



Fire ravages township delicatessen

A fierce fire caused the devastation of a Union Avenue food market Wednesday morning, April 29, and forced the evacuation of four families residing upstairs. There were no injuries reported.

The fire began sometime in the early morning, and upon the arrival of the first Belleville fire engine, there was already "a heavy smoke condition" at the site, Deputy Fire Chief Walter Beresford said in a report to Fire Chief George Sbarra.

In all, three Belleville engines and one Nutley engine responded to the blaze, bringing it under control within two hours.

The Essex Arson Squad, along with Deputy Chief Beresford, were called to investigate the cause of the fire. At the fire site later that

day, Beresford told the Times that arson was unlikely because preliminary investigations revealed no evidence that entry to the market was forced.

Store inventory ruined

Sy Harad, an insurance adjuster investigating the fire, said it would be "about two weeks" before an estimate of damages could be ascertained. However, ruined store inventory alone was likely to run into the thousands of dollars.

Inside the charred market were aisles of burned-out packaged foods, broken glass, and partially melted fixtures.

Another business in the building, Lombard Realty, suffered some ceiling beam damage.

Beresford reported that the "smoke alarms did not sound. We

found the circuit breaker to the alarm system in the off position."

The owner of the building is John Camaera. The proprietor of the store is Anthony Libertazzi.

Helene Leeder, Marge Pastore, Andrew & Annette Puchs, and Robert & Joann Majenski were listed as the occupants of the evacuated apartments.

Following the blaze, the storefront was boarded up. The Times, however, arrived at the scene in time to snap the photographs that appear on page three.

Youth is in guarded condition

NJT train severs legs of town man in Newark

A 22-year-old Belleville man whose legs were severed below the knee by a train was in guarded condition at University Hospital in Newark this week, said Newark police.

Police Director Louis Greenleaf said Thomas Abrusia of Newark Street, Belleville was injured at 11 p.m. Thursday on a train track near Greenwood Lake and Ruby Streets in Newark's North Ward.

He was struck by a NJ Transit train going from Hoboken to Dover, the director added.

"We have not been able to interview the victim and so do not know why he was in the area," Greenleaf said.

The director added the train engineer was William Casey and the conductor was John Vince.

A spokeswoman for NJ Transit

said the train, number 1007, had left Hoboken at 10:30 p.m. and was proceeding west at 45 miles per hour.

"Just west of Mt. Prospect Avenue in Newark the engineer noted an obstruction on the track and attempted an emergency stop, but there was not time to come to a complete halt," said the spokeswoman, Nancy Greenberg.

She said the area is "secluded behind some old industrial buildings. It is not near a road. Also, there are drainage ditches on either side of the tracks."

The train was due at Dover at 11:46 p.m.

According to a Lieutenant Robert Rankin, spokesman for the Newark Police Director's office, Abrusia was still unable to be interviewed at press time.

Cigarette case draws to close

A man charged with stealing a pack of cigarettes from a town market and a market employee charged with assaulting the former suspect were both found not guilty by Township Judge Frank Zinna in an April 29 court proceeding.

The hearing of the case for the January 7 incident was postponed twice, once by each accused party. Found not guilty were Frank

DeLuca of Washington Avenue Pathmark on charges of assault and Vincent Nuzzo on charges of shoplifting.

According to DeLuca, Vincent Nuzzo stole a pack of cigarettes and subsequently broke his nose running into the automatic doors at the Pathmark entrance.

According to Nuzzo, nothing was stolen by him and he was struck by DeLuca.

Quotes by Vincent Frantantoni regarding his involvement with the Economic Development Corporation (EDC) of Essex County resulted in a storm of phone calls to my office.

For those unfamiliar with the EDC, it is a non-profit group that channels grant and reduced rate loan money to businesses for the purpose of upgrading and renewal. Yerg Co., for example, is a Belleville firm that took advantage of EDC opportunities and expertise to purchase a new printing press. Charles' Jewelers utilized the EDC program to renovate that shop's facade.

