Kelly and Crecco win Assembly seats

Kean's coattails carry Republicans to victory

Belleville's voters, in a surprise turnaround, went along with the state's Republican sweep Tuesday, electing GOP candidates John V. Kelly and Marion Crecco to Assembly posts in the 30th Legislative District.

Kelly of Nutley, carried Belleville with 4,666 votes over Democratic incumbents Stephen N. Aduato Jr. and Buddy Fortunato. Crecco of Bloomfield garnered an impressive 4,262 votes for his first try at an Assembly seat.

Aduato came in with a third showing, garnering 4,209 votes, followed by Fortunato with 3,758 votes.

"I am not going to tell you I'm surprised," Aduato said after his defeat. "I knew this could happen. I'm 28 years old and I'm not gone forever. I promise you."

"Democracy does not mean the best people win," he said. In the governor's race, Republican incumbent Thomas H. Kean carried Belleville as well as the state with 6,625 votes to Democratic challenger Peter Shapiro's 1,950 votes.

"New Jersey is united tonight as it has never been united

before," Gov. Kean said. "I ask you to join in making New Jersey all it is and all it can be in the next four years."

In the Essex County Sheriff's race, Democratic incumbent Thomas J. D'Alessio was re-elected to that position. D'Alessio garnered 4,928 votes compared to Republican challenger Bob Cottle's 2,951 votes.

"I couldn't do the job without you men and women," D'Alessio told his campaign workers Tuesday night. "I also want to thank my campaign manager."

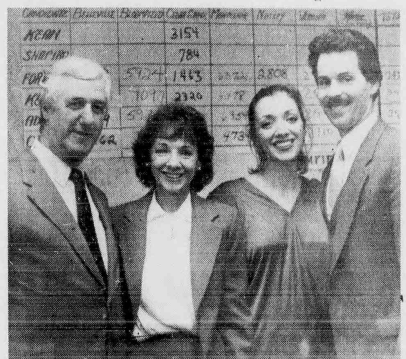
"The race was closer than expected," Jerome Greco, D'Alessio's campaign manager, said. "The Kean vote brought the numbers closer. The close numbers had us worried."

"At no point could we say we had the election in the bag," he continued. "You can't be sure until all the votes are counted."

"We worked to the last minute last night," Greco said. "We were concerned it would be this close. We're not surprised; we expected a battle because of Kean's popularity."

In the county clerk's race, Democratic Nicholas V. Caputo was re-elected to his post over

Veteran's Day parade begins 2 p.m. Sunday

The Veterans Council of Belleville will host its annual Veteran's Day Parade this Sunday, Nov. 10, at 2 p.m.

The parade will begin at the corner of Greylock Parkway and Washington Avenue and proceed along the avenue to the reviewing stand at Town Hall.

Leading off the parade will be the Belleville Police and Fire departments and the Belleville High School Marching Band, followed by the parade's grand marshal, John Loree, past national commander of the Amvets (1984-85).

Honorary grand marshal will be General Gerald Hend of the National Guard of New Jersey. Parade chairman is Pat Wynn.

Following the grand marshal and honorary grand marshal will be the American Legion Post 105 of Belleville and members of the township commission, including Mayor Michael Marotti, Commissioner of Public Affairs Michael Pizzi, Commissioner of Public Works Joseph Grande and Commissioner of Public Safety Ralph DiRuggiero.

Also marching in the parade will be members of the Belleville Board of Education, led by Superintendent of Schools Michael Nardiello, members of the Belleville Zoning Board of Adjustment, township clerk Mary Lou Hood, John V. Kelly and Buddy Fortunato.

The parade will consist of 10 divisions. Marching in Division 2 will be Andy Vyniski, aide in

charge, the United States Army Band from Fort Hamilton, Brooklyn, N.Y., the Essex County American Legion Color Guard, Essex County American Legion Commander Ray Kinsley, Amvets Post 26 of Belleville and the National Guard from Somerset, N.J.

Division 3, there will be seven service groups represented, led by Tommy Devine, aide in charge. They include: the U.S. Army Training Center Color Guard and Marching Unit from Fort Dix; the Motts Jr. High School Band from Bronx, N.Y., VFW 275 of Belleville, VFW 493 of Nutley, VFW of Cedar Grove, Pearl Harbor Survivors and the 50th Armored Division - National Guard from East Orange.

