Service Station Law Likely Will Restrict 24-Hour Operations

A measure to prohibit gasoline stations from operating 24 hours a day is up for public hearing and final vote at next Tuesday's commission meeting.

"I'm in favor of the regulations," said Mayor Michael Marotti of the proposal.

"Most of the station owners don't want to be open all night either," he added.

The ordinance was approved unanimously by all five commissioners at the Aug. 14 town meeting and smooth approval is likely for its adoption next week.

The proposed regulation came about when the Shell Company decided early in the summer to require its two Belleville stations to keep a 24-hour operation.

Business owners affected by

Shell's decision complained to township officials that the extra revenue from graveyard business hours would not compensate them for the costs of staying open later or for the risks of theft and vandalism posed by the lengthened shift.

Residents of neighborhoods near affected businesses oppose the Shell plan, fearing increased criminal activity and noise from all night operations.

Mayor Marotti, basing his opinion on several all-night stores

and gas stations already operating in town, agreed that the risks make the plan unwelcome.

Although officials apparently favor restricting service stations, they also expect legal action from the Shell Company.

"They sent us a letter last month saying they were against our proposed ordinance," said Marotti. "We expect them to be there next week and then we'll see what happens."

The meeting will be held on Sept. 11 at 8 p.m. in Town Hall.

Columbus Day Parade Will Run On Oct. 7

The second annual Columbus Day Parade for Belleville and Nutley will be held here Oct. 7. Jack Nosti will serve as general chairman for the parade, which is sponsored by the Nutley Italian American Civic Association. Public Works Director Joseph Grande will serve as the parade coordinator in Belleville.

There will be two new features for the parade this year. The organizing committee is looking for a "bella signorina" to serve as a parade queen. The other feature is a special dinner-dance to be held on the Friday night before the parade steps off.

Qualifications for women to serve as the parade's bella signorina are that they must be 16-20 years of age, single, a Nutley resident and have at least one parent of Italian heritage.

Those interested should send a resume and photo to Mrs. Mary Romanowski, 65 Grant Ave. in Nutley. Applications must be received by Sept. 7. A committee will screen applicants and pick the parade queen.

A dinner-dance has been slated for Oct. 5 in the Nutley Elks Lodge, 242 Chestnut St. Tickets for the affair are currently available at \$30 per person. The evening will feature a cocktail

hour, open bar, a full course dinner, dancing and live entertainment, coffee and dessert. Call Nosti at 667-7334 for reservations.

According to Nosti, the general theme of this year's parade will be to expand the march and attract a variety of interesting bands. Last year eight marching bands participated and Nosti said that the parade committee hoped to double the number this year. Along with the Nutley and Belleville high school cadet marching bands there will be several drum and bugle corps, a bagpipe band and the Denville String Band.

The parade will kick off at noon in the Belleville High School stadium. The march will file west on Division Street to Passaic Avenue and proceed south to Joralemon Street. The parade will then turn west to Franklin Avenue and proceed south through Nutley. The reviewing stand will be located at Nutley Savings and Loan, 371 Franklin Ave. The parade will terminate at Adams Court and will use the Park Oval to disembar.

Nosti said that the parade will be a "50-50" effort between the two townships this year.

Mark Bridge, 23; Funeral Tomorrow

Mark David Bridge of Belleville died Saturday, Sept. 1, in the National Institute of Health Clinical Center, Bethesda, Md.,

where he had been awaiting a heart transplant. He was 23.

Mr. Bridge, victim of cardiomyopathy, a fatal heart condition, had volunteered for a research program at N.I.H. in which a medical cure for the condition was being sought.

He had been recommended for the transplant immediately upon his admission July 21.

A native of Oneonta, N.Y., Mr. Bridge lived in Belleville more than 22 years. He was predeceased by his mother, Anne Marie Bridge, who died Jan. 9 of this year.

Mr. Bridge attended Belleville schools and was a 1979 graduate of Belleville High School.

He had been active in Cub Scout Pack 305 and Boy Scout Troop 350, both of Belleville, and Belleville recreation baseball. He was a member of the Belleville Junior High School wrestling team.

Mr. Bridge was employed as a packaging mechanic by Interbake Foods Inc., Fairfield.

Belleville Bucs Again Seen As Power In Grid League

After a hot summer of lifting weights and running in the humid evenings, the Belleville football team began the real thing last weekend with two a-day practices

that lasted until yesterday, when school officially commenced for the 1984-85 year. The Bucs will now practice on a daily basis, gearing for the opener of the 1984 season on Sept. 22, at Don Bosco.

The annual decathlon, held by coach John Senesky since he took the reigns in 1977, produced some impressive results last week, especially in the power index ratings, a tribute to the Bucs' hard weight lifting program during the summer months.

