# Girls' crew wins nationals

Putting the final touches to an incredible career, the Belleville girls' senior four crew team won an unprecedented third national title at St. Andrew's, Delaware, last weekend. The girls' marvelous victory capped a weekend in which three of the Belleville shells made it to the finals.

"It was just unbelievable,"

said an ecstatic head coach Sam Giuffrida last weekend. "The credit goes to Scott Fabian (girls' head coach over the last four years). He has done a marvelous job with the girls and he deserves all the accolades that go with this national title. I'm thankful he's on my staff. I wouldn't want to go up against him."

It was a marvelous ending to

the careers of three very talented athletes. Seniors Stephanie Aiello, Jackie Mele and Diane Black received their third national championship patch. Back in 1982, as freshmen, the girls won their first title, competing in a junior eight shell. The championship spent excitement throughout the township and immediately, the pressure was on for the girls to

win a second title in 1983.

It didn't pan out that way, although the girls came close.

"They finished third in the nationals that year," Giuffrida remembered, "and people thought that was a disappointing season. That season served to get our girls ready for the following year."

# Blight question remains

The decision has been made, but the question remains.

The Belleville Board of Commissioners voted no on the proposal for a blight declaration of Washington Avenue two weeks ago, but they did not rule out blight in the future if they do not see rehabilitation taking place.

To make sure the commissioners do not reverse their decision, the Belleville Revitalization Committee has vowed to see that the rehabilitation process continues.

"Our group is stronger than ever," Vincent Frantantoni, revitalization chairman, said. "We will be meeting the first and third Mondays of the month to discuss what is happening on the avenue."

"The commissioners left the question of blight up in the air," he continued. "The matter is far from resolved."

Frantantoni said the commissioners' decision does not give the business community on the avenue any direction. He said that the decision seems to be Phase II of an entire process to

change the town.

"We're looking for rehabilitation, not drastic measures," he said.

If the township commissioners go the route of high-rise buildings, Frantantoni said, the developers will demand more services. He referred to an expansion of the township's water mains and sewer system as an example.

"If they institute a large commercial district on the avenue, traffic will be bumper to bumper," he said. "You need access roads for high-rise

buildings and Belleville doesn't have them. An average high-rise building is three stories, which means it needs 10-14 acres. We don't have the land."

Frantantoni said the revitalization committee agrees with the commissioners' plan for a new municipal complex. He added that if the school board complex is sold, the committee wants to see the monies used for the town hall project and the land used for development, not for a relocation plan which was proposed by the Belleville Redevelopment Agency.

# Elementary dress code in the works

A new dress code for elementary schools was introduced to the Belleville Board of Education at its meeting last week.

The new dress code, as presented by Superintendent of Schools Michael Nardiello, lists five articles of clothing inappropriate for school attire. They are: shorts, mid-riff shirts, studed accessories, unsuitable footwear and garments with pornographic or suggestive messages.

The policy does, however, state that only kindergartners will be allowed to wear shorts. It was that statement that caused some members of the audience to disagree with the policy.

Barbara Cleaves, president of the consolidated parent organization, said that parents want their older children to wear shorts as well. She said that some parents wanted to have a policy where

kindergarten through third grade students would be allowed to wear shorts.

"You can't tell a fourth grader he can't wear shorts when his friend who's in third grade can," she said. "Parents wanted an overall dress code because the policy from school to school was confusing."

Nardiello said that each elementary school principal decides what is appropriate and inappropriate clothing. Some principals allowed their students to wear shorts and others didn't, he said.

Because of the confusion caused by the varying policies, parents requested that the school board look into the matter. As a result, a dress code committee was formed in January to establish a townshipwide dress code. That committee consisted of four school principals and two

parents from home and school associations.

The committee established a

policy in March which determined shorts inappropriate

# Annual fire inspections have begun

Fire inspections of all multiple dwellings, stores and factories in Belleville began last week and will continue until completed, Ralph J. DiRuggiero, Commissioner of Public Safety, said.

DiRuggiero said the fire department's annual fire inspections are meant to ensure that all dwellings of three families or more, as well as commercial properties comply with all the applicable township codes and have the required fire safety equipment.

