Five million gallons of water per day available

Belleville gets a chance to join Wanaque South

The huge Wanaque South reservoir project will generate more potable water than originally estimated and Belleville again is hoping to tap into the project as a part-owner.

Efforts to join seven other municipalities as owners in the Wanaque South Project were stalled nearly two years ago when Belleville last applied. But as the large construction project nears completion, engineers have calculated that the system will yield at least an additional five million gallons of water per day.

"Five million gallons a day is precisely Belleville's requirement," Wanaque South Project Coordinator Frank Orechio of Nutley told the N.J. District Water Supply Commission this past week.

Acting upon Orechio's recom-

mendation, the water commissioner adopted formal resolutions supporting Belleville's effort to join seven other municipalities as owner of the new reservoir supply system scheduled for completion a year from now.

"Belleville also is petitioning the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) as the final legal step toward becoming an owner of the project," Orechio said. The water commission also adopted formal resolutions urging the DEP to "favorably consider" Belleville's request.

Several other North Jersey municipalities have expressed interest in joining the Wanaque South system but were turned down because the projected "safe yield" of 79.5 million gallons of water daily had been

totally appropriated.

As an owner, Belleville would not only have access to a guaranteed water source, but would also enjoy substantially lower rates in the years ahead. As a customer of the City of Newark, Belleville must pay whatever rate is requested including annual increases. Newark also sets whatever restrictions it deems necessary on water use and amounts for Belleville.

From the very start of the Wanaque South Project four years ago, Orechio has been predicting the system will offer "the highest quality water in New Jersey and at the lowest rate."

Belleville would not be required to make a down payment if accepted as an owner in the Wanaque South Project. Instead,

the construction cost would be financed over 40 years with Belleville paying a set rate. The township's only increase on a year to year basis would be limited to the relatively minor costs of water treatment and system maintenance.

Neighboring Nutley and Bloomfield already are among

Funds for senior citizen housing running dry as township waits

Belleville senior citizens may face their last chance for federally-funded housing in Belleville when the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) takes applications from townships this spring.

"The money is running out. This could be the last year for us to get funding," Belleville Mayor Michael Marotti said Friday.

HUD makes long-term loans available to townships for senior housing construction. Loans are paid back with rent money. Rents subsidized by the federal government, are set on an ability-to-pay basis.

The financial burden to townships is negligible. Typically townships cover only sewerage and garbage costs, according to Chris Albanese, a resident and senior housing advocate. Belleville now extends similar courtesies by defraying township service costs to Clara Maass Medical Center.

Unlike her neighbors, Belleville now has no senior citizen housing. Her sister city, Nutley, built Parkside Apartments on William Street in 1984 with HUD monies, and Bloomfield is working on its second complex, Brookside Towers, courtesy of HUD. Bloomfield's first senior citizens' complex is Felicity

Towers on Llewellyn Avenue.

One proposal was developed to bring a senior housing center to Belleville by the Belleville Senior Citizens Corporation which was founded in 1977, according to Albanese, a trustee of the corporation. The organization was formed to conform with HUD's requirement that fund applications be made by a non-profit, non-government organization.

The group succeeded in developing a project, but failed to get it past the Belleville Zoning Board of Adjustment. At a hearing before that board, its proposal to build a complex in back of the Senior Citizens'

Clubhouse on the corner of Mill Street and Franklin Avenue died.

In its resolution of May 6, 1980 denying the proposal, the zoning board cited several problems with the building, including its location. The building would occupy parking spaces then reserved for clubhouse use. Many members of senior citizens' clubs were against the proposal for this reason.

In the five years since the zoning board's decision, no other applications have been filed with HUD for Belleville housing, but HUD monies are drying up as

Minor repairs made at Middle School; building's future remains a question

Repairs at the Belleville Middle School, which were itemized by an Essex County official, have been partially completed, according to Superintendent of Schools Michael Nardiello.

Dr. William Block, county school business administrator, conducted a health and safety inspection at the middle school on Nov. 21 based upon a written inquiry presented by several parents, Nardiello said.

In his findings, Dr. Block noted necessary repair work such as electrical wiring, general patching, plastering and painting, removal of deadbolts and plexi-glass from classroom doors and replacement of floor tiles. In all, eight items were listed.

