## Poland conflict worries relatives

For Charlotte and Jerry Czarnecki the upcoming holiday season will not be a cheerful one. Mrs. Czarnecki and her husband are going through hard times as they wonder about the fate of their relatives in Poland.

Mrs. Czarnecki has more than 40 relatives in Poland during a time when very few people know what is going on inside the

country, and which some say is torn by war.

The fighting between Polish workers and Russian soldiers have been told in a few ugly stories smuggled out of the country by news correspondents, but it is the lack of news reports which is haunting the Czarneckis most.

"I have aunts, uncles and cousins living in Poland right now," said Mrs. Czarnecki, with a voice of concern. "I have heard from them recently because I have relatives living in Wallington and Passaic and they hear from our family in Poland often. But I do not know when I will hear from them again.

"It is especially terrible that something this is happening at this time of the year," she continued. "When we go to church to celebrate the birth of Christ. This year there may not even be any bread on the tables for the people in Poland. It is not going to be a very happy holiday."

Jerry and his wife have lived in Belleville for more than 30 years, and have owned and operated the Overlook Market located on Overlook Avenue since establishing residence in town. But Mrs. Czarnecki has always remembered her relatives.

"My family here in the United States and myself have always send our relatives in Poland contributions in the way of food, clothing and money," she said. "That is the only way the people over there have survived over the years. They needed our help since World War II, and they still need our help to today.

But Mrs. Czarnecki is not sure whether her help is reaching the folks in Poland.

"I talked to one of my relatives here last week and she told me

## Industries picking up most of tab

# Passaic Valley Sewerage rates increase by 48 percent in 1982

As predicted last year the Passaic Valley Sewerage Commission has announced its 1982 budget is going up 48 percent, but this year it is not the townships which will have to foot most of the bill.

Thanks to new federal regulations establishing a system of sewerage fees, industries and tax-exempt institutions such as schools and hospitals are going to bear the brunt of the PVSC's 1982 budget hike.

Of the Commission's \$45.5 million budget, adopted unanimously last week, the Township of Belleville will be charged \$653,176, an increase of \$22,561 over last year's 58 percent increase, which caused an uprise from the 30 municipalities served by the commission's system.

Led by Bloomfield's Mayor John Kinder municipal officials were able

to get the Commission to cut its 60 percent budget last year down to 53 percent.

The Commission this year originally set the 1982 budget at \$60 million but reduced it by refining the number needed for new personnel at the new federally mandated \$500 million sewage plant located in Newark.

Industries in Belleville will be billed \$151,153, while tax-exempt groups will be charged \$2,187 for their sewage use. Other institutions will make for \$499,863 of the bill.

Among the major industries being billed are, Clara Maass Hospital, Walter Kiddee Company, McGraw Edison Battery Division, Wallace Tiernan, Etamco Industries, and

Universal Foods Corp.

The tax-exempt groups being charged include, St. Peter's Church, Essex County Park Commission, Bethany Lutheran Church, Belleville Reformed Church, Grace Baptist Church, Christ Church, Belleville Junior Woman's Club, Belleville Elks Lodge, Knights of Columbus, the American Legion Post, Cerebral Palsy of Essex County, Glendale Cemetery, and Christ Church Cemetery. There are 35 tax-exempt groups and 13 industries which will be charged for sewerage cost in 1982.

As expected Mayor Michael Marotti was happy with the new federal regulations establishing the sewerage fees.

"This year the taxpayers of Belleville will not be burden with the heavy cost imposed on us by the Passaic Valley Sewerage Commission," said Marotti, who last year spend much time at meeting with PVSC officials discussing the increases and trying to persuade them to trim their budget. "Last year we were hit hard, but this year the increase will not hurt us as much. But it will still hurt."

The Commission have spent many hours discussing the possibility of charging Clara Maass Hospital and other industries for sewerage use, but with the new federal regulations their job has been made a little easier.

Calling it a case of "unbalanced bidding," the Board of Commissioners voted 4-1 last week to reject all seven bids, differing by nearly \$113,000, for a proposed senior citizens' recreation park.