Division 4 will consist of eight service groups, including the U.S. National Guard 2nd 113 Battalion, a 36-man marching unit from Newark, Sunrises Drum and Bugle Corp, American Legion Post 105 (Commander Ray Brown), American Legion Post 299 and Auxiliary (Commander Ben Schiero and President June Janasuski), Post 70, the Roseville Avenue Armory from Newark and the U.S. National Guard 2-113 Battalion.

Division 5 will include the Department of the Army Color Guard, the 78th Division from Edison, the Youth in Action Drum Corp from the Bronx,

Once an appointment is scheduled, instructions will be sent advising what is required at that time.

Income eligibility limits are set

according to household size and monthly allowable gross income limit. They are: household of one, \$636 monthly allowable gross income limit; two, \$881; three, \$1106; four, \$1331; five, \$1556; six, \$1781; seven, \$2006; eight, \$2231; nine, \$2456; and 10, \$2681. The income eligibility limit for each additional member is \$225.

Food stamp recipients are automatically eligible.

The program is provided by the Essex County Department of Citizen Services.

BHS Guidance Office hosts Career Night

The Belleville High School Guidance Department will host more than 68 universities and trade, technical and business schools at its seventh annual Career Night Wednesday, Nov. 13, from 7:30-9 p.m.

Career Night, which gives students an opportunity to meet with representatives from a variety of colleges and vocational schools all in one night, is the biggest event the guidance department sponsors, according to Phil Esposito, guidance counselor and coordinator of Career Night.

"We invite colleges not only from New Jersey, but different places, including New York and Pennsylvania and also trade, technical and business schools and representatives from the military," Esposito said.

"Each representative has a table where students and parents can come by very informally and ask questions about the school," he added. "They can visit one table or 44 tables, it is totally up to them."

Career Night is open to all students at Belleville High School, as well as alumni who

are still not sure what they want to do, Esposito said.

"It is a very good opportunity for the students because all the information is under one roof," Esposito said, however, he added that the school offers students the opportunity to meet with representatives throughout the year.

Some of the schools expected to attend Career Night include: Adelphi University, Beaver College, Pa.; Bloomfield College; Cabrini College; Caldwell College; Essex County College; Fairleigh Dickinson University; Felician College; Fordham University; Glassboro State College; Jersey City State College; Kean College; Marist College; New Jersey Institute of Technology; New York University; Pace University; Princeton University; Providence College; Seton Hall University; St. John's University; Stevens Institute of Technology; Trenton State College; Union County College; Upsala College; and William Paterson College.

Husband shoots wife; turns gun on himself

A Belleville couple was rushed to Clara Maass Medical Center in critical condition after the man, Edwin Ehler, 58, allegedly shot his wife Lydia, 52, in the head several times and then shot himself in the forehead shortly after noon Monday.

According to Belleville Police Captain Ray Kimble, the Ehler's daughter Candy, who lives near her parents' 231 Joralemon St. home, was talking on the phone with them when she heard shots.

"She ran over to their house and found them on the floor," Captain Kimble said.

"She was frantic," Bill Lynch, a druggist at Laterza's Pharmacy on the corner of Union Avenue and Joralemon Street, said of the Ehler's daughter.

"She just kept screaming, 'Somebody help me.'"

A patrolman driving on Joralemon Street saw the daughter in the street and stopped to investigate.

"Five police cars were here not two minutes after it happened," Lynch added. "It was impressive."

No charges have been filed by the police yet, but Capt. Kimble expects that the investigation should be completed by next week.

The Ehlers have four children, two of whom are of school age. They are staying with the adult daughter, according to Capt. Kimble.

At press time Tuesday, both Mr. and Mrs. Ehler were listed in critical condition in the intensive care unit at Clara Maass, a hospital spokeswoman said.

Asbestos levels in two School 3 classrooms increase slightly, but no danger present

Airborne asbestos levels in two classrooms at School 3 have increased slightly, according to a report submitted by Belleville Board of Education Secretary Edward Appleton to the board at its Oct. 21 meeting.

In an evaluation completed May 30 by the United States Testing Co., asbestos fiber concentrations in rooms 214 and 215, which have asbestos ceilings, were rated below the 0.01 fiber per cubic centimeter of air safety limit recommended by the state Department of Health for deferred action.

