Kean's coattails carry Republicans to victory

Belleville's voters, in a surprise turnaround, went along
with the state's Republican
sweep Tuesday, electing GOP
candidates John V. Kelly and
Marion Crecco to Assembly
posts in the 30th Legislative
District.
Kelly of Nutley carried Bol.

District.
Kelly of Nutley, carried Bel-leville with 4,666 votes over Democratic incumbents Stephen
N. Adubato Jr. and Buddy For-tunato. Crecco of Bloomfield garnered an impressive 4,202 votes for her first try at an As-sembly seat.
Adubato came in with a third
Adubato came in with a third

sembly seat.

Adubato came in with a third showing, garnering 4,209 votes, followed by Fortunato with 3,758

votes.

"I am not going to tell you I'm surprised," Adubato said after his defeat. "I knew this could happen. I'm 28 years old and I'm not gone forever. I

and I'm not gone forever. I promise you.
"Democracy does not mean the best people win," he said.
In the governor's face, Republican incumbent Thomas H. Kean carried Belleville as well as the state with 6.625 votes to Democratic challenger Peter Shapiro's 1,560 votes.
"New Jersey is united tonight as it has never been united

before," Gov. Kean said. "I ask you to join in making New Jersey all it is and all it can be in

Jersey all it is and all it can be in the next four years."

In the Essex County Sheriff's race, Democratic incumbent Thomas J. D'Alessio was reelected to that position. D'Alessio garmered 4.928 votes compared to Republican challenger Bob Cottle's 2.951 votes.

"I couldn't do the job without you men and women." D'Alessio told his campaign workers Tuesday night. "I also want to thank my campaign manager."

day night. "I also want to thank my campaign manager."

"The race was closer than expected." Jerome Greco, D'Alessio's campaign manager, said.
"The Kean vote brought the numbers closer. The close numbers had us worried.

numbers had us worried.

At no point could we say we had the election in the bag," he continued. "You can't be sure until all the votes are counted.

"We were concerned it would be this close. We're not surprised; we expected a battle because of Kean's popularity."

In the county clerk's race, Democratic Nicholas V. Caputo was re-elected to his post over

"She just kept screaming,

A patrolman driving on
Joralemon Street saw the
daughter in the street and stopped to investigate.
"Five police cars were here
not two minutes after it happened," Lynch added. "It was
impressive."

The Ehlers have four
children, two of whom are of
school age. They are staying
with the adult daughter, according to Capt. Kimble.

Asbestos levels in two School 3 classrooms increase slightly, but no danger present

Airborne asbestos levels in
two classrooms at School 3 have
increased slightly, according to
a report submitted by Belleville
Board of Education Secretary
Edward Appleton to the board at
its Oct. 21 meeting.

In an evaluation completed May 30 by the United States Testing Co., asbestos fiber con-centrations in rooms 214 and 215, which have asbestos ceilings, were rated below the 0.01 fiber per cubic centimeter of air safety limit recommended by the state Department of Health for deferred action.

If a concentration of 0.01 or or more is found, the state recom-mends that the asbestos be removed, encapsulated (sprayed with chemicals to prevent flaking) or enclosed (covered by a barrier), according to Depart-ment of Health spokesperson Leiph Cooke ment of He Leigh Cooke.

Board members indicated they will take no action at this time to remove, encapsulate or enclose the asbestos but will continue to monitor asbestos

concentrations in the rooms.

The company rated asbestos exposure in the rooms a: 16 on a scale from 0-50 when it tested School 3 in 1983. Exposure has increased to a rating of 18 according to the May 30 test.

According to the report, if the exposure number is 0-12, deferded action is appropriate. If the exposure number is 10-50 and there is severe water damage or high accessibility removel is the best corrective action. But if water damage and accessibility factors are low, "various factors are low," various factors are low, "various factors are seconomic and time constraints economic and time constraints and complexity of the surface -need to be axamined. Three three corrective actions possible are encapsulation, enclosure, and removal

Water damage caused by a roof leak accounts for the slight increase in the rating of the rooms, according to Appleton's

Schools 1, 5, 7 and 9 were also tested for asbestos in 1983, and friable, or airborne asbestos was discovered in School 7 as well as in School 3. Some enclosure

posed asbestos had been covered there.

All other Belleville schools were tested in 1984, according to Appleton.

Friable asbestos is also present in the stairwells and nurse's room at School 3, but those areas were not evaluated in the latest test.

were not evaluated in the latest test.

The 1983 test rated asbestos exposure at 16 for the nurse's room and 24 for the stairwell, according to Appleton's report.

Ceilings in many other school of classrooms are also asbestos, but are enclosed by drop ceilings installed after a fire in 1976.

"We enclosed most of the ceilings because of smoke damage caused by the fire." Austin McArthur, principal of School 3, said.

