Hope to revitalize township shopping district

Chamber announces discount cards

One reason many townspeople choose to shop outside of Belleville is the quest for value. Big sales at malls and stores along highways often spur Bellevillites to pass Washington Avenue and other township shopping districts by.

Recently elected Chamber of Commerce Vice President Vincent Frantantoni, however, has an idea that promises to lure some of them back into the habit of shopping in town.

"The Board of Directors of the Belleville Chamber of Commerce have embarked on a new program to unite all members of our community in a common goal - to create a new and positive image for Belleville and to involve all our citizens in the Chamber of Commerce."

The meat and potatoes behind this grandiose statement is a citizens membership key card which entitles the holder to special discounts and privileges.

As Frantantoni, whose official title is Vice President of Retailing, explains it: "A \$5 annual membership fee will provide shoppers with a membership key card entitling them to discounts and special considerations from member merchants."

Already, says the chamber veep, the program is starting to take off. Some of the township's most prominent retailers and businesses have already hopped on the key card bandwagon, pledging special discounts to prove that it's still "better in Belleville."

These include Sherman's children shop, Charles Jewelers, Personal Fitness, Century 21, Kondreck Photographers, Crown Chevrolet, Belleville Tee Party, K-mart Cafeteria, and Belleville Shoes. And as word spreads through the dozens of chamber members, the list is growing fast.

Discounts are at the discretion of the individual retailers, Frantantoni points out, but could eventually spiral into major savings for shoppers. Some offer 5%-15% off across-the-board, while others may select special values on certain items or services for savings as high as 50% off or more.

Chamber of Commerce President Shirley Sherman is enthusiastic about the idea. She said that the chamber has extended membership to private citizens in the past, but that the cost was \$20, not \$5, and that special discounts were not a part of the plan. She, like other chamber officials, is hopeful that a lower price and the prospect of saving big by shopping locally, will lead to a number of townspeople holding - and using - key cards.

Says Chamber of Commerce Chairwoman Jaye Tarantino: "Our chamber has a wide variety of members who are ready to service the public and are participating in the key card program to show how

much better in Belleville shopping can really be."

"I hope that the citizens of Belleville will unite with us and make Belleville shopping vibrant once

Area firm hosts drug abuse forum

"It's very frightening to think that over 5,000 people try cocaine each day for the first time," said clinical psychologist Gerald Shulman, M.A., at a seminar held in Nutley on one of New Jersey's most serious health problems — chemical dependency.

The seminar, cosponsored by Hoffmann-La Roche, Inc. and the New Jersey State Nurses Association (NJSNA), was held March 25 at Roche headquarters in Nutley.

Shulman, an accredited member of the American College of Addiction Treatment Administration spoke before an audience of 200 nursing professionals and media members.

"Women in the work force are four times more likely to use cocaine than housewives," continued Mr. Shulman. "It may be the most compulsive drug we know of — even more so than heroin."

Shulman also noted that chemical dependency is crossing over monetary boundaries. "Cocaine is no longer the drug of the rich and famous. Two children can easily pool their lunch money and

bus fare and buy a vial of crack." Other speakers included nurse/attorney Jill Slattery and William Ambrose, a nurse who recovered from drug addiction. The group discussed chemical dependency, with special emphasis on cocaine and crack, how to define addiction, identification of the population at risk and changing addiction patterns and treatment modalities.

Nurses face dilemma Slattery, who represents a number of nurses before the Board of Nursing involving licensure issues, said, "Attorneys representing impaired nurses face the potential dilemma — a legal duty to avoid confrontation and minimize sanction while aware confrontation may be the only effective means for impaired nurses to seek treatment and counseling to ultimately survive."

Ambrose told the group how his peers ignored the physical and mental signs of his drug addiction and expressed concern that other impaired nurses may be in need of help. "A real challenge facing nursing in general, supervisors, direct care givers and administrators is that they not shut their eyes to the problem."

School board election '87

Belleville Board of Education President Phil Linfante and newcomer Patricia Pisano were the victors in the April 7 school board election, as incumbent Sy Grossman was edged out by 55 votes in light turnout.

"I feel real good about the win," Linfante said enroute to his victory

Grossman carried two polling places.

Linfante's strength was at the Middle School, School 5, the Recreation House, and especially at School 3 where he took 154 votes to Grossman's 120 and Pisano's 95. Surprisingly, the board president lost at Belleville High School,

at the same locale, but poor showings by Grossman at School 8 and the Middle School negated his margin at School 5.