If a concentration of 0.01 or more is found, the state recommends that the asbestos be removed, encapsulated (sprayed with chemicals to prevent flaking) or enclosed (covered by a barrier), according to Department of Health spokesperson Leigh Cooke.

Board members indicated they will take no action at this time to remove, encapsulate or enclose the asbestos but will continue to monitor asbestos

concentrations in the rooms.

The company rated asbestos exposure in the rooms at 16 on a scale from 0-50 when it tested School 3 in 1983. Exposure has increased to a rating of 18 according to the May 30 test.

According to the report, if the exposure number is 0-12, deferred action is appropriate. If the exposure number is 10-50 and there is severe water damage or high accessibility, removal is the best corrective action. But if water damage and accessibility factors are low, "various factors - economic and time constraints and complexity of the surface - need to be examined. Three corrective actions possible are encapsulation, enclosure, and removal."

Water damage caused by a roof leak accounts for the slight increase in the rating of the rooms, according to Appleton's report.

Schools 1, 5, 7 and 9 were also tested for asbestos in 1983, and friable, or airborne asbestos was discovered in School 7 as well as in School 3. Some enclosure

work was done at Appleton 7, according to Appleton, who at press time was unsure if all exposed asbestos had been covered there.

All other Belleville schools were tested in 1984, according to Appleton.

Friable asbestos is also present in the stairwells and nurse's room at School 3, but those areas were not evaluated in the latest test.

The 1983 test rated asbestos exposure at 16 for the nurse's room and 24 for the stairwell, according to Appleton's report.

Ceilings in many other School 3 classrooms are also asbestos, but are enclosed by drop ceilings installed after a fire in 1976.

"We enclosed most of the ceilings because of smoke damage caused by the fire," Austin McArthur, principal of School 3, said.

"The rooms where asbestos is showing are those which the fire didn't reach," he added.

Rooms 214 and 215 were

tested in May at the request of teachers, according to McArthur.

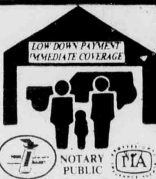
"There's no danger to anyone from asbestos," McArthur said. "If we thought that there was a hazard present, we'd be the first ones to take care of it."

An Angel's Birthday

This is about a lady who dreamed dreams, not about herself — but about her children. Happily, she has lived to see the fulfillment of those dreams. This dotting mother was so dedicated when it came to her children's welfare that she became a willing slave. The lady — my angelic mother.

It seems only yesterday I had written about her occasional feisty mother as we prepared to celebrate her 90th birthday. It appears now as she approaches her 92nd birthday, time is suddenly taking its toll.

A week away from her 92nd birthday, this super lady appears to be losing her way. No longer combative — she is resigned. Her memory, well, it used to be better. Her vision even with eyeglasses, seems imperfect. Limbs that once were firm and served her so well, refuse to carry the burden of a lighter weight. Her heart is willing — but her mind blinks in wonderment. Occasionally, her hand is outstretched for the familiar family handshake, but the strength is ebbing.

Her hearing is dimmed and a faint smile replaces the joyous sounds of her infectious laughter. Firm but considerate — accommodating but not demanding —

she never complains. Ask her how she feels, and she will answer, "Fine" — but you know her right knee was giving her excruciating, arthritic pain.

She has lived her active life establishing the highest of personal standards for her family to emulate. We have tried our best to overcome the human frailties endowed by our Creator and be the person our mother is. Looking the truth straight in the eye, we must confess our achievement is short of her standard.

And now as she slowly phases into the twilight of her life, I lean over the side of her hospital bed, and tell her as I often have, "Mom, I love you." I know her response. I have heard it many times. But now — although the words are the same — the energy is missing — her reply faintly, ever so faintly, "I love you." The biblical cadence in which the words are spoken are cherished and they will forever live in the language of our hearts.

The spirit, the love, the desire are there — but the muscles appear to be unwillng.

When told that she received a birthday greeting card from Nancy and Ronald Reagan, she feebly acknowledged the honor and quietly answered, "tell them thanks."

On this, her 92nd birthday, we thank God for the precious gift of a beautiful mother who has filled our lives with love and a good family name to cherish. Now — as she celebrates her 92nd birthday, we humbly ask our Lord to continue to allow her to enjoy the rest of her years free of pain.

