"We were originally going to shoot this scene at Yonkers, New York," said Jeff Stelow, location manager for the film.


"At the last minute the deal fell through. We came to see the





Orechio blames county executive for \$19.6 million fiscal 'fiasco'

Taxpayers throughout Essex County are being forced to suffer for the coming 12 months, Orechio says, because of what he calls a deliberate mismanagement of the county's finances by the Shapiro Administration.

Orechio, the Republican candidate for county executive, says Belleville alone will suffer if Essex municipalities faces cash flow problems by early June, and he says he is not a fan of the county's fiscal situation.

Problems surfaced, Orechio says, because the Shapiro Administration "deliberately" without warning in late 1984 the county executive. But the problem, and the state, could be solved, Shapiro the year and authority, we're faced with coming out with \$19.6 million in tax back bills.

Orechio, however, the county

delays paying its bills in recent years, simply to make Peter Shapiro look good in his self-serving efforts in seeking higher office.

"Because municipal tax bills have to be mailed, taxpayers face delinquent penalties imposed whenever payments are received later than Aug. 1. Many municipalities are attempting to change local law to temporarily suspend the penalties for late payment of taxes."

"Many towns already are attempting to borrow money on a short-term basis because of the expected cash flow deficits resulting from the delayed tax bills," Orechio said.

Orechio said he supports the Freeholder-controlled board of freeholders in its efforts to stay within the budget, but that it is possible when you choose to ignore existing bills as Shapiro has done.

Among his foremost priorities will be not only to spread a lot of daylight and sunshine on Essex County's fiscal affairs, but to work as closely as possible with the board of freeholders in ensuring business-like and efficient government for all of Essex County.

Shapiro: freeholders fattened Essex budget; Sheriff's hike 'obscene'

Essex County Executive Peter Shapiro said the Freeholder Board has broken faith with the taxpayers by passing a budget that increases the tax levy by 27 percent over last year's.

"If I were a Freeholder I would have voted against it. If I had the power to veto, I would have vetoed it."

The budget was adopted by the Freeholder Board on July 2 by a vote of 7 "Yes" with District IV Freeholder Minor L. Luybald and District V Freeholder Arthur L. Clay voting against the budget.

Shapiro attacked the budget as being passed so late that it has severely affected town governments who can't send out tax bills in time. He said the budget in County history. And one of the things that is the worst budget in Essex County history.

According to a Shapiro spokesman, the Essex County budget was proposed by Shapiro in January 1985, on time according to state law. Once the budget was introduced, the Freeholder Board takes over and it is supposed to be passed by March 28.

Today, on July 2, they finally took the action they were supposed to take months ago, Shapiro said.

"The final adoption of the budget is by the Freeholders. Resolutions are not subject to executive veto," Shapiro said. He is going to propose that a change be made in state law to give County Executives under this form of government the power of line item veto similar to what the governor has in the state budget today. With the power, the County Executive could reduce the tax levy or appropriation in order to save tax dollars, but not increase it.

With line item veto power, I would have looked for ways to cut the budget by as much as \$10 million," Shapiro said. "I am convinced there is plenty of fat in this budget and instead of sticking it to the taxpayers we should be taking on some of the sacred cows."

Kelly bill passes; measure will aid Vietnam vets

The General Assembly today approved a measure designed to help Vietnam veterans collect public assistance.

The measure, sponsored by Assemblyman John A. Kelly, R-Essex, and Paul DeGaetano, R-Bergen, and passed by a vote of 21-0, will provide that any funds made to victims of Agent Orange, a spraying used by the U.S. military in Vietnam, will not be considered income when determining eligibility for public assistance.

DeGaetano explained that during the Vietnam War, Agent Orange was sprayed over Vietnam to defoliate its jungles so the enemy could be more easily seen from overhead.

If a lawsuit brought against a manufacturer of herbicides in Agent Orange, proceeds from that lawsuit, that money should not be considered when determining the person's eligibility for public assistance, Kelly said.

The bill, A 2387, was approved by the Assembly by a vote of 21-0. It was forwarded to the Senate for consideration.





Midseason Major League soundoff



Let's take a break for this week from local sports and take a look at the Major League Baseball season as we near the annual All Star Break next Tuesday.

Baseball is more popular than ever, especially in the metropolitan area, where both teams are doing exceptionally well. At the beginning of the season, this column boldly predicted St. Louis and San Diego to win its division championship. San Diego is certainly in the running, but St. Louis' only chance for the title is if the other teams in the NL East forfeit the remainder of its games.

In the American League, the April picks were the Yankees and Kansas City to win its divisions. The Yankees are struggling at press time after a good start. Kansas City is playing its worst ball at the moment, however the Royals are housed in the AL West and have rallied to win the title over the past two years after poor starts. So, don't count them out yet.

In the NL East, the Mets are off to a marvelous start and seem a shot in to win the title, its first since 1973. The Mets dominance of the division is reminiscent of the 80 Royals, 83 White Sox and 84 Tigers run away seasons. In 1980, the Royals opened a huge lead by the All Star break, then breezed to the title by 14 games over second place Oakland. In '83, the Chisox won by 20 games over second place Kansas City and in '84, the Tigers went wire to wire, winning by 14 games over Toronto.

