Property owners dissatisfied Plans for town hall finalized this week

Plans for Belleville's new \$10 million town hall complex will be finalized this week, but owners of the property on which it is to be built are dissatisfied with the prices being offered for their land.

I was offered \$68,000 for my property, which has an office and three apartments, while they offered the other owner \$168,000, and his building is gutted inside," Gary Bell, owner of the Rita Troise Insurance building at 177 Washington Ave., said.

My whole life is in that place," he said. "I spent \$50,000 on renovation. I offered them \$150,000, a very fair price, and they insult me with this price. Something is definitely wrong with this town."

Bell said that he will hire an appraiser and present a counteroffer to the board of commissioners at its next meeting Feb. 11.

The owner of the other property at 170 Washington Ave. could not be reached for comment. Mayor Michael Marotti

would not confirm the appraisal values at an earlier time, but said then, "They (the property owners) are going to be disappointed. We're not offering them what they are asking - we're offering them a fair price."

Plans for the design of the building are almost final, Marotti said.

Our committee has selected a design," he said. "We are going to show it to the department heads and commissioners. If any of these people is not satisfied, they will report back to the committee."

The town hall complex committee lists as members Marotti, Public Safety Commissioner Ralph DiRuggiero, Township Engineer Neil Siciliano, and representatives from the New York architectural firm of Herbert Beckhard, Frank Richien & Associates, which created the design for the proposed complex.

The new complex will house all municipal offices, including the five municipal departments: revenue and finance, public affairs, parks and public property,

public safety and public works. The Public Works Department is currently housed in the Public Affairs building at 383 Washington Ave.

The board of education and the municipal court offices will also be housed in the new complex. The old School 1 building at 166 Cortland St. is now the temporary home of the board of education.

The design calls for a triangular building with a tree-lined front courtyard, Marotti said. It will be built next to the current town hall building pending the sale of the two adjacent properties.

Because of the slope of the land on which it will be built, the building will have three floors facing Washington Avenue and two different floors facing Valley Street, Marotti said. Most offices will be housed in the front three floors, while the police department will be headquartered in the back two floors.

A four-tier, open parking garage for more than 200 cars will

Businesses protest move to enlarge intersection

Several Belleville businessmen protested plans to install left-hand turn lanes in all approaches of the intersection of Joramelon Street and Franklin Avenue at a special meeting of the Belleville Board of Commissioners Monday afternoon.

The intersection is one of four townwide to receive left-hand turn lanes and signals as part of a \$4.4 million federally-funded safety program administered by Essex County.

In total, 16 intersections in the northern Essex towns of Nutley, Bloomfield, Glen Ridge, and Belleville will be made safer.

The other intersections in Belleville are Hoover Avenue, Main Street and Union Avenue, all at Joramelon Street.

A spokesman for the Belleville Plaza, which houses 12 stores on Joramelon Street, said that the mall would lose more than 20 parking spaces to the new left-hand turn lane.

"If this land is taken away from the shopping center, it would cause at least as much

congestion with people trying to get in and out," he said.

Representatives from Peoples Bank, located next door to the Belleville Plaza on Joramelon Street, also protested their prospective loss of parking spaces.

"We'll lose 13 spaces and we're already congested," William Hildebrandt, bank president, said. Peoples Bank rents spaces from its neighbor, BP Service Station, to accommodate its employees, he added.

Dennis Sedaille, traffic engineer with Essex County, countered Hildebrandt's protest with a drawing which provided 10 of the 13 lost spaces.

"I restriped the lot and got back all but three of the spaces," he said.

Hildebrandt was unconvinced.

"We'll take a look at his plans, but there is no way that he can get 10 spaces back," he said.

"The county is unrealistic."

Sedaille also said that the county would explore possible solutions to the Belleville

Plaza's parking dilemma.

"I wasn't aware of the problems with the shopping center," he said. "I am certainly willing to work to lessen the impact of loss of parking to the shopping center."

Although the intersection is unpopular with merchants, the police department hailed it as a long-needed safety improvement. Belleville Police Captain Robert Russomano cited the high rate of accidents at the intersection.

"We had 15 reported accidents in 1985," he said. "If you have more than three five accidents a year, there is something wrong with the intersection."

"I see people jumping the lights, driving on the curbs," he continued. "It's a very dangerous corner. This needs to be done."

Commissioner Joseph McGreevy asked if another solution which would leave the spaces could be found since businesses may suffer.

School board will review teacher employment policy

The Belleville Board of Education will conduct a review of its employment policy in response to a parent's question concerning teacher applications.

Mario Drozd of Bell Street questioned the school board at its meeting Monday night about whether or not the district asks applicants if they had ever been arrested or convicted of a crime.

