School board reorganizes

Linfaente elected president; three members sworn in

Incumbents Phil Linfaente and Ernest Zoppi were unanimously elected president and vice president, respectively, of the Belleville Board of Education at its reorganizational meeting Monday night.

Sworn in as members to the board of education during the meeting were incumbent Dr.

Anthony D'Agostino and new comers Daniel Borgo and Barbara Cicalese.

Linfaente, a two-year member and former vice president, succeeds D'Agostino, who was elected to his fourth term on the board in last Tuesday's election. Zoppi, a former board president, was first elected to the board in 1978. He enters his sixth term

this year.

"I am very happy to have been elected president of the board of education," Linfaente said. "My main concern as president of the board is that there are a lot of good things happening within the schools that I want people to know about."

"I want to continue the open

communication between the parents-townpeople and the board," he added.

As proof of his intention about keeping townspeople abreast of school activities, Linfaente unveiled a banner with the district's new slogan, "Good Things Are Happening In Belleville Schools."

According to Linfaente, the slogan, which will be in existence at least during his presidency, resulted from a comment made by Dr. Elena Scambio, county superintendent of schools, during a meeting in Belleville a few years ago. Those were her words, Linfaente said.

One issue he will be addressing as president of the board is the repair of the middle school.

"I don't know which way or how, but it is something that has to be done," he said.

As far as the defeat of the school budget is concerned, Linfaente said he hopes that the township commissioners are fair in the amount of money they cut from the budget. Approximately \$450,000 was appropriated in the budget for repairs to the middle school.

In a statement made after his election, Linfaente complimented

Children fingerprinted through police & schools

The Belleville Police Department in cooperation with the school system, will conduct a fingerprinting program for elementary, school and pre-school children the week of April 28-May 2.

The fingerprinting program within the Belleville school system was established three years ago, according to Police Chief George Lister. Although there have been no missing children reported in Belleville, he said, the program was established as a result of parents' requests.

According to Lister, fingerprinting is one conclusive way of identifying a lost child because fingerprints remain the same throughout life.

A program, which included dental records and photographs of children was proposed, but according to Commissioner of Public Safety Ralph DiRuggiero, it was too costly to put together in the time frame allotted.

"At this point, we have expanded that type of program," he said. "We discussed it with the health department and Dr. Palmer Burde, the township dentist, and found it would be too difficult to put this type of

program together for this spring.

However, DiRuggiero did not rule out an expansion of the fingerprinting program in the future.

"We are looking to discuss the possible funding of such a program with private companies," he said.

The fingerprinting program itself has already been expanded in that this year pre-schoolers will be included in the process. According to Police Chief Lister, because parents also requested, the fingerprinting of pre-schoolers, the township decided to try such a program.

A special date for the fingerprinting of pre-schoolers has been set up. Parents of pre-schoolers (ages 2-5) are asked to pick up permission slips at their neighborhood schools, fill them out and report either to the school during the assigned day or to the Knights of Columbus Hall, 94 Bridge St., on Wednesday, April 30, from 6-8 p.m.

The fingerprinting program is voluntary, however, all children being fingerprinted must have a signed permission slip and be accompanied by a parent.

Fingerprints will be taken on standard fingerprint cards supplied by the police department. Information listed on the card will include the child's name, address, race, sex, date of birth, age, birthplace, height, weight, color of hair, color of eyes and complexion and scars (if any).

Parents will be responsible for the card upon its completion.

According to Det. Vincent Massi, program coordinator, approximately 500 students will be fingerprinted next week. That number, he said, reflects transfer students and students who have not yet been fingerprinted. The majority of students are kindergarteners, he said, adding that any student who has not been fingerprinted will be during the week.

The schedule for the fingerprinting program is as follows: Monday, April 28: Schools 4 (morning and afternoon) and 3 (morning only); Tuesday, April 29: middle school and School 7; Wednesday, April 30: Schools 10 and 3; and Thursday, May 1: Schools 8 and 5.

A make-up day for all students has been scheduled for Friday, May 2.

Citizens' group concerned with three major town issues

The Belleville municipal budget, the new town hall, commuters, and changes in the township charter are three of the topics a newly formed Belleville citizens' group plans to address.

