## Fornarotto's two town jobs under scrutiny once again

By Pat Brightman

A year-old question resurfaced at the last Belleville Board of Commissoners meeting, when Mayor Michael Pizza instructed the town attorney to investigate whether a commissioner can also be a town employee, a situation Commissioner of Public Affairs Joseph Fornarotto feels was settled.

At the meeting June 14, Pizza told Frank Cozzarelli to file for a declaritory judgement. According to Pizza the reason he informed Cozzarelli was he feels he has given enough time for Commissioner of Parks and Public Property Vincent Frantantoni to act.

"Last year an opinion was render-

ed that there was a conflict of interest," described Pizzi. "Tve been waiting and waiting and nothing was happening. Since I'm the mayor and the mayor is the overseer of all departments, I thought it was time to take action.'

Cozzarelli expressed his opin-ion, that there was a conflict of interest, in May of 1987, shortly after Fornarotto was elected commissioner. Cozzarelli said he based his opinion on a case held in Union City in 1971 where a public employee was forced to choose between the office he was elected or his public job.

"There are two possibilities," explained Cozzarelli, "one, he will

be told to relinquish one or both of his positions or he will be able to make a choice. The likely outcome is the second option.'

Both Fornarotto and Frantantoni said they feel there are no problems with Fornarotto being commissioner and Housing Inspec-tor. "It's been proven," said Fornarotto, feeling opinions of other officials stating no conflict are correct. He said he was suprised when Pizzi brought it up at the meeting "after it was settled a year ago.'

"It's an old egg he (Pizzi wants to hatch," Fornarotto said. Frantantoni said he has received

five or six opinions stating their is no conflict of interest and the only judgement saying there is a conflict is Cozzarelli's.

"A lot of people who did not like the results of last year's election are doing everything in their power to create havoc," is the way Fran-tantoni explained the reasoning for the reintroduction of the question.

Pizzi had said he wanted to have an answer by the next town meeting, June 28, but Cozzarelli was not as optimistic, saying it would "take weeks to months" before a decision is rendered. He also had a question regarding the entire situation.

I don't know if it would be ethically correct," commented Cozzarelli when asked if he had filed for the judgement. "Since I gave my opinion I may have to give it to someone else in my office.

## New lamp flashes a different perspective on Town Hall

Lighting up the night on Washington Avenue is a new lamp used to enhance the architectural structure of Town Hall, a structure approaching its 73rd bithday.

Commissioner of Parks and Public Property Vincent Frantantoni said the light was installed by Public Service Electric and Gas (PSE&G) without a fee and is the

first action towards Belleville's 150th anniversary next April.

"It's brightened the area and has made the building a focal point," stated Frantantoni. "It's the center of our government, the Town Hall, and we used it to begin to celebrate our anniversary. Hopefully, it will instill pride in the town."

Frantantoni explained the lamp is an innovation by PSE&G that accents particular designs on buildings and he would like to draw attention to the almost 14,000 square foot structure, which was built over the course of three years,

"I was always opposed to destroy-ing this building," said Frantantoni. "I felt it should be preserved, it's a historic site. It should be preserved for our children and our grandchildren.

In committee, including Belleville's first Mayor, Charles Lyman Denison, formed to find a site for a Town Hall, concluding the intersection of Washington Avenue and John Street was the most appropriate location.

## Fornarotto arrested for upsetting surveillance

Commissioner of Public Affairs Joseph Fornarotto was arrested and charged with obstructing justice and burglary and theft Monday when he approached a Belleville Police surveilance vehicle and asked questions of the officers within the auto.

Fornarotto said he approached the vehicle because it was following him and taking pictures and he wanted to know the reason. He said he was troubled by the fact the investigators in the vehicle knew who he was and he did not know who they were. "When undercover cops are staking me out and taking pictures of me and following me I object very much," said the commis-

Belleville Police Chief George Lister said complaints were filed by Captain Michael Petrillo for obstruction of justice and Detective Peter Fraone for burglary and theft. Lister said Fornarotto had attempted, and succeeded, to enter the vehicle and remove the keys from the auto at approximately 8:20 a.m. Fornarotto said he wrote down

the license plate number to the vehicle and found it was unregister-According to Lister there was no

assault charges filed and Fornarotto offered no resistance to the arrest. "There was no physical assault used by him (Fornarotto) or the arresting officers," he said.

