Chairperson gives positive oral report

Middle States committee completes three-day evaluation at high school

A three-day evaluation, which took two-and-a-half years of preparation, has been completed at Belleville High School.

The three-day study, conducted by a 24-member committee of the Middle States Evaluation organization, was completed Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of last week. All disciplines of the school, from curriculum to the plant operation, was evaluated by the committee.

Each of the 24 committee members, led by Louis Scott III of Pennsylvania, evaluated a discipline in which he or she was experienced, according to Joseph Ciccone, Belleville High School principal.

During their three-day stay at the high school, committee members visited every classroom, sat in on every class lesson, observed each teacher twice and participated in the cafeteria services, Ciccone said.

"The committee basically

observed and evaluated the whole building and every process that takes place within," he said.

While visiting the school, the committee met with 20 students selected by the school administration as well as 20 students selected by its members.

"One of the things that both groups discussed with the committee was their feeling that the staff really cares about what happens to them," Ciccone said. "Mr. Scott, in his oral report to the staff on Friday afternoon, said that the committee was very impressed with the student-teacher relationships at the high school."

In his oral report, which he called superficial, Mr. Scott also commended the staff on their work in updating the curriculum guides and Gus Leming, school custodian, on the physical condition of the school.

Mr. Scott, who will now compile all the reports filed by the committee members, said that

it was too soon to digest all the information and be as specific as staff members would want him to be.

A formal, written report will be sent to the school in approximately two months, Mr. Ciccone said. At that time, he will

Fifty committee members have been asked to go to the meeting, according to committee chairperson Vincent Frantantoni.


"We support the idea of ex-

Recreational grants awarded to township and palsy center

Nearly \$2,000 has been granted by the state to Belleville for funding of recreational programs for physically and mentally handicapped residents, ages 13-35.

Two Handicapped Recreational Opportunity Grants for \$1,000 and \$870 were awarded on the contingency that the Township of Belleville match each \$8 of grant money with \$1 of municipal funds.

A spokesman for Mayor Michael Marotti, director of the Recreation Department, indicated that the township will provide the \$374 in matching funds required by the state.

The Cerebral Palsy Center of Essex and West Hudson will administer the \$1,000 appropriation

by sponsoring parties and weekend day trips for physically handicapped Bellevillites.

"We try to run programs that are both culturally educational and enjoyable," Phyllis Burgess, executive director of the Center, said.

Tours of Jamaica Bay in Queens, N.Y., Gateway National Park, Manhattan's South Street Seaport, the Bronx Zoo and the Papermill Playhouse in Millburn are a few of the events which the Center will offer during 1986.

A Christmas party is also being planned, Burgess said. All events are free of charge and transportation is provided between the Center and field trip locations.

Eligible residents will be notified by mail of upcoming events. Seating for transportation on day trips is limited to 25 persons and is allocated on a first-come, first-serve basis.

Anyone interested in having his or her name added to the Center's mailing list should call Burgess at 751-0200 or write the Center at 7 Sanford Ave., Belleville, 07109.

Belleville's Recreation Department will also sponsor a Christmas party and several outings in 1986 with the second Handicapped Person's Recreational Opportunities Grant of \$870.

Both mentally and physically handicapped residents, ages 13-35, are eligible for these free programs. For information about specific events, call the Mayor's office at 450-3322.

School 4 implements pilot program which tests students on math skills

Students at School 4 are in the process of completing a pilot supplemental testing program which measures individual capabilities.

The test, Individual Criterion Reference Testing (ICRT), measures a student's achievement against a set of math objectives, according to Pat Forte, School 4 principal. Forte appeared before the Belleville

Board of Education Monday night to explain the pilot testing program.

"Students will be tested on his or her functional level relative to how they could master a specific concept/objective," Forte said.

Forte said this particular type of supplemental testing, which emphasizes math concepts, is a pilot program at School 4. However, he added,

this type of testing has been conducted at schools 9 and 10 over the past few years. Those tests,

however, involved both reading and math concepts, he added.

Applicant withdraws flea market proposal

An application for a flea market in the Valley section Belleville was withdrawn at the Zoning Board of Adjustment's meeting last Wednesday.

The application, filed by Al Bonadonna, received opposition from the public, particularly those parents of students who attend School 9 (one block away from the proposed flea market).

According to Mr. Bonadonna's attorney, Bob Gascione of Belleville, the application was withdrawn in face of the opposi-

tion. The Belleville Board of Education, along with parents of School 9, objected to the proposed flea market because of its proximity to the school.

