# Rent control law changed in 1984

Changes in the Township of Belleville's rent control ordinance has caused confusion among both landlords and tenants over the past few years.

The first ordinance on rent control in Belleville was established in 1974 when the Town Fathers discovered they had a housing crisis. Jack Reilly, chairman of the rent leveling board, said last Friday.

The ordinance was established to freeze or control rents, he said. That ordinance was in effect since that time until revisions were incorporated into the ordinance in April of 1984.

The rent control ordinance in effect today concerns three-rental units and up, regardless as to whether or not the landlord lives in the home, Reilly said. One- and two-family units are not included in the ordinance.

The rent control ordinance in Belleville allows landlords to raise their tenant's rent 6 percent every year on a specific date. That date, otherwise called the anniversary date, is based on the first rental of the apartment, not the tenant, Reilly said.

Landlords are given the right to raise a tenant's rent 6 percent each year, however, they must

give the tenant a 30-day written notice. For example, Reilly said, if a tenant pays his rent Aug. 1 and the anniversary date is Sept. 1, the tenant must be given a written notice when he pays the landlord Aug. 1.

A landlord is not allowed to raise the rent at any other time during the course of the year, Reilly said. However, if a tenant moves out of an apartment, a landlord may apply to the board for another increase.

That increase, called a vacancy increase, is a 9 percent rent increase, Reilly said. The vacancy increase was incorporated into the rent control ordinance in April of 1984 along with other revisions.

A landlord cannot raise a tenant's rent 9 percent unless he is given approval by the rent leveling board. If a landlord receives approval for the increase, the next day of payment becomes the new anniversary date, Reilly said.

For example, if a tenant moves out of an apartment on Aug. 31 and the anniversary date of the apartment is Aug. 1, the rent of the apartment would have been raised 6 percent. However, if a landlord goes to

# School bus storage discussed by board

The safe storage of Belleville Board of Education buses was discussed at the board's meeting Sept. 9.

The buses had been originally stored in the board complex parking lot but were continually plagued by vandalism. A few months ago, the board of education was given permission by Joseph Grande, commissioner of Public Works, to let school bus drivers drop the buses off at the Public Works site on Cortland Street after they finished their runs.

The board agreed to do so because the Public Works site is fenced in, however, communication problems have developed as a result of the buses being stored somewhere other than the school complex.

Edward Appleton, school board administrator/secretary,

highlighted the communication problems to the attention of the board at its meeting. He said that problems were occurring with getting in touch with drivers at the Public Works site when other drivers broke down during their run.

Drivers, after dropping the buses off at the site, were shut from there to the board complex. However, Appleton said it was costing the board of education time and money. Board members discussed extending the existing fence at the board complex so that it completely encloses the buses. Gates would have to be installed along the two driveways of the parking lot as well as fencing from the driveways to the building.

Appleton said that when the

# Safety departments increase personnel

Two bills recently passed by the state Legislature will mean more firefighters and police patrolmen for Belleville.

Legislation signed Aug. 15 will appropriate \$33,616 in state matching funds for fire department personnel expenditures. Between two and three new positions will be created before the end of next month, according to Public Safety Commissioner Ralph DiRuggiero.

A total of \$8,000,000 will be used statewide for new positions in towns that fall under the Safe and Clean Neighborhoods Act.

Five new police patrolmen were hired with funds provided by a similar bill sponsored by State Senate President Carmine A. Orsello (D-Essex) which appropriates \$86,721 to Belleville out of a total \$25,000,000 appropriated for personnel expenditures.

Under both bills, Belleville must match every \$4 of grant

funds with \$1 of municipal monies.

"We had no foot patrol officers on regular beats before now," Chief of Police George Lister said. "The public seems to like having officers whom they can get to know and who know them."

The "beats" of the new officers will include the areas of Silver Lake, Washington Avenue, Union Avenue near Passaic Avenue and the Franklin Avenue shopping district during the holidays, Lister said.

A sixth new position is also in the process of being filled, according to Lister.

Four of the five officers must complete a 13-week training program in the Essex County Police Academy in Cedar Grove before taking their posts.

