## Sixteen in race for commission

Sixteen Belleville citizens, four of them incumbents, will run for the five seats on the Town Commission in the upcoming May elections and currently await ballot positions which will be determined at a Town Hall drawing this afternoon at 3.

The field of candidates, which is larger than the 11 in the last election, includes incumbents Mayor Michael Marotti, Commissioners Mary V. Senatore, Vincent Strumolo and Joseph McGreevy. The other hopefuls are Joseph Fornarotto, Michael P. Pizza, Jerry DiNicola, James R. Golden, Joseph R. Yeamans, Matthew Pica, Michael A. Bisci, Albert Guglicelli, Joseph Granes, Harry J. Romeo, Joseph Capezera and Kevin Kennedy.

**MAYOR MAROTTI** will seek his third term this year. He has been mayor since 1971. He was re-elected in 1975.

Marotti, who graduated from School 4 and Belleville High School, has been actively involved in the AMVETS, the American Legion,

Belleville Kiwanis, Italian-American Civic Association and other groups.

An Air Force veteran, Marotti is also actively involved in the Little League and has a field named in his honor in town. His slogan is "Performance, Not Promises."

**JOSEPH MCGREEVY**, past mayor of Belleville, will seek his fourth term on the commission. His previous two terms, he has served as finance director.

Some people feel McGreevy is responsible for making Belleville a debt free town. He is running under the banner, "strict fiscal management."

The commissioner is a graduate of Seton Hall University. He owns McGreevy's Tavern on Cleveland Street. He has been actively involved in such organizations as the Knights of Columbus and the American Legion. An Air Force veteran, McGreevy received a Purple Heart.

**INCUMBENT VINCENT STRUMOLO** will seek his fourth term race as director of health and public services.

Strumolo attended Belleville High School and was a councilman-at-large under the town's old form of government. He is actively involved in the VFW, United Way, American Legion and the Boy Scouts.

He says he deserves re-election "on his record."

**COMMISSIONER MARY V. SENATORE**, the only female candidate, will seek her fourth term in the upcoming May elections with the slogan, "for continuous service."

Currently the director of public works, Mrs. Senatore graduated from Belleville High School and Drakes Business School. She attended Panzer College.

A former Girl Scout leader, Mrs. Senatore was chairman of the Belleville Board of Adjustment. She has won various honors including the Professional Woman's Award and Please see "Fiscal" on page 4.

## Belleville gas stations say supplies, hours being cut

Belleville service station owners are wary of the impending gas crunch although they have not yet felt the hardships of the steady rise in gasoline prices or the meager allocation of gas.

The Times/News spoke with several service station owners this week in an effort to discern how the current "crisis" has affected business.

"Gasoline has only gone up a penny or so and so far we're not running

short," a spokesman from Ronnie's Texaco on Washington Avenue said. "We've been conducting business here like nothing has happened," he said in reference to the hardships some stations are experiencing.

The spokesman at Ronnie's said that the owner even "pumps a little gas on Sundays."

Belleville American, the Amoco station on Washington Avenue, has not "been hurt" although prices have gone up two and a half cents in the past two weeks.

"We haven't run out of gas yet but I anticipate, with the way things seem to be going, that we'll have to cut down on our hours," Pete Zabohonski, owner, said.

His service station is presently open on Sundays and week nights.

"It's really our repair work that keeps us busy and in business," Zabohonski added. "It really wouldn't be worth staying here if it wasn't for that."

Kenny Fordney, manager of Bell Washington Auto Center, Washington Avenue, also said that business had "been about the same." But he admitted that the station had run out of gas several times in the past several weeks.

"We can't stay open on Sundays and we have already been forced to close earlier at nights," Fordney said.

"Gasoline has jumped eight cents in the past month and a half at the Chevron Station and Fordney says there is a real danger that they will lose some of their customers."

"There's no gas shortage as far as I'm concerned," Fordney said. "As soon as the people in control get their price, gas will be readily available," he added.

after a while, but the risk still exists," he said.

The course he and his fellow firemen took was entitled, "Radiological Monitoring," and was presented by two teachers from the University of Lowell, Mass., in Mansquan.

"The course instructed us on how to provide the maximum amount of safety during a nuclear fallout," Lowack said.

