

Yudin's artistic renovations create interest in store

The renovations to Yudin's on Washington Avenue are more than just cosmetic. The store has undergone a change that many people may not be aware of.

When it first opened in the early part of this century, the store sold glass and wallpaper. Today it has a more sophisticated variety of items, ranging from office furniture to art supplies.

It may be considered a veritable artist's store to end all stores, with supplies ranging from sketch pencils to acrylic and enamel paints, from poster board to paint canvas. And for those not blessed with artistic ability but appreciate art none the less, a small selection of original paintings are available for purchase.

"A lot of people still feel we're glass and wallpaper but we're not," said Edward Brett, manager. "The new look is here."

"We have a new theme. After all the years of glass and wallpaper we've become modernized with custom frames and art supplies."

With that new look has come renovations to the store, totaling close to \$60,000, according to Brett. Work has been completed for approximately one year, with actual renovations taking four months to complete.

The first step in the process was when the store was purchased by Carmine and Daniel Torsiello 17 years ago, creating the change in supplies. The overhaul of the look of the store began when they purchased C&D Market, which was next door, a little under two years

ago. With the delicatessen moving across the street, the art supply store was able to double its floor area to over 2,000 square feet.

As soon as that was finalized, a new store front was installed as well as new gondolas, roofing and lighting, and carpeting. With the added space and improvement, three times as much inventory as before the work was put in, according to Brett.

"We had an idea of putting in an art gallery but we found supplies turned over better," said Brett. "We do have a large supply of posters that can be framed."

With the completion of the store renovations, Brett has noticed an increase in business volume, at least 30 percent, he said. "Progress brings progress."

"It's like the snowball rolling down the hill, it's bound to pick up more snow," he said in explaining why he feels the volume has increased. By creating a new atmosphere and a new attitude, patrons have become more appreciative of the store.

According to Brett a majority of customers come from outside of Belleville, most notably Newark and Nutley. In fact, a Spanish-speaking employee has been hired to speak with the numerous Portuguese artists that come to the store. With approximately 20 parking spots in the rear of the building, it's easy for people to come, park their cars, and do their shopping.

"People don't realize we're here," noted Brett. "They come in and say 'It's right here under my nose' and then they come back."

Resident flies over Honduras for U.S.

A 25 year-old Belleville resident has seen the recent happenings in Central America first-hand as he was a member of the 82nd Airborne Division that was ordered to fly down to Honduras a few weeks ago.

Airman Robert C. Buccino, son of Charles and RoseMarie Buccino of 153 Passaic Ave., was one of a five member crew aboard a refueling plane that was part of the contingent President Ronald Reagan sent in a show of force and aid to the Honduran people.

Buccino, a 1980 graduate of Belleville High School, is a boom operator for the Boeing 717 that carries almost 1.3 million gallons of fuel.

The crew refueled one plane, a C-141 "Starlifter". The tanker steadied itself in mid-air, then the transport plane came within 36 feet of

the tanker, coming in beneath the tail. At this point a refueling tube, guided by the boom arm controlled by Buccino, descended from the plane.

With the two planes connected by the metal and rubber line, the operation of "filling her up" began. JP-4, jet fuel, was then pumped into the Starfighter at a rate of 1,000 gallons a minute. In that minute enough gas is pumped through the line to power an automobile for a year.

When the refueling was complete, the two jets separated and went their different ways, like boats passing in the night.

Buccino is stationed at Robins Air Force Base in Macon, Georgia. He graduated from Air Force basic training at Lackland Air Force Base, Texas on October 8 and earned his wings December 11.

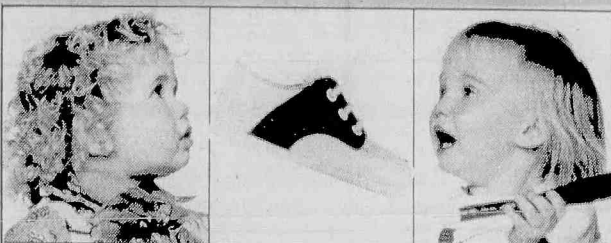

Mr. I. of Clifton asks: "I have spaces between my teeth that seem to be getting wider. Can this cause a problem?"

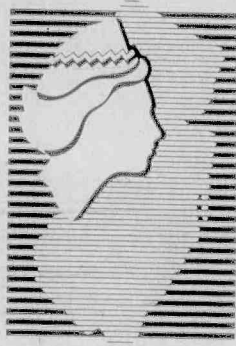

People have spoken

Congratulations to the two new Belleville Board of Education members Joe Del Guercio and Joe Papisidero and good luck to both of them in their new positions. They are thrown right into the fire, having to find a way to reduce the school budget but not lose the quality of education that had been on the upswing.

Both have stated they had problems with the budget, well here's their chance to do something about it. We all know it is easy to stand back and criticize something but when someone says, "O.K. you do it" often time we realize just how difficult that something is. This is not to say Del Guercio and Papisidero have blown a lot of hot air the past few months and will now do nothing on the board. We believe both are hight qualified, responsible individuals who will work hard and create a workable budget for both the school system and be acceptable to the public.

