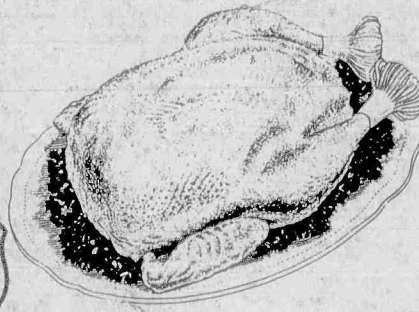

# Belleville's Grant Denied For New Police Complex

Belleville's application for federal grant monies to construct a new police station was rejected last month, Mayor Michael Marotti announced at a recent Board of Commission meeting.

Whether municipal officials will seek other avenues to build a new facility remains to be seen.

"We haven't talked about it yet. We just got notice we were rejected for the funding last week," said Marotti after the meeting.

Public Safety Director Matthew Pica added, "The police department definitely needs a new facility. We're going to discuss this further."

Marotti did say, though, that any new police building would be kept on Washington Avenue. His remark was a reference to the outcry raised by Avenue merchants who objected to original proposals to locate police headquarters on Franklin Avenue, fearing lack of protection in the main commercial district.

In fact, Commissioners un-

animously approved another resolution mandating that "all federally funded municipal construction regarding the township administrative and police facilities be located on Washington Avenue and that all future federally funded municipal development be targeted for Washington Avenue to aid in the

redevelopment and revitalization of our main thoroughfare."

Presently the police department is located in the basement of Town Hall, where facilities are deemed cramped and insufficient by officials and citizens alike.

# School 7 Principal Rosamilia Announces Retirement

Over the years there have been many inspirational stories generated by men who, with courage and determination, defeated the odds and became outstanding figures in their communities. They were recorded as men who possessed a certain hunger which many of us lack and a desire which all of us strive for. In the Belleville school system there is such a man and his name is Michael Rosamilia, principal of School 7.

Last week Superintendent of Schools Michael Nardiello announced that Rosamilia was retiring, thus ending a teaching career which spanned for more than three decades in the Belleville school district.

"Michael Rosamilia is the best friend I have had in this school system," said Nardiello at last Monday night's School Board session. "He possesses one of the finest minds we have ever had here in the Belleville school district and I will miss him very much."

Through his 34 years as a teacher and administrator in Belleville, Rosamilia has worn many hats, starting as a social studies instructor at the high school in 1950 and serving at one time for two years as acting superintendent of schools.

"I never wanted to be superintendent of schools," Rosamilia said during an interview at School 7 last Friday afternoon. "My ambition was always to be an elementary school principal. I took the acting superintendent post after serving as assistant superintendent of schools for five years, but I never really wanted it. As a matter of fact, I wrote a letter to the Board of Education members when they were searching for a new superintendent informing them I did not want to be considered for the post. I got into teaching because I like kids and, being a top administrator, I did not have the chance to interact with children like I wanted to."

Rosamilia's devotion to the youngsters of Belleville has been documented well over the years, but the fact that he ever

became a teacher and then an administrator is amazing since he was a high school drop out.

"I was born and raised in the Big Tree section of town and attended School 5 and Belleville High School, until I dropped out in my sophomore year," Rosamilia said. "When I went to school there were split-sessions and I had to go to school in the afternoon. So I dropped out and went to work and then into the military."

It was while he was in the armed forces that Rosamilia decided he would go back to school. "I knew then that I wanted my degree," he said. "At least a high school diploma."

But with hard work and endless energy Rosamilia went much farther than a high school degree. Working six days a week and nine hours a day, he also attended Barringer High School during the evenings earning enough credits to obtain his degree, but he did not stop there. At the age of 27 he started attending Montclair State College where he received his

bachelor degree. Since that time he has also earned his master's from Montclair State and his doctorian equivalent from Rutgers, Seton Hall University and Newark State College (Kean).

"It took a lot of work and determination to make it through," said Rosamilia. "I really do not know where the inspiration came from, but I had a lot of help from my family. You need a very supportive family to accomplish what I did."

While serving as a social studies teacher at the high school, Rosamilia also got involved in coaching the crew squad. For seven years he served first as the assistant coach and then as head coach.

He later served as a guidance counselor and after seven years as a teacher, was named to head the social studies department.