Mayor Michael Marotti explained that the rejection was recommended by Township Engineer Neil Siciliano of Wood-Ridge following consideration of the bids which were submitted on October 13.

The low bid, submitted by N. Farro of Nutley was \$35,000. The high bid of \$147,144 was made by Ventura Landscaping Company of East Hanover, a difference that prompted Siciliano's scrutiny.

The township received a \$75,000 HUD grant last July to fund the park which will consist of barbecue areas, picnic tables, bocci ball courts, repaving, and landscaping of the Mill Street and Franklin Avenue property.

Discussing the newest development in an interview Monday, Siciliano said, "I think the commissioners made the right decision in rejecting the bids."

He noted that in such situations of widely varying bids, the township would meet with the County to explain the situation and discuss new plans before going out for new bids.

Siciliano said the project will be redone and expanded to include more landscaping and covered bocci courts.

"We also hope to get an additional \$15,000 to \$20,000 in contingency funds from the County," said the engineer.

According to Siciliano, the new project with added funds, if granted, would be a "complete project," whereas the original one contained several alternates. "If the work had been done at either of the two low bids, the project would not have been complete. Certain details would have been eliminated."

A reasonable bid for the complete project, according to Siciliano, is \$90,000, a figure that may be reached with the contingency funds.

With the exception of the two lowest bids, all five other offers ex-

## Fidelity Union Bank announces merger

Peter Cartmell, chairman of the board, of Fidelity Union Bancorporation, one of New Jersey's largest bank holding companies, announced today its plan to merge three of its member banks into its lead bank.

Cartmell stated that the Board of Directors of Fidelity Union Bank approved an agreement in principle to merge Fidelity Union Bank, N.A., Garden State, Fidelity Union, N.A. and Fidelity Union Trust Company, N.A. into the lead bank, Fidelity Union Bank last week.

\$2,972,415,000 as of September 30, 1981. Fidelity Union Bank, headquartered in Newark, has 43 offices in Bergen, Essex, Morris, Middlesex, Passaic and Union Counties. Fidelity Union Bank, N.A., Garden State, headquartered in Paramus, has 31 offices in Bergen, Hudson, Ocean, Sussex, and Warren Counties. Fidelity Union Bank, N.A., headquartered in Red Bank, has 26 offices in Monmouth and Mercer Counties. Fidelity Trust Company, N.A., headquartered in Morristown, has 3 branches in Morris County. Fidelity Union Bancorporation's affiliate, Burlington County Trust Company, is not included in the merger plans. As previously announced, a letter of intent was signed to sell Burlington County Trust Company.

The boards of the three affected banks will meet within the next two weeks to adopt similar resolutions.

"The mergers, which are subject to regulatory approval, represent the most important step in our long-standing corporate objective to consolidate our organization," Cartmell declared. He said the bank would be substantially strengthened by the move and that it would benefit both shareholders and the banks' customers.

Cartmell continued, "The consolidation will mean substantially increased economies of scale. We have already begun to effect cost savings as a result of consolidation of our back office operations at our Center in North Brunswick as well as the consolidation of the trust departments of the member banks into the lead bank over the last several years. Cost savings were also realized with the recent name changes to Fidelity Union which aided in the standardization of the services we offer as well as to more accurately identify our member banks with the Bancorporation.

## Views On Dental Health

WHAT IS TOOTH DECAY:

Tooth decay in children is not just a hole in a tooth. It is an infectious disease. Tooth decay is a gradual process that results from acid on the tooth dissolving the enamel. This acid is produced when the bacteria normally present in everyone's mouth reacts with food.

Research shows that there is no single cause of tooth decay. What studies reveal, however, is that a clean tooth simply won't decay. For example, studies show that the teeth children find most difficult to clean are those that most consistently develop cavities.

In the pre-school child, the molars, with their deep grooves and fissures, are most cavity-prone. The next teeth most susceptible to decay are the upper front teeth (central incisors).