The two were honest, saying they found problems with the budget but could not offer any sure-fire solutions to it. Anyone that says they can solve a monumental problem such as a school board budget without doing complete research is trying to put one over on the public. These two did not. This is not to say Frank Caputo and Ernie Zoppi were the fault with the budget. In fact, Caputo voted against the budget but we think it was a case of being the wrong people at the wrong time. The people of Belleville have decided changes are needed in their elected offices, and new blood will flow in the political body, in the hopes it will give it new life. Who's to say it will? Well it is the voters decision to change the makeup of a board if they feel fit. And they felt fit last year and they felt fit again this week.

Zoppi was with the board for the better part of ten years and, whether you liked him or didn't, you have to admit his experience will be missed. Caputo, as he stressed, was not really part of that "old crowd," the crowd that many townspeople seem to dislike. Apparently, he couldn't stress it enough, for even though he voted against the budget, people still felt he was not in the best interest of the town. Or, maybe they just felt Del Guercio and Papisidero were better suited to help lead the town out of the low period and bring it back up.

The people have spoken and know they have a somewhat fresh Board of Education and a somewhat fresh Board of Commissioners. These are the people they wanted and now trust with their town, the town many people have lived in all their lives. For a very long time, residents seemed to resent change, or be afraid of it. Now it seems, they are craving for it, for someone, or something to get the ball rolling and bring Belleville back.

It's now Del Guercio's and Papisidero's turns to assist in bringing a new Belleville, one tha all townspeople can be proud of, not just a chosen few. They will need help and they know that. The two also realize now there will be people scrutinizing and questioning every move they make. They will be under the microscope, people looking at what they are doing, not the other way around has been the case. We think both are up to. Good Luck gentlemen and may both of you add strength and stability to the town. Hopefully, enough strength and stability, to push that ball and get it moving at a pace that the town hasn't seen in quite some time.

Magnificent Boondoggle

There is a beautiful slang word the meaning of which cannot easily be duplicated from the more conventional lexicon: COCKAMAIGMIE.

It means a nitwit idea, something that is dumb and stupid, something hare brained, and what other word can be used to describe the proposal to drill a deep tunnel 13.5 miles from Wayne to the Nutley-Clifton border to carry Passaic River floodwaters away from a zone they presently inundate periodically, so they can inundate parts of Nutley and Belleville, which haven't had flood problems in modern times.

As presently constituted, the tunnel has a price tag of \$862 million according to the Army Corps of Engineers, which is pushing the idea, but it is doubtful anyone seriously believes it could be accomplished for that figure. An even \$1 billion is probably more realistic.

Representatives Robert A. Roe, D-Wayne, who is Nutley's man in Washington, and Rep. Dean Gallo, R-Parsippany, have told the corps that practically demands a further six miles of tunneling be done to carry the floodwater to Newark Bay.

Samuel P. Tosi, chief of the planning division in the corps' district office in Manhattan demurs. That extension would cost an additional \$300 to \$350 million, he estimates, adding "...such an expenditure does not generate \$300 to \$350 million worth of additional benefits."

It all depends on your point of view. The governing bodies of Nutley and Belleville certainly do not agree, nor do many property owners who may become victims of transplanted floods.

Truth to tell, spending that kind of money for such a cockamaigmic idea is a boondoggle of the first magnitude. For hundreds of millions less properties in the present flood zone could almost certainly be acquired at market value, some anti-flooding landscaping done and the remaining lands turned into environmental preserves along the river.

Whatever needs to be done to head off this cockamaigmic tunnel must be done, and quickly.

Highland Beach, Florida — This Sunday, most of us basked in the sunshine and glory of Easter Day — with a feeling of tranquility, peace and love. Purged from our hearts and minds were the negatives that we accumulate from year to year — even in some hearts and minds, the hate of our fellow man/woman. With that, we have the capacity to carry on in the next 52 weeks reflecting the tender love and passion toward our fellow human beings that Christians rendered unto God on Sunday.

If we try hard enough, we will find that it is easy to disagree without being disagreeable. Nutley, Belleville and Bloomfield are relatively small communities — and for the most part, a large segment of the population has forever lived in the community. My roots are in Nutley. I graduated from Nutley High School — and in between, I commuted for two years to Newark's old Market Street High School, a two-story building north of the Essex County Courthouse located on High Street and West Market. At 71, I now look back upon those school years as a period of enrichment — the hard knocks of a Newark city environment, and later facing the prejudice of Nutley's ruling class during the Depression years. The experience of those years, I believe, developed an inner strength that sustained me in the fight for survival which the Avondale-Big Tree residents faced every day. Our parents were a proud folk, mostly illiterate immigrants, with hearts of gold and unblemished personal characters. Our mothers were slaves to their families. Our fathers worked day and night to put bread on the table and provide clothing for their families and a roof overhead. I wish that I were half the man my father was — for he was the very essence of goodness — a man who had an unquenchable love and devotion for his family. Those days are long gone since — but I cherish those memories as I enter the charmed years of the twilight of my existence.

There are fewer tomorrows than yesterdays. I'm trying hard to make every day count. Like a cousin recently reminded me — "It's later than you think." Time will tell if I succeeded.

