

Fire department Cooling the burn ... feels the heat

Whenever a municipality suffers a spate of fires in a short period of time the local fire department is likely to come under some fire of its own. With three serious blazes occurring in Belleville from the end of November to the end of December, BFD is no exception. Townspeople have been talking, and the department, under 39 year veteran George Sbarra, has been taking its share of heat.

"Actually, we were having a pretty good year until the end of November," Sbarra told the Times, "that's when we had that Cozzarelli fire.

The November 26 blaze the Chief referred to occurred at 341 Washington Avenue. The incident caused an elderly woman to suffer a heart attack and she was subsequently rushed to Clara Maass Medical Center, where she survived but was in critical condition.

That incident fueled the fire for renewed speculation on the adequacy of the fire department's manpower, response time record and equipment. However no suits have been brought against the department in that blaze. In fact, Sbarra contends that "in my 39 years with the Belleville Fire Department there has never been a successful lawsuit against us."

But the ash from that Washington Avenue blaze barely had time to settle when another fire struck, this one at Prospect Place on December 5, the evening of the annual Belleville Firemens' Ball.

Witnesses to the blaze noted that citizens were assisting the firemen in unrolling hose, and townspeople wondered openly if this was an indication that the department is indeed understaffed.

But Chief Sbarra dismisses the accusations.

'If there's an emergency and you're standing around, and I ask you to help, are you going to say no?" he asked. "People pull together at times like that." He added that citizens who assisted firemen in unrolling fire hoses, some distance away from the actual blaze, had all volunteered to help. None were ordered or asked by the fire denatiment fire department.

But what caused the fire department to be so shorthanded that there was a need for citizens to pitch in? Was it because most of the men were attending the firemens' ball?

"We had 11 men on duty that night," said Deputy Chief Walter Beresford. Four were at fire headquarters on Franklin Avenue, and the rest were on duty at the department's firehouses on Franklin Street in Silver Lake and on Washington Avenue.

Beresford said optimum on-duty strength is 18 men townwide, and the lowest it can go is 9 mcn (or three per firehouse.) Usual strength, he noted, is between 12 and 15 men. There are no female firefighters in Belleville.

However, Chief Sbarra contended that having so many firemen together at The Chandelier for the ball made it easy to call in reinforcements.


I had twenty men respond to the Prospect Place fire, and I could have called in twenty more if I needed them, he said. That blaze, apparently caused by faulty electrical wiring, was largely contained to the upper floor and the building, at presstime, has not been totalled. "Totalled" means a torched building would cost more

to rebuild than replace.


On December 31 another fire struck, this time in the Domestic Linen factory at 265 Cortlandt Street. The

Middle School set for repairs

The Belleville Middle School, long targeted by school board officials and township activists as a structure in dire need of repair, is slated for extensive exterior work that aims to help prevent leakage, Business Administrator Dr. Leonard DiGiovanni told the Times.

At the January 4 Board of Education meet, the board authorized architect Richard Becker to draw up plans and specifications for pointing and sealing the school's brickwork.

Pointing refers to the addition of fresh mortar to replace and supplement the school's original mortar between the bricks, much of which has been weaken-ed and loosened with age. Sealing refers to a watertight spray which is applied to the exterior. Architect Becker will : ceive 7% of the contract

price once it goes out to bid. DiGiovanni expects the ob to begin in the springtime, but would not estimate

the cost, contending that a public speculation might adversely affect the bidding. DiGiovanni said the work will benefit the aging structure, which was formerly Belleville High School, in three ways. First, it will add strength to the structure scored it will add strength to the structure., Second, it will prevent seepage of the moisture which has ruined room paint jobs in the past.

And third, it should stop those outright leaks which are caused by seepage through loosened mortar. However, the business administrator pointed out that the majority of leaks are caused by a leaking roof, a job which will eventually cost substantially more, then the autematication than the current project. "I get the best deal I can," DiGiovanni said. The switch, based on an estimated 12 to 15 thousand gallon annual consumption, is expected to save the school system about \$3,000.