Happy Birthday Mom. God loves you and so do we.

Postscript

An Angel Has Risen

Three months later, on October 27, 1985, my mother answered her last call. Meanwhile, God did answer our prayers. She lived out her life without pain, died at home — and in her sleep. These are blessings denied to many, but treasured by those of us from whom she took her final farewell. Golden Comments

The supervisor of Belleville public school plant operations, Mr. Joseph Grande, also happens to be a Belleville commissioner who resigned his post as chairman of the township planning board upon his election to the township governing body... obviously a knowledgeable person with a multiplicity of talent, especially in the field of plant maintenance. He has advised the school trustees of the deteriorating conditions of the Belleville Middle School which he regards safe, but requiring extensive work of both exterior and interior nature to meet construction code requirements.

Grande, sensible of his responsibility and concern of the school children and teachers' safety and well-being, estimates needed repairs would cost approximately \$3 million. As a commissioner he realizes that any board of education expense ultimately reflect higher township taxes. Yet, with candor and courage, he speaks out by telling the trustees that, "If you put that kind of money into the building (middle school), you'll have a \$3 million barn. I just think you're throwing good money after bad."

With customary fortitude, he boldly recommended to the board it construct a new building at an estimated cost of \$3.5 million... replete with common additives including a clock system, elevator, kitchen, auditorium and classroom seating and a sound system... convincingly Grande advised the board, "If you construct a new building, you'll have a maintenance-free building at the same cost."

We concur with Grande's view on this matter for a number of reasons; not the least of them being the fact that the township seems to have awoken from its lethargic slumber by the town commissioners' plans to erect a new town hall on Washington Avenue... a new middle school would add much to that spirit of revitalization and rebirth of community activity... times have changed and new is better. A long-term bond issue would ease the pangs of much of the added tax bite.

The site of the present middle school is on valuable Washington Avenue property which could be sold for many types of convertible usage which would offset cost of the new school while adding rates to the tax payrolls; completion of the new town hall will permit offices at the health department building to move into their new quarters, and it too can be sold at a handsome price and become taxable property. Such added tax income from these properties would substantially help meeting the terms of the township's bonded indebtedness.

It would appear that consideration might be given to the building of the new school on either Clearman Field or on near the present high school complex where ample open land exists in the rear of School 7 or land on publicly owned land in the high school or Municipal Stadium area... that campus effect at the high school entails a lot of land use that could be put to more prudent practical usage... much of the present tax-exempt land occupied by Clara Mass Medical Center would have been an ideal site for a new high school. It is regrettable that our former office holders lacked the vision to reserve a portion of this once town owned property for future use of our town or school growth needs of today.

One of the greatest ills of Belleville today is the burden it must bear by the vast number of huge tax-exempt choice properties that would have produced tax income were they not placed in a tax-exempt category.

We believe Joseph Grande's suggestion has much merit in proposing the building of a new school and that with some of the alternatives available we may "pick-up" some additional tax rates. We sorely need them.

Firefighters learn ways to handle transportation of AIDS patients

Disciplinary action taken six months ago against four Belleville firemen for refusing to transport an AIDS patient to the hospital was partially rescinded last week, according to Fireman's Benevolent Association vice president Jack Wille.

"The chief (George Sharra) and the commissioner (Ralph DiRuggiero) gave them 10 days working without pay, but five of the days were rescinded," Wille said.

The chief has taken precautions against the occurrence of such incidents in the future. Annals from the Essex County Board of Health gave two lectures to firemen about AIDS, and AIDS expert Dr. James Orn of Belleville also talked to them.

Equipment for the transportation of AIDS patients is also now available, Sharra said.

"We have gloves, masks, gowns, and bleach to sterilize units after transport," he said.

"We knew the job would be onerous when we signed on," Wille said, "but the men were concerned about (spreading AIDS) to their families."

In addition to special transport equipment, a positive pressure machine is available to resuscitate AIDS patients

without the contact of mouth-to-mouth resuscitation.

But Wille acknowledged that some emergencies may necessitate close contact with AIDS victims.

"In a fire when people are bleeding, if we have to make a quick rescue, we're on our own," he said.

Both Wille and Chief Sharra said that the fire department rarely deals with AIDS patients.

"That case (involving the refusal to transport) was our only one," Chief Sharra said.

