## BHS band instructors are named

The Belleville Board of Education approved two advisers for the Belleville High School Marching Band at its meeting last week.

Victoria Kohler was approved as marching band drill instructor for 1985-86 and Benedict Grammatico was approved as percussion instructor for 1985-86.

Both appointments are part of a three-phase program developed to improve the Belleville High School Marching Band program.

## Matters in Brief

### No garbage collection July 4

There will be no garbage collection Thursday, July 4, because of the holiday.

### Board grants leaves of absence

The Belleville Board of Education approved leaves of absence to two elementary school teachers at its meeting last week.

Leaves of absence were granted to Mary Bradley, School 3 teacher, and Jane Palumbo, School 7 teacher. Bradley has been a teacher in the school system since 1967. Palumbo has taught here since 1971.

### Legislation increases eligibility

Legislation which will raise income eligibility standards for the state's Pharmaceutical Assistance to the Aged Program (PAAD) cleared the State Senate and awaits Gov. Thomas Kean's signature, Senate President Carmen A. Orechio, said.

The bill increases income limits for PAAD program participants from \$12,000 to \$13,250 for individuals and from \$15,000 to \$16,250 for couples.

It also restores retroactive eligibility to persons who became ineligible due to the social security cost of living increase granted Jan. 1, 1985.

### Board tables vote for School 9 post

The Belleville Board of Education tabled a resolution at its meeting last week which would create a dual administrative post at School 9.

A resolution which would create a position of assistant superintendent of elementary education in conjunction with the School 9 principalship was introduced by Superintendent of Schools Michael Nardiello.

The School 9 post was vacated by retiring principal Joseph Grosch.

### Business Finance Day is July 2

A Belleville Business Finance Day will be conducted Tuesday, July 2, at Town Hall on Washington Avenue.

Business Day will provide the Belleville business community the opportunity to meet individually with staff members of the Economic Development Corporation of Essex County (EDC) on an appointment basis to discuss any business matter, ranging from starting a new business to below market interest rate financing for a wide range of improvements.

All appointments for Business Finance Day are to be scheduled through the Town Hall by calling 450-3314.

### County program offers job training

Applications are now being accepted from out-of-school county youth and college students ages 16 to 21 for the Essex County summer youth employment training program.

## State appropriates \$300,000

# Police need new facility

The Belleville Police Department will get some added necessities with its new police facility if a \$300,000 state supplemental budget appropriation receives Gov. Thomas Kean's approval.

The appropriation, introduced by the Legislature's Joint Appropriations Committee, was announced by Assemblyman Stephen Aduabato Jr., (D-Essex) last Wednesday at police headquarters.

"Legislators always seem to respond to things not initiated as a positive thing," Assemblyman Aduabato said. "Belleville has suffered enough crises. We want to show the absurdity of the situation in which the (Belleville) police have to function. This is a legitimate project to help the community."

Aduabato said that the commissioners' approval of a \$10-million bond ordinance for a municipal complex signifies that Belleville is moving forward.

"The state is merely helping Belleville to help itself," Aduabato said. "This building is in the area of town that is being revitalized."

"The police station is, at

best, inadequate," Aduabato continued. "Being a police officer is a job with an incredible amount of stress. Working in these cramped conditions in the basement of town hall, with small interrogation rooms, office space and work space, has to have an effect on job performance."

Commissioner of Public Safety Ralph DiRuggiero said that the monies, if approved, would be earmarked for equipment such as a communications system, lockers or a new central police desk.

"We want to be able to add special things to this department," DiRuggiero said as he led a tour through the department. "We want to make our house a home."

The police department, which employs 84 men, is housed in a seven-room facility in town hall. Four police captains share an office which is also a filing room for dog licenses, DiRuggiero said. Another office, not much bigger than the first, is occupied by three deputy chiefs who share two desks.

Deputy Chief James Mundy also explained the lack of space needed to process and hold

prisoners.

"If three or four men (prisoners) are here at once," Deputy Chief Mundy said, "we have to separate them. You can't interrogate someone when the other guy is listening. We also face a problem when we have to separate the men and the women."