DiRuggiero called on property owners to cooperate with the fire department as it makes its rounds.

"Our inspection program is

designed to prevent the loss of life and property that fires can cause," DiRuggiero said. "For that reason, we ask property owners to cooperate with our firefighters in making their properties safer."

Among specific conditions the fire inspectors will be looking for the following:

- Location and condition of smoke detectors.
- Access to and condition of fire escapes. Fire escapes should not be blocked by air conditioners.
- Access to and condition of exit doors. Exit doors should also be marked clearly.
- Improper wiring.

- Overloaded extension cords.
- Labeling and storage of flammable liquids.
- Excessive debris.
- Overcrowded cellars and hallways.

DiRuggiero said property owners can assist the inspectors

by taking note of the above conditions and correcting them as necessary. He urged property owners with questions concerning fire prevention to contact Capt. Andrew Depczek at 450-3368 between the hours of 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. on weekdays.

**A SPOONFUL**  
It is not a good idea to use a teaspoon from your regular service to measure out medicine for a child. Although it is common practice, the bowls on teaspoons vary so widely that you run the risk of seriously over- or under-medicating the child. Instead, use the medicine spoon provided with the medication or one which can be provided by the pharmacist. It consists of a spill-proof tube, with a spoon at one end, calibrated in teaspoons and milliliters. If the child has not yet graduated to using a spoon, ask the pharmacist for an oral syringe.

It's extremely important to follow the instructions given on a prescription or over the counter medication otherwise there could be problems. 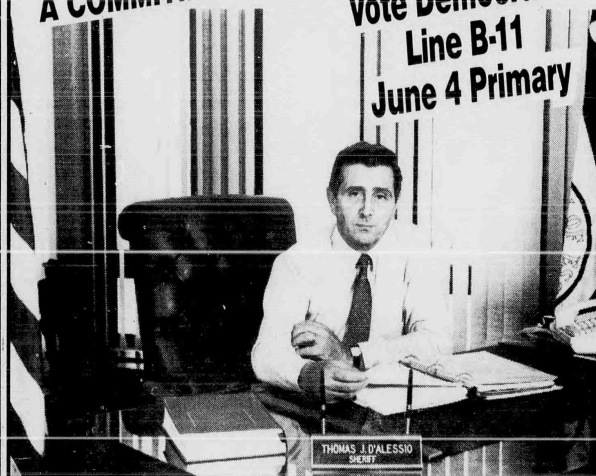

## Golden Comments

In many foreign countries littering is a crime bringing fines or arrest. There only criminals do it. In this country, especially in the large city streets, sidewalks and gutters are unsanitary landfills.

New York, in an effort to tidy things up a bit, on Sept. 12, 1983 imposed a 5 percent surcharge on bottles, cans of soda, beer, ale, mineral water and malt liquor. Refundable on return.

Reports now on how the "bottle law" worked out in its first year shows:

•A strong trend away from glass to plastic containers because, unlike bottles and cans, they can be crushed before they are returned to distributors;

•Beer prices shot up 18 percent - seven times more than the cost of handling the returnables;

•New York residents drank 3 percent less soda and 7 percent less beer;

•People do return returnables - 70 percent of soft drink containers and 86 percent of beer cans and bottles;

•There were heavy layoffs in factories manufacturing bottles and cans, lots of new jobs in plastics and among retailers taking on new hands to handle the returnables; and

•There was a sharp increase in recycling

of containers, cutting solid waste tonnage by 4 percent and reducing wastes deposited in landfills by 12 percent.

But are the streets and sidewalks cleaner? It depends on how you look at them. Researchers surveyed New Jersey and Pennsylvania, which go no bottle law, and found that in New York there were 70 percent fewer returnable bottles and cans lying around than in the case in Pennsylvania, yet, the difference in total litter was negligible because returnables comprise only 20 percent of all litter.

It is not just the ugliness of the garbage but the indifference of the people who are so indifferent to the sensibilities of the rest of us. Why can't they hold on to a can or bottle until they can properly dispose of them? Why do they throw cans and bottles out of car windows as they ride along?

