Quotes by Vincent Fran-tantoni regarding bis involve-ment with the Economic Development Corporation (EDC) of Essex County resulted in a storm of phone calls to my office.

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For those unfamiliar with the EDC, it is a non-profit group that channels grant and reduced rate loan money to businesses for the purpose of upgrading and renewal. Yerg Co., for example, is a Belleville firm that took advantage of EDC oppor-tunities and expertise to pur-chase a new printing press. Char-les' Jewelers utilized the EDC program to renovate that shop's

facade. The first Frantantoni statement some townspeople took exception to was a contention that the "successful effort to bring the (EDC) to Belleville" was his.

Tom Brown, Director of the EDC, said he did not recall speaking or working with Fran-tantoni to introduce EDC protantoni to introduce EDC pro-grams to the township's com-mercial sector. Brown said he may have spoken with Fran-tantoni, but that he could not honestly recall either way. Brown added that the people most responsible for publicizing the EDC in Belleville were May-or Michael Marotti, Commis-sioner Ralph DiRueviero and sioner Ralph DiRuggiero and Belleville Redevelopment

Lock Up

Editor's note - The Belleville Police Department, through Crime Prevention Officer Fred Puleo, offers town businesses the following crimefighting tips:

Install deadbolt locks on all outside doors – double cylinder deadbolts on doors with glass panels. Or use other effective locking devices. Check all doors and win-dows rolutinely at closing.

dows rottinely at closing. Make sure padlocks are solidly mounted and never left open...even on an open door. Check door and window frames for looseness or rot-

ring. Repair them. Practice good key security. Sign out all keys and col-lect them when employees leave your company. To be safe, change locks and combinations. Never label keys with what they're for. Use a code, if

If any doors are outswinging, use non-removable head-ns, and install panel doors lined with metal to resist drilling.

Reinforce rear and side doors with cross bars, and in-stall grating or bars on rear and side windows. Don't neglect roof openings, air ducts, skylights, hat chways, doorway transoms, sidewalk and basement

openings, And don't lock a burgler *inside* when you leave. In-spect all closets, bathrooms and other hiding places.

Light Up

Light up all entrances, including alleys, with vandal proof fixtures. Leave some lights burning inside and over your safe – in full view of the street.

Clean Up

Keep all weeds, shrubbery and debris away from win dows and doors. And keep fences in good repair. Don't provide concealment or climbing platforms for the burglar.

Avoid high displays near windows that could keep passersby from seeing in. Lock up ladders and all tools that could invite a break-in, or make a burglar's job easier.

Sound Off

Install an alarm system and check it regularly for failure. Post conspicuously a notice that shows you have an alarm.

Be Safe

Keep cash to a minimum with frequent, irregular bank deposits. Don't expect a fire safe to do the job of a burglar resis-

tant safe. Anchor your safe to the floor in a well lighted highly

visible location. Leave empty cash drawers open after hours to prevent damage.

Keep an accurate inventory of all valuables.

Be Clever

Tie appliance cords together chain bicycles, alternate the direction of hangers on the rack bolt racks down...lock small valuables in cabinets and show

Install burglar-resistant glass, If you discover a break in, call the police at once — the burglar might still be inside. Don't disturb evidence. Join Operation Identification.





Possible Savings Crecco noted that Rochester, New York has reduced its operat-ing budget by \$3.1 million through 78 new privatization contracts between 1974 and 1984.

ween 1974 and 1984. Data from 126 Canadian cities indicated that public collection of solid waste was 51 percent more costly than private collection. Crecco said that among the ser-vices that can be considered for privatization include motor vabicles creatice accurate water

vehicles, resource recovery, waste water and sewage treatment pro-grams, garbage collection, street repair and data processing.

Proper safeguards "Privatization, if accompanied with the proper safeguards, would get the bureaucrais out of many areas of the government and turn it over to local businesspeople who would be made more accountable or the tamanare.