Pediatric dentists are trained to help parents incorporate new oral hygiene methods into the routine care of their children. If these methods are begun in the child's early life, pediatric dentists confirm that today's children stand an excellent chance of being cavity-free.

## The Golan Heights

Little Israel has been condemned by the U.S. government for annexing a piece of real estate which its leaders consider essential to the very existence of the state of Israel. The action resulted in a condemnation of Israel by the U.S. government and the suspension of a military security agreement which the U.S. entered into with Israel only last month.

The Israeli reply to the American official action was not unexpected. Israeli Defense Minister Ariel Sharon accused the U.S. of ruining its credibility by suspending the Nov. 30 Strategic Cooperation Agreement. The defense minister brands Washington's treatment of the agreement as an attempt to damage Israel's military safety.

The Golan Heights region is necessary for Israel to ward off an attack from Syria. In the present Mideast circumstances, Israel took the right step. The

stridency of Defense Minister Sharon's remark has stunned U.S. officials to the highest level. The White House should not have been surprised at the aggressive tone of Israel's action.

Syria is pledged and dedicated to the extermination of Israel as a state.

Time and again in this space we have warned that Israel, surrounded on all sides by hostile neighbors, cannot rely upon American soldiers to defend Israel's boundaries. Our foreign policy has vacillated for decades. There is no reason to believe it will change tomorrow. In view of our recent track record of walking away from our friends, Israel had no choice but to annex the Golan Heights.

### Byrne's irresponsibility passed off to taxpayers

To the Editor:

A recently released audit of New Jersey's jobless fund, indicating losses of over one hundred million dollars as a result of the inefficient operation of the Department of Labor and Industry, does not surprise me. Unaccountability and ineptness have been characteristic of our present administration for a number of years.

As far back as July 1974, in a widely circulated release, I called for a legislative investigation of the State Unemployment Trust Fund and its administration, stating, "Something is definitely wrong when uncharged claims can reach \$100 million and one official can pass it off as 'just a major goof,'" with such excuses as "bookkeeping errors" and "sloppy controls and bad management."

Several weeks later, in another widely circulated release, I again called for the creation of a special Legislative Commission to develop means to prevent over-payments by the State Department of Education to local school districts and other agencies, further stating that I was "astounded that a routine check by the State Office of Fiscal Affairs, the auditing arm of the Legislature, had uncovered some \$500,000 in overpayments — and the possibility of millions more — due to sloppy, horse-and-buggy practices and procedures used by the Education Department."

My second release further stated, "With the continuous efforts by the Byrne Administration to publicize the State's so-called fiscal crisis and the alleged need for additional tax revenues, I suggest they direct their attention to a

more responsible course — austerity and the responsible management of those funds they already have on hand."

In September 1974 I introduced Assembly Concurrent Resolution 200 which would have created a commission to investigate the administration of the State Unemployment Trust Fund. This bill was in the Labor Committee for four years, and obviously was not considered important enough by the Byrne Administration to be released for a vote in the Assembly.

It was inexcusable on the part of Governor Byrne to permit such a situation to continue or to reoccur — whichever may be the case. It is obvious and inevitable that New Jersey taxpayers are paying and will continue to pay for the irresponsible lack of action by Governor Byrne, the State's top executive official, who has seen fit to reward his political friends, hacks, defeated Democrats, former office holders and political allies (who have done the Administration's bidding) with important positions in Government, without regard to their qualifications or integrity. We have been at Byrne's mercy for eight years. Thank God our New Jersey Constitution did not permit him to run for a third term.

A thorough investigation by other than a Byrne ally is certainly a must to restore the public's confidence in our New Jersey Jobless Fund. Luckily for the citizens of New Jersey, the new commissioners of Labor and Industry will be appointed by Governor-Elect Tom Kean, a man with far better judgement than the man who appointed the current commissioner, in my opinion.

# BHS gym ceiling causing rainouts

If you decided to attend the boys basketball game against Caldwell last Tuesday afternoon, or the girls game against Columbia last Friday evening, chances are good that when you arrived, the gym was empty.