He did not say what the officers what surveiling nor why the vehicle was on Union Avenue

Fornarotto said he did not realize he was being watched until he was told by someone that pictures were being taken of him.

"I got a tip from a resident who. called me and said I was being followed," said Fornarotto. "I was very shocked.


## Physical structures a question as system moves ahead

Both Superintendent of Schools Michael Nardiello and Assistant Superintendent of Schools Michael Lally believe Belleville schools have improved despite the continous rejections of the school budget, but that is not to say the constant vetoing of the operating costs have had no detrimental effects on the school system.

This September the New Jersey Department of Education will visit Belleville and evaluate the school district, and while the academic structure of the district is strong, the physical structures of the buildings have created concerns for administ-

Lally explained 43 qualifications

must by met for the school district to pass its examination. With improved test scores and updated curriculum, most of the 43 will be met. Others such as attendence, by both the teachers and students, should also meet or surpass the requirements. However, the conditions of the school buildings has been, and remains, a source of concern of both Lally and Nar-

"We're paying the price of letting go eight custodians and five maintenence people," said Nar-diello. "That's now coming to

Lally agreed, saying the layoffs of not only the custodians and maintenence workes but also a librarian and nurse were "a giant step back-

All must be met

If the school system fails any one of the 43 requirements it will drop a Level 2 district, which would ever the standard and reputation of the district. Once at this stage, the state sets a date by which the failed condition or conditions must by met and if it is not, it can be dropped to a Level 3 district. Ultimately, the district, if it continues to fall short, can be taken over by the

With that in mind, the Belleville Board of Education passed resolutions at its June 6 meeting for work to begin on the Belleville Middle School and asbestos removal from all schools. The work, though yet to get underway, should be completed by September, before school begins and the evaluation is done.

Despite these problems and the budget cuts, Nardiello claims the children are getting "a good educational begining. You have to play with the team you have," noting how Belleville's cost per student is approximately \$4,100, or almost \$500 less than the state mean.

"Not only have we met the goals wanted to meet, we've exceeded them," commented Lally about educational standards.

To continue to meet and exceed, district objectives and goals are designed, both long and short term. Lally receives and evaluates information received from teachers, students, parents and administrators and arrives with guidelines for upcoming years.

Five goals for 1988-89
For the 1988-89 school year, five goals have been established by Lally's office, varying from course

offerings to how to help students

think more constructively. The first goal will be to continue to improve reading and math skills of all students in the district by implementing objectives and activities. Goal number two will focus on the continued improvement of communication skills, both oral and written, with special emphasis on writing compositions.

Exploration and investigation of ways to increase students' ability to think critically and precisely for academic success is the third goal. The fourth goal will be to investigate how students spend their leisure time and promote interest in spending that time more constructively. The final goal will review all course offerings to determine if they provide enough information for students to keep up with the changing nature of society.

Five objectives designed

Objectives for next year are more specific and deal exclusively with inschool improvements.

The first objective will continue to emphasize basic skills as a priorty, with the hope being by June 1989, 80 percent of students will

meet or exceed the state level.

have a combined 65 years in the Belleville system, Lally with 28 and Nardiello with 37, feel the district has, and is continuing, to move in the right direction. Each one expresses confidence in the system and its capabilities.

Come this September, both, as well as everyone else involved with the school, will know exactly where the school system stands.

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## Resident named skills coordinator

Belleville resident Frank Cancellieri was unanimously appointed basic skills coordinator by the Board of Education for Essex County Vocational Schools at a special board meeting held at the district's headquarters located at 68 So. Harrison St., East Orange, Acting Superintendent James Southers announced recently.