At the forefront of the as yet unnamed organization are Vincent Frantantonio at Mt. Prospect Street and Cornelius Vander Zwan at Marion Court, two outspoken critics of the Belleville Board of Commissioners plan to erect a new \$10 million municipal complex next to the existing town hall.

According to an April 17 statement released by the group, "Events regarding the new town hall project are raising new levels of concern among Belleville residents."

Frantantonio said a petition opposing the new town hall project was circulated by the group and was subsequently signed by 2800 Belleville residents. He added that some of the petitions have not come back yet, and that the final figure expected to be considerably higher.

Regarding the proposal, 1987 township budget the group projected a \$480 tax increase on a home assessed at \$50,000, a prospect which it termed "frightening."

Concerning the township charter which provides the board of commissioners with its spending authority, Frantantonio said, "We're looking into changing the township charter because we don't want five part-time men to have the power to spend \$10 million without a referendum."

The citizens' group currently has 15 members. The board approved \$10 million bond and utility additions for a new town hall, in \$3 installments. This amount would be used to purchase the Belleville Police Department with a new public safety building which would be built on township property behind town hall.

According to Frantantonio, the group will be investigating several alternative plans to alleviate the problem of inadequate municipal office space, including the possibility

utilization of the board of education complex formerly School 11. The school was closed in 1978 and converted for use as the board of education's headquarters but is currently underutilized by one third to one half of its capacity.

Frantantonio claimed that School 11, which is on Valley Street, two blocks from Town Hall, was originally proposed as a possible municipal annex two years ago by defeated school board candidate Michael Giordano.

Burned-out owners receive approvals for new buildings

The owners of the Washington Avenue buildings gutted last month are receiving conditional approvals from the Belleville Zoning Board of Adjustment to erect new buildings on the same sites.

Giacomio Nassis, owner of J&P Cleaners at 543 Washington Ave., submitted plans for a new building and cleaning business at the April 13 zoning board meeting. Architect for the project is the Centanni firm based in Bloomfield.

DePalma of Union Zoning board secretary Mary DePalma said the two projects were conditional, pending the approval of compatible architectural plans to be submitted at a future zoning board meeting.

"Since the buildings will be so close together, they had to agree for the architects to get together and work out a reasonably common facade," Hood said.

The applications submitted by Nassis and Perri followed pledges to "remain in Belleville" made by both businessmen shortly after the tragic fires that claimed their

Program may cut costs

Township may save insurance monies

The proposed Essex County Municipal Insurance Pool Program may slash up to 25 percent off of Belleville's insurance bill next year, a savings of \$40,000 to \$80,000.

"We've been looking into insurance pools for some time," Township Treasurer Isadore Padula said, adding that the township is also considering a planned state-wide insurance pool that could further savings similar to the savings possible with the planned county pool.

Belleville, along with 100 other municipalities across the country, has been included in a national insurance pool which has pushed up the price of municipal insurance 780 to 100 percent higher than last year, according to Rona Parker, spokeswoman for Essex County Executive Peter Sarni.

A municipal insurance pool would let the towns share their insurance costs with 25 percent below commercial insurance companies, said Padula.

The plan, however, Padula pointed out, Belleville will not be able to join the pool of liability and carries commercial insurance only for claims in excess of that amount. Padula said self-insuring has already saved the township a good deal of money.

Because the self-insured were not on that list of rates, Padula said.

However, carrying self-insurance coverage, while considerably less expensive than the savings, still is expensive.

According to Padula, the latest Essex Insurance Pooling for 1986

cost \$189,000, of which \$107,000 went for building and liability coverage, \$57,000 for water coverage and \$25,000 for protection against false arrest suits.

Of the \$25,000 false arrest policy Padula said, "This year we may not be able to get it all and if we can get it, it will cost \$50,000."

Had there been an insurance pool offering a 25 percent savings this year, Belleville's insurance bill would have been about \$40,000 less. Should the township participate in a pool of terms similar savings this year, the savings could run as high as \$80,000 since the cost of commercial insurance this year is double.

Padula said he has a municipal insurance questionnaire on his desk, which is to be filled out and sent back to the county by late June. The same questionnaire has been distributed to 51 other Essex County municipalities, many of which are rushing their insurance costs.