Superintendent of Schools Michael Nardello told Drozd and members of the audience that the district does not conduct criminal checks.

"Do you actually know who you are hiring?" Drozd said. "What are you reading in the papers? I clipped one article that reads, 'Music teacher cited in sex abuse case.' I just don't want to see that happen here again like those two tenured cases."

Drozd was referring to the cases of Gerard Fulcoi and Patrick Caporaso, two teachers

who were recently dismissed from teaching in the system by the state. Commissioner of Education. The board of education, according to Lawrence Schwartz, board attorney, fought to have both men dismissed from the school system.

Fulcoi was charged with making threatening phone calls to teachers during the night and mailing them suggestive items. Schwartz said Caporaso was charged with sexually abusing a student more than 10 years ago. Both cases went to trial and eventually they were dismissed from teaching within the school system.

"What if something like that happens to my child," Drozd said. "Can I hold the board responsible?"

Schwartz nodded.

"Then why should we let this happen?"

"Both of these cases were

dismissed. They had no prior records. Both incidents happened while they were employed here. And when we were made aware of them, the board acted quickly."

"I understand that, but who's to say that they won't go to another district and teach?" Drozd said. "I don't want that to happen here with someone from another district coming in."

"Why is there a difference?" Ernest Zoppi, board member, said in response to D'Agostino's statement. "I took it for granted that our teachers were checked. This is the first I'm hearing this. Until tonight, I honestly thought we were checking all new hired teachers."

John DiStasi, board member, suggested that a review of the district's teacher applications be made and that questions regarding criminal records be

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Tax credit available to persons who care for older dependents

Many taxpayers are aware that there is a tax credit available if they must pay to have their children taken care of while they are at work. This same credit can apply in a variety of circumstances.

For example, you are single and your elderly mother lives with you and is your dependent. Your mother becomes unable to care for herself physically. You hire a housekeeper to come in while you are at work primarily to take care of your mother. Incidentally, the housekeeper may do some light housekeeping and start supper. You may take a credit based on the housekeeper's wages.

Perhaps you are widowed and have a 30-year-old son who is severely retarded and mentally incapable of self-care. If you pay someone to care for him while you work, those wages may qualify you for the credit.

Another example would be a married couple where both

work. The husband has an accident which leaves him disabled and needing assistance for six months. The cost of such assistance would qualify for the credit.

The amount of the credit varies based on the taxpayer's earned income and total income and the amount of expenses paid. For most people, it results in a significant tax savings.

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Volunteers from all areas dedicate time & effort to Nutley Rescue Squad

Volunteers — people who unselfishly offer their time and energy — are usually those who go unrecognized within their communities, especially if they serve on an organization in another town.

Such volunteers are those who serve on the Nutley Rescue Squad. Started in 1953 as the Nutley First Aid Squad by a small group of people, the Nutley Rescue Squad is a volunteer organization with a 68 member crew and three fully-equipped medical ambulances.

Although it services Nutley with a majority of township residents, on the squad — others volunteer from its neighboring towns of Belleville, Bloomfield, Clifton, Passaic and Lodi, according to Chuck Granata of Bloomfield, a two-year member of the squad.

Each year the Nutley Rescue Squad conducts a drive for volunteers with the purpose of providing more emergency medical aid during the 24-hour, 365-day schedule. Granata, who said he was always interested in first aid, learned of the volunteer squad from friends.

Glenn McCann of Belleville, also a two-year member of the squad, read about the program in a poster hung up in a local store. Most of the publicity about the squad, he said, is through newspaper articles, flyers and mostly word of mouth.

A person who volunteers on the Nutley Rescue Squad doesn't have to be a special person, McCann said. "All you need to

have is compassion for people, be a little patient and just be able to be there for someone, maybe hold their hand if they need it or wipe a tear."

No prior training is needed to become a volunteer on the squad, he said, only the interest.

We'll train them, pay for all their classes," McCann said. "We like to take our volunteers and get them enrolled in a training program in either the 5-point program or the state Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) program, which is 100 hours of training run by the state."

With the EMT program, we have state instructors come in and test our volunteers on practical and written knowledge," he continued. "The 5-point program is very similar except, for the most part, we can teach them right in our own headquarters. We have instructors and trainers on hand to do so."

All volunteers are trained in Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR), emergency childbirth, advanced first aid and auto extrication, he said.

The squad pays for all the training and uniforms," Chuck Granata said. "We work on a reimbursement program whereby a volunteer gets reimbursed for the training course if he or she passes the test. It really is an incentive to pass the test."

Besides the requirements mentioned, a lot of our members go into a more in-depth training, either heavy rescue or scuba dive, he added. "We are one of the only squads in the area to have a scuba dive team for

medical emergencies."

