

You And Your Pet

Exercise Your Animals

By Raymond Minor, D. V M.

By Roymond

Exercise ranks
second—behind food—in a
list of items crucial to the
well-being of your dog or cat.
And the task of giving your
pet enough activity has
become more difficult in our
urbanized society.
In a typical old-fashioned
home, with a cellar and an attic, a cat experienced a good
bit of exercise simply by running up and down stairs,
checking every nook and
cranny.

checking every nook and cranics (or stairs) in an arrangement of the many hooks and cranics (or stairs) in an apraparament or modern-ranch house.

Outside exercise has also become more difficult to obtain "naturally." In many communities, dogs are forbidden by law from roaming free in public places. The same laws don't normally apply to cats, but threats of injury or theft make many cat owners follow the same policy that dog owners are forced to adhere to.

One solution to the problem of sufficient exercise, for both dogs and cats, is the leash. Yes, cats trained at an early age enjoy a walk around the block on a leash.

Where time or other factors prevent leash exercising of a cat, an outdoor cage can prove useful.

prove useful.

Cages can be purchased commercially. Or, if you are handy, you can build one yourself with old, window screens. Ordinary, window screening, should be replaced with two-inch mesh chicken wire to prevent the cat from catching his claws.

The larger the cage, the more exercise for your cat, And when the weather is good, the cat can be profitably, left outsdie for an hour or two in his cage.

For dog owners, the task is a bit more arduous. Dogs should be walked twice each day. And they should be taken as far as they can go without

seeming tired.

If you are uncertain about
the distance your dog can
walk, start with ashort jaunt
and gradually increase the
distance each day. If you have
any doubts, consult your local
veterinarian.

In addition to their twice-aday walks, a dog should be

In addition to their twice-a-day walks, a dog should be exercised and played with regularly in his yard. If possi-ble, he can be taken for, a romp in the woods or a field. Do not feed your pet im-mediately before or after exercise. If it is very hot, try to exercise in the early morn-ning or evening. Dogs in par-ticular find the going tough on icy pawements.

ning or evening. Dogs in par-ticular find the going tough on icy pawements.

If your pet gets caught in the rain, dry him off when you return home. Be sure to check his feet for thorns, cuts or abrasions and his coat for burs or ticks.

And one more note of caution: the danger of poisoning is a very real one, particularly for pets left to wander alone outdoors.

Poisoning is often the result of eating something left to kill rodents, or eating the rodent which has already eaten the poison. If may also come from eating grass or plants that have been sprayed for in-sects.

The important rule in treating a poisoned pet is speed. Give your pet an emetic to make it vomit, then rush it to your veterinarian.

Some effective emetics are: two or three tablespoons of salt water and a teaspoonful of peroxide diluted with an equal quantity of warm water.

In either case, what you do with the tree after you get it home will determine its appearance and safety when you set it up indoors.

William F. Munk, senior countly agricultural agent of Essex County, has some tips on how to maintain good tree color, reduce needle drop, and keep the tree moist and more resistant to fire.

*When you bren gour tree home from the market place it in a bucket of water out-doors or in a cool place until you are ready to decorate it. Exposure to snow of, rain won't hurt it but heat will dry it out and cause the needlest to drop early.

*When you're ready to

*Place the tree in a container or tree holder filled with water. Never place the tree near a fireplace.

*Keep the cut surface covered with water at all times. A tree in a warm room may use a pint of water a day.







On June 16 of this year, PSE&G filed a Petition with the New Jersey Board of Public Utility Commissioners for a general increase in electric and gas rates. Increasing costs have forced us to revise this original request.

Costs have increased in one area through the enactment of the National Safety and Health Act. For example; Abandoned buildings or those destroyed by fire, and there have been many in our urban areas, can no longer have gas service simply turned off in the building. We must now dig up the street, excavate, cut the line, plug the main, fill in the excavation and repave the street.

Also in the interest of safety, we have shortened the replacement time of larger gas mains. Because traffic. weight has increased dramatically, the risk of cracks developing in older cast iron gas mains has also increased. These are being replaced with steel or plastic mains at a stepped-up pace.

Still another example of changing times is reflected in the salvage value.

of electric lines we must replace on a periodic basis to maintain efficient service. Since, for many years, we have been replacing copper lines with the aluminum type, we are no longer benefitting from the high salvage value of the copper wire.