The questionnaire, along with technical assistance and the terms of a municipal insurance consultation form, is being financed with \$25,000 in seed money from the county.

The planned "Actable for Loss pool" calls for a setting up of a municipal insurance pool commission by July and establishing the actual money saving pool by October, according to county spokeswoman Parker.

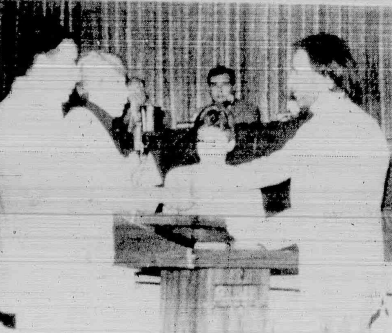
Meanwhile, the township will be expected to begin making plans to join the pool by July, Padula said.

School board election

Two thousand nine hundred and six voters representing approximately 19 percent of the registered voters visited the polls last week to re-elect School Board President Dr. Anthony D'Agostino, reject the reelection bid of incumbent Gabe Nazzola, and elect two youthful newcomers, Mrs. Barbara Cicalese and Danny Borgo.

Former school board member, Thomas Spillane, finished just outside of the running, gaining 1,056 votes, while third place Cicalese received 1,224 votes and second place Borgo received 1,276 votes.

Trailing far behind were Nazzola with 761, Richard Yanuzzi with 674 votes, Michael Giordano with 265 votes, Mary Susan Bloesch with 217 votes and Catherine Gangeruso with 79.

The word on the street is that Gabe Nazzola lost his bid for reelection because of his perceived involvement in partisan political affairs — and not because of his record as a school board member. The new board should have no problem reorganizing and continuing the good work already in place.

As for the defeat of the school board, the current expense section of the budget was defeated by a 3-2 margin and the capital outlay budget lost by an almost 2-1 margin. Failing school board budgets is not a new experience in Belleville. It is almost a tradition.

Judge Nicholas Amato

Judge Nicholas R. Amato, completing fifteen years as Essex County Surrogate, was replaced on the Democrat ticket at the insistence of County Executive Peter Shapiro in order to achieve a ticket that would be ethnically balanced.

Judge Amato, a white, was rejected for renomination by Shapiro because room had to be made on the ticket for a black.

Judge Amato has served with distinction as Essex County Surrogate for the past fifteen years. Among the legal fraternity, Judge Amato is recognized as the outstanding surrogate in New Jersey. He is considered to be operating the most efficient surrogate's office in New Jersey.

A continual rejection of school board budgets is an invitation to future disaster to the community at large.

Facts remind us of U.S. aid to France

To the editor:

This letter is in response to France not allowing our American planes to fly over their country en route to Libya. Here are some facts about how America helped France during World War II.

July 6, 1944 — Gen. De Gaulle arrived in Washington to confer with President Roosevelt for help to defeat the Germans who were occupying France.

July 25 — Americans under Gen. Bradley break through German lines in Normandy and begin a great drive which routs the enemy.

Aug. 1 — Americans enter the province of Brittany from Normandy.

Aug. 3 — Americans race through Western France 30 miles toward Rennes and 25 miles toward St. Malo, threatening the port of Brest.

Aug. 4 — Americans take Rennes and another American unit sweeps west across the Breton Peninsula, taking Dinan. A third unit reaches Morlaix, 150 miles from Paris.

Aug. 7 — Americans are fighting in outlying streets of Brest, other American units are fighting at Lorent and St. Nazaire, and driving toward Nantes. The battle of the ports are won.

Aug. 8 — After overrunning the Brittany Peninsula, the Americans went eastward with a great drive toward Paris.

Aug. 9 — American troops close in on Le Mans, 110 miles from Paris. Gen. Eisenhower moves his headquarters from England to Normandy.

Aug. 15 — Invasion of Southern France begins with Americans, British and Canadian troops storming ashore between Nice and Marseilles. Infantry lands under cover of a 70 minute bombardment from the United States Navy.

Aug. 19 — A southern invasion in France was made by the United States 7th Army, under Maj. Gen. Alex Patch, in northeast France. Gen. George Patton commanded the American Third Army who whipped his tanks within 40 miles of Paris.