The election was seen by many as a reaffirmation of the continued leadership of township democratic party chairman Chet Prosperi and republican party chairman Angelo

Phil Linfante, 1154 - Patricia Pisano, 1067 - Sy Grossman, 1012

Risoli. Both men openly endorsed Pisano.

School budget defeated In other election news the school budget was soundly defeated both in the capital outlay category and in the current expense category. Only voters at School 5 and School 9 voted in favor of the budget, and by narrow margins. A full breakdown of the voting appears on page 9 of this week's edition of The Belleville Times.

which is up the block from his home street and in the heart of "Linfante Country," where many supporters had erected signs with that slogan. The vote at Belleville High School was close, however, with Pisano taking 88, Linfante taking 80 and Grossman 71.

Grossman's biggest strength was at School 5, where he took 197 votes - the highest tally for any candidate at any polling place. It was nearly 100 votes more than Pisano earned.

The election was somewhat of a squeaker, with top vote-getter Linfante garnering 1154 votes and Grossman receiving 1012. Only 142 votes separated the two.

Pisano, with 1067 votes, carried eight out of thirteen polling places. Linfante carried three polling places and the absentee vote while

Township musician shoots for the stars

The American music industry is a tough nut to crack, as almost any Belleville musician will tell you. The township has offered up many popular music acts; names like React, Ambition, and Hollywood Teeze quickly come to mind. These groups, each with their own special talents, has spent many years on the New Jersey pop scene, playing small clubs in both New York and the Greater Essex area, and investing thousands of dollars in professional recordings and equipment. But the pot of gold at the end of the rainbow, a record deal from a major label, unfortunately has not yet come to any of them.

Add to this list "Gabe Nazziola," better known to townspeople as Gabriel Nazziola Jr., the soft-spoken, hard-rocking son of former school board member and current commission candidate Gabriel Nazziola Sr.

Like his Belleville rock colleagues, Gabe also has dreams of making it to the big-time, but even if he doesn't quite make it to the top, his career is still speckled with highlights. Foremost among them are his live shows.

"This month I'll be playing the Arlington Lounge in North Arlington, and The Dirt Club in Bloomfield," Nazziola says of his immediate local touring schedule. Other clubs the 25 year old BHS grad has played during his career include famous Manhattan nightclubs like Studio 54, Xenon and Kenny's Castaways.

In addition, the young rocker has appeared on the Uncle Floyd Show, a popular Jersey-based TV program, and is scheduled to appear again on television later this spring when a segment he did on The Underground Cafe airs. That show, which is broadcast state-wide on the CNN network, is produced by another Bellevillite, Pat Mirucki.

Older Bellevillites, however, are more likely to remember the junior Nazziola for his performance on a float during last year's Columbus Day Parade.

For some would-be rock stars, record company rejection is enough to make one quit the business, but Nazziola has other ideas. Earlier this decade, he decided to release his own record, to sell at his performances, to send to record companies and radio stations for publicity, and to have as a testament to his own perseverance. That record, now very rare, did not "hit" for one very good reason.

"It wasn't recorded well enough," Nazziola recalls, "We did

Superintendent Nardiello to be honored by Community Mental Health Services

Michael D. Nardiello, Superintendent of Schools for Belleville, will be honored by the Community Mental Health Services of Belleville, Bloomfield and Nutley at their Annual Dinner on Friday, April 24 at The Chandelier.

A Community Mental Health Services Board of Trustees member said, "Mr. Nardiello is an educator from the word go." Selected because of his special interest in education for all children, Mr. Nardiello served on the Board of Trustees of the Community Mental Health Services from 1973-78. During that time he was part of a team that provided leadership for the three-community (Belleville, Bloomfield and Nutley) program called the Garden School for physically and emotionally impaired students. Superintendent Nardiello, with faculty from Bloomfield and Nutley, met bi-weekly at the Community Mental Health building, where the Garden School was located.

Soft spot for children

Nardiello admits to always having a soft spot in his heart for the

student who had a more difficult time with learning and physical tasks. It was natural for him to move from teaching science, math and physical education into the field of special education in his se-

cond year at Belleville public schools. In 1964, when he became the first director of Special Education, he developed this new program for the school district. Continuing in administrative roles for

13 years as principal of School No. 4 (his boyhood grammar school), he maintained his concern about special education through program development and budget support.

