Belleville's application for federal grant monies to construct a new police station was rejected last month, Mayor Michael Marotti announced at a recent Board of Commission meeting.

Whether municipal officials will seek other avenues to build a new facility remains to be seen.

"We haven't talked about it yet. We just got notice we were rejected for the funding last week," said Marotti after the meeting.

Public Safety Director Matthew Pica added, "The police department definitely needs a new facility. We're going to discuss this further.

# School 7 Principal Rosamilia Announces Retirement

Over the years there have been many inspirational stories generated by men who, with courage and determination, defeated the odds and became outstanding figures in their communities. They were recorded as men who possessed a certain hunger which many of us lack and a desire which all of us strive for. In the Belleville school system there is such as a man and his name is Michael Rosamilia, principal of School 7.

Last week Superintendent of Schools Michael Nardiello announced that Rosamilia was retiring, thus ending a teaching career which spanned for more than three decades in the Belleville school

"Michael Rosamilia is the best friend I have had in this school system," said Nardiello at last Monday night's School Board session. "He possesses one of the finest minds we have ever had here in the Belleville school district and I will miss him

Through his 34 years as a teacher and administrator in Belleville, Rosamilia has worn many hats, starting as a social studies instructor at the high school in 1950 and serving at one time for two years as acting superintendent of schools.

"I never wanted to be superintendent of schools," Rosamilia said during an interview at School 7 last Friday afternoon. "My ambition was always to be an elementary school principal. I took the acting superintendent post after serving as assistant superintendent of schools for five years, but I never really wanted it. As a matter of fact, I wrote a letter to the Board of Education members when they were searching for a new superintendent informing them I did not want to be considered for the post. I got into teaching because I like kids and, being a top administrator, I did not have the chance children like I wanted to.

Rosamilia's devotion to the youngsters of Belleville has been documented well over the years, but the fact that he ever

became a teacher and then an administrator is amazing since he was a high school drop out.

"I was born and raised in the Big Tree section of town and attended School 5 and Belleville High School, until I dropped out in my sophomore year," Rosamilia said. "When I went to school there were splitsessions and I had to go to school in the afternoon. So I dropped out and went to

work and then into the military. It was while he was in the armed forces that Rosamilia decided he would go back to school. "I knew then that I wanted my degree," he said. "At least a high school diploma.

But with hard work and endless energy Rosamilia went much farther then a high school degree. Working six days a week and nine hours a day, he also attended Barringer High School during the exearning enough credits to obtain his degree, but he did not stop there. At the age of 27 he started attending Montclair State College where he received his

bachelor degree. Since that time he has also earned his master's from Montclair State and his doctorian equivalent from Rutgers, Seton Hall University and Newark State College (Kean).

"It took a lot of work and determination to make it through," said Rosamilia. "I really do not know where the inspiration came from, but I had a lot of help from my family. You need a very supportive family to accomplish what I did.

While serving as a social studies teacher at the high school, Rosamilia also got involved in coaching the crew squad. For seven years he served first as the assistant coach and then as head coach.

He later served as a guidance counselor and after seven years as a teacher, was named to head the social studies depart-

superintendent of schools and served as acting superintendent from 1966-68. He



Columbus Day brings back different memories to different people. Underlying all the memories is a sea voyage by a courageous Italian from Europe to the shores of America. The Nutley Italian-American League in a tremendous show of energy, pride, and encouragement, supported by the Nutley-Belleville Italian communities, organized a parade to mark the occasion that was a huge suc-

For us, the events remind us of another day - another sea voyage from Europe to America by another courageous Italian. This Italian immigrant was 14 when he sailed aboard a freighter from the shores of his native land to find a new home 3,000 miles across the sea.

He could neither read nor write, but within his powerfully built body was a compassionate heart, pulsating to the rhythm of sounds from the distant shores of a strange land filled with a promise of a new life.

Facing the dark uncertainty of a sea voyage — the unknown of a new land - possessing no skills but that of a shepherd he was unafraid - and with remarkable courage this 14year-old boy left behind his mother, father, and family members in a daring pursuit of a better life.

For him, this would be the first time ever he would be away, overnight from his birthplace.

He arrived in the foreign, mythical land as the old century was giving way to the 20th, unable to speak the language nor understand the customs.


But in this experience he was not alone - for thousands of his countrymen preceded him and hundreds of thousands more were to follow him males, females, babies, teenagers, and adults.

Ellis Island was their first stop - an experience better to be forgotten, for the cruel dog pounds of yesteryear were like country estates compared to the squalid quarters of Ellis Island.

He survived the pushing around, the insults hurled at "greenhorns," the epithets reserved for ethnic immigrants from southern Europe. Like dumb cattle they were herded about from one staging area to another - not knowing what to expect next.