In further business, the board authorized the administration to apply for vocational education funds, a pool of money supplied by state and federal sources

Belleville is seeking \$1,850 each for cooperative home economics, cooperative marketing education, cooperative office education and cooperative industrial education. For vocational auto, \$18,941 is sought.

The board accepted three resignations at the meeting. George Zanfini steps down as head baseball coach for the BHS squad. Brenda Shapiro resigns as special education teacher. And Betty Kidon departs as elementary physical education teacher.

Several transfers were also announced.

blaze was reported at 1:50PM and by 3:30PM, Belleville's last serious fire of 1987 was declared under control.

Although damage was extensive, some one dozen Belleville firefighters along with about 20 more men from Newark and Nutley, managed to contain the blaze to the office structure where it began. Adjacent manufacturing quarters escaped serious damage, according to Captain Robert Reed whose on-the-scene photographs of the fire appear in this week's edition. "Everybody always talks about the bad ones," Reed

noted, "No one ever mentions the saves."

Reed continued, "We had a nice save at 83 Magnolia Street on October 2. It could have been a serious fire but (continued on page 5)

Crecco sets agenda for 1988

Assemblywoman Marion Crecco (R-Essex) has announced her legislative plans for the coming year. She has set a busy schedule which will focus on taxes, health care, senior citizens, and education.

She says that taxes, which dom-inated her efforts in Trenton last year, again tops the list. "Last year I was able to lay the

groundwork for many important pieces of tax legislation," she explaned. "Now, I intend to push for their passage, and foremost will be my Taxpayers Rights Act.

This specifies that if voters defeat a proposaed school budget, the previous year's budget plus an inflation allowance will automatically go in to effect. School budgets account for an average of 55 percent of the municipal property tax, and school administrators must be encouraged to pursue tight managerial practices so that property taxes can be controlled.

"I also plan to continue my efforts to get the state to take over Essex County's court costs," she added.

Parkway targeted

Mrs. Crecco, who has been one of the most outspoken critics of the New Jersey Highway Authority and its thus far thwarted attempt to double tolls on the Garden State Parkway, said the Assembly Committee on Regional and Independent Authorities, of which she is a

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member, will have a joint meeting later this month with its senate counterpart, headed by Senator Carmen Orechio, D-Nutley, to get answers to questions about parkway plans.

Catastrophic illness

Crecco is chairman of the Task Force on Catastrophic and Long-Term Health Care, and says that its findings will lead to legislation.

"One of the proposals will be the establishment of Individual Medical Accounts (IMA), similar to Individual Retirement Accounts, into which individuals would pay regular sums during their younger, healthier years and draw upon those monies when illness strikes later in life.



Governor Kean signs 2 bills

The governor recently signed two bills sponsored by Senator Carmen Orechio designed to alleviate the liability insurance crisis in New Jersey.

The first bill, S.2708, would prevent injured persons from collecting twice for the same elaim and the other, S.2709, would establish an arbitration system for insurance claims of less than \$20,000.

"When an injured person 'double dips' by receiving two payments for the same claim, the costs are

passed on to all the other consumers," said Senator Orechio. "Another exhorbitant cost in the system is the unnecessary legal expense







New York's Mayor Koch made uncommonly good sense last week when he suggested that fast food restaurants set a national example and stop using styrofoam trays for millions of customers to carry away their hot sandwiches.

This substance, said Edward I., is virtually indestructible, and while he did not add this thought, it is a fact that it will turn up under the shovels of archeologists 2,000 years hence, in precisely the same form it went in to municipal dumps.

They should return to using paper and cardboard, which are biodegradable, Koch said, and we couldn't agree more. The same goes for the vendors of electronic equipment and other appliances. Just run your eye over the garbage piles outside every household in town this post-holiday season, and you will see these massive packing elements that came inside boxes with video recorders, hi-fis, television sets, mixers and so on.

They will fill dumpsites with their bulk and never, but never decompose.

