Library wing likely to be late opening

Local officials mingled at an informal opening of the Belleville Public Library's new addition last Wednesday, but since furniture hasn't yet been purchased or a heating system installed, it's unlikely the addition will open by Christmas as originally scheduled.

Nearly 11 years of waiting will come to an end when the addition 'officially" opens, which Library Director Gerard Hickey estimates might not be until next summer due

The heating system should be in by December's finish, said Hickey, but he stressed that if the addition opens soon, as library trustee Joe Casale predicted, comfort would be limited since no furniture has even been ordered yet

Cost of water could double

Belleville residents may soon bewatching how they use water with greater care than ever since its price could soon double if the Newark Water Company gains an added \$267.92 surcharge on every million gallons. The price hike is being demanded due to an increasing scarcity of water and rising prices for the local supplier.

Because Newark is paying Elizabethtown Water \$389 per million gallons and charging its seven municipal customers only \$250 per million gallons, the company is los-







Elderly at Geriatrics Center get best of care from a loving staff

May I take exception to the "Elderly blast" on the Geriatrics Center by Mike Olohan in your Nov. 20 issue. I attended the meeting he reported on.

I was somewhat shocked at the statement that 300 older adults had been abandoned by their children. This is grossly untrue. Some may be forgotten. I feel the percentage is small. I those 19 months, I have never seen a roach in her second floor west room, but I heard there are some in other areas. This is a condition that can be resolved. Mr. Merrigan is aware of it together with the other problems he has inherited. I certainly would not label it a "horror story." Visit some of the private nursing homes and I'm sure you will not find the patients as well taken care of as they are at Geriatrics Center. I know we have been there.

The medical staff headed by Dr. Greco leaves nothing to be desired. They spend endless hours caring for the residents. The food is institutional and cannot satisfy all. I have been there many noontimes and have seen the trays come up. The food seems to be adequate for inactive people.

Mr. Michael Ziv who heads social services has done a great job. In fact, the entire personnel of the center makes it a very

pleasant place to visit.

The shortage of nurses is a real problem. Mr. Shapiro is aware of it and hopefully something may be done about it.

The nurses are doing a terrific job, sometimes under difficult circumstances. They work long hours giving loving care to

Don Vaillancourt, president of the family council, has done much for the betterment of the residents, and George Myer, head of volunteers, has given time and effort to induce more people to



Talks expected soon on school purchase

With the cost estimate of School are no land dedication problems with expected within weeks, School Board President Ernie Zoppi and Mayor Michael Marotti will soon discuss the possibility of transforming the building into a town recrea-

When trustees discuss the cost appraisal of School 2, they will then decide whether to cut the price and offer a bargain deal to commissioners. With constant budget defeats, trustees themselves have little money to spare, but may decide to slice the price not only to help the a reduced price to commissioners' commissioners but themselves.

Since commissioners decide school budget if it's defeated — a where budget cuts should be made suggestion for now that's only a trial after the school tabs are defeated, trustees might be able to work out a deal whereby they will reduce School 2's price if commissioners promise not to cut more than a specified amount after a defeat, if there is one. Belleville's school budget has gone down 17 of the last 18 years.

Besides commissioners' possible purchase, trustees have been approached by commercial firms, said Zoppi, noting, however, that commissioners would be given the first shot at buying the land and building.

Trustees own nine-tenths of an acre around the 86-year-old building to which an addition was added in 1966. Commissioners own an acre of the property. The Soho school was closed this fall because of declining enrollment and increasing costs as part of Belleville's "restructuring" plan to save money and end what the state has said is defacto segregation

Asked about the possibility of cutting the price in return for com-missioners' guarantee about cutting funds in case of a budget defeat. Zoppi said, "I don't think in good faith you can do that. I take exception to the cuts commissioners make," he added, though, stressing many are "arbitrary" and hurt education.

Zoppi said he'd be meeting with commissioners before the April school election next year to explain Belleville's school budget to them and get their suggestions, which may reduce cuts if the tab is defeated. He conceded trustees "have been remiss" in not consulting with commis-

sioners about the budget in the past. "I'm very much in favor of recreation up there," Zoppi said of the suggestion that School 2 may be used as a rec center. He said he can't be sure his colleagues will favor cutting the price of Sthool 2 to help commissioners. He also noted there





Play review

O'Casey plays make great Christmas gift

The Nutley Little Theatre has furnished a most thoughtful gift for theater-goers this holiday season, a witty, well produced ensemble of one-act Sean O'Casey plays which opened Friday night at the NLT Barn. "The Moon Shines Over Kylenamoe" and "Bedtime Story" were as warm and flavorful as the spicy, heated cider served during in-

The cast seemed in love with the two satirical, slice-of-life stories which captured pieces of Ireland during the early 1900s. Though very quaint and full of pungent wit and dry humor, no doubt these plays were meant as strong social statements and eye-raising moral satire at the time they were written.