The firemen explained that they would set up major fallout shelters areas and gather townspeople to the safest possible places in the event of a radiation seepage.

Should a sudden nuclear accident occur, the best spot to head for would be a basement or ground floor, said the firemen.

## Budget is nixed at polls

While Caesar Romano and Anthony D'Agostino sang a victorious "My Way" and a surprised Charles Miele remained speechless after coming up as the number one choice at Tuesday's school election polls, Mary Shader nodded her head to the fact that the educational budget had once again failed to capture a positive vote.

"Another election year is over," Mrs. Shader, the system's secretary-business administrator, said. "And another budget is rejected by the people."

But another year has only just begun for Charles Miele who led the school board race with 1,603 votes. "I'm ecstatic," he said. "The people have done a fine job and they are the answer."

Tuesday's election marked Miele's second try for a seat on the Belleville Board of Education. He ran seven years ago but was unsuccessful. "People didn't know who I was. I knew then I had to get more involved and let the people know I'm here."

When asked about the number of votes he gained over the three incumbents, Miele commented, "You don't expect anything, you just wait and see."

On the other side of town, Anthony D'Agostino hugged his wife and daughter as the tally put him about 200 votes over his opponent, Felix Linfante, for the one-year term on the Belleville board.

"Being one of the winners, Belleville has truly won in this election," he said. "Now, I have to prove myself in performance."

D'Agostino, who received 1,479 votes, spoke about beginning immediately to foster communication between the board and parents and said the main concentration will be on both the desegregation issue and the re-districting of the schools.

D'Agostino had another reaction: "We are the quality and backbone that is needed on the Belleville Board of Education."

Though the continual news of the frightening Harrisburg radiation leak has stirred much local concern, citizens can rest assured that Belleville is prepared for most nuclear emergencies.

Belleville Fire Capt. Al Lowack and Firemen Mike Fortino and Tom Nisoviccia recently completed a special one-week course in Manassquan on the proper steps to take in the event nuclear fallout threatened the community.

Fire Chief George Sbarra and Public Safety Commissioner Rocco Saletta proposed having the firemen take the course even before the Harrisburg incident.

"We thought the area of nuclear power and the deadliness of radiation were worth looking into for the safety of Belleville," Sbarra commented.

Nisoviccia said that there was once even more concern about the leakage of radiation. "It died down

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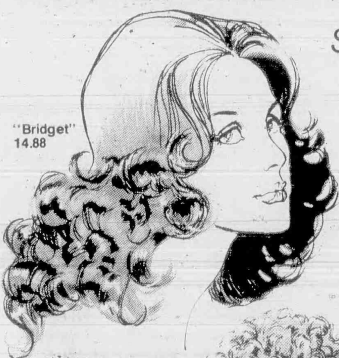
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# Despite single bid, schools save on supplies for the coming year

Despite regrets that there has been no competitive bidding on the school supply contract in four years, trustees have approved a state contract with J.L. Hammett Company, the lone bidder. Any local purchasing done under a state contract exempts a school board from advertising for bids.

The \$51,705.74 figure represented a 20 percent savings over last year. Belleville schools previously paid J.L. Hammett directly for supplies. But because Hammett is one of only

a few nearby educational supply companies, trustees decided to okay the state contract with Hammett which will cost about \$10,000 less than the contract signed with the same firm two years ago.

"There hasn't been a competitive bid on this school supplies contract for at least four or five years," said Board Secretary Administrator Mary Shadr. "This situation exists in most of the towns around here. If you look around you'll see most of these surrounding areas have the same problem with this," she said.

Shadr said teachers and administrators establish "a set of standards" for school supplies by examining and recommending a specific brand "or its equal" for classroom use. She said more than 1,000 different school items are included in the supply contract.

"When we are bidding for these items we have to maintain certain standards," she said, adding the paucity of bidders may make it appear local taxpayers are being overcharged. "But Hammett has been the only bidder on this for years now," she noted, stressing a firm in Massachusetts does bid but added transportation costs raise the price of its supplies.

Trustees Ernie Zoppi and Pete Clarizio emphasized the board should find other supply contract bidders, thus reducing cost.