The Nutley Rescue Squad, in fact, is broken down into three divisions: emergency medical (first aid or oxygen therapy), heavy rescue (with a heavy rescue team and heavy rescue truck), and a scuba dive team.

The scuba dive team, which has seven trained members at the time, was recently added to the squad's list. Last year, the Nutley Rescue Squad responded to three calls which required the scuba dive team, McCann said.

We do not only respond to calls at the Passaic River," Granata said. "We also answer calls in Bergen County and provide mutual aid to neighboring towns."

The North Jersey Regional Chorus is selective to the better students.

Finetti said that students should have two qualities while performing with the North Jersey Regional Chorus. One is that they be obedient and two, that they know the music, he said.

Because there are only six rehearsals before the performance students are expected to do everything they are asked, he added.

Finetti said he enjoys the rehearsal period because it gives him, as well as his stu-

dents, a chance to meet and talk with students from other schools in the North Jersey area.

"I like to talk with them about what types of music they learn and what other choral directors are teaching in the classroom," Finetti said.

Before each rehearsal, students are required to learn the musical piece which will be performed that day. If a student is tested on a piece of music he or she is expected to know and doesn't, that student may be asked to leave the group, Finetti said.

"The rehearsals are very demanding," he added.

This year's North Jersey Regional Chorus, under the direction of Bloomfield Choral Director Tim White, will be performing "Te Deum" by Haydn, "Os Justi" of Bruckner, the "150th Psalm" by Howard Hanson and selections from Gershwin's "Forgy and Bess."

"Music usually performed by the North Regional Chorus spans different periods," Finetti said. "There's always serious classical music along with a show tune and a spiritual number."

"The musical piece 'Te Deum' will be performed in Latin."

Tickets for the Feb. 9 performance are \$4 and may be obtained by calling 743-7700.

The North Jersey Regional Chorus, sponsored by the North Jersey Music Educators Association, will join members of the Central and South Jersey choruses in a combined performance this fall.

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Ethnic biases

Recently, New York's Governor Mario Cuomo, publicly decried the issue of discrimination not only against Italian-Americans, but also against blacks and other ethnic groups.

The occasion for the Cuomo outburst was due to the numerous references appearing in the columns of the nationally syndicated columnist who observed that Cuomo could not be the Democrat presidential nominee in 1988 because "it isn't time for an Italian to run for president." When Governor Cuomo's name is mentioned for the presidency, more often than not, a non-Italian practicing politician asks aloud "Can an Italian from the northeast be elected president?" Cuomo wondered aloud why such a basis should be used to determine the presidential nominee of any party. Cuomo asked "Shouldn't the question be about intelligence and ability, not ethnicity?"

Governor Cuomo especially took to task syndicated columnist Joseph Sobran, an editorial in The Boston Herald and comments by reporters on weekly political talk shows on network television. He specifically mentioned Evans and Novak. A recent Evans and Novak column read as follows, "Cuomo's political problem is described by a liberal member of the Democratic National Committee from the Deep South: between Richmond and Houston, there are no Cuomo's and damn few Marcos." A protester outside his Albany office displayed a sign recently in connection with the granting of clemency to an individual convicted of killing a deputy sheriff that read "Kill a Cop, Get Paroled by the Wop."

Governor Cuomo states that he is not hypersensitive to the ethnic references — he simply says it's there and we must recognize it for what it is. As for the national political writers, specifically, Cuomo states "I do notice an increasing interest in my ethnicity, and one has to wonder about that."

Anthony Parrillo

Governor Thomas Kean recently nominated Bloomfield's Anthony Parrillo, the current Acting Director of the Division of Gaming Enforcement, to be the division's new director. The vacancy exists because of the retirement of former director Thomas O'Brien who returned to the more lucrative pursuit of a private law practice.

Kean did not exaggerate when he called Parrillo "exceptionally well qualified to lead the Division."

Attorney General W. Carey Edwards praised Parrillo as a "dedicated public servant and an individual who has demonstrated his ability to administer a most important division of government."

Winning confirmation by the New Jersey Senate is no problem. Spearheading the confirmation drive is Parrillo's district State Senator Carmen Orechio. The position is probably one of the most responsible in the state law enforcement. Parrillo will head a branch of the Attorney General's office that is responsible for investigating and policing Atlantic City's eleven casinos and their 40,000 employees. The Division of Gaming Enforcement makes recommendations to the Casino Control Commission which rules on

At different times, Governor Cuomo also criticized news organizations for using the word "Mafia" to describe organized crime. Cuomo makes the point organized crime goes beyond the Mafia, which automatically translates to Italian heritage.