EDITH and I joined Bob and Connie Rose on their fifth wedding an-

niversary, Easter Sunday, with mother, Anne Rose, proudly participating. It was an enjoyable four hours in the company of another pioneer Nutley family. The Roses live in a palatial estate on the intercoastal waterway in Hallandale. Bob parks his speedboat at his backyard dock. He is looking to a future with a cabin cruiser.

THIS week, we discovered a gem of a restaurant — the Piazza Colonna at the Royal Palm Plaza in Boca Raton. I would judge it one of the finest restaurants in Florida. The staff attention, the service and the quality of food are of the very best. In fact, it reminds me very much of the Santini family restaurant in Nutley.

NOW and then I am reminded of an observation made by Mark Twain, "If a man could be crossed with a cat, it would improve man, but deteriorate the cat. If you pick up a starving dog and make him prosperous, he will not bite you. That is the principal difference between a dog and a man."

WE responded affirmatively to a solicitation from Rich Ruffalo, a 36-year-old Belleville blind athlete who has been named to represent New Jersey at the National Championship for the United States Association of Blind Athletes to be held June 18 - 27 in Indianapolis, Indiana. Part of the feud is connected to the 14th Congressional District Democrat race that pits former Florida Senate President Harry Johnston against Palm Beach County Commissioner (Freeholder) Dorothy Wilken. Delegate slates are being formulated based upon a person's allegiance to Wilken or Johnston. Seven delegates are up for grabs. In the Broward County (Fort Lauderdale) Democrat circles, there are three delegate slates — a labor union slate, a so-called unity slate and a Broward/ Palm Beach coalition slate. Spokespersons for the various slates are charging opponents with backroom deals. There is no reason in the world why we in Essex County are obliged to fund a \$40 million activity when the responsibility is primarily that of the State of New Jersey.

Photography and sculpture are also accepted, but not crafts items, such as painting on velvet, paint by number or decoupage.

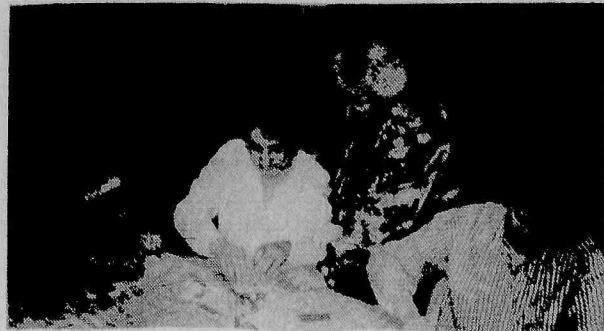

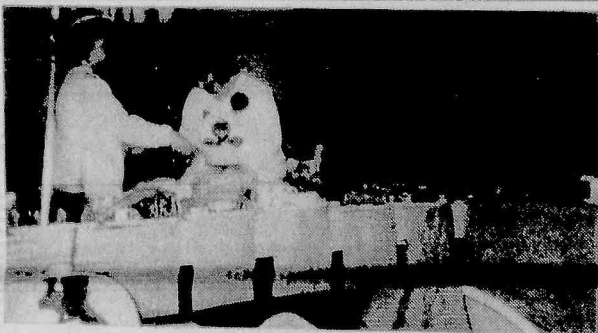

The facts on Tourette syndrome

Tourette syndrome is a neurological disorder characterized by involuntary muscular movements, uncontrollable vocal sounds and inappropriate words. These multiple tics usually begin when the patient is between the ages of two and 16. Males are afflicted about three times more often than females.

The first symptoms of Tourette syndrome are usually facial tics: the patient blinks his eyes excessively, twitches his nose, or grimaces. As the condition progresses, he may repeatedly stretch his neck, stamp his feet, or twist and bend his body.

The Tourette patient eventually produces strange uncontrollable and unacceptable sounds. He may continuously clear his throat, cough, sniff, grunt, bark, or shout. Some patients involuntarily shout obscenities, or constantly repeat the words of other people. Victims may touch other people excessively, or repeat actions obsessively and unnecessarily. A few patients bite their lips and cheeks, bang their heads against hard objects, and develop other self-destructive behavior.

Tourette syndrome is thought to be caused by a chemical abnormality in the neurotransmitter system by which the brain regulates movement and behavior. Neurotransmitters are chemicals that carry signals from cell to cell in the brain and along the nerves.

Physicians have had some success treating Tourette syndrome patients with haloperidol. This drug, also known as Haldol, suppresses symptoms for many patients but does not cure the condition.

The long-term side effects of Haldol are not yet known. Some short-term side effects, such as muscular rigidity, drooling and restlessness, can be reduced by drugs commonly used to treat Parkinson's disease, Artane or Cogentin, for example. Other side effects such as fatigue, depression, anxiety, weight gain, and difficulties thinking clearly may be more

troublesome. Patients with mild Tourette syndrome symptoms may be able to do without any medication.

Haldol should be administered by a physician familiar with the drug and with Tourette syndrome. Haldol is given in very small doses that are increased slowly, usually every fifth day, until the best possible balance between symptoms and side effects is achieved.

Research on Tourette syndrome is under way at the National Institute of Neurological and Communicative Disorders and Stroke, the National Institute of Child Health and Human Development, the National Institute of Mental Health, and major private medical institutions. Work is concentrated in three major areas: Pharmacologic studies, Genetic studies and Neurotransmitter studies.

