## Estimated at \$3 million

## Repairs needed at Middle School

The deteriorating condition of the Belleville Middle School would cost approximately \$3 million to repair if the board of education approves a refurbishing project presented by Joseph Grande, supervisor of plant operations.

According to Grande, the condition of the building is safe, however, extensive work of both the exterior and interior of the building is required to meet with construction codes.

"There is nothing in the school, that meets today's codes," Grande said.

Repair work earmarked by Grande includes: widening of the school's driveway; pointing and waterproofing of exterior; replacement of interior doors and classroom windows; new floors installed; ceilings dropped; and corridor walls painted.

Grande also said that new electrical and plumbing systems should be installed, noting that the only toilet facilities located in the school are in the basement.

"To do this kind of work, we are talking \$3 million," Grande

said. "My recommendation to the board is, and I know you don't want to hear it, but I believe you construct a new building. If you put that kind of money into the building, you'll have a \$3 million barn."

"I just think you're throwing good money after bad," Grande said.

In his report, Grande also presented figures for the construction of a new building which were prepared by Neil Siciliano, consulting engineer. Estimated costs of a new building were set at \$3.5 million, according to Siciliano's report.

Siciliano based his report on a preliminary budget, approximate square feet required, "model costs" for a two-story building and common additives which include a clock system, elevator, kitchen, auditorium and classroom seating, furniture and a sound system.

Figures were estimated at \$50,000 for total area; \$2,515,000 for "model costs," \$377,500 for overhead costs, \$232,500 for architects' fees and \$375,000 for

## Cerami plans move of misplaced condo

Cerami Construction Co. will comply with the Belleville Zoning Board of Adjustment's decision that it move one of its nine condominium buildings at its new complex on Mill Street.

The building, constructed on the far end of the complex near River Mill West, will be moved approximately 10-12 feet in order to eliminate a 15-foot side line violation, according to Jon Campbell, zoning board attorney.

Residents of the River Mill West complex had complained to the zoning board at previous meetings about the proximity of the building. They said that because the building was so close to their complex, it would be easier for residents of the new building to park their cars in their lots rather than their own.

The zoning board then reviewed the site plans at a special work session on Sept. 25 and discovered the 15-foot side line violation. The board, which also found an inadequacy in the parking area, ordered Cerami

Construction Co. to develop amended site plans which were reviewed at a special meeting Oct. 22.

In the plans, Cerami Construction Co. developed a new parking scheme and specified that the building would be moved to eliminate the 15-foot side line violation, according to Jon Campbell, zoning board attorney.

According to Campbell, Cerami Construction Co. will also be responsible for putting up fencing or hedging along the border of River Mill West and River Mill East subject to the construction code official.

No time frame on the completion of the project has been set, Campbell said, adding that no certificates of occupancy for any of the buildings can be issued until the entire project is approved by the zoning board.

Campbell also said that Cerami will be constructing a second foot bridge in accordance with a zoning board decision. No further meetings on the matter are scheduled, he said.

## State, district seats to be filled Nov. 5

Belleville's 17,715 registered voters will have an opportunity to choose New Jersey's governor, two state Assembly representatives and a county sheriff and clerk when polls open for the general election Tuesday, Nov. 5, from 7 a.m. - 8 p.m.

Voters from the township's 24 districts will also have an opportunity to vote on seven public questions which include a wastewater treatment bond fund issue, a resource recovery and solid waste disposal facility fund bond issue and use of "casino revenue fund" monies.

Gubernatorial candidates are incumbent Republican Thomas Kean and Democrat Peter Shapiro, who currently serves as Essex County Executive.

In the 1981 gubernatorial election, Kean lost in Belleville to his opponent, Democrat James Florio, by 4,670 to 6,171 votes. Registered voters at the time of the election were 17,225.

Assembly candidates for the 30th District this year are Democratic incumbents Buddy Fortunato and Stephen Aduabato Jr. and Republican challengers

John Kelly and Marion Crecco.

In the 1983 election race, in which votes were also cast for state senators, Fortunato and Aduabato were the winners over Kelly, George Riepe and Samuel Angelo. Out of the 15,865 registered voters in Belleville, 2,476 cast their votes for Fortunato, followed by 2,326 for Aduabato.

Kelly received 1,511 votes followed by Riepe with 1,011 votes and Angelo with only 161 votes.