In 1961 he was named assistant superintendent of schools and served as acting superintendent from 1966-68. He

## Nanina's One Of Best Dining Places According to New Jersey Magazine

Belleville gourmets who would travel anywhere to enjoy the perfect Italian meal need only venture as far as Mill Street where, nestled in the greenery of Branch Brook Park, lies Nanina's in the Park Restaurant.

Although a local tradition for over 30 years, the popular Nanina's won statewide fame recently when the dining critics for New Jersey Magazine listed the Belleville restaurant among their top 40 Critics' Choice restaurants in the entire state and one of their five favorite Italian restaurants in North Jersey.

Writing in the August 1983 issue of New Jersey Magazine, critics John Gottfried and Janet Bukovsky praise the "restless

imagination" of Nanina's co-owner and chief cook, Alan Gaeta.

In a tempting passage designed to recreate their culinary experience, the critics comment, "when Alan serves up ravioli filled with lobster in a mushroom cream sauce or paglio e fieno with colorful red and yellow peppers, sausage, and cream, or does a 10-course seven-wine blowout in his wine cellar, it's an extraordinary treat."

Creative planning and fresh ideas are the main ingredients of Nanina's success, according to Gaeta, who invited The Times for an inside look at the busy Italian kitchen.

LoBruzza, who has performed four emergency deliveries and earned the title "Belleville's Ben Casey," received a "D" award for the 1979 service.

Firefighter Joseph LaMin, Jr. was awarded a certificate of commendation for assisting in the extrication of the driver in an August 6, 1982 car accident.

In addition, four civilians received certificates of commendation for outstanding community service.

Harold Metz was honored for extinguishing an electrical fire at Clara Maass Hospital on June 6, 1982.

Thomas Collucci was cited for administering mouth to mouth resuscitation and chest compressions to a cardiac arrest victim on March 18, 1982.

# BHS Kids Are Well Represented By Student Government Organization

Belleville High School offers its students a variety of clubs and organizations, each with its own interests and goals. Many of them represent an individual group of students. However, there is one organization whose goal it is to represent the entire student population.

Since its inception nearly five years ago, the Student Government Organization (SGO) has had the main purpose of being representative of the student body.

"The organization helps keep an open line of communication with the administration and the student body," said Mrs. Patricia Pugliese, SGO advisor. "We also try to promote a good and healthy relationship between the students and faculty."

Most of the activities sponsored by the SGO involve and benefit the students themselves. There are fundraisers, such as candy sales and a battle of the bands.

These fundraisers recently provided the school with the money to purchase a bulletin board which now stands in the front of the school, detailing upcoming events.

According to Pugliese, SGO funds enabled 50 BHS students to attend Essex SOBERfest, a program to discourage teen-agers from drinking and driving, held at South Mountain Arena last Saturday.

Monies also raised by the SGO send four BHS students to a leadership training conference held every year, sponsored by the New Jersey Association of Student Councils. Others may attend the conference but at a cost to the student. Money is also donated to the state student council's annual charity.

Another service provided through SGO funds is the annual scholarship given to any senior who exemplifies the qualities of a good student. Both

the staff and SGO members choose the recipient of this award.

About three years ago the SGO established another student service, known as the Buc Stop. The Buc Stop is a small store located in the school, which provides various items for sale to students. Such items include candy and Buccaneer buttons

The SGO also provides service to the community as well. In fact, there is a mutual benefit to some of the programs sponsored by the SGO.

One example is the SGO annual blood drive, which is co-sponsored by the North Jersey Blood Center.

# Columbus Day Memories

Columbus Day brings back different memories to different people. Underlying all the memories is a sea voyage by a courageous Italian from Europe to the shores of America. The Nutley Italian-American League in a tremendous show of energy, pride, and encouragement, supported by the Nutley-Belleville Italian communities, organized a parade to mark the occasion that was a huge success.

For us, the events remind us of another day — another sea voyage from Europe to America by another courageous Italian. This Italian immigrant was 14 when he sailed aboard a freighter from the shores of his native land to find a new home 3,000 miles across the sea.

He could neither read nor write, but within his powerfully built body was a compassionate heart, pulsating to the rhythm of sounds from the distant shores of a strange land filled with a promise of a new life.

Facing the dark uncertainty of a sea voyage — the unknown of a new land — possessing no skills but that of a shepherd — he was unafraid — and with remarkable courage this 14-year-old boy left behind his mother, father, and family members in a daring pursuit of a better life.

For him, this would be the first time ever he would be away overnight from his birthplace.