Research also focuses on the synapse, the essential junction where neurotransmitter chemicals carry impulses from one nerve to another. Together, neurotransmission and synaptogenesis account for about half of the research dollars currently being devoted directly and indirectly to Tourette's syndrome.

Job related expenses

Employees who incur expenses, incidental to their jobs, may still be able to claim a deduction on their federal income tax return. Some expenses are still considered adjustments to income, while others are itemized deductions according to Bert Tobia, District Manager for H & R Block.

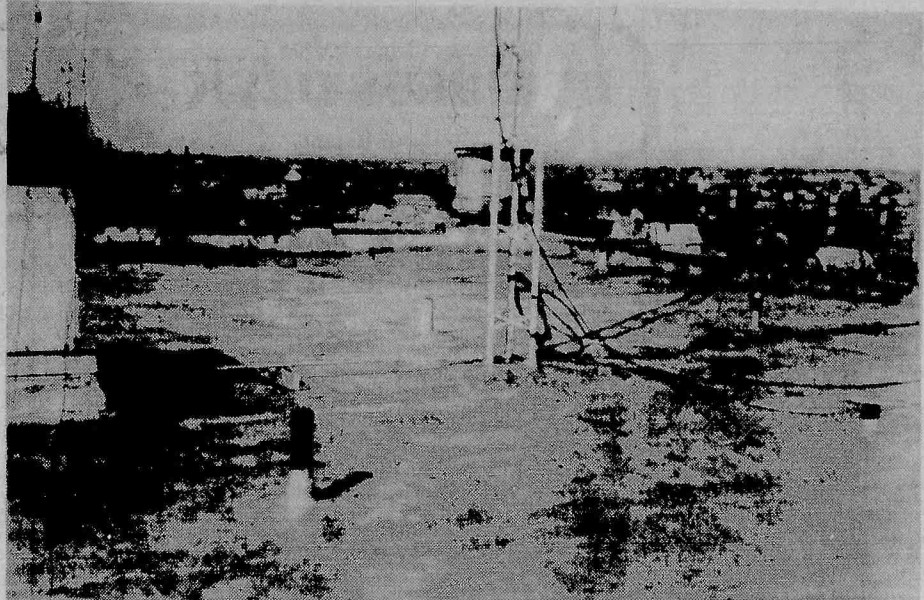
For example, firemen, nurses, crossing guards, etc., are required to wear uniforms. They are entitled to deduct not only the cost of the uniforms but also the expense of cleaning them. Many employees pay union or professional dues which are deductible. The cost of books, periodicals related to one's profession are deductible, as are vocational supplies. A person who is required to be on 24-hour call may deduct part of his cost for local phone service. Small tools are an expense in many trades.

Many employees take courses to improve their job skills. The cost of tuition, books, lab fees, etc., may be deducted as long as you were not required to take them as a prerequisite for getting

the job, and the education is not to qualify you for a new job or profession. If you look for another job in your same line of work, you may deduct job-seeking expenses such as employment agency fees and resumes. You may deduct the cost of a medical exam required for your employment. If your employer provides you with no regular place of work and you work from your home for the employer's convenience, you may qualify for an office-in-home deduction.

The tax reform act of 1987 did make major changes in the way these deductions are to be calculated by the taxpayer, but they still are allowed and can reduce the amount of taxes owed. "Naturally," Tobia added, "every taxpayer has a different situation, but we will be glad to help them find their lowest tax liability at any local office. tion on the pipes and save on wear and tear. We got rid of all the pipes on top of the roof except an electrical line."

Frantantoni said an electrician will install lighting in the attic shortly because, without the sun shining in through the skylights, there is not sufficient light in the attic.

Total cost of the re-roofing \$15,100, \$8,200 for the first half and \$6,900 for the second. The first cost more because of the ripping up of the section of roof, Frantantoni said.

Other jobs on Frantantoni's list completed include new rooves for the firehouse and Parks and Property building on William Street, the re-painting of the interior of the Public Affairs building and replacing swings and other playground equipment at the Recreation House.

Dear Doctor:

In your recent column, you discussed some of the advances associated with angioplasty using balloon-tipped catheters. Recently, I have been hearing much about laser catheters. Could you comment on this question? A.W.

Answer:

In the last few years, there have been tremendous advances made in the use of balloon catheters. The news media constantly reports on wider and more advanced techniques and usages of these catheters.

It is well known that many patients with blocked coronary arteries now undergo balloon angioplasty, often being performed at many of our local hospitals. Without the angioplasty, many of these patients might have needed open heart surgery to bypass these clogged arteries.

Now, researchers are offering wider usages of these balloon-tipped catheters. For example, at several major health centers, researchers are replacing balloons with lasers or drill bits to open clogged vessels in the leg (thigh). Several doctors have developed a laser-heated probe that can vaporize the plaque on contact. This has been used on patients whose femoral (thigh) arteries were so severely clogged that the bulkier balloon-tipped catheters could not fit through. The laser creates a channel through the clogged arteries so that the balloon can follow through.