Come to think of it, growing up in the town of Nutley, we felt the heel of oppression because our name began and ended in "O". In Nutley, time has made a difference, although, we frankly believe the bigots remain bigots — at least those that are still around. They will never change, but the consoling fact is that these bigots are not bigoted against Italian-Americans. To some of us, at times, the words give us the strange feeling of emptiness — since in the real world, equality and justice are hard to come by.

Who knows but that a Cuomo presidential candidacy in 1988 may be the catalyst necessary to give substance to the equality and justice references found in our Constitution and Bill of Rights. We can only applaud Governor Cuomo for raising the issue — and we hope he continues to address it. What America needs is more men of courage like Mario Cuomo and Martin Luther King.

School board member tells truth about budget

To the editor:

I don't normally read Mr. Golden's column anymore because I like to read my town newspaper in a leisurely and relaxing fashion. Like most people, I did not find it enjoyable to keep a dictionary next to me in order to decipher the "linguistic gobbledygook" Mr. Golden used to confuse rather than communicate with his readers. It also became a bore to have to read his continual criticism of the President of the United States.

However, someone brought this week's column (1/23/86) to my attention. It would appear that once again Mr. Golden is guilty of deliberate distortion or deliberate ignorance. Since Mr. Golden has served as a town councilman in Belleville in the past, he is most certainly familiar with the budget preparation process, so he can't claim ignorance.

Therefore, it looks like he is attempting to deliberately distort the facts in order to mislead the public and at the same time damage the credibility of the board of education. Inasmuch as I have taken the responsibility of being the budget committee chairman for the last two years and a member of the budget committee the year prior, I take offense to his distortions.

He really ought to do his homework more diligently. Perhaps he should put down his dictionary and pick up his math primer.

Fact - The total increase in the board of education budget projected for the 1986-87 school year is \$1,579,840

and not \$1,593,444 as cited by Mr. Golden.

Fact - Of the foregoing amount, only \$1,171,563 is to be funded through tax levy, and that equates to a 26.03 tax point increase and not the 35.4 tax points cited by Mr. Golden.

Fact - The difference between the two amounts shown above is funded by state and federal aid and Mr. Golden should be well aware of that. Fact - The cost of that projected increase to a homeowner with a \$50,000 assessed value home will be approximately \$130 and not the \$151.80 cited by Mr. Golden.

It is also misleading to attempt to compare the educational system budgets of two adjacent towns unless both have equal numbers of student body, faculty and physical plants etc.

If Mr. Golden did a little in-depth homework, he would have found that over the last five years, including this projected 1986-87 increase of 26.03 tax points, that the Township of Belleville's educational budget has averaged 7 tax points per year increase or an average annual cost of \$35 to a \$50,000 assessed value homeowner. Hardly excessive!

To have been at least fair in his reporting, Mr. Golden might have asked how many tax points have been cut from original budgets by the critical and watchful eyes of the budget committee of the board of education in behalf of our taxpayers.

But even with the increased state aid, the budget calls for a whopping 26-point tax increase. Included in the budget is money for a capital outlay at the middle school. This money is for restoration work at the middle school. Restoration, I might add, which is desperately needed. But there is no way that the voters of Belleville are going to support this budget. And that is a shame because the only ones who suffer because of a budget defeat are the children. That is why it is so important for the board to present a realistic budget to the voters.

How does the board go about presenting a realistic budget to the voters? Each member must realize that the huge property tax in Belleville

is a threat to the existence of Belleville as we know it. Each member must realize that the time to think about the budget is not only at budget preparation time but all of the time. Each and every decision that the board makes must be weighed as to its impact on the budget. I firmly believe that if every member of the board considered the impact that all of his or her decisions are going to have on the budget, we can get back to the times of realistic budgets.

The answer to the problem is in the hands of the people of Belleville. On April 15 the people will have the opportunity to vote on the budget. A caption on the Opinion Page of one of the state's principal newspapers captured the eyes of many of its readers and, if true, opened the eyes of many who read the brief letter to the editor. It read in bold type: "A pension sweetener for Congress."

Now we all know how well our honored Congress persons are regarded, respected and remunerated in return for their arduous tasks on Capitol Hill and their tiring trips, that some critics call junkets, which take them to many spots of the world that are considered troubled, such as Paris, Rome, London, Hong Kong, Rio, etc. trips that enlighten them and help them evaluate the myriad worldly problems which beset our times.

We graciously accept these expensive prerequisites in knowledge that they are separated for long periods of time from their families and loved ones. We know that living costs are high in Washington and that sons and daughters must attend college, so we yield, without question, to their right to raise and fix their own salaries.

