Library wing likely to be late opening

Local officials mingled at an informal opening of the Belleville Public Library's new addition last Wednesday, but since furniture hasn't yet been purchased or a heating system installed, it's unlikely the addition will open by Christmas as originally scheduled.

Nearly 11 years of waiting will come to an end when the addition "officially" opens, which Library Director Gerard Hickey estimates might not be until next summer due to delays.

The heating system should be in by December's finish, said Hickey, but he stressed that if the addition opens soon, as library trustee Joe Casale predicted, comfort would be limited since no furniture has even been ordered yet.

Cold air from the unheated addition has made local librarians unhappy. Please see "delays" on page 11.

SUPPLIER IN A BIND

Cost of water could double

Belleville residents may soon be watching how they use water with greater care than ever since its price could soon double if the Newark Water Company gains an added \$267.92 surcharge on every million gallons. The price hike is being demanded due to an increasing scarcity of water and rising prices for the local supplier.

Because Newark is paying Elizabethtown Water \$389 per million gallons and charging its seven municipal customers only \$250 per million gallons, the company is losing money. It is buying other water

too, which has also increased in price due to New Jersey's drought, so Newark is applying to the State Public Utilities Commission in hopes of raising its price to \$517.92 per million gallons — a jump of more than 100 percent. A \$62,448 surcharge on Belleville retroactive from Sept. 7 is pending the decision of PUC officials.

Local tax collector and water monitor Steve Vogel estimates an "average" family of four will use 2,400 cubic feet of water in a three-month billing period, costing \$15.60 a quarter at water's current price. That \$15.60 will more than double if

George Lister is sworn in as Belleville police chief

"You couldn't find a better man for the job in the town of Belleville," said Public Safety Commissioner Matthew Pica of the new police chief, George Lister.

Pica "found" Lister nine months ago when the lifelong Belleville resident was appointed to succeed the retiring Joseph Smith, but Civil Service snags held up the swearing in until Monday of this week at a Town Hall ceremony attended by relatives and friends of the new chief and most of the town's top officials.

"It was one of the easiest decisions I've had to make," said a beaming Pica in brief remarks before residents crowded into the Town Commission Chambers, and Lister's extensive background in police work shows why that was so.

A member of the Belleville department since November 1952 when he began the first of 12 years as a patrolman, Lister, who'll turn 52 tomorrow, has almost literally lived and breathed law enforcement all his life. As a boy, Lister told the crowd Monday, he lived next door to Belleville's first police chief, Michael J. Flynn, and he used to "sit on his knee." Though Lister's grandfather was dead, a picture of the man in his blue uniform hung from a wall in the family home, and two of Lister's uncles were also police officers.

Lister, a graduate of St. Benedict's High School in Newark,

advanced up the ranks in the local police department, becoming deputy chief in 1973. Continually working to improve himself on the job, Lister attended William Paterson College in Wayne, graduating in 1977. He also spent 11 weeks at the FBI Academy. He was named acting chief on March 1, following Smith's retirement, and commissioners approved his permanent appointment Oct. 28.

Lister thanked commissioners for

their support and had good things to say about Belleville's men in blue. "We have one of the finest departments in Essex County, in my opinion," the chief said. "They're a fine group of men to work with."

Lister's wife Joan held the Bible as Town Clerk Mary Lou Hood administered the oath of office, and it was for his family that the chief had the final word of thanks "for putting up with all those long hours."

Judge won't hear pleas to reopen School 1 case

Newark Administrative Law Judge Arnold Samuels has refused to hear any arguments presented against School 1's closing because local parents didn't file their lawsuit within 90 days of the March 3 Board of Education decision to shut down the school.

The parents, Judy Wright and Judy Sobanko, filed their suit after State Education Commissioner Fred Burke officially okayed the School Board's desegregation plan closing the school July 24. They were told by their original attorney, Jacob Zimmerman of Newark, along with local attorney and trustee Tom Zampino, to wait until Burke's decision, since in the words of trustees, "Nothing's final yet."

Board attorney Lawrence Schwartz chalked up his second victory in the School 1 legal battle by convincing Judge Samuels that the 90-day filing deadline requirement, normally required, applied in this case. In August, he convinced Samuels to permit trustees to shut down School 1 after contending neither Mrs. Wright nor Mrs. Sobanko could show "irreparable harm" stemming from School 1's unforeseen closing.

Both mothers had pointed out that School 1's closing wasn't recommended by a 51-member school restructuring committee, and was open to public debate only on the night trustees were going to vote on it. The two women said "ir-

reparable" harm would be done to School 1's children if it closed — a charge Schwartz shrewdly turned against them.

"I am impressed with the results," said Schwartz, cracking a smile Monday night. He stressed that most judges adhere closely "to the 90-day time frame" for filing legal appeals but pointed out that parents may still appeal Samuels' decision as well as request a hearing before the State Board of Education.

School 1 attorney Richard Vallario said Burke can either accept, reject, modify or ignore Samuels' decision. If he lets it lie for 45 days, it then is automatically accepted, or if he rejects it, then Samuels may have to hear School 1's case on Jan. 5, 6, 8 and 9 — previously scheduled court dates.

Vallario said he'd make sure Burke realized most School 1 parents were "under the assumption" — obviously given credibility by trustees' pleas to wait for Burke's reply — that nothing would happen until Burke's reply was received. But when it was received, most trustees took that as gospel, saying Septmeber was fast approaching and not much should be done since Burke had already okayed their plan.