Anthony M. Weedo, hired Sept. 9, is currently on the job because as a transfer officer

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# School board talks about AIDS policy

A recommendation for a policy on enrollment of children afflicted with Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS) was presented by Superintendent of Schools Michael Nardiello at Monday's Belleville Board of Education executive meeting.

Nardiello recommended that the board follow state Department of Health policy regarding the admission of afflicted children into the school. According to that policy, "the school board must not exclude the child from attending school unless the school board can document compelling reasons to do so."

These reasons include the existence of the following conditions: the child is not toilet trained, is incontinent or is unusually physically aggressive. These same criteria apply to the admissibility of any child into school.

The policy also includes a provision that "anyone must be removed from school if and when the individual has skin eruptions or weeping lesions that cannot be covered."

Nardiello recommended that the board's Child Study Team, health officers, school physician and the Township of Belleville

evaluate the student. If the team found that the child would pose a threat to other students and staff, the child should be classified "chronically ill" and instructed at home.

"I feel that we should establish a policy that if a child has AIDS, in his own best interest, we should deem this child chronically ill and that the child should be given home instruction," Gabriel Nazzola, board member, said. "And if any staff member refuses to give home instruction, the board will not take any disciplinary action against that staff member."

"If it were me, they could put me in jail before I dealt with an AIDS child," he continued. "I feel sorry for the families, but God forbid I should take this disease home to my kids."

Board attorney Joel A. Pisano then recommended that the board support the Department of Health's mandate until a child with AIDS was found in the school system, at which time the board could reconsider its policy.

All board members concurred with Pisano's opinion, although Nazzola cautioned that "the board should start now to

# High school students can earn Bloomfield College credits

Students at Bloomfield Senior High School can earn college credit for their work, thanks to a special advanced placement (AP) program administered in cooperation with Bloomfield College.

According to Richard MacNett, chairman of the BHS guidance department, the co-current credit program was

begun in 1978 in response to a push from the state education department for high schools to provide college-level work for their more capable students.

That year, AP English and calculus were offered. Biology II and psychology were added in 1979. A second-level chemistry course is also planned and will probably begin in 1987, MacNett said.

Students signed up for this year's AP offerings during a special registration held at the high school Tuesday afternoon. Last year some 12 students participated in the program; 20 to 22 have been involved in years past, he said. A letter is sent to students during the summer telling them about the program and registration procedures.

The courses are taught at the high school by BHS staff members, who are designated adjunct Bloomfield College faculty but receive no stipend or other extra compensation. Course syllabi are reviewed by the college for nature and depth to ensure that college-level standards are set and maintained. Sometimes tests are co-graded by high school and college faculty according to MacNett.

Students who elect to receive college credit for their work — and not all do, MacNett said — must earn a grade of C or better. These credits are automatically transferable to Bloomfield College, which also sends credit reports to other institutions if students plan to continue their studies elsewhere.

English, biology and psychology, one-year courses at the high school, earn 4 credits, the equivalent of one college semester. Calculus, an intensive one-year course earns 8 credits.

AP tests are offered, but not required, for students who feel a high score will bolster their college credit standing.

Although transfer credits are accepted at many area colleges, a few refuse to participate in the program, MacNett said.

Rutgers, for example, does not accept English transfer credit, although it offers an advanced class for freshmen who have taken AP courses. Engineering colleges, especially NJIT and Stevens, will not ac-

cept calculus, but Stevens offers two or three units of general college credit. Princeton accepts no transfer credits.

Nonetheless, the program offers students many advantages, says Martha LaBare, assistant dean of the college.

"Earning credits in high school gets a lot of work out of the way, and it's a real money saver," she noted. The college charges a special tuition rate of \$50 per course (\$100 for

calculus) and even offers financial aid for students who cannot afford the special rate.

In addition, she said, students are issued college identification cards that entitle them to full privileges. These include use of the library and attendance at lectures, movies, athletic contests and learning support workshops on such subjects as making the transition to college, time management and speed reading.

"AP students don't have separate status at the high school, and participation in a program like this is prestigious," she said.