The Mets seem to have it all, with solid pitching and an excellent offensive team. Montreal appears to be the only club capable of making a run in the second half, although Philadelphia might have a chance to make it interesting. The Mets would need a rash of injuries, however, to give Philly and Montreal a legitimate chance of narrowing that gap.

In the NL West, it's up for grabs. One of the interesting aspects to the '86 season is the new teams in contention this summer. In the West, San Francisco is in first place, with Houston right behind. The Giants and Astros haven't been contenders too often lately. Houston did win the crown in 1980, but San Francisco hasn't won since 1971. The Giants, you might remember, were close in 1982, battling to the final weekend before losing to Atlanta.

San Francisco, Houston, Atlanta and San Diego are all in the running. You can't count out Cincy and Los Angeles although both teams are struggling. I still stay with San Diego to win the West, battling the Mets in the NL championship series.

In the American League, the big surprises come from Cleveland and Texas, where winning baseball is not very common. The Rangers last posted a winning season in 1977 and have not won a divisional championship since the inception of divisional play in 1969. The Rangers were the former Washington Senators before moving to Arlington in 1972.

Cleveland has also not won a title since divisional play was introduced. The Indians last had a winning team in 1978 and last won a title in 1954. It's doubtful the Indians will win the AL East, not with Boston and the Yankees in the same division. However, it's exciting to see a different team making a run.

The Red Sox finally have some good pitching and with the addition of Tom Seaver, could have it all. Can you imagine a World Series between the Red Sox and Mets? Tom Seaver versus Dwight Gooden at Shea Stadium? I don't think the Mets fans would know who to root for. I couldn't imagine Seaver ever being the enemy at Shea Stadium.

The Yankees have a chance to catch the Sox but poor starting pitching could prove to be the difference. Unlike 1978, when the Yanks caught the Sox down the stretch, the Yanks don't have the pitching this time and the Sox do. Cleveland could sneak into third ahead of Toronto, who has been playing better but no where near the 85 team Milwaukee is a solid ball club, maybe just a year away from serious contention. Baltimore and Detroit could pull up the rear this year, a long way from the '83 and '84 seasons when those teams respectively won the World Series.

In the AL West, Kansas City could come back, especially with their pitching. However, California could be the team to beat this summer. The Angels have a number of veterans who might be making their last serious run at a championship. Texas on the other hand, is a very young team on the way up. The Rangers lack experience down the stretch, where California is used to pressure. The Angels won the '82 divisional title, then lost in the final weekend in '84 and '85. Players like Ferguson-Jackson, Don Sutton, Doug DeCinces, Bob Boone, Brian Downing and Bob Grich could prove to be the difference for the Angels in the final weeks of the season. In the playoffs, Boston over California in six games and the Mets to defeat the Padres in five. The official Buc Shots prediction is the Mets and Red Sox in the '86 World Series. The winner? Stay tuned, we'll see in October.


Ruppoff, Lucante and Rodriguez paired off Belleville with two hits each. Dunphy and Best had a hit each and Belleville received some good pitching.





Congressman Roe pushes drunk driving resolution

Drunk driving deaths continue to be one of this country's national tragedies. Rep. Robert A. Roe (D-N.J.) District 10, informed President Reagan at a recent meeting upon the President to declare this leading cause of death a "national emergency."

Roe was joined by 84 colleagues who signed the resolution sent to President Reagan. He said "Drunk driving remains a growing tragedy and deserves immediate attention. The previous efforts at all levels of government have failed to halt the carnage and human suffering that stems from this problem."

Roe said that in his district alcohol related automobile deaths have continued to increase and he noted, "It's mostly the teenagers

who are responsible for the deaths."

In a recent interview with the Belleville Times, Roe expressed his concern that there has been a growing public awareness of our nation's problem with drunk driving for effective reform. The time has come for aggressive and effective action to answer that plea. Drunk driving is the leading cause of death among young Americans and a leading cause of brain and spinal cord injury for people of all ages.

"According to the U.S. Department of Transportation, an estimated one out of every ten citizens will be involved in an alcohol related automobile crash in their lifetime. With less than 25,000 lives and \$14 billion yearly in property damage, the country demands the highest priority."

Roe pointed out that legislation alone is not the answer. He said, "The solution lies in attacking the problem at a dual systems approach through the collective participation of local citizens, law enforcement agencies, judicial and executive sectors, and national resources. This type of action could reduce fatalities by as much as 50 percent."

pastor. Eighteen Nutley Police Officers served as Father Blake's pallbearers and honor guard. They and five Essex County policemen escorted the funeral procession with five Nutley police cars and five motorcycles, two of which were on loan

from the City of Newark and Township of Bloomfield.

The procession stopped at the Public Safety Building on Chestnut Street, where police honored the priest who had been their chaplain with a memorial service. The bell was rung and municipal employees lined the streets in homage. The procession then continued into Lyndhurst, where three of that township's officers joined on motorcycle. Father Blake was buried in Holy Cross Cemetery in North Arlington.

Father Blake's career began in 1941 after he was ordained on receiving a master's of divinity degree from Immaculate Conception Seminary, Darlington, now affiliated with Seton Hall University. 