In the Essex County Sheriff's race, Democratic incumbent Thomas D'Alessio will be challenged by Republican Bob Cottle.

In the 1982 sheriff's race, D'Alessio defeated challengers Cummings and Iadarola with 5,556 votes compared to 2,783 and 118 votes, respectively. Only 9,015 votes were cast out of 16,532 registered voters.

Lastly, in the Essex County Clerk's race, Democratic incumbent Nicholas Caputo will be challenged by Republican Samuel Angelo. Caputo has been the county clerk since 1960.

## Property taxes are due

Property taxes for the Township of Belleville are due Friday, Nov. 1.

The tax collector's office will be open Monday, Nov. 4, from 6:30-8:30 p.m.

Residents who do not pay their property taxes will be charged 6-18 percent interest beginning Friday, Nov. 8.

## State dismisses teacher from school district

The New Jersey Commissioner of Education has decided to dismiss a tenured teacher, charged with sexually abusing a student more than 10 years ago, from the Belleville school system.

Patrick Caporaso, a special education teacher in Belleville for approximately 13 years, was charged with having sex with a boy while he was a student in the school system, according to Lawrence Schwartz, attorney for the Belleville Board of Education.

The charges against Caporaso were made by John Sileo of Nutley who was accused of sexually abusing teen-aged boys in ritualistic-type ceremonies. Sileo, who was arrested by Nutley police in 1984, was suspected of being the leader of the "Fourth Satanic Church of the United States."

It was after being jailed that Sileo accused Caporaso of sex-

ually abusing him 10 years earlier.

As a result, the Belleville Board of Education had the charges investigated and eventually sought to have Caporaso dismissed from the school system based on Sileo's statements, Schwartz said, adding that Sileo was recognized by the judge as a credible witness.

Caporaso was suspended without pay for 120 days and thereafter, with pay, according to a teachers' contract.

A trial was held earlier this year before an administrative law judge in Newark who found Caporaso guilty of the charges, Schwartz said. However, the decision was appealed.

The case was then reviewed by the New Jersey Commissioner of Education who concurred with the administrative law judge's decision. That decision was rendered Oct. 15.

## Architects reviewed by township officials

A recommendation for an architect of the new municipal complex should be decided upon by the next board of commissioners' meeting, according to Belleville Commissioner Ralph DiRuggiero.

The commissioner, along with Mayor Michael Marotti and Township Engineer Neil Siciliano, has been reviewing four architectural firms for the past few weeks and hopes to have it narrowed down to one by the board of commissioners' meeting Nov. 12.

"We've interviewed three firms and visited their offices," DiRuggiero said. "We're now in the process of forming a recommendation. We looked at 18 architectural firms, which included some of the best from

New Jersey, New York and Pennsylvania. It was very tough to narrow it down."

DiRuggiero said that the firms selected among the 18 included the Grad Partnership in Newark and Beckhardt and Richland in New York, as well as one firm in Paterson and one with offices in Princeton and Philadelphia.

No definite site plans have been developed as of yet, but DiRuggiero said that the township is looking to keep the present town hall as a civic center and construct a new complex next to it.

"We are looking to build a complex which has Washington Avenue frontage," DiRuggiero said. "The mayor mentioned at the last public meeting that the

The ordinance, which was introduced at the board's Oct. 22 meeting, was unanimously approved on first reading.

According to MaryLoud Hood, Belleville's town clerk, the work of the purchasing board, which


accepts bids for municipal projects from outside contractors, is repetitious.

"The commissioners are the final authority for bids, so they really should deal with them," she said. "There should be a public record of bids submitted to the town."


Bids for large projects are already read at the board of



# Hartmann represents students on state committee

Claudia Hartmann, a Belleville High School senior, recently received the honor of becoming the first student to participate on the state's "Teacher of the Year" Committee.

Hartmann, an executive member of the executive board

of the New Jersey Association of Student Councils (NJASC), was selected by the New Jersey Superintendent of Schools Saul Cooperman to represent the state's student councils. She was recommended by Walter Angilly, executive director of the NJASC.

Hartmann was among

representatives from the Association of Principals, the state Parent-Teachers Association, the Academy for Advancement of Teaching, and other state educational organizations.

"I really had a lot of fun," Hartmann said. "They (committee members) treated me as an equal member and not some 17-year-old senior. They listened to my ideas and opinions. I appreciated that."

