Though the continual news of the frightening Harrisburg radiation leak has stirred much local concern, citizens can rest assured that Belleville is prepared for most nuclear emergencies.

Belleville Fire Capt, Al Lowack and Firemen Mike Fortino and Tom Nisivoccia recently completed a special one-week course in Manasquan on the proper steps to take in the event nuclear, fallout threatened the community.

the event nuclear landst threatened the community. Fire Chief George Sbarra and Public Safety Commissioner Rocco Saletta proposed having the firemen take the course even before the Har-

he said.

The course he and his fellow firemen took was entitled, "Radiological Monitoring," and was presented by two teachers from the University of Lowell, Mass., in Manasquan.

"The course instructed us on how to provide the maximum amount of safety during a nuclear fallout," Lowack said.

The firemen explained that they would set up major fallout shelters areas and gather townspeople to the safest possible places in the event of a radiation seepage.

Should a sudden nuclear accident occur, the best spot to head for would be a basement or ground floor, said the firemen.

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

What's happening on the Washington scene; we are informed that "both the Social Security Program and the Social Security Administration are basically in very good shape." This quote from Stanley G. Ross, commissioner shape." This quote from Stanley G. Ross commissioner of the Social Security Administrative Office. Also on the federal level, Congressman Joseph Minish has introduced Bill No.HR 1424 which if passed, would provide senior citizens with an alternate to nursing home confinement. Cash payments would be made to elderly persons eligible for Medicare and Medicaid who do not require around-the-clock nursing supervision. It has been determined by Congressman Minish that money would be saved in that the payments for the service of taking care of the in-home elderly would amount to ½ of the average cost of nursing home care. The in-home patient in familiar surroundings, would be more likely to improve in health by living with their loved ones and knowing that they wuld be contributing to the household income.

On the state level, in New Jersey, we are still waiting for a break in 'the implementation of the Lifeline Bill. Although the lifeline statute authorizes lower rates or all users of small amounts of gas and electricity with incomes of less than \$9,000 for individuals and \$12,000 for families, The Transportation Committee, which has charge and has been given jurisdiction over implementation, still has not come up with a workable solution. The Essex County Council of Senior Citizens Clubs is sponsoring a bus and turning it over to the New Jersey Federation of Senior Citizens for their use to transport senior members to the federation convention in Asbury Park on April 18. The Council supports those who have shown a great interest in our area seniors. Their intense

shown a great interest in our area seniors. Their intense feelings and knowledge towards the plight of the elderly should be recognized and we support any effort, whether or not it be political and we do not care from which side of the fence, as long as it is a means to an end that will alleviate the pressures on the elderly and help them to cope

with today's problems.

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

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