Senesky's success as head coach has been well documented. In his inaugural campaign in '77, the team posted a 2-6-1 record and marked the third straight season in which Belleville football had not finished with a winning season. Furthermore, the Bucs had not defeated arch rival Nutley since 1971, showing only a scoreless tie in 1975 as any success with the Maroon.

Since 1977, Belleville has a record of 43-11 in regular season play. They have been to the playoffs in 1979, 1980 and 1982, advancing to the finals in 1980. The Bucs have also posted six straight victories over the Nutley Raiders, the last coming in the home opener of 1983, 12-6.

Last season, the Bucs finished with a 6-3 mark, losing via an upset to Ridgewood, 20-14 and bowing to eventual state champions Passaic, 28-7 and Montclair, 14-6.

Belleville did post victories over Nutley, 12-6, Bloomfield, 14-0, Teaneck, 33-0, St. Joseph's, 30-6, Hackensack, 27-0, and Kearny, 28-6. This season, the schedule has been completely revamped, with only Nutley, Montclair, Bloomfield and Passaic remaining from the 1983 slate. Even Kearny, an old time rival usually played on Thanksgiving Day, has been nixed in favor of Nutley, which should provide an interesting game.

Belleville had two 1,000-point scorers in this year's decathlon, which tests the Bucs' strength, endurance and versatility. Seniors Steve Kimble and John Apicella led the way with 1,015 and 1,000 points respectively. Kimble, like his brother Ray, is a stalwart defensive player and could see time at tight end. Apicella was a mainstay on the offensive line last year as a junior and should continue his excellence this year.

Five athletes, led by senior quarterback/defensive safety Mark Walsh, posted scores of 900 or better. Walsh finished with a 980, followed by Todd Conforti, a junior, with 970. Don DiPaolo had

Nutley Little Theatre, which will celebrate its 50th anniversary this fall, is seeking old playbills, news articles, pictures, ticket stubs, props, costumes or mementos from past seasons to be included in a special exhibit at the Nutley Museum.

The theatre history exhibit will be on display this September at the Nutley Museum, sponsored by the Historical Society. The exhibit will depict 50 years of live theater in Nutley.

A grand opening 50th season cocktail gala will be held at the NLT Barn, 43 Erie Place Sept. 15 at 6 p.m. NLT will open its special anniversary production of "Detective Story" at 8 p.m. later that same night. Call 667-0374 for ticket reservations.

NLT is also interested in making contact with past members

The theatre group plans various events to celebrate its golden anniversary this fall and hopes to attract as many former members as possible.

The first NLT production opened Nov. 23, 1934 with a comedy entitled "Up Pops the Devil," written by Nutley resident Frances Goodrich and directed by Robert Winteritz. The performance was held in the Franklin School auditorium, as were most plays during the group's early years. The Little Theatre held its first organizational meeting Oct. 1, 1934 in the Public Safety Building on Chestnut Street. Ivor

Watts, a former Nutley resident now living in New Hampshire, was elected president while Alfred Eville, a resident of Rutgers Place, was chosen as vice president.

The group purchased a former jam factory on Erie Place, known as "The Barn," in 1936. After presenting plays in various school auditoriums for 32 years, NLT decided to renovate the facility and make it a theatre. The first "barn" production was held in November of 1976 with the play "Six Rms Riv Vu." Since then, the group has run its entire season slate of productions from the Erie Place barn, as well as maintaining it as its headquarters.

There was a proposal before the Nutley Planning Board in the summer of 1931 to convert the barn into a garage for garbage trucks, but this request was turned

down. The event was significant, not only in the preservation and history of the NLT Barn, but also in the career of the late Commissioner John H. Lucy. The Planning Board verdict was the first act of municipal service by Lucy and set forth a distinguished career in local government which lasted over 50 years. Lucy had been named to the Board on July 28, 1931 by Mayor Ernest P. Cook specifically to help decide this issue, following the death of planner Ernest G. Weischdel.

"Detective Story," the production which will mark the group's 50th anniversary on Sept. 15, is the same play which celebrated the theatre's 25th anniversary. NLT is currently working with Nutley Commissioners to have The Barn designated as a state historical landmark.

NICOTINE GUM

A new prescription gum, Nicorette, that contains nicotine, can double a smoker's chances of kicking the habit. This is the first prescription product designed to help smokers quit that has ever been approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA). Here is how it works: Whenever a smoker craves a cigarette, he puffs a piece of the gum into his mouth and slowly chews it. The chewing action gradually releases the two milligrams of nicotine contained in the gum. The nicotine is absorbed through the lining of the mouth into the bloodstream. The smoker thus gets his nicotine fix, lessening such cigarette withdrawal symptoms as headaches and drowsiness. After a few weeks, the now ex-smoker gradually decreases the number of pieces he chews until the urge is dispelled.