He arrived in the foreign, mythical land as the old century was giving way to the 20th, unable to speak the language nor understand the customs.

But in this experience he was not alone — for thousands of his countrymen preceded him and hundreds of thousands more were to follow him — males, females, babies, teenagers, and adults.

Ellis Island was their first stop — an experience better to be forgotten, for the cruel dog pounds of yesteryear were like country estates compared to the squalid quarters of Ellis Island.

He survived the pushing around, the insults hurled at "greenhorns," the epithets reserved for ethnic immigrants from southern Europe. Like dumb cattle they were herded about from one staging area to another — not knowing what to expect next.

With dauntless courage and determined grit he managed to survive the unpleasant experience of Ellis Island — an experience that scared his teenage memory. He wasn't bitter — just shocked, surprised and numbed — he had dreamed dreams of a friendly, hospitable people in America so he couldn't help but compare the reception at Ellis Island with the tenderness and loving care he and his comrades showered upon dumb animals back in his native country.

He finally made it into the

warm embrace of an older brother.

By foot (plenty of it, too), rail, and horsedrawn carriage, the immigrant finally made it to New Jersey — a place where an older brother found shelter a year earlier.

Before he had time to firmly plant his feet on American soil, a job opportunity arose — the wages — 50 cents for a 12-hour day. He accepted — and though it seemed like an eternity — a year or so later, a job offer was available from a company (later to become Public Service Transportation), at \$1 per day. He couldn't resist the new job challenge and higher wages — so he switched — a move that led him into marrying a native of his home town who he met through family circle picnics.

And so it came to pass that this immigrant established a home on a \$1-a-day income, a borrowed kitchen set, with a loving, dedicated wife, and a mind and heart determined to be a winner.

Working day and night, Saturdays and Sundays, moonlighting at any job available, skilled or unskilled, this immigrant boy grew into manhood proudly boasting of home ownership, and a loving, devoted wife who quit her job pitting cherries to concentrate all her time and energies on being a mother and a housewife. She succeeded at both.

For his part, he lived just long enough to pay off his home mortgage, see his children complete their schooling, and his boys establish their own businesses.

He lived a life that made him one of the millions of unsung, unheralded, nameless heroes of America. He insisted that his sons and daughter meet the most stringent behavior standards, developing integrity, character, family honor, community pride and respect for the laws of his adopted country. One of life's proudest moments for him was taking the oath of an American citizen and pinning the American flag to his lapel.

Early on, he mastered the English language to a point where he could speak it well and be understood thoroughly — and still determined to learn to write English — at age 58, he sat evenings at the kitchen table with his middle son teaching him the English language. In life he rose from a common laborer to a state-licensed engineer.

He had a fierce belief people should pay their just debts. As for lending money, on one occasion his middle son asked for a \$1,000 loan for a business venture. "Okay, son, here it is. You pay it back, and it will be there the next time you need it."

He was a good and decent man. He was the finest husband, and he was a most inspiring father.

His code of living was there for his children to emulate.

He died young — 35 years ago this week — at a point in life when he had everything to live for — a lifetime of hard work behind him — but he was destined to die too soon — he died before he had the opportunity to see his sons blossom into manhood, achieving undreamed honors and glory at the hands of his adopted community's voters. He was no Christopher Columbus — he was my father — Pasquale Orechio. Pop, wherever you are, and I think I know — rest in peace — your wife with prayer beads in hand and abiding faith in God — continues strong at 90 — and your children continue to honor your name.