Sept. 11 — United States First Army units under Lt. Gen. Hodges enter capital of Luxembourg. German Siegfried line bombarded from a dozen frontier posts.

Sept. 12 — United States First Army crosses German border near Trier, advancing 5 miles into Reich. U.S. Third Army seizes part of the old French

Magnin line intact. Troops from the Seventh Army under Gen. Patch coming up from the Mediterranean make contact with units of Patton's Third Army near Dijon.

Without the American's help, the French would be paddling their boats in the ocean, plus France would be called Russia now.

Golden Comments

Snatching victory from what seemed certain defeat: Vincent Frantantoni, the inspirational and competent leader of massive hordes of irate local homeowners and tenants enraged over the Belleville Board of Commissioners' proposal to build a \$10 million town hall on Washington Avenue, led his angry cohorts in vituperative demonstrations at public hearings that staved the hands of the commissioners' determined plans to go ahead with their already legally passed ordinance providing for such construction.

Frantantoni and hosts of qualified speakers who swayed the noisy crowd which filled the high school auditorium well into the wee hours of the morning and invective shouts and catcalls threatening recall of the commissioners' proposed town hall.

Frantantoni's proposal to build the town hall on Washington Avenue, led his angry cohorts in vituperative demonstrations at public hearings that staved the hands of the commissioners' determined plans to go ahead with their already legally passed ordinance providing for such construction.

It is gratifying that discretion proved the greater part of valor on the part of the commissioners who had vowed, with the exception of Commissioner Joseph McGreevy who voted for a referendum vote of the people, an adamant stand to build the new

Washington Avenue town hall.

The overall outcome of Frantantoni's superbly orchestrated campaign and his exceptional leadership in masterly marshalling his forces with its proper deployment of eloquent speakers and press coverage clearly demonstrates the efficacy of his leadership qualifications and bodes well for his being recognized as a capable township personality whose voice should be heard in community affairs.

Despite the acrimony engendered by this donnybrook, the advantages of democratic action manifest the opportunity of the people's voiced views to be heard. Surely, the commissioners sensed the will of our people and had little doubt, but they would ignore their threat to petition for a recall.

With confusion over what compromise might be agreeable, amounting in the area of \$3.5 million seemed most acceptable. A committee of five is to be selected, with Police Chief George Lister among them, to come up with plan alternatives to be studied.

The commissioners did vote unanimously to authorize Beckhard Richlin and Associates, the architectural firm handling the project, to prepare alternative plans. Frantantoni says, the architect's plans are only 60 percent complete. The property next door has not been bought yet and will probably wind up in litigation. The final cost has

not been determined and they don't even have a contractor yet. An announcement at the meeting was made that the other property sought previously would not be bought.

Mayor Michael Marotti still favors the \$10 million town hall plan, saying, "I'm not in favor of rescinding at this time. When you come in with a lower cost factor, we'll be willing to rescind at that time."

The regularly scheduled commission meeting of April 22 had been cancelled and a public meeting on Belleville's municipal budget is set for Tuesday, April 29, 8 p.m. at Belleville High School, although the published Belleville budget indicated the budget hearing would be at the township hall on that day.

The voters' defeat of the local school budget presents another vexing task to the commissioners who now must consider reducing a portion of the rejected budget. It is not mandatory that they do so, however, in view of the projected high tax increase coming, the people will be expecting them to make substantial cuts in both the school budget and the township budget.

The Belleville natives are more than restless these days. They are angry. They didn't get a 2.5 percent pay in crease over three years like the town and school employees did two years ago.