"Also, being a part of the college community is good for them. They see they can handle the work, and they go on to college full time with a lot more confidence."

## Pet owners meet tonight to discuss pet cemetery

A meeting of pet owners concerned about the closing of the Blairstown Pet Cemetery will be held at 8 tonight, Sept. 19, at the Fairfield Ramada Inn on Route 46 in Fairfield.

Invited speakers include Gov. Thomas Kean, Senate President Carmen A. Orechio (D-Essex), Assembly Speaker Alan Karcher, Blairstown Det. John Cramer, attorneys representing both the cemetery owners and a class action lawsuit and representatives from the N.J. Department of Environmental Protection and Consumer Fraud.

A trench containing the remains of more than 900 animals was discovered after police received an anonymous tip on Aug. 16. Six more mass animal graves are suspected to be located on the same land, according to Det. Cramer.

Edith and Frank A. Orechio, sponsors of tonight's meeting, filed a class action suit against the Blairstown Pet Cemetery owner Gregory Wulster and his brother, Wayne, the Cedar Lake Estates real estate company and an unnamed person connected with the pet cemetery.

The suit calls for compensatory and punitive damages, a full refund of all funds paid for cremation, court costs and attorney's fees, plus treble

damages as provided by the state Consumer Fraud Act.

No criminal charges have been lodged against the Blairstown Pet Cemetery or its owners. The DEP fined Gregory Wulster \$25,000 for operating an illegal landfill. It also ordered him to remove the carcasses within 60 days and dispose of them at an approved landfill, according to Det. Cramer.

Reports made in the press last Saturday that the Orechios had dropped their lawsuit are incorrect, according to Frank Orechio.

"There was a misunderstanding," he said. "Our attorney had met with the owner of the cemetery and was shown a paper trail that showed that our dog was received, cremated and that the ashes had been given to us."

"I am not satisfied that this proves that we were not defrauded," he continued. "I would like to see if dogs whose owners paid for the cremation but who were identified by dog tags in the trench can also be traced by paper trails. If their paper trail is like mine, mine becomes meaningless."

A bill that provides for criminal punishment of operators of pet cemeteries who violate contracts on burials or cremations was introduced Sept. 9 by Orechio.

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
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## Michael Lamberti

## Golden Comments

Disturbing tidbits from TIME with accompanying hints of crime and cover-ups with eye-catching captions focusing on wrongdoing and the seamy side of justice in high places of government and military service.

Out of danger, a teamsters' probe is dropped; after a three-year investigation of padded payroll practices in a Cleveland Teamsters Local by its secretary-treasurer, the Justice Department decided that it had overruled a recommendation by a federal organized crime strike force in that city and would not prosecute the union boss whose local was the only major labor organization to back Ronald Reagan for president in 1980 and 1984; the Justice Department insisted that this support did not affect its decision.

Justice officials claimed the case lacked "prosecutorial merit" because there was insufficient evidence to win a conviction. They also cited "outstanding law enforcement considerations," a reference to the labor leader's role as a secret FBI informant providing tips on teamster-related crimes for at least eight years.

Two Senate committees have announced that they plan to investigate the Justice Department's handling of the case. Skeptical of the department's explanations, the Senators want to find out whether the teamsters' boss was given favorable treatment because of his political ties to the administration. He was appointed a labor adviser to the Reagan transition team in 1980 by Edwin Meese, now the attorney general. He was a frequent guest at the White House.

The Cleveland strike force, composed of investigators from both the Justice and Labor departments, had compiled a 100-page memo recommending that a grand jury be urged to indict the labor boss for allegedly putting "ghost workers" on the local payroll.

Over the side, waste and fraud in the Navy: file cabinets, metal desks, brass fire nozzles worth \$85 each, a \$5,000 oscilloscope. All dumped into the ocean from the aircraft carrier Kitty Hawk because its sailors were too lazy to return the items to the vessel's storerooms or to do the needed minor repair work.