According to Nardiello, a report was sent to Dr. Elena Scambio, Essex County Superintendent of Schools, noting which repairs had been completed.

"Five of the items have been completed," Nardiello said last

Friday. "The others are in progress. Some of those, such as plastering and painting, cannot

be completed until the leaking roof is fixed."

Deductions benefit taxpayers; deadline is fast approaching

Although the holiday season is upon us, there is still time for a smart taxpayer to make some moves which will lower his tax bill for 1985. Congress and the President have still not decided on a tax reform package, but no matter what changes go into effect for 1986, taxpayers can benefit by taking as many deductions as possible in 1985 and deferring income where they can into 1986.

If you are planning to make contributions to charity, be sure to do it before December 31. Contributions can take the form of property as well as cash. If you have held property long term that has appreciated in value, you can deduct its fair market value on the date of the gift. If you hold stocks at a loss, you may want to sell them to take advantage of the loss yourself and then donate the pro-

who do not itemize can still deduct 50% of their charitable contributions.

As another way to maximize deductions this year, you could prepay your 1986 real estate tax or send in your January 16 estimated state tax installment by December 31. If your medical expenses are near to or more than 5% of your estimated adjusted gross income, you might consider getting in any check-ups, dental visits, minor surgery or new eyeglasses before year end. If you pay by charge card, you can claim the expenses in 1985 even though you don't pay the bill until next year.

This is the last year for the residential energy credit, so if you haven't already done so, consider making those energy saving adjustments to your furnace or putting in insulation or new storm windows now.

Although investment concerns are of primary importance, you may want to sell some securities

stock can be purchased back after 31 days to avoid the "wash sale" rules. Perhaps you could do some "swapping" in low coupon municipal bonds. Up to \$3000.00 of a net capital loss can be used to offset other income, and any loss in excess of \$3000.00 can be carried forward to next year.

Finally, if you are self-employed on either a full-time or part-time basis, you must have a Keogh plan in place before December 31, although you can make contributions until April 15, plus extensions, and count them for 1985. Anyone with wages, self-employment income or alimony, should be sure to get in their 1985 IRA contributions by April 15, 1986.

Drug/Alcohol Abuse Committee offers help to township parents

More than 75 Belleville residents recently attended a meeting of the Belleville Drug and Alcohol Abuse Committee, according to committee chairperson Doug Cantarella. Sgt. Joseph Pariso of the Essex County Sheriff's Department and Jo-ann Wisch, an alcohol crisis counselor, were guest lecturers at the meeting Dec. 3.

"The speakers pointed out warning signs in the behavior of children that point to drug

abuse," Cantarella said. "It's vital to be aware of the problems and situations that signal drug abuse."

The Drug and Alcohol Committee is an ad hoc committee of the Belleville Board of Education. Its membership is limited to 35 residents, but it conducts two public meetings per year. The next public meeting is tentatively scheduled for March.

Det. Sgt. William Adelhelm of the Belleville Police Department Youth Bureau, a member of the committee, also addressed the audience.

According to Adelhelm, the Belleville Youth Bureau had 288 incidents involving juveniles overall in 1984. Of these, 36 involved drugs or alcohol solely, and many of the others accounted for multiple offenses in

which drugs or alcohol played a part.

"These figures are small," Adelhelm said in a recent telephone interview. "These are only the kids that got caught, not the many who are using drugs without our knowledge."

Youths that are arrested for drug or alcohol abuse are sent before the Juvenile Conference Committee for sentencing, according to Adelhelm. Punishment usually involves community service.

"The Drug and Alcohol Abuse Committee is a preventative organ," Adelhelm said. "We are also here to help people who have a problem. Parents often don't know where to turn or what to do. We can refer them to the proper agencies or individuals."

Tom Kean's agenda

The political events of last month have far-reaching effects.

First and foremost, is the future of Governor Tom Kean. His next step up on the political ladder is a run for the U.S. Senate in 1988 — to continue the family tradition begun by his grandfather.

