Blight question remains

The decision has been made, t the question remains. The Belleville Board of Com-The Belleville Board of Com-missioners voted no on the proposal for a blight declaration of Washington Avenue two weeks ago, but they did not rule out blight in the future if they do not see rehabilitation taking

To make sure the cor sioners do not reverse their deci-sion, the Belleville Revitalization Committee has vowed to see that the rehabilitation process "Our group is stronger than ever." Vincent Frantantoni, revitalization chairman, said. "We will be meeting the first and third Mondays of the month to discuss what is happening on the avenue. "The commissioners left the question of blight up in the air," he continued. "The matter is far from resolved." Frantantoni said the commissioners."

from resolved."
Frantantoni said the commissioners' decision does not give the business community on the avenue any direction. He said that the decision seems to be Phase II of an entire process to

change the town.
"We're looking for rehabilitation, not drastic measures," he
said.

said.

If the township commissioners go the route of high-rise buildings, Frantantoni said, the developers will demand more services. He referred to an expansion of the township's water mains and sewer system as an example.

example.
"If they institute a large commercial district on the avenue, traffic will be bumper to bumper," he said. "You need ac-cess roads for high-rise aid. "You need ac-for high-rise

buildings and Belleville doesn't have them. An average high-rise building is three stories, which means it needs 10-14 acres. We don't have the land."

Frantantoni said the revitalization committee agrees with the commissioners' plan

for a new municipal complex. He added that if the school board complex is sold, the committee wants to see the monies used for the town hall project and the land used for development, not for a relocation plan which was proposed by the Belleville Redevelopment Agency.

Elementary dress code in the works

A new dress code for elementary schools was introduced to the Belleville Board of Education at its meeting last week.

The new dress code, as presented by Superintendent of Schools Michael Nardiello, lists five articles of clothing inappropriate for school attire. They are: shorts, mid-riff shirts, studed accessories, unsuitable footwear and garments with pornographic or suggestive messages.

The policy does however.

sages.

The policy does, however, state that only kindergarteners will be allowed to wear shorts. It was that statement that caused some members of the audience to disagree with the policy.

Barbara Cicalese, president of the consolidated parent organization, said that parents want their older children to wear shorts as well. She said that some parents wanted to have a policy where me parents wanted to a policy where

kindergarten through third grade students would be allowed to wear shorts.

"You can't tell a fourth grader he can't wear shorts when his friend who's in third grade can," 'Parents wanted an overall dress code because the policy from school to school was confusing."

Nardiello sald that each elementary school principal decides what is appropriate and inappropriate clothing. Some principals allowed their students to wear shorts and others didn't, he said.

Because of the confusion caused by the varying policies, parents requested that the school board look into the matter. As a result, a dress code committee was formed in January to establish a townshipwide dress code. That committee consisted of four school principals and two

parents from home and school associations.

"Our inspection program is

designed to prevent the loss of life and property that fires can cause." DiRuggiero said. "For that reason, we ask property owners to cooperate with our firefighters in making their properties safer."

Among specific conditions the fire inspectors will be look-ing for the following:

-Location and condition of sinoke detectors.
-Access to and condition of fire
escapes. Fire escapes should not
be blocked by air conditioners.
-Access to and condition of exit
doors. Exit doors should also be
marked clearly.
-Improper wiring.



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

Golden Comments

In many foreign countries littering is a crime bringing fines or arrest. There only criminals do it. In this country, especially in the large city streets, sidewalks and gutters are unsantary landfills. New York, in an effort to tidy things up a bit, on Sept. 12, 1983 imposed a 5 percent surcharge on bottles, cans of soda, beer, ale, mineral water and malt liquor. Refundable on return. Reports now on how the "bottle law" worked out in its first year shows:

law" worked out in its first year shows:

A strong trend away from glass to-plastic containers because unlike bottles and cans, they can be crushed before they are returned to distributors:

Beer prices shot up 18 percent seven times more than the cost of handling the returnables:

New York residents drank 3 percent less soda and 7 percent less beer;

People do return returnables -70 percent of soft drink containers and 86 percent of beer cans and bottles;

There were heavy layoffs in factories manufacturing bottles and cans, lots of new jobs in plastics and among retailers taking on new hands to handle the returnables; and

There was a sharp increase in recycl-

ing of containers, cutting solid waste tonnage by 4 percent and reducing wastes deposited in landfills by 12 percent.

But are the streets and sidewalks cleaner? It depends on how you look at them. Researchers surveyed New Jersey and Pennsylvania, which qs no bottle law, and found that in New York there were 70 percent fewer returnable bottles and cans lying around than is the case in Pennsylvania, yet, the difference in total litter was negligible because returnables comprise only 20 percent of all litter.

nables comprise only 20 percent of all litter.

It is not just the ugliness of the garbage but the indifference of the people who are so indifferent to the sensibilities of the rest of us. Why can't they hold on to a can or bottle until they can properly dispose of them? Why do they throw cans and bottles out of car windows as they ride along?

The New Jersey Legislature is now considering the merits of a state "bottle law" with a 10-percent deposit requirement which if enacted will perhaps have as many objectors as those who view the need for it...only because of the thoughtfulness of lazy individuals who display little regard for civic pride...it's too bad.

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

George E. McCormack, administrator of the Board of Taxation, certified the rate at the Board of Taxation Office in East Orange for Shapiro, who was joined by Commissioner DiRugglero and other municipal elected officials.
"The four-point cut in the tax rate is an achievement that will be important to our local Beleville taxpayers, DiRugglero said.
"This was a particularly tough year to hold the budget down because the county was affected by state and federal cut-backs of \$14 million," Shapiro said. "But we've held the line of cost through a variety of

creative new measures and actually increased services."

This year's tax rate reflects an overall reduction of 25 greent since Shapiro became County rate was at an all time high - \$1.45 per hundred of equalized value - the year before he took office

\$1.45 per hundred of equalized value - the year before he took office.

As a means of comparison, Shapiro said if the tax rate had remained at the old high lel of \$1.45, county taxpayers would be paying \$62 million more in taxes this year.

The cumulative effect of the 37-point drop in the rate during the seven years of the Shapiro administration totals \$268 million.

Shapiro said a number of innovative measures were key to holding the budget down. These include:

concerning the county pension system that was closed to new members in 1961. The action translated into a savings of \$5 million thisyear.