One other person transported by the department since the incident was suspected of having AIDS, Wille said, but was later found free of the disease.

According to AIDS experts, the AIDS virus is spread by contact with the blood or semen of

an infected person. While the virus is present in saliva, no case of AIDS has been attributed to being transmitted by saliva.

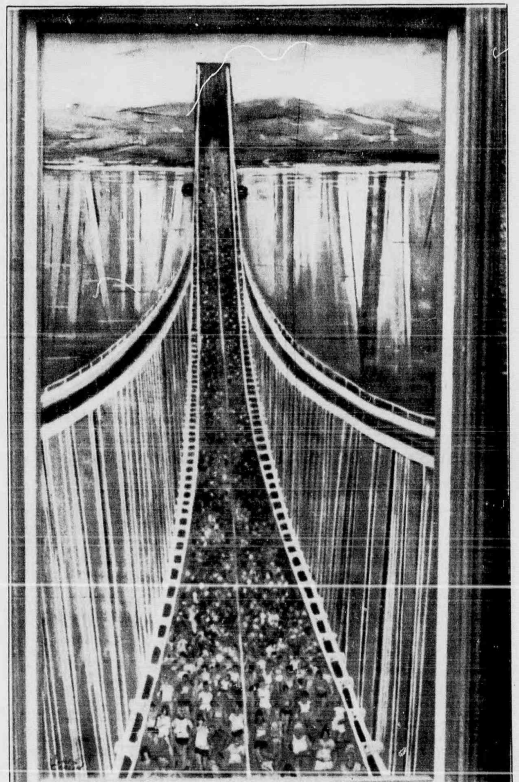

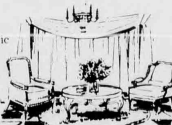

DENTALLY SPEAKING

Mrs. J. asks: What is an immediate denture?

An immediate denture is a denture inserted right after the remaining teeth are extracted. The advantage of such a technique is that the patient can leave with a set of teeth. It must be mentioned in most cases an immediate denture is only an approximate fit of the jaw. It will be loose and needs to be relined periodically to adapt better to the shrinking gum tissue. This is due to the resorption of the bone that used to hold the teeth in place. Once the teeth are removed the body uses the mineral content of the tooth holding bone elsewhere. This shrinkage comes about over a six month span. Often another denture is recommended after the gums have healed which will be more accurately fitted and the previous immediate denture can be used as a spare.

Postal Service urges customers to shop & mail early for holidays

The Postal Service is cooperating with the business community in urging customers to shop early and mail early for the holidays.

Joseph J. Benucci, Postmaster of the Newark Sectional Center, asks holiday shoppers not only to mail early, but to be certain that mail is addressed correctly, including Zip Codes, and that packages are wrapped correctly so that cards and parcels reach their destination in plenty of time.

"Normally, the Newark Sectional Center handles about 1 million pieces of First Class stamped mail per day," said

Benucci. "This is just cards and letters. During mid-December, our projected peak time, we expect this number to reach 3.4 million pieces per day."

He also recommends planning now for gifts that must travel long distances by Christmas.

"Many overseas mailing dates — including those for the armed forces stationed overseas — occur this month," he said. "Mailers can get specific information on the dates by calling the Newark Main Post Office at 596-5177 or their local post office."

"Customers should also take

care to write legible Zip coded addresses for both the address and the return address. The use of Zip Codes following the name of the particular city and state aids in processing the mail."

"During last year's holiday season we handled nearly 200 million pieces of First Class mail, both domestic and international, and our customers helped us tremendously," said Benucci. "They mailed early in the season and early in the day. We hope they cooperate with us again, and we both will have a satisfying holiday mailing season."

Buc Shots

F. Fazzini's college career highlighted



This Saturday night, the Belleville Italian American Civic Association will hold its annual dinner at the Wayne Manor. On the agenda will be the presentation of an award to Frank Fazzini, Belleville High School's outstanding athlete who has been profiled in this column over the last two weeks. The dinner will begin at 7:30 p.m. and should attract the usual large throng to help pay homage to an outstanding young man.

For those interested in attending the dinner, but have not yet purchased a ticket, you may call 751-4528 or 759-1492 for details.

We have looked over Fazzini's high school years and spoken to the coaches that helped to develop Frankie's outstanding talent and charisma. This week, a look at his tremendous college career and his promotion to the Milwaukee Brewers farm team last summer.