It wasn't empty because of a lack of interest, it was empty because the game was postponed. Postponed, because of rain. Now, you probably would like to know why an indoor basketball game would be postponed because of rain, especially since it wasn't raining outside. Well, here goes. The Belleville basketball games were postponed because of rain that occurred days before the actual sporting event.

The reason: the roof leaks. Is this a new problem? No. How long has it been a problem. Approximately four years. Now, we can play question and answer on the roof at Belleville gymnasium for hours and wonder why anything hasn't been done about it. That's a good question, one that many of the coaches at Belleville don't really know how to answer.

Let's start with last Tuesday. Belleville boys game against Caldwell is the setting. It is an afternoon game and the Bucs are anxious to avenge a tough loss the previous day. Caldwell High School has already arrived and is warming up on court. The officials come out to center court to line up the captains for the introductions when they suddenly see Lake Papisidero forming on the far side of the court. After a conference with the coaches, the officials declare the court unfit for play. The result: Belleville loses a valuable home game, the Bucs have only nine this year as it is, and Caldwell is out a good amount of money for nothing. After all, the Chiefs did hire a bus to get down to Belleville, they paid the bus driver and if you know anything about arrangements that a high school athletic director has to make for a game, you'll know that the entire situation was one of embarrassment for the Bucs.

The following day at the girls practice, you would have thought that Karen Fuccello was running an obstacle course so that her girls would be a well coordinated team. Actually, the buckets and paper towels on the floor symbolized the places where the girls had to run around so they would not fall and break their leg. Fuccello wasn't shouting instructions like "watch for their full court press" or "watch out for their big girl," she was shouting "watch out for the buckets" and "look out for the paper towels."

On TV, this would be comical. In real life, it is rather dangerous. On Friday, the girls game with Columbia was cancelled at 2:30 p.m. so at least there wasn't the problem with having the team arrive and then declaring the court unplayable. There also have been many instances this season where the ref has had to stop a game for a few seconds so that someone can bring a towel out and soak up the puddle that is forming on the court. Phil Colalillo, the Bucs fine forward, slipped on the wet spot twice against Wallington, thankfully he was not injured.

As Fuccello and Papisidero both point out, if the problem isn't taken care of soon, there is the chance of a serious injury and also the chance of more games being cancelled. Belleville is very anxious to get into a conference and if the committees who decide on who enters a conference hears that the Bucs have an unsafe court on which to play basketball, then the chances are good that a major strike towards Belleville's chances of getting into a conference has been administered.

Now, getting back to the length of this problem. If you see some alumni of Belleville High School, ask them about the leak. Ask Tommy Smith, class of 78, ask Pete Martin, class of 79, ask Karen Portuese, class of 79, or Michelle Giordano, class of 80. You can even ask Pete Liloia or Ronnie Krych, class of 1977. They will all remember the famous leak in the ceiling. It's been there for some time, but nothing has been done about it.

Not trying to put fear into anyone, but reality has to be faced here. What if, God forbid, a tile fell off the ceiling during a game and hit a spectator or player. What if a piece of cement came tumbling down. It doesn't take a degree in architecture to realize that constant water will erode cement, or wood or tiles. It is not a situation to be taken lightly.

Now, last Monday, the Board of Education was to accept a bid on repairing the roof and hopefully the work can start immediately toward correcting this problem. Thankfully, no one has been injured and with the exception of a team arriving to a game and not playing, no major damage has been done. If people continue to sit on their hands regarding this problem, there is also the chance of the leak doing irreparable damage to the floor and that means a ton of money for a new basketball court. Let's all hope that we've seen the last of this predicament and the future for the Belleville basketball court will be as bright as the future of the players who compete on it.

The games that the Belleville basketball teams did play last week was a successful game against Caldwell for the girls while the boys took it on the chin against both Wallington and Columbia. Joe Papisidero's team should have won the Wallington game but played a pretty decent game against Columbia. Fuccello's team, which played at Madison on Tuesday, is priming for the Essex County Holiday tournament and to see the tourney trophy returned to Belleville. The girls lost in the finals, 41-38 to Livingston last year and are looking with enthusiasm to regain the crown. Bloomfield appears to be the girls toughest obstacle. The Bengals, who lost to Belleville, 46-45 in the first round of last year's tourney, are a scrappy team that Fuccello has a lot of respect for.