The first Frantantoni statement some townspeople took exception to was a contention that the "successful effort to bring the (EDC) to Belleville" was his.

Tom Brown, Director of the EDC, said he did not recall speaking or working with Frantantoni to introduce EDC programs to the township's commercial sector. Brown said he may have spoken with Frantantoni, but that he could not honestly recall either way. Brown added that the people most responsible for publicizing the EDC in Belleville were Mayor Michael Marotti, Commissioner Ralph DiRuggiero and Belleville Redevelopment Agency Director Joseph Dasaro.

Brown said it was the "Business Day" event which was held at Town Hall and initiated by the EDC itself which drew the most response.

Times readers also took exception to another Frantantoni quote which held that, "this agency (EDC) has provided for funds and assistance to over 70 businesses to date at no expense to taxpayers."

Brown said that actual funds (either loans or grants) were disbursed to only 7 township firms, and most were a direct result of last year's "Business Day."

However, the EDC director explained that his non-profit corporation has channelled funds to "over 100" firms county-wide, and that his firm could have easily provided business assistance to "over 70" Belleville firms without actual funds. He

Money earmarked for extensive renovations

Senator Orechio legislation leads to \$150,000 for center

State Senator Carmen Orechio recently presented a check for \$150,000 to Eugene Stefanelli, executive director of West Essex Rehabilitation Center in Montclair.

Orechio was the original sponsor of S.188, a special appropriations bill for \$150,000 designed to aid the renovation efforts of the vocational development center. The bill was passed unanimously by the N.J. Assembly and Senate and was signed by Gov. Thomas Kean in August.

The senator has sponsored legislation to form the Division of Developmental Disabilities to prohibit zoning from interfering with group homes for the disabled and to appropriate funds for the Essex West Hudson Cerebral Palsy Center.

He has also lent his support to numerous pieces of legislation designed to benefit disabled individuals and has worked extensively on the local level to promote transportation, work and recreation to disabled community members.

The funds appropriated to West

Essex Rehabilitation Center will be used to complete extensive renovations on the 25,000 square foot facility. WERC provides vocational development services to more than 100 disabled individuals from Essex, Passaic and Morris counties. The center's

placement department has found employment for 14 individuals so far this year.

WERC is a member agency of the United Ways of North Jersey and Hamilton. More information about the agency's services is available by calling 784-7171.







Tuesday's election

The Township of Belleville is at a crossroads. Tuesday, Belleville voters have an opportunity to exercise a freedom only found in a democracy. They will have the right to cast the ballot and elect their local public officials. Five Commissioners are to be elected. Two incumbent Commissioners have decided not to seek re-election. It was with regret that we accepted the news from Commissioners Ralph DiRuggiero and Joseph Grande. Commissioner DiRuggiero decided his business future and life with his family took precedence over his public service. Commissioner Grande's health requires him to be in a less contentious environment. Grande prefers the quiet of home — sharing of happiness with family in place of the rough and tumble of Commission life.

We believe the three incumbents, Mayor Michael Marotti, Revenue and Finance Commissioner Joseph McGreevey and Public Affairs Commissioner Michael Pizzi — on balance, have served the community well. They have kept faith with the public that elected them four years ago.

Based upon the recognition of the major issues facing our people, and his determination to do what is necessary to resolve the problems in a manner beneficial to our taxpayers, Angelo Risoli has earned the endorsement of this newspaper. There are eight other candidates seeking the high office of Township Commissioner. All are qualified. All candidates share in common a love for Belleville. No candidate wants to raise property taxes.

So — Belleville is very fortunate today. Voters have a unique opportunity of making a choice — twelve citizens among us have volunteered to serve you in order to provide us with a better Belleville. All candidates deserve the thanks of a grateful community for wanting to make the great sacrifice public office requires. The recently formed Citizens of Belleville has taken issue with policies of the present commission. Vincent Frantantoni, Nazzola, both of whom have made a formidable opposition to incumbents seeking

The wide field of twelve candidates, all well known and successful in their field of endeavors, makes this particular election a most difficult one to forecast the outcome of... much will be determined by the voter's reaction to mounting taxes, largely caused by loss of federal grants to municipalities and reduced state aid for education, all of which must be made up by increasing local taxation... a plague troubling all municipalities throughout New Jersey.