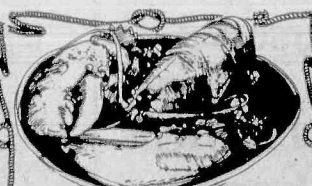

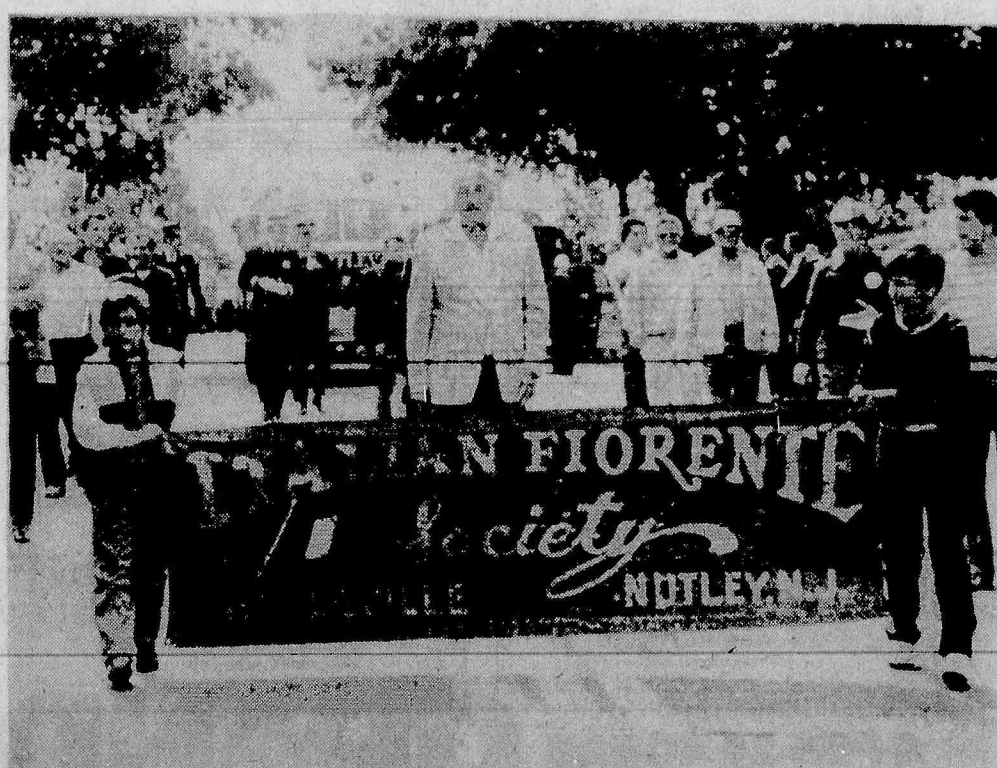

## Home Opener This Saturday Against Teaneck

### Montclair Hands Bucs First Defeat of Season

There were a couple of items worth noting in last week's Belleville-Montclair football game at Woodman Field. First off, the Montclair Mounties are a very big, physical football team. Secondly, it is apparent that Montclair has Belleville's number, beating them for the fifth time in the last six meetings. Third, despite the loss, the Belleville football team showed a great deal of character and might have made more strides with the defeat than it did with the first two victories combined.

The record will show that Montclair won this game, 14-6, dropping the Bucs record to 2-1. Teaneck High School will be in Belleville this Saturday afternoon for a 1:30 p.m. kickoff. It will be the Buc-

caners' home opener after playing its first three games on the road.

Since this rivalry was reinstated back in 1977, Montclair is the only team to hold an advantage over the Buccaneers, winning for the second straight year and for the fifth time in six attempts. Only a 7-6 Belleville triumph in the driving rain back in 1980 prevented a Montclair sweep of this series. In 1981, these two teams did not play because Montclair was in the Watchung Hills Conference and Belleville was still an independent.

This year, as in the game last season, Montclair capitalized on a few key plays and then held its breath as Belleville, true to its tough tradition, came back strong.

After spotting the Mounties an early 14-0 lead, Belleville's Blue Wall defense put the clamps on the Mounties' strong running game. James Overby, the Mounties' speedy running back, picked up 74 yards in the first quarter, but was held pretty much in check for the remainder of the game.

After Belleville won the opening kickoff, the Bucs started a drive from their own 28. They weren't able to move the ball and Mike Murphy punted for the Bucs. On the punt, Montclair was called for roughing the kicker and Belleville had new life on its own 33.

"We had a tough time on the front line with them," said head coach John Senesky. "We knew they were tough, but I didn't expect them to be as physical as they were. We didn't have the size to match them up front, but our kids stayed tough and did a good job of matching them after the early going."

The Bucs could not move the ball on the new series of downs and Murphy, once again, was called upon to punt. It was here that the most controversial call of the day came about. Murphy punted to Overby and the Montclair runner apparently got his feet caught up on the grass. As he attempted to get away from the football, Belleville's Mark Walsh came barreling down, looking to down the football. It appeared from the angle closest to the sidelines that the ball hit Overby, rather clearly, and Walsh grabbed loose ball on the Mounties' 32-yard line. The Belleville bench called for a first down in its favor on the Montclair 32 and the linesman closest to the play seemed to agree. However, the head official ruled that Overby did not touch the ball and the Mounties had the first down going the other way.