"Maybe we can get the same supplies, although of a little lesser quality to do the same job," said Clarizio. Zoppi said he knew of supply companies with lower prices. "We're buying basically the same things we could get somewhere else. I think it's wrong," he said.

# Holy Family sponsoring tour of Italy in summer

## Legal error delays Pathmark action

A representative for Chatsworth Properties, which owns part of the land on which a Pathmark complex might be built here, has succeeded in delaying Planning Board action on the proposed project for three more weeks.

Krieger charged that persons owning property in the surrounding area were not properly notified about Monday's special meeting on the project, thus making any action taken then void.

After a brief recess, board attorney Thomas DiBiasi said that according to the transcript from a previous meeting, Pathmark attorney Lawrence Berger stated that he would contact residents within the required 200 feet of the project to make them aware of the meeting.

DiBiasi noted that although notices advertising the meeting were taken out in local newspapers, the nearby residents had not been contacted. The board attorney agreed with Krieger and advised planners against a decision until the public was properly notified.

"We did try," Chairman Joseph Grande said regretfully as he scheduled another special meeting by vote of the entire board for Monday, April 23, at 7:30 p.m.

"Mr. Krieger did his homework," he added.

Krieger's client bought surface land above the Transcontinental Pipe Line several months ago and owns a 20-foot-long section near the proposed employee parking area south of the project.

Krieger also argued that the proposed project could not draw from the storm sewers located on the property and asked the board to deny the site plan.

Grande asked Pathmark representatives for more information on the storm sewers located at the easement and for several minor details on the site plan concerning lighting and railing.

Krieger refused to say why his client opposes the Pathmark site plan.

Before the hasty adjournment, planners and board consultant Grace Harris discussed several changes that the board requested in the original site plan.

Neither proper dumpsters or a shopper pick-up and loading area in front of the entrance to the shopping mall is designated in an area of 56 feet long and eight feet wide.

Mrs. Harris' main concern over parking circulation was alleviated in the revised plan which reflects a one-way entrance and one-way exit for the main parking lot and two-way circulation for the aisles within the lot.

Three signs have also been designated in the plan, one large sign

in the front of the mall and two in the southerly facade of the building. Two will read "Pathmark Super Center" and the other "Belleville Mall."

Monday Mrs. Harris and board members further requested guardrails for shopping cart return, low lighting on the entrance driveway, stairs from the ground floor level to parking garage, proper refuse control and additional satellite store signs to be within zoning requirements.

Grande and various board members asked that the town engineer, Essex-Passaic-Hudson Soil Conservation District, Public Service Electric & Gas Company and Transcontinental Gas Pipeline Company also okay the proposal before its moves off the drawing board.

Planning Board members also said they would recommend that the Belleville Department of Public Safety apply to the State Department of Transportation for a crosswalk on Washington Avenue at the site of the Pathmark complex.

## Let's meet every week

Without commenting on the merits of any individual candidate in Belleville's large field for the next month's commission election, we assume the community is not going to undergo a major revolution at the May polls.



Most of the incumbents, if not all, stand a good chance to be reelected.

While we have endorsed a change of Belleville's form of government, it's not likely to happen soon"—and certainly not before the new Board of Commissioners is elected, reorganized and well on its way to preserving or building new political powerhouses.

Since the form of government cannot be changed quickly, we propose that the incoming Board of Commissioners take im-

mediate steps to increase inter-departmental cooperation and communication. As a first step, we suggest commissioners schedule meetings on a weekly basis and at the same time, make a serious effort to cut down the wasteful time spent at many meetings listening to the self-serving speeches of the same half dozen people who monopolize the very precious hour or two our commissioners gather every other week to exchange thoughts on community affairs.

A meeting every week coupled with a weekly open conference session would go a long way, we sincerely believe, in promoting inter-departmental cooperation and communication among our five municipal departments.