Mark Bridge

Mark Bridge, a 23-year-old lifetime Belleville youngster, died Saturday. We all know that we are born to die — but not at age 23. Mark Bridge was too young to die, for he had much to offer the world about him and much to enjoy from members of a loving family. Mark's end came suddenly — at a time when preparations were being made for a heart transplant.

Soon after his mother, Anne Marie Bridge, died on January 9 in Clara Maass Medical Center after a four-year battle with breast cancer, Mark began to experience unusual physical symptoms that suddenly turned violent. Virtually unable to walk, in early July, doctors found that Mark's heart was the size of his chest cavity.

He was enrolled as a patient at the National Institute of Health Clinical Research Center at Bethesda, Maryland,

where doctors discovered that Mark's heart was beyond repair; a transplant was Mark's only hope.

Doctors relate that Mark's will to live was stronger than the medicine prescribed for him. Despite his courage and will to live, Mark's heart sputtered and stopped. It is with sadness and pain that we acknowledge the demise of Mark Bridge. The mystery of life and death is in the hands of God and only He will ever know why Mark left us at such an early age.

May God grant his father and sisters the courage and strength to carry on.

History speaks of astronauts made of the "Right Stuff." Looking at my mother and thinking of her history, it is with personal family pride the "Right Stuff" is an observation that easily fits my mother — astronaut she is not.

My mother is not, and never was a crabby person. So with that modification, I share with you a reading of An Ode To Nurses:

What do you see, nurses, what do you see?
What are you thinking when you're looking at me?

A crabby old woman not very wise,

Uncertain of habit with far away eyes.

I'm a small child of ten with a mother and father,
Brothers and sisters who love one another,

A bride in her twenties — my heart gives a leap.

Remembering the vows that I promised to keep.

A woman of thirty, my young now grow fast,
Bound to each other with ties that should last.

At forty, my sons have grown and have gone,
But my man is beside me, to see I don't moun.

There is now a stone where I once had a heart.

I remember the joys, and I remember the pain;

And I am loving and living life over again.

I think of the years all too few — gone too fast,

So open your eyes, nurses, open and see

Not a crabbed old woman; look closer — see me.

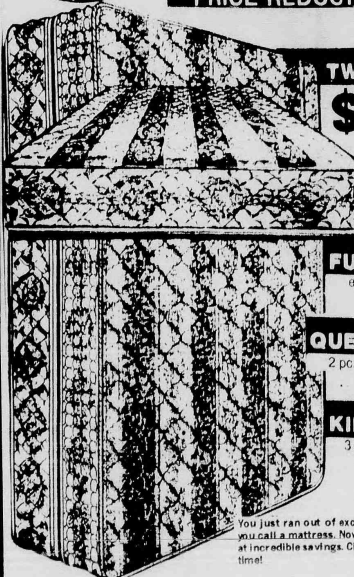

Sheriff Is Offering Speakers on Child Abuse

Essex County Sheriff Thomas J. D'Alessio has announced the availability of speakers from his

department dealing with the subject of child abuse.

"In light of the recent shocking

disclosures," D'Alessio said, "I wish to remind our citizens that we have been offering a program concerning child safety for over a year. Members of our department, who are specially trained in advice and counseling, have been speaking to concerned groups throughout Essex County.

"While the current headlines are shocking, the problem is by no means a new one. Statistics show that child abuse in their United States is nearing epidemic proportions and as concerned parents we should do all we can to protect our children," he continued.

The sheriff pointed out that the best way to prepare and protect

our children is to educate them. The Sheriff's Department has prepared a brochure that points out many ways in which to do this. Produced by Sheriff's Personnel, the brochure entitled "Children—Be Safe—Be Alert" is a message to both children and parents which openly discusses the dangers which children may encounter, how they may avoid them and how parents can deal with them.

"Our speakers are available to any interested group, and the brochure will be sent to anyone who requests it. While these are useful tools, and I urge every parent to take advantage of them, the most important thing we can do is trust our own instincts. No one knows our own kids as well as

we do. Be open in all communication with your children and listen to them, very often they are trying to tell us something and we don't listen. Let them know that we do care, that we are there when they need us, and most of all that we love them and are on their side. Hopefully with increased com-

munication and education, we can prepare our children and ourselves to cope with this most serious problem," D'Alessio said.

Orechio Bill Advocates Fingerprinting of Staff

All current and prospective employees of private and public child care centers should be required to undergo fingerprinting and criminal background checks under legislation recently proposed by Senate President Carmen A. Orechio.