Cancellieri, who has 24 years of teaching experience in both innercity and suburban school settings, in his new post will supervise the district's basic skills program, including testing administration, and provide statistical data to the Essex County Superintendent's Office and the New Jersey State Department of Education.

Cancellieri joined Essex County Vocational Technical Schools in 1969 as a reading teacher, and has also taught at the elementary and junior high school levels. In 1986 he was appointed educational program coordinator of the Essex County Youth House in Newark, supervising the educational and skilled training programs for more than 100 juvenile offenders detained at the facility.

As the program coordinator at the facility, Cancellieri wore many hats and recounted how the youth looked to him for support. "On one occasion a student came to my office and just burst into tears," he said. "When he composed himself he confided that his parents had not come to visit him," said Cancellieri

Cancellieri was graduated from Jersey City State College with a master's degree in secondary reading education and a bachelor's degree in elementary education. Active in many civic organizations, he has served as a summer camp counselor, a varsity track coach and junior varsity baseball coach.

## Crecco favors averaging

Assemblywoman Marion Crecco, R-30th Dist., says she favors the bill now before the legislature that would strike an average rate for garbage disposal around the state.

A co-sponsor of the bill, A-2086, with Assemblyman Harry McEnroe, D - Essex, and Assemblyman John V. Kelly, R-Essex, expressed disappointment that the bill was withdrawn from consideration by Democrats.

"This is a very important, cost saving measure," she said. "Currently, essex County pays approximately \$105 a ton to dump our trash. This rate averaging bill would have saved Essex \$20 a ton, and taxpayers in Bergen, Morris, Union and Somerset Counties would also have benefitted.

It is not the purport of this column to engage in verbalized discourse with Mr. Michael Capanear, however, despite his right to entertain views contrary those expressed in this column, he must be apprized that a columnist is not a reporter and does have much more latitude in giving vent

to views and observations. that, however, would hardly allow the distortion of facts, as Mr. Capanear has written in a published letter over his signature in which he writes "and will continue to do so in the future." That borders on libel which often proves very costly.

Yes, we often report excerpts from the AARP News Bulletin, a

very informative and responsible publication, which disproves the myth in its Special Report you allude to ... "that Social Security currently is taking in more revenue than it's paying out in benefits, the program certainly is NOT contributing to the deficit. In fact, Social Security currently is building a huge long-term reserve

and that the Gramm-Rudman-Hollings budget balancing law passed in 1985, the annual Social Security surplus is counted each year in the calculation of the federal deficit. This inclusion of Social Security annual surpluses masks the real deficit by making it appear smaller than it actually is another deception of the

Reagan years in the White House. We would find it probable that the manner in which Mr. Capanear computes his hypothetical \$18,000 plus Social Security would hardly apply in most Belle ville instances. Let us presume a married couple with a retired husband on a pension of less than \$5,000 a year and a Form SSA-1099 showing the total social security benefits paid to in 1987 of for the wife \$2,964 paid by check and \$214 deducted for Medicare for a total of \$3,178. For the husband \$6,612 paid by check and \$214 deducted for Medicare for a total of \$6,826...a grand total of \$10,006, but after deducting the combined \$428 deducted for Medicare the actual total received in cash being \$10,004.

So that adding the less than \$5,000 pension and the \$10,004 cash received from Social Security we have an income total of about maybe \$14,675. In which case the Social Security benefits would not be taxable.

In extending to reality the probability of most Belleville cases we would find many actual cases of husbands and wives in the similar Social Security class of receiving benefits in amounts similar to those outlined above, but, what would happen had these thoughtful couples in preparing for a "rainy day" put aside savings or investment in taxable accounts which produced as little as \$3,325 more income to put them over the \$18,000 "means test" level making them pay income tax on half of their \$10,004 Social Security benefits while their pension income was also taxable.

With Belleville taxes going up in August about \$500 more a year on average and federal income tax of around \$1,700 and state income tax near \$100 for this year for people in this income level, we may conclude on paying \$1,800 in both taxes and \$3,400 in local taxes on real estate, on average a total of \$5,600 or more...JUST \$400 above what they would allow a single person to exist and not pay taxes on their social security benefits...what about insurance costs, food and clothing, supplemental health insurance, maintenance costs, etc?