"A lot of problems that arise are caused by the conditions,"

Mundy continued.

Commissioner DiRuggiero also said the monies would be used to offset construction costs of a new police facility. The police facility is only part of a \$9.5 bond ordinance approved by commissioners for the construction of a new municipal complex. The new complex will house all township departments, the police station and possibly the board of education.

## 'Gift of Life' child returns home

The chance of survival for a 5-and-a-half-year-old Korean boy were minimal three months ago. Today, however, through the efforts of the Belleville Rotary Club, In Woo Jon will live a normal and healthy life.

In Woo Jon, who was suffering from a congenital heart defect, came to the United States three months ago in desperate need of surgery. That surgery, which was performed by Rotary Club member Dr. Joseph Amato at Children's Hospital in Newark on April 15, was partially funded by the Belleville Rotary Club through its Gift of Life Program. The club contributed \$3,500 to In Woo's medical costs.

In Woo Jon, who returned to Korea this past Thursday, was one of four Korean children who arrived at John F. Kennedy Airport on April 7 through the efforts of the International Rotary Club. The other children, two boys and one girl, were the guests of Korean-American families in Dover, Fairfield and Madison, Rene Gabba, Gift of Life chairman, said. In Woo was the guest of the Pak Family of Academy Street during his stay. Belleville was chosen as a host community because of its

proximity to the hospital, Gabba said. In Woo, who was considered a "blue boy," underwent surgery which connected an artery from his heart to his lungs. His stay in the hospital lasted two-and-a-half weeks. The remaining time was spent at the home of Mrs. Mary Pak.

Pak, a native of Korea, came to the United States almost 10 years ago. The Pak family, which consists of four children, was chosen so that In Woo's stay would be more comfortable.

During his stay here, In Woo went to a circus at Madison Square with Gabba and his grandchildren and enjoyed a family picnic at the home of Gabba's son.

"We didn't speak the same language, but we got along just fine," Gabba said. "He was very happy to go home. We will miss him very much."

Gabba said the Rotary Club will participate in the Gift of Life Program as long as funding is available. This year's funding was made possible through fund-raising events, donations from members and a donation from Rotary's corresponding club in Japan.

Joel Dalva of Plantation, Fla., has been appointed vice president of finance at Clara Maass Medical Center in Belleville.

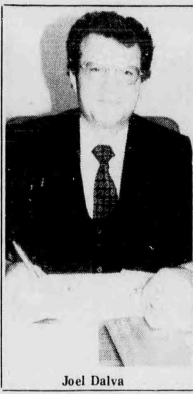
As chief financial officer, Dalva will be responsible for all financial areas of the Medical Center along with purchasing.

# Anna Rosa Mazur displays fan collection in library exhibit

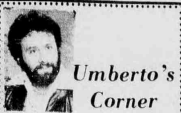

## The Kevin Kennedy Matter

A "Letter to the Editor," whose alleged author claimed his name was forged, and an advertisement on the subject which appeared in last week's issue of the Belleville Times with a "No Name" author, pointed up a weakness in our procedures.

Controversial "Letters to the Editor" attacking an individual or individuals are customarily checked out to insure that the signature of the author is legitimate. It is our management policy not to accept advertisements from sources that refuse to be publicly identified. Unfortunately, both events occurred — and fortunately without any lasting damage.

However, there is a story behind the episodes. It involves the possibility of forged signatures on documents filed with the Town Clerk. The incident involves the possibility of a criminal act. Rumors are abundant alleging forgeries on petitions filed with the Town Clerk.

To put a stop to these rumors, the Essex County Prosecutor should be invited to review the problem — and if necessary, conduct a complete investigation. Let the chips fall where they may.

Names of important and valuable civic leaders and public servants have been bandied about.

Kevin Kennedy, a civic activist has been made a target of some criticism. He visits Town Hall and spends time in the Town Clerk's office. Big deal. The Town Clerk is a public office where anybody has a right to be. If the persons interfere with the work of municipal employees, there are methods to end the visit. Kennedy has demonstrated over the years an interest in every level of government. A decent young man, some people find him a joy to be around. Maybe, he should be signed up as a volunteer municipal worker and thus end the debate over whether or not he should have a right to be in Town Hall.