In this connection, it is well to note that there are some plastics that can be recycled, and this is an aspect of the garbage disposal crisis that is gaining popularity.

With garbage temporarily being shipped long distances out of state until the Essex County resource recovery center goes on line three years hence, and local towns paying high tonnage fees, obviously it is crucial to the financial well being of everyone that, A, these dumps don't fill up before the incinerator is built, and B, that not one ton of material be shipped that can be recycled.

A whole industry is springing up to recycle plastic bottles, and the uses they are putting them to is indicative of the ingenuity that the trash crisis is spawning. For instance, they can be shredded to make fiber fill for winter clothing. Five two-liter bottles provide enough fill for an insulated vest; 36 bottles fill a sleeping bag. Such bottles can even be processed in to polyester fabric for windbreakers. Plastic lumber is another use, with milk bottles the favorite material, processed in to lengths of material suitable for building park benches and boat docks, signposts and wheel blocks for parking lots. Soft drink bottles are also being processed in to a polyester based industrial coating, fuel pellets for furnaces and, in a touch of irony, one company even turns these bottles in to material from which it manufactures large bins to hold - wait for it - cans, glass and plastic at recycling centers! One of the nation's key locations for research in to plastic recycling happens to be at Rutgers University, which is just as well, because New Jerseyans are among the nation's biggest consumers and there are more of us here than most other state populations.

As his second term in the governorship winds down, Tom Kean has come closer to finding himself in disrepute with a large segment of the state's population than he certainly ever wished to, and it was the proposal for doubling tolls on the Garden State Parkway that did it.

A major fiscal levy like that is never going to be popular and the suggestion that Kean had given tacit approval in the spring with a suggestion that because of several crucial bond issue referendums the hike be kept quiet until after the November election hasn't sat well with many.

To make amends he vetoed the New Jersey Highway Authority's budget, which effectively sends them back to square one, and his veto carried with it some probing questions about expenditures that are yet to be answered.

On top of that, the Asbury Park Press uncovered two instances of extraordinary overtime payments to a toll collector and Chairman Judith Stanley's driver that bear out the suspicions of many critics that the agency is heavily committed to the welfare of its favorites. These are precisely the kind of anomalies being probed for by Senator Carmen Orechio's Independent Authorities Committee in its public hearings and now, having opened a Pandora's box with its poorly managed toll hike caper, the highway authority is going to have a hard time closing it.

Others said she resembled the implaceable Queen Victoria, and there was some sentiment for likening her to Bloody Mary. We venture to suggest that if a candidate of the style and strength of the 62-year-old Thatcher were to be proposed for the U.S.presidency, voters would not hesitate to have made the

recalled another "good save." "We had two cars on fire in a driveway on Campbell Avenue. It could have easily extended to the house, but we contained it," Santuso said.

If the members of "Belleville's bravest" contend that only the 'bad" fires get the town talking, the numbers appear to add weight to their contentions. BFD responded to a total of 1,165 calls in 1987. That figure includes house fires, brush fires, car fires, serious accidents, and false alarms.

"Some of the fires are nothing more than burnt toast and a lot of smoke," said Santuso. "Some are more serious.

However, Chief Sbarra, Deputy Chief Beresford, Deputy Chief Santuso and Captain Reed all agree that even small seemingly insignificant fires can erupt into major blazes if the fire department isn't up to par.

Of the 1,165 calls the department answered last year, 165 were false alarms. The figure is about the same as for 1986. It averages out to more than three false alarms every week, or nearly one every other day Of the 165 false alarms received

in 1987, all but 16 of them were logged on fire boxes posted throughout town.

"90% of our false alarms are from the fireboxes, while 90% of our legitimate calls are over the phone," Captain Reed noted.







Sometime this week, perhaps it's already been done, **Ted Sochaski** will score a basket and break **Abdel Anderson's** scoring record for Belleville boys' basketball, set back in the 1974-75 season.