But implicit in trustees' pleas to wait for Burke's reply, parents believe, was the understanding that School 1 would probably still be saved, an understanding buoyed by

White stuff causes very little problem

A slick coating of light snow Monday night caused four minor accidents locally, but disappointed Belleville snow aficionados obviously dreaming of a white Christmas.

Although weather forecasters predicted accumulations of four to six inches, and possibly even 10, barely half-an-inch of white flakes landed. Three salt trucks scurried about early Tuesday morning to help melt away most of the minor accumulation on roads.

The brief snowstorm was the second this winter season, coming after a Nov. 17 dusting. Most snow was gone by Tuesday night, washed away by a light mist falling during most of the day. Damp, near-freezing temperatures Tuesday night chilled outside venturers strolling beneath Washington Avenue's Yuletide display of Christmas trees, candles and bells framed by red, green and white lights.

"I didn't think it was much," said Public Works Commissioner Mary Senatore contacted Tuesday night. She said had forecasts come true,

would have been much worse." Mrs. Senatore was busy making Christmas cookies Tuesday night, catching the snowy, Christmas season spirit.

She said 10 public works employees labored until 5:30 a.m. Tuesday before coming back to DPW's Cortlandt Street garage.

She said whenever a snowfall threatens Belleville, depending on the forecast, her department usually gets both plows and salters ready and makes up a list of men to work based on seniority. If a heavy snowfall hits, all 38 DPW employees are called in.

"There were four minor accidents," said Police Dispatcher Joe Mulvihill Tuesday afternoon. He said two Washington Avenue mishaps, another on Route 21 and a fourth were caused by slippery conditions.

"It was just the usual thing," added Mulvihill, noting many youngsters called local police to find out whether school was closed, a decision administrators don't usually

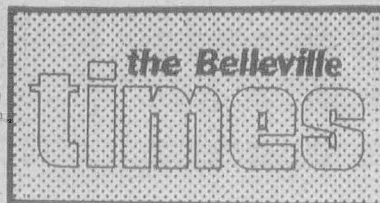

BRACES AND PROFESSIONAL CLEANING

Important as it is for all of us to have our teeth cleaned at regular intervals it is even more important for orthodontic patients to have regular office cleanings and fluoride treatments. Food, plaque, and cavity forming debris can accumulate around the braces more quickly with these "plaque catchers". They must be removed by a dental hygienist or dentist even though orthodontic patients follow their home care instructions with their toothbrush.

For best results, the orthodontic wires should occasionally be removed from the

braces that are cemented on the teeth so that better access can be achieved by the dentist or hygienist. All tartar and plaque can then be removed prior to a thorough fluoride treatment. The archwires can then be tied back into the cemented braces by the orthodontist and tooth movement can continue at its usual rate.

Future of child tests clouded by finances

Screening of infants from birth to detect learning, emotional or physical difficulties will begin in September 1982 locally if the State Assembly passes Bill A-538. However, Special Services Director Anthony Chirico foresees little hope Belleville schools will be able to continue the testing once state funding subsidies.

Chirico completely favors having pre-school youngsters examined by his three child study teams (CST) enabling them to define problems before they are compounded, but with Belleville's repeated school budget defeats and rising costs, he fears the screenings could easily be bumped in favor of other educational necessities.

More than 600 local students are now "classified" in one of 12 categories following tests by CST members, and without continued federal and state aid, Chirico would find it virtually impossible to conduct comprehensive screenings and follow-up programs for youngsters with learning problems.

Two weeks ago, Amelia Augustowicz, a familiar face at daily BIPPY (Belleville Intervention Program for Pre-school Youngsters) classes, urged trustees to send three telegrams urging local assemblymen to vote for A-538. Trustees support

the bill but haven't discussed local financing at length.

"What's really going to happen is the Board of Education will have to pay for this after a couple years," pointed out Chirico. "This is going to cause hardships for 100 percent of the school districts," said Chirico, fingering New Jersey's municipal "cap" law that limits school budgets and inflation as leading culprits paralyzing any future pre-kindergarten screening program.

Presently, the 24 pre-school children enrolled in Belleville's BIPPY program aren't "classified," although they are periodically re-evaluated by BIPPY's two teachers, one consultant and four aides who handle the program. Chirico says by "classifying" the BIPPY children, Belleville will probably be eligible for more state aid if the program to screen tots gets underway in 1982 as proposed.

"I'm totally in favor of this, but on the other hand, you have to look at the cost," said Chirico, who's using Title VI federal money to pay for Belleville's third CST.

BIPPY began officially in March. "The only thing we don't like is the word handicapped. These are children with special needs," says Mrs. Augustowicz, who pointed to a recent newspaper photo caption that she said several people misinterpreted when they saw the word "handicapped," referring to several BIPPY children.

"If they're unclassified, they shouldn't be labeled. A couple of parents saw that picture, and they looked at our kids as if they were freaks," said Mrs. Augustowicz, who has two boys in BIPPY. "This (labeling) is stigmatizing them."

Mrs. Augustowicz said she was glad New Jersey's Senate Education Committee unanimously approved A-538, but it still awaits the full Assembly's approval and the governor's signature.