Meanwhile, on to the bigger question — was there a crime committed when documents were filed with the Town Clerk? Probably, the County Prosecutor could answer the question.

### TWA Flight 847

The prayers of people around the world have been answered. The hostages of TWA Flight 847 are free! The successful end to the hostage nightmare must be attributed to the quality of leadership provided by President Ronald Reagan. He was tough when he had to be tough. He was conciliatory when that type of behavior was required. In the end, it is apparent that Syria took seriously the tough talk of President Reagan and decided that her national self-interest was at stake — and that the hostages had to be released to prevent possible military action in Lebanon by U.S. forces.

The record is clear — Mideast leaders have respect for military strength — and nothing else. Time and again, they have demonstrated they have no respect for life or Western world values.

Should we now seek retribution?

Retribution in the literal sense should not be our objective — President Reagan should demand a meeting with the UN Security Council be convened for the purpose of establishing international procedures for the punishment of terrorist involvement in taking hostages, kidnappings and similar crimes. Any person involved in that type of crime should be considered a war criminal. Persons who can be identified with such acts should be tried by a jury in a court of justice by the aggrieved country. If found guilty of murder, the death sentence should be mandated — and the country of refuge harboring the perpetrator should be obliged to surrender the guilty person to the appropriate authorities.

Pre-emptive strikes against terrorist training camps should be undertaken after the return of the seven hostages held in Lebanon. The Beirut Airport should be rendered useless.

Those of us who have lived through this unfolding drama of the last forty-eight hours will never forget the experience, but we should always remember the 23 year old boy who was brutally assaulted and murdered aboard TWA Flight 847 by two Lebanese who should be made to face a death squad. The acts of the hostages through the terrible crisis that has marred their lives fill us with great national pride. The conduct of President Reagan gives great comfort and makes us proud to be an American. Above all, and in the end — God answered our prayers. But our praying should not end. We have seven more Americans held hostage in Lebanon and their welfare should not be forgotten.

## Budget cuts affect township

To the editor:

A Joint Committee of Congress is right now debating the final figures for a federal budget cut. It is expected the committee (made up of Republicans and Democrats from the Senate and the House) will present the Reagan Administration with budget cuts of at least \$50 billion this year and as much as \$200 billion over the next three years. Final budget cuts or "freezes" might result in even more billions unavailable for state and local social and infrastructure programs.

At this point, we are uncertain exactly the amount specific programs will be reduced — except, apparently, in one area: federal general revenue sharing. So far, the elimination or phasing out of this multi-billion revenue gain for municipalities, including those in this district I represent (30th), is the only budget cut agreed to by all participants in the joint committee.

As I have done on other occasions in my tenure in the State Assembly, I must again alert local taxpayers of this potential severe jolt. Our municipalities have expected and used general revenue sharing, and the local property taxpayers have benefited. If, to be sure, this program is cut out, each municipality will have to get the funds from the state... or tax local property owners at a higher rate... or cut many services.

Meanwhile, down in Trenton, it appears many of my fellow colleagues as well as many candidates for office, continue to promise more and more spending, more and more services. Just because we have near billion-dollar state budget surplus some of my colleagues I must say, are proposing and voting for new spending as if there will be no rainy days tomorrow and the days after. I abhor this kind of politics.

I alert the 30th District taxpayers to this problem and I urge them to support me in trying to restrain spending in Trenton on nonessential programs. I say the budget surplus should be retained in part to make up for the federal cuts and to pay for infrastructure needs, like water supply system improvements. If any of the surplus is to be distributed otherwise, it should come back to those who paid the taxes in the first place.

## Golden Comments

People using cordless telephones should be careful what they say. Ham radio operators can hear everything that is being said within miles; often being able to use the information from their eavesdropping for unsavory tactics such as blackmail or learning when people plan a vacation to burglarize a house.

Shortwave radios it appears can intercept signals from cordless phones from a 5-mile distance. With about nine million cordless telephones in use throughout the country the public should be told about the potential danger that could result from careless "loose" talk "picked up" from a cordless phone.