When it's done, Sochaski will not only surpass a record, he will have surpassed a legend in Belleville sports. For it was Anderson who led Belleville to its last winning season in 1975 and earned All American status in his senior year.

American status in his senior year. Let's look back at that 1974-75 campaign at Belleville High for a just a bit. Belleville was a member of the Big 10 conference and, like the NNJIL of today, had a difficult game in every conference outing.

The Big 10 that year was made up of East Orange, Orange, Irvington, Montclair, Bloomfield, Columbia, Kearny, Nutley and Belleville. Although it was called the Big 10, only nine clubs competed in the conference. Essex Catholic joined the league in the 1976-77 campaign and stayed in until the Big 10 folded following the 1978 campaign. My personal feeling is it should have never been disbanded, but then again, what do I know about conference bureaucracy.

Anyhow, there was high hopes for that '74-75 club before the season started. Head coach Dan Grasso had assembled a talented team, led by Anderson, seniors Michael Meagher, John Megna, Pat Hogan, Alan Amiano and juniors Bob Tost, Wayne Riche, Joe Dunn and Doug Jackson. The hopes soared to new heights after the season opener that year, when Belleville played host to Garfield.

I'll never forget that game. It was December 13, 1974 at Belleville High School. Seems like yesterday, but it was over 13 years ago. The Bellboys won, 68-44 as Anderson scored 36 points. He hit an incredible 16 of 17 shots from the floor and was a perfect 4 for 4 from the foul line. To this day, it's a performance that has to rank as one of the best in school history. About the only thing Abdel did wrong that day was foul out. However, when he did foul out, it was late in the game and Belleville had a big lead. Abdel was a hero at Belleville High School. Although he was a

Addel was a hero at Belleville High School. Although he was a senior in a big graduating class, he was a man that everyone seemed to look up to, and not just because he was 6'7" tall. Major colleges called at just about every game and the stands were full on a regular basis to watch this Belleville team compete.

After Belleville won its opener, the team lost its next two, dropping games to Irvington and East Orange. The Panthers of East Orange were an incredibly tallented team back in '74-75, with stalwart players **Mike Booker** and **Cleveland Eugene** leading the way. The Panthers would win 25 straight games before losing to Lakewood, 72-71 in the Group III championship game in March, 1975.

Belleville rebounded with a win over Kearny, but lost to Bloomfield in a thriller on the road to drop the team record to 2-3. In that game, Belleville trailed, 67-65 with :15 left in the game. Tosi made a steal for Belleville and laid in what appeared to be the tying basket. The official ruled otherwise and called Tosi for a travel, negating the basket. The Bengals, led by T.K. Tripucka and a sophomore forward named Kelly Tripucka won, 69-67.

Belleville beat Passaic handily the following game and headed into January with a 3-3 mark. The Bellboys got off quickly in the new year, beating Nutley by two points, 50-48 and stopping Orange, 78-63. The win over Orange had significant meaning for Anderson.

Abdel needed 34 points to become the first player in Belleville history to score 1,000 points in a career. Back in the early 70's, freshman were not allowed to play varsity ball, so Anderson's offical count didn't begin until his sophomore year.

Late in the game, Anderson sank a jumper and broke the historic mark. However, most of the fans weren't aware of the feat because the official couldn't get the game stopped for a brief presentation.

Abdel would finish with 39 points on the afternoon,

The win over Orange was also very big, because Belleville had not beaten the Tornadoes in over 10 years and Orange was traditionally one of the better teams in the Big 10.

With a 5-3 mark, Belleville played host to Montclair on a Friday night before a packed house. Before the game, Belleville A.D. Herman "Jitty" Wische presented Anderson the ball he had scored the 1,000th point with.

Belleville played a strong first half, but let up in the third quarter and ended up losing a tough game, 66-63. The following Tuesday, the team went to East Orange and lost a thrilling 89-82 decision to the number one ranked team in New Jersey. I remember that game vividly because Amiano played so well at



As stated earlier, the Bucs finished third with 102 points, followed by Passaic Vally 101.5 points, Clifton 99 points, Nutley 89.5 points, West Essex 73 points, and Kearny 68 points.