"We feel that it would endanger the children who attend School 9," Gabe Nazzola, school board member, said after a zoning board meeting Oct. 1.

However, Mr. Bonadonna reassured both the board and parents that the flea market



Belleville Health Department staff attends AIDS workshop

Belleville Department of Public Health professionals attended an AIDS workshop at the Bloomfield Civic Center Thursday, Nov. 14.

AIDS experts spoke on the nature of the disease, proper care techniques for AIDS patients and prevention of the

spread of AIDS to health care workers.

More than 50 municipal health care workers from Bloomfield, Nutley, East Orange and Belleville attended the seminar.

Nancy Drew, an infectious disease control nurse at East

Orange General Hospital, blamed the media for the hysteria surrounding the disease.

"No one reading an article can be rational anymore about AIDS," she said.

Drew said that health care workers are at low risk of contracting the disease if they take proper precautions against direct contact with bodily fluids of AIDS patients.

"Even if you are accidentally stuck with an AIDS-contaminated needle, the chances are very slight that you will hit a major vein and contract the disease," she said.

Drew advised, however, that needles be disposed of in puncture-resistant containers immediately after use, and not broken in half as is customarily done.

"There is a greater risk of injury when the nurse has to break the needle," she added.

Drew also urged health care workers to wear surgical gowns, gloves and masks when expecting to come in contact with blood or blood products. She noted that East Orange General has recently changed its policy on wearing surgical attire.

"We don't gown and mask unless we expect to come in contact with body fluids," she said. "We felt it was ridiculous to get all dressed up just to talk to a patient or take his blood pressure, and then when he is discharged he just walks out in public, where no one is wearing sterile clothes."

Drew noted that her hospital often monitors the progress of AIDS patients after they are released.

"We had one man who didn't have a home, so we worked very

hard to find a boarding house that would accept him," she said, pointing out that all prospective landlords were informed of his illness.

"We finally found one willing to take him, but he left shortly after moving in," she continued.

"He spent a year-and-a-half sleeping in cars left open overnight in towns all over this area. We were amazed that he never got sick, considering his dis-

ease."

East Orange Hospital has treated 58 people for AIDS, according to Drew.

Jeanine Cuchelli, a Belleville Health Department nurse, attended the workshop.

"I found out a lot about where to refer AIDS patients - which doctors and hospitals," she said.

"It was interesting to learn about the specifics of caring for AIDS patients, although I

wouldn't be doing that here because we only deal with routine office visits," she added.

When asked if the disease itself causes her anxiety, Cuchelli replied, "It frightens me. It frightened me more when I was working at Beth Israel Hospital in Newark. I worked in maternity and we dealt with blood all the time. You never know who has it or who is developing the disease."

No arraignment date scheduled for Polizzi

No arraignment date has been set in the rape-assault indictment of Nutley resident Francesco Polizzi, owner of the Belleville businesses Casa Polizzi Restaurant and Polizzi Builders and co-owner of the Belleville Motor Lodge.

Polizzi is also standing trial in New York for the "pizza connection" heroin smuggling case, in which he and 20 others are accused of moving \$1.6 billion worth of narcotics into the United States.

Polizzi and Newark resident Joseph Baio were indicted Oct. 25 in connection with the sexual assault of a 15-year-old girl between March and June. They were arrested on three counts - sexual assault, endangering the welfare of a child and promoting prostitution.

The alleged crimes took place at Polizzi's motel, according to Belleville Chief of Police George Lister.

Crimes involving more than one girl are alleged to have taken place at the Belleville

Motor Lodge, Lister said.

Bail was set at \$25,000 for each accused offender, and they were released on bail bonds of \$2,500.

The Hillsdale Police Department turned over the information leading to the arrests of Polizzi and Baio to the Belleville Police Department, which then informed the Essex County Prosecutor's Office. Arrests were made by the Prosecutor's Office.

An investigation of runaway girls living in Hillsdale led to the arrests of Polizzi and Baio, Hillsdale Police Sgt. Cann said.

Sgt. Cann, noting that the case is still pending a trial, would not release any other information about his department's part in the case.

"I wouldn't want to jeopardize the prosecution's efforts by leaking important information before the trial," he said.

An arraignment should take place within in the next few weeks, Essex County Assistant Prosecutor Robert Laurino said.