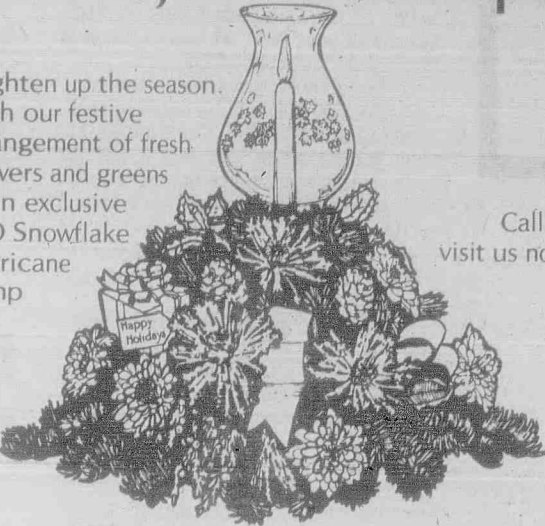
Man from the Pole down in the Valley

Airman Salters finishes training

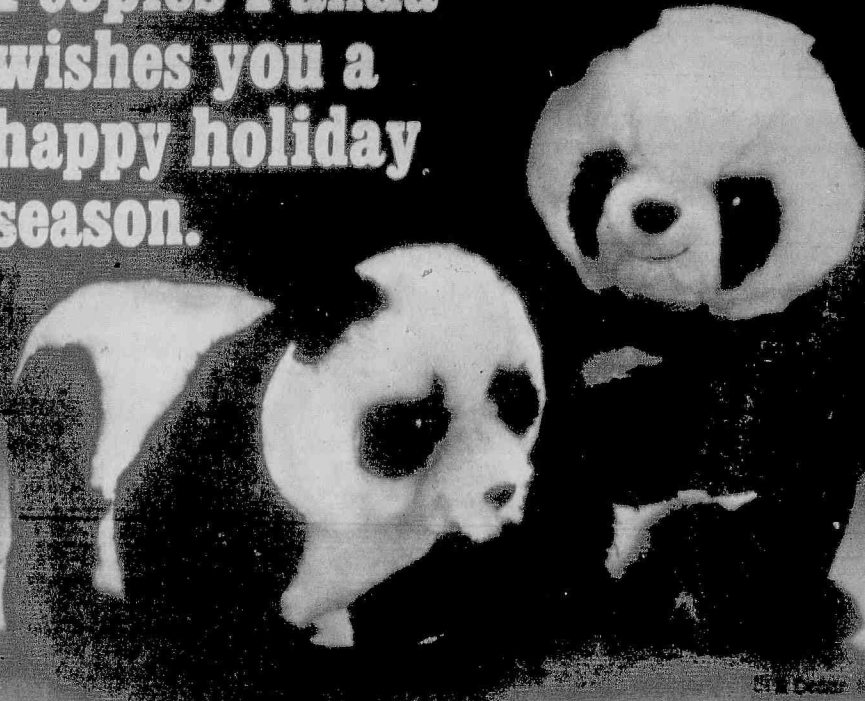
Navy Airman James F. Salters of Belleville has completed recruit training at the Naval Training Center, Great Lakes, Ill.

At the funeral services, his teammate, Whitey Ford, in offering a eulogy, commented that

Elston was admired for his great courage, his pride as a New York Yankee, and had receive national acclaim because of his dignity and class. In closing, Whitey Ford delivered a heart-rending "Number 32, rest in peace."

The postscript we would add to Whitey Ford's comments would be addressed to the family. We knew Elston as a friend — a cherished one. In his passing, Elston has left a rare family legacy, one to be cherished by his wife, his two daughters and Elston Jr. Today the family could look back and say to Elston, "Thanks for the memories."

In Elston's passing, the nation and the world of sports have lost a model of human dignity — a man for all classes — the family has lost a loving husband and devoted father — we have lost a best friend. May God grant him eternal rest — and to his family the strength to carry on — Amen.

Elderly at Geriatrics Center get best of care from a loving staff

To the Editor:

May I take exception to the "Elderly blast" on the Geriatrics Center by Mike Olohan in your Nov. 20 issue. I attended the meeting he reported on.

I was somewhat shocked at the statement that 300 older adults had been abandoned by their children. This is grossly untrue. Some may be forgotten. I feel the percentage is small. Some may have no living relatives. My elder sister was admitted to the center 19 months ago and during that time I have met many relatives and friends visiting there. Some of them also volunteer.

I those 19 months, I have never seen a roach in her second floor west room, but I heard there are some in other areas. This is a condition that can be resolved. Mr. Merigan is aware of it together with the other problems he has inherited. I certainly would not label it a "horror story." Visit some of the private nursing homes and I'm sure you will not find the patients as well taken care of as they are at Geriatrics Center. I know we have been there.

The medical staff headed by Dr. Greco leaves nothing to be desired. They spend endless hours caring for the residents. The food is institutional and cannot satisfy all. I have been there many noontimes and have seen the trays come up. The food seems to be adequate for inactive people.

Mr. Michael Ziv who heads social services has done a great job. In fact, the entire personnel of the center makes it a very pleasant place to visit.

The shortage of nurses is a real problem. Mr. Shapiro is aware of it and hopefully something may be done about it.

The nurses are doing a terrific job, sometimes under difficult circumstances. They work long hours giving loving care to all.

Don Vaillancourt, president of the family council, has done much for the betterment of the residents, and George Myer, head of volunteers, has given time and effort to induce more people to volunteer.

The Geriatrics Center is a facility where older adults receive special care.