The call did not help the Buccaneers' attack as Montclair proceeded to drive 68 yards in five plays, with Overby gaining 65 of the yards and Brandy Wells picking up the last three for the touchdown. Quintis McDonald added the point after touchdown.

The Montclair lead ballooned to 28-0.

Junior Bob Hutchinson ran an 18:48 in the Bernardsville race and forms a good one-two combination with De Meo. The big story has been the fine running of freshman Craig Burden. In the invitational last Saturday, Burden placed 11th in a field of 100 freshmen in the 4 kilometer race. His time of 15:21 gives good reason to believe that Burden can be a top runner before his days at BHS are over.

Junior Billy Huamani was the final runner across for the boys' team, running a 19:25, also his best race of the season.

The team battled with Paramus Catholic, 2-5-2.5 when lightning forced a halt to the final doubles match of the day. "They (Paramus Catholic) had won the first set, 6-4 and we were ahead in the second set, 3-0, explained head coach Karen Fucello. # Belleville Booters Keep Rolling On

In keeping with its impressive start in this 1983 season, the Belleville High School varsity soccer team won its first two divisional games in the Northern New Jersey Interscholastic League last week by identical 1-0 scores. These victories, over Ridgewood and Teaneck,

brought the Buccaneers' record to an unheralded 6-2.

"If things keep going the way they have so far, I think we have a good shot at taking the conference," said coach Anthony DeAquino, "as good as anyone else. Of course, we have to play up to our potential. If we do that, we're liable to get one of

the top seeds in the Essex County Tournament and we stand a better chance in it than we have in previous years."

Both of last week's contests were exciting, nail-biting matches that went right down to the wire. Belleville took the early lead at Ridgewood after sophomore striker Jamie Jerez knocked Santiago Borja's pass away from the goalkeeper into the net at 19:18 of the first quarter. The Bucs were never able to relax, however, as the home team kept sending wave after wave of attackers in to attempt to even the score. "Ridgewood kept passing the ball well," said DeAquino, "and they didn't let us sit back. But when they really put the pressure on we were able to stop them." Senior Brian Cook played another strong game, making eleven saves for the shutout.

The outcome was even more uncertain against Teaneck last Thursday as the teams played a scoreless tie for three quarters. Both sides had many opportunities but the only score came early in the fourth when Carlos Kingalahu beat keeper Brian Fleisig to the lower right-hand corner off of a pass from Jerez. The visitors continued to pressure the weary Buccaneer defense but they were unable to prevent Cook from recording his

fourth shutout of the year. "I think we played a better game against Teaneck, but obviously I was happy with both results," stated a pleased DeAquino. "Even though I would have preferred a little more offense, I'm happy with a 1-0 win anytime. In any event, it's important for us to get the first goal, no matter who we're playing. And in those 1-0 games you don't even have to make a mistake to lose it. A shot can go in off of someone's back, shoulder, whatever — and that's it. Of course there's a lot of strain on the backs in a game like that but all of them — Freddy (Wedekin), Luke (Silletti), Jamie (Lijo) and Karl (Hauschild) — have been playing really good ball for us. And what can you say about Brian — four shutouts, two one-goal games — he's just been playing great."

The Buccaneers, who played St. Joseph's of Montvale on Tuesday, will need more of this fine play when they host the Passaic Indians at Clearman Field today at 4 p.m. Hackensack comes in Tuesday

We had five matches plus a tournament the week before so the girls were a bit drained."