The New Jersey Legislature is now considering the merits of a state "bottle law" with a 10-percent deposit requirement which if enacted will perhaps have as many objections as those who view the need for it, only because of the thoughtfulness of lazy individuals who display little regard for civic pride... it's too bad.

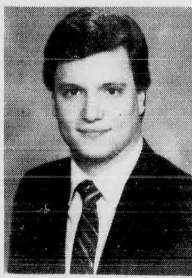

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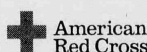
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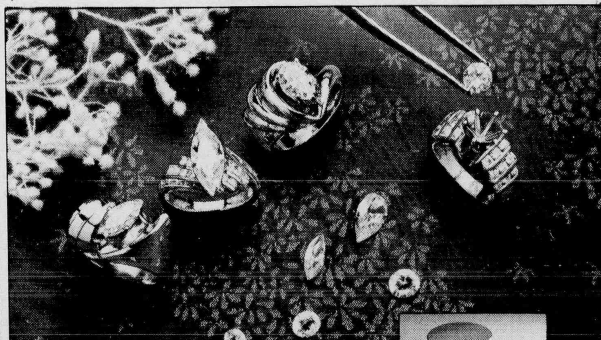

official Essex County tax rate - \$1.08 per hundred, which is a four-point drop below last year's rate of \$1.12. It puts the tax rate at the lowest level since 1967.

George E. McCormack, administrator of the Board of Taxation, certified the rate at the Board of Taxation Office in East Orange for Shapiro, who was joined by Commissioner DiRuggiero and other municipal elected officials.

"The four-point cut in the tax rate is an achievement that will be important to our local Belleville taxpayers," DiRuggiero said.

"This was a particularly tough year to hold the budget down because the county was affected by state and federal cutbacks of \$14 million," Shapiro said. "But we've held the line of cost through a variety of

creative new measures and actually increased services."

This year's tax rate reflects an overall reduction of 25 percent since Shapiro became County Executive in 1978. The County rate was at an all time high - \$1.45 per hundred of equalized value - the year before he took office.

As a means of comparison, Shapiro said if the tax rate had remained at the old high level of \$1.45, county taxpayers would be paying \$62 million more in taxes this year.

The cumulative effect of the 37-point drop in the rate during the seven years of the Shapiro administration totals \$268 million.

Shapiro said a number of innovative measures were key to holding the budget down. These include:

- Implementation of a solution to a 25-year-old liability problem

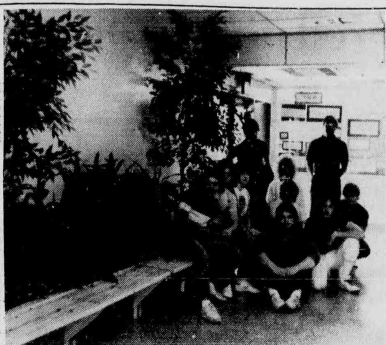
concerning the county pension system that was closed to new members in 1961. The action translated into a savings of \$5 million this year.

• Successful negotiations to reduce the cost of the state health benefits plan for a savings of \$4.2 million. Essex County's decision to fight rate increases also resulted in a savings of millions of dollars for the 900 government jurisdictions, as well as all the retirees, who participate in the state health plan.

• Restructuring and improving management systems in the Welfare Division for a savings of \$2.5 million in the administrative costs of welfare.

• Opening of a central kitchen to prepare meals for all county institutions for a savings of \$1 million a year.

• Implementation of energy improvements for a savings of \$750,000.