And the worst tragedy of all, what happens when the widow who loses her husband and his pension and can't subsist unless she is forced to sell her home or turn it over to a bank who will take over and let her stay with the costs involved deducted from any estate which may exist?

NO! Mr. Capanear, I do not subscribe to the Reagan policies. His Administration has inflicted upon this nation the highest debt and deficit in the world's history and saddled our youth with a burdensome debt they should not have been obliged to pay.

due to a poor fit. Children's sneakers, for the most part, come in only a medium width. For the majority of children with wide feet, this means a compensatory move to large sneakers. The resultant poorer fit may well induce a child to stumble. By contrast, leather shoes provide a more precise fit and greater stability. ## Public or private figure?

The recent trials and tribulations of Commissioner of Public Affairs Joseph Fornarotto has brought to light one of the many glaring differences between a public figure and private figure.

Many people would not even know of, let alone care about, the recent harrassment charge filed against him or the incident last week where he was charged with obstructing justice and burglary and theft. But since he is a member of the Board of Commissioners, it has become a focal point when discussing Belleville, whether in town or in the nearby area. For this reason it is time for Commissioner Joseph Fornarotto to look in the mirror and decide whether he should be a member of the town

There is no questioning Fornarotto's work ethic or his true concern for the town and its people. He is always available to any citizen who needs him and is thinking Belleville every minute he is awake, or so it seems. It is his actions that bring about the question of his competency as public figure. Just as his fiery attitude has helped bring about his success as a commissioner, it is this attitude which may ultimately bring

As a private citizen his actions would not be very newsworthy, and may even be tolerated by most people, but as a public figure he must learn to control his actions. In public life it is not only the end result that matters but how that end result is achieved, so it is up to Fornarotto to decide whether he can control his sudden inclinations so that he may continue his term as commissioner or realize his outbursts are not fitting a town commissioner and resign.

A parallel can be drawn between New York Yankees Manager Billy Martin and Fornarotto. Martin is considered by many to be an expert manager, one that gets the most out of his players and brings his team to new heights but his off-field behavior, most noteably fighting in bars and an overall excitable nature, has led to him losing more than his share of positions. Fornarotto has provided services to the residents of town in a successful manner, as well as honestly attempting to keep the Municipal Budget within reason, but his "off-field" behavior may lead him to losing his position as Commissioner of Public Affairs.

## Committee could use help

The work of the 150th anniversary committee is something that demands recognition. The group will work together to find the appropriate ways of celebrating such a monumental occasion. But the group can not do it on their own, it will take others to help, possibly others who do not even know they can lend a hand.

By contacting the committee and relaying the knowledge to committee members, or joining the committee, individuals can not only help in the anniversary celebration next year but also help to instill town pride in a town in need of some pride.

The unsung heroes finally get some recognition as 11 police officials and a courageous citizen were honored for work well done. While some will attempt to trivialize the feats by saying they were only doing their job, we feel the risk of life all police must deal with while on the job must be commended.

Awards were put in stages, from a "D" award to an "A" award, with an "A" being the most difficult to achieve. No one received an "A" but that says more about the difficulty of the award than the competence and courage of those on the force. It gives one a safe feeling knowing these men are out there, protecting us and our families. Belleville can take pride in having qualified police as these 11, and all the others who serve and protect.

A special feeling most be bestowed on Gregory Prehodka, who offered assistance during an armed robbery. Many others may have turned their backs on the incident but Prehodka risked his life for the capture, and ultimate safety of others. His action is something that it not taught but instintive, an action he should be applauded for.

## Procurement scandal in Lincoln County

WHEN THE F.B.I. last week unveiled details of its two-year investigation into widespread corruption among employes and ex-employes of the Pentagon and private defense contractors, it was another case for the Department of Deja Vu.