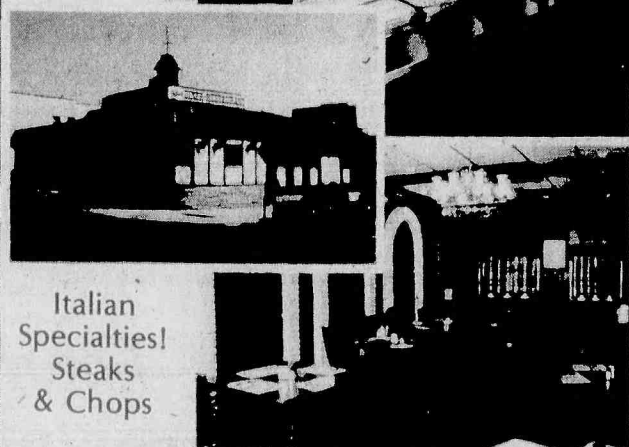

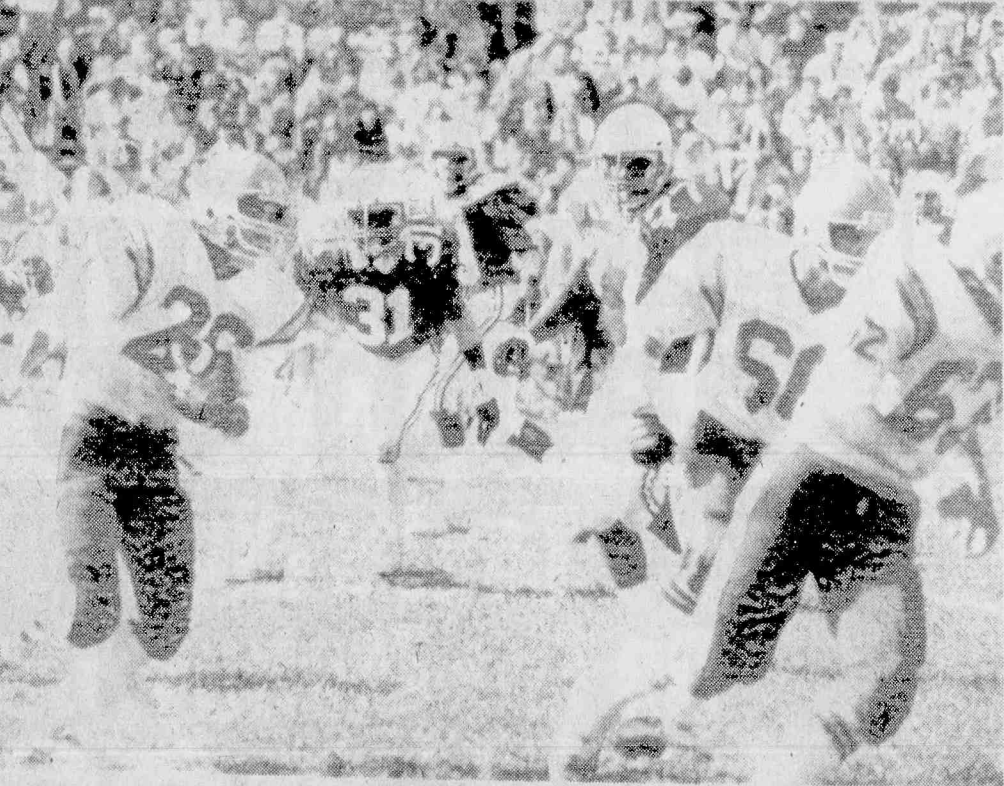

13-0 seconds later when Dennis O'Hare picked off a Walsh pass and ran 31 yards for a touchdown. McDonald added the point after and it was 14-0.

"At that point," said Senesky, "the kids might have given up and nobody would have noticed. However, they stayed tough and got themselves back into the game. That says a lot for the team."

The Belleville defense, too proud to surrender this early in the game, finally got the Blue Wall built up to its usual standards and kept Overby and Wells pretty much confined. Following a sack of Mountie quarterback Kevin Richberg, the Mounties punted to the Bucs who started on the Montclair 37. With the fans roaring, Belleville picked up 10 yards on a Frank Tursi run. From the 27, Murphy added two yards and Billy Baber picked up one to the 24. From there, Walsh found Dave Mozeika for an apparent first down at the 17. However, the official placed the ball a few inches short of the first down mark and on fourth down, Walsh's attempt on the quarterback sneak was stopped.

"I thought he had made it," said Senesky. The official, who was certainly making some questionable calls in the early going, felt it wasn't necessary to call for a measurement and awarded the ball back to Montclair.

The half ended with Montclair ahead, 14-0. In the second half, the Blue Wall once again put a clamp on the running of Wells and Overby and the Bucs got a big break on a short Montclair punt. Starting from the Montclair 38, Murphy picked up five yards and left three Mounties on the ground. Baber added four more and Murphy picked up five for the first down. On the Murphy run for first down, the Mounties were finally called for a personal foul penalty, good for 15 additional yards and a first down at the Montclair 11. After

Murphy picked up a yard, the entire Belleville sideline held its collective breath when wide receiver Carmen Cerreto did not get up following the play. The concern deepened when the receiver did not get up, or for that matter, didn't move for 10 minutes. The ambulance and stretcher were called out on the field and an anxious crowd watched as the senior was taken to Mountinside Hospital for x-rays. First reports indicated that Cerreto had a possible neck injury and concussion. Thankfully, Cerreto is home with a sprained neck and could get back into the lineup in the future.