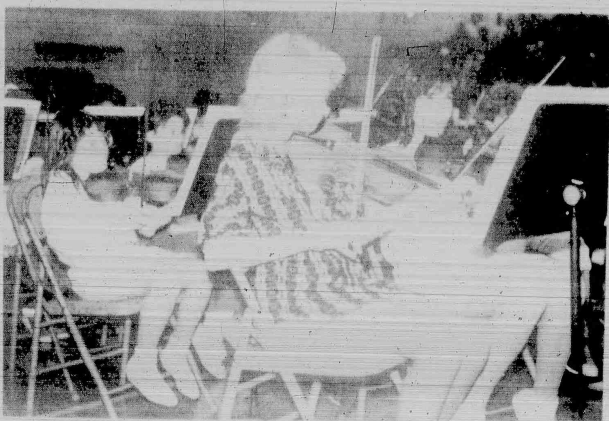

Elementary students present Spring Music Festival

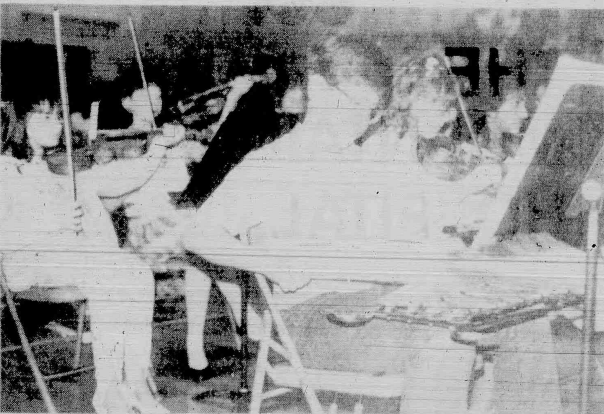

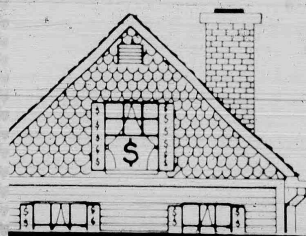

Mrs. J. of Belleville asks: "Why is it so hard to replace a missing tooth?"

One of the strongest muscles in the body is the tongue. Mrs. J. wants to know why God's teeth next to it. The tongue has to get used to not lifting the denture. If eventually happens but it's a time. In addition to the tongue, saliva tends to pool at the bottom of the mouth providing a slippery base for the lower denture. The upper denture does not have the presence of saliva to provide a watery environment. And finally the action of the muscles moving the lower jaw all tend to dislodge the lower denture. Sleep walking, nightmares part of normal development

Parents are apt to become upset when a child wakens or talks in his/her sleep or has frightening dreams. Although it can be distressing to witness such nighttime disturbances in children, parents need to know that in most cases, these are normal developmental occurrences and usually have no special psychological significance.

These sleep disturbances — night walking, night talking and night terrors — are quite common in children between the ages of 7 and 10. They occur in about 40 percent of boys in this bracket and to a lesser extent in girls. They can occur at earlier ages and may persist through adolescence. Typically, these dramatic sleep interruptions occur in the first third of the night. They are caused by momentary awakenings as the child shifts from a deep sleep state into lighter sleep. The immature developing nervous system is momentarily confused at these transition periods.

With night terrors, the child may scream and seem to be terrified, but he or she does not usually remember the frightening dream and is in no way harmed by it. However, if the dream was about, for example, the dream was about, it probably occurred later in the night — a nightmare. Only if the same dream repeats itself often might a problem be indicated.

In adolescence, as in the pre-teen years, these sleep disturbances may be regarded as normal if they occur infrequently

once a week or less for night terrors, and sleep walking decreases in frequency with age, occur during the first third of the night and there is no recollection of the frightening dream.

If, however, the sleep disturbances persist into adolescence and increase in frequency, they may indicate emotional upset. Problems in school, with friends or with parents, or conflict between the parents, can result in sleep disturbances in the teenager. In such cases, when the sleep disturbance is persistent and frequent, counseling is advisable.

Under any circumstances, parents need to be concerned about taking necessary precautions in the case of a child who walks in his sleep. A gate or some other barrier should be installed at the top of the stairs, and doors to the outside should be secure. The parent should not attempt to awaken the sleepwalking child but rather should guide him gently back to bed. If he does wake up and find himself out of bed, it may frighten him. If the child talks in his sleep, either while sleeping or while lying in bed, the parent may respond to him calmly and reassuringly in the context of the things he is talking about. Do not try to correct him or reason with him at the time or the next day, even though what he is saying may not be realistic.

Remember that with children, just as it is true at any age, occasional sleep problems are normal. If they persist, you should feel comfortable about discussing these incidents with your pediatrician or physician.