Deja vu is a French expression meaning we've seen it before, and the playing of footsie by those who handle procurement for the military with those who sellthe government its supplies and equipment is something that has been almost commonplace since George Washington waged the revolutionary war on an expense account 200 years ago.

There were scandals in the Civil War, World Wars I and II, and intermittently in between, since those who seek an extra advantage feel less guilt when the nation isn't actually at war, though a hard-fought conflict is no barrier to chicanery on the

This latest scandal reveals among other things that specifications were drawn by corrupt bureaucrats that could only be met by their favorite supplier, and after getting one major defense contractor's approach to meeting a given military requirement, they promptly passed the data along to THEIR contractor of choice so he could underbid.

If you saw that memorable bit of videotape last week when Senator John Warner talked about what the congressional and Pentagon culprits were getting in return, without realizing that his mike was open and a camera had he and his confidante sharing their whispers with millions of viewers, you now have the full

LATER THIS SUMMER 20th Century Fox will be releasing a new movie about Billy The Kid, calling it "The Young Guns," and news of its coming sparked the memory that Billy, who was bern Henry McCarty on New York's lower east side, actually acquired his reputation as an outlaw after falling afoul of The Santa Fe Ring, a group of murderous businessmen in New Mexico, who were hand in glove with territorial and federal politicians, with the prize a \$2.5 million contract to supply beef to the army, and hundreds of thousands of other dollars

for supplying a variety of items to U.S. protected Indian tribes.

In the 1870's and 80's, those were big stakes, indeed, and in assuring themselves of an appropriate supply of livestock and a minimum of competition, "The Company," which was what the territorials called the far-reaching organization run by Jimmy Dolan and Jimmy Riley, gathered within its bounds every hood and gunman it could hire, and formed an unholy alliance with an outlaw band headed by Jesse Evans.

If trumped up legal documents were needed to take over some unwilling rancher's land and herd, the territorial governor and just about every other officeholder, could be counted upon to make it happen.

So they rightly smelled trouble when John Henry Tunstall, a young and handsome Englishman, scion of a wealthy family that still lives in the same baronial mansion today as it did in the 1870's, rode in to Lincoln County.

He fell in love with the beautiful mountain valley with its clean air, crystal streams and fertile soil that literally grows anything. He bought 4,000 acres and started ranching on quite a grand scale. THE 18-YEAR-OLD Billy, who had already dropped both the McCarty and Antrim names of his father and stepfather, struck up an immediate friendship with Tunstall, because he was surprisingly well educated for the time, very well read and with a vocabularly that would be impressive in a teenager even today.

Tunstall hired him but their relationship was more than rancher and ranch hand, especially since the Englishman was only five years Billy's senior.

Anyway, to cut a long story short, when "The Company's" outlaws gunned down Tunstall, Billy swore revenge, and before long the Lincoln County war was in full

Tunstall's lawyer sent a cable to the Englishman's father, who promptly visited with Lord Salisbury, Queen Victoria's foreign minister, who got off a chilly demand to U.S. Secretary of State William M. Evarts, that something be done to apprehend the killers and safeguard the Tunstall property.

New Mexico fell under the domain of

Interior Secretary Carl Schurz, who met with Evarts and President Rutherford B. Hayes, and between them they formulated a plan to send a special U.S. attorney to Lincoln County to conduct a sweeping investigation.

Their choice was Frank Warner Angel of Jersey City, and he collected more than 300,000 words of depositions from those involved in the war, including a lengthy statement from Billy, and while it took some time, to run the gang to ground, eventually ordserc was restored, though not before Billy had been slain at the age of 21 by former bartender pat garrett.

It's a colorful chapter of American history with a central figure that everyone has heard of, and whose story has been more clouded with myth and falsehood than perhaps any other man of such

We put it in the Department of Deja Vu because it might never have happened but for a military procurement scandal. Today's scandal was our excuse for recapping these facts, many of which I personally dug out of the Public Record Office in London.



#### The best friend you will ever have

How many real, true friends do you have? Not nearly as many as you think. You have a lot of acquaintances and different levels of friendship with different ones who you call true friends. But abiding friendships - we do not have many of those in life because it takes time to develop that kind of relationship.