Petty Officer First Class Robert Jackson, 26, claims, who served 10 months aboard the carrier. Working as an auditor on the ship, he accumulated about 1,100 pages of notes and documents on what he describes as appalling acts of waste, fraud, auditing forgeries and altered books in the handling of spare parts and other equipment. The system was so lax, Jackson charges, that when bookkeepers in various departments feared they were exceeding their budgets on supplies, they simply neglected to enter further purchases in the computerized record system.

Jackson contends that he examined 12 departments last March and discovered that \$2.45 million worth of supplies had been received aboard the ship but had not been charged to the departments. After turning his records over to Navy investigators, Jackson said that the supply system contained "no checks or balances, no accountability. It's breeding ground for crooks." (Later the Navy found that it could not account for some \$14 million worth of Kitty Hawk supplies.)

Citing examples of theft, Jackson said that Kitty Hawk sailors managed to requisition 31 bars of pure silver, each weighing 9 lbs. and worth about \$535. The sailors were able to secure the bars from a shore supply depot and hide them. No record of the orders was kept on board, so the pilfering would not have been discovered if one of the sailors had not been caught trying to sell several bars.

The Navy has promised a thorough investigation into Jackson's allegations about the Kitty Hawk, which recently won a Navy excellence award for having the best-run supply department in the Pacific fleet. "If this is the best," Jackson scoffs, "what sort of shape are the bad ones in?"

# Job placement program helps handicapped students find work

Jobs are hard to find for anyone nowadays, but thanks to the efforts of Elyse Pepose, job placement coordinator at Belleville High School, handicapped students are getting the chance to experience the working world.

The idea behind the job placement program is to prepare and place handicapped students in jobs and to prepare them for such things as independent living, locating and keeping a job and how to conduct a job interview, Mrs. Pepose said.

The program, which was developed by the Special Education Advisory Council, is based on a work study program whereby a student receives 10 credits for attending class and working afterschool, she said.

There are 108 special education students mainstreamed in Belleville High School this year, Mrs. Pepose said. They are divided into nine classes which she teaches on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, on Tuesdays and Thursdays, she visits neighboring businesses informing them about the program.

"I look for entry-level jobs which are mostly clerical with basic typing and filing or factory-type work," she said. "I look for jobs that don't require that much experience."

When she first started the program in May, she mailed 160 letters to businesses in Belleville, Bloomfield and Nutley. So far, she has students working at Garden State Pet Supply in Nutley, Channel and National Lighting in Belleville as well as those students who have gotten jobs on their own at fast food establishments.

In fact, during the interview, Mrs. Pepose made final arrangements for one of her students to work at William Tatz Industries in Belleville. When the student came in to see her, this reporter couldn't tell who was happier about the job, her or the student.

"His's such a good kid," she said. "I'm so happy for him. I think it's great."

" I don't care whether they get a job through me or by themselves," she continued. "I just want to see them working."

Most of the students in the work program are juniors and seniors, she said. If a job comes along, the position is reviewed by Mrs. Pepose who then chooses which student she believes is right for the job. Students who receive jobs as a result of the program are released from school early but receive credits for working.

"Once a student has a job, I'll be keeping in touch with the employer to make sure the child is doing the work," Mrs. Pepose said.

Most of the students who have jobs work approximately four-five hours a day, 15-20 hours a week. One student, who applied for a job on his own, works 30 hours a week at K-Mart in Belleville, she said.

The main thing about the program is that the students learn how to go about attacking the real world," she said. "We talk about how they feel about themselves because if they don't feel good about themselves, how can they be the best person for the job.

"Students are also taught how to prepare a resume," she said, "but most of them get nervous because they don't have any jobs to put down. The best thing for them to do is to take from their life experiences. If they babysit, I tell them to write down child care and things like that.

"We're finding our way as we go along," she said.

### NORMAL AMONG THE ELDERLY

The number 98.6 is indelibly etched in most people's minds as one's "normal" temperature, in degrees Fahrenheit. However, there was a recent study at the University of New Mexico's College of Nursing. Its purpose was to determine the normal temperature among a group of healthy adults, between the ages of 45 and 90. The group revealed an average temperature of 97.7 degrees, substantially below the old standby norm of 98.6. It is important for elders to realize that they have lower body temperatures than the general population. A temperature elevation to 98.6 or above, particularly in those over 75, should raise suspicion of fever. It should prompt a search for the underlying cause.

same problem was discussed two years ago, the cost of the additional fencing was \$3,000. He estimated that it would cost \$3500-\$3600 today.