From All State to All American

In June of 1982, Belleville High School held its annual commencement exercises on the football field behind the school. The township bid farewell to some fine athletes that summer, people like Joe Murphy, Barb Gundry, Rose Leonidis, Eugene Cancelliere, Jeff Walsh, Anthony Guarino, Phil Cerza and of course, Fazzini.

Frank chose Florida State University to continue his baseball career. While there were schools interested in Frank for his football skills, Fazzini felt his best option would be the baseball circle and he pursued it in earnest.

In his freshman year, Fazzini hit .366, with 17 homers and 63 runs batted in. He had 86 hits, scored 65 runs and played in 69 games. His 17 homers set a Florida State record for most round trippers by a freshman. After suffering through an injury plagued baseball season in 1982, Fazzini was back in form and would be a nightmare to opposing pitchers for the next three years.

In the summer of 1983, Fazzini played in the prestigious Cape Cod League. All he did there was drive in 40 runs in 42 games. It was quite obvious that this young man had the tools necessary to become one of the finest collegiate baseball players of his time.

His sophomore year, 1984, was even better. He finished second in the nation in homers, with 29. He drove home 89 runs, stole 18 bases, hit .325, scored 87 runs and collected 103 hits. His 89 ribbies ranked him sixth nationally, his 87 runs placed him fifth nationally. He had three multiple home run games in 1984 and hit three homers in a game against Southern Mississippi, while driving home five runs. He was 11 for 26 in the Metro Tournament, including a five for six outing in the championship game. He had ten game winning hits, which tied for the team lead. Playing the outfield, Fazzini had 13 assists, most by a Florida State outfielder.

In addition, he earned All American honors for his performance, but some experts felt he could be mixed in the '85 draft. Some scouts felt his size, 5-9 and 200 pounds, would hurt him. However, Fazzini had different ideas and dedicated the 1985 season to be his best ever.

What a Year

Fazzini came through like gangbusters in the spring of 1985. He belted 33 home runs, drove in an incredible 118 and hit a robust .413. Fazzini stole 19 bases in 23 attempts, had a fielding average of .945, collected 147 hits, scored 109 runs and had 21 doubles. A junior, he was the team captain of the Seminoles and the Milwaukee Brewers decided it was well worth the "risk" to draft him. Once again, Fazzini paid instant dividends to the Brewers.

Gold Sox, Here I Come

Fazzini earned All American honors in 1985, but he was just beginning his work. Upon being drafted by the Brewers, Fazzini was sent to Helena and he continued his torrid pace. Playing for the Gold Sox he quickly collected three game winning ribbies, drove home 18 runs and hit .458. Not bad for a 19th round pick that scouts felt might not be able to play with the big boys because of his size.

"As far as homers go, I don't look for them," Fazzini told an Helena newspaper. "I look for the RBI's. I think that's the key. They always stick out in my mind. And the guys have been getting on base in front of me all the time."

Following a Gold Sox victory over Butte, 5-3, Fazzini received a welcomed telephone call. He had just finished a 3 for 5 day, with two doubles and an RBI. He had been batting .457, with 21 ribbies in 12 games. The Brewers figured this young man was ready for the next plateau.

"We're sorry he's leaving," Gold Sox coach Mike Easom had told a local paper at the time, "but I'm glad for him."

Fazzini's next assignment was Beloit, a single A affiliate. Brewers farm director Bruce Manno explained the decision to promote Fazzini.

"We've had an injury (in Beloit) and another situation where an outfielder was really struggling and we released him. So, we were down to three outfielders. We felt that Frank was the most advanced hitter (at Helena) and that he will not be over matched in Beloit. He'll play left field every day."

In one year, Fazzini went from an All American at Florida State to one of the Milwaukee Brewers bright up and coming prospects. Surprised? Well, anyone who knows Frank Fazzini and has seen him play through the years realizes what a tremendous young man he is. Chances are good that next season, more will be heard about Frankie. This Saturday, the township will get a chance to congratulate him on these tremendous accomplishments.

Tough defensive game

Bucs lose to Mustangs, 6-0

Playing a fine defensive game once again, the Belleville football team lost a tough 6-0 decision to conference rival Clifton at Municipal Stadium last Saturday afternoon. The game was the annual homecoming contest, played on a blustery day. The loss lowered the Buc-

caners record to 2-4.

