Legislation increases eligibility

Legislation which will raise income eligibility standards for the state's Pharmaceutical Assistance to the Aged Program (PAAD) cleared the State Senate and awaits Gov. Thomas Kean's signature, Senate President Carmen A. Orechio, said.

The bill increases income limits for PAAD program participants from \$12,000 to \$13,250 for individuals and from \$15,000 to \$16,250 for couples.

It also restores retroactive eligibility to persons who became incligible due to the social security cost of living increase granted Jan. 1, 1985.

Board tables vote for School 9 post

State appropriates \$300,000

Police need new facility

The Belleville Police Department will get some added necessities with its new police facility if a \$300,000 state supplemental budget appropriation receives Gov. Thomas Kean's approval.

The appropriation receives Joint Appropriation introduced by the Legislature's Joint Appropriations Committee, was announced by Assemblyman Stephen Adubato Jr., (D-Essex) last Wednesday at police headquarters.

"Legislators always seem to respond to things not initiated as a positive thing," Assemblyman Adubato said. "Belleville has suffered enough crises. We want to show the absurdity of the situation in which the (Belleville) police have to function. This is a legitimate project to help the community."

Adubato said that the commissioners' approval of a \$10-million bond ordinance for a municipal complex signifies that Belleville is moving forward. "The state is merely helping Belleville to help itself."

Adubato said. "This building is in the area of town that is being revitalized.

"The police station is, at

best, inadequate," Adubato continued. "Being a police officer is a job with an incredible amount of stress. Working in these cramped conditions in the basement of town hall, with small interrogation rooms, office space and work space, has to have an effect on job performance." Commissioner of Public Safety Ralph DiRuggiero said that the monies, if approved, would be earmarked for equipment such as a communications system, lockers or a new central

would be earmarked for equipment such as a communications system, lockers or a new central police desk.

"We want to be able to add special things to this department," DiRugglero said as he led a tour through the department. "We want to make our house a home."

The police department, which employs 84 men, is housed in a seven-room facility in town hall. Four police captains share an office which is also a fling room for dog licenses, DiRugglero said. Another office, not much bigger than the first, is occupied by three deputy chiefs who share two deeks.

Deputy Chief James Mundy also explained the lack of space needed to process and hold

prisoners.
"If three or four men (prisoners) are here at once,"
Deputy Chief Mundy said, "we have to separate them. You can't interrogate someone when the other guy is listening. We also face a problem when we have to separate the men and the women.

also said the monies would be
used to offset construction costs

'Gift of Life' child returns home

The chance of survival for a 5-and-a-half-year-old Korean boy were minimal three months ago. Today, however, through the efforts of the Belleville Rotary Club, In Woo Jon will live a normal and healthy life.

In Woo Jon, who was suffering from a congenital heart defect, came to the United States three months ago in desperate need of surgery. That surgery, which was performed by Rotary Club member Dr. Joseph Amato at Children's Hospital in Newark on April 15, was partially funded by the Belleville Rotary Club through its Gift of Life Program. The club contributed \$3,500 to In Woo's medical costs.

In Woo Jon, who returned to Korea this past Thursday, was one of four Korean children who arrived at John F. Kennedy Airport on April 7 through the efforts of the International Rotary Club. The other children, two boys and one girl, were the guests of Korean-American families in Dover, Fairfield and Madison, Rene Gabbai, Gift of Life chairman, said. In Woo was the guest of the Pak Family of Academy Street during his stay.

Belleville was chosen as a host community because of its

proximity to the hospital, Gabbai said. In Woo, who was considered a "blue boy," underwent surgery which connected an artery from his heart to his lungs. His stay in the hospital lasted two-and-half weeks. The remaining time was spent at the home of Mrs. Mary Pak, a native of Korea, came to the United States almost 10 years ago. The Pak family, which consists of four children, was chosen so that In Woo's stay would be more comfortable.