Sure, it's a tough life bearing the heavy burdens of serving their constituents who are seldom happy or satisfied, and then again there are fences to be mended when the elections loom and the voters demand their response to demands.

Yeah! What the heck! Every body's got a job to do, while most of us adopt this attitude with a shrug of the shoulders, Mr. Fred J. Hoffmann of Wanaamassa, where ever that is, appears, "fed up," he writes. "When we were in school, we learned that ours is a government of the people, by the people and for the people."

Now, however, it is a government of Congress, by Congress and for Congress. Their latest benefit was included in the latest income tax law, that no congress man shall pay income tax on his pension. This is indecent.

To carry this farce one step further we have those famous, excellent presidents, Carter, Nixon and Ford, getting a mere pittance, \$7.5 million per year each.

All men are created equal, some more than others.

We are without knowledge, at this point, if this income tax rule, that no congressman shall pay income tax on his pension, is a good one. We called IRS and were advised they were, as yet, unfamiliar with it, but that Congress may make rules concerning IRS regulations that IRS merely interprets. Congress intends and writes rules pertaining thereto.

Were true such a provision, causing pensioned members of Congress, from paying income tax on their pensions, usually large, we too, would consider it indecent and clamor for rescission of such a rule.

We entertain the view that this matter should be further reviewed and that, if such a ruling exists, that it immediately be rescinded, if necessary, by Executive Order. Time is of the essence.

Taxpayers who received income tax refunds in 1985 from taxes paid in an earlier year to a state or local government may have to report the refunds as income on their 1985 federal tax returns, generally, only if the taxpayer itemized deductions on Schedule A of 1040 form.

Interest earned on a delayed federal refund is income and must be reported as such.

School board reviews employment policy

Disasti, who said he had questioned the applications at an earlier date, will be reviewing the district's employment policy with Edward Appleton, school board secretary, sometime next week.

According to Schwartz, school districts can ask appli-

cants whether or not they have a criminal record. However, he said the records of those teachers already employed in the district cannot be reviewed.

Custodians-and-bus drivers-are among those already checked for criminal records, he added, saying that they are fingerprinted by state law.

Asking whether or not

someone has a criminal record is a "board" policy decision," Schwartz said. "In 95 percent of the school districts, it is not done. Records should be checked and I think we're getting to that."

Changing teacher applications to ask whether or not someone has ever had a criminal record can be done by a resolu-

tion of the board of education, Schwartz said. Doing more than that may require approval of the teachers' union, he added.

"At the present time, a person must give their permission in order for a district to check their police record," Schwartz said, adding that a district does have the legal right to do so.

be erected in back of the current town hall, Marotti said.

"The first floor will be reserved for police department use and the other floors will be open to municipal employees and the public," he said.

All non-police spaces will most likely be metered as are the current ones next to town hall, Marotti said, but the final decision on metering will be made in the future.

In addition to acquiring more parking spaces, the police department will receive many new facilities when the new complex is completed.

"They'll have a shooting range, a briefing room, seven male cell blocks and three female cell blocks, a holding room, a training room, a matron's room, and men's and women's locker rooms," Marotti said.

The police department now has only three cell blocks and

none of the special rooms, he said.

And those arrested by Belleville police will have less chance to escape. Police cars will pull into a carport where doors close automatically behind the vehicles and closed-circuit televisions record all entrances.

"Right now the police just pull up to the building and drag them in," Marotti said.

"The new police facility will be one of the top facilities in the country," Public Safety Commissioner Ralph DiRuggiero said. DiRuggiero declined to comment further until the plans were officially approved by the board of commissioners.

The process of building the complex will take approximately two years, Marotti said. After all moving is completed, the current town hall building will be used as a civic center.

"No, for safety we need those change lanes," Russomano said. "You can't put a price on people's lives. You can't expect to have 15 people hurt per year."

Essex County Assistant Engineer Robert Busch concurred.

"We're trying to improve the safety of county roads," he said. "The 15 accidents were only a part of all accidents that happened there because reportable accidents must involve \$500 damage or personal injury."

Township Engineer Neil Siciliano said that the plans complied with township construction standards.

In May 1985 we reviewed the plans and made an engineering estimate that it was a safe improvement," he said. "From an engineering standpoint it is a definite safety improvement."

Siciliano also said that the

loss of parking spaces to the Belleville Plaza and People's Bank could be lessened by converting some spaces for use by compact cars.

"The planning board and zoning board would have to cooperate to allow compact parking, but I'm sure we could get their cooperation," he said.

Many neighboring townships allow 30 percent of spaces to be designed for compact cars. These spaces are 7 1/2 by 15 feet instead of the traditional 10 by 20 feet.