Hartmann said that the committee read through resumes of 18 county winners and selected three top candidates for the "Teacher of the Year" award. The three candidates, all women, were then asked to appear before the committee for individual interviews.

"It really came down to the interview," Hartmann said. "I had selected one teacher, but when I met her at the interview I couldn't believe it was the same person. Then when I saw one of the other teachers, I really liked her. She had a sense of what being a teacher really is."

"We all discussed what we thought of each one," she added, "and we all agreed on the one who gave the best interview."

Hartmann, besides being chosen to the "Teacher of the Year" Committee, was also selected to attend Governor's School at Monmouth College this summer where she was enrolled in the school of Public Issues and the Future of the Schools.

Each of the schools offered to students was one intensive course which included seminars and evening series. In the course, Hartmann discussed conflict and conflict resolutions, the arms race, nuclear war and

wrote a 10-page paper on U.S. intervention in Nicaragua.

"It was a lot of hard work, but we had fun," Hartmann said. "It wasn't just a tough academic experience, we had a chance to develop relationships with students from all over New Jersey. The kids I met there were great."

During her stay at the college, Hartmann also got the

chance to meet Gov. Thomas Kean and interview him, along with other students, on a cable station in South Jersey.

You would think now that these two experiences are over for Hartmann, she would just sit back and continue with her school work and activities. But that is not the case.

She is now representing Belleville in the U.S. Senate Youth


Scholarship Program in which two students from every state receive a scholarship.

## Nick Caputo

In the fall of 1960, we met a young man on Kingsland Road, Nutley, opposite the Atlantic Chemical Corporation office. He was standing alongside a white car with the lettering, "Nick Caputo for County Clerk". The man with the smiling face and twinkling eyes was waiting for the appearance of the President-to-be, John F. Kennedy, in a cavalcade visiting with Atlantic Chemical Corporation officials.

His name — Nick Caputo —

who with Kennedy won election in the 1960 polls. Twenty-five years later, Caputo returns to our Township and asks voters to approve his public record and re-elect him to office for another five years. No problem! Caputo has been an excellent, efficient Essex County Clerk — dedicated to the job of making government function. Nick Caputo has earned re-election and deserves voters' support.

There are seven questions on the ballot.

Question number 1 authorizes \$190 Million in state bonds to provide financial assistance to local government for the construction of waste water treatment systems. Question number 2 provides \$85 Million in state bonds to establish a revolving fund to make low-cost loans to local governments for the construction of resource recovery and sanitary landfill facilities. Question number 3 provides \$30 Million for grants and loans to the Pinelands area for transportation, waste water treatment, water supply and other infrastructure systems. Question number 4 permits the use of 1980 Natural Resource Bond monies for resource recovery and solid waste disposal facilities. These first four questions on the ballot certainly are entitled to a "Yes"

vote. Lord knows, our local governments are sorely in need of assistance to avoid added property tax burdens at the local level.

Question 5 permits horse race-tracks to send and receive televised pictures of races and accept betting on those races. It even permits races such as the Kentucky Derby to be televised. It would be hypocritical to vote "No" in view of the fact that we have practically every kind of racing available — every kind of betting available, throughout the State of New Jersey. The question begs a "Yes" vote.

Question number 6 provides that casino revenue fund monies shall not be used to finance homestead rebates after June 30, 1985 for senior citizens and disabled veterans. The amendment makes sense and should be over-

whelmingly approved.

Question number 7 is a constitutional amendment permitting the legislature to disapprove rules and regulations promulgated by the Executive Department of government to enforce legislation adopted by the legislature. In 1976, both Governor Tom Kean and Essex County Executive Peter Shapiro co-sponsored Assembly bill #2323 in support of the thrust of question number 7. They were both members of the Assembly in 1976, and they believed, the intent of the legislature, was better understood by the legislators who voted to create the law, than the bureaucrats who would later write the rules and regulations. This constitutional amendment properly places, in the legislature, the right to interpret its intent. The constitutional amendment makes sense and should be approved.

What's going to happen if taxes and interest on mortgages are no longer IRS deductible? What's going to happen to the widowed senior citizen who no longer has the pension income of her departed mate, but must struggle along on a few dollars doled out by Social Security? Must she sell her home because she can't afford to pay higher taxes?

Why does Belleville not give some studied thought of following the trend of many other Jersey towns and cities by creating senior citizen homes such as surrounding communities have done?