Other suggestions included leaving the buses at the Public Works site and developing a communication system between the board complex and the buses. Some board members said that if the board is considering moving its offices to the new municipal complex, they would not want to see the money invested in additional fencing. The majority of the board seemed to favor establishing a communication system such as walkie talkies or radios within the buses and a control panel at the board complex.

Board members Phil Linfante and John DiTasi suggested to their colleagues that they get costs of both projects before making any decision.

## Fire Safety Tips

### Offices Can Burn...Plan Your Escape

By Firefighter P. Lazaro Jr.

If you become trapped in an office by smoke or heat and are unable to reach an exit, close the door and seal off any cracks. Turn off ventilation systems. Go to a window and open it for air and rescue. Stay low. Don't panic or jump. Wait for help.

Evacuation procedures vary with each building. Alarms may signal to leave the building and relocate at a specific area. Get a copy of the fire escape plan for your area.

Practice leaving by the emergency routes. Count doors to exit stairways. You may need to find them in the dark. If power is lost or smoke is thick, you won't be able to see the exit sign above.

Follow these evacuation rules:

- Plan now. Know your exits.
- Don't use the elevator in a fire. Power may fail and you may be trapped or the heat of the fire may bring the elevator to the fire floor and open the doors.
- If smoke or heat is present, stay low. Crawl and cover your mouth.
- When the alarm sounds, leave immediately. Call the fire department (911), unless you know someone else has.
- If trapped, close doors and wait at windows. Signal for help by hanging something out the window. Do not break windows if they can be opened. If smoke enters from the outside, you will need to close them. People have lasted for a long time in burning high-rise buildings by keeping a level head and remaining near the window, low to the floor, covering themselves and taking shallow breaths.
- Know where fire alarms are and how to use them.
- Don't fight the fire. Get out and stay out. Sound the alarm.

F.M.B.A. Local 29 provides these fire safety tips in an effort to promote a fire safe Belleville.



## Armando DiVilla

Armando DiVilla ranks as one of the finest restaurants in the area. From the matre'd to the table lines, one word describes Armando's: "class", and that is the atmosphere which prevails.

The menu features gourmet Italian specialties, more European-style than Italian-American dishes. The appetizer list emphasizes vegetables and seafood; offering dishes such as the Antipasto Freddo Casalingo (home-made cold marinated vegetables), Scampi alla Griglia (broiled jumbo shrimp in garlic sauce) and Spiedino Alla Romano (cheese brochette with wine and Anchovy Sauce).

A plate of traditional Italian Zuppa (soups) is a nice second course. Minestrone Piemontese, Pasta Fagioli, and Cappelletti in Brodo (with meat-filled dumplings) are good choices to try.

Armando's has 15 pastas on its dinner menu, which can be ordered as either a main or secondary course. Traditional favorites like Manicotti, Fettucine Alfredo, and Ravioli are available, as well as more "exotic" pastas. The Paglia e Fieno (white and green noodles with onion, prosciutto, mushrooms, and peas in clam sauce) is absolutely delicious. The noodles are very thin and fresh, and the combination of ingredients is superb.

Several salads and vegetables are offered, and are far more sophisticated than those dishes in standard restaurants.

Veal, chicken, grilled meats, and fish are cooked up several different ways by Chef Armando. An interesting dish is the Cotoletta alla Valdostana (stuffed veal chop with Fontina, Prosciutto, and truffles); and Pollo alla Marengo (chicken sauteed in butter with brandy and tomatoes).

The desserts are equally as elegant as the main fare. Italian pastries, cakes and gelato are classic items to end your meal with. Those with more exotic tastes can choose cherries jubilee, banana flambé, or fragole portofino.