A trained shortwave operator in a small town could figure out the identity of callers by checking the strength of the signal.

Manufacturers are taking steps to modify their telephones to limit the distance from which the signals can be picked up, but these newer models cost more than \$200 — about four times more than the early models. Moreover, while the extent of the signal is limited, there is no way to completely prevent the interception of cordless phones; they're just like a walkie-talkie.

If you use a cordless phone don't use your access number to a phone company or bank because anyone listening could use the access number to make free phone calls or credit card purchases that you'd be charged for. So if you use one be careful what you say.

While on the subject of telephones we find that a coalition of highway safety groups, legislators, consumer protection organizations and insurance companies are calling the cellular car phones "an accident waiting to happen."

The Institute of Research and Public Safety five-year study is cited by the American Automobile Association in saying that 25 percent of all accidents are caused by driver inattention. That means that a driver traveling at the maximum speed limit, who dials a number for 12 seconds, will be distracted for a fifth of a mile. The AAA says that in a typical urban area, there are 200 different situations in each mile drive that require some sort of driver attention.

The National Safety Council insists that the "only way" to maintain absolute control of a car is to have both hands on the wheel. But most mobile telephones require the use of one hand to hold the handset, and the other to dial.

The car phones manufacturers brochures issue safety messages to customers warning them to drive with both hands, yet, often their ads show drivers talking on the telephone with one hand on the wheel.

An article in Teleconnect entitled "Dialing and Driving Don't Mix" points out that many ads for car phones show the microphone on the left or right sides of the sun visor, which requires the driver to turn his head when talking, although the optimum position is straight ahead.

A California company has devoted itself to marketing of dashboard mounted key pads and a visor mounted microphone that leaves both hands free, however, this costs around \$250 added to the cost of the cellular telephone hook-in.

Safety advocates warn drivers to pull to the side of the road and stop while dialing when using their car phone.

Eventually, legislators may require hands-free or voice activated car phones in promoting highway safety. That appears to be the trend of the future.

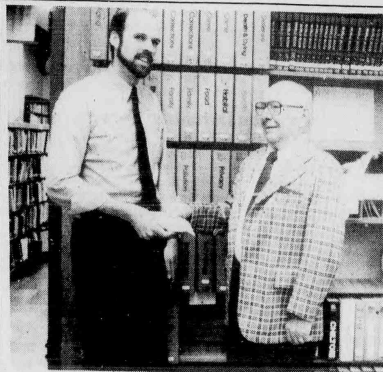

## Your sex may determine how illness is viewed

Whether a person is a man or a woman may very well make a difference in the kind of help he or she gets in case of a psychological illness such as a depression or a psychosomatic illness such as high blood pressure, an ulcer or sexual dysfunction.

Let us take this illustration. A man comes into a doctor's office and complains of the following: He is feeling "blue" or "down" a good deal of the time. He is sleeping poorly and doesn't have much appetite. He is weary and without energy from the time he gets up in the morning. He can't get up much interest in going out with his wife, the children, friends. He can't concentrate at the office.

These are some of the classic presenting symptoms of depression. But depression is often a psychological rather than a physical illness, and there is still considerable prejudice - even among physicians - about someone having a psychological illness. To many people, psychological illnesses still mean that "there is something wrong with a person's mind," also that it indicates "a weakness in character and personality" - prejudices which are absurd.

Hence, when a man comes in with the symptoms of depression, the doctor - especially if it is a male doctor - may be disinclined to see it for what it probably is: an emotional illness. He is much more likely to see it as being a case of "overwork," of "too much pressure on the job," and to prescribe an energizing drug and recommend to the man that he "take it easy for a while," or take a vacation, or even change his job. This course of action, while positive and helpful, may only be superficial and may not deal with the basic depression and the emotional factors which are producing it.

In most cases, the male patient may himself be "setting up" the misconception. People who are depressed - whether they be male or female - generally have a feeling of helplessness, failure, defeat, despair. Such feelings are not however consistent with the male image of being strong, in charge, in command. Hence,

men are less likely to recognize that this is what they are feeling, and even if they do recognize it, less likely to be able or willing to express it and communicate it. It is "too emotional" and "men aren't supposed to be emotional."