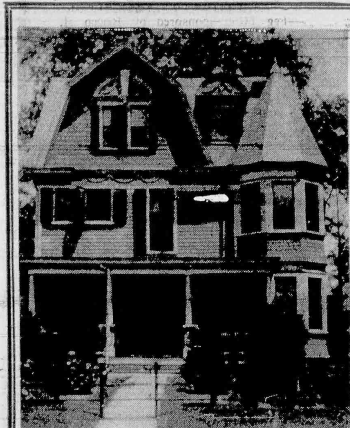
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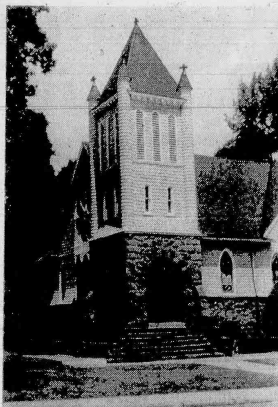


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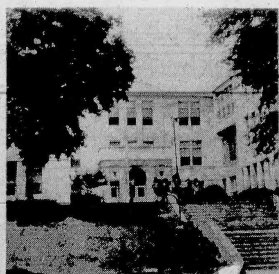

## One season harriers might like to repeat

Flip back the calendar a couple of years. Keep flipping until you reach the year 1975.

When one thinks of 1975, one might remember the Mayaguez Incident, the great World Series between the Reds and Red Sox, the end of the Vietnam conflict, the Golden State Warriors winning the NBA title in a shocking sweep of the Washington Bullets and a man from Georgia named Carter who entered his name in the presidential sweepstakes.

And the spring of 1975 was a very special one for Belleville High sports. Every varsity team put together a winning record that year. For the baseball and crew teams, that feat was pretty routine. For the 1975 track team, it was something that was long awaited.

You see, the track team hadn't had a winning campaign in 15 years. It might not have been a winner in all those years, but its members didn't seem to notice. Those guys knew how to have fun and still give their best effort. The problem was that there wasn't a great deal of interest in the team. But the athletes who gave the sport a try usually stuck with it.

However in 1975, the team mixed a little bit of craziness with a good deal of talent and came through with an 8-6 record. The Bellboys lost four of those meets by a total of 27 points. Their mile relay team set a school record that has yet to be equalled. The two-miler, Jim Beck, won 12 of 14 dual races and placed fourth in the Big 10 championship at Nutley in a time of 10:08. The sprinter, Greg Bunch, advanced to the state championships with a time of 10.1 in the 100-yard dash. Quarter-miler Brian Wood set a school record by running 51.1 seconds in the state sectionals. Miler Nelson Seda ran his best career race in the state sectionals with a 4:33 in blistering heat. Ken Drake, the team's Mr. Versatility, excelled in the high and low hurdles, the high and long jumps. Then there was Mike Fortino. Mike was the number one half-miler and the third leg on the mile relay team. He was also the team personality. If anyone knew how to have fun, it was Mike Fortino. If there was anyone crazy, it was Mike Fortino. If there was anyone who would give everything he ever had, it was Mike Fortino.

The guy had a great deal of pride in his team. He ran against Columbia even though he had a high fever. In the half-mile against Nutley, he ran by the Raiders' side of the bleachers and raised his finger, signifying he was number one. In plain language, Mike was the team leader, and his enthusiasm was something that the entire team modeled itself after.

The track team of 1975 ran under subpar conditions. The track looked like the battleground at Gettysburg. There were holes, big rocks and an occasional sand dune. But still the team practiced and still it competed. It was on that track that Belleville upset a very powerful Montclair team 68-54. It was there that the Bellboys newly opened a great Nutley team. The team wanted to win, but more important was out to have fun and enjoy the competition. Just as the team was getting off the bus for the Big 10 championship, John Matera, the quarter-miler, exclaimed that he wasn't getting back on the bus until his team was Big 10 champ. His teammates laughed because they knew that that was a high improbability.

The season culminated in a 76-46 triumph over Kearny. The win was a great one because it assured the team of a winning record, and the win was against Kearny, a constant nemesis of Belleville for so many years.

There hasn't been another winning record in track at Belleville High since, and chances are that when there is a winning team on the Buc cinders there will never be a team with the zeal and enthusiasm that that team had.

Another thing that comes to mind when I think of that spring is baseball. The baseball team finished 14-10 for the year but at one point was 11-1. What turned the season around was a game between Belleville and Irvington in May 1975. Irvington was undefeated and the number one ranked team in the state. The Campers had beaten Belleville at Irvington on opening day 2-0 on a Ron Krill no-hitter.