Senior Notes

Robert Parinello assisted by Michael Morello of the Clara Maass Memorial Hospital staff presented a demonstration of the Heimlich maneuver to members of the Belleville Senior Citizens Club. This method of saving the lives of choking victims was portrayed with a movie and further explained by Parinello. A question-and-answer period followed during which some of the seniors told of their own experiences with the Heimlich maneuver in saving someone's life. All clubs should see this demonstration.

The Belleville club will continue the collection of foodstuffs for the needy until Dec. 23 when they will be taken to the Welfare Department for distribution. The collection of clothes for the Italian earthquake victims has been called to a halt for the time being. Money contributions can still be made by sending your check or money order to Italian Earthquake Relief, First National Bank, P.O. Box 1810, Newark, N.J., 07104.

I read with misgivings about the several criminals who are receiving Social Security money while serving time for their crimes. It is not unusual for some to collect over \$500 per month. We read that the whole Social Security system is in financial difficulty because of more money being paid out than is collected from the people still working. What a travesty this is to allow convicted felons to take advantage of this giveaway program. I thought that benefits were to be paid to retired people and in some cases disabled people and families of same.

I would like to make a suggestion, with tongue in cheek of course, that perhaps it would be a good idea for all seniors who are having a hard time of it to find a way to get into jail and stay there. They could further enhance the country club atmosphere with the presence of their senior friends while being housed, fed and clothed by the government and still collect their Social Security benefit checks. I am not saying that I advocate crime against society to be eligible for a jail term, but if the real criminals can get away with it, why not the elderly? The only thing to be lost perhaps would be their freedom, but what the heck, we're not going anywhere anyway. We could get a weekend off once a month for good behavior and after seeing what goes on in the outside world, it would probably be a pleasure to get back. Merry Christmas to all senior citizens and their benefactors!

Talks expected soon on school purchase

With the cost estimate of School 2 expected within weeks, School Board President Ernie Zoppi and Mayor Michael Marotti will soon discuss the possibility of transforming the building into a town recreation center.

When trustees discuss the cost appraisal of School 2, they will then decide whether to cut the price and offer a bargain deal to commissioners. With constant budget defeats, trustees themselves have little money to spare, but may decide to slice the price not only to help the commissioners but themselves.

Since commissioners decide where budget cuts should be made after the school tabs are defeated, trustees might be able to work out a deal whereby they will reduce School 2's price if commissioners promise not to cut more than a specified amount after a defeat, if there is one. Belleville's school budget has gone down 17 of the last 18 years.

Besides commissioners' possible purchase, trustees have been approached by commercial firms, said Zoppi, noting, however, that commissioners would be given the first shot at buying the land and building.

Trustees own nine-tenths of an acre around the 86-year-old building to which an addition was added in 1966. Commissioners own an acre of the property. The Soho school was closed this fall because of declining enrollment and increasing costs as part of Belleville's "restructuring" plan to save money and end what the state has said is defacto segregation here.

Asked about the possibility of cutting the price in return for commissioners' guarantee about cutting funds in case of a budget defeat, Zoppi said, "I don't think in good faith you can do that. I take exception to the cuts commissioners make," he added, though, stressing many are "arbitrary" and hurt education.

Zoppi said he'd be meeting with commissioners before the April school election next year to explain Belleville's school budget to them and get their suggestions, which may reduce cuts if the tab is defeated. He conceded trustees "have been remiss" in not consulting with commissioners about the budget in the past.

"I'm very much in favor of recreation up there," Zoppi said of the suggestion that School 2 may be used as a rec center. He said he can't be sure his colleagues will favor cutting the price of School 2 to help commissioners. He also noted there

are no land dedication problems with School 2, noting only the property at Mill Street and Franklin Avenue has stipulations attached to it. That property was donated by the old Jergens Company to the town to be used for recreation purposes, a stipulation that caused controversy when a group tried to get an okay for senior citizen housing on the site.

"I think we need a lot more recreation in town," said Trustee Tom Zampino, asked about converting School 2. He suggested tying a reduced price to commissioners' agreement not to cut Belleville's school budget if it's defeated — a suggestion for now that's only a trial balloon.

Play review

O'Casey plays make great Christmas gift

The Nutley Little Theatre has furnished a most thoughtful gift for theater-goers this holiday season, a witty, well produced ensemble of one-act Sean O'Casey plays which opened Friday night at the NLT Barn. "The Moon Shines Over Kilenamoe" and "Bedtime Story" were as warm and flavorful as the spicy, heated cider served during intermission.

The cast seemed in love with the two satirical, slice-of-life stories which captured pieces of Ireland during the early 1900s. Though very quaint and full of pungent wit and dry humor, no doubt these plays were meant as strong social statements and eye-raising moral satire at the time they were written.

The major success of the two pieces was the cast's ability to communicate the rich, earthy human spirit and sly charm of early 20th century Irish life. The entire cast seemed to hit upon a most believable Irish brogue which not only sounded good but helped to build the mood and manner of the characters. The players were in full command of each other and their surroundings — a fine tip of the hat to directors Linda DeSimon and Robert Pace.

Richard Kaye was a gem, perfectly cast as the befuddled, pompous windbag, Lord Leslieon, setting himself up as a high class clay pigeon which the rustic Irish folk found an easy target for mockery. I say, he was rather snobbish and stuffy, which provided the rest of the cast ample ammunition for giving him the run-around and the business. In plain "English," Lord Leslieon was really asking for it.