Under the measure, which will be introduced when the Senate convenes next month, current employees who refuse to be fingerprinted for background checks would be dismissed. Any such employee who has been convicted of sexually, physically or emotionally abusing a child would be barred from employment at child care centers.

The proposal follows several disclosures of sexual abuse of children at day care centers and is aimed at reducing the occurrence of such situations in the future.

"The time has come when this should be done on a mandatory basis," Senator Orechio said.

He stated that also under consideration was an expansion of the requirement to cover workers at state institutions, foster and group homes for children as well as individuals who operate private child care centers in their homes. Public hearings will be held in the near future on the measure which

is still in draft form.

Governor Thomas Keane, Human Service Commissioner George Albanese and Attorney General Irwin Kimmelman have all announced their support for Senator Orechio's proposal. Here in Nutley, Orechio is a commissioner and the director of the Public Safety Department.

Blue-Gold Cagers Coast to Third Victory

Would you believe this? The Belleville boys' basketball team has a record of 6-3. That's right, 6-3. Last week, the Bucs won three straight games, defeating nemesis Kearny and Essex Catholic and beating Weehawkin rather handily.

The Bucs were home to face St. Cecilia of Kearny on Tuesday and battle Essex Catholic, starting at 8 p.m. tonight.

The last time the Bucs won three straight was back in 1975 and the six victories represent the most by a Belleville team since the 1974-75 season. Furthermore, Belleville had not defeated Kearny since Jan. 31, 1975 and had never beaten Essex Catholic before.

The Essex Catholic game had started as if Belleville would be on the low end of the scoreboard once again. The Eagles jumped out to a 19-13 first quarter lead and extended that margin to 35-25 at the half. Suddenly, in the third quarter, Ronnie Wittman, the

hero of the week, started hitting his famous jump shot and the Bucs outscored the Eagles, 21-9.

The fourth quarter was the Gary Farar show, as the senior guard hit for seven points and the Bucs rolled to a 64-55 win. Wayne Bubet was the high scorer with 18 points, Wittman had 17, Farar had 15 and Eddie Aulisi contributed 12 points.

Head coach Joe Papasidero was extremely pleased with his team's effort. "We made a fine comeback after a very bad first half," the rookie pilot said. "I was really happy with the guys' super effort."

Speaking of super efforts, the Bucs played a super game in stopping Kearny in triple overtime, at Kearny, 75-73. Wittman won a thrilling game with a jump shot from the corner with just two ticks left in the third overtime and a Kearny player's hand over his face.

All tolled, he finished with a career high of 30 points, while Farar, Aulisi and Bubet scored 15, 15 and 14 points respectively. The Bucs actually had control of the game until the last quarter. They led 18-14 after one quarter and extended that margin to 35-29 at the half.

The third quarter was even and Belleville led, 51-45 entering the final frame. It was then that the Kurds made a fine comeback, one that put the game into overtime.

Things looked particularly bleak for the Bucs too, since Bubet had fouled out in regulation time. Wittman had a chance to win it before the first overtime, but the junior missed the first half of a one in one and the game went into overtime.

Wittman more than made up for the miss in the overtime. His shooting was deadly and he also contributed with a critical rebound.

Papasidero was naturally quite

elated with the win. "It was a beautiful game," said the coach. "What a win for us. It was a great game to watch and it's great to come out on top of an emotional game such as that."

The Bucs' adrenalin might have been down for the next night at Weehawkin, but the result was the same, victory. Belleville used an easier path this time, leading most of the way and breezing to a 64-49 win. It was the second victory over Weehawkin this season.

Bubet took up the scoring slack in this game with 25 points and 13 rebounds. The junior hit on seven of 10 free throws. Aulisi played a fine game, scoring 11 points, handing out 15 assists and hitting five of six from the charity stripe.

Ronnie Cook led the Bucs with 19 rebounds and chipped in with 10 points. Wittman was held down a bit, but he did contribute with 10 points. Finally, Farar hit

for seven points. All tolled, the Bucs hit 19 of 26 free throws and that, alone, with some fine shooting, extended the team record to 6-3.

Can you believe it? Whoever thought at the beginning of the season the Bucs would be 6-3. Maybe, just maybe, Joe Papasidero had an idea that they might be.

NOTES: The Bucs of 1979-80 finished the season with an 11-13

record after starting off 9-3. It was the best record at BHS since the 13-10 mark in 1975. Belleville was selected to play in the Essex County Tournament, losing to Clifford Scott High School in the first round. Wittman was the leading scorer that year, but Bubet came on in his senior year to become only the second man ever to break the 1,000-point mark at BHS. Abdel Anderson being the first.