A beautiful occasion took place on November 1, 1985. In typical divisive fashion, which much characterizes the climate of Belleville's response to revolving public matters, discord erupted at both public meetings of the school board and the town commission when citizens voiced views of variance with proposed or suggested plans concerning the site location of the new town hall edifice and the future of the Middle School.

Concern was expressed over the cost effect and the increased taxes resulting therefrom, were a new school constructed. Board President Dr. Anthony D'Agostino announced the scheduled meeting to discuss plans for the Middle School will be held at the school Dec. 2 at 8 p.m.

The forbidding fear of increased taxes, especially with the President's proposal to eliminate the interest and tax deductions on homes, naturally evokes concern in the minds of all taxpayers. This, however, does not alter the reality that our public schools must be properly maintained in a cost-effective manner... a point cogently accentuated by Mr. Joseph Grande, supervisor of school plant operations.

Were it deemed impractical or cost prohibitive to either refurbish the present Middle School or build a new one... go back to the old 8 - 4 school system. Many educators support and prefer this educational policy.

The properties owned by the school board at the Middle School site and the School 1 site could be sold, with the board moving into the new town hall. The board then could use the sale money to enlarge and improve all the other local public schools... the township, upon completion of the new town hall, could move the offices presently at the health building at Washington Avenue and Jerusalem Street into that building, thus, providing a centralized township government; the health building could then be sold, bringing in considerable money... once sold these properties become ratables bringing in taxes.

We were sternly reminded that our last council neglected to include several of Belleville's outstanding Republican town chairmen who played major roles in the past decades' GOP victories. We're sorry for that so there they are: Stony Machette, Gordon Gant and Rudy Zoller in that order.

In fact, Rudy Zoller was instrumental in bringing Earl Warren into Belleville back on Oct. 29, 1952 when he was Governor of California. They had lunch at the Forest Hills restaurant just over the Belleville line by the old Erie Railroad tracks. Kondreck Studios took pictures, and they were given a Belleville police escort to New York; Eddie Meade was the officer.

That was the year Ike Eisenhower was nominated and elected President bearing Adlai Stevenson. Earl Warren was named Chief Justice of the Supreme Court in 1953 and served 16 years until 1969.

Perhaps the resounding Kean-led Republican victory sweep galvanized some of the old timers, who participated in those idyllic triumphs of the GOP, into meditative memories of the halcyon days when the Grand Old Party won all the marbles in the great game of politics.

It is the shifting sands of uncertainty and the caprices of voters that makes difficult the destinies of those who seek or hold public office... much like the weather's uncertain propensities, it's difficult to predict the trend projections of politics with any great degree of certainty.

Despite the reassurances, parents continued to object to the flea market.


"We're going to fight this all the way," Mrs. Kathy Watkowski, School 9 P.T.A. executive member, said at the Oct. 1 meeting.





Mrs. B. asks, "I've heard that my headaches can be related to my bite. Is this true?"
Yes, Mrs. B., this is very true. Some headaches are caused by muscle spasms very similar to "charley horses" that you get in your legs. What happens to a muscle after extended use is that lactic acid builds up inside the muscle, preventing it from functioning properly and then it begins to hurt.

When something causes the bite to change: either loss of teeth, a fractured jaw, or arthritis in the joint, the teeth begin shifting to adapt to the change. When the teeth shift, some may strike before others. To compensate, the muscles remain tight always under stress, to avoid hitting the premature tooth. These muscles begin to hurt, and the pain is felt as a headache.

St. Peter's Church hosts SHARE registration

St. Peter's Church in Belleville will be a host organization for SHARE, a group dedicated to providing a method for the hungry to help themselves.

The Self-Help and Resource Exchange (SHARE) was begun in 1983 by Rev. Carl Shelton, a Deacon in the Catholic Diocese of San Diego. More than 2 million pounds of food were distributed to 31,000 families in San Diego and Imperial counties of California, five Western counties of Virginia and Chicago through the SHARE program.

Host organizations, including churches, labor unions, schools and community groups assist in registration and the distribution of food to people in their neighborhoods.

Anyone needing food becomes a SHARE participant by signing up with a host organization, con-

tributing \$12 for each food package desired and pledging two hours of community service work during one month's time. Only cash and food stamps will be accepted.

There is no limit to the number of packages a family may order.

The content of the food package varies each month and always includes meat, fruit, vegetables and staples such as beans, rice or pasta. Frequently, canned goods such as soup, chili, tuna or convenience goods and dessert items are included. Each package weighs 50-60 pounds and has a retail value of approximately \$40.