For the boys, they play in the all new Nutley Holiday tournament next week. In addition to Belleville, Nutley, Clifton and Bloomfield will participate in the tourney. It is a natural. Belleville hasn't played the Bengals since 1978 and since all four schools are relatively close, geographically, there figures to be some very exciting basketball played at Nutley High School. At early look, the Nutley Maroon Raiders appear to have the toughest team in the festival. Nutley, coached by the incomparable Bruce Gallagher, is very fundamentally sound and plays a strong defense. They are led by Dave Siepert, a fine guard with excellent moves. It was his shot at the buzzer last year that gave Nutley a controversial 55-54 win over Belleville last January.

Well, Ron Guidry has signed a multi year contract with the Yankees and wheeling and dealing George Steinbrenner is now ready to sign Dave Collins a steady player who is good for a .290 season and very few errors. The signing of Collins leaves only Reggie as a mystery. At first it appeared that Jackson had no interest in playing for the Yankees in 1982, but now he seems to have changed his feeling and is willing to play solely as a

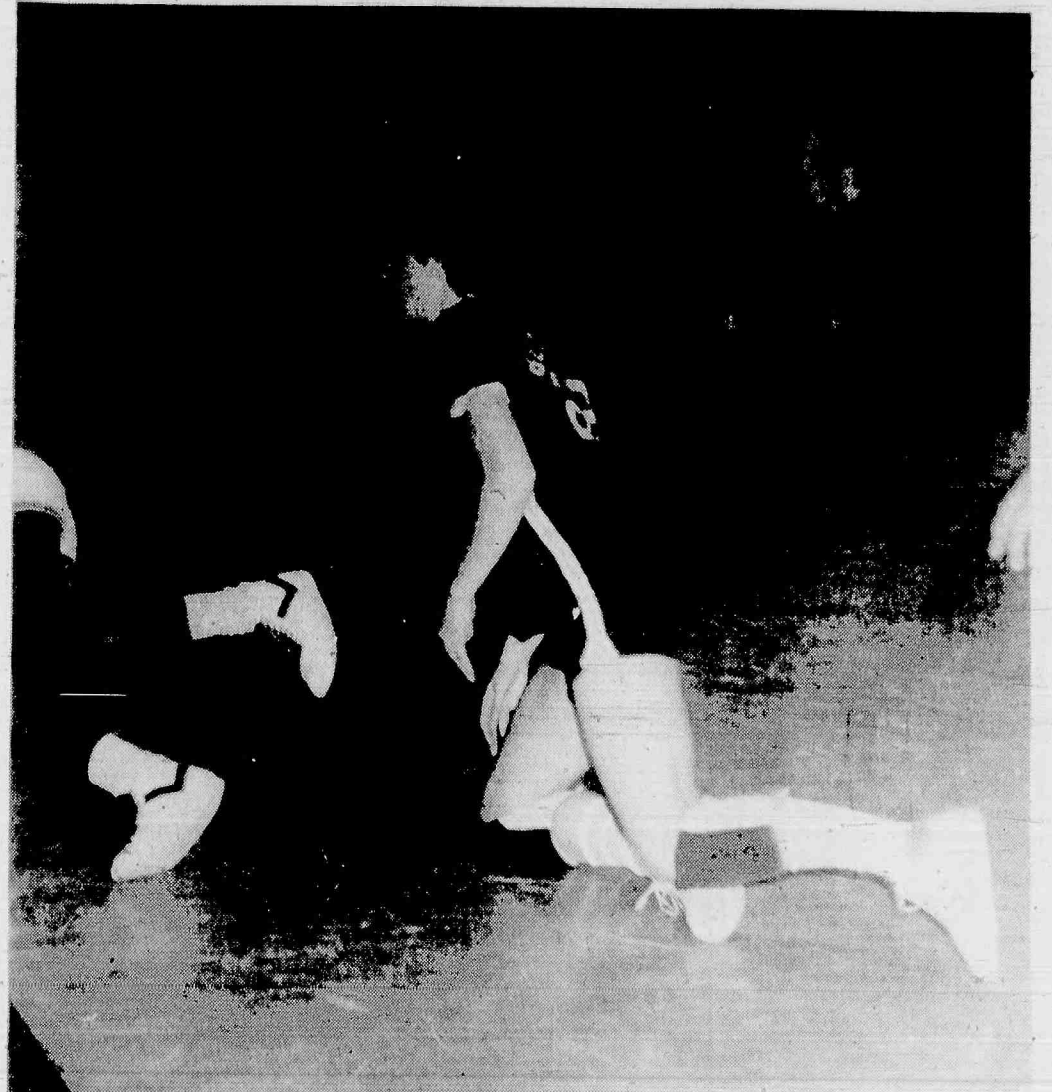

Apicella led the team in free throws percentage last season at 76 percent.

# Hoopsters up 14-0 in first quarter; lose game 39-38, record now at 0-3

While this may be the season of jolly, don't mind if head basketball coach Joe Papisidero if he isn't full of holiday spirit as of yet.

Last week the Bucs were defeated by Wallington, 39-38 and then lost to a very good Columbia squad, 62-48 to set the team's record at 0-3.