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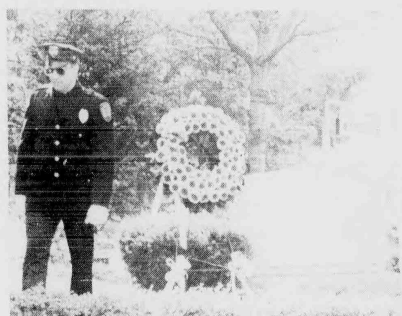

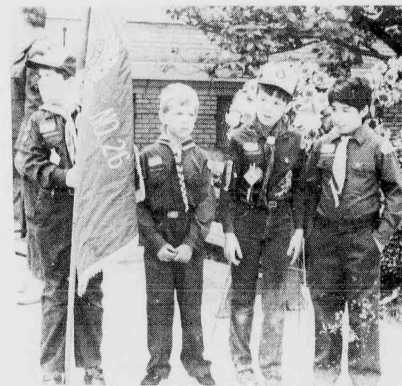

In right field, Sherri Sorrentino has come around very well. The junior has good power at the plate and is doing a very good job in the field. In left field, senior Sue Schuster has been a very steady performer. "She pretty much fills the bill in left as Tillman does at first," Corino said. "She is very consistent and gets the job done."

From 1981-84, the battery for Belleville softball consisted of Dina De Aquino and Buono. Both girls graduated last spring and now, a new battery is beginning to take shape. The pitching is paced by freshman Michelle Calderone and junior Debbie Paterno. Behind the plate is a sophomore, Laura Caruso.

Calderone has been the workhorse of the staff over the last three weeks. "She is our most consistent pitcher now," Corino said. "She gets the ball over the plate and is picking up confidence."

Going back to the state sectional race, Silletti ran a 56.7 in the 400 meter high hurdles, good for fourth place. Senior Robert Hutchinson put the final chapter on his career with a 10:33.9 in the two mile. It was Hutchinson's best time in the event. Chandler ran a personal best in the 400 meters with a time of 52.4. J.R. Di Vincenzo ran a personal best in the 400 meters clocking a 54.5. Joe Speer came through with an 11.4 in the 100 meters, also a personal best. Chandler ran an 11.1

in the 100 meters. Nick Compitanto finished in 59.8 in the 400 low hurdles and Burden ran a 4:51.5 in the mile, just missing his personal best in that event.

With the track season now nearing an end, head coach John Tosato is looking toward the cross country season next September. For those who aren't familiar with the Lyndhurst, please don't think that its like any other truck-stop diner. The entrees prepared here rival those of many fine restaurants. There are over 100 dinner items, which are cooked to order, any time of day or night.

All meals are accompanied by the Diner's superior salad bar. This bountiful selection includes unusual items such as delicious home-made stuffed grape leaves, feta cheese, assorted beans, seafood salad, coleslaw, potato salad, and Italian olive salad, as well as lettuce and fresh vegetables. It's a substantial meal in itself, and can be ordered alone as a main course.

A basket of assorted warm, fresh rolls is placed on the table as soon as the customers arrive.

The selection of entrees is astounding: poultry, beef, veal, many varieties of fish and seafood, pork, Italian specialties, and daily chef's specials are all available.

I sampled the stuffed calamari with spaghetti, and it was delicious! The tomato sauce it was served in was just hot and spicy enough (it is also available with a sweet sauce). The calamari was tender and fresh, and the breadrum stuffing was very flavorful.

My dinner companion tried the reuben sandwich, which was served open-faced. It was piled high with lean corned beef and had a thick cover of melted swiss cheese. My companion, a conossor of reuben sandwiches, pronounced it "great".

On another occasion, we sampled the rice pudding, which was out of this world, and the fresh strawberry cheesecake, which was heavenly. The waitresses and waiter were all very affable, and their service was prompt and cheerful. John Sakellaris, the friendly owner is often on hand to greet diners, and have a chat with them.

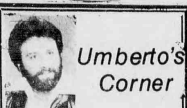
A dirty yellowish callous found on the toes or on the bottom of the foot can possibly be an ulcer. Once removed a hole may appear.

The improvement described in Section 2 of this bond ordinance has heretofore been and is hereby authorized as a general improvement to be made or purchased by the Township of Belleville, Essex County, New Jersey. 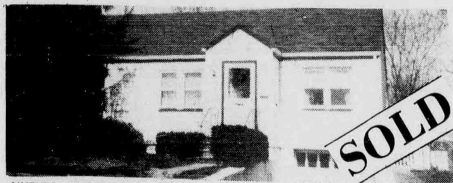