The major success of the two pieces was the cast's ability to communicate the rich, earthy human spirit and spry charm of early 20th century Irish life. The entire cast seemed to hit upon a most believable Irish brogue which not only sounded good but helped to build the mood and manner of the characters. The players were in full command of each other and their surroundings fine tip of the hat to directors Linda DeSimon and Robert Pace.

Richard Kaye was a gem, perfectly cast as the befuddled, pompous windbag, Lord Leslieson, setting himself up as a high class clay pigeon which the rustic Irish folk found an easy target for mockery. I say, he was rather snobbish and stuffy, which provided the rest of the cast ample ammunition for giving him the run-around and the business. In plain "English," Lord Leslieson was really asking for it.

Confronting and confounding, Lord Leslieson in "Kylenamoe" (the entry directed by Pace) was a rascally crew of salty-dog buckos and lassies which had assembled at the train station, led by a spunky, bleary-eyed crank played by Mike Mulrenan, who turned his character loose in a most splendid performance.

The wiley Cort boys, brothers Jim and Thomas, were two spirited trainmen who poked, slapped and taunted Lord Leslieson around the straight-laced station master, Sean Tomasheen, who drew guffaws from

the audience while mimicking Lord Leslieson behind his back as he ranted and gestured over his plight. Miriam Orner played the sassy and humorous Martha Conroy, who echoed Corny's words. John Kenney and Dolores Helsel were young lovers passing by who also took a hand with spiteful remarks directed towards Leslieson.

In "Bedtime Story," directed by Linda DeSimon, Jim Cort and Dolores Helsel formed an amusing and energetic comedy team. Cort had a reservoir of worrisome comic spirit as he thrashed about the stage in a zany dither. His charm and punch were staples in both one-act performances

Helsel was the source of Cort's anxiety, showing her own humorous energy as she danced about the stage, ignoring Cort's pleas for silence, try-ing to conceal their scandalous affair. Helsel was well cast and brought Angela Nightingale to life as of John Jo's desire.

Mulrenan and Orner again contributed delightful characters to the stage, adding more confusion to John Jo's anxious predicament. Mulrenan, in particular, was again bright and funny.

Lighting, sound effects and set design greatly enhanced the production, especially in "Kylenamoe." The dimly lit, sparse grey stage produced a quiet, almost surrealistically empty mood, one which the players used to full advantage.

The ensemble was paying special tribute to the memory of O'Casey an Irish playwright, on this, the 10-0th anniversary of his birth. At the end of the evening's performance, the players gathered once again on stage, joined by directors Pace and DeSimon for sing-a-long Irish folk tunes with acoustic guitars.

Performances continue tomor-Saturday and Sunday at the Little Theater Barn, 47 Eric Place. adjacent to Yantacaw School, and attendence for your holiday pleasure is recommended. For ticket information, phone 783-7665 or 667-5492.

"All Samuels has ruled is that he can't hear this," said Vallario Monday afternoon. Just 18 days from today, School I's court dates will begin, so Vallario expects an early opinion from Burke. Vallario said he'll stress the fact that trustees led School I parents to believe nothing was official until Burke decided whether to accept or reject the desegregation plan okayed March 3.

"I was very disappointed by this (Samuels's ruling)," said Judy Wright Monday. "Not only did the board and board attorney mislead us when they said School I was in the budget and that nothing would be done until they heard from the state, but they did a complete about-face after Burke's reply," she added,

Mrs. Wright said trustees' passive acceptance of Burke's desegregation plan approval was "unethical and vindictive" towards School I children and parents. Because trustees urged them to be patient, to wait for Burke's response, Mrs. Wright emphasized, "That's where they misled us. They lied to us. I'm nurt, because we've been very upfront with them.'

"I'm still optimistic that we'll win in the end. The board made a terrible, terrible mistake March 3 (voting 4-3 to okay Belleville's desegregation plan). The board is arrogant. They said they did this for the good of the town...bullshit," said an angry Mrs.

Mrs. Sobanko said she expected Samuels's negative ruling, pointing out that Schwartz filed in Newark to delay parents' appeal to state education officials in Trenton, which she feels they'll win. "Regardless of what Lawrence Schwartz says, the desegregation plan and the closing of School I are one and the same thing.

This (court setback) is just more red tape" on the way to Trenton, she ad-

"They gave us the toilet," Mrs. Wright said, referring to School 9's needed renovations and expenditures. "What they did was wrong. There's nothing they can do now except correct it.