Traditionally incumbent office holders have benefited in Belleville by successive continuance in office, however, the declination of commissioners Grande and DiRuggiero to seek reelection, changes the complexion of this year's election contest.

The CDB group's support of their officers Frantantoni and Nazzola, which is substantial, has created a dichotomy of forces lining up against the entrenched followers of the incumbents seeking return to office, who will in turn marshal their combined strength to overcome the attempt of the CDB candidates to be elected, by supporting other candidates considering more compatible with the policies of those seeking reelection to office... all of which produces a nightmare in trying to predict or divine the ultimate outcome of this election. Better judgment dictates that we put away the crystal ball and leave it up to the voters to bring in the final verdict around 9:30 p.m., Tuesday, May 12. Vox populi, Vox Dei (L). 



Came the summer vacation, and because I lived in Nutley and they lived in Newark, we split off and by the time September rolled around, I got sense enough to return to school. I enrolled at Nutley High School and miracles of miracles, I doubled up with my major subjects and graduated with my grammar school graduating class. Del Guercio is taxpayer's candidate...

"As we approach the Municipal Election on May 12, 1987, it is important that our voters know their candidates and their positions on the issues as they make up their minds who they intend to vote for on Election Day.

"I am running under the slogan, 'The Taxpayers Candidate,' because I feel I identify with the average Belleville taxpayer and it is his interest I am looking to protect.

"I am a resident of Belleville for the past 10 years and a life-long resident of Essex County. I am married to the former Rosalie Ditta of Irvington, and we have a three-year-old son, Jerry.

"I have a B.A. degree in government from Seton Hall University. I have held various positions on the municipal, county and state level of government. I am a shop steward for Local 1037, Communications Workers of America, AFL-CIO and a member of Local 1158, International Brotherhood

of Electrical Workers, AFL-CIO.

"The number one priority of my platform is to stabilize property taxes. Four years ago the municipal portion of our property taxes was \$1.36 per \$100 of valuation, including the reserve for uncollected taxes. Last year the reserve for uncollected taxes was separated from the municipal tax rate, but 90 percent of the reserve is a surplus which is applied toward municipal services the following year.

"With the proposed 26 point increase in municipal taxes this year, the municipal portion of our taxes, including the reserve for uncollected taxes, would increase to \$2.29 per \$100 of valuation or a 58 percent increase over 4 years ago.

"This is not including the increases we have received in the County or Board of Education portions of our tax bills. At the present rate it is not inconceivable for a homeowner with a house

valued at \$50,000 to be paying \$5,000 in property taxes 4 years from now.

"In order to stabilize taxes I seek to return town priorities to providing basic essential services, which I feel have been grossly neglected. Some of our streets are in deplorable condition and our Fire Department is in need of new equipment. I do not intend to expand programs or create new ones, which do not provide essential services, because they are no longer affordable due to the continued loss of Federal and State aid.

"I also seek to suspend the proposal to construct the \$5 million Public Safety Building. This project was ill conceived and the bids have come in approximately 35% over Cap. About \$700,000 has already been spent on architectural and engineering consultants fees and I do not believe in spending good money after bad.

"I recognize more space is needed for police operations and to better police morale. I feel this could be provided by space available at former School No. 1 or, as a last resort, a modest addition to Town Hall.

"With the proposed layoffs of a number of town employees, including 10 policemen and 8 firefighters, the completion of this project can only provoke additional layoffs, or escalated taxes, or both, in future years.

"To prevent future controversial projects I propose that future bond issues for large capital expenditures, not of an emergency nature, be submitted to the voters as a referendum for their approval. Lastly, I am against blight declarations or tax abatements, because the developers would benefit at the taxpayers expense.