During his stay here, In Woo went to a circus at Madison Square with Gabbai and his grandchildren and enjoyed a family picnic at the home of Gabbai's son.

"We didn't speak the same

Gabbai's son.

"We didn't speak the same language, but we got along just fine," Gabbai said. "He was very happy to go home. We will miss him very much."

Gabbai said the Rotary Club will participate in the Gift of Life Program as long as funding is available. This year's funding was made possible through fundraising events, donations from members and a donation from Rotary's corresponding club in Japan.





The Kevin **Kennedy Matter**

A "Letter to the Editor," whose alleged author claimed his name was forged, and an advertisement on the subject which appeared in last week's issue of the Belleville Times with a "No Name" author, pointed up a weakness in our procedures.

Controversial "Letters to the Editor" attacking an individual or individuals are customarily checked out to insure that the signature of the author is legitimate. It is our management policy not to accept advertisements from sources that refuse to be publicationally and the signature of the author is legitimate. sources that refuse to be publicly identified. Unfortunately, both events occurred — and fortunately without any lasting

tunately without any lasting damage.

However, there is a story behind the episodes. It involves the possibility of forged signatures on documents filed with the Town Clerk. The incident involves the possibility of a criminal act. Rumors are abundant allering forgeries on paties. dant alleging forgeries on peti-tions filed with the Town Clerk.

To put a stop to these rumors, the Essex County Prosecutor should be invited to review the problem — and if necessary, conduct a complete investigation. Let the chips fall where they may.

Kevin Kennedy, a civic activist has been made a target of some criticism. He visits Town Hall and spends time in the Town Clerk's office. Big deal. The Town Clerk is a public office where anybody has a right to be. If the persons interfere with the work of municipal employees, there are methods to end the visit. Kennedy has to end the visit. Kennedy has demonstrated over the years an interest in every level of government. A decent young man, some people find him a joy to be around. Maybe, he should be signed up as a volunteer municipal worker and thus end the debate over whether or not he should have a right to be in Town Hall.

Meanwhile, on to the bigger question — was there a crime committed when documents were filed with the Town Clerk? Probably, the County Prosecutor could answer the question.

TWA Flight 847

The prayers of people around the world have been answered. The hostages of TWA Flight 847 are free! The successful end to the hostage nightmare must be attributed to the quality of leadership provided by President Ronald Reagan. by President Honald Heagan. He was tough when he had to be tough. He was conciliatory when that type of behavior was required. In the end, it is apparent that Syria took seriously the tough talk of President Reagan and decided that her national self-interest was at stake — and that the hostages had to be released to prevent possible military action in Lebanon by U.S. forces.

The record is clear — Mideast leaders have respect for military strength — and nothing else. Time and again, they have demonstrated they have more spect for life or Western world values.

Should we now seek retribution?

Retribution in the literal serves should not be our object. He was tough when he had to be

Retribution in the literal sense should not be our objective — President Reagan should tive — President Reagan should demand a meeting with the UN Security Council be convened for the purpose of establishing international procedures for the punishment of terrorist involvement in taking hostages, kidnappings and similar crimes. Any person involved in that type of crime should be considered a war criminal. Persons who can be identified with such acts should be tried by a jury in a court of justice by the aggrieved country. If found guilty of murder, the death sentence should be mandated and the country of refuge har-boring the perpetrator should be obliged to surrender the guilty person to the appropriate authorities.

Pre-emptive strikes against terrorist training camps should be undertaken after the return of the seven hostages held in Lebanon. The Beirut Airport

Those of us who have lived through this unfolding drama of the last forty-eight hours will never forget the experience, but we should always remember the 23 year old boy who was brutally assaulted and murdered aboard TWA Flight 847 by two Lebanese who should be made to face a death squad. The acts of the hostages through the terrible crisis that has marred their lives fill us with great national pride. The conduct of President Reagan gives great comfort and makes gives great comfort and makes us proud to be an American. Above all, and in the end — God Above all, and in the end — God answered our prayers. But our praying should not end. We have seven more Americans held hostage in Lebanon and their welfare should not be forgotten.