In order for Tom Kean to be available in 1988 to make the run, it will be necessary for Republicans to control the New Jersey State Senate. Under the law, an interim vacancy in the Governorship is assumed by the President of the New Jersey Senate. Unless Tom Kean is able to elect a Republican majority to the New Jersey Senate in 1987, his party loyalty will prevent him from exercising an option to run for the U.S. Senate in '88.

So, there is no doubt that the power of the New Jersey President, Ronald Reagan, and the

power of the incumbent Governor will be used to insure the election of 21 Republican State Senators in 1987. Republicans now claim 17 — they need an additional four Republican Senators in 1987 to permit Tom Kean the option of running for the U.S. Senate — or be drafted for a spot on the national ticket — a presidential nomination or the vice presidential nomination.

The New Jersey Republican party today finds itself in one of its strongest positions in the last three decades. It has access to unlimited funds and it has an incumbent Governor who carried 566 municipalities out of a possible 567. It has the most popular Governor of the century, and it enjoys the luxury of a relatively weak and leaderless opposition that controls only one house of the legislature by only a thin margin.

Auxiliary police

At recent meetings of the Belleville Board of Education, the use of auxiliary police has been on the agenda. The person responsible for this agenda item is Ann Marie Puglio, a member of the Belleville Band Parents Association.

Superintendent of Schools Michael Nardiello explains that auxiliary police are used at school-sponsored functions to provide security. Since members of the organization do not receive compensation from the township, provision is made in the budget to compensate members who are assigned to specific functions on an hourly basis.

Nardiello states that a yearly contribution of \$2500 is made to the auxiliary police for their services throughout the year.

At the last meeting of the school board, a recommendation was made to decrease the sum to \$1500.

If the auxiliary police are rendering \$2500 worth of services, they should receive \$2500. If they only rendered \$1500 worth of services, they should only receive \$1500.

However, if the school board receives \$2500 worth of services, and now it wants to cut that amount to \$1500 and still receive the same amount of services, such a result would be unfair.

No different than any other body, the school board should pay for what it gets. If it receives \$2500 worth of services, it should pay that sum.

Federal housing

While in the world around us — and throughout the nation — over the years, billions of dollars have been spent for federally-funded senior citizen housing, not a dime has been received or loaned to Belleville. At the present time, Belleville is unique — it has no senior citizen housing. Bloomfield is working on its second complex. Nutley completed

its first in 1984 — and is seeking another one.

While the money lasts — and it may dry up very soon, in view of President Reagan's thrift trip, Belleville officials should lose no time in moving ahead in making the necessary application and take the necessary steps to insure a senior citizen housing project for Belleville.

State officials' salaries cause taxpayers' burden

To the editor:

A blue ribbon gubernatorial commission has recommended 40 percent salary increases for all high ranking government officials including the Governor, the Judiciary and the Legislature. This report seems to have given little weight to several important considerations.

It is a fact that the tax burden in New Jersey is very high. It is a fact that high salary increases were approved for these same positions after the 1981 election. Are these increases in the public interest? Are they really needed to attract qualified people into government service?

It is my impression after six years in the Legislature, that our present salary levels have not impeded spirited competition for whatever openings become available.

This is so because gubernatorial appointments are an opportunity for those who serve well to develop credentials which are of far greater value than any salary the public could ever pay. Such positions are a very valuable resume builder.

It is a source of distress that no members of that commission were drawn from the general tax paying public.

The commission was composed of three former judges, two were former

governors, plus two chief executives of industries regulated by the bureaucracy which will be the chief beneficiaries of the recommendations. These are talented people but not representative of a wide spectrum of New Jerseyans.

The unbalanced make-up of the commission may well have pre-ordained its findings. They determined we must increase top level salaries despite the fact that our New Jersey officials are already among the highest paid in the nation.

Where does it end? No one seems to know. There is a definite implication that just about every bureaucrat's salary will be increased similarly. We may well be obligating our taxpayers to many millions of dollars in additional government overhead.

If this decision were put to a public vote I'm pretty certain it would be defeated. However, the timing may well preclude any effective public input on the question. It may be all over before most people are aware it is happening. If you have taken the trouble to read this letter, perhaps you might tell your Governor and your legislators how you feel. Maybe, just maybe, you can put the brakes on this juggernaut. If you don't — nobody will.

