Howard Relocation Group will provide services to government agency personnel

The New Jersey-based Howard Relocation Group (HRG) has been awarded a government con-tract to provide relocation services in 14 northeastern states to the personnel of a number of federal agencies

personnel of a number of National agencies. The Howard Relocation Group is a subsidiary of the \$3.7 billion asset Howard Savings Bank of New Jersey.

They came down from Bergen on a mission of goodwill, and they were ambushed. There were three of them --

a male guitarist, a female singer and a helper. They had just finished a benefit perfor-mance at Studio I, a nightclub near Washington Avenue, one block south of the Belleville

summer? They entered our area via Route 21, taking the Mill Street exit to Washington Avenue, ex-pecting to use the same route to return home. However, being unfamiliar with Essex, the trio was un-aware that in order to get to 21 North, one must first drive back into Newark, past some of the most crime-ridden housing projects in the county.

the most crime-ridden housing projects in the county. At about 4 a.m. near the cor-ner of Grafton Avenue and Mc-Carter Highway, a carload of suspects pulled out in front of the trio's vehicle, cutting them off just before the Route 21 eptrance ramp.

entrance ramp. Then, according to Newark Police, a second carload of suspects blocked them from the rear, preventing any chance of escape.

that eight suspects armed with baseball bats pulled them out, stealing their money, jewelry, equipment, and finally their

The male victims were club-bed senseless, suffering in-juries ranging from cuts and bruises to a mild concussion, while the female victim, thank

while the female victim, thank God, was merely robbed and al-lowed to flee. Later, they were treated at Clara Maass Medical Center and released. The good news is that another trio of good samaritans witnessed the crime and provided Newark Police with names and statements. Six of names and statements. Six of the suspects have since been apprehended.

apprehended. This incident, not the first say officers at Newark's North District Precinct, represents a new level of organized street crime, a carefully planned urban ambušh in which suspects, using stolen cars, lay in wait to literally "head them off at the pass." Until such criminal activity in that area, less than a mile from our border, can be effec-tively corralled, we urge that all Belleville signs for Route 21 be changed to redirect traffic to

be changed to redirect traffic to the Main Street ramps, one mile north and safely within our township

According to a recent study, According to a recent study, the elderly are spending 15 per-cent of their incomes - an average of \$1,660 per person in 1985 - for health care costs. And the costs continue to rise." Senior citizens are one of our

provide younger generations with a wealth of knowledge and yet sometimes, they are treated like lower-class citizens. It is a shame that after

citizens. It is a shame that after putting in their years of service in the workplace and at home, senior citizens are subjected to such atrocities. The senior citizens in Essex County are supporting legisla-tion which requires physicians, including dentists, optometrists and chiropractors to name a few to accept a Medicare As-

Orechio's bill appropriates cleanup money

Senator Carmen Orechia (D) 30th: has introduced a bill 182669) which will appropriate 2500000-to the Department of Environmental Protection for the continued cleanup of hazardous substances at the Organic Inorganic Chennical Corporation site in Belleville

In 1983 Senator Orechio sponsored S3425 which was passed by the Legislature on an emergency basis and signed by Gov Thomas Kean to clean up the site when the incident first occurred.