"In conclusion, the destiny of Belleville is in the voters hands on May 12th. I sincerely believe that I can make a difference, if elected, and put Belleville back on the right track. I ask the voters to give me one of their five allotted votes. But remember, change cannot take place by staying home as a spectator and not voting. If the voters choose not to come out and vote, they have only themselves to blame for the consequences afterward.

Nazziola believes budget can be cut

As the pace of the Belleville race for commissioner picks up speed it's a job in itself to catch up with the candidates as they move quickly from campaign "kickoffs" to sign making and erecting, to public candidate forums to campaign "finales."

Candidate Gabriel Nazziola was doing door to door canvassing, "pressing the flesh" and being asked about the belief that it is impossible to lower taxes in Belleville.

Candidate Nazziola responded, "There are some very specific finance proposals that I have outlined that would not only eliminate tax increases being proposed, reduce the rate of increase as well as specifically reduce the tax burden on the individual property owner. Of course, these proposals would require the cooperation and affirmative vote of at least two other new commissioners as well as my own, if I am elected.

"The specific financial proposals would involve an ordinance to amend an ordinance to modify the 10 million dollar municipal complex ordinance and eliminate the 5 million public safety building resolution and replace it with a \$2½ million cap police station ordinance; scale down the Reserve for Uncollected Taxes over a period of years and create a segregated reserve fund that is separately identified and not commingled with the general surplus account so it loses its identity and is spent for purposes other than for which it was earmarked.

"Change the contract of the

township's independent grantman to a contingency basis — pay based on amount of grants actually secured.

"Actively pursue major industrial and commercial developers to tie together redevelopment of the Washington Avenue shopping area with the shift of some of the tax burden from individual homeowners to industry and commercial development.

"Resolve to turn back to the township for sale the four incumbent commissioners' cars, thereby earning some immediate revenue and eliminating the cost of their operation, maintenance and insurance costs, or perhaps committing them to unmarked police car usage. After all, I think it's an unnecessary luxury to provide a full time car to a part time job especially when the taxpayers are paying for it!"

Nazziola said the primary problem facing Belleville today is "taxes. All the other problems like keeping our community affordable for new young families and seniors on a fixed income, providing senior citizen housing for those seniors who can't afford to keep their own home, providing more systematic servicing of our roads, curbs, sewers and trees, are related the funding that comes from taxes... local, state and federal."

He concluded, "I believe I have the background experience and training to apply these ideas. I believe they are workable. I need the confidence of the taxpayers of Belleville behind me. I need their vote on May 12th."



Summing up his candidacy with a businesslike assessment, Mazzola says, "Your vote should be an investment, and you should get a good return. I definitely believe I am a good investment. Vote 9-A on Election Day."

Angelo Risoli is an ideas candidate. Not only does he bring to his candidacy a large platform of ideas large and small, but he has an idea for a business leader advisory board which would be a virtual think tank for ideas...all aimed at making Belleville a better community.

Risoli's idea for fighting auto thefts in Belleville is to personally lobby in Trenton for stiffer penalties for juvenile offenders. He says these juveniles are employed by adult-run stolen car fences who hire juveniles to perform the risky stealing because they are "out on the street the next day" following capture.

The advisory panel idea "would consist of executives from our larger stores and banks, to advise the township. They have great investments in their businesses and if the Township of Belleville goes down so do their stores," he says.

His open government idea is designed to increase the accessibility of the Belleville Commission.

"At least one day a week, probably Saturday morning from 9AM to noon, I'd be at my office in Town Hall. Anybody with ideas, complaints or whatever could come in and see me without an appointment," he vows.

His community involvement idea is one that has a decidedly old country touch.

He says he would seek permission from Public Service to allow the grassy area around their high tension wires in town to be cultivated into a community vegetable garden for senior citizens.

Vegetables and spice from the garden would be distributed among the seniors for free. Teens could volunteer with some of the heavier work, like turning the soil.

Risoli says the township could provide the gardening equipment. Rutgers could provide some expertise, and Public Service could provide the land. Public Service has already let some of its land around high-tension wires be used for similar purposes, Risoli added.