Entire career in Belleville

Since 1980, Mr. Nardiello has been in the Superintendent's Office of the Belleville schools. His entire career of 36 years has been with the Belleville School District.

Community Mental Health Services maintains five programs that serve persons with special needs or persons who face unusual stress in their lives.

The Therapeutic School serves children ages 3-10; a counseling program is available for families and individuals, aimed at maintaining the family structure and reducing potential violent and destructive behavior. A day-program for chronically mentally ill adults is provided through the partial Care Program and the Friendly Visitor Program served homebound elderly.

Essex Executive announces \$422,000 for renewal of Valley neighborhood

County Executive Nicholas R. Amato announced that on March 31, Essex County Community Development, represented by Rosemary Senatore Ciccone, assistant director; Jack Case, acting housing coordinator and Bill Kattermann, representing the Township of Belleville for Bruno Associates attended a workshop in Princeton, sponsored by the Department of Community Affairs. The subject of the workshop was the Neighborhood Preservation Balanced Housing Program.

The program will be a cooperative effort between the County and the township and will address serious rehabilitative needs within the Valley neighborhood. Residential units will be rehabilitated over a three-year period.

These units will be mostly one to four family owner occupied houses.

All units will be occupied by low to moderate income families. The first priority will be to rehabilitate a structure to comply with local code.

The County, in conjunction with the Township of Belleville will provide the professional expertise required to quickly and effectively implement this program.

Program applications will be available sometime this spring and residents of the areas will be notified by a direct mailing.

The County Executive Nicholas R. Amato and Mauro G. Tucci, acting director of Community Development stated that the total combined cost per year will be \$422,625 over a three-year period.

The Township of Belleville will receive \$200,000 from the Essex County Community Development Block Grant fund and the remainder from the New Jersey Depart-

ment of Community Affairs.

County Executive Amato states that the neighborhood is viable and stable.

Implementation of the program proposed will reinforce property owner efforts and enhance the neighborhood.

Chamber power

Everyone knows the traditional good points of shopping locally. Better service, less gas and time, and the satisfaction of helping the local economy are but a few.

Here in Belleville, we may now add one more good point to the list of reasons to shop locally - value. The Belleville Chamber of Commerce has announced a new key card program which offers member townspeople discounts at all participating businesses.

Discounts, which are at the discretion of the individual businesses, would range from as little as 5% or more across-the-board to as high as 50%, and it appears that the scope of savings possible to local shoppers is as limitless as the innovation of the business owners.

This effort, spearheaded by the chamber's newly elected vice president of retailing, Vincent Frantantoni, is just one example of the many steps forward the Belleville Chamber of Commerce has taken in recent months.

Here is an organization that has brightened the community and

involved the youth through a delightful Halloween window painting contest; put Belleville on the sports map with an annual day of footracing, and later this month will present all candidates for the township commission on television in conjunction with OBC-TV.

Under the leadership of Chamber Chairwoman Jaye Tarantino, President Shirlee Sherman, Vice President Vincent Frantantoni, and other chamber officials of vision, the organization is going full-steam ahead toward returning to the commercial prosperity of yesterday.

To these accolades we can only add one suggestion.

Avenue businesses who have facades in need of repair should take care to improve their appearances. Even across the street from our historic Town Hall there are sloppy signs with broken, crooked letters, for example.

The old saying, "One bad apple spoils the whole bunch," applies nicely here. The Chamber would do well to insist on polishing the bad apples in their midst.

Redeveloping Belleville

Last week The Belleville times published the current meeting schedule of the Belleville Redevelopment Agency, and it is a vigorous one indeed. Beginning 8PM, April 15, at 383 Washington Avenue, the agency is to meet once a month through the end of the year.

The redevelopment agency originally came under fire in the early eighties for supporting a blight proposal which promised to attract federal funds for the restoration of lower Washington Avenue. However, this proposal might have tarnished Belleville's image. It was subsequently rejected by the township commission.

Last year, the agency came under fire once again for having an infrequent meeting schedule, and at one recent town meeting several citizens called on the board of commissioners to disband the group.

This would be unfortunate.

The Belleville Redevelopment Agency needs to be strengthened, not weakened. It needs an influx of new people, new ideas and community participation. It needs to

focus on a wide variety of possibilities for restoring Washington Avenue, and Franklin Street, the Valley, Soho and every area of town that is lacking in any way.

