The annual decathlon, held by coach John Senesky since he took the reigns in 1977, produced some impressive results last week, especially in the power index ratings, a tribute to the Bucs' hard weight lifting program during the summer months.

Senesky's success as head coach has been well documented. In his innaugural campaign in '77, the team posted a 2-6-1 record and marked the third straight season in which Belleville football had not finished with a winning season. Furthermore, the Bucs had not defeated arch rival Nutley since 1971, sho wing only a scoreless tie in 1975 as any success with the Maroon.

Since 1977, Belleville has a record of 43-11 in regular season play. They have been to the playoffs in 1979, 1980 and 1982, advancing to the finals in 1980. The Bucs have also posted six straight victories over the Nutley Raiders, the last coming in the home opener of 1983, 12-6.

Last season, the Bucs finished with a 6-3 mark, losing via an upset to Ridgewood, 20-14 and bowing to eventual state champions Passac, 28-7 and Montclair, 14-6. 

Mark Bridge

Mark Bridge, a 23-year-old lifetime Belleville youngster, died Saturday. We all know that we are born to die — but that we are born to die — but not at age 23. Mark Bridge was too young to die, for he had much to offer the world about him and much to enjoy from members of a loving family. Mark's end came suddenly — at a time when preparations were being made for a heart transplant.

Soon after his mother, Anne Marie Bridge, died on January 9 in Clara Maass Medical Center after a four-year battle with breast cancer, Mark began to experience unusual physical symptoms that suddenly turned violent. Virtually unable to walk, in early July, doctors found that Mark's heart was the size of his chest

He was enrolled as a patient at the National Institute of Health Clinical Research Center at Bethesda, Maryland,

where doctors discovered that Mark's heart was beyond repair; a transplant was Mark's only hope.

Doctors relate that Mark's will to live was stronger than the medicine prescribed for him. Despite his courage and will to live, Mark's heart sputtered and stopped. It is with sadness and pain that we acknowledge the demise of Mark Bridge. The mystery of life and death is in the hands of God and only He will ever know why Mark left us at such

know why Mark left us at such an early age.

May God grant his father and sisters the courage and strength to carry on.

Orechio Bill Would Review Child Welfare

The cases of children under the state's care who are to be returned to their natural parents would have to undergo special review, under new legislation sponsored by Senate President Carmen Orschin

by Senate President Cornello Orechio. The bill (S. 1039), which recently cleared the Assembly and now goes to the Governor, would create a special review panel whose findings would have to be confirmed by the state's family court.

Creation of the special panels was recommended by the State Child Placement Review Board in its annual report.

"This special review would provide an additional means of checking whether the proposed reasons for the change are appropriate and whether this action would be in the best interests of the child." Senator Orechio said.





All current and prospective employees of private and public child care centers should be required to undergo fingerprinting and criminal background checks under legislation recently proposed by Senate President Carmen A. Orcehio.

Under the meaure, which will be introduced when the Senate convenes next month, current employees who refuse to be fingerprinted for backgound checks would be dismissed. Any such employee who has been convicted of sexually, physically or emotionally abusing a child would be barred from employment at child care centers.

The proposal follows several disclosures of sexual abuse of children at day care centers and is aimed at reducing the occurance of such situations in the future.

"The time has come when this should be done one a mandatory basis," Senator Orechio said.

He stated that also under consideration was an expansion of the requirement to cover workers at state institutions, foster and group homes for children as well as individuals who operate privates.