At various other centers across the United States, doctors and researchers are developing and using both hot-tipped and cool-tipped lasers that help vaporize fatty and calcified deposits in the arteries.

At other centers, there is even a different approach — a drill bit placed at the catheter tip. Powered by compressed air, the drill bit burs at high speed through the plaque, destroying it into pieces so minute that the body can dispose of them.

It should be noted that these procedures are still undergoing extensive research and development and are only available at a few major centers throughout the country, often on an experimental basis. Hopefully, it will be fully available to more patients in the near future.

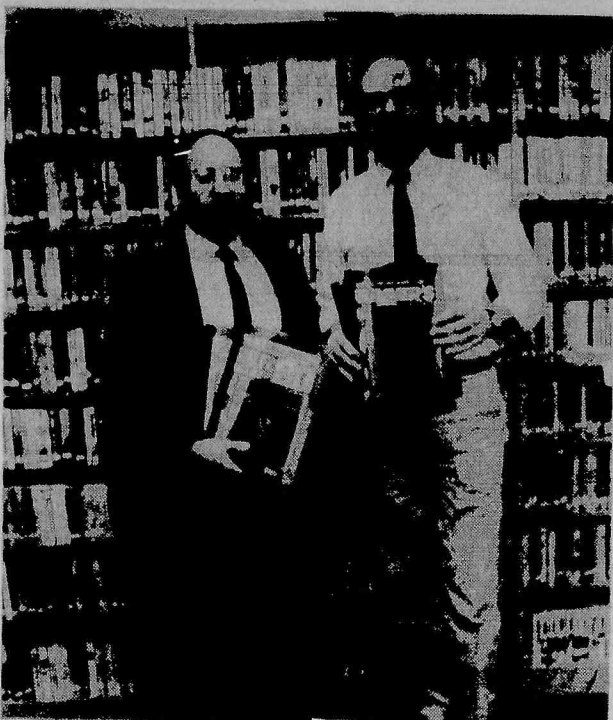

Durkee, and assistant superintendent Harold A. Dufford. The two gentlemen were on hand for their periodic check on building progress.

Tax savings for divorced parents

"Divorce is difficult enough from an emotional and financial standpoint, but the ever-changing tax laws seem to further complicate matters," said Bert Tobia, District Manager of H & R Block. Tobia said, "divorced people can save money if they know how the tax law affects them. It's amazing that there are so many local courses at the 'Y' and the adult school about single parenting and adjusting to divorce, but no courses explaining the special tax situation of divorced people. After all, taxes can account for up to half of a divorced person's income. "First of all, two kinds of payments usually change hands between divorced people and they have very different tax consequences. Child support payments are not deductible by the payer and not taxable to the recipient. Alimony payments are taxable to the recipient and can be deductible by the payer, but taxpayers must be careful not to try to disguise child support as alimony because the IRS has strict new rules on this.

"Divorce agreements made or modified after 1984 which specify that alimony will decrease or stop when a child reaches a specified landmark (e.g. age 12, finishing college, etc.) will not be treated as alimony. Instead, the IRS will treat all or part of the payments as child support. That means the payer will not be able to deduct it from his or her income, and the recipient will not be taxed on the

payment.

"Most divorced parents work and must pay for child care services for their children under 15 years of age. The parent having custody of the child for the longer period during the year is entitled to claim the childcare credit. That credit can reduce taxes by as much as \$1440.

"A question we are often asked is which divorced parent is allowed to claim the child as an \$1,900 exemption. "Usually," Tobia explained, "the parent who has custody of the child for the greater amount of time can claim the exemption. However, the non-custodial parent can claim the exemption if he or she contributed at least \$600 toward the child's support that year and there is a written pre-1985 agreement saying that the noncustodial parent can claim the child as an exemption.

"Because of the changes in the tax laws, divorced people should consult professional tax preparers for accurate, up-to-date information on their individual situations.

"A custodial parent who allows the dependency exemption to be taken by the non-custodial parent may still qualify for head of household filing status and may still be eligible for the earned income credit with is worth up to \$851 in their pocket.

"Another confusing area which taxpayers ask us about," Tobia added, "is their filing status. Most divorced people think of themselves as single. Socially, they are

single, but for tax purposes, they will find big savings if they can file as head of household because they will be taxed at a lower rate. To be eligible for head of household status, you must 1.) be unmarried on the last day of the year, and 2.) have paid more than half the cost of keeping up a home that was the principal home for more than half the year for you and your unmarried child (even if you do not claim the child as your dependent). Other rules govern married children and other relatives, but a professional tax preparation service can best advise you.

"One other area where we get a lot of questions is medical deductions. Let's face it, even healthy kids can rack up huge medical and dental bills. As long as the combined support for the child given by the two parents equals more than half the child's total support, each parent can claim all the medical and dental expenses he or she paid for the child regardless of which parent has custody or claims the child as a dependent. In other words, if either parent can claim the child as a dependent, both parents are entitled to deduct each of their medical expenses they paid for the child.

"With the fantastically high rate of divorce in Northern New Jersey, we recommend that divorced people, whether they are parents or not, seek the advice of trained tax professionals so that they can pay the lowest tax possible. We can help them if they call their local H & R Block office.