Yes! We know the seniors "knocked it down" themselves when things were fine and the sky would never fall, but now dark heavy laden clouds are fast forming a cataclysm of taxes that paint a sorrowful road ahead for many.

The county adjusts on a ratio basis, the percentage rate municipalities contribute. County services are assessed largely upon the comparison between assessed valuation of property as compared with the actual sales price of properties at today's prices.

We have learned, from reliable sources, that Belleville is down to around seventh or eighth of the lowest assessed communities in Essex County... which leads to the indication that Belleville will get "walloped" next year.

Never having been among the affluent class, it becomes difficult to quite understand why the prestige of wealth must be set as the standard of prominence... what has happened to dedication and the satisfaction of doing good service for worthy causes?

In retrospect, we go back to the period when New Jersey had one state senator from each of the 21 counties and their salary was \$500 a year and a railroad pass... respect and loyalty meant more than money, much like the teachers who used to stay with a failing child after school to help boost and improve the student's work... must money alone be man's greatest goal?

# Ancient New Year's Eve festival creates traditions of Halloween

When we think of Halloween today, we picture children dressed up in costumes walking through the streets of town shouting "trick or treat." However, the history of Halloween does not paint such a pretty picture.

The ancient Celts, from whom we take many of our Halloween traditions, celebrated Halloween (their New Year's Eve) as a festival to their god of death, Samhain. Celtic priests, called Druids, would command that certain houses be burned to the ground.

After these individual fires were exhausted, a great bonfire was torched in the center of the village. And to appease Samhain, fuel for the fire featured unlucky villagers.

At the same time the Romans were celebrating a more benign holiday, the feast of Pompona,

goddess of orchards. To glorify Pompona, the festival celebrated her bounty - apples and pumpkins, to be specific. Romans bobbed for apples, exchanged treats of fruits and nuts, and, to protect themselves from evil spirits which seemed to run rampant in those days, they hollowed out pumpkins and placed a lit candle or oil-soaked rag inside.

When Julius Caesar invaded the isles of Britain and Ireland in 55 B. C., the two holidays merged, and new customs were developed. Children began parading in the streets as goblins, but everyone avoided black cats, for it was believed that Samhain reincarnated evil souls into those sinister-looking animals.

When missionaries converted the Celts to Christianity, they tried and failed to quash belief in Samhain and practice of his

feast day. In a compromise, the feast was Christianized and became All Hallow Day, when Christians prayed for saints who do not have their own festival, the dead.

The night before, became, you guessed it, All Hallow Eve, the night to pray for the dead. In current Christian practice, Nov. 1 is All Saint's Day and Oct. 31 is All Soul's Day. And to all, today is Halloween.



## Lifeline system offers help in emergencies

An electronic device, hooked up to a telephone system, can help save someone's life.

The Lifeline system, introduced at Clara Maass Medical Center earlier this year, is a device used at home by handicapped individuals in case of emergency.

Persons, who are confined to a wheelchair or who have difficulty walking around, can call for medical assistance 24 hours a day by pressing a button worn on a chain around their neck, according to Joanna Gorczyca, director of social services at Clara Maass.

A signal, triggered by the press of the button, is sent out to the Clara Maass Emergency Room. When the signal is received, the Emergency Response Center contacts the person to access their medical needs. Each Lifeline subscriber has his or her medical needs or ailments recorded on a responder card.

If an individual is unable to answer the phone, a responder (either a neighbor or relative) is notified to check on the person, Gorczyca said, adding that medical personnel arrive at the scene within minutes.

"We had one case in which a 71-year-old woman had fallen in her bathroom," Gorczyca said. "Because she used a walker, she would have been unable to get to a phone. Instead, she pressed the button on her chain and help arrived in a matter of minutes. She wasn't seriously hurt. She just needed someone to help her up."

"Later that day, her daughter called me, quite surprised, to say that the system really works," she added. "If her mother wasn't a subscriber of the Lifeline system, she could have laid their for four to five hours unattended."

Most of the 24 persons using the Lifeline System are elderly, Gorczyca said, adding that they either live alone or have children who work.

The Lifeline System, which is co-sponsored by Clara Maass and The Mountsinclair Hospital in Montclair, can be used by anyone in the community for a \$20 rental fee per month, Gorczyca said.

The Lifeline System is one of the services provided by Clara Maass' Social Services Department, which is responsible for the discharge planning of patients in the hospital.