Buc Shots

Hall of Fame inductees to be honored



This Friday night, at the Chandelier, the Belleville Hall of Fame will induct 17 new members to its prestigious organization at its annual dinner. The festivities will begin at 7 p.m. and once more, a large and enthusiastic crowd will help to honor these deserving former Belleville athletes.

For the record, Michael Nicosia, Alan Cervasio, Dennis Buckley, Russell Pagano, Jr., Christopher Musmanno, Vin Mustacchio, Donald Smith Jr., Mike Barbone, Michael O'Connor, Pat Barbone, Donald Paterno, Michael Davis, Paul Denning, Keith Waddell, Richard Budrick, Doug Dorival, and Paul Melchione were selected to the Hall for 1985. The later 10 athletes were members of the 1976 Belleville crew team which won the Stotesbury Regatta. To this day, Sam Giuffrida, the Belleville High crew coach past and present, looks back on that team as one of his best of all time.

To talk about each one of these fine participants would take hours and hours. However, a little recognition certainly is deserved by these fine young men, who have been very successful since their graduation from Belleville High School. It goes to prove what fine people our township has produced.

Mike Nicosia, a 1980 graduate of Belleville High, was selected by this newspaper as its first athlete of the year. During his tenure at BHS, Nicosia was an outstanding baseball and football player. He earned all state honors in 1980 and was a member of the North All Star team in the annual all star game. He played college baseball for Montclair State College, amassing some tremendous records. He currently holds seven offensive school records at Montclair State.

Alan Cervasio, a 1976 grad, played varsity football for Belleville High from 1973-75. He was the team captain of the '75 team and one of the best running backs in the county. In his senior year, Cervasio rushed for 952 yards on 185 carries, good for a 5.1 average per carry. Cervasio scored nine touchdowns. He was named to the Herald News All Area Team, the first time a Belleville runner made that poll. He was also all county from the New York Daily News. Cervasio was later named to the All Decade team of the Herald News.

Upon graduation, Cervasio attended the University of Delaware and earned a business administration degree in 1980. During his playing days, Cervasio was a member of a national championship team, the 1979 Delaware team that won the Division I-AA championship. Cervasio is now a very successful sales director for a large resort.

Dennis Buckley was graduated from Belleville High in 1975. He was one of the best managers and trainers that Belleville High has ever seen. Buckley managed the wrestling, baseball and football teams from 1973-75. He earned five varsity letters. At Montclair State College, Buckley was the manager of the wrestling team for four years. He graduated with a degree in 1979.

Almost everyone in town knows Dennis as the director of the Recreation Department. He is also a certified sports official in football, wrestling, baseball and softball. Dennis is a member of the Wrestling Parents & Friends Association and the Michael V. Marotti Civic Association. He is married and lives in Belleville with his wife Terri and three year old son Christopher.

Russ Pagano is also a familiar figure in town. Currently, Russ is an assistant football coach with the varsity team. He is in his third year of coaching and has earned the respect of the coaches and players.

While on the field, Pagano earned the respect of players and coaches in a different way. He was one of the best linemen in the state during his three year tenure. He was graduated from Belleville in 1980, having been a member of the 1979 Buc team that went to the playoffs at Giants Stadium.

In 1979, Pagano earned first team all state honors, first team Group IV honors and first team county honors for his outstanding play at offensive tackle. He earned six varsity letters at Belleville High, having been an excellent track performer as well. Pagano graduated from Montclair State in 1984 and is a teacher in the Belleville school system.

Chris Musmanno, another 1980 Belleville grad, was an outstanding wrestler, by consensus the best ever to compete for Belleville High. Musmanno made the state finals in 1979 and '80, winning the 170 pound class in the latter season. Including his freshman season, Musmanno posted an incredible 97-8 mark. His varsity record was 68-3.

Musmanno attended the University of Virginia and wrestled varsity for four years. He was captain of the team in his senior year and placed twice in ACC tournaments held at Maryland and Clemson. He finished with over 100 collegiate victories and won the Bloomsburg tourney twice. He was graduated in 1984 and is now attending the Seton Hall University School of Law.