Belleville hopes to get back on the winning track this weekend when Paterson Kennedy comes to town for a 1:30 p.m. kickoff. This game marks the final home contest of the '85 campaign for Belleville. The Bucs will conclude the season

with games at Montclair (November 16) and Nutley on Thanksgiving Day.

With Paterson Kennedy, Belleville will be playing a team that is high on quality but low on quantity. Kennedy has just 30 players on its entire roster, but they play every team tough. Like Belleville, they are 2-4, but as usual, will be a difficult foe.

Last week Kennedy lost to Nutley, 7-0 and earlier this season, defeated Clifton, 28-10.

"There isn't a break in the conference schedule," said head coach John Senesky. "Kennedy is a very good football team. They have an outstanding quarterback, a fine receiver and play very good defense. We'll have our hands full, no doubt."

As for the Clifton defeat, Senesky was very happy with his team's effort.

"The kids played with a lot of heart, they played a good ball game. It was the same type of game as the Bergen Catholic game this year (a 3-0 loss at the final gun). We played solid defense throughout the game, but lost on a late touchdown."

In Clifton, Belleville was facing a team loaded with size on the front line.

"They were huge, there is no other way to describe Clifton," Senesky said. "They had guys 240, 250 and 260 pounds on the line. We had trouble moving the

ball on the offense, but credit our defense for plugging the holes and putting pressure on their quarterback. We played very well against them."

Belleville held the Mustang attack to 171 total yards, but the Mustang 'D' did even better, limiting Belleville to 113 total yards.

The lone touchdown came late in the fourth quarter. Quarterback Jeff Spilsbury, seeing his first extended action of the season, threw an interception. Clifton then received 15 additional yards at the end of the play when Belleville was cited for a personal foul call.

Starting from the Belleville 49, the Mustangs used six plays, all running, to reach pay dirt. The big plays in the series was a 20 yard run by Jack Belanger and a 16 yard gallop by John Silva. Silva would be the leading rusher in the afternoon, gaining 79 yards in 20 tries.

Silva also scored the lone TD, a three yard run on third and goal. The Mustang back was hit in the backfield, but broke loose for the game winner.

The Belleville offense had one serious drive when Lou Lucante hit Jaime Galio on a 37 yard option pass to the Mustang 30 yard line. The drive stalled there, however.

Galio was the top receiver (Continued on page 16)

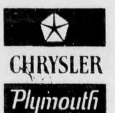

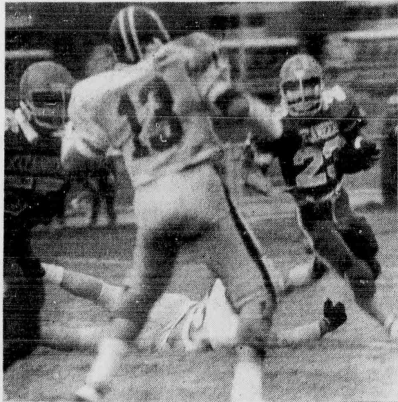

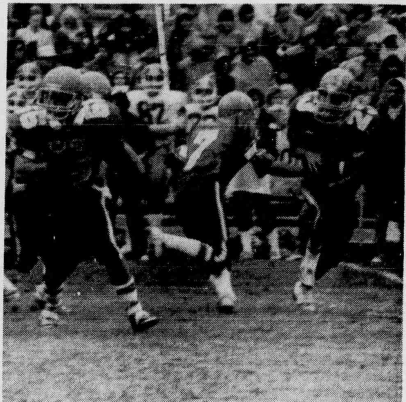

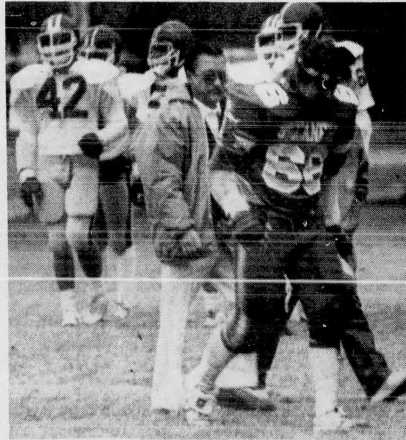