Confronting and confounding, Lord Leslieon in "Kilenamoe" (the entry directed by Pace) was a rascally crew of salty-dog bucks and lassies which had assembled at the train station, led by a spunky, bleary-eyed crank played by Mike Mulrenan, who turned his character loose in a most splendid performance.

The wily Cort boys, brothers Jim and Thomas, were two spirited trainmen who poked, slapped and taunted Lord Leslieon around the stage. Fred Hutter played the straight-laced station master, Sean Tomasheen, who drew guffaws from

the audience while mimicking Lord Leslieon behind his back as he ranted and gestured over his plight. Miriam Orner played the sassy and humorous Martha Conroy, who echoed Corny's words. John Kenney and Dolores Helsel were young lovers passing by who also took a hand with spiteful remarks directed towards Leslieon.

In "Bedtime Story," directed by Linda DeSimon, Jim Cort and Dolores Helsel formed an amusing and energetic comedy team. Cort had a reservoir of worrisome comic spirit as he thrashed about the stage in a zany dither. His charm and punch were staples in both one-act performances.


Helsel was the source of Cort's anxiety, showing her own humorous energy as she danced about the stage, ignoring Cort's pleas for silence, trying to conceal their scandalous affair. Helsel was well cast and brought Angela Nightingale to life as the slightly-less-than-innocent object of John Jo's desire.

Mulrenan and Orner again contributed delightful characters to the stage, adding more confusion to John Jo's anxious predicament. Mulrenan, in particular, was again bright and funny.

Lighting, sound effects and set design greatly enhanced the production, especially in "Kilenamoe." The dimly lit, sparse grey stage produced a quiet, almost surrealistically empty mood, one which the players used to full advantage.

The ensemble was paying special tribute to the memory of O'Casey, an Irish playwright, on this, the 10-0th anniversary of his birth. At the end of the evening's performance, the players gathered once again on stage, joined by directors Pace and DeSimon for sing-a-long Irish folk tunes with acoustic guitars.

Performances continue tomorrow, Saturday and Sunday at the Little Theater Barn, 47 Erie Place, adjacent to Yantacaw School, and attendance for your holiday pleasure is recommended. For ticket information, phone 783-7665 or 667-5492.

 comfortable lately, since no partitions close off the cold-absorbing cement addition.

"We just don't have the dollars to do it," said Hickey of providing furniture costing \$80,000 to \$100,000. But he added, "Hopefully, it'll (heat) be done before the end of the year."

The addition was originally estimated at \$240,000 but leapfrogging construction costs pushed that figure to \$335,000, including architectural fees of \$25,000.

"I think they're all satisfied with it," said Hickey of local officials' appraisals. He said he hopes the addition can open soon, but doubts it.

Hickey has said he'll try to add about 20,000 more fiction books when the addition opens, giving Belleville's Library nearly 100,000 such volumes. But the most important part of the addition is providing sitting and working space, always in short supply in Belleville's library.

Newark's price increase is okayed. A hearing on Newark's increase ap-

plication was held yesterday. Vogel stresses that water bills have always "been a drop in the

bucket" when compared to other utility tabs, but with the price expected to leap and water generally in short supply, people may definitely take drastic steps to cut back.

Newark's director of customer services, Joseph Paradise, says Newark must continue to buy water at higher prices so it can maintain its slowly dwindling reservoir supplies. If the company didn't purchase water, he said, Newark would soon run dry and be forced to curtail water supplies to Belleville, Wayne, Elizabeth, South Orange, Bloomfield and Pequannock.

"Is it fair for Newark to pay \$389 per million gallons but only charge Belleville \$250?" asked Paradise. "I think they should pay this increase," he added, noting Newark officials have never before had any trouble from Belleville officials about increasing rates. But in the same breath he said, "I'm sure they'll probably protest like hell (this increase). The state's been involved, and they've agreed it's not fair that Newark should be losing money like this. They (state officials) have to worry about this situation (declining water supplies and rising prices)," he stressed.

Newark Mayor Kenneth Gibson told Belleville commissioners the price increase was necessary because of "substantial costs (incurred) in the purchase and transfer of water to you and other customers," adding New Jersey's drought has caused problems. The mayor said "we would like to continue serving your community...but we are not in a position to subsidize the cost of the water we supply you."

Vogel said last week's daily consumption was an average 529,329 cubic feet daily or about 3.7 million gallons, which means because the surcharge is retroactive to Sept. 7,

Belleville officials may have to come up with an additional \$80,000 to \$100,000 this year alone.

That would mean quarterly bills will soon be jumping, reflecting increases in other utility bills that have many families wrapped in financial straitjackets.

"This whole thing (water increase) has a good chance of ending up in litigation," said Town Attorney Frank Zinna, although he wasn't sure whether commissioners would contest the increase until after yesterday's hearing results are known.

Zinna said Belleville's water contract with Newark contains a clause stating that Newark reserves the right to take care of Newark's water needs first, and its customers second. He said he expected PUC officials to okay Newark's increase (since the company probably could prove it can't supply water to its customers without purchasing outside water).

He said commissioners could begin a legal battle if Newark gets its increase, ignore the increase in which case Newark would probably take Belleville to court, or simply pay the increase.

"Right now, we're in a holding pattern. If they say, 'Pay the increase,' we may pay or go to court for immediate relief. They (Newark) may say they have no obligation to supply you if you don't pay the increase," said Zinna.

He said he doubted whether it would be a plus for Belleville to point out that it has been conserving almost 15 percent compared to Newark's poor record of 7 percent, especially considering Newark's bigger water headaches such as tenement houses and industry.