Donald Smith Jr., is currently a lieutenant in the Essex County Police Department, assigned to the Administrative Unit. Following his graduation from Belleville High, Smith played semi pro football for the Belleville-Nutley Iron Dukes. In 1949, he married a former classmate, Ethyle (Tootie) Robbins. Fourth straight shutout

Bucs defeated by Mounties, 20-0 as team prepares for Raiders

It has been a frustrating season for the Belleville football team. The Buccaneers have been playing rock solid defense, holding its opposition to 71 points over eight games and allowing six of those opponents one touchdown or less. Unfortunately, the offensive movement has been limited this year and the result is a 2-6 record heading into the season finale with Nutley on Thanksgiving morning.

Belleville was handed its fourth straight loss, all by shutout, when powerful Montclair administered a 20-0 setback. The Mounties possess a solid team, one that will travel to the Group IV, Section II playoffs for a fourth straight season. With the victory, Montclair extended its perfect record to 8-0. A possible showdown with number one ranked Union could be in the cards for a fourth straight season should both teams advance in first round play which starts this Saturday.

As for Nutley, head coach John Senesky says you can throw away the records for this game.

"Beating Nutley would be a winning season for us," the coach said. "It's something to work for this last week of practice. Nutley has a fine football team. I saw its game with Clifton last Saturday (in the mud and snow at Clifton). The field conditions were poor that day. A lot of fumbles and bad snaps marred that game. It was a tough game for them."

Nutley lost to Clifton, 15-8, eliminating the Maroon from Group III, Section II playoff consideration. Thus, both teams will get plenty of rest heading into the Thanksgiving Day showdown. Nutley, of course, won last year's game, 19-6, breaking a six year hex at the hands of Belleville. More on the Nutley-Belleville rivalry in next weeks edition.

As for the Montclair setback, Senesky was not surprised by the Mounties game plan or talent.

"We scouted them for four games," the coach said. "We knew their tendencies, they adjusted well to what we did. Montclair has some fine athletes and possess an excellent team."

Still, the coach was somewhat frustrated by the loss.

"It gets tough week after week. I feel especially bad for the seniors. There's not much you can do, just hope the team improves and gains experience from this year. The kids are doing a great job, they're playing hard and fighting on every snap. At times, our offense shows some signs of improvement. I think we were able to do

something against Montclair that others could not, and that's pass."

Although the Bucs were an underdog, they came out playing intense football. On the opening kickoff, a Montclair runner bobbled the ball and Belleville recovered on the Mountie 22 yard line. However, the Bucs were not able to penetrate the Mountie line, gaining just three yards before Lou Lucante attempted a 36 yard field goal. The


snap to Jeff Spillsbury was low and the kick never got off the ground.

Montclair started its first offensive series from its own 26 and drove 74 yards in 26 workman like plays. Two big penalties by Belleville, the first a face mask and the second a

personal foul, also benefitted the Mountie drive. It ended with Riddick going over from the one yard line for the first score. After the conversion it was 7-0.

Montclair scored the next time it had the ball. Belleville punter, Dave Long received a low snap and never had a chance to get the kick away. He was tackled at his own 29 and the hungry Mounties moved in

Cross country team members return with improved skills

Youth and improvement were the key ingredients to the 1985 Belleville cross country team. The Harriers posted a 2-3 record and will return a solid club for the '86 season.

Leading the way for John Tosato's team was junior Craig Burden.

"He showed good improvement over the season," Tosato said. "His times were 35-40 seconds better than last year. He was competitive in most races and his biggest asset was his consistency. He was always in the 17 minute range."

Burden's best performances were a 19th place finish in the Essex Catholic Invitational and a 24th place showing in the county championships. He earned a medal for his finish at the Essex Catholic meet.

Burden, a fine athlete, will now concentrate on basketball

during the winter months. He will come back in the spring to compete for the track team.

Senior Nick Compitiano, in his first season of cross country, did an outstanding job for the Bucs.

"He showed good endurance," Tosato said of Compitiano, who is a short distance man by trade. "He got his times down during the season and finished with a personal best of 17:38. He'll compete for the indoor track team now and then go outdoors in the spring."

A sophomore, Greg Moriello, finished his first year with a great deal of improvement.

"He started the season in the low 20 minute range," Tosato said, "and by seasons end, he was in the 18 minute area. That is fine improvement and should get him set for indoor track as well."

Most of the athletes on the Belleville cross country team compete for the indoor and outdoor track teams as well. There are a few exceptions, such as Burden, who competes for the basketball team.