The Gospel In the Carols

Christmas started with a song — an angelic outburst of praise from a heavenly host.

It came upon the midnight clear,
That glorious song of old,
From angels bending near the earth
to touch their harps of gold:
"Peace on the earth, good-will to men,
From heav'n's all gracious King,
The world in solemn stillness lay
To hear the angels sing."

Perhaps the "solemn stillness" is gone. But a wealth of song still marks the celebration of the Savior's birth. And for those who are really listening, they can hear the gospel in the carols.

Look at a few of the better known carols and see how they echo the gospel of Jesus Christ.

For example, the way of salvation is clearly presented in these verses from "O Little Town of Bethlehem":

How silently, how silently,
The wondrous gift is giv'n!
So God imparts to human hearts
The blessings of His heav'n.
No ear may hear His coming,
But in this world of sin,
Where meek souls will receive Him still,
The dear Christ enters in,
O holy Child of Bethlehem,
Descend on us, we pray;
Cast out our sin, and enter in,
Be born in us today,
We hear the Christmas angels
The great glad tidings tell:
O come to us, abide with us,
Our Lord, Immanuel!

These words remind us that forgiveness of sin is found as Christ is "born in us." The fellowship with God which we lost because of sin can be restored only as we take Christ into our lives. And the sure foundation for Christian living comes when we invite Him to "abide with us."

Healing from the body and the soul is also found in the gospel in the carols. From "Hark, the Herald Angels Sing" comes this familiar verse:

Hail the Sun of Righteousness!
Light and life to all He brings,
Ris'n with healing in His wings;
Mild He lays His glory by,
Born that man no more may die:
Born to raise the sons of earth,
Born to give them second birth.

Another verse of that carol embodies the story of the Incarnation:

Christ the everlasting Lord:
Late in time behold Him come,
Offspring of a virgin's womb.
Veiled in flesh the Godhead see,
Hail th' incarnate Deity!
Pleased as man with men to dwell,
Jesus our Immanuel.

Golden Comments

Editorially, the Belleville Times sternly admonishes those who prepare and adopt budgets for the public schools and government agencies of their need to "hold the line" instead of almost always raising the tax burden of the taxpayers.

Pointing out that although the law permits increases based upon a complicated state formula which sets "cap" limits for schools and governing agencies at varying levels, stress is emphasized that in no way does that mean public officials should spend to the limit.

With inflation rates holding firm at less than 4 percent it is harsh and unreasonable to impose upon property owners yearly increased school and municipal budgets with "caps" much higher than the inflation rate.

Teachers throughout the state will be seeking to increase wages for experienced personnel at a rate relative to the hikes given inexperienced teachers by Gov. Thomas Kean's \$18,500 minimum pay legislation. The state will pick up the tab for three years on the new teachers to compensate for the wage differentiation, then it becomes the entire burden of the local district's taxpayers.

One school board member from another district said that had all the teachers been given the increments at the same level Kean gave it to new instructors, "We'd be bankrupt in a hurry."

Union negotiators contend it's unfair for experienced teachers to be making as much as a college graduate just entering the system. Negotiations are expected to be aimed at achieving a "fair differential" on all levels of the salary guide.

The formula which sets the "cap" limit for each school system is based on pupil population and a town's total real estate value. The Nutley Board of Education has been told it can increase the '86-'87 school budget by 9.7 percent.

In Belleville, the present 1985-1986 school budget "cap" was 8.5 percent. We understand the 1986-1987 school budget "cap" will be 11.2 percent meaning the school budget to be voted on next April can be increased by 11.2 percent still remain within the state's "cap" guidelines.

This portends a harrowing nightmare for local taxpayers who have had it with yearly escalating tax increases on an annual basis; our school trustees and commissioners had better start sharpening up their pencils to cut a swathe in the fancy trimmings and bubbles tacked away in favorite notches of their respective budgets.

New Jersey is a high-tax state with much of the taxes collected "plowed" into our public education system which helps to keep local taxes in line. Were President Reagan's tax reform plan approved whereby local taxes and interest payments would no longer be deductible items in filing federal income taxes, the tax bite on the average home owner would be unbearable.