After all, it's not the Washington Avenue Redevelopment Agency, it's the BELLEVILLE Redevelopment Agency.

Belleville, like many older Essex communities, needs redevelopment and therefore needs a redevelopment agency to attract it, plan for it, and accommodate it.

The first step has already been taken - setting up a sure and steady meeting schedule.

Next comes the hard part. Just as interested residents have turned out in record numbers for town and school board meetings, so too must they turn out for Belleville Redevelopment Agency meetings.

Input from the people of our township is what will make our township, already a good one, even better.

We wish the Belleville Redevelopment Agency well for 1987, that they may help lay the groundwork for a prosperous 21st Century community for all of us.

Golden Comments

Back in early 1984, Steve Singer, executive vice president of Merchants Motors in Hooksett, N.H., leased a fleet of 20 cars to an out-of-state client with excellent references. A few months later, the client left the state owing Singer \$12,268 and three missing cars.

The cars were finally located — one had been located and abandoned in a Vermont parking lot, another was left in Maine after an accident and a third was impounded in New York City. The bill went unpaid until last fall when Singer, who is still angry, settled for partial payment — at 20 cents on the dollar. Now the client, former Colorado Senator Gary Hart, is back in New Hampshire, but Singer suggests that the Democratic front-runner lease his cars elsewhere.

"A campaign reflects the personality of its leader," Singer is quoted saying. "If you can't run a debt-free campaign in a small state like New Hampshire, how are you going to run the country?"

Other creditors across the country are asking similar questions that are beginning to unsettle the 1988 Hart campaign. An influential New Hampshire paper ran a front-page headline, "Hart's 1984 debt settled, but is it Paid?" Hart's debts could become a major political issue, says Ramsay McLaughlan, director of the state Democratic party. In Hart's home state critics have printed bumper stickers reading: "Honk if Gary Hart owes you money."

In January 1985, Hart's campaign debts stood at \$4.7 million. He has since reduced that to about \$1.6 million, but in New Hampshire, the repayment problem has been complicated by the fact that there were so many little debts — and in a small state, everybody seems to know about them.

Presidential political campaigns are not renowned for scrupulous repayment of debts, and Hart isn't the only candidate with a spotty track record. Hart's problem is different, however, not only because he will need credit for his second quest for the White House, but also because this time he is the front-runner and the leftover debt provides critics with a convenient line of attack.

Sometime in June, Rear Admiral Poindexter will testify before television cameras for the congressional select committees investigating Iran. Rumors around Washington suggest this 50-year-old is an angry and bitter man.

Not true, according to friends who say he is completely at peace with himself. The basis of his calm: he simply feels he did nothing wrong — and broke no laws — in helping arrange secret arms sales to Iran and permitted Oliver North's gunrunning operations to the Contras. "He had authority, direct or indirect, for everything he did," said a longtime adviser.

Even on the diversion of Iranian funds to the Contras, friends say Poindexter believes that he was following Ronald Reagan's policies and that he kept the President adequately informed. Indeed, he is likely to testify that on at least two occasions in 1986, he told Reagan in general terms that the Contras were being helped as an ancillary or side benefit of the arms deals with Iran.

The admiral feels confident enough to ignore for the most part the stream of Irancon revelation, counting upon his lawyers to keep track of what is important.

If Poindexter testifies that he informed Reagan, however generally, of how the Contras were benefiting from the Iran deals, it will be a severe political embarrassment for the President. Reagan has repeatedly denied that he knew anything whatever about the diversion, most recently at the March 19 news conference that Poindexter did not watch.

Asked if he might have been told about the diversion but had forgotten, Reagan replied with a vehement no. After the formal session had ended — but while he was still on television — Reagan added that Poindexter and North "just didn't tell me what was going on." That flat statement dismayed some advisers, who suggested that Reagan might want to use a hedge.

Pave the strip! Save the brick!

For years Belleville officials, merchants and citizens have wrestled with one of the township's biggest questions:

How do we bring the Avenue back?

Blight proposals...mid-rise proposals...taj mahal proposals...mama mia!

Enough already. There are only two steps this township must take to restore the Avenue permanently, definitely and instantly. One, pave the strip. Two, save the brick.

Belleville Mayor Michael Marotti agrees that a fresh coat of asphalt may be just the shot in the arm the Avenue needs.

It needs it," Marotti said, "and I'll look into funding and how much it would approximately cost. Hopefully, this can help move the Avenue in the right direction." He said the town's consulting engineer, Neil Siciliano might be able to come up with a ballpark figure by computing the square footage to be paved.