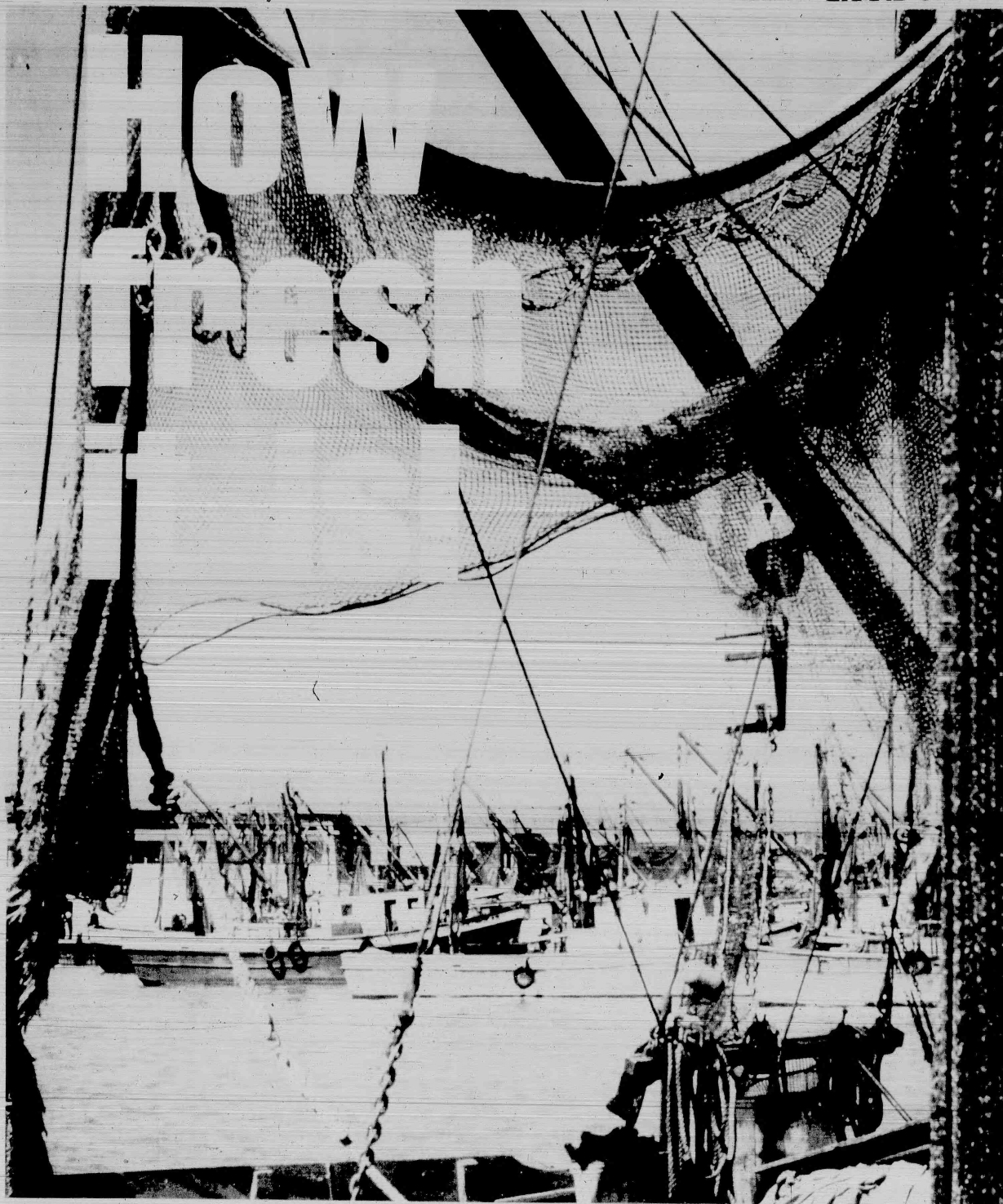

Coach upset about Bucs' slow start

Ralph La Conte doesn't make excuses. Very rarely will he criticize something rather than his team for a loss. However, the coach has been upset about his team's slow start this spring, and is not blaming his team for the entire problem.

La Conte's reasoning is justified. If you follow the Bucs, then you know the team is 3-3-1 entering this week's action. You probably also know that Belleville has played just three complete games this spring. Now, a complete high school game consists of seven innings. Unfortunately, the Bucs have been able to get in the full seven innings less than 50 percent of the time.