The Bucs seemed fueled by the loss of their teammate and after Tursi gained only one yard to the nine, Walsh found Billy Baber for eight yards to the Montclair one and a first and goal. From there, it was Mr. Murphy bulling over two plays later and the Bucs were on the board, 14-6. The point after kick never got off as holder Frank Zangari couldn't handle the low snap and Zangari's pass for two points was almost caught in the end zone. Despite the missed point, the Bucs were back in business.

The Bucs had one more chance to tie the score when they drove as close as the Montclair 33, but the Mountie defense was able to answer the call and they held on for their third victory of the year and assured themselves of the number two state ranking and the top ranking in Essex County, at least for another week.

For Belleville, it was an outstanding performance but like last year (a 22-2 defeat), the Bucs missed out on some opportunities and lost their first game of the season.

NOTES: Teaneck comes into Belleville with an 0-3 mark. No injuries to report, other than Cerreto's neck injury. The loss was the first for Belleville in their "lucky" road uniforms after winning 13 straight in those colors. Belleville has lost just three road games in the last five seasons

and all three have been to Montclair. As a matter of fact, in the 1979 and 1982 seasons, the Bucs were 8-1 in the regular season with the only defeat coming to Montclair. The Bucs will be home to Teaneck and St. Joseph's in a night game before heading over to Passaic on October 29 for another key contest. Talk

about tough football players, Ralph De Falco, who missed the Bloomfield game with a separated shoulder incurred during the warm up drills, was back in action on the offensive line. De Falco was supposed to have missed about four weeks, but his arm was tapped up and he was back for the contest with Montclair.



continued as assistant superintendent until 1975 when he requested a transfer as principal of an elementary school. After serving as principal of School 9 for two years, he was transferred once again, this time to School 7, where he has been ever since.

Rosamilia said he has seen a lot of changes in the operation of the school district since he first started 34 years ago, some which have made things easier and some which have not.

"A major change has been the increase in paper work for school principals," he said. "Years ago a principal spent 20 percent of his time doing paper work and the rest observing classes and helping teachers. But now the figures are reversed. A principal now just does not have enough time to help out. He is stuck at his desk with paper work and it is bad for the system."

"Also many elements in society have lessened their responsibilities and therefore the schools have been given responsibilities which at one time were shared by the family, church and school," he said. "Over the years we have been spending more time teaching children about sex education and attention has been placed on instructing students about

dealing with life, which is fine. There is a place for that in education, but for every subject which has been added, there is less time available for the basics. More emphasis must be placed on the basics in education."

While also assuming several positions in the school system, Rosamilia also found the time for outside interests, which have earned him a list of honors and awards. He was once elected Belleville's Citizen of the Year, served on the state's Commissioners' Advisory Council For Gifted and Talented Children, president of the Belleville Child Guidance Association, a member of the board of trustees of Community Mental Health Services, Educator of the Year in 1969, president of the Belleville Education Association, president of the Essex County Assistant Superintendent Council and a list of many more.

But of all the posts he held in the Belleville school system, the days he enjoyed most were the early ones.

"I really enjoyed my early days as a teacher, coach, and playground guidance counselor and playground director," he said. "Because then I was able to see the youngsters in various dimensions and get very close to them."

So now Rosamilia plans to put his endless energy into other forms as he stages his retirement in December.

"I plan to play a lot of golf and do some fishing," Rosamilia said. "And do some writing, especially poetry. I plan to relax."

And Eord knows, he deserves it.

Mayor Marotti was notified of the rejection for federal monies in a September 21 letter from the U.S. Department of Commerce. Assistant Secretary for Economic Development Carlos Campbell wrote that with 2,800 applications under the Jobs Act, the federal office received requests for aid totalling \$1.6 billion but had only \$100 million to award.

As explained by Bruno Associates, Belleville's funding consultants, the applications for federal monies were considered on the basis of priority needs.

Last July 11, Commissioners approved a capital ordinance appropriating \$1,725,000 and authorizing issuance of \$665,000 in bonds to finance construction of a proposed \$1.6 million police complex.