Belleville had the most first place finishers with three, Bloomfield, Caldwell and Nutley had two each.

Sophomore Ralph Perna opened the tournament for the Bucs and was beaten in the first round by Caldwell's Nick Fiore, 8-0. Perna then excelled in the "out bracket" by pinning both Andy Siris of West Essex and Bill Renaut of Clifton in the first period. Perna was one of the question marks prior to the season, but seems to have overcome some early jitters to become a solid leadoff man in the mold of his older brother Joe.

Lou Coco, unlike Perna, still has not established a solid identity as a varsity performer. Wrestling in the 112 pound bracket, Coco pinned Frank Laccitiello of Passaic Valley at 1:16 of the first period. Lou then suffered back to back pins in his next two matches. Steve Hull of Kearny, the eventual winner of this bracket pinned Coco at 3:25. Then Mike Kwapniewski of Caldwell also scored a fall in OT after Lou was ahead by a 7-0 score. In Coco's defense, he had very little wind and endurance throughout the tourney, a result of a recent attack of the flu.

Captain Mike Iuliano won his first ever Bloomfield tourney title by steamrolling through a field of would be challengers. Mike was so aggressive throughout the event he made a number of minor mistakes in his tactics and execution, yet he was so dominant and fired up that no one noticed. A 14-3 Major Decision in the quarterfinals, an 18-2 Technical fall in the semis and a pin at 4:28 in the finals gave Iuliano the

golden ring he has been chasing for three years.

At 125 pounds, John Stampone earned a second place finish as he lost a nail biter in the finals to West Essex' Chris Janish, 5-4. John had a tough time in his opening match, but scored a close 3-1 decision over Jon Seda of Clifton. In the semis, Stampone scored an easy fall over Steve Salerno of Bloomfield at 2:30 of the second period.

Senior Joe Cerreto won his second Bloomfield Tournament title by scoring a 4-1 decision over Fred Goldbach of Clifton in the evening's most exciting match. Last year, Goldbach had beaten Cerreto in the consolations of the Region 2 championships.

Cerreto's preliminary matches included a 17-2 Technical Fall over Pat Algieri of Nutley and a first period pin of Bloomfield's Vinnie Gencarelli. With a record of 4-0 on the season, Cerreto is inching up on the 100 victory total for his career. Now at 72 wins, Joe and Mondo Nardone have a chance to establish a career record for BHS athletes.

Belleville's last first place finisher was captain Armando Nardone. Also at 4-0 for the year, Nardone pinned Paul Scotti of Nutley in the opening round in on-

ly 22 seconds. The semis-saw Mondo use only 3:05 to pin Passaic Valley's Mike Hilway. The championship bout against Bloomfield's Gary Foti was supposed to be a rock 'em sock 'em affair, but turned into a one sided bout, won 8-0 by Nardone.

After Nardone's match, the tortunes of the BHS wrestling squad went down hill. Nick Keykurun was felt to have been in the running for a title at 140 pounds, but lost a one point decision to E.J. LaGuerra of Passaic Valley in the opening round and had to settle for a fifth place finish.

The Bucs had no entry at 152 pounds and Joe DeCeglie withdrew from the tournament after an opening round loss in the 160 pound division. DeCeglie sustained a minor rib cage injury and should not miss any dual meets.

The BHS squad also had no entries in the 171 and 189 pound weight classes. Ed Oldak closed out the tournament for the Bucs by finishing sixth in the Heavyweight division. Ed was pinned in the first round by Lou Fontana of Passaic Valley, then pinned Dave Niland of Clifton in the "out bracket" prelims. George Wurtemburg of Kearny pinned Oldak to finish in fifth place.

B-ball Bucs get down to business

Having captured its second straight Tri County Holiday championship, the Belleville boys' basketball team now gets to the business of the NNJIL sche Jule, which began in earnest earlier this week.