Clara Maass Medical Center offers many positions for people who care about people.











common additives. Model costs include foundations, roofing, substructure and superstructure.

"If you construct a new building, you'll have a maintenance-free building at the same cost," Grande said.

Board member Ernest Zoppi recommended to the board that it devote portions of its capital outlay budget for repairs of the school. He also suggested that if the board decided to construct a new building, it should go out for a bond issue.

If the board decided to opt for a bond issue, it would be borrowing money from a bank which sells shares to people in Belleville. Edward Appleton, school board secretary, said that a bond issues is similar to a home mortgage in that both are paid over a 20- to 30-year period.

Board members did not commit themselves to recommendations made by either Grande or Zoppi, however, they did agree to conduct a special meeting at the middle school on Monday, Dec. 2, at 8 p.m. to discuss the school's future.

## Buc Shots

## Fazzini's career is remembered



Part two of the Frank Fazzini years can best be told by the men who helped to mold Fazzini into the fine athlete he is today. His coaches at Belleville High, all of whom hold Frank in the highest esteem, remember him as a class young man, well ahead of his years in maturity and a leader who was very special from the first day he set foot on the field.

### Senesky Remembers the Clark Game

Current football coach John Senesky coached Fazzini from the fall of 1979 through '81. During those three seasons, Belleville posted a regular season record of 23-4, making the playoffs in '79 and '80, with a trip to the state finals in the latter season. In 1981, the Bucs "fell" to 7-2, with its two losses coming at the hands of Passaic and Seton Hall Prep, teams that would post a mark of 22-0 combined. Belleville missed the state playoffs by one half game that season.

"He was a tremendous competitor," remembered Senesky. "He was a team oriented player. As a freshman, he was an outstanding halfback and as a sophomore (on the varsity) he played mostly defensively. I guess the big switch that really put him into the lead was moving him to fullback in his junior year."

Fazzini had shown signs of maturity in his sophomore season. In the state playoffs that year, Belleville traveled to Giants Stadium to battle Union. Both teams were 7-1, with Union the slight favorite. Fazzini excelled on both sides of the field that day, fielding punts, playing in the secondary and helping the offensive backfield. The Bucs lost that game, 15-12, but everyone knew that Fazzini was a man to be reckoned with for the next two years.

The "switch" as Senesky said, came in the Passaic game of 1980, at Passaic. Frank was playing halfback coming into the game, with some success. However, the opposing defenses were holding him down somewhat and the Buc offense was sputtering in the process. With Passaic looming as a big game, Senesky switched Fazzini to the fullback spot, and the junior responded with over 100 yards rushing. From then on, he took off with a vengeance, breaking the 200 yard mark against Marist and Clark. Before the '80 season ended, Fazzini would rush for over 1,000 yards.

"He had some great games," recalled Senesky. "The Seton Hall game (3 touchdowns in a 34-8 Buc win) certainly was excellent. But the game I remember was Clark in 1980. We were 6-1 (so was Clark) and needed to win to assure a playoff berth (as did Clark). Frankie started the game with a 75 yard run off scrimmage for the first score and sealed it late with a long run to wrap up the win."

Fazzini's late score, with Belleville clinging to a 13-12 lead at the time, wrapped up a 20-12 victory and sent Belleville to the first round of the Group IV, Section II playoffs against Morris Knolls.

"He had halfback speed with fullback power," Senesky said. "Frank always got up for the big game. That Clark game was just an example."

### Zanfani Could Write a Book

George Zanfani retired at the end of the 1982 season as baseball coach at Belleville High. He, of course, coached Fazzini from 1980-82 and has a host of memories about this special athlete.

"Those were three very good years," Zanfani said. "He was a great scholar athlete. Even as a freshman, you could see how skilled he was. I was contemplating bringing him up (in 1979) because we weren't hitting too well, but I decided it would be best to wait until his sophomore season."

"His drive and attitude was that of a winner. He had that never say die spirit and always hustled. He was very special and brought to Belleville a legacy that will not be duplicated."

Fazzini's best year, statistic wise, was his junior campaign. Zanfani remembers it well.

"That year (1981) was probably the best individual performance I've seen in 20-25 years," Zanfani said. "His senior year was played on one leg, practically. He pulled a hamstring early in the season, but never quit. Also in his senior year, he didn't have the hitting he had behind him in 1981. Other teams were able to pitch around him with more success in '82."