The Bucs are off this week and will resume play in the Nutley Christmas Tournament which starts on Dec. 28 at Nutley High School. Bloomfield and Clifton will join Belleville and Nutley in the tournament.

"We stunk up the gym, plain and simple," said Papisidero's after the team's setback to Wallington. "When you jump out to a big first quarter lead and then lose all the in-

tensity you use to get that lead, well that is not the sign of a strong team.

The Bucs did indeed take early control of the contest, springing to a 14-0 lead midway through the first period and leading 15-2 after one quarter of play.

Belleville started the second quarter by continuing its intensity and built a 14 point lead. Then suddenly things started to go sour. Belleville watched its lead fall to nine points at halftime, which wasn't bad.

In the third quarter, the Bucs, after a Papisidero 'pep talk' built the lead back to 12 points again and after three periods led, 29-19. However, the fourth quarter was total disaster. Wallington, a club

that does not specialize in its basketball program, never gave up. They clawed and suddenly had the lead down to just four points. A missed Buccaneer jump shoot, and there was plenty of those, combined with some good outside shooting by Wallington and the score was tied.

Sophomore Phil Colalillo played a fine game, scoring 19 points, while Billy Cook chipped in with seven. The Bucs were hurt by the flu bug to point guard Joe Zangari and the early foul trouble to power forward Sterling Lutz.

Walsh played in the backfield and rushed for 500 yards. He scored seven touchdowns and was the leading scorer in the decathlon; the Bucs conditioning contest in summer practice. 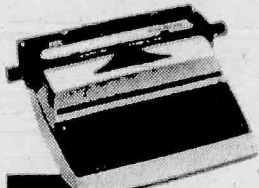

