

## Plunging Birth Rate

The national birth rate plunged to its lowest level in the history of the nation in the first quarter of this year. Should the rate remain at this level, or move lower, the country's traditional population growth rate would be reduced amost to zero.

The National Center for Health Statistics reports a 1972 rate of 15.8 births per 1.000 population, which compares with a 1971 rate of 17.3 per thousand. It reports the estimated average number of children of women of childbearing age has dropped to about 2.14 as a result of the decline. An average of 2.11 per woman would produce zero population growth, the Center estimates.

The oversight in these figures and estimates is that they do not take into account immigration, since immigration, much of it illegal, continues to pour Spanish Americans into the nation, es-

pecially into Florida, Texas, New Mexico, Arizona and California, the nation's pop-ulation is certain to continue to grow.

One result of a lower national birth rate then is likely to be an increase in the percentage of people of Latin American extraction. The vast majority of these immigrants have been taught it's sinful to use the birth control pill and therefore have larger than average families, even with lower than average means.

Combined with the fact that the nation's basic immigration law was changed in the middle sixtles to allow immigrants to enter the nation more or less on a first-come, first serve basis, rather than on a quota system giving each ethnic segment of the, population its fair share of immigration by quota, what low American birth rates combined with predominately Latin-American immigration likely means is a slow but steady altering of the basic ethnic makeup of the country.

WHILE STATEWIDE ATTENTION is riveted on New Jersey's tax structure and legislative action to let an income tax remove part of the municipal dependence on the hoary property tax, I have been intrigued by a conversation with a real estate man who holds firm views about the need for tax relief in saving open space.

He doesn't want me to mention his name, but he told me that "The only way to conserve land is not to use it. Since it's certainly going to be used anyway, the only sensible thing is to use it intensively in spots and not at all in wide surrounding areas.

His first step in that direction would be to ban further building of single family dwellings. "I know that's an unworkable idea, but I'm only talking theoretically, so hear me out", he said.

He said single family dwelling units on small lots are the most wasteful kind of construction from the standpoint of saving open space. "Yet that's the kind of construction builders prefer in this state. Zoning and planning boards will always opt for one-family houses because that's what the most people prefer".

IF HIS IDEA of a ban came to be, he said, "The present owners of one-family

houses would profit greatly, because their values would rise due to scarcity".

Despite his views about having open space surround areas of high density use, he doesn't like cluster zoning. "It merely invites an economic and social degeneration for many reasons. For one thing, the cluster zone takes a limsy type of construction and concentrates it in close proximity. For another, it brings people into close proximity and invites friction among differing types. 'I'm not merely referring here to racial and ethnic differences, but even employment disparities." (I violently disagree with him there!)

What he favors, he said, is high rise apartments. "Anything from 10 to 20 stories high, depending on the locale and terrain. High rise is a superior kind of construction and it puts the most people into the smallest area, so that virgin land can be extensive and the oppimum population density can be had".

HE HASTILY ADDED that when he talks about high rises, he means substantial buildings with strong managements. He favors sizes which will permit indoor restrictional facilities, snack bars will cut down on traffic.

He sees little friction between neighbors in apartment houses because "they won't be

owning their own places. Real trouble comes in a neighborhood because of the attitudes of homeowners to what they imagine as threats to their personally owned little kingdoms".

BEING OF A REALISTIC turn of mind DELIVO UP A REALISTIC turn of mind, he adds another argument. "If the suburban crime rate keeps climbing, which it's probably going to do, the high rise will prove the most easily defended against outsiders bent on robbery or other crimes. On the other hand, the single family home is the most vulnerable of all—the hardest to defend."

He said a Rutgers University study recently said essentially the same thing about high rises and open space preserva-tion. "Sort of like putting a high rise on the corner of a farm and keeping the rest of it actively in agriculture"

AS FOR TAXATION, he has a few ideas

He proposes a federal inheritance tax provision which will hold back on charging of an inheritance tax until such time as land is taken out of its natural state and developed

Like a lot of other people, he favors beefing up a farmer's desire to keep his land

in agriculture by increasing the rollback from the present three years to some lengthier term. Rollback is the extra taxation a farmer pays when he sells his land, to make up for the tax break he had been getting because it was limited to agricultural

He takes this farm assessment idea a step further by advocating that any land of a minimum acreage get farmland assessments if it is in some kind of "ecological use", such as woodland, flood plain, marshland, wetland, etc., even though it's not being used agriculturally. Any stop on that cological uses should cost the owner, the presentations of the properties of the pr

ALTHOUGH SOME of my friend's ideas are a bit extreme, and I certainly cannot support all of them, they do have merit. Such ideas are calculated to ignite more creative thinking among people who mull them over, and that's something we badly need.

There is no question at all that land use patterns must radically change in this state we're in. Business as usual for the next decade or two would simply multiply all of the urban, suburban and rural land use problems we have now—and these already seem to be insolvable!

## **Urges Protect** Us Against Eye Quacks

To the Editor:
The New Jersey Optometric Association between the State Board of Medical Examiners is failing to protect the public from "quickie" eye examiners at highway eyeglass centers.

The Medical Board recently adopted a rule for a minimum eye examination to regulate the physicians—MDs and osteopaths—who are performing "quickie" eye examinations at mass-production eyeglass centers.

But, this rule is an attempt to delude the people into believing they will now receive an adequate eye exam from physicians at these drive-in eyeglass stands.

The eye exam rule adopted by the Medical Board imposes no requirement that a physician at the highway eyeglass centers have any qualification to examine eyes and requires only that four procedures, instead of sixteen, be performed by the examiner.

Earlier this year, separate investigations con-ducted by the NIOA and the State Division of Consumer Affairs revealed that some physicians with no specialized training in eye care were performing two-minute eye exams that resulted in harmful prescriptions.

None of the exams were performed by an optometrist. Unlike physicians, optometrists are required, by law, to perform a sixteen-point exam that lasts at least a half hour. Optometrists are also prohibited, by law, from practicing in a commercial establishment. Both laws were proposed by the NJOA.

The NJOA calls upon the Medical Board to require that only qualified eye specialists be allowed to perform eye examinations for corrective lenses and that these examinations include the sixteen vital procedures followed by optometrists.