Public Safety Commissioner Ralph DiRuggiero instructed Neil Siciliano to explore the expansion of the intersection further. He also recommended that the board of commissioners solicit public opinion of the matter by including it on the agenda of its next meeting Feb. 11.

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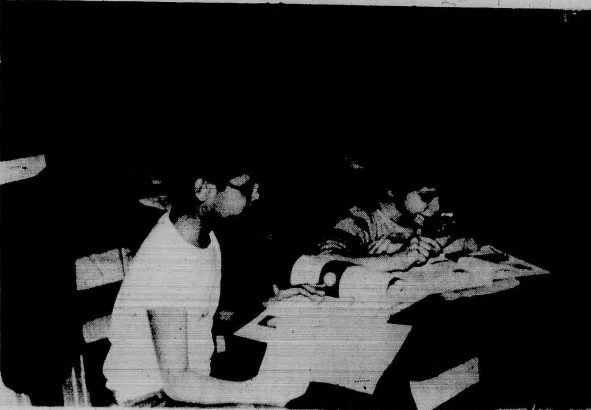

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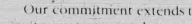

Sophomores are named top athletes

They are both sophomores, but their coaches are gearing the defenses around them. They both have tremendous offensive prowess, but usually receive the brunt of criticism from their coaches. They are the sophomores that you should be plenty of over the next two years.

Judy Nehila and Ted Sochaski are the Belleville High School athletes of the month for January. As mentioned, they are both sophomores, playing on young teams that are building for the future.

Nehila's story is one of continuing improvement. She is an athlete that head coach Karen Fuccello was aware of from the eighth grade on.

Judy has the tools necessary to be a very good player. Fuccello said, "She has the fundamental skills necessary. She has the offensive ability and I'm trying to gear the offense around her. She has to take that jump shot, drive to the hoop, if it's there and make the right decisions on the break. She has the ability to do those things."

So much so that Fuccello is gearing her offense around Nehila for the next two years. Nehila, along with junior Laura Caruso, sophomores Raquel Melson and Sandy Brew and freshmen Laurie Dondarski, Danielle Pizzi and Simone Edwards, figure to pace the 86-87 club, one that will return with experience after playing some tough N.J.H.I. clubs this winter.

Nehila's offensive performances have improved tremendously last season, she started to come on in the late stages of the season. This year, after a slow start in December and some early games in January, she has been very steady of late.

The sophomore had a string of six games in which she hit for double figures every time, leading her team in scoring in five of those games. It started with the Immaculate Heart game. After scoring just one point in the first half, she regrouped in the second half and finished with 12 points. Against Passaic, she led the way with 17 and followed that with 14 against Nutley. 19 versus Kennedy. 16 in the victory over Paramus and 12 at Clifton. The string was broken last Friday night when she scored eight at home against Bloomfield.

That's a 14.3 ppg average over those six games, an indication of the talent that Nehila possesses. The career high 19 against Kennedy was even more impressive when you consider the team scored just 29 points.

Nehila's free throw shooting has also improved. After a 1 for 7 effort against Columbia in the opener, she has shot 17 of 27 in her last 10 games. She also isn't afraid to play with pain. In the second game of the season, she played with a bad toe having had the toe nail surgically removed earlier in the day. Last week, she played the Bloomfield game with a painful hip pointer, an injury suffered in practice.

Her favorite high school player was Jennifer Apicella, the former Belleville scoring ace who now plays for Holy Cross University. She plans to work hard during the off season, in an effort to be even more effective next winter.

Certainly, her better days are still ahead of her, but based on her performance in January, Judy Nehila should be a big asset to the future of the program.

Sochaski's Turnaround

Ted Sochaski has been on fire over the past two weeks. This is after a heart to heart conversation with coach Rocco Colucci.

"He was in a mental slump earlier this month," Colucci said. "He wasn't putting out 100 percent and he knew it. After the Passaic game, I talked to him and told him that he scored 14 points and should have had 28. He wasn't working as hard as he could in practice and that's important. You can't play take it easy in practice and then expect to turn it in for the games."

Sochaski took his coaches advice and has played some tremendous games. In his last three games, the sophomore has scored 69 points, hitting for 25 against Paramus, 25 versus Clifton and 22 last Friday night against Bloomfield.

The 25 points are a career high and Colucci is expecting a lot more from his 6'3 1/2" forward.

He has the potential to be a very good high school player and feel he can play on the collegiate level. How far he goes depends a lot on him. His potential is unlimited. I don't think there's anyone in the program that I've worked harder, of that I expect so much from. His potential is unlimited. We have a mutual respect for one another. He knows what I expect and I know what he can do. He also knows that if he doesn't give it his best, or doesn't work hard enough, he'll be sitting next to me on the bench."