With dauntless courage and determined grit he managed to survive the unpleasant experience of Ellis Island - an experience that scared his teenage memory. He wasn't bitter — Just shocked, surprised and numbed - he had dreamed dreams of a friendly, hospitable people in America so he couldn't help but compare the reception at Ellis Island with the tenderness and loving care he and his comrades showered upon dumb animals back in his native country.

warm embrace of an older

By foot (plenty of it, too), rail, and horsedrawn carriage, the immigrant finally made it to New Jersey — a place where an older brother found shelter a vear earlier.

Before he had time to firmly plant his feet on American soil, a job opportunity arose — the wages - 50 cents for a 12-hour day. He accepted - and though it seemed like an eter-- a year or so later, a job offer was available from a company (later to become Public Service Transportation), at \$1 per day. He couldn't resist the new job challenge and higher wages - so he switched - a move that led him into marrying a native of his home town who he met through family circle picnics.

And so it came to pass that this immigrant established a home on a \$1-a-day income, a borrowed kitchen set, with a loving, dedicated wife, and a mind and heart determined to be a winner.

Working day and night, Saturdays and Sundays, moonlighting at any job available, skilled or unskilled, this immigrant boy grew into manhood proudly boasting of home ownership, and a loving, devoted wife who quit her job pitting cherries to concentrate all her time and energies on being a mother and a housewife. She succeeded at both.

For his part, he lived just long enough to pay off his home mortgage, see his children complete their schooling, and his boys establish their own

He lived a life that made him one of the millions of unsung, unheralded, nameless heroes of America. He insisted that his sons and daughter meet the most stringent behavior standards, developing integrity, character, family honor, community pride and respect for the laws of his adopted country. One of life's proudest moments for him was taking the oath of an American citizen and pinning the American flag to his

Early on, he mastered the English language to a point where he could speak it well and be understood thoroughly - and still determined to learn to write English - at age 58, he sat evenings at the kitchen table with his middle son teaching him the English language. In life he rose from a common laborer to a state-licensed engineer.

He had a fierce belief people should pay their just debts. As for lending money, on one occasion his middle son asked for a \$1,000 loan for a business venture. "Okay, son, here it is. You pay it back, and it will be there the next time you need it."

He was a good and decent man. He was the finest husband, and he was a most inspiring father.

His code of living was there for his children to emulate.

He died young - 35 years ago this week - at a point in life when he had everything to live for - a lifetime of hard work behind him - but he was destined to die too soon - he died before he had the opportunity to see his sons blossom into manhood, achieving undreamed honors and glory at the hands of his adopted community's voters. He was no Christopher Columbus - he was my father - Pasquale Orechio. Pop, wherever you are, and I think I know — rest in peace - your wife with prayer beads in hand and abiding faith in God — continues strong at 90 and your children continue to honor your name.



Mayor Marotti was notified of the rejection for federal monies in a September 21 letter from the U.S. Department of Commerce. Assistant Secretary for Economic Development Carlos Campbell wrote that with 2,800 'applications under the Jobs Act, the federal office received requests for aid totalling \$1.6 billion but had only \$100 million to award.

As explained by Bruno Associates, Belleville's funding consultants, the applications for federal monies were considered on the basis of priority needs.

Last July 11, Commissioners approved a capital ordinance appropriating \$1,725,000 and authorizng.issuance of \$665,000 in bonds to finance construction of a proposed \$1.6 million police complex.

However, actual construction was contingent upon receiving the federal grant. The federal decision puts all

'This is zuccotto," explained Gaeta who talks easily as he 'It's a light Florentine dessert baked to resemble a dome in Florence.

When he completed the initial preparation of the six desserts, which must set overnight, Gaeta led the way to the restaurant's upstairs kitchen area and removed a completed zucotto from the refrigerator, proudly displaying it alongside a painting of Florence that hangs in the restaurant lobby depicting the very dome.

That combination of good cooking 'technique, interesting menu selections, and knowledgeable repartee, have made Nanina's one of the area's most popular and busy restaurants.

With a menu of various meat and foul dishes, and selections of pasta smothered in diverse sauces, Nanina's remains true to famous seafood tradition. The thriving eatery evolved from fish market on Newark's Cutler Street established by Gaeta's grandmother, Nanina

"Soon, the market started cooking meals on weekends, then more frequently," said Gaeta. Then, three decades ago, Nanina brought her style to Belleville and has remained ever

Nanina's is a family operated business with Gaeta, his mother Etta Gaeta, and of course, Nanina herself, overseeing the daily affairs.

Though she speaks little English, Nanina communicates her pride clearly enough as she gestures around the kitchen where she sat during the busy dinner preparations last week, noting, "Very clean kitchen,

It's in the special wine cellar dinners that Gaeta's imagination takes wings. Although some of the cellar parties order the meals to be served, many adventurous regulars make their reservations and tell Gaeta to do the rest.

"It's a real event. I'll plan and prepare a complete 10course dinner and select the wines to go with it," he said, noting that the various dishes reflect a wide variety of Italian regional cooking.