"The rooms where asbestos is showing are those which the fire didn't reach," he added. Rooms 214 and 215 were


tested in May at the request of teachers, according to McArthur.
"There's no danger to anyone from asbestos," McArthur said. "If we thought that there was a hazard present, we'd be first ones to take care of it."

Resident asks school board to oppose Gay Rights Bill

To the editor:

Residents of Belleville should be aware that shortly after this week's election, the New Jersey State Assembly will vote on Assembly Bill 1-1721 (the Gay Rights Bill).

The supervisor of Belleville public school plant operations, Mr. Joseph Grande, also happens to be a Beleville commissions to be a Beleville commission who resigned his post as chairman of the township planning board upon his election to the township governing body...obviously a knowledgeable person with a multiplicity of talent, especially in the field of plant maintenance. He has advised the school trustees of the deteriorating conditions of the Belleville Middle School which he regards safe, but requiring extensive work of both exterior and interior nature to meet construction code requirements.

Grande, sensible of his responsibility and concern of the school children and teachers' safety and well-being, estimates needed repairs would cost approximately 33 million As a commissioner he realizes that any board of education expense ultimately reflect higher township taxes. Yet, with candor and courage, he speaks out yet lelling the trustees that, "If you put that kind of money into the building middle school), you'll have a \$3 million barn. I just think you're throwing good money after you're throwing good money after bad."

With customary fortitude, he boildy recommended to the board it construct a new building at an estimated cost of \$3.5 million ... replete with common additives including a clock system, elevator, kitchen, auditorium and classroom seating and a sound system ... convincingly Grande advised the board, "If you construct a new building, you'll have a maintenance free building at the same cost."

We concur with Grande's view on this matter for a number of reasons; not the least of them being the fact that the township seems to have awaken from its lethargic slumber by the town commissioners' plans to erect a new town hall on Washington Avenue... a new middle school owould add much to that spirit of revitalization and rebirth of community activity... times have changed and new is better. A long-term bond issue would ease the pangs of much of the added tax bite.

The site of the present middle school is on valuable Washington Avenue property which could be sold for many types of convertible usage which would offset cost of the new school while adding ratables to the tax payrolls; completion of the new town hall will permit offices at the health department building to move into their new quarters, and it too can be sold at a handsome price and become taxable property. Such added tax income from these properties would substantially help meeting the terms of the township's bonded indebtedness.

It would appear that consideration might be given to the building of the new school on either Clearman Field or on or near the present high school complex where ample open land exists in the rear of School 7 or land on publicly owned land in the high school or Municipal Stadium area. that campus effect at the high school or that is a total to the school or the school of the school of land use that could be put to more prudent practical usage . much of the present tax-exempt land occupied by Clara Maass Medical Center would have been an ideal site for a new high school. It is regretable that our former office holders lacked the vision to reserve a portion of this once town owned property for future use of our town or school growth needs of today.

One of the greatest ills of Belleville today is the burden it must bear by the vast number of hughe tax-exempt choice properties that would have produced tax income were they not placed in a tax-exempt category.

We believe Joseph Grande's suggestion has much merit in proposing the building of a new school and that with some of the aiternatives available we may 'pick-up' some additional tax ratables. We sorely need them.

"We have gloves, masks, pwns, and bleach to sterilize te units after transport," he sid.

"We knew the job would be engerous when we signed on." Wile said, "but the men were encerned about (spreading ADS to) their families."
In addition to special transort equipment, a positive presers e machine is available to asuscitate AIDS patients

without the contact of mouth-to-mouth resuscitation.

But Wille acknowledged that some emergencies may neces-sitate close contact with AIDS

victims.

"In a fire when people are bleeding, if we have to make a quick rescue, we're on our own," he said.

Both Wille and Chief Sbarra said that the fire department rarely deals with AIDS patients.
"That case (involving the refusal to transport) was our only one," Chief Sbarra said.
One other person transported by the department since the incident was suspected of having AIDS, Wille said, but was later found free of the disease.





Service bureau offers family counseling

The Family Counseling Service Bureau has been serving Belleville families since 1928. Originally established as the Community Service Bureau of Belleville, it was later changed to the Family Counseling Service of Belleville, a name more accurately describing its functions.

In 1969 the bureau became part of the Family Service Bureau of Newark. Today, the Family Service Bureau of Newark. Belleville and West Hudson offers confidential counseling and assistance for problems arising out of almost any interpersonal situation.

The bureau is a beneficiary of the United Way of Essex and West Hudson which is currently conducting a campaign to raise \$10 million. Last year it served 925 families from Belleville.

925 families from Belleville.

"We offer counseling on all types of problems that involve that family." Edward V. Kilduff, executive director of Family Service Bureau, said. "Today, families face a great range of problems. There is a rise in the incidence of child abuse and neglect. We also see the number of single parent families on the increase. Many factors contribute to family problems.