Friendly host Onofrio Pellegrini said that there are always daily specials; and if there is something you desire that is not on the menu, just ask him. There is also an extensive wine list, with both imported and domestic selections.

A separate room is available for functions including 10-50 people; a much larger one is available for large affairs.

Lunch (with a special menu) is served from 11:30 - 2:30, Dinner from 5:00 - 10:00 p.m., every weekday except Monday. Saturdays just for dinner, and Sundays 1:00 - 8:00 p.m. Reservations are recommended. Seating is for 100 persons.

## New coach named to '77 team



Continuing our look at the past ten years of Belleville sports, we start at the 1977-78 campaign.

Please keep in mind that there is not enough space to begin to mention all the great athletes and games that have made up the last ten years of Belleville sports. This is just a chance to remember some of the players and a few of the games that made all the years so great.

In 1977, John Senesky was named the new head football coach at Belleville High. He started with some hungry football players, but the team was up against some tough competition and the Bellboys finished with a 2-6-1 mark. Among those losses was a 40-0 setback to Livingston, a 63-0 loss to Seton Hall and a 36-12 loss against Passaic. Two years later, Belleville would avenge all three of those defeats.

Sue Smith entered her senior year as one of the best female runners in Essex County. She had an excellent cross country campaign and concluded her career by leading the girls track team.

### My friend, Mike Graham

In 1978, Mike Graham set the school record in the half mile, running under two minutes and breaking a mark that seemed untouchable in Belleville track. Graham suffered through an injury plagued senior year in 1978-79, but he went down in the annals of Belleville track as one of the best runners ever to wear the Blue and Gold.

I mention Mike Graham for a special reason. In March, 1981, Mike died in a tragic car accident, sending a feeling of shock and sadness throughout the township. At 19 years old, he was too young and too vibrant an athlete to leave us so soon. Time goes by and the shock does settle down, but the spirit of Mike Graham will never die. He was a very special friend, a person that I still think of often.

### Baseball

The Belleville baseball teams rebounded in 1978 and 1979 under coach George Zanfi. A sophomore named Mike Nicotusa made noise right away for Belleville in '78 with his outstanding play in center field. Before he graduated in 1980, Nicotusa would go down as one of the best baseball players ever to attend BHS. Later, Anthony Coco, Fazzini, Ken Constantino and Dave Starr would lead Belleville to the 1981 GNT championship.

### B-Ball

Basketball at Belleville was undergoing a new look. Joe Papasidero took over the reins in the 1979-80 season, taking over for Dan Grasso, who stepped down after the 1978-79 season. Papasidero inherited a veteran team, with Ed Aulisi, Gary Ferrer, Rich Cook, Ron Whitman and Wayne "The Train" Bubet. The Bucs finished with a 11-13 mark, marking the Essex County tournament and later the State tourney.

### Superman

The wrestling teams at Belleville continued to excel. A sophomore wrestler named Chris Musmanno burst upon the scene in 1978, making the state tourney in his first try. Before graduation in 1980, Musmanno would advance to the states two more times, winning the state championship in the spring of 1980 at 170 pounds.

### Coach Fu

Girls basketball was on an upswing in the late 70's. Karen Fuccello had her young and fired up team playing exciting basketball. In 1979, the team advanced to the county semi finals, finishing with a 16-7 mark. Players like Denise Guiliano, Karen Portuese, Denise Zarra and Robin Giordano helped to put Belleville girls basketball back on the map.

### A New Decade

In the early 80's, the Belleville football team established itself as one of the state's best. The team made the playoffs in 1979, '80 and '82, making it to the state finals in 1980. Trying to name all the stars of those seasons is impossible, but players like Dave Grant, Frank Fazzini, John Mellilo, Ed Aulisi, Len Mendola, Craig Mack, Phil Cerza, Paul Scheuplein, Bill Walsh, Mark Walsh, Jeff Walsh and Mike Murphy come to mind as outstanding athletes.

Soccer, under coach Tony De Aquino, had some solid teams. Santiago Borja, Brian Woods and Carlos Kingalaha came to mind right away as outstanding players. John Lee and Brian Cook were also excellent players that helped to put Belleville soccer on the road to excellence.