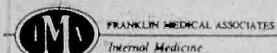

ADOPTING A DRUG POLICY

It offers tax incentives to drug manufacturers enabling them to produce orphan drugs at a reasonable cost. Over one hundred orphan drugs are now being produced as a result of the law.



Chemical dependency a killer

Certain kinds of illnesses carry much more of a stigma than others. Chemical dependency is one of them.

Four hundred thousand people in New Jersey are suffering from alcohol/drug abuse. Nearly two million family members, friends and co-workers are suffering with them.

But for most individuals, the problem remains hidden.

"When you love someone, you try to take care of them," commented Jimmie Nell Stuckey, assistant director of Addiction Recovery Service at Carrier Foundation. "You try to make things better...to come to their defense...to minimize their drinking/drugging."

"You end up doing all the wrong things for all the right reasons, (because you love them, are worried about them, etc.)," she concluded.

"It's the conspiracy of kindness that kills alcoholics/addicts," said Isabelle Richards, supervisor of Carrier's Outpatient Addiction Treatment Service.

"We used to believe that addicts must 'hit bottom' before they could get help. At that point, we had no idea that, through the family, we could get them ready to bottom out."

When traditional methods (requests by family members that the individual attend AA, outpatient therapy or counseling) have failed, and when the individual adamantly refuses to admit that he/she has a problem, intervention may be the appropriate "next step."

"Intervention is a well-orchestrated strategy for encouraging the addicted person into treatment," said Richards. "Things are never, ever the same once an intervention has occurred."

At Carrier Foundation, the outpatient intervention program, led by a certified alcoholism counselor (C.A.C.), is divided into eight sessions. The first six are devoted to the family members and close friends of the identified individual.

Through the sessions, it is determined whether or not an intervention is appropriate, and what has not worked in the past. Family members and friends are educated about addictive illnesses and participate in role playing exercises, at which time they are advised on what they should and should not say to the individual and how to diffuse their anger, avoid accusation/confrontation and concentrate on the issue at hand — persuading the individual to seek treatment.

Everything comes together at the seventh session — the actual intervention.

"During an intervention, everyone is prepped," said Bradley D. Evans, M.D., director of Carrier's Addiction Recovery Service Program.

"There are no arguments, no one gets punched out. It is an extraordinary event."

And most of the time it works.

According to Dr. Evans, 85% of the individuals who undergo an intervention accept and remain in treatment.

Family members as well must begin their own recovery process. According to Stuckey, an interview with someone affected by chemical dependency will usually reveal problems such as guilt, shame, worry, difficulty, concentrating and preoccupation with the addicted person. Physical complaints may include

Saute onion and garlic in oil until onions are tender. Stir in bread crumbs, olives, parsley, tomatoes, 1 tablespoon lemon juice and 1/4 teaspoon salt. Simmer, stirring often over medium heat about 10 to 15 minutes or until most of liquid has evaporated and sauce is thick. Combine remaining 1 tablespoon lemon juice and 1/2 teaspoon salt with 1 cup water and pour over fish in a 2-quart shallow baking dish. Cover and bake in 400°F. oven 20 minutes or until fish is tender and flakes when tested with a fork. Transfer fish to serving platter; keep warm. Stir in about 1/2 cup broth from fish pan to tomato mixture. Bring to a boil and simmer for 5 minutes until it is a good saucy consistency. Pour sauce over fish. Garnish with parsley, lemon wedges and additional ripe olives, as desired.