# Poland conflict worries relatives

(Continued from page one.) that she mail money to the family in Christmas cards," said said, "and all the cards were opened and the money was taken once they got to Poland. It is just terrible for our people." Many people in the United States think that the problems confronted in Poland have just recently developed. But according to Mrs. Czarnecki the problems have always existed in Poland. "Since the end of World War II things have not been good for the people of Poland," she said. "Only recently when the Solidarity attempted to make the Polish people free, did the people of Poland begin to live more hopeful lives. "Nothing has changed in Poland in the past 40 years," she continued, "except then it was the Nazis and now it is the Russians. Poland is becoming another Afganistan. The Polish people do not need Marital Law in their country. Mrs. Czarecki agrees with Pope John Paul II that no bloodshed should be used in gaining freedom for the Polish people. "Pope John Paul may be Polish, but he is a Pope for all people," she said. "And he is correct when he asks that no blood be shed for the cause of freedom. The Polish people and people throughout Europe have seen enough bloodshed in the past 40 years. "What we must do is pray to God, and hope he answers our prayers," she said. "There are some very intelligent people in Poland who could sit down at a table decide the proper course of action which needs to be taken. The Russians should give Solidarity a chance in Poland, and everything would work out." But Mrs. Czarnecki realizes the Russians' position, and what would happen to their stronghold on other nations if the Polish people were to maintain a solidarity society. "The Russians know that if the Polish people were giving a chance to work within a solidarity system it would work, it has worked," she said. "But then other countries under Russian rule such as Czechoslovakia, East Germany and Hungary, would also demand to have solidarity set up in their countries. The Russians can not let the Polish people get away with making them look bad." "President Reagan has been quoted as saying, "The Polish nation, speaking through Solidarity, has provided one of the brightest, bravest moments in modern history. "The Polish people are giving us an imperishable example of courage and devotion to the value of freedom in the face of relentless opposition," he continued. Mrs. Czarnecki says she will continue to pray for her relatives and the rest of the natives of Poland. "All that the people of Poland want is to gain the freedom which has been suppressed for years," she said. The people of Poland have been slaves for long enough."

# Commissioners reject all bids for senior park

(Continued from page one.) ceeded the \$75,000 granted the township for the project; a motive in the rejection of all, according to the Mayor. Earlier this month, Siciliano recommended that the commission bypass the low bid and accept the second lowest bid submitted by F. Farro of lowest bid of \$74,900 submitted by F. Farro of Nutley, brother of the low bidding contractor. "We don't see \$35,000 as a feasible offer. We do see the project at \$75,000," the engineer had said. However, the commissioners questioned the fact that the second lowest bidder turned out to be the brother of an extremely low bidder, sensing a possible connection. "He's making fools of us," Commissioner Joseph McGreevy said of N. Farro, suggesting that the board award the project to the low bidder and hold him to the quoted price. Both McGreevy and Commissioner Matthew Pica expressed concern that N. Farro had in the past submitted an unusually low bid for a project he failed to win. Pica, who cast the dissenting vote on the resolution to reject all offers maintains that the township "should hold him (N. Farro) responsible." Township attorney Frank Zinna advised the commissioners that case law says if a bid is so unbalanced it must can be viewed as a mistake. "It would remain to be seen if the bonding company would come through," Zinna added. He further advised the board that attempts to force the contractor to perform the job at \$35,000 could be legally costly and lengthy. "I don't want the taxpayers to have that expense to worry about," the Mayor pointed out, advising Pica and McGreevy that their persistence might have led nowhere. If the township goes out for new bids sometime in January, the park itself may not be completed until summer.

# Belleville's past

Another Indian trail, running along the Second River, became a regular road in 1720. Then known as Brook Road, today's Mill Street was colonial Belleville's main connection with early Bloomfield. The Old Bloomfield Road, too, also known as the Long Hill Road, a remnant of which is today's Franklin Street, had once led Indian warriors and hunters up to the ridge of the Orange Mountains; there it connected with the most famous of Indian paths, the Minisink Trail. By 1839 the more important of these early colonial highways had become turnpikes. Development of good roads — and consequently of stagecoach travel — had been somewhat retarded by the excellent transportation facilities which the Passaic River provided for early Bellevillians. But the beginning of the 1800's had seen the dawn of the turnpike era and with it had come stage travel as a daily reality. Previously private coaches had been in use, and though America's first stagecoach robbery took place in the Gully Road in 1793. It was not until two years later, when the ancestor of today's Rutgers Street Bridge was built across the Passaic, that any form of public conveyance connecting Belleville with the outside world. Eventually four of the 54 turnpikes authorized by the State in 1801, ran through Belleville. The Newark and Pompton Turnpike was laid out in 1806 to follow the "new" Bloomfield Road, or what is now Bloomfield Avenue. The following year the Belleville Turnpike was chartered; it ran from the Rutgers Street Bridge "to the Newark and Pompton Road between Bloomfield and Cranetown." From Richard A. 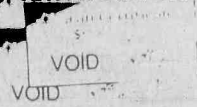