However, actual construction was contingent upon receiving the federal grant. The federal decision puts all plans in limbo at present.

the staff of six cooks busily cutting meats, cleaning vegetables, and preparing for the evening business.

With an apron over his street clothes, Gaeta himself was at creative work preparing one of the unusual attractive desserts featured on the menu at Nanina's.

"This is zucchini," explained Gaeta who talks easily as he works. "It's a light Florentine dessert baked to resemble a dome in Florence."

When he completed the initial preparation of the six desserts, which must set overnight, Gaeta led the way to the restaurant's upstairs kitchen area and removed a completed zucchini from the refrigerator, proudly displaying it alongside a painting of Florence that hangs in the restaurant lobby depicting the very dome.

That combination of good cooking technique, interesting menu selections, and knowledgeable repartee, have made Nanina's one of the area's most popular and busy restaurants.

With a menu of various meat and fowl dishes, and selections of pasta smothered in diverse sauces, Nanina's remains true to its famous seafood tradition. The thriving eatery evolved from a fish market on Newark's Cutler Street established by Gaeta's grandmother, Nanina Mari.

"Soon, the market started cooking meals on weekends, then more frequently," said Gaeta. Then, three decades ago, Nanina brought her style to Belleville and has remained ever since.

Nanina's is a family operated business with Gaeta, his mother Etta Gaeta, and of course, Nanina herself, overseeing the daily affairs.

Though she speaks little English, Nanina communicates her pride clearly enough as she gestures around the kitchen where she sat during the busy dinner preparations last week, noting, "Very clean kitchen, yes?"

It was Nanina who taught her grandson his famous cooking skills. "I also return to Italy every year to study whatever is new on the horizon," said Gaeta, who attends cooking schools mostly in Northern Italian cities of Bologna, Venice, and Florence.

Serious and patient in conversation, Gaeta is an ever changing experimenter in the kitchen. "I vary the menu. Sometimes we'll have ravioli filled with crabmeat, sometimes with shrimp. It depends on what customers request, what I may have picked up in my travels, or just on what ingredients are available to us at a given time," he said.

Gaeta displayed a basket loaded with vibrant yellow peppers imported from Holland and similar to those grown in certain regions of Italy and used on the current menu there.

"We'll experiment and sometimes a trial dish goes on the regular menu," he said, adding, "but we will cook what the customer requests, even if we've never tried it before."

Nanina's boasts an intimate soft pink dining room that seats 75 and a banquet room for 150 patrons, but Gaeta is especially proud of his newest experiment, the wine cellar.

The cook led the way to the lower level where a long table, which can accommodate up to 16 diners, stands in a cellar room housing over 7,000 bottles of wine.

It's in the special wine cellar dinners that Gaeta's imagination takes wings. Although some of the cellar parties order the meals to be served, many adventurous regulars make their reservations and tell Gaeta to do the rest.

"It's a real event. I'll plan and prepare a complete 10-course dinner and select the wines to go with it," he said, noting that the various dishes reflect a wide variety of Italian regional cooking.

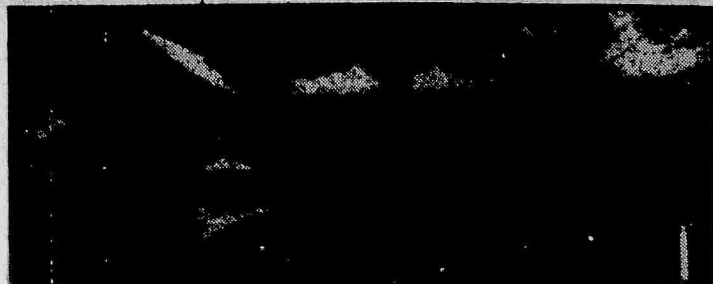

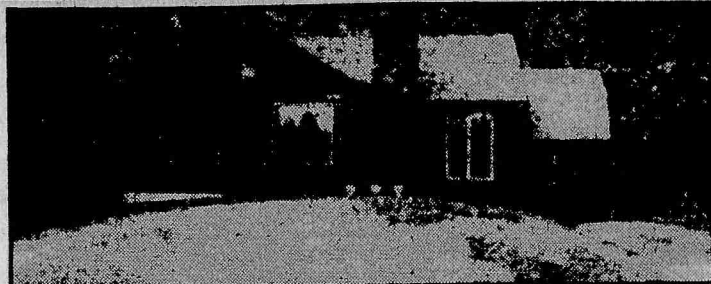