In other areas of concern, Candidate Risoli said he would strive for a closer working relationship among the five people who make up the next Belleville Commission.

"More cooperation could cut down on wasteful spending," he believes.

A lifelong Bellevillite, Risoli is currently the Belleville Republican Chairman and a legislative aide to Assemblyman John Kelly.

team appears to have its game back in gear. The Bucs took a six game winning streak into this weeks action and won four straight games last week. Whatever head coach George Zanfina said in the privacy of closed doors to his team last week certainly paid dividends.

The Bucs discovered two new heroes in an important position. Frank Orrei and Michael Thompson both pitched tremendously last week. Orrei came in in the bottom of the seventh inning at Randolph last week and in his varsity debut, struck out the side with the tying runs on base.

Thompson pitched four innings of perfect relief in a game against Bloomfield, keeping the Bucs in the contest after Belleville fell behind early. The Bucs eventually rallied, coming back from a 6-0 second inning deficit to beat the Bengals, 8-7 in eight innings.

Thompson's performance reminds me of a similar effort turned in by Eugene Cancelliere in the 1981 season. Cancelliere pitched six innings of outstanding relief and kept his team in the game after Belleville had fallen behind, 8-0, to Columbia in the quarterfinals of the Greater Newark Tourney.

The Bucs came back to win that thriller, 15-9, and eventually won the GNT two weeks later. But Cancelliere did the job when the Bucs needed it that day. He came in in the first inning, with Belleville already down 8-0 and held the hard hitting Cougars at bay.

Speaking of the Greater Newark Tourney, Belleville was seeded third in this years tourney, trailing only top seeded Irvington and Caldwell. That's the same Caldwell team that Belleville had beaten, 24-4, two weeks ago. That victory over Caldwell had snapped a five game Buccaneer losing streak and put the team back on the winning side.

Caldwell is a solid club, however, and Zanfina knows full well that it won't be that easy in the GNT. Blowouts are a part of the game of baseball, witness the Bucs 17-3 wipeout defeat at the hands of Clifton just four days prior to the victory at Caldwell.

The Bucs will be trying for a return to the finals, where last year, it lost a heartbreaker to Columbia, 9-8. BHS ball team back on track

Following a closed door team meeting on April 28, the Belleville baseball team apparently has its game back in order. The Bucs won four straight games, three over conference rivals, to boost its team record to 11-5.

Belleville battled Nutley and Kennedy earlier this week. Tomorrow, the team is at Clifton and on Saturday, will host Verona in a first round, Greater Newark Tournament contest. The game is slated for 2:30 p.m. from Belleville High. Next Monday, the Bucs battle Bloomfield, at home, starting at 4 p.m. That game will be televised by TV-3. Next Wednesday, it's off to Eastside for a 4 p.m. start.

Head coach George Zanfina, in watching his team boost its current winning streak to six games, termed the '87 season a "roller coaster ride."

"They've come back strong from some of the setbacks (two weeks ago)," Zanfina said. "This team is capable of a lot of good things when it plays intense, intelligent baseball. We had a meeting last Tuesday and ironed out a few things. I think the team knows what it takes to be successful. The attitude is good, no one has given up or is down on each other."

The Bucs opened the season with five straight victories, then lost its next five games. The team has now won six straight games entering this week.

"It's been a roller coaster ride," Zanfina said. "It would be nice to get off and just be consistent."

Last week, the Bucs upended Montclair, 6-1, came back from six runs down to defeat Bloomfield, 8-7, squeezed by Passaic, 7-5, then used a strong offense to beat Randolph, 10-7.

Versus Montclair, the Bucs took control early, scoring four runs in the second inning. The early outburst made things relatively easy for pitcher Jim Dunphy. The senior southpaw threw a complete game, striking out five and allowing just four hits.

In the second inning, Al Best stroked a two run double, scoring P.J. Grande and Dean Mauro. Later in the frame, Lou Lucante hit a double, bringing home Best and Jamie Galioto.