Don Roll's club took a 5-1 mark into action last Tuesday. The Bucs played its long awaited home opener last Tuesday against Bloomfield. This afternoon, the Bucs are back on the road for a 4 p.m. game at Eastside. On Saturday, Belleville is home for a tough game with Montclair. Tip off for the Mountie game is 1:30 p.m. Next Tuesday, the Bucs are at Passaic, also at 4 p.m.

Last week, Belleville posted victories over Rahway and Kearny to win the Tri County Holiday tournament for the second straight year. Senior Ted Sochaski, who will shortly become the all time leading scorer in Belleville boys' basketball history, was named the tourney MVP.

The Bucs played a solid game in the opening round of the tourney and beat a strong Rahway club, 60-47. Roll was impressed with the effort.

"That was the championship game, in my mind," the coach said later. "Rahway has a very good ball club. They have some outstanding athletes and our kids were up for that game."

Belleville played a strong defen-

sive game against its bigger Union County opponent. The Bucs took a 12-9 lead after one frame and extended the margin to 30-23 at intermission. The Bucs boosted the lead to 46-34 after three quarters and came home with a 13 point win, 60-47.

Sochaski lead the way for Belleville with 29 points. Chris Chiarmonte played a solid game, scoring 12. Leon Puentes and Dominick Straface had seven points each and Ray Zamloot closed with five. For Rahway, Sam Jacobs had 20 points.

"Rahway had a lot more depth than we did," Roll said. "I would compare them to a Passaic, or East Orange squad that we played last season. They double teamed Leon (Puentes) all game long. Chris (Chiarmonie) played a real good game for us. It was an excellent effort by our kids."

So good was the effort that the traditional let down occurred the following evening when Belleville and Kearny played for the tournament championship.

The Bucs did not play one of its better games, but the sign of a good team is when it wins even though it didn't play well. Such was the case in the Kearny game.

"No, I wasn't happy with the way we played," Roll said. "We didn't play with the intensity we did in the Rahway game, but I kind of expected it. Our kids wanted the Rahway game. They didn't want to play in another consolation game, like they did in the Tip Off Classic (two weeks ago). I think we could have won by a bigger margin, but it was good to win the tournament again."

The final score of the game was 60-49. Sochaski led the way for Belleville once again, this time scoring 22 points. Steven Schwed, a senior forward, had his best game of the season, scoring 15.

After allowing his team a day to enjoy the championship, Roll had the Bucs back on the court last Saturday, getting them ready for a critical week against some tough NNJIL teams.

"I think we have a good chance to go 4-0 this week," the coach said. "3-I wouldn't be bad, either. We need to play well this week and next Tuesday, because next Friday (January 15), we play at home against Nutley at 7:30 p.m. If we can be 9-1, or 8-2, the gym will be so packed our players won't be able to get in."

With the way the Bucs are playing in the early going, there's no reason to feel the club can't win all four games, heading into that Nutley clash on the 15th.

"We can't let up," Roll said. "We don't have the type of team that can take it easy and expect to win. The kids are playing well, but we have to keep the momentum going into this week. Last year, we got off 9-6 and lost our last nine games. We were too content just to get those nine wins. This year, it should be different."

NOTES: Sochaski needed just 27 points to surpass Abdel Anderson and become the all time leading scorer in boys' basketball history at Belleville. Sochaski had 1,320 points heading into the Bloomfield game last Tuesday. The all time leading scorer in Belleville basketball history, of course, is Jennifer Apicella, who compiled an incredible 3,105 points from 1980-84. Bucs have not beaten Passaic since February, 1976, when Tom Smith hit two free throws in the closing seconds to lead Bellevil-le to a 47-46 win. Roll was a sophomore forward for the Bellboys in that game. Bucs posted a win over Montclair last year, the first time that happened in 20 years. The win also marked the first time a Bob Lester coached club had lost to Belleville. Lester had coached at East Orange and Atlantic City before going to Montclair in 1979. Bucs have not beaten Eastside since the inception of the NNJIL, although the team has come close on a few occasions.