At least now, when local taxes go up we can write off some of the load, but, without that escape we'd be clobbered silly. Yes! The taxpayers are tired of constantly seeking ways and means to meet the ever increasing annual tax burden.

The Belleville Times editorial "Budgets, Budgets, Budgets" is timely appropriate and thought-provoking. Hopefully it will galvanize a degree of retrenchment thinking and implementation of Draconian policies that will lighten the load of the oppressed Belleville taxpayers... enough is enough. Spare us from the tax collector's onslaught. The cross is becoming too heavy to bear.

Usage of auxiliary police unit at school functions questioned

The usage of auxiliary police at school-sponsored functions has become a topic of conversation at recent Belleville Board of Education meetings.

At a meeting held earlier this month, Ann Marie Puglio, a member of the Belleville Band Parents Association, questioned the board about monies paid to the police and auxiliary unit for security purposes.

According to Superintendent

of Schools Michael Nardiello, who was instructed by the board to look into the matter, schools have always used township police for crowd control at various functions. When the auxiliary police unit was re-established a few years ago, members were and still are used on a volunteer basis, he said.

However, police are paid on an hourly basis, according to Chief George Lister. These monies are usually taken from

the proceeds of the school functions.

According to Chief Lister, policemen must be present at school functions, particularly large events, in case of an outbreak, he said, adding that auxiliary police cannot replace regular policemen in this area.

"Auxiliary police are to be used only in emergencies or for training sessions for crowd control," Chief Lister said. "This is a state law. Members of the auxiliary unit are strictly volunteers and are under the supervision of the police."

The auxiliary police unit consists of only 15 members which patrol the township during the night hours, he said.

"The auxiliary police will not step in and take the functions away from the police," Chief Lister said. "It would be a violation of state law providing guidelines for auxiliary police."

According to Schools Superintendent Nardiello, a yearly contribution of \$2500 is given to the auxiliary police for their services.

At the school board's last meeting Dec. 16, recommendations were made to decrease the figure to \$1500 and use the remaining \$1000 for a fund to be used specifically for school functions.

At the request of the board, Nardiello wrote to Chief Lister asking for a report detailing the services the auxiliary police provides the school system. On the basis of the report, the board will determine whether to change the amount of the contribution.

Repairs completed at Middle School

now," he added. "But we have no time frame on when the work would be completed."

Within the past few months there has been much discussion about the future of the middle school. Total repair work in the school has been estimated at \$2,950,000. Areas in need of renovation include: sitework (paving); exterior walls; interior (fire safety, finishes and toilets); mechanical (boiler); plumbing; electrical; and handicapped facilities (building entry, interior access and elevators).

Most of the minor repair work has been completed by the district's maintenance crew, however, according to Edward Appleton at a school board

meeting Dec. 2, the major repair work needed is beyond the maintenance staff.

At that meeting, which the school board set up especially for discussion on the middle school, Appleton said the major repair work would take approximately five to six years if the district's maintenance crew completed the work. He also mentioned that if the work was completed in-house, other schools in the district would suffer from neglect.

Alternatives to renovating the building were discussed, particularly the idea of a new building. Although no formal decision was made at the meeting, the school board did inform the public that suggestions were being considered and that an update on the situation would be given sometime in January.

the seven owners of the Wanaque South Project. Nutley will be entitled to 5.12 million gallons per day (mgd) and Bloomfield, 2.75 mgd. Bloomfield already receives water as a partner in the Wanaque Reservoir system.

The other Wanaque South partners are Newark, Bayonne, Wayne Township, Kearny and Cedar Grove.

The Wanaque South Project involves the new Monksville Reservoir in Ringwood and West Milford, two giant pumping stations which will divert water from the Ramapo River in

Pompton Lakes and from the Pompton River in Wayne Township.

The seven municipal partners are 50-50 owners in the project with the privately-owned Hackensack Water Company which has linked the Wanaque South System with its own Oradell Reservoir by way of a 17-mile aqueduct.

