dent Shirlee Sherman is enthusias tic about the idea. She said that the chamber has extended member-ship to private citizens in the past, but that the cost was \$20, not \$5, and that special discounts were not a part of the plan. She, like other chamber officials, is hopeful that a lower price and the prospect of saving big by shopping locally, will lead to a number of townspeople holding - and using - key cards. 

improved. I'll check with the state department of transportation to see if there any funds available." For a road renewal fan like myself, I find it very encouraging that Believille's highest state and town officials both agree that repay-ing the strip is the way to bring it

Regarding step two, saving the brick, I mean just that: Designate the finest brick buildings on Washington Avenue as township landmarks, and pass a resolution barring their demolition.

Many of these buildings were built by immigrants and the children of immigrants, who wor-ked long and hard to make a life for themselves and their future genera-tions in America. A part of our heritage lies with that brick!

Currently, no developers are rushing to rip down any Avenue brickwork for new projects, but should the Avenue get treated to a new stone blanket, the desirability of a Washington Avenue location

Supports fair housing...

In last week's Belleville Times, Assemblywoman Marion Creeco endorsed the concur-rent Resolution 110. I think she is mistaken in endorsing this Resolution for the following

reasons: The New Jersey State Legislature, in an effort to remove housing decisions from the courts, adopted the Fair Housing Act of 1985. The Fair Housing Act* provides a method to enable every municipality in the State to determine and to provide for a fair share of its region's need for low and moderate income housing. The Council on Alfordable Housing's initial substantive rules implement this statutory purpose through criteria and guidelines which assess regional need, fair share and the adequacy of municipal measures. I concur with the New Jersey Legislature's determination that the issue of producing housing does not belong in the courts and that viable alternatives must be devised in order to avoid measure over-development as a side module of addressing the year, real housing

to avoid massive over-development as a side product of addressing the very real housing problems of New Jersey. The Affordable Housing Program provides an opportunity for the New Jersey Housing Mortgage and Financ Agency to correct the imbalance in affordable housing state wide. In addition, the real need for affordable rental housing which has almost never been produced by the "builders remedy" approach has been addressed by the "builders remedy" approach has been addressed by the Council.

If the decision whether or not to build affordable housing units within a community is

If the decision whether or not to build affordable housing units within a community is left solely to the discretion of the municipality, would any affordable housing units be built, or would we merely be reverting back to the pre-Mt. Laurel condition? In order for a smoother functioning of the implementation of the Fair Housing Act of 1985, the Council on Affordable Housing should take advantage of the specialized agen cies, Housing Authorities and non-profit corporations already in existence. Clearly, New Jersey municipalities have an undisputed role and responsibility in the areas of planning and zoning. However, New Jersey municipalities have historically established specialized local housing agencies to develop and manage low and moderate income housing. The implementation on the Act would function more effectively and efficiently if these

The implementation on the Act would function more effectively and efficiently if these specialized agencies were recognized for their organizational capabilities and expertise in the provision of low-cost housing.

In conclusion, I would like to commend the State Legislature for having enacted the Fair Housing Act of 1985 and the Council on Affordable Housing for their efforts to ex-peditiously implement the Fair Housing Act regulations. It would be tragic for the low and moderate income families in the State if the Fair Housing Act of 1985 were under mixed by the mercene of the effectivity. mined by the passage of this resolution.

Crecco renews call for action on check holding bill

Assemblywoman Crecco renew ed her call for swift passage of legislation that would shorten the period of time that banks may hold checks prior to depositing

The legislation, Assembly Bikk 3175, introduced jointly by Assemblywoman Crecco and Assemblywoman Maureen Ogden (R-Essex), would shorten the holding period for checks. Under the provisions of the bill, deposits made by government check, cer-tified check, cashier's check, bank check or money order would have day. Other in-state deposits would become available within two days, and the time-limit would be three days for out of state checks. Additional provisions in the bill would permit individuals receiving government checks, like social security, to cash the check at any institution where they have an ac "Thanks to new computer Thanks to new computer systems, checks can clear almost instantaneously. Many banks still maintain the same, long holding periods, they used in the 1950s. This must end. By passing my legislation, the Assembly will stop the delays many consumers fac when depositing a check," Crecco

Fabian is not new to the demands of coaching a sport like crew. He has been an assistant coach at Belleville for 13

years. "It's a big difference (from assistant to head coach)," said

"It's a big difference (from assistant to head coach)." said Fabian. "You have to worry about scheduling, equipment and other things that weren't in the way when you're an assistant. That's all right, though. I really enjoy the job." Fabian was graduated from Belleville High in 1969, where he rowed freshman crew under the tuteloge of Giuffrida and varsity crew under Mike Lally. After graduation from col-lege, Fabian came "home" to Belleville and has been an as-sistant ever since

"Dennis (Villano) has the experience of coaching so many years in wrestling." Fabian said. "He knows how to motivate kids. Bobby and Maureen have been through the sport before and they know what they're doing."