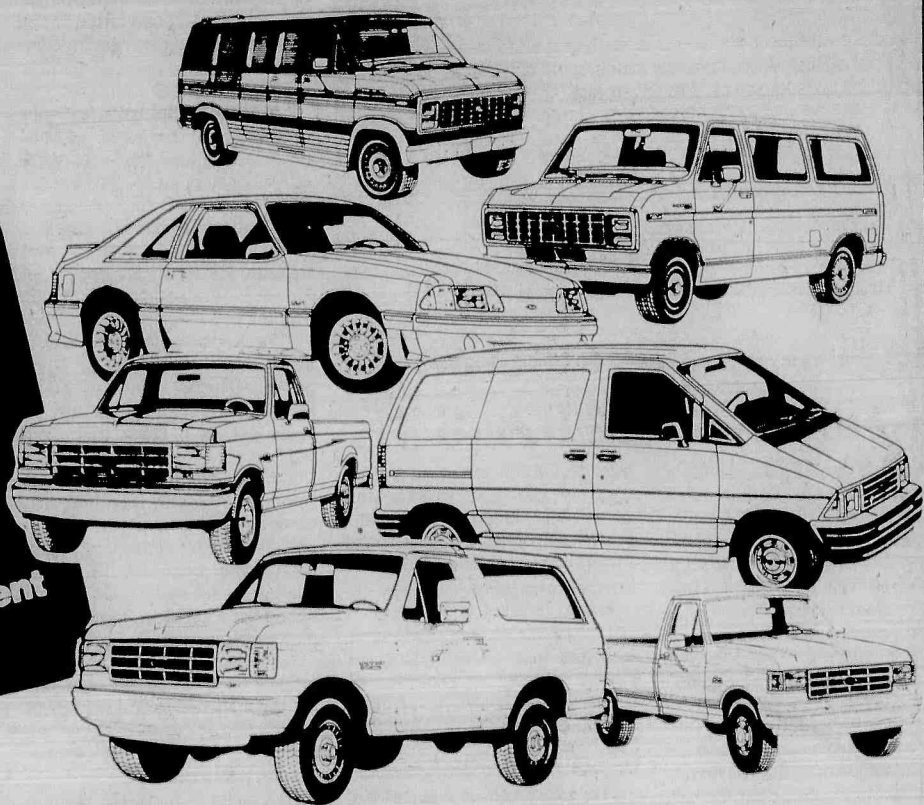

For 21 years, he could be found on the high seas of the Passaic River, barking instructions to his team or giving words of encouragement. He was an institution at Belleville High School, and recently, his friends and former athletes got together to thank the man they will always remember and respect.

Sam Giuffrida was honored at the Knights of Columbus hall by those who worked for, and with him, during his coaching career. Needless to say, Giuffrida, a family man and one fiercely dedicated to the Belleville athlete, was left practically speechless.

"It was a great night, I couldn't believe it," the former Belleville crew coach said. "How they kept it a secret all that time is beyond me. I had no idea of what they have planned. When I walked into that room, and saw all those faces I didn't now what to say. I saw people from 20 years back. I saw so many of my former athletes, who are doing so well now. I'm really proud of them."

Giuffrida's coaching career was cut short in the Fall of 1986. The man who is known as "Mr. G", or just "G" by his students, was stricken by a heart attack and spent months in the hospital.

"They were tough times," he recalls of the days and weeks following the attack. "I can't say enough about the people of this town, who were so supportive of me, and my family, during those times."

teaching history once again. While coaching crew is a thing of the past, he can still be found by the boathouse from time to time, enjoying the sport he coached for over two decades.

Giuffrida first arrived on the scene as a coach for Belleville crew in the spring of 1965. For six seasons, he served as assistant coach to **Mike Lally**. In 1971, he assumed the role of head coach, and held that post through the 1986 campaign. During that tenure, Giuffrida coached some outstanding crews.

"The program has come a long way," the coach said. "There were great times at the boathouse. When I first came on as an assistant, I remember the boat house as a shack with two old shells. I said, 'what did I get myself into.' But I knew shortly thereafter that this sport was for me. Let me tell you, the town of Belleville is just super. They were so supportive of the program and helped to get a new boathouse installed."

"Today, we have some of the best equipment and even though the sport doesn't produce big numbers of athletes, the kids that do come out are outstanding. We race against some very good schools, and we've more than held our own. Getting to the nationals used to be few and far between. Now, we're there almost every season."

Giuffrida expressed praise and gratitude to his assistants throughout the years, especially **Tony Sorrentino**, **Angelo Corino** and **Scott Fabian**, who is now the varsity coach. It was Fabian who served as girls' crew coach in the early 80's, when the team won three national championships over a four year period.

"That's such a tremendous accomplishment," Giuffrida said of the girls exploits. "To win one national title is outstanding, to have the same group of girls win three is awesome. He (Fabian) deserves the credit. He was my longest term assistant and now, he's doing an excellent job as head coach."

Back in November of 1985, Giuffrida was inducted to the Belleville Hall of Fame, along with the entire 1976 boys squad that won the Stotesbury and Poughkeepsie Regatta.

Having been a graduate of Belleville High in 1976, I remember the excitement that that crew team generated throughout the school. I remember the varsity club dinner in the spring of '76, when Giuffrida said goodbye to those seniors. It wasn't an easy moment for the coach.

Thus, when he was inducted to the Hall in 1985 with that shell, it goes without saying that it was an emotional moment.

Mike Davis, one of the members of that '76 shell, spoke for the entire team in accepting the induction and remembered the camaradery that the team had under Giuffrida. Davis needed a few seconds between words to collect his composure. You couldn't hear a pin drop during the ceremony.

"I think we were out until 4 a.m. after the dinner," Giuffrida remembers with a laugh. "Those guys were super. It was the first big championship team."

The members of that team were, **Paul Denning**, **Michael Davis**, **Doug Dorival**, **Paul Melchione**, **Pat Barbone**, **Keith Waddell**, **Mike Barbone**, **Rich Budrick**, **Mike O'Connor** and **Donald Paterno**.

"You have to remember that my '77 team also did real well, finishing third in the nationals," the coach said. "1976 was the first year, but there were many great seasons after that, too."

The girls team first began to practice in the Fall of '77 and began competitive racing in spring, 1978.

"While many remember the national champion teams (1982, '84 and '85), I have a lot of respect for those early teams," Giuffrida said. "They knew they were going to lose, but they stuck with the program. They gave it everything they had."

Giuffrida remembers **Theresa Cassin** and **Marie Herter** as two athletes who put a lot of time into those early teams. Cassin's brother, **Bob**, is now a member of the varsity coaching staff for Belleville crew and Theresa has been very active in the success of the program.

"What makes me very happy is that we have people coaching the program now that were a member of the team," Giuffrida said. "The program has come full cycle, and that means a lot."

The current coaches for the team, in addition to Fabian and Cassin, are **Dennis Villano** and **Maureen Russo**.