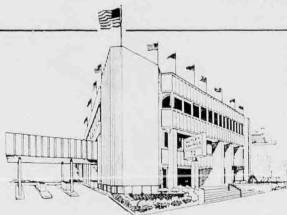

Liability law warns party hosts not to serve alcohol to minors

With the holiday entertaining season approaching, Essex County Sheriff Thomas J. D'Alessio is reminding all citizens about changes in New Jersey's "Host Liability" laws and penalties.

Recent legislation now makes it illegal for adults to serve, or even to offer to serve, alcoholic beverages to anyone under New Jersey's legal drinking age of 21. A violation of this law constitutes a disorderly persons offense and makes the violator subject to arrest. Such a disorderly persons offense is punishable by up to six months imprisonment or a fine of up to \$1,000 or both.

Sheriff D'Alessio explained that the provisions of this bill, however, do not apply if the underage person consumes alcoholic beverages in connection with any religious observance or ceremony. Also exempt would be the consumption of alcoholic beverages by a minor within the home and in the presence of a parent or guardian who has willingly given his/her permission.

According to Sheriff D'Alessio, this new law is designed to involve the growing problem of teenage drinking in our communities. Adults can now be held legally responsible for hosting parties where alcohol is served to underage drinkers.

D'Alessio cited recent statistics that emphasize the severity of the teenage drinking problem. A survey conducted by the State Division of Criminal Justice revealed that by 10th grade a total of 81 percent of students polled admitted to alcohol use. In comparison, the next highest percentage showed 41 percent of students had used marijuana by the same age. This

study, which surveyed high school students throughout New Jersey, showed that alcohol is by far the most abused substance, with a total of 91 percent of all students polled admitting to using alcohol during their high school careers.

"Many parents feel that as long as their children are not involved with illegal drugs, they are not in any real danger," said D'Alessio. "They fail to realize that alcohol can be as harmful as any other drug."

This new law, in conjunction with New Jersey's strict driving while under the influence (DWI) penalties, is designed to act as a deterrent to teenage drinking and the resultant danger of automobile fatalities. Sheriff D'Alessio noted that many community organizations, in particular the New Jersey Federation of Drug Free Communities, were instrumental in getting this law enacted.

Boys' team loses, 47-38

A funny thing happened at Bergen Catholic High School last Friday night. On its way to what was supposed to be a route of the Belleville Buccaneers, the B.C. Crusaders had to fight tooth and nail to overcome a strong Belleville effort. In the end, B.C. won, 47-38, but the Belleville effort certainly gives the players hope for the 1985-86 campaign.

The Bucs were scheduled to play St. Mary's of Elizabeth on Monday, but that game was postponed. Belleville's next

game is set for Friday night, in the Tri County Holiday tournament. The Bucs first round opponent will be Queen of Peace High, starting at 6:30 p.m. The second game of the tourney pits Kearny and North Arlington. The consolation and championship games will be played on Saturday night. All games in the tourney are played at North Arlington High School.

A year ago, the Bucs opened the season against virtually the same B.C. team. The game was played at Belleville High and in

head coach Rocco Colucci's debut, the Bucs were humiliated, 88-45. Colucci and his team remembered that loss vividly.

"Bergen Catholic had just about the same team as last year," Colucci said, "and we gave them a much better game. They (B.C.) were huge, they towered over our kids. But we came to play and gave a good defensive effort."

Was the coach satisfied with the victory?

"It was a start, we have a lot

of work to do. This team has to keep its intensity at all times. We can not afford the luxury of turning it on when we please. If we feel we can do that, we'll be on the short end of a lot of 93-39 games."

To clarify the situation, first let it be known that Bergen Catholic is a solid basketball team. The Crusaders were in the Parochial A finals last year and are known as one of the better teams in Bergen County. Bel-

Girls' BB team loses opener to Columbia

The signs are there. While the Belleville girls basketball team was losing to Columbia last Friday afternoon, some good performances gave hope to head coach Karen Fuccello that the '85-86 season will be a good one.

The girls will not play again until Friday, January 3, when they travel to Clifton for a 7:30 p.m. start.

Versus Columbia, Belleville lost, 54-32, committing numerous turnovers and missing 23 foul shots. If it were a mid season ball game, there might be a feeling of disaster. However, this was just the first of at least 22 ball games, and certainly improvement will set in.