"It's certainly possible, but I doubt if it would be of much value," he said.

the stands of Trustees Tom Zampino and John DiStasi supporting the Valley school.

"All Samuels has ruled is that he can't hear this," said Vallario Monday afternoon. Just 18 days from today, School 1's court dates will begin, so Vallario expects an early opinion from Burke. Vallario said he'll stress the fact that trustees led School 1 parents to believe nothing was official until Burke decided whether to accept or reject the desegregation plan okayed March 3.

"I was very disappointed by this (Samuels's ruling)," said Judy Wright Monday. "Not only did the board and board attorney mislead us when they said School 1 was in the budget and that nothing would be done until they heard from the state, but they did a complete about-face after Burke's reply," she added.

Mrs. Wright said trustees' passive acceptance of Burke's desegregation plan approval was "unethical and vindictive" towards School 1 children and parents. Because trustees urged them to be patient, to wait for Burke's response, Mrs. Wright emphasized, "That's where they misled us. They lied to us. I'm hurt, because we've been very up-front with them."

"I'm still optimistic that we'll win in the end. The board made a terrible, terrible mistake March 3 (voting 4-3 to okay Belleville's desegregation plan). The board is arrogant. They said they did this for the good of the town...bullshit," said an angry Mrs. Wright.

Mrs. Sobanko said she expected Samuels's negative ruling, pointing out that Schwartz filed in Newark to delay parents' appeal to state education officials in Trenton, which she feels they'll win. "Regardless of what Lawrence Schwartz says, the desegregation plan and the closing of School 1 are one and the same thing.

This (court setback) is just more red tape" on the way to Trenton, she added.

Surprisingly, no trustee or school official announced Samuels's favorable ruling at Monday's public business meeting, though Schwartz later asked a reporter if he'd heard about the ruling.

"They (trustees) spit in our face by closing the good school," said Mrs. Wright, noting School 1 doesn't need \$86,000 worth of new windows like School 9, has a bigger playground, has hot lunch facilities and is generally in better physical shape than 9, a smaller school left open. Trustees cited declining enrollments, inflation and underutilization as prime reasons for closing School 1. They've discussed using the now mostly empty building for board offices, an idea that has infuriated parents who say schools should be used for educating, not administration.

"They gave us the toilet," Mrs. Wright said, referring to School 9's needed renovations and expenditures. "What they did was wrong. There's nothing they can do now except correct it."

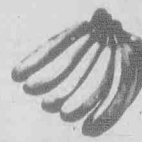

Buc Shots



Gridmen dominated most '80 opponents

Now that the original sting of that 22-7 loss to West Essex has worn off a bit, it seems a good time to reflect back on the great 9-2 season that this year's Belleville football squad put together.

The Bucs scored 242 points this year, allowing just 129 points. A very interesting statistic, among many, is that Belleville was penalized some 670 yards while the opposition was hit for only 320 yards. For the year in numbers, see page 17.

The 1980 season started at Belleville with the opposition, the No. 1 team in the state at the time, Livingston. The Lancers came in with a fine passer in Stan Yagiello and a great receiver in George Alpert. The two did not disappoint any Livingston fan or The Star-Ledger as the Lancers rolled to a 36-12 win. Ken Constantino and Billy Zeimer scored touchdowns off passes from quarterback John Melillo for the Bucs.

The Bucs found victory number one a rather wet one the following week against Montclair. In a driving rainstorm, the Bucs held off the Mounties 7-6 thanks to some fine running by Pete Haverick and a Melillo-to-Eugene Cancelliere touchdown pass in the first quarter. Montclair scored its only points in the first quarter following the Belleville tally but missed the all-important conversion. Paul Scheuplein intercepted a pass late in the game to seal the first of many Buc wins.

A keyed-up Nutley squad gave Belleville all it could handle in week three. Following a 72-yard Melillo-to-Constantino touchdown pass, the Raiders tied the score quickly and it took a Melillo run of 33 yards late in the game for Belleville to come out on top 13-7.

The fourth week of the season saw Belleville defeat previously unbeaten Passaic 13-9 in Passaic. The Bucs trailed 6-0 at half-time, but a Melillo-to-Frank Fazzini touchdown pass and later a Melillo-to-Scheuplein pass sealed the Indians' fate. The officiating in this game was absolutely horrible, but the Bucs managed to overcome adversity to win this very big game.

Belleville traveled to Bayonne for a battle with another unbeaten team, Marist, the following week. This time, the Bucs made surprisingly easy work of the opposition, winning 35-7 as Melillo had a field day and junior Frank Fazzini ran all over the Marist defense for 200 yards plus. Fazzini, who switched to fullback in the Passaic game and was all but unstoppable the rest of the year, scored the game's first touchdown on a 72-yard run from scrimmage.

With their record now 4-1, the Bucs returned home for a game with the Eagles of Essex Catholic. The Bucs were easy winners as Mike Dalla Riva scored his first varsity touchdown and Fazzini had another good night. Tight end Bill Wash hauled in his second touchdown pass of the season as Belleville won 34-0.

The best game of the season, as far as I'm concerned, was the 34-8 trouncing of Seton Hall the following week. It was such a sweet win because it erased the memories of that 63-0 loss to the Hall back in 1977. The game was dedicated to Tom Mack, who was seriously injured in practice, and was in the hospital. The Bucs could do no wrong in this game as Melillo hit Constantino for a score and Fazzini crossed the goal line three times. Scheuplein closed out the scoring with a four-yard run.