In 1981, Fazzini hit a robust .534, with 10 homers and 48 runs batted in. He had 55 hits in 103 at bats, 37 runs scored, 10 doubles, three triples and only 11 strikeouts. Fazzini was walked 17 times, nine of which were intentional.

In his senior year, Fazzini was moved to the catching spot, a move he made voluntarily.

"He sacrificed his senior year for the team," Zanfani said. "He accepted the challenge of a new position and did his job very well."

His stats showed a .357 average, with four homers and 22 ribbies. Because of his injury, he only batted 56 times, with 20 hits. He had one triple and four doubles.

"After his junior season, anything was a let down in his senior year," said Zanfani. "It's just so hard to match the year he had in 1981."

Fazzini earned all state honors in 1981 and '82 and would continue his career at Florida State.

### Corino Coached him in the Early Years

Carl Corino, the current softball coach, was the freshman football and baseball coach during Fazzini's freshman year.

"There were some great memories with Frankie," said Corino. "He came in with a great reputation and lived up to it. He was so mature for his age, it was like dealing with an adult. He knew what was going on. Frankie played with some excellent athletes that year. Our freshman team was 9-0 and the baseball team, 19-2 with the freshman tournament championship. Frankie could play any position on football or baseball. He was such a versatile athlete."

Corino also says that Fazzini was a fine person outside the field.

"He was very coachable. He always had respect for his coaches and his teammates. I'm not surprised at all by his

## Team loses, 21-0; record falls to 2-3

# Bucs shut out by Passaic

It had started off as another typical Belleville-Passaic football game. However, the talented Passaic offense took advantage of some Buccaneer mistakes in the second quarter and went on to a 21-0 victory at Schools Stadium, Passaic.

With the loss, Belleville fell to 2-3 on the season. The Bucs hope to regroup this weekend when Clifton comes to town for a 1:30 p.m. kickoff from Municipal Stadium. After Passaic failed to get a first down, the Indians punted and Belleville took over on the Passaic 21.

Jay Marchese lost two yards on first down, but Lou Lucante gained three to the 20. Passaic was hit with a five yard penalty and Marchese gained 11 yards to the four, setting up a first and goal.

However, Belleville failed to gain the final four yards, with the Passaic defense sacking quarterback Dan Senesky on the final play.

On the other hand, Passaic finished the scoring attack by returning a punt 50 yards, breaking a number of tackles along the way, to boost the score to 21-0 following the conversion.

Despite the loss, Senesky was happy with the play of his defensive unit.

"Donald Washington did a fine job for us," the coach said.

"Our entire defensive unit was strong. Passaic, like a good team, took advantage of our mistakes. We couldn't capitalize


on our opportunities and they did."

In the uneven parallel bars,


Glunk was at it again, taking first place with an 8.35. Alise Davies took second with 7.95 and Veltre, third, with 6.95.

The Teaneck match was a difficult loss for the Lady Bucs. Belleville won the first, 15-9, then, according to its coach, fell asleep in the second set and lost,







## Fortunato's truthfulness is upheld

Test results bring uplift to campaign

By Karen A. Lynch

Results of recent lie detector and "truth serum" tests prove his innocence of bribe-taking charges and will affect his campaign in Nutley, Belleville and Bloomfield "positively," incumbent Democratic Assembly candidate Buddy Fortunato said.

In form letters mailed last week Fortunato, 39, told local voters he has taken a series of polygraph (lie detector) tests and been examined under the influence of sodium amylal at Morrisstown Memorial Hospital.

Tests were conducted in August. The assemblyman's attorney, Michael Querques of Orange, has filed a motion, with Superior Court Judge George Nicola to ask that the results be admissible as evidence in Fortunato's trial.

"Medical and legal experts who participated in hours of intense cross examination agree that I passed all the tests, that I am telling the truth, and that I am innocent," Fortunato said in his letter.

He also asked voters for "an even greater consideration" than support in his fifth bid for re-election: that they "judge (his) character as a man and as a legislator."

"My constituents know the job we've done during past years. They know I've

## Crecco criticizes voting record of both Aduhato and Fortunato

(Political release submitted by Marion Crecco)

"You can't truly represent the voters of your home district if you don't vote, or allow playing politics to affect their vital concerns," according to Marion Crecco, Republican candidate for the State Assembly.

Crecco is running in the 30th District, consisting of Belleville, Bloomfield, Cedar Grove, Glen Ridge, Montclair, Nutley and Verona.