Even when he is having severe physical symptoms, a man is likely to see them purely as that and to reject the idea that they may have something to do with an underlying psychological difficulty. Hence, when he comes to the doctor, he will be likely to talk only about backaches, or stomach disorders, or dizziness - or whatever the case may be - and ask the doctor to prescribe something for that condition, not even letting on that he is also feeling miserable, unhappy, agitated, anxious, depressed - symptoms which could give the doctor a clue that there is also an emotional problem there.

With women patients, it is different. To start with, male doctors, acceding to the stereotype, are more apt to see a woman as being weaker, more helpless, more emotional, more likely to have psychological problems. Hence when a woman comes in with symptoms of depression, the doctor is more likely to perceive "depression" rather than "pressure" or "overwork" and to refer her to a psychiatrist for further evaluation.

The woman may herself make it easier for the doctor to come to this conclusion. She will likely be weeping. She will communicate her feelings of melancholy, helplessness, defeat and despair. That, together with the other symptoms she reports, will produce a picture the doctor will easily recognize as depression, and incline him to proceed accordingly.

Further, women are more likely to recognize that what they have is a psychological problem and to seek help at a mental health clinic or from a private psychiatrist right off without first going to a physician. Men, on the other hand, are more likely to reject the idea that they might need psychotherapy and psychiatric help and take themselves to a physician instead.

Ruffalo, competing in the javelin, shot put and discus, took two gold medals and a silver for his effort. Ruffalo won the javelin with a throw of 45.25 meters and won the discus on his final throw of 30.68 meters. In between, he was second in the shot put, with a throw of 11.06 meters.

The former track coach at Belleville High also took honors in the swimming competition, with two silver medals. He took a silver in the 400 meters for his age group and won a bronze medal for the gold ball competition.

"It was an exhausting week," Ruffalo said last weekend. "It

was a good week for us, though. I was selected to compete in the Canadian Games in mid August, representing the U.S.A. team. David (De Notaris) did a tremendous job. He has 22 national records in weight lifting. He has set those records as a teenager against athletes that are much older than he."

Ruffalo was also asked to take part in the coaching staff, but the 33 year old Bloomfield native has opted to hold that offer for a while. "I'd rather compete at this stage, the coaching can wait for the future."

De Notaris set three more records in the Nationals. In the squat, he cleared 253.2 pounds, breaking the old mark by five pounds. In the bench press, he cleared 192.5, breaking the old mark by six pounds. In the dead lift, De Notaris finished at 314 pounds, which was a national record until it was surpassed later in the competition.

De Notaris also excelled in the wrestling category, winning a silver medal. He pinned his first two opponents then lost in the final by a 19-16 count. "He had his opponent on his back in the final seconds," recalled Ruffalo of De Notaris' wrestling. "The horn went off just as David had him pinned. It was that close."

De Notaris finished the day with a bronze medal in the mens pentathlon and a bronze in the

gold ball competition.

Joe Ruffalo, the older brother of Rich, won four bronze medals in the masters competition. He took the bronze in the 400 meters, the 50 meter free style swimming, the discus and shot put.

Overall, the three athletes brought home 16 medals not bad for a weeks work. For Rich Ruffalo, the next step is the Canadian Nationals in August. Ruffalo currently holds the world record in the javelin and has eight national records to his credit.

Because of the rush to get the applications in on time, the schedules are not yet printed.

## Spring sports teams have bright futures

Continuing our wrap up of the 1984-85 sports season at Belleville High, we look back at the just completed spring season, a campaign that gave our fans a great deal to be proud of.

The spring season, as usual, was loaded with excitement. Our baseball, softball, crew and golf teams all attained outstanding records while the track and tennis teams gave some good individual performances.

The baseball team, under the leadership of Ralph La Conte, posted an 18-2 mark, the best at Belleville High since the 22-7 mark of 1981 that included a GNT championship. Since La Conte took over in the spring of 1983, the team has showed a marvelous turnaround. In that initial season, the Bucs were 8-17-1 with a very young and inexperienced club. La Conte expected to take his lumps in that initial season, but felt his club would be okay for the long run with youngsters such as Dean Sternik, Joe Mullaney and Tom Reid. Last season, the Bucs did turn it around, finishing 16-2, good for second place in the NNJIL revamped conference. The Bucs, who were dead last in the NNJIL in '83, lost out only to Ridgewood, who lost just once in the conference, that coming to Belleville.