The second contest, at Belleville this time, was a classic. Krill did not start for Irvington, but a pitcher named Bob Wacker who was almost as good did. He allowed one run over five innings of work. But the Belleville pitcher, Greg Pettie, had allowed no runs during that span. Irvington tied the game at one apiece with a run in the sixth inning. In the bottom of the sixth, Krill came on to pitch and was once again unstoppable. Belleville did manage to eke out a couple of hits off him but could not score that magic run. Pettie was marvelous, though. He pitched 11 innings and allowed one run. The game lasted 14 grueling innings, 14 innings that saw a torrential rainstorm, a Belleville player going after an Irvington player, the managers of the two teams in an argument, some very questionable calls by the umpires and a Belleville player signifying with his finger just what he thought of the Irvington fans. Not, naturally, that they were number one.

Irvington won the marathon with a three-run homer in the 14th inning. Krill pitched eight innings, allowed no runs and was the winner.

Despite the loss, it was a great game but one that was tough to lose. The Bellboys hit a slide after that battle, but no member of that squad will ever forget that contest in May of 1975.

Did you watch the championship game last Monday of the NCAA basketball tournament? Michigan State won the game 76-65 over an Indiana State team that suffered from horrendous foul-shooting, bad officiating and only 19 points from its super player, Larry Bird. Ervin "Magic" Johnson of MSU was the game MVP with 24 points. If he decides to claim hardship and jump right into the pros next year, he should be an instant success. MSU's guard, junior Terry Donnelly, was the story of the game. Donnelly took five shots from the field. He hit all five. He scored 15 points in all and took up the slack well when Johnson and Greg Kelsey were in foul trouble.

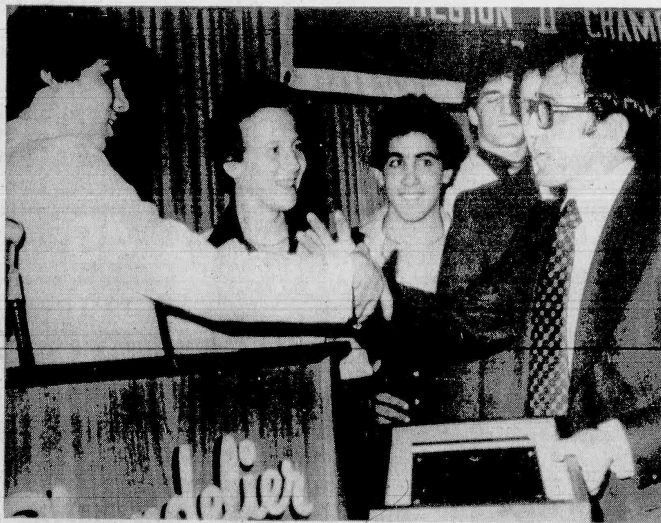
Board Vice President Ralph Risoli presented Musmanno with a written commendation from trustees and each board member congratulated him twice.

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## Senior Notes

What's happening on the Washington scene; we are informed that "both the Social Security Program and the Social Security Administration are basically in very good shape." This quote from Stanley G. Ross, commissioner of the Social Security Administrative Office. Also on the federal level, Congressman Joseph Minish has introduced Bill No. HR 1424 which if passed, would provide senior citizens with an alternate to nursing home confinement. Cash payments would be made to elderly persons eligible for Medicare and Medicaid who do not require around-the-clock nursing supervision. It has been determined by Congressman Minish that money would be saved in that the payments for the service of taking care of the in-home elderly would amount to 1/2 of the average cost of nursing home care. The in-home patient in familiar surroundings, would be more likely to improve in health by living with their loved ones and knowing that they would be contributing to the household income.

On the state level, in New Jersey, we are still waiting for a break in the implementation of the Lifeline Bill. Although the lifeline statute authorizes lower rates for all users of small amounts of gas and electricity with incomes of less than \$9,000 for individuals and \$12,000 for families, The Transportation Committee, which has charge and has been given jurisdiction over implementation, still has not come up with a workable solution.

The Essex County Council of Senior Citizens Clubs is sponsoring a bus and turning it over to the New Jersey Federation of Senior Citizens for their use to transport senior members to the federation convention in Asbury Park on April 18. The Council supports those who have shown a great interest in our area seniors. Their intense feelings and knowledge towards the plight of the elderly should be recognized and we support any effort, whether or not it be political and we do not care from which side of the fence, as long as it is a means to an end that will alleviate the pressures on the elderly and help them to cope with today's problems.