"Judging from the public records of their votes on Assembly bills, neither of the Democrats now running give full-time attention to the best interests of the 30th District's voters," she said.

"In the last two years, Fortunato has missed, or failed to vote on, nearly 22-percent of the important bills in the Assembly. His record shows 350 times when he did not vote. "Aduhato's vote statistics are better. However, there are major differences between what he says and

how he votes.

"For instance, he claims the environment as a major concern. Yet, his voting record does not show any fight on his part to break the three-year delay created by the Democrat Assembly majority regarding passing the environmental trust bills."

"If environmental improvements are so important to him, why did he have to wait all that time to get a compromise which is only slightly different from what the Administration

proposed?" said Crecco.

"The long delay kept us from getting started as we should have. It also means that the trust money won't go as far as it would have three years ago. Everybody knows that things cost more every year, especially in construction and equipment. Just think of how much more the taxpayers will have to pay because of the delay caused by the Democrat-controlled Legislature," said Crecco.

"I assure the taxpayers of our district that my voting

record would be different. I have no commitments to special interests. My only commitment is to working hard in the interests of all our district's taxpayers, and being there to voice their needs when it comes time to vote," said Crecco.

"I consider representing the people of this district a serious public trust. If elected, I intend to honor that trust, without regard to special interests or partisan political nonsense," she said.

crime and reducing government spending in Trenton.

"There are also many other areas in state government that call for more effective leadership," said Kelly, "namely auto insurance reform, environmental clean up, care for our elderly and insuring a sense of excellence in our school system."

Kelly said he is personally disappointed in some of the campaign tactics by his Democratic opponents, saying the personal attacks on him and Nutley Savings & Loan by Stephen Aduabato was an indication of the candidate's immaturity.

"The only thing that Stephen Aduabato has not accused me of is having a job," Kelly said.

A veteran of one term in the General Assembly, Kelly is regarded as an outspoken advocate for working people and those less fortunate.

He authored the original 1983 Jobs Training Act, known as the Governor's Employment & Training Initiative, which put thousands of people to work and was signed into law on September 1,

1983.

Kelly sponsored legislation calling for the establishment of a fund to aid families with children suffering from catastrophic illnesses and major disabilities, and he co-sponsored a bill aimed at lowering our auto insurance rates.

Kelly authored one of the strongest pieces of environmental legislation in the state, a bill that would put violators of toxic waste statutes in jail. No parole.

Kelly is the father of four children, an accountant and a businessman. He serves as President of Nutley Savings & Loan. He is a trustee of his local church; he is past town chairman of the United Way, March of Dimes Campaign and he served as Essex County Chairman of The American Cancer Society Drive.

John Kelly was awarded the Hospice Citizenship Award 1983 for his work on behalf of those who provide home care for the terminally ill. He was singled out for "Assemblyman of the Year" honors in 1983 and he was cited by the Essex County Board of Chosen Freeholders for his community service.

represented them ably and give them the best possible representative they could vote for." Fortunato said in a telephone interview.

He added his constituents whom he has represented since 1977 have been "very supportive" of him and his family since charges were filed in April.

"I think people have seen through the charges and are more concerned with the issues," he said.

"I've always been responsive to the people in my district, and my legislative office has always been ranked one of the best in the state. The charges represent political gamesmanship at its worst," he said.

Fortunato cited his involvement with several Bloomfield issues including the moratorium on construction of a new McDonald's most recently, as examples of his concern for residents with respect to local community issues.

He said he has also helped the district by getting urban aid under the Clean and Safe Streets program and by working one full term for the passage of the Casino Revenue Fund bill.

Bloomfield he said, is eligible to apply for money the \$1.5 billion bill will make available.

Fortunato's wife Marion said the most painful part of the period since charges were filed was when her husband was asked to undergo the sodium amyltal test at the hospital. The physician, she said, told her the drug "could have an effect on his life," possibly in the form of an allergic reaction.

"It was very difficult for us, not knowing how he would come out of it physically," she said.

"That he would take his life in his hands to prove his innocence to his family and voters...I don't know how to express that in words."

She added her husband has an "impeccable record" and denounced the charges as "a dirty stunt to gain his legislative seat."

Fortunato said he has requested a dismissal of the charges. The state Attorney General's office is reviewing all data, including test results, but there is "no way to predict what the decision will be, the assemblyman said."

No date has been set for the trial as of this writing.