The Bucs, now 6-1 and thinking playoffs, had their usual battle with Clark and as usual it was tough one and turned out to be a last-minute affair. Belleville won 20-12 as Fazzini ran 49 yards late in the game to wrap it up. He started the game with a 75-yard run, but Clark would not fold. With Belleville leading 13-6, the Crusaders scored, but elected to go for two points. Despite what the obnoxious Clark announcer thought, the runner was stopped short.

Belleville's next game was in the first round of the Group IV, Section 2 playoffs with Morris Knolls. The Golden Eagles were a hard-hitting team with a 7-1 record and gave Belleville fits all evening. Scheuplein ran for over 100 yards that day and Belleville won 14-7 as Fazzini and Scheuplein scored. The victory gave Belleville the right to play West Essex in two weeks for the championship of Group IV, Section 2.

The Bucs played in the traditional Thanksgiving Day game and defeated Ralph Borgess and the Kards 53-15. Borgess, who last year was the Bucs' defensive wizard, has done a good job in turning that the program around in Kearny and with his guidance, the Kards will be hard to contend with. However, this game was all Belleville as Fazzini crashed the 1,000-yard mark and Dalla Riva had a superb day.

And of course, there was the 22-7 loss to West Essex that concluded the fine season. The only Buc score was a 43-yard pass from Melillo to Constantino as West Essex played perhaps its finest game of the season. Melillo was hurt late in the game, but thankfully it was not as serious as first thought, and the senior will be on the basketball court to lend his efforts to that program.

Next week, I hope to present a summary of the underclass football seasons.

Congratulations to the Belleville girls' basketball team on winning its opener 58-29 over Verona. Jennifer Apicella, the freshman sensation, hit for 28 points to lead the way. Apicella will be something else for the future of Belleville basketball. She is a fine shooter and is a very confident player who almost beat me in a game of OUT last Saturday at practice.

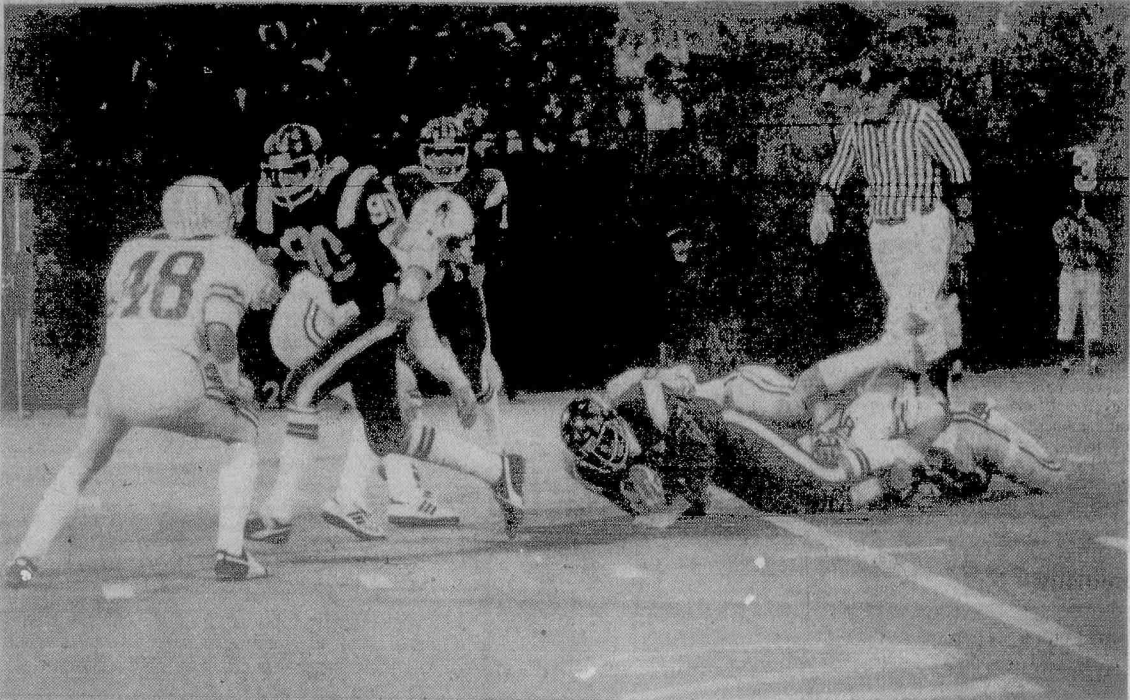


Innovative Group — The Belleville cheerleaders present a new routine during the halftime of Tuesday's girls' basketball game at the BHS