A Joint Committee of Congress is right now debating the final figures for a federal budget cut. It is expected the committee (made up of Republicans and Democrats from the Senate and the House) will present the Reagan Administration with budget cuts of at least \$50 billion this year and as much as \$200 billion over the next three years. Final budget cuts—or "freezes" — might result in even more billions unavailable for state and local social and infrastructure programs.

Meanwhile, down in Trenton, it appears many of my fellow colleagues as well as many candidates for office, continue to promise more and more spending, more and more services. Just because we have near billion-dollar state budget surplus some of my colleagues. I must say, are proposing and voting for new spending as if there will be no rainy days tomorrow and the days after. I abhor this kind of politics.

People using cordless telephones should be careful what they say. Ham radio operators can hear everything that is being said within miles; often being able to use the information from their eavesdropping for unsavory tactics such as blackmail or learning when people plan a vacation to burglarize a house.

Shortwave radios it appears can intercept signals from cordless phones from a 5-mile distance. With about nine million cordless telephones in use throughout the country the public should be told about the potential danger that could result from careless "loose" talk "picked up" from a cordless phone.

A trained shortwave operator in a small town could figure out the identity of callers by checking the strength of the signal.

Manufacturers are taking steps to modify their telephones to limit the distance from which the signals can be picked up, but these newer models cost more than \$200 - about four times more than the early models. Moreover, while the extent of the signal is limited, there is no way to completely prevent the interception of cordless phones; they're just like a walkie-talkie.

If you use a cordless phone don't use your access number to a phone company or bank because anyone listening could use the access number to make free phone calls or credit card purchases that you'd be charged for. So if you use one be careful what you say.

While on the subject of telephones we find that a coalition of highway safety groups, legislators, consumer protection organizations and insurance companies are calling the cellular car phones "an accident waiting to happen."
The Institute of Research and

Public Safety five-year study is cited by the American Automobile Association in saying that 25 percent of all accidents are caused by driver inattention. That means that a driver traveling at the maximum speed limit, who dials a number for 12 seconds, will be distracted for a fifth of a mile. The AAA says that in a typical urban area, there are 200 different situations in each mile drive that require some sort of driver attention.

The National Safety Council insists that the "only way" to maintain absolute control of a car is to have both hands on the wheel. But most mobile telephones require the use of one hand to hold the handset, and the other to dial.

The car shoppes manufacturers.

telephones require the use of one hand to hold the handset, and the other to dial.

The car phones manufacturers brochures issue safety messages to customers warning them to drive with both hands, yet, often their ads show drivers talking on the telephone with one hand on the wheel.

An article in Teleconnect entitled "Dialing and Driving Don't Mix" points out that many ads for car phones show the microphone on the left or right sides of the sun visor, which requires the driver to turn his head when talking, although the optimum position is straight ahead.

A California company has devoted itself to marketing of dashboard mounted kev pads and a visor mounted microphone that leaves both hands free, however, this costs around \$250 added to the cost of the cellular telephone hook-in.

Safety advocates warn drivers to pull to the side of the road and stop while dialing when using their car phone.

Eventually, legislators may re-

Eventually, legislators may require hands-free or voice activated car phones in promoting highway safety. That appears to be the trend of the future.

Your sex may determine how illness is viewed

Whether a person is a man or a woman may very well make a difference in the kind of help he or she gets in case of a psychological illness such as a depression or a psychosomatic illness such as high blood pressure, an ulcer or sexual dysfunction.

Let us take this illustration. A man comes into a doctor's office and complains of the following. He is feeling 'blue' or 'down' a good deal of the time. He is sleeping poorly and doesn't have much appetite. He is weary and without energy from the time he gets up in the morning. He can't get up much interest in going out with his wife, the children, friends. He can't concentrate at the office.