Buc Shots



Gridmen dominated most '80 opponents

Now that the original sting of that 22-7 loss to West Essex has worn off a bit, it seems a good time to reflect back on the great 9-2 season that this year's Belleville football squad put

The Bucs scored 242 points this year, allowing just 129 points. A very interesting statistic, among many, is that Belleville was penalized some 670 yards while the opposition was hit for only 320 yards. For the year in numbers, see page 17.

The 1980 season started at Belleville with the opposition, the No, I team in the state at the time, Livingston. The Lancers came in with a fine passer in Stan Yagiello and a great reciever in George Alpert. The two did not disappoint any Livingston fan or The Star-Ledger as the Lancers rolled to a 36-12 win. Ken Constantino and Billy Zeimer scored touchdowns off passes from quarterback John Melillo for the Bucs.

The Bucs found victory number one a rather wet one the following week against Montclair. In a driving rainstorm, the Bucs held off the Mounties 7-6 thanks to some fine running by Pete Haverick and a Melillo-to-Eugene Cancelliere touchdown pass in the first quarter. Montclair scored its only points in the first quarter following the Belleville tally but missed the allimportant conversion. Paul Scheuplein intercepted a pass late in the game to seal the first of many Buc wins

A keyed-up Nutley squad gave Belleville all it could handle in week three. Following a 72-yard Melillo-to-Constantino touchdown pass, the Raiders tied the score quickly and it took a Melillo run of 33 yards late in the game for Belleville to come out on top 13-7

The fourth week of the season saw Belleville defeat previous ly unbeaten Passaic 13-9 in Passaic. The Bucs trailed 6-0 at halftime, but a Melillo-to-Frank Fazzini touchdown pass and later a Melillo-to-Scheuplein pass sealed the Indians' fate. The officiating in this game was absolutley horrible, but the Bucs managed to overcome adversity to win this very big game.

Belleville traveled to Bayonne for a battle with another un-

beaten team, Marist, the following week. This time, the Bucs made surprisingly easy work of the opposition, winning 35-7 as Melillo had a field day and junior Frank Fazzini ran all over the Marist defense for 200 yards plus. Fazzini, who switched to fullback in the Passaic game and was all but unstoppable the rest of the year, scored the game's first touchdown on a 72-yard run

With their record now 4-1, the Bucs returned home for a game with the Eagles of Essex Catholic. The Bucs were easy winners as Mike Dalla Riva scored his first varsity touchdown and Fazzini had another good night. Tight end Bill Waslh hauled in his second touchdown pass of the season as Belleville

The best game of the season, as far as I'm concerned, was the 34-8 trouncing of Seton Hall the following week. It was such a sweet win because it erased the memories of that 63-0 loss to the Hall back in 1977. The game was dedicated to Tom Mack, who was seriously injured in practice, and was in the hospital. The Bucs could do no wrong in this game as Melillo hit Constantino for a score and Fazzini crossed the goal line three times. Scheuplein closed out the scoring with a four-yard run.

The Bucs, now 6-1 and thinking playoffs, had their usual battle with Clark and as usual it was tough one and turned out to be a last-minute affair. Belleville won 20-12 as Fazzini ran 49 yards late in the game to wrap it up. He started the game with a 75yard run, but Clark would not fold. With Belleville leading 13-6, the Crusaders scored, but elected to go for two points. Despite what the obnoxious Clark announcer thought, the runner was stopped short.

Belleville's next game was in the first round of the Group IV, Section 2 playoffs with Morris Knolls. The Golden Eagles were a hard-hitting team with a 7-1 record and gave Belleville fits all evening. Scheuplein ran for over 100 yards that day and Belleville won 14-7 as Fazzini and Scheuplein scored. The victory gave Belleville the right to play West Essex in two weeks for the onship of Group IV, Section

The Bucs played in the traditional Thanksgiving Day game and defeated Ralph Borgess and the Kards 53-15. Borgess, who last year was the Bucs' defensive wizard, has done a good job in turning that the program around in Kearny and with his guidance, the Kards will be hard to contend with. However, this game was all Belleville as Fazzini crashed the 1,000-yard mark and Dalla Riva had a superb day.

And of course, there was the 22-7 loss to West Essex that concluded the fine season. The only Buc score was a 43-yard pass from Melillo to Constantino as West Essex played perhaps its finest game of the season. Melillo was hurt late in the game, but thankfully it was not as serious as first thought, and the senior will be on the basketball court to lend his efforts to that












Open Man — John Fell clutches the ball to his breast. His touchdown reception on a pass by John Papa gave West Essex a 13-0 lead in the second period.