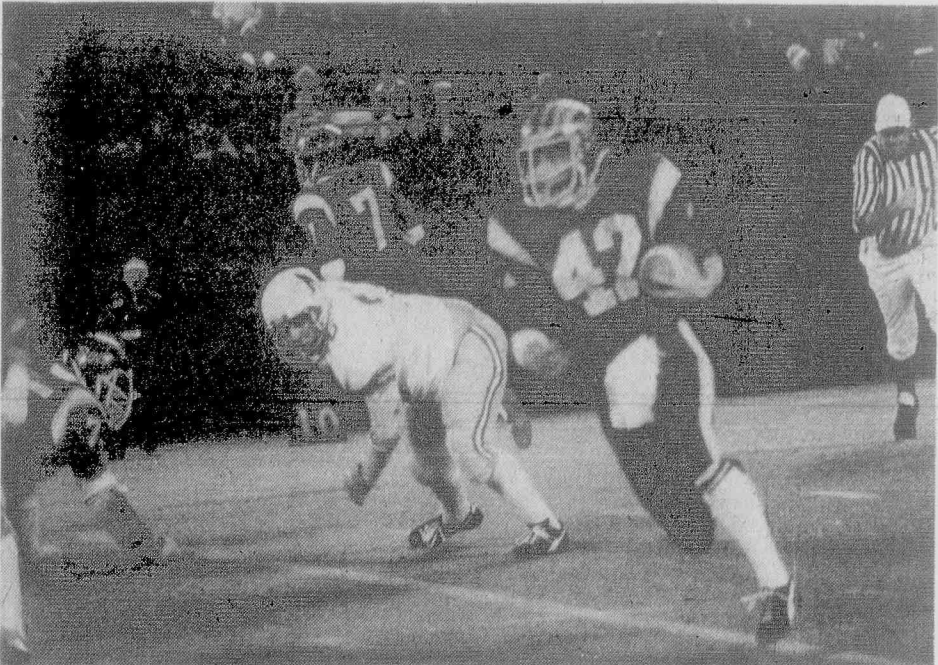

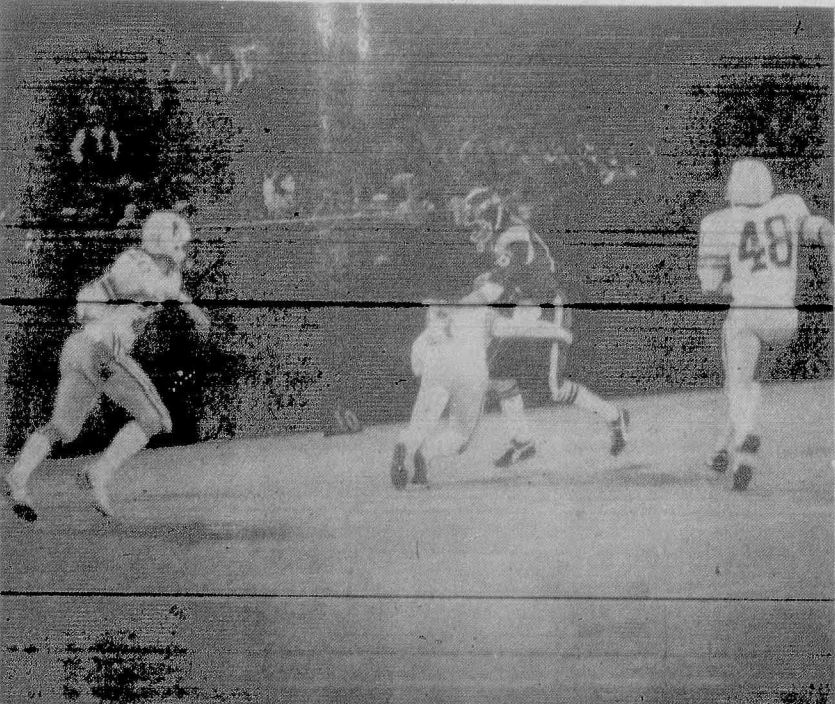

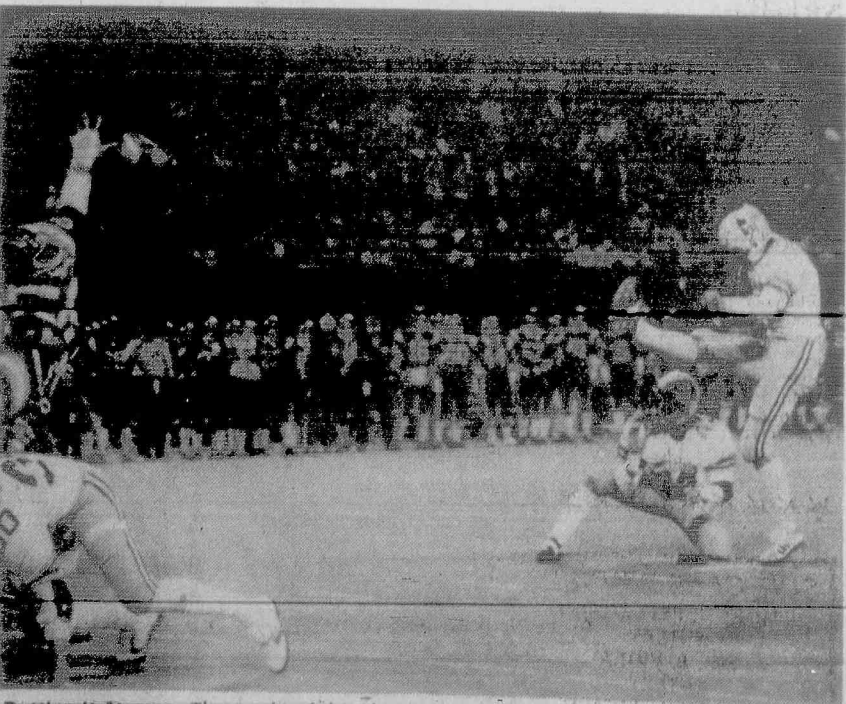

Allergies can also be caused or aggravated by coloring agents or other inactive ingredients in finished drug products. A drug allergy reaction suffered once can be much more severe the second time around, so don't make it your "secret".