These are some of the classic presenting symptoms of depression. But depression is often a psychological rather than a physical illness, and there is still considerable prejudice - even among physicians - about someone having a psychological illness. To many people, psychological illnesses will mean that 'there is something wrong with a person's mind;' also that it indicates ''a weakness in character and pesonality', prejudices which are absurd.

Hence, when a man comes in with the symptoms of depression, the doctor - especially if it is a male doctor - may be disinclined to see it for what it probably is: an emotional illness. He is much more likely to see it as being a case of 'overwork.'' of 'too much pression, the doctor - especially if it is a male doctor - may be disinclined to see it for what it probably is: an emotional illness. He is much more likely to rake a vacation, or even change his job. This course of action, while positive and helpful, may only be superficial and may not deal with the basic depression and the emotional factors which are producing it.

In most cases, the male taken the patient may himself be "settling up" the misconception. People who are depressed - whether they be male or female - generally have a feeling of helplessness, failure, defeat, despair. Such feelings are not however consistent with the

men are less likely to recognize that this is what they are feeling, and even if they do recognize it, less likely to be able or willing to express it and communicate it. It is "too emotional" and "mar it supposed to be emotional."

Even when he is having severe physical symptoms, a man is likely to see them purely as that and to reject the idea that they may have something to do with an underlying psychological difficulty. Hence, when he comes to the doctor, he will be likely to talk only about the backaches, or stomach disorders or dizziness or dizziness or dizziness or material to the doctor to prescribe something for that condition, not even letting on that he is also feeling miserable, unhappy, agitated, anxious, depressed symptoms which could give the doctor a clue that there is also an emotional problem there.

With women patients, it is different. To start with, male doctors, acceding to the stereotype, are more apt to see a woman as being weaker, more helpless, more emotional, more likely to have psychological problems. Hence when a woman comes in with symptoms of depression, the doctor is more likely to perceive "depression" "ather than "pressure" or "overwork" and to refer her to a spychiatrist for further evaluation.

tion.

The woman may herself make it easier for the doctor to come to this conclusion. She will likely be weeping. She will communicate her feelings of melancholy, helplessness, defeat and despair. That, together with the other symptoms she reports, will produce a picture the doctor will easily recognize as depression, and incline him to proceed accordingly.

Further, women are more likely to recognize that what they have is a psychological problem and to seek help at a mental health clinic or from a private psychiatrist right off without first going to a physician. Men, on the other hand, are more likely to reject the idea that they might need psychotherapy and psychiatric help and take themselves to a physician instead.







Justice for his office's participation in the most successful mass round-up of fugitive felons in law enforcement history.

Eugene Liss, State Marshall Eugene Liss, State Marshall for his district of New Jersey of the mitted States Marshals' Service, presented an award to Precholders. According to Liss, the Essex County Board of Precholders. According to Liss, the Essex County sheriff was being honored for his "outstanding efforts in the furtherance of joint law enforcement cooperation, understanding and success."

The award stems from the participation of the Essex County Sheriff's Office in "Operation Fist," which combined men of the United States Marshals Service with officers from state, coutny and local law enforcement agencies. Working in undercover teams, the officers arrested over 3,000 of the most wanted fugitive felons in an eight state area.

Sergeant Anthony Patuto and

Detective Keith Cummings of the Sheriff's Office worked with federal marshals as part of "Fist" (Fugitive Investigative Strike Teams) undercover teams in Essex County.
Various "Stings" were used to flush out and apprehend the targeted fugitives. Letters were sent announcing that the fugitive had won a valubale lottery prize that had to be picked up in person. Another sting was the creation of the imaginary "Fist Construction Company" which specialized in hiring people who had been in trouble with the law. Prospective employees showed Prospective employees showed up for interviews and walked right into "Operation Fist."

Liss stated that his office wished to recognize Sheriff D'Alessio and the Essex County Sheriff's Office for their assistance in both "Operation Fist" and for the active help that the Sheriff's Office provides to the United States Marshals Service on an oragoing daily basis. "This award points out what can be accomplished when law enforcement agencies work

together," said Liss. He also pointed out that the "Fist" Operation in Essex County was the most successful of the many such operations undertaken hroughout the country.