In the Belleville fifth, two more runs scored. Dunphy scored on a balk and Jeff Spillsbury was safe on a steal of home plate.

"We played a good defensive game," Zanfina said. "Jimmy pitched very well and we got some key hits."

The Bloomfield game was a good example of the intense rivalry built up between the two schools in baseball. The Bengals jumped out to an early 6-0 lead, then watched the Bucs rally for three runs in the fourth and four runs in the fifth to pull ahead.

Bloomfield didn't quit, tying the game at seven in the sixth inning. Belleville won it with a run in the top of the eighth, giving Lucante the victory in relief.

"(Michael) Thompson was the key to the game," Zanfina said of the junior pitcher. "He kept us in the game and we were able to peck away at their lead. It was a good win for us."

Bob Hutchison started for Belleville, but he didn't have one of his better days, giving up six runs in the second inning.

Enter Thompson, who threw four innings of perfect relief to keep the Bucs within striking distance. In the fifth inning, Belleville scored three runs, with Jay Marchese and Lucante contributing RBI singles. Spillsbury hit a sacrifice fly to cut the deficit to 6-3.

In the fifth, Belleville pulled ahead with Spillsbury providing a key RBI double. The Bucs also took advantage of walks and a hit batsman.

Bloomfield tied it in the sixth with a solo run, and the game went into extra innings. In the top of the eighth, Belleville regained the lead. Dunphy walked and stole second base. The Bloomfield catcher threw wildly attempting to catch Dunphy at second base and the

ball sailed into the outfield. Dunphy raced all the way to home plate on the error and the Bucs led, 8-7.

Lucante pitched a strong eighth inning, striking out the final Bloomfield hitter with the winning runs in scoring position.

The Bucs had to rally from a 3-0 deficit to defeat Passaic, 7-5. Marchese got the victory, throwing a complete game and allowing just six hits.

"Jay pitched very well," Zanfina said. "We made too many mistakes. I think we gave up four unearned runs. We had to battle hard to win that game."

The Bucs were limited to just five hits, but took advantage of Passaic's wildness. The Indian pitching allowed 12 walks in the game.

Last Saturday, the team traveled to Randolph for an independent game. The Bucs jumped out to an early 8-1 lead after three innings, but had to

hold on in the closing stages of the game.

"Our pitching staff was tired," Zanfina said. "We had played four games in a row. We were a little battered, too. Jimmy (Dunphy) was hurting with the pulled hamstring and Jay's arm was bothering him. (Bob) Hutchison gave us five good innings and Frank Orrei was incredible in his first varsity game."

Orrei came in in the seventh inning, having never pitched in a varsity game before. Randolph had cut the Belleville lead to 10-7 and had the tying run at the plate. There were no outs and the sophomore was scheduled to face the top of the lineup.

Orrei proceeded to strike out the side, an ending usually reserved for a movie script.

On the offense, Dunphy was 2 for 2, with a triple and 2 RBI's. Best finished 3 for 3 and Mauro

was 2 for 3, with 3 RBI's and 2 runs scored.

"You couldn't have asked for a tougher assignment," Zanfina said. "I asked Nick (Grande, the JV coach), if he had any pitcher who wasn't tired and he said Frank could pitch an inning. He did an excellent job."

NOTES: Bucs received third seed in GNT, trailing only top rated Irvington and Caldwell. Zanfina expects a tough game with Verona in the first round this Saturday. Bucs made the finals of last years GNT, losing to Columbia, 9-8. During the decade of the 80's, no team has won the tourney back to back. From 1980-86, the winners have been, Livingston, Belleville, Caldwell, Seton Hall, Millburn, Cedar Grove and Columbia. Bucs were looking forward to rematch with Clifton tomorrow afternoon. Clifton buried the Bucs, 17-3, three weeks ago.

Lock Up

Editor's note — The Belleville Police Department, through Crime Prevention Officer Fred Puleo, offers town businesses the following crimefighting tips:

Install deadbolt locks on all outside doors — double cylinder deadbolts on doors with glass panels. Or use other effective locking devices. Check all doors and windows routinely at closing.

