

Some Inside Thoughts On Proposed Tax Reforms

The fact that medicine will cure our ills doesn't make it taste any better. The fact that a broad base tax will cure New Jersey's critical property tax problem doesn't make it any more palatable.

We were perfectly aware of this when we accepted the Tax Policy Committee's report and presented our version of its recommendation to the Legislature. We knew people were afraid that a now program meant higher taxes. We knew that most people would not understand this complicated program of reform when it was first presented.

For that reason, we have spent the better part of a month writing newspaper articles, appearing on television and radio shows and speaking to leaders in all walks of life throughout the state. We hope that people will better understand the program and decide on the basis of knowledge and understanding - not fear - whether or not they approve of this program. I'm convinced the tax reform program is best for all the people of New Jersey, that it corrects longstanding inequities in our traxing system; that it will provide a just system of taxation for everyone; and that, in believing all this, I would be derelict in my duty if I failed to use every means in my power to inform the citizens of New Jersey of this programs on they can tell their legislators how they feel about tax reform.

Many people objected to the income tax provision of the plan when it was first proposed. But the objections have been diminishing, as people come to understand what is involved. More and more are agreeing that we have to reduce property taxes, and that an income tax, where each person's fair share of the cost of government is based on his ability to pay, is the fairest way to cut the property taxes and still provide the government services the public demands.

The proposed income tax would work very much like the federal income tax you now pay, but with several innovative improvements for taxpayers, particularly for parents of many students and for tenants. You would begin by taking your gross income for the year and subtracting the various deductions, including tution payments for children in college, to arrive at net income. This is multiplied by the appropriate fate; ranging from one per cent for income under \$1,000 up to 14 per cent for income over \$200,000. From the resulting tax you then deduct tax credits, including \$14 for yourself and each dependent. Parents with olithidren in parochial schools will be eligible for a tax credit up to the full amount of tution, a dattion, a tenant computing his income may deduct from his gross income his proportionate share of the property tax on the building where he resides, and deduct his proportionate share of property tax reduction, resulting from the reform program, from his taxes due.

There are other benefits. The State income tax would become a deduction on your federal tax thereby recovering some of the tax money going to the federal government from New Jersey. In addition, as a result of instituting an income tax system, New Jersey would qualify for increased federal funds if and when federal revenue sharing is adopted.

The reform program applies not only to individuals, but also to businesses. The purpose of reform is to see that each pays his proper share. We have taken measures to insure that industries and commercial businesses, including commercial property landlords, many of whom are owners of large and valuable properties, do not profit by the reductions in real estate property taxes.

This will be accomplished by levying an "excess gains tax" of 100 per cent on any profit realized by a business as a result of a real property tax reduction under the reform program.

That is the most important provision relating to business, but there are other revisions including increases in corporate income taxes, the business personal property tax and certain taxes on banks public utilities and insurance companies.

On the other hand, it also provides for the elimination of certain unfair business taxes such as the retail gross receipts tax, the tax on unincorporated business and exempting business machinery and equipment from the State sales tax. As a result of the total program, business would pay slightly more of the State's total tax burden than it now does. But we agree with the Tax Policy Committee that this is a more equitable distribution of the cost of government.

We believe this is a fair and balanced program that will permit business to operate without either paralyzing penalties or unwarranted incentives. We believe that in a stabilized at atmosphere, business can prosper and provide the employment that is essential to the wellbeing of our citizens.

You And Your Pet Be Alert To Dog's

Failing Vision By Raymond Min or DVM

Since you can't ask your dog to read an eye chart, how can you be alert to any deterioration in his vision! It this is occurring, is there anything you can do about it anything you can do about it light in discussing this situation, I'd like to make several points. First, nearly all dog's develop some cloudiness in the pupils of their eyes as they grow older.

This condition is known as nuclear solerosis, a natural hardening of the lens fibers which reduces the light entering the eye. It results in limited vision, but not to the point of blindness.

A cataract is a cloudy or opaque discoloration within the lens of the eye. In an advanced cataract, the pupil may appear bluish white or grey with a mother-of-pearl sheen.

Many pet owners do not realize that their dogs have cataracts because the animals retain some degree of useful vision.

I would recommend that at the first sign of any cloudiness, or other change, in your dog's eyes have your veterinarian check the animal.

How does the veterinarian examine the dog's eyes? The examination procedure is the same as for a small child.

Both eyes are inspected in daylight for evidence of in-juries, ocular discharge, ab-normal position or move-ment of the eyeball.

The next part of the examination takes place in a dark room or stall.

Some veterinarians will ask the pet owner to bring the dog into the dark room, place him on the examination table and hold the animal's head during the examination.

Since there are no distractions, the dog will tend to seek the light from the veterinarian's opthalmoscope, an instrument used for inspecting the interior of the eye.

In an aged dog (over eight years old) the lens may appear quite opaque on examination when senile citaracts are forming. And yet, a considerable degree of useful vision remains, enough for the animal to get around without the need for surgery.

Don't be misled into believing that cataracts are a condition associated only with old age.

Juvenile or development cataracts are frequently found in dogs under six years of age. They are often in-herited.

Infectious diseases are common causes of both juvenile and senile cataracts. Glaucoma may be associated with senile cataracts.

A completely opaque and nonfunctional lens can be removed surgically, in many cases with the return of good ambulatory vision.

The operation is generally performed by a practitioner who specializes in veterinary ophthalmology, the study and treatment of diseases of the eye in animals.

This type of surgery is known as ''elective'' because it is not necessary to save the life of the animal. He can live without the operation. The veterinarian may advise against it if there is too much risk involved.

I recommend that you have your veterinarian examine your dog at least once a year, and at that time check the animal's eyes.

Corrosion of sprayer parts can be reduced by flushing insecticide residues from reservoir tanks, hoses and nozzles after each use.

Don't Give Beetles A Fighting Chance

Black, brown, or striped flea beetles that jump when you disturb them can soon destroy all hopes of fresh vegetables grown in the home garden.

Leaves of attacked plants appear as if they had been shot full of hofes and plants soon die if the one-sixteenth-inch beetles are not controlled, says William F.Munk, senior county agricultural agent of Essex County.

As soon as you set your transplants apply Sevin dust or spray to the leaves and stems, advises Mr. Munk. Thorough coverage of plant parts with insecticide is essential for good control, he

Repeat the treatment when you see beetles or fresh feeding holes again. When the edible portions of the plant begin to form, apply methoxychlor.

Rhododendron Leaf Diseases

Rhododendrons are among the most prized plants for the home grounds. Unfortunately they suffer from any diseases and problems.

Gray or brown spots or blockes on leaves indicate that the plant is infested with fungio em olds.