D'Alessio said that he accepted the award as recognition of the dedication and hard work of the men and women of the Essex County Sheriff's Office.

Freeholder President Jerome D. Greco added his congratula-tions to D'Alessio and said that the entire Board of Freeholders stood "100 percent" behind the Sheriff's Office and their efforts in law enforcement. According to Greco, the Essex County Sheriff's Office was an example of "taxpayers dollars well spent."

Consumers warned of credit card scam

Credit card holders should be on the lookout for telephene schemes that ask consumers to disclose their credit card numbers in order to win "valuable" prizes, said Andrew R. Babyak, chairman of the New Jersey Bankers Association Bank Security Committee and vice president and director of security. First Fidelity Bancorporation, Newark.

"The scheme usually begins with a congratulatory telephone call in which the caller asks the cardholder to disclose their credit card number to "verify" the consumer's identity and/or address," Babyak said.

"If you receive a call like this, it is probably a fraud," he said. "Reputable businesses do not solicit credit card numbers over the phone to verify names or identities. You wouldn't give your checkbook or checking account number to a stranger who asked for it regardless of the reason. Don't give them your credit card number either. Unfortunately, giving them one is just about like giving them the other."

A driver's license or social security number is much easier to check and therefore more useful for identification. These unmbers do not involve a credit device.

In one variation of the scheme, the caller will ask the consumer to 'verify' the credit card number and will then read an imaginary number, hoping the person will correct him by giving the real number. In another variation, the caller will invite the consumer to call back and give him the credit card

number. The calls are frequently tied-in with the sale of overpriced merchandise or an attempt to use the credit card number to make unauthorized charges against the victim's account

Never give the credit card

count.

"Never give the credit card number to anyone unless you initiate the call," urged Babyak.

"And never verify or correct a card number read to you over the phone. Remember, your bank has no way of knowing whether or not a credit card voucher received from a business or bank is valid. You and you alone control access to your card and you are ceit account."

Should you receive uch a call, bankers and state consumer protection authorities urge to inflout the name and address of the company placing the call. Do not give them your credit card number under any circumstances, but immediately call your local bank, the "hot line" listed on your credit card or documents or the New Jersey Department of Banking's Consumer Complaints Legal and Economic Research Division, (669) 282-6559.

Here are some other tips to

Here are some other tips to consumers for protecting credit cards:

• Be certain to retrieve yourcard after using it and be certain that when it is returned, that it is, in fact, your card.

• Be cautious about signing an incomplete or blank charge card voucher.

• Obtain and destroy all carbon paper used in connection with copies of the voucher.

Park curfew may change

Essex County Freeholder
President Jerome D. Greco has
announced that a proposed ordinance changing the curfew
time from 10 p.m. to 9 p.m., in

Residents in the surrounding residential areas of Montclair, Nutley, Glen Ridge and Bloomfield have complained about the conditions, as weil as littering. Yantacaw park is located in Nutley while Brookdale Parkl borders residential areas of Montclair, Bloomfield and Glen Ridge.

The county lawmaker said setting an earlier curfew would enable the county police to "get a better grip on the situation" in the parks. Moreover, he said, it would make the parks less attractive as gathering spots for young people drawn to the parks

from around North Jersey by recent newspaper articles describing the parks as ideal social
meeting places.


Greco said he has also asked
the Administration to direct the
County Police to step up its
patrol of county-run parks to enforce orderly conduct and punish
individuals who litter the parks
and nearby residential areas.

"This legislation will help the
county turn Brookdale and Yantacaw Parks back into the quiet,
safe suburban parks they were
intended to be," said Greco.
"After all, the taxpayers of Essex who live around and use our
parks are entitled to no less than
that."

Greco said ne will ask the
county to undertake a complete
review of iaw enforcement

an eye toward "beefing up present efforts."