Junior John Zurlo also showed a two minute improvement in his times, going from the 20 minute area to the mid 18's. Zurlo will now concentrate on the half mile during the indoor and outdoor seasons.

Leon Puentes, a sophomore, finished his first season of competition with some excellent performances.

"Leon gave us some strong races, especially in the close meets," Tosato said. "He did a very good job for us."

Puentes will now move over to basketball for the winter, returning to track in March.

J.R. Di Vincenzo, a senior, is a sprinter during the track seasons, but runs cross country every fall in an effort to get in shape. He had a personal best of 18:53 and showed marked improvement this year. Di Vincenzo completed his third year of cross country and will now head indoors for track.

Al Schweer, a junior, completed his first season with times in the mid 18 minute range. Tosato is looking for continued improvement from Schweer during the remainder of the track seasons.

Rounding out the remainder of the boys team is sophomore Bob Scheibel, juniors Mark Huamani and Tim Nielsen and freshman Peter Gerst and David Rosamilia.

"The freshmen were able to come along at their own pace," Tosato said. "We had a good turn out this season, so the younger athletes weren't put into a difficult position of running varsity right away."

For the girls, Joyce Luongo, a sophomore, led the way. Luongo improved her times significantly from last season.

"She is just seven seconds away from the girls school record (at Nutley)," said Tosato. "She was much stronger this year than last. Her best time on the home course was 21:06."

Luongo's best performance was an 18th place finish in the varsity race of the Essex Catholic Invitational.

Junior Donna Lee Daudelin also showed improvement this year. In her second year, Daudelin shaved two minutes off her time and should form a solid 1-2 punch with Luongo next season. Both Daudelin and Luongo will now compete in indoor track.

Two freshmen, Denise Ives and Michele Compitiano rounded out the girls team. Ives ran a personal best of 22:48 while Compitiano, despite some injuries, came through with some fine performances.

Finally, Tosato would like to mention a seventh grader, Danielle Groeling, who worked out with the team four days a week and should be a welcomed addition when her high school years become reality in 1987. Groeling ran a 24:23 on the home course, certainly a fine mark for such a young athlete.



















spend money and hide it," he said. "A new building will make the block look nicer, and people will want to shop there."

But Frantantoni believes that if a new structure is erected at that site, the financial health of Washington Avenue will suffer.

"Putting the building there takes space away from private businesses which might develop the land," he said. "We taxpayers have to pay for the land to build next to Town Hall, and the bill could run up to \$250,000. We already own the land in back."

DiRuggiero noted that erecting a separate new structure will leave the existing building free for use as a civic center.

"We need a place in the center of town where clubs, senior citizens groups and other

functions could be held," he said. "We also have a very nice fire department museum collection, but it is now at the Franklin Avenue firehouse, off the beaten path. It would be nice to house it in a central location where a lot of people could see it."

Frantantoni noted that Belleville already has facilities for recreational use.

"We've got the Recreation House on Joralemon Street, the Friendly House, which has just received over \$200,000 in renovations, and a newly-formed board of education committee which is looking into extending the recreational use of the schools," he said. "Using Town Hall as a civic center is a waste of money."

The debate promises to be lively. The board of commissioners' next public meeting is Tuesday at 8 p.m.

The results of the testing will provide School 4 with an individualized prescription plan for each student who takes the test, Forte said, adding that the test is more diagnostic than that of the IOWA tests given to students yearly.

Once the tests have been completed, printout sheets will be made detailing the skills a student has mastered, those he or she needs to review and those a student needs to know.

"Each teacher will alter or tailor the computational skills at each grade level so the students could better master a particular skill," Forte said. "This is a supplemental test, not a replacement. We are emphasizing reinforcement and review with individual students."

Mr. Ciccone said. "You must continue to meet the needs that they specify in this report. In five years there will be a mid-year report given on how we've progressed to meet those needs."

"We cannot stand still and rest," he continued. "We must continue to strive."

Although the evaluation is over, Mr. Ciccone said that progress at the school will not stop. Some of his objectives for the future include the implementation of a full school day and the increase of high school credits necessary for graduation.

"I'd like to do away with early release which has been caused by the school's overcrowding," Mr. Ciccone said. "The early release program has been in effect at the school for the past 10-13 years."

"I would also like to increase the number of high school credits needed for graduation," he added. "Presently, a student needs 100 credits to graduate Belleville High School. I would like to increase it to 120-125 credits to ensure a full school day. This will help prepare students for when they leave Belleville High School either for college or work."