This season, La Conte's team was picked to be one of the best in Essex County and the boys did not disappoint. Showing a solid offense and timely pitching, the Bucs finished in a tie for the NNJIL title with Bloomfield, a team that Belleville had split with in two games this season.

The Bucs were led by Mullaney, Sternik, Dave Long, a junior, John Auriemma, also a junior, Jim Caponi,

Allan Ruopp and Steve Mulhearn. Belleville advanced to the quarterfinal round of the GNT, losing to Caldwell, then made it to the state sectional semi finals before bowing to eventual sectional champ, Elizabeth, 22-5.

Despite the tough loss to Elizabeth, Belleville had a great deal to look back on and La Conte is quite optimistic about next season. The Bucs return a solid nucleus, headed by pitcher Jim Murphy (sophomore, 7-1 on the season). Belleville's jayvee team, under the direction of Nick Grande, and the freshman team, under Danny Borgo, also posted outstanding records of 17-9-1 and 16-4 respectively. In three years, La Conte has done a very good job of bringing back Belleville baseball to the forefront of county play.

The softball team, led by coach Carl Corino, was supposedly in the stage of rebuilding. Gone were Dina De Aquino and Tracy Buono, the All World battery of the past four years. Belleville regrouped, however, with catcher Laura Caruso and pitchers Debbie Patierno and freshman Michele Calderone. Also returning was senior all everything Donna Brooks, perhaps the best female athlete ever to don a Belleville uniform. Brooks had just completed another standout basketball and volleyball campaign and now dedicated herself to one last swing at the softball.

Brooks was the catalyst to an exciting Belleville team that captured 24 wins and made it to the county finals for the fourth straight season, fifth time over the last six years. In the county finals, Belleville was upset by

Livingston, 4-3, but did not take away from the fine season turned in by the Lady Bucs. Belleville came back in state play to stun Union, a perennial power, in the sectional semis, but lost to Westfield, 3-0 in the finals.

Like baseball, the softball team also appears solid for the next few seasons. Calderone and Patierno return next season, as does shortstop Desiree Johansen, one of the most sure handed fielders in the county. The team loses an all star in Brooks, but returns Nick Tramulata at third base and Sherri Sorrentino in right field. Caruso, a sophomore, will be solid behind the plate for the next two years.

Senior Cheryl Marion was graduated from Belleville High last week and a few words should be directed to her. Marion was a team hit the headlines every week, but always turned in a solid effort, whether it be basketball or softball. In basketball, Marion hit the big basket in the 1984 county semi finals when Belleville upset Irvington. In softball, she was an excellent defensive second baseman. Certainly good luck goes to Marion in her future endeavors.

The crew team, under the direction of Sam Giuffrida, made headlines once again, by winning another national title in the girls senior four shell. It was the third national title in four years for the girls and Giuffrida admits that repeating a performance like that will be difficult, to say the least. The coach was thrilled with the performance of his entire team. The Bucs won back the Goodwill Regatta in 1985 after losing the team trophy to

Kearny last spring. Belleville also showed strong efforts in the Manny Flick races in Philadelphia and the always prestigious Stobersbury Regatta, also in Philly. Giuffrida expects another solid season in 1986, with the boys team to lead the way. The boys junior four was tremendous this season and should be a top contender next spring.

In the area of golf, Rocco Colucci's team posted a 10-9 mark, but won the matches it had to. The Bucs took a share of the conference title with arch rival Nutley, beating the Maroon and Clifton in a tri match to capture a share of the title. Brian De Furia, Greg Simone and a host of underclassmen led the way this spring for the golf team. Colucci, who has led the team to previous marks of 8-2, 9-4, 11-5 and 10-5 before this seasons championship, did not expect this type of campaign from his team. He figured it would be a rebuilding season, but the Bucs proved him wrong.