The Mayor added that Washington Avenue is a state road, one that's quite wide and long. And that means a lot of asphalt. The cost is likely to be steep indeed.

Belleville's senior state delegate, Senator Carmen Orechio, also agreed that repaving the strip can be the key to a fast - but enduring - turnaround.

"No question about it," Senator Orechio stated, "Washington Avenue needs to be repaved and improved. I'll check with the state department of transportation to see if there any funds available."

For a road renewal fan like myself, I find it very encouraging that Belleville's highest state and town officials both agree that repaving the strip is the way to bring it back.

Regarding step two, saving the brick, I mean just that: Designate the finest brick buildings on Washington Avenue as township landmarks, and pass a resolution barring their demolition.

Many of these buildings were built by immigrants and the children of immigrants, who worked long and hard to make a life for themselves and their future generations in America. A part of our heritage lies with that brick!

Currently, no developers are rushing to rip down any Avenue brickwork for new projects, but should the Avenue get treated to a new stone blanket, the desirability of a Washington Avenue location would skyrocket.

With that in mind, maybe the first step should be to save the brick, because even speculation that the Avenue is to be improved could put some of the buildings in jeopardy.

So who benefits from a new Washington Avenue?

The list is longer than you might think. There are the merchants, of

course. Business would pick simply because the strip would be a more enjoyable place to shop. Foot traffic would pick up as well.

Avenue property owners would also benefit. The market for Washington Avenue properties, already strategically served by several real estate agencies right on the block, would no doubt blossom. Worth would increase dramatically, creating a ratables windfall the next time Belleville revalues. Theoretically, this could ease the burden of private homeowners, because the commercial sector would be picking up a bigger percentage of the overall tax levy.

But for the extra taxes they chip in, Avenue landlords would enjoy a giant leap in the equity of their holdings. They're not likely to complain. Some may choose to sell and retire in twice the style. Others may simply take advantage of their fatter investment portfolios as extra collateral for more business adventures.

Townpeople would benefit from a rehabilitated Avenue as well.

Coming into the town's business district would be more pleasurable...no more dips, ripples, potholes, and cracks. Community pride would swell.

The image of Belleville would be transformed. Stable but stagnant would give way to progressive but preserving, caring. And that would be positive for everybody who wants the best for our township.

Essex would benefit of course. Washington Avenue is a road which serves Newark and Nutley too, and an improved Avenue road-bed makes for better mass transit, smoother auto traffic, and easier delivery of goods. Increased value of Avenue ratables, meanwhile, would benefit the county tax coffers.

Among our most prominent Avenue merchants are the new car dealers. Two GM dealerships, a Ford dealership and a Chrysler dealership combined make for a selection that is unequalled by any other town main drag. And when you consider that a fifth new car dealership lies just outside of town, and add the used car dealerships to the list, it becomes obvious that a lot of vehicles are test-driven on the Avenue.

Unfortunately, a test-drive on the main drag is just that - a drag. But there is no doubt in my mind that when the Avenue is repaved, our car dealers will benefit immensely and immediately.

Test drives on a smoother road will surely lead to more exclamations of "I'll take it!"

Perhaps, then, support for the drive to "Pave the strip!" will eagerly come from Belleville's new car business community.

A word of warning to Avenue slob: If you think your properties look bad now, imagine how they'll stick out like monstrosities when

the road is fixed up! No more camouflage, Mr. Landlord! Alert township officials will know right where to go with their code violation tickets, the ones that cost \$100 PER DAY!

Regular readers of "Bifani on Belleville" may recall a piece I wrote last month entitled "Season of the Road." In it I revealed my

Supports fair housing...

To the editor:

In last week's Belleville Times, Assemblywoman Marion Crecco endorsed the concurrent Resolution 110. I think she is mistaken in endorsing this Resolution for the following reasons:

The New Jersey State Legislature, in an effort to remove housing decisions from the courts, adopted the Fair Housing Act of 1985. The Fair Housing Act provides a method to enable every municipality in the State to determine and to provide for a fair share of its region's need for low and moderate income housing. The Council on Affordable Housing's initial substantive rules implement this statutory purpose through criteria and guidelines which assess regional need, fair share and the adequacy of municipal measures.