Needless to say, Colucci expects a great deal from this talented athlete. Thus far, he has answered the call. Sochaski leads the team in scoring with a 16.2 ppg average. He leads the team in free throw attempts, 52, and has hit 33 for a 63 percent accuracy, tops among his teammates.

With Sochaski, Leon Puentes, Rob Hutchinson, Chris Goldrick, Loung La, Frank Morel, John Morel, Craig Burden and some junior varsity players developing, the future teams at Belleville High could be in pretty good shape.

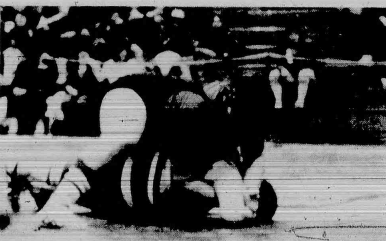

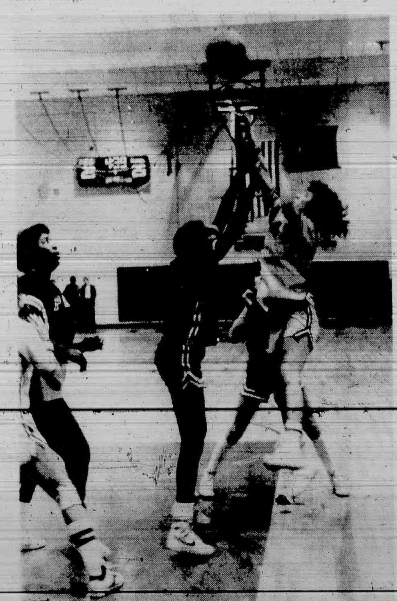
Indeed, the Bucs did have a tough time at the free throw line, hitting only 10 of 21 shots and keeping the game dangerously close.

with only one real challenger. Kearny's John McCaffrey. Although Nardone defeated McCaffrey by a 13-5 margin earlier in the season, the Kearny-122-pounder has not lost since and could give him a run for his money. Still, the choice here is Nardone, emphatically.

Tricaptain Tim Buckley owns the 129 slot in the Bucs' rotation, and has a 6-9 record thus far. Buckley, as was stated in last week's article, is really a misplaced 115-pounder. His record could cause seeding problems for Coach Nisrovicia, but it is not inconceivable for Buckley to reach the finals in his division.

St. Benedict's Pat Napoli and Essex Catholic's Joe DePiro are the top two seeds in this weight class. The prediction here is a clouded one. If Buckley is seeded in Napoli's bracket, he probably will finish third. However, it is the feeling here that Buckley can beat DePiro. A seed in DePiro's bracket could lead to a silver medal for Buckley, despite his deceiving record.

At 135 pounds, Phil Zamloot draws the most difficult weight class in the 2nd district. Essex Catholic's Dennis Hall is undefeated and will undoubtedly be seeded first. Bloomfield's Ari Cuffari is also undefeated and will surely draw the second seed. Zamloot owns a 9-6 record, but that log is not one of the better ones in his class, thanks to Masters Hall and Guffari. A third place finish for Zamloot seems to be a fair assessment this year. Next year is the one in which he should

shine. Carmine Tirone has developed into one of the co-favorites this year in the 141-pound division. With an 11-4 record this year, the only opposition would seem to come from St. Benedict's Justin Scarpace. If Tirone manages to wrestle the way he has in the past month, he will walk away with a district crown. First place is predicted here, with the championship bout coming against Scarpace.

Belleville's second to captain is David Siletti and he is the most difficult Buc of all to predict. If he wrestles as he did against Nutley's Mark Muller, it is conceivable he could be knocked out of the district in the first round. However, if he wrestles as he did against Clifton and Montclair, he could win the gold medal.

The history of the Siletti wrestling family has been one of rising to the occasion. With brothers Jason and Luke reminding him of

his responsibility, David should be ready for the challenge. A third matchup with Muller is in store with the results going Siletti's way, probably by a 6-5 score.

Mike Minichini is another Buc with an excellent record but having the misfortune of winding up in a monstrous weight class. Essex Catholic's Pat Caruso is undefeated and the top seed in every one's book. Bloomfield's Tony LaVacca is undecided as to whether he will compete at 158 or 170. If LaVacca competes at 158, Minichini can be seeded no higher than third.

Minichini's record is outstanding (10-1), but in comparison to Caruso and LaVacca, that is only third best. The pick here is a bronze medal.

The 170-pound class has Lou LaTontie as its resident "with a 2-5 record this year. Unfortunately for LaTontie, he has too many obstacles to overcome to earn a place medal. Lost and foregone, he has


only been out for the team a few weeks, and the inexperience is painfully obvious. Additionally, his record will surely put him against the top seeded grappler in his class.