"We missed 23 foul shots and had trouble breaking a press that we should have handled easily," Fuccello said. "We also had trouble under the boards, they (Columbia) had too many second and third shots."

The first half was a tight game, with Columbia leading 9-7 after the first quarter and 19-14 at intermission.

In the third quarter, however, the Lady Cougars began to take advantage of the Belleville inexperience. They ran well, took advantage of second and third shots off the boards and in-

creased its lead to 38-23 after three periods. The Cougars were also helped by a number of missed Belleville free throws.

In the fourth quarter, Belleville tried to cut the deficit, but once more, turnovers affected the team. Columbia outscored the Lady Bucs, 16-9 and won, 54-32.

Desiree Johansen, the leading scorer on last years team, led the way with 13 points. Johansen, uncharacteristically, missed 10 foul shots, many of which rimmed the basket and fell out.

Sophomore Judy Nehila scored nine points, but was 1 of 7 from the free throw line. Starting her first varsity game, Nehila played very well overall and should get better as the season progresses.

Laura Caruso, a junior, had six points and played well under the boards. Once again, more playing time will make Caruso a more confident athlete.

Belleville also missed the front end of four one in free throw situations. All told, it was a game that Belleville handed to its opponents and Fuccello hopes to use the two week lay off to work out these mis-

leville was up against a good defensive club and one capable of scoring at will.

In the first quarter, it appeared that B.C. would take control early. Belleville started slowly and after four minutes, the home team had built up a 12 point lead.

"It didn't look good at first," Colucci remembered. "Last year, we could have written the game off after a start like that. This year, the team has more experience and came back."

The Bucs cut the deficit a little in the first quarter, trailing, 15-6 at quarters end. In the second quarter, the Bucs played solid defense, outscoring the hosts, 11-7 and trailing, 22-17 at intermission.

Late in the third quarter,

with Belleville trailing, 34-28, a B.C. player was fouled. Awarded two free throws, the player hit the first, but missed the second. There was '03 showing when a Bergen Catholic player rebounded the missed free throw. Colucci takes it from there.

"They rebounded the ball, passed a few times, then the player takes a shot and it goes in. Now, there is no way that the entire sequence took just three seconds. The clock had hit :00, but the horn didn't go off. Therefore, the officials did not know the quarter was over and they let the game continue."

"Needless to say, I didn't like the call, because it turns the game into a nine point deficit, as opposed to seven, which is a big change in a defensive game.

The officials said that since the horn didn't go off, the basket had to count."

Basketball fans who remember the 1981 Belleville-Nutley game will certainly take sympathy with Colucci. In that game, Nutley took at least seven seconds (there were just five left) to hit a winning layup to beat the Bucs.

In the fourth quarter, the two teams scored 19 points each, leading to the 47-38 finish.

Ted Sochaski and Leon Puentes, both sophomores, led the Belleville attack. The two men tallied 14 points each. Bob Hutchinson had six and Don Washington finished with three before fouling out.

"We're knocking on the door," Colucci said. "Hopefully, we can knock it in during the season. We can be a good team, if we play hard and stay intense every game. This first game is a good indication of that."

'First a Friend, Then a Host' program helps prevent accidents

"First a Friend, Then a Host" program, sponsored by the Automobile Club of America (AAA), fosters awareness about the responsibility of party hosts who must make sure their guests' ability to drive home is not impaired.

A host can do this by following these rules when mixing fun and alcohol:

- Serve the first drink yourself, if you wish, but let the guests be their own bartender after that. Studies show that people tend to consume less when they mix their own.
- Provide plenty of non-alcoholic beverages as an alternative.
- Serve snacks throughout the evening. Food, starchy foods in particular, slows down the rate at which alcohol is absorbed into the bloodstream.
- Plan activities that draw attention away from the bar.

• Close the bar about an hour before the party ends and serve coffee as your "one for the road." The coffee won't necessarily help to sober anyone, but it will buy time which does clear heads.

• As the host, take it easy yourself and set a good example. If for all your good intentions there is still a tipsy guest, arrange for a ride home or invite the guest to stay over. Your role as a friend before that of a host could prove life-saving.