I concur with the New Jersey Legislature's determination that the issue of producing housing does not belong in the courts and that viable alternatives must be devised in order to avoid massive over-development as a side product of addressing the very real housing problems of New Jersey. The Affordable Housing Program provides an opportunity for the New Jersey Housing Mortgage and Finance Agency to correct the imbalance in affordable housing state wide. In addition, the real need for affordable rental housing which has almost never been produced by the "builders remedy" approach has been addressed by the Council.

If the decision whether or not to build affordable housing units within a community is left solely to the discretion of the municipality, would any affordable housing units be built, or would we merely be reverting back to the pre-Mt. Laurel condition?

In order for a smoother functioning of the implementation of the Fair Housing Act of 1985, the Council on Affordable Housing should take advantage of the specialized agencies, Housing Authorities and non-profit corporations already in existence.

Clearly, New Jersey municipalities have an undisputed role and responsibility in the areas of planning and zoning. However, New Jersey municipalities have historically established specialized local housing agencies to develop and manage low and moderate income housing.

The implementation on the Act would function more effectively and efficiently if these specialized agencies were recognized for their organizational capabilities and expertise in the provision of low cost housing.

In conclusion, I would like to commend the State Legislature for having enacted the Fair Housing Act of 1985 and the Council on Affordable Housing for their efforts to expeditiously implement the Fair Housing Act regulations. It would be tragic for the low and moderate income families in the State if the Fair Housing Act of 1985 were undermined by the passage of this resolution.

it at Studio 198 in Newark on a tight budget." He explained that the studio was very small back then compared to the more professional and larger studios in Essex and Manhattan, and that although his

resulting record "got his name out," it didn't pass muster with people in the industry.

Since then, however, the town rocker has learned much about the realities of a very demanding business, and his next project promises

to reflect this wisdom.

"I'm planning to release some more of my recordings on vinyl, possibly with a double b-side," he says. For those not familiar with "music biz lingo," vinyl refers to a record and a double b-side means two songs on the flip side, and an extra value for the money that major labels seldom offer.

Besides the bonus marketing move, Nazzola has also made sure that this record was recorded in a studio comparable to those used by the stars.

Following his humble Newark recording beginnings, he went on to record at some of the finest

recording rooms in Essex, including EARS in East Orange and House of Music in West Orange. This experience has paid off handsomely, as there is a marked improvement in the sound quality of his current tape over that of his earlier single.

Will it be enough to convince to record buyers? Radio programmers? Big time record companies?

Nazzola hopes so. But if not, he still takes pride in his work.

Says Gabe: "I don't do it for the profit. I do it for the exposure. The music is the main thing."

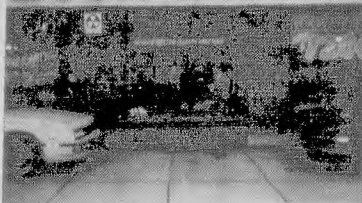

Last week, I left some readers wondering why a teacher tied my left hand behind my back. She wanted to teach me to write with my right hand! It happened in Belleville School 5. Why Belleville? At the time, we lived at 31 King Street, a block up from Washington Avenue, right on the Belleville/Nutley line. I probably could have gone to either Nutley or Belleville schools, but since the landlord's daughter was attending School 5, she took me by the hand and that's where I ended up. They did one hell of a job — Diane Guinan, Beverly Lanterman, Janet Clarke, Charlene Duffy and Maryann Richburg. The plane was 25 overbooked in coach and three in first class. When it came time to depart, eight passengers gave up their seats for a free Eastern Airlines trip to anywhere in America, thus making room for eight other ticketed passengers. Believe me, it was a mess — one that I don't want to be part of for a long, long time.

If you want to meet a man with a big, big heart, stop at Belleville Crown Chevy and shake the hand of a gentleman — General Manager John Abracclamento.

If ever you are departing from Palm Beach Airport via Eastern Airlines, look for two gentlemen who are worth their weight in gold to Eastern Airlines, and to you — Joe Vattiat and Dave Meadows. If Eastern Airlines has something akin to the Congressional Medal of Honor, these two guys are most deserving. Almost on a daily basis — because of the very nature of their positions — these two gentlemen are the ones that the riding public take to task because a flight is cancelled — a plane is late arriving — a flight is overbooked — first class accommodations are gone — husband and wife do not have adjoining seats. It's just terrible the quantity of complaints that Eastern Airlines employees like Joe Vattiat and Dave Meadows are held responsible for. They deserve better — but a complaining public couldn't care less — the person they see before them is either Joe or Dave, and the passenger says, "These men are Eastern Airlines and they are responsible." Delegate says swift action needed on bills to cut Essex overspending

Assemblywoman Marion Crecco (R-Essex) today called for swift approval of her legislation that would require county treasurers to notify the director of the Division of Local Government Services by December 1 of each year when the county is in debt for \$1 million or two percent of the total budget.