Members of the Belleville Senior Citizens Club and representatives of the County Groups will also be making the trip, to Asbury as will other senior groups from this area. We are hoping for a good turnout.

Did you feel both? What were you trying to accomplish by doing what you were doing? Did you honestly misunderstand his instruction or were you purposely trying to do it wrong to get even, because you were mad? Be Honest! Ask him to share the same was with you. Was he mad at you for something else and unable to talk to you about it? Remember your purpose is to find out what was going on underneath the fact that you were both not getting along. Then, you'll have the opportunity to solve the real problem.

It is not unusual for many parents and their teenage children to go through this kind of a stage of being unable to relate to each other. It's just as difficult for parents to understand their children growing up as it is for kids to grow up. # Firemen will direct preparation for possible nuclear emergency

especially the wind direction. "Rain is probably the best precaution now for us," Lowack added. "It brings any traces of radiation down from the air."

The three firemen are also trained to use various equipment to measure the extent of radiation in the air during any future emergency.

According to the men, Belleville is now equipped with one of two survey meters and Geiger counters. But state officials have informed the town that they will fill requests for additional and proper equipment.

Nisoviccia, Lowack and Fortino noted that they are not professionals and that the program was a "basic crash course." "We can maintain ultimate safety precautions, however," they said.

What's the biggest danger of

radiation in the atmosphere? "It's more internal," Nisoviccia said as he explained exposure to radiation can cause cancer throughout the glands of the human body.

The men explained that radiation can penetrate the skin, and various rays are also inhaled into the lungs.

"The frightening thing about it is that you can be exposed to radiation in the air without even knowing it," Lowack added.

"People exposed to radiation don't usually show any physical signs until many days later," he continued.

The firemen hope to contact the local civil defense office and begin to spread awareness of nuclear power, radiation and how to prepare in the event of an emergency.

The men also noted that not many nearby towns are prepared for any type of atomic radiation

emergency and did not send representatives to take the special course. "They should have been there for the people's sake," Lowack said.

There is presently one nuclear power plant in southern New Jersey at Oyster Creek and a plant adjacent to this in Forked River is currently being proposed.

There are also various plants throughout New York and surrounding states.

It is very unlikely that a nuclear accident will affect Belleville, according to firemen and safety officials, but "we are prepared to insure the maximum amount of safety," they commented.

for comment as he joined voters at the Fountain Restaurant with D'Agostino. "These people did it right here," he said as pointed to the crowd.

"I didn't even campaign, but they saw what I could do and had confidence enough to vote for me," he added. "And they're going to see a hell of a lot more."

Fired up about the desegregation issue, Romana charged, "The community is going to win this time against the state." There is no deliberate segregation in Belleville.

The element of surprise and maybe disappointment in the election was the loss by incumbent Peter Clarizio who slipped from the race gaining only 1,152 votes.

"I was pleased with the results," Clarizio said. "Miele is a well-qualified person and I hope he will be a benefit to our children."

Clarizio said there was a possibility he would run again for a Board of Education seat but meanwhile would still remain active in the school system.

Felix A. Linfante, who admitted his true age as "19 but in a few weeks I'll be 20," held a respectable position with 1,285 votes. Although losing to D'Agostino, Linfante con-

gratulated him and other members saying he would remain active in the system and run for another seat again.

Sam Petracca, who awaited the results promptly well before other candidates showed up, picked up 1,097 votes. He quickly slipped out saddened by the outcome and headed for his headquarters. "My people need me now."

Joseph DelGuercio gained the least amount of votes with 604 and was the only candidate not present during the count at the school board office.

Only 3,386 citizens came out for the elections to vote and the largest number emerged from School 3 with 406 votes. School 4 cast the highest number of votes for one candidate — Charles Miele with 234 votes out of the 372 votes.

Citizens voted "no" on both budget issues. For district taxes in the current expense, 1,027 voted no; and 1,026 voted no for district taxes in the capital outlay.

The new board members will officially begin their new term in May. As a new member, Charles Miele was invited to sit with the board during the meetings without voting privileges until his inauguration.