Giuffrida is proud of his accomplishments as coach of the team, and rightfully so.

"I had the chance to see my children (**Michael** and **Carolyn**) go through the program, and the team looks real good this season. I have no regrets. Well, I guess I regret the way I had to leave the program, but as far as my years as coach, I am very grateful."

I first met Sam Giuffrida in the Fall of 1970. I was 12 years old and it was my first day of Junior High School. Sam was my seventh grade teacher in history, and later, I had him for economics in my senior year of high school in 1976. Although I never competed for him in crew (I was involved in track), I certainly gained a tremendous amount of respect for the man. He told it like it was, and he is certainly a Hall of Famer in every respect.

Freshman baseball readies for opener

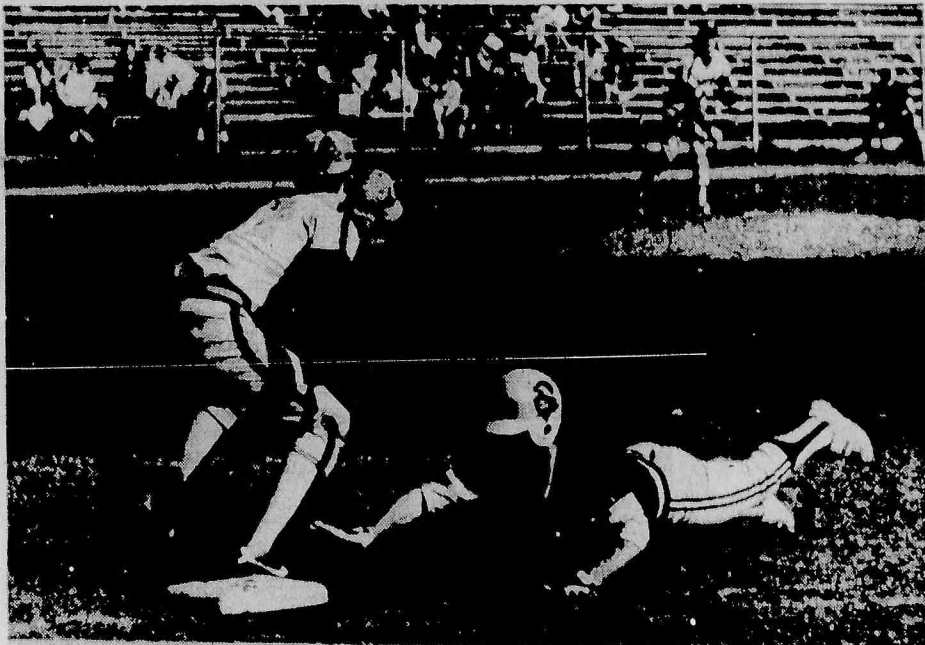
While the Belleville varsity baseball team is looking for continued success, the future of the baseball program begins on the freshman level.

Anti-cholesterol product coming

An agreement has been signed between the board of directors of Pragma Bio-Tech Inc. of Bloomfield and a division of Darby-Rugby to manufacture Liqui-Mega, a food supplement made from Norwegian fish oil, which can help reduce cholesterol levels in the human body.

According to a spokesman for Pragma Bio-Tech the agreement will assure an unlimited supply of Liqui-Mega, which is a product of the company's Marine Research Division. It will be manufactured in a state-of-the-art facility owned and operated by Darby-Rugby.

The Darby-Rugby family of companies, located on Long Island, is one of the largest purveyors of generic drug products in the nation, and John R. Bruno, Pragma Bio-Tech's president and chairman of

the board, said his company is happy to forge the connection.

"We have received pre-marketing commitments from several major national drug chains," Bruno added.

A spearmint flavored liquid, Liqui-Mega is seen as far more palatable than capsules already on the market containing Omega-3 oil, and the new product involves application for a patent for a process known as microemulsion, which allows the substance to be

absorbed more easily in to the bloodstream as it reduces cholesterol levels.

Before marketing begins, Pragma Bio-Tech will have the prominent Canadian lipids specialist Dr. Paul J. Lupien conduct an evaluation. Analysts estimate there is a market for cholesterol reducing products in excess of \$850,000,000 annually. When cholesterol levels are reduced, it is believed that the risk of heart attack is also reduced.

The estate was once the home of Lord North, prime minister of England during the American Revolution, and was then acquired by Oxford University. In 1965, Wroxton Abbey was purchased by FDU as the first American-owned college campus in England. Since

that time, nearly 2,500 students have benefited from the program.

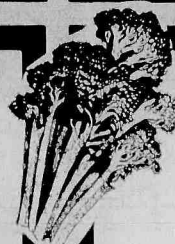

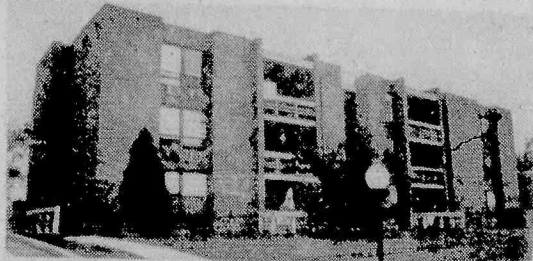