The bill also provides that when a county makes an appropriation to pay off the debt, it would publish a notice in a newspaper

circulating in each municipality of the county at least once for two successive weeks.

"The fiscal crisis now faced by many counties, especially Essex County, may well have been avoided had this legislation been in effect in the past," Crecco said.

The Bloomfield Republican added that "the purpose of the notice requirement is to warn taxpayers that the politicians are planning to raise their taxes again. It will provide the notice that we need to

take the proper action."

Crecco said that the bill, Assembly Bill 3296, was released on March 9 from the Assembly County Government Committee by a vote of 5-0.

"Making the politicians more accountable to the people is one of my top priorities in Trenton. This bill works towards a greater degree of accountability," added Crecco, vice-chair of the Assembly State Government Committee.

Assemblywoman Marion Crecco represents the Essex communities of Belleville, Bloomfield, Cedar Grove, Glen Ridge, Montclair, Nutley and Verona in suburban Essex County. Now serving her first term in the General Assembly, she also serves as a member of the Assembly Committee on Independent and Regional Authorities.

Crecco renews call for action on check holding bill

Assemblywoman Crecco renewed her call for swift passage of legislation that would shorten the period of time that banks may hold checks prior to depositing funds.

The legislation, Assembly Bill 3175, introduced jointly by Assemblywoman Crecco and Assemblywoman Maureen Ogden (R-Essex), would shorten the holding period for checks. Under the provisions of the bill, deposits made by government check, certified check, cashier's check, bank check or money order would have to be made available within one day. Other in-state deposits would become available within two days, and the time-limit would be three days for out of state checks.

Additional provisions in the bill would permit individuals receiving government checks, like social security, to cash the check at any institution where they have an account.

"Thanks to new computer systems, checks can clear almost instantaneously. Many banks still maintain the same, long holding periods, they used in the 1950s. This must end. By passing my legislation, the Assembly will stop the delays many consumers face when depositing a check," Crecco said.

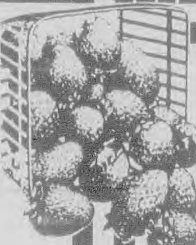

He took over a job that he never imagined would be his. At the time of taking this job, he was seriously considering retirement from coaching the sport. However, circumstances beyond his control convinced him that he should be the new head coach.

"I never expected to be in this position," Fabian said last week. "Of course, no one expected Coach 'G' to become ill. I'm just glad he's doing well, we all are."

Most people know that Coach Giuffrida suffered a heart attack last fall. He has made good progress in his recovery, but obviously, the rigors of coaching crew did not fit into his rehabilitation program. Thus, a man who coached crew for over 20 years, decided it was time to move over.

Fabian is not new to the demands of coaching a sport like crew. He has been an assistant coach at Belleville for 13 years.

"It's a big difference (from assistant to head coach)," said Fabian. "You have to worry about scheduling, equipment and other things that weren't in the way when you're an assistant. That's all right, though. I really enjoy the job."

Fabian was graduated from Belleville High in 1969, where he rowed freshman crew under the tutelage of Giuffrida and varsity crew under Mike Lally. After graduation from college, Fabian came "home" to Belleville and has been an assistant ever since.

He even tried his hand at coaching football, working with the freshman program back in the fall of 1981.

"At the end of last season, I didn't even think I was going to come back (to coach in 1987)," said Fabian. "I wanted to spend more time with my family and to continue my graduate work. I was seriously considering retirement from the sport."

Fabian was the architect of the girls' crew team which established prominence in the early 1980's. The 1982, '84 and '85 squads posted national championships for Belleville High School, but Fabian puts those accomplishments into perspective.

"G" was the coach," he says. "I just helped out with the girls."

Ask Giuffrida about the success of that team, and he quickly points to Fabian as the leader of the team. Fabian's reluctance to bask in individual glory is the story behind the sport of crew.

"It's definitely not a sport for an individual," said the coach. "Crew is a challenge, it has to be a total team effort." Any sports fan from Belleville will tell you that crew has been a very successful sport over the past 15 years. This season looks like a continuation of that success.