"People should be more aware that counseling does help." he continued. "But there is no success unless people work at it. Getting them to look at their problem and then work toward solving it is the first step to success."


Family Service Bureau of Newark, Belleville and West Hudson is staffed by 17 full-time counselors in addition to Mr. Kilduff who works as a counselor as well as executive director. Fees for counseling are based on income, family size and ability to pay.

The bureau is qualified as an outpatient psychiatric center and offers complete counseling

"The United Way of Essex and West Hudson provides us with 48 percent of our budget," Kilduff said. "If not for that money, our service wouldn't be nearly as effective."

"DIAL-1" is offered as a result of the "Equal Access"

After the first selection, there will be a charge levied by New Jersey Bell to change long distance companies. Postmaster gives tips for holiday deliveries

Newark Postmaster Joseph J. Benucci has half a dozen "dos" and "don'ts" for customers who want to be sure their holiday parcels get delivered.

• Don't box yourself in - use the right container. Boxes must be adequate in size for the items being mailed and provide enough space for cushioning material. They must also be strong enough to hold the weight of their contents. If the box has adequate space for an address (cross out confusing information), it is not necessary to wrap it in paper. If you use paper, however, be sure it is equivalent to the kind used in grocery bags (60-pound weight). Fiberboard tubes and similar long packages are acceptable if their length does not exceed 10 times their girth. · Don't box yourself in

• Give yourself some cushion. Cushioning absorbs and distributes shock and vibration. Examples of good cushioning materials are foamed plastics, corrugated cardboard and loose fill material such as polystyrene, popcorn or shredded newspaper. Loose fill material should completely gover the items being mailed. cover the items being mailed

Close parcels up right. Use tape, not string or rope, to close

packages. Cellophane and masking tape should not be used. Pressure sensitive, filament-reinforced tape is recommended and should be wrapped around the parcel at least twice.

• Addresses are important. You spend a fortune on wrapping, but your package will never reach its destination if it is not addressed right. Print or type the address clearly on one side of the parcel only. It is also a good idea to put the name and address inside the package in case the address label comes off.

• Don't mail your pet elephant. Packages must not exceed 70 pounds. They must also be at least 3½ inches wide and 5 in-ches long, and total length and girth cannot exceed 108 inches.

Don't overinsure. If your parcel is valuable, you might want to insure it, but insure it only for its actual value. The Postal Service pays claims based on the actual value of lost or damaged items and not a higher insured amount.

"If you follow these six sug-gestions, it'll help us get your package where it's going on time, in good shape," Post-master Benucci said.





Postal Service urges customers to shop & mail early for holidays

The Postal Service is cooperating with the business community in urging customers to shop early and mail early for the holidays.

Joseph J. Benucci, Postmaster of the Newark Sectional Center, asks holiday shoppers not only to mail early, but to be certain that mail is addressed correctly including Zip Codes, and that packages are wrapped correctly so that cards and parreks reach their destination in plenty of time.

"Normally, the Newark Sectional Center handles about 1 million pieces of First Class stamped mail per day," said

Benucci. "This is just cards and letters. During mid-December, our projected peak time, we expect this number to reach 3.4 million pieces per day."

He also recommends planning now for gifts that must travel long distances by Christmas.

"Many overseas mailing dates—including those for the armed forces stationed overseas—occur this month," he said. "Mailers can get specific information on the dates by calling the Newark Main Post Office at 596-5177 or their local post office.

"Customers should also take

care to write legible Zip coded address for both the address and the return address. The use of Zip Codes following the name of the particular city and state aids us in processing the mail.
"During last year's holiday season we handled nearly 200 million pieces of First Class mail, both domestic and international, and our customers helped us tremendously," said Benucci. "They mailed early in the season and early in the day. We hope they cooperate with us again, and we both will have a satisfying holiday mailing season."

We have looked over Fazzini's high school years and spoken to the coaches that helped to develop Frankie's outstanding talent and carisma. This week, a look at his tremendous college career and his promotion to the Milwaukee Brewers farm team last summer.

From All State to All American
In June of 1982, Belleville High School held tits annual commencement exercises on the football field behind the school. In his summer of 1983, Fazzini played in the prestigous Cape Cod League. All he did there was drive in 40 runs in 42 games. It was quite obvious that this young man had the tools necessary to become one of the finest collegiate baseball players of his time.

His sophomore year, 1984, was even better. He finished second in the nation in homers, with 29. He drove home 89 runs, stole 18 bases, hit 325, scored 87 runs and collected 103 hits. 1984 firsh is time.

His 89 ribbies ranked him sixth nationally, his 87 runs placed him fifth nationally. He had three multiple homer run and the health of the team lead. Playing the outfield, Fazzini had 13 assists, most by a Florida State outfielder.

In addition, he earned All American honors for his performance, but some experts felt he could be nixed in the 635 draft. Some scouts felt his size, 5-9 and 200 pounds, would