Hopefully LaTontie will learn this year and win next year. That seems to be the most logical train of thought. However, let us not forget the legend of Carmine Rispoli.

Belleville has not had a 188-pounder all year, so that makes an easy time for predictions. This class will be won by Nutley's Nick Seelman or St. Benedict's Woody Pleurizart, finishing second. Finally, at heavyweight, Maxie Caravene is the clear choice to win a gold medal for the Bucs. Caravene's only real opposition will come from Steve Goshell of Nutley. Caravene has split two bouts with Goshell this year, both with a 1-1 record and 10 pins.

The fourth quarter was wrap up time for the Bengals, as the tired Bucs fell victim by a 54-36 count.

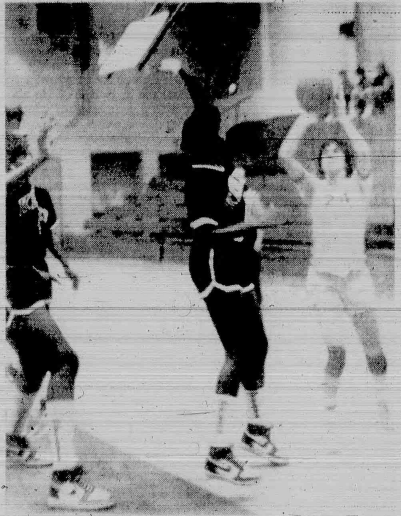

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New wrestling coach leads winning team

Joe Nisvoccia, Belleville's new head wrestling coach (after six years as Jayvee coach), has established a championship atmosphere throughout his entire athletic career.

As a recreation grappler in the Edison wrestling program, Nisvoccia was a gold medal winner at 72 pounds and a silver medal winner at 84 pounds. His overall record as a rec wrestler was 24-1-1, an outstanding .960 percentage.

In high school, Nisvoccia continued his winning ways by capturing three district gold medals and a regional title in his senior year of 1972. "Nis," as he is affectionally called by his team, capped a brilliant high school career by winning the state championship at 115 pounds in his senior year of 1972.

He received an athletic scholarship to Rutgers University and was a four-year performer on the Scarlet Knights' wrestling squad. His college credentials included a 50-7-1 record and the selection as team captain in his senior year.

Upon graduation from Rutgers, Nisvoccia landed a job as assistant coach to Glen Kehler in the Westfield school system. After only a year there, "Nis" moved on to

Belleville where he has taken roots.

He has headed the Belleville Recreation Program for the past four years and is now coaching many of the boys on the varsity squad he trained as youngsters.

Basically a quiet, almost shy individual, Nisvoccia leads by example and by hard work. He is a confident performer and, coach, albeit quietly so, yet his workouts at the BHS afternoon sessions are strict and grueling.

Another aspect of Nisvoccia's personality was probably honed by his predecessor, Gene D'Alessandro. Caution in assessing his team's abilities and goals has become more and more a Nisvoccia trademark. In evaluating this year's team the coach stated, "I really hate to use the word, but I really must classify this year's team as a rebuilding year."

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
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For a restaurant with origins dating back to Revolutionary times, Proud Mary's in Bloomfield does a fine job of keeping up with the times.

Due to his two-year layoff, Minichini was forced to use his exceptional strength during the early season to win most of his matches. Now that some of the rust has worn off, he is relying more and more on drills and switches to score his points.

In fact, Minichini is one of only two grapplers this year to win a shirt for special moves assigned by Coach Nisvoccia. The coach established four moves from headlock to a fireman's carry to a pin, front headlock to an ankle pick to a pin, drag reap to a pin and double leg lift to a pin on the B-3 of Belleville's home mat.

Only Minichini and Armando Nardone have earned a shirt this far this year.

Minichini's season record is indicative of his hard work at practice and his extra-curricular work out. His only tie was against a wrestler in the 170-pound class, 12 pounds over his wrestling weight. One of his four losses was due to a disqualification in a bout which would have been an easy victory.

As you can see, Michael Minichini is making up for lost time. With at least two dual meets and the district right around the corner, Belleville's rugged 158-pounder is almost out of challenges to overcome.

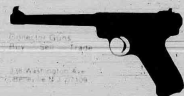

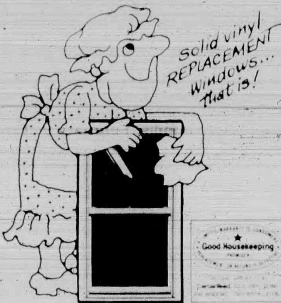

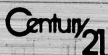