"We don't have a lot of kids," the coach says, "but what we have is excellent talent. I guess you can say we have quality, but not quantity. The kids are really enjoyable to work with. They are nice kids and enjoy the sport."

A typical practice session is five to six hours a day on the high seas of the Passaic River. A weekend away race usually means departure by 7 a.m. from Belleville and not arriving home until 10 p.m.

The Bucs travel to Philadelphia on occasional Sunday's to compete in the "Flick" races and are quite often in upstate New York, or Philadelphia for invitationals. The nationals are held in Virginia, so there is plenty of travel involved with the sport.

"In some of the regattas," Fabian said, "we have to leave by 4 a.m. and don't get home until early evening. It's a full day."

Despite his schedule, Fabian is continuing his graduate work at Montclair State College. He resides in Jefferson, New Jersey, located in Sussex County. Suffice it say, the coach doesn't have a hard time sleeping at night.

"I'm enjoying the job," Fabian said. "It's a challenge and I have an excellent staff to work with."

Fabian is assisted by Dennis Villano, Robert Cassin and Maureen Russo. Villano is sort of a newcomer to the sport, having not coached crew since the early 70's. Russo and Cassin were a member of Giuffrida's staff last season.

"Dennis (Villano) has the experience of coaching so many years in wrestling," Fabian said. "He knows how to motivate kids. Bobby and Maureen have been through the sport before and they know what they're doing."

All told, it seems like a smooth transition for the new head coach at Belleville High. Good luck to Coach Fabian and his staff as a new era of Belleville High School crew hits the high seas.

Tosato had to be optimistic with the performances turned in by his underclassmen. Six juniors placed in the meet, led by Craig Jackowski.

Jackowski was second in the 400 meters (58.3) and second in the 800 meters, 2:20. Mario Lemongello took third in the 200 meters with a time of 26.3. Rich Galasso finished third in the 400 meters (58.8) and Bobby Chulanandana was second in the pole vault with a jump of 8'.

Rounding out the underclas-

smen, Jerry Padula took second in the 200 meters (26.0) and third in the 100 meters (12.7). Finally, Greg Moriello, a fine middle to long distance runner, posted second in the two mile, with a time of 11:24.

Tosato is a little disappointed that all the meets will be on the road this spring.

The coach explained that the facilities at Belleville High do not have the necessary run ways that are required by the NNJIL. Also, because all conference meets are now co-ed, Belleville's track does not have enough lanes to run the necessary races.

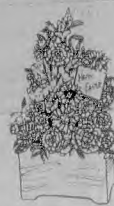

Real Estate Briefcase

What is meant by the term "holding paper"? — G. Morales, Nutley.

Financing is the singular most important aspect of homeownership for most homebuyers. In the long run, the purchase boils down to a matter of whether the purchaser (and the bank) feel comfortable not only with the house, but with the monthly payments. After all, the actual purchase price is only a figure on a piece of paper after the closing. The purchase of a home and the "cost" in the truest sense occur once a month — every month — in the form of mortgage payments and property taxes.

Mortgages are the most common tool used in our homebuying market place to defer the payment of debt and amortize that debt over a period of time by paying equal monthly installments over a given time period. Often times one might say that they are going to "get" a mortgage at a bank. In fact, this is incorrect because the mortgage is actually given to the bank, and in turn the bank gives the purchaser funds needed to complete the transaction.

The mortgage is a piece of paper which the borrower gives to the lender and it states the amount of money borrowed is secured to the property being financed. The property cannot be sold or ownership transferred until the debt is paid in full, at which time the bank returns the mortgage document to the borrower.

Occasionally, the owner of a home or other type of property may be interested in acting like a bank, and allow the purchase of the property to be financed by accepting a mortgage document from the purchaser in the same fashion as a conventional mortgage lender would. It is in these cases that the phrase "holding paper" is used. What it means is that the seller of a property will accept paper (the mortgage document) in lieu of cash or other considerations for a given term at a specified rate of interest, just like a bank would.

There are advantages, as well as disadvantages to this type of financing. It may not be feasible for many sellers who may be relying on the full sale amount to make another purchase. However, in the event that the proceeds of the sale are not immediately required by the seller, a properly structured first mortgage can be an excellent investment tool, often paying dividends far in excess of commonly available investment avenues. Your real estate broker or attorney can advise you as to the best route to take.