### Jenny, Jenny

From 1980-84, a young lady took to the basketball court and when she was finished, she would be the all time leading scorer in state history. It doesn't take a mind reader to realize that the athlete to whom I am referring to is Jennifer Apicella. You all know the marvelous accomplishments that this young lady came through with during her years at Belleville High.

### A New Generation

Speaking of female athletes with a world of talent, let's not forget Barbara Gundry, Dana Caruso, Dawn Ritacco, Rosie Leonidis, Kim Indiero, Donna Brooks, Dina De Aquino and Tracy Buono.

In November, 1983, the Belleville Times honored De Aquino, Apicella and Buono for their outstanding accomplishments.

The Belleville softball teams of the 1980's, under Carl Corino, won two county titles in 1982 and '83. The girls advanced to the finals in 1980, '84 and '85, and also were excellent in state play, making the sectional finals in '85.

Unfortunately, time does not permit me to continue with all the names and games that have made Belleville sports so exciting over the past ten years. You would need a book to really give justice to all the great performances turned in by these young men and women.

### Thank You

As I begin my 11th year of covering Belleville sports, I look forward to watching more of the current athletes make a mark in the annals of BHS sports. To the athletes of the past ten years, I personally would like to thank you for all the great times and memories. I would also like to thank the Belleville Times for giving me the opportunity to cover Belleville sports through the years. Hopefully, it can continue for another ten years.

## Football teams may face changes in playoff status

Changes to the state high school football playoffs could be a major topic of discussion at the New Jersey Athletic Association annual meeting in December.

The first step will be four area meetings held in Bergen and Essex counties, at the Shore and South Jersey where the proposals would be discussed.

The main issue would deal with enrollment requirements. Under the present system, the four public school and two parochial school groups are determined by the enrollment figures of its group. Schools with the top 25 percent enrollment go into Group 4. The next 25 percent go to

Group 3. Both Parochial A and Parochial B are determined within two sections, North Jersey and South Jersey.

Enrollment numbers in the past have given rise to inequities. Last year, Trenton High School of Central Jersey reported an enrollment of 2,522, the largest in Central Jersey. Lakeland Regional of Wanakee in North Jersey, Section 1, also wound up in Group 4 with an enrollment of 999.

In Central Jersey, Lakeland would have been classified as a Group 3 school.

Another proposed idea which

is headed by a special committee would split Group 1, bringing the public school total to five groups.

In Group 1, Central Jersey, the largest football playing school was Metuchen with 523. The smallest was Green Brook with 167. In North Jersey, Section 1, Wallkill Valley of Hardystown was tops with 455 and Wallington rounded out the list with 244.

This proposal would split Group 1 so Metuchen and Green Brook with such diverse numbers would not be bracketed to play in the playoffs.

Another proposal which may find its way to the December meeting would require all playoff bound teams to move their Thanksgiving Day clashes to the Saturday prior to the holiday.

The change would set up a series of playoff games in con-

secutive weekends commencing on the Saturday following Thanksgiving.

This season the football playoffs will be held the weekend of Nov. 22-24 and of Dec. 6-8.

Based on the 1984 enrollments, Group 4 would involve schools with 1,251 and more students. In Group 3 would be schools with enrollments of 951 to 1,250. Group 2 would be 701 to 950. Group 1 would be 451 to 700. And the proposed Group 1A would provide pairings for schools with 450 or fewer students.

The proposal would only affect the state playoffs.

If certain measures are adopted the Thanksgiving Day games would be moved and the playoff eligibility would be determined by a teams first eight contests.

firefighters. "We felt that the man in charge of training our new people should have at least a captain's rank to command the respect and authority he needs," Public Safety Commissioner Ralph DiRuggiero said.

The ordinance brings the number of fire captains from 10 to 11. Thomas Murphy was also promoted to captain to fill a vacancy in an existing position.

In addition, the number of deputy fire chiefs is reduced from 11 to four in the ordinance.

"We have had only four for a long time and the change in the ordinance is being done simply so that our town law agrees with what is going on," DiRuggiero said.

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

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