Make sure padlocks are solidly mounted and never left open... even on an open door.

Check door and window frames for looseness or rotting. Repair them.

Practice good key security. Sign out all keys and collect them when employees leave your company. To be safe, change locks and combinations.

Never label keys with what they're for. Use a code, if necessary.

If any doors are outswinging, use non-removable headpins, and install panel doors lined with metal to resist drilling.

Reinforce rear and side doors with cross bars, and install grating or bars on rear and side windows.

Don't neglect roof openings, air ducts, skylights, hat chways, doorway transoms, sidewalk and basement openings.

And don't lock a burglar *inside* when you leave. Inspect all closets, bathrooms and other hiding places.

Light Up

Light up all entrances, including alleys, with vandal proof fixtures.

Leave some lights burning inside and over your safe — in full view of the street.

Clean Up

Keep all weeds, shrubbery and debris away from windows and doors. And keep fences in good repair. Don't provide concealment or climbing platforms for the burglar.

Avoid high displays near windows that could keep passersby from seeing in.

Lock up ladders and all tools that could invite a break-in, or make a burglar's job easier.

Sound Off

Install an alarm system and check it regularly for failure.

Post conspicuously a notice that shows you have an alarm.

Be Safe

Keep cash to a minimum with frequent, irregular bank deposits.

Don't expect a fire safe to do the job of a burglar-resistant safe.

Anchor your safe to the floor in a well-lighted highly visible location.

Leave empty cash drawers open after hours to prevent damage.

Keep an accurate inventory of all valuables.

Be Clever

Tie appliance cords together... chain bicycles... alternate the direction of hangers on the rack... bolt racks down... lock small valuables in cabinets and show cases.

Install burglar-resistant glass.

If you discover a break-in, call the police at once — the burglar might still be inside. Don't disturb evidence.

Join Operation Identification.

Crecco says private sector can handle government roles

Assemblywoman for Belleville, Marion Crecco this week hailed efforts by Assembly Appropriations Committee chairman Anthony Villane (R-Monmouth) to move toward "privatization" of some government functions.

The Bloomfield Republican said that "everybody knows the private sector can run entities much better than government. There is no reason why New Jersey should not follow the lead of so many other municipalities, states and even the federal government, by contracting out for government services with the private sector."

Possible Savings

Crecco noted that Rochester, New York has reduced its operating budget by \$3.1 million through 78 new privatization contracts between 1974 and 1984.

Data from 126 Canadian cities indicated that public collection of solid waste was 51 percent more costly than private collection.

Crecco said that among the services that can be considered for privatization include motor vehicles, resource recovery, waste water and sewage treatment programs, garbage collection, street repair and data processing.

Proper safeguards

"Privatization, if accompanied with the proper safeguards, would get the bureaucrats out of many areas of the government and turn it over to local businesspeople who would be made more accountable to the taxpayer. I am anxiously awaiting Assemblyman Villane's recommendations," added Crecco, vice-chair of the Assembly State

Government Committee.

Assemblywoman Marion Crecco represents Belleville and the Essex communities of Bloomfield, Cedar Grove, Glen Ridge, Montclair, Nutley and Verona.

Crecco named "Home Care Hero" for respite care work

The board of Community Health Care of North Jersey has named Assemblywoman Marion Crecco as "Home Care Hero" for April.

A release from the Orange-based group, which focuses on health care for the elderly, praised the Bloomfield Republican for her legislation providing for a respite care program through the Department of Human Services. The legislation is currently on Governor Kean's desk.

The legislation would provide for interim homemaker and personal care, emergency care and companion or sitter service, making it easier for families to care for their loved ones, and at the same time, for senior citizens and disabled residents to remain at home.

"With a growing elderly population and projected increases in the over-75 age group," the release said, "it becomes more and more crucial for both federal and state lawmakers to begin to seek innovative, cost effective, and most important, humane alternatives to enable this population to continue to live at home."

