# Estimated at \$3 million **Repairs** needed at Middle School

By Michelle Jeannotte The deteriorating condition of the Belleville Middle School would cost approximately \$3 million to repair if the the board

million to repair if the the board of education approves a refur-bishing project presented by Joseph Grande, supervisor of plant operations. According to Grande, the condition of the building is safe, however, extensive work of both the exterior ar. Interior of the building is required to meet with construction codes. "There is nothing in the

construction codes. "There is nothing in the school that meets today's codes," Grande said. Repair work earmarked by Grande includes: widening of the school's driveway: pointing and waterproofing of exterior: replacement of interior doors and classroom windows: new replacement of interior doors and classroom windows; new floors installed; ceilings drop-ped; and corridor walls painted. Grande also said that new electrical and plumbing systems should be installed, noting that the only toilet facilities located in the school are in the base-ment

"To do this kind of work, we are talking \$3 million," Grande

The New Jersey Commis-sioner of Education has decided

to dismiss a tenured teacher, charged with sexually abusing a student more than 10 years ago, from the Belleville school

system.

system. Patrick Caporaso, a special education teacher in Belleville for approximately 13 years, was charged with having sex with a boy while he was a student in the school system, according to Lawrence Schwartz, attorney for the Belleville Board of Education

for the Belleville Board of Education. The charges against Caporaso were made by John Sileo of Nutley who was accused of sexually abusing teen-aged boys in ritualistic-type ceremonies. Sileo, who was ar-rested by Nutley police in 1984, was suspected of being the leader of the "Fourth Statmic Church of the United States." It was after being jailed that Sileo accused Caporaso of sex-

Estimated costs of a new building were set at 33.5 million, according to Siciliano's report. Siciliano based his report on a preliminary budget, approx-imate square feet required, "model costs" for a two-story building and common additives which include a clock system, elevator, kitchen, auditorium and classroom seating, furniture and a sound system. Figures were estimated at \$50,000 for total area; \$2,515,000 or "model costs," \$377,500 for verhead costs, \$377,500 for (Continued on page 15)

John Kelly and Marion Crecco. In the 1983 election race, in which votes were also cast for state senators, Fortunato and Adubato were the winners over Kelly, George Riepe and Samuel Angelo. Out of the 15,865 registered voters in Belleville, 2,476 cast their votes for For-tunato, followed by 2,326 for Adubato.

Adubato. Kelly received 1,511 votes fol-lowed by Riepe with 1,011 votes and Angelo with only 161 votes. In the Essex County Sheriff's race. Democratic incumbent Thomas D'Alessio will be chal-lenged by Republican Bob Cot-tle.

In the 1982 sheriff's race, D'Alessio defeated challengers Cummings and Iadarola with 5.56 votes compared to 2,783 and 118 votes, respectively. Only 9.015 votes were cast out of 16.532 registered voters.

Lastly, in the Essex County Clerk's race, Democratic in-cumbent Nicholas Caputo will be challenged by Republican Samuel Angelo. Caputo has been the county clerk since 1960.

# Posting of signs illegal

## **Ordinance** eliminates town's purchasing board

By Kara Laczynski Belleville's purchasing board will be eliminated if an or-dinance is approved by the Bel-leville Board of Commissioners at its next meeting Nov. 12. The ordinance, which was in-troduced at the board's Oct. 22 meeting, was unanimously ap-proved on first reading. According to MaryLou Hood, Belleville's town clerk, the work of the purchasing board, which

accepts bids for municipal pro-jects from outside contractors. is repetitious. "The commissioners are the final authority for bids, so they really should deal with them," she said. "There should be a public record of bids submitted to the town." Bids for large projects are already read at the board of

A trial was held earlier this year before an administrative law judge in Newark who found Caporaso guilty of the charges. Schwartz said. However, the decision was appealed.

The case was then reviewed by the New Jersey Commis-sioner of Education who concur-red with the administrative law judge's decision. That decision was rendered Oct. 15.

> Question 5 permits horse race-tracks to send and receive tele-vised pictures of races and accept betting on those races. It even permits races such as the Ken-tucky Derby to be televised. 

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