In track, John Tosato's team won just once, but featured some strong performances. Senior Mike Silletti and junior Willie Chandler led the way in team scoring. Sophomore Craig Burden was consistent in the middle distances and William Huamani and Robert Hutchinson, both seniors, excelled in the longer distances. Junior Nick Compitiano was also excellent in the sprints and hurdles and should be a big addition to next years team.

The tennis team, under Len D'Armento, worked under a rebuilding cast, after losing a number of talented seniors to graduation last spring. With such a young team, the Buc tennis program should be on an upswing for



the 1986 season.

That's just a small look back on the past ten months of activity in BHS sports. It was another banner season with conference titles and individual accomplishments leading the way. Thanks to all who made the year possible and now, the focus will soon be on the 1985-86 school year, which believe it or not, is just nine weeks away.

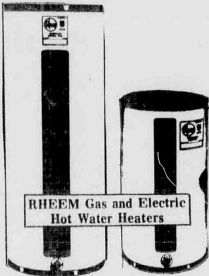

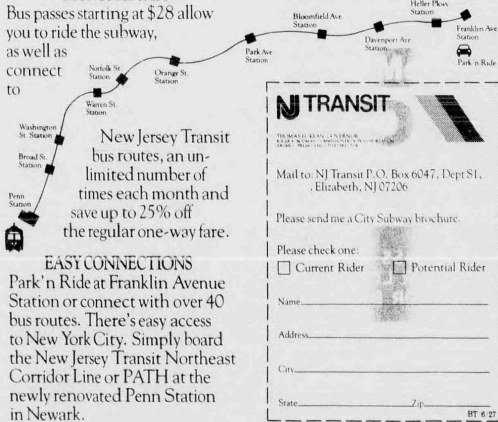

# Essex County Sheriff D'Alessio accepts award from U.S. Department of Justice

Essex County Sheriff Thomas J. D'Alessio has been honored by the United States Department of Justice for his office's participation in the most successful mass round-up of fugitive felons in law enforcement history.

Eugene Liss, State Marshall for the district of New Jersey of the United States Marshals' Service, presented an award to D'Alessio at a meeting of the Essex County Board of Freeholders. According to Liss, the Essex County sheriff was being honored for his "outstanding efforts in the furtherance of joint law enforcement cooperation, understanding and success."

The award stems from the participation of the Essex County Sheriff's Office in "Operation Fist," which combined men of the United States Marshals Service with officers from state, county and local law enforcement agencies. Working in undercover teams, the officers arrested over 3,000 of the most wanted fugitive felons in an eight state area.

Sergeant Anthony Patuto and

Detective Keith Cummings of the Sheriff's Office worked with federal marshals as part of "Fist" (Fugitive Investigative Strike Teams) undercover teams in Essex County.

Various "Stings" were used to flush out and apprehend the targeted fugitives. Letters were sent announcing that the fugitive had won a valuable lottery prize that had to be picked up in person. Another sting was the creation of the imaginary "Fist Construction Company" which specialized in hiring people who had been in trouble with the law. Prospective employees showed up for interviews and walked right into "Operation Fist."

Liss stated that his office wished to recognize Sheriff D'Alessio and the Essex County Sheriff's Office for their assistance in both "Operation Fist" and for the active help that the Sheriff's Office provides to the United States Marshals Service on an on-going daily basis. This award points out what can be accomplished when law enforcement agencies work

together," said Liss. He also pointed out that the "Fist" Operation in Essex County was the most successful of the many such operations undertaken throughout the country.

D'Alessio said that he accepted the award as recognition of the dedication and hard work of the men and women of the Essex County Sheriff's Office.

Freeholder President Jerome D. Greco added his congratulations to D'Alessio and said that the entire Board of Freeholders stood "100 percent" behind the Sheriff's Office and their efforts in law enforcement. According to Greco, the Essex County Sheriff's Office was an example of "taxpayers dollars well spent."

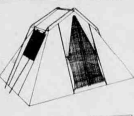

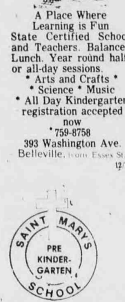