Crecco was also praised for "her long-standing support for the development of high-quality home-health care for residents of New Jersey."



After two and one-half years, he has returned to normal for his Democratic state Assemblyman Buddy Fortunato and his family.

Fortunato was acquitted Friday of six counts in an alleged bribe-for-jobs scheme, following a 50-minute deliberation by a jury in New Brunswick. Waiting for the verdict, his wife Marion said, was "like a lifetime."

"It's been two and a half years with a tremendous burden of trying to live a normal life, and keeping the family unit as normal as possible through the stress and strain. Now that burden has been lifted off all of us," a smiling Fortunato said Saturday in an interview at the family's Glen Ridge home.

"It's been a very difficult experience, but Marion was very supportive. She's not only my wife but my best friend."

The former legislator said his children, Jeff and Sissy, other family members, neighbors and friends had been "great, just great" throughout the ordeal. But maintaining a cheerful home environment, Mrs. Fortunato said, was not easy.

"The hardest part was trying to keep his spirits up all the time — to make him laugh and smile and forget. But I knew God would take care of it," she said.

"There's an old saying, 'You reap what you've sown.' Buddy has always had a great reputation in high school and in his public life, and the way he treated people paid off. His reputation preceded him into that courtroom."



Miss R. of Newark asks: "My teeth have no cavities but are greyish brown and I don't like the way they look. Is there any kind of cosmetic paint that can be put on?"

At present Miss R. the only cosmetic coverings are either crowns (caps) or bonding. Since you mentioned you have no decay we would suggest porcelain veneers as a possible solution. Porcelain veneers are fingernail-like casings made of a porcelain color of your choice that goes on the front side surface of your teeth. Very little removal of tooth structure is needed. After the laboratory makes the covering under the direction of your dentist they are then fitted to your teeth. Upon your approval a special bonding procedure then adheres them to your teeth and the cosmetics you desired are achieved. Some care must be taken to keep the bond intact but its minimal. Consult your dentist for further information and have a great summer.

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

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
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Real Estate Briefcase

Dear Mr. Reilly:

What is the "Multiple Listing System" and why is it better than listing "exclusively"? — E.M., Belleville.

The term "Multiple Listing Service (MLS for short) refers to a service by which a group of Real Estate Agents share properties for sale with each other. There are many such services in New Jersey, each governing a specific geographical locality. In our area, the towns of Belleville, Nutley, Bloomfield and Glen Ridge are served by a ML service which focuses on property for sale within the boundaries of those four towns. Any given MLS is independently controlled, so the rules for one may not hold for another.

In our area, the MLS is actually administered by a committee of the Board of Realtors of Bloomfield, Glen Ridge, Nutley and Belleville. Their rules mandate that any residential property for sale within the borders of those four towns must be submitted as a multiple listing within 72 hours of receiving a signed listing contract. Infractions of this rule are greeted with stiff financial penalties as the integrity of the system depends on each member maintaining a strict sense of fairness so as not to have an undue advantage over the other members of the system.

In as far as your question and the subject of "exclusives", please note that, in essence, that type of listing is extinct, at least in New Jersey. Both the Real Estate Commission and the Attorney General's Office have mandated that every licensed broker in this state must share their listing with one-another, regardless of whether or not that property has been multiple-listed.

In our area, should a homeowner request that the broker take their house as an "exclusive," the broker is compelled to advise them against it, since it really is not in

their best interest. The broker's primary duty is to obtain the highest possible price in the shortest amount of time for the seller. Certainly that goal is hindered should the property be held back from the eighty-plus offices which fall within the boundaries of the service area. The exclusive concept also violates the old real estate adage: "Untold - Unsold." If only one broker has knowledge of a property for sale, the seller has to hope that the buyer for that property is going to stumble into that real estate office.

The primary benefit offered by this area's Multiple Listing Service is that anyone looking to purchase residential property in Belleville, Nutley, Bloomfield or Glen Ridge simply has to enter the real estate office of their preference and have at their disposal every piece of property available for sale in today's market.