It also should be noted that two of Belleville's three losses and the tie have come in shortened games. The team lost to Bergen Catholic, 4-3 in six innings to Ridgewood, and tied Paramus in a five inning affair.

Why the shortened games? Daylight savings time does not take effect until the last Saturday in April. Therefore, until that time, it gets dark a little earlier, usually 5:30-6 p.m. In the early part of the season, before daylight savings, Belleville schedules a number of interconference NNJHL games. The opposition is usually Teaneck, Hackensack, Ridgewood, Bergen Catholic, Paramus, St. Joe's and Don Bosco. You don't have to be a geographical genius to know that these schools are located in Upper Bergen County and encompass a large bus ride. The traffic is also congested at 3:30, 3:45 p.m. Very rarely does a game begin at 4 p.m., the scheduled time for the two short losses to Ridgewood and Bergen Catholic. The Bucs had to travel to Bergen County, quickly warm up, then try and get in a game before darkness, or possibly rain.

It's an impossibility to travel so far, then get the kids ready to play a game when you're up against darkness. La Conte said, "Very seldom does a game start on time. It's very difficult to get the kids ready to play on short notice. This has happened in previous years, since La Conte started the head coaching duties in 1983 the first year of conference play. It's difficult to coach a game like that."

What's the solution? La Conte feels there are a few choices.

Either get the kids out of school a few minutes earlier, so we can get a head start, or move the time of the games up. We're not playing baseball, we're playing basketball. There are two games a week and not all are on the road, so we're not taking a lot of school time. A few minutes can help in letting kids warm up properly or getting the game started on time.

Another possible solution is scheduling the interconference games on the weekends, where there is no problem with starting times or playing the games later in the season, when daylight savings time is imposed. That extra half hour to 45 minutes can result in a game being played to completion. With daylight savings set for the Saturday, Belleville's schedule now features NNJHL rivals Bloomfield, Nutley, Clifton and Eastside, games that are much closer and could probably be played earlier in April and be completed on time.

The problem with the present format is the coaching and strategies totally changes with the imposing darkness. Say hypothetically, Belleville and Ridgewood are playing in Ridgewood. The Bucs trail 3-2 entering the sixth inning. Dave Long and John Aueriema drill back to back singles and Dave McNeill brings them both home with a double. McNeill then scores on a Jim Murphy single and Belleville leads 5-3. Belleville doesn't score any more in the sixth, but it's getting dark.

Bottom of the sixth, Ridgewood scheduled to bat. However, the umpire notes that it's too dark and the game is called. Belleville wins, right? Wrong. Under high school rules, the game is reverted to the last full inning, where Ridgewood was winning 3-2. Thus Ridgewood wins a five-inning game, and Belleville's hits in the six are for naught.

You have to keep the runs down, especially on the road. La Conte said, "You can't afford a big inning late in the game because it might not count if the home team doesn't get up in its half of the inning. That's not what baseball is about. You're supposed to be out there to win, not beat the clock before it gets dark."

La Conte maintains that many times, in a close game his team is playing for the tie late in the game, rather than going for the win. The team tries to get the necessary runs then hurries the remainder of the inning so the other team can get up and hopefully, not score.

Belleville's only game last week, a 7-5 loss to Bergen Catholic, was a prime example. Bergen Catholic is in Oradell, a town located near Ridgewood, some 35 minutes away. The Bucs got to Oradell, warmed up quickly and batted first. The skies were overcast and a steady drizzle gave indication that stronger rains were coming.

Belleville scored five runs in the first inning. That's where it ended. La Conte said, "I knew it would be tough to get seven innings in."

When Bergen Catholic tied the game at five with a second inning out, La Conte knew it would be a short game. Sure enough, three innings later the game was called with Bergen Catholic leading 7-5. Belleville batted through the fifth inning before rain halted the game.

You can't control the rain, but darkness halted the Ridgewood, Paramus and Don Bosco games early. Belleville won the Don Bosco contest, but the point is, the kids should get a full game. They work hard in practice and should be entitled to playing a game without fear of darkness changing the outcome of an exciting contest.