To whom are you a real, true friend? Do you know what the real qualities of true friendship really are? All of us need deep, abiding friendships.

One day a fellow (much older than I) said, "I have a friend with whom I have been acquainted, and I have fellowshipped with him every week - sometimes several times a week - for thirty-five years." Suddenly I had this sinking feeling. I thought, thirty-five years with the same friend! I have missed something in life.

As I began to read and study about friendship, I began to realize that we men are not nearly as friendly as we think we are. In a survey leading psychologists and therapists were asked, "How many men in America really have a true friend?" The majority of them said, "About ten percent or less."

As I thought about friendships, it dawned on me that I have had one friend for forty years. The Bible says He "sticks closer than a brother" (Proverbs 18:24), and His name is Jesus Christ.

"Is Jesus Christ really my Friend?" I thought. I know He is my Savior, my Lord, my Master, my God. But most of my life I had never thought about Jesus Christ as being a Friend. In John 15:12-17 we have it from Jesus Himself: "This is My commandment, that you love one another, just as I have loved you. Greater love has no one than this, that one lay down his life for his friends. You are My friends, if you do what I command you. No longer do I call you slaves, for the slave does not know what his master is doing; but I have called you friends, for all things that I have heard from My Father I have made known to you. You did not choose Me, but I chose you, and appointed you, that you should go and bear fruit, and that your fruit should remain, that whatever you ask of the Father in My name, He may give to you. 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

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

#### Russo testifies on handguns

testified at a packed public hearing last week that prohibiting guns in homes will reduct the pool of weapons that criminals steal and use to commit crimes.

"Anyone with a criminal record cannot legally purchase a gun in New Jersey," said Russo. "Criminals get guns by stealing them from law-abiding citizens who cannot watch their weapons 24-hours a

The Seant President was the first of more than two dozen witnesses that testified at the Senate Law, Public Safety & Defense Committee's first public hearing on the Russo gun control legislation.

Additional public hearings on S.2282 will be held this summer in Camden and Hackensack before the committee will vote on the bill.

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according to Senator Frank X. Graves, Jr., the committee chairm-

Russo said guns kept in homes are used more often to accidentally or intentionally hurt innocent people than to stop intruders.

"FBI statistics show that it is 115 times more likely that guns kept for 'self-protection' will end up used in murders, suicides and accidental shootings that in self-defense against a criminal," he said.

Under the Russo legislation, private citizens would no longer be able to purchase handguns to keep in their homes.

People who already have legal handguns could keep them for the rest of their lives, but heirs would be required to turn the weapons over to authorities in exhange for financial compensation, Russo said.

"There are now an estimated one million legally owned hand-guns in this state," he said. "Over the span of a generation, this law will remove most of these weapons from circulation."

Russo emphasized at no time in the future would the legislation affect the sale or ownership of shotguns and rifles used by hunters, antique firearms kept by collectors or target shooting pistols that are locked and left at practice ranges.

Police officers and military personnel would also continue to be able to buy and own weapons under the terms of the legislation.

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
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
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

Summer is the time when New Jersey residents begin to enjoy the sun and surf. The Humane Society of the United States asks you to remember . . . SOME DON'T LIKE IT HOT ... your dogs and cats.

Pet owners can protect their animals by taking a few basic

precautions

• NEVER leave a pet in a parked car during the summer, even with the windows partically open. The inside of the car can reach temperatures in excess of 120 degrees in just minutes, and pets can suffer heatstroke, brain damage and

 ALWAYS be sure that dogs have constant access to shade and shelter when out of the house. Cats should be kept inside year-round. All pets should have clean water available at all time

• NEVER subject a dog to rigorous exercise during the hottest times of the day. Restrict walks or runs to early morning or evening

If your pet does become overheated, it is vital to act immediately. Signs of trouble are excessive panting, labored breathing, rapid pulse, glazed eyes, tremors, vomitting or a deep red or purple tongue. If your pet is unconscious, you have very little time to lose.

The first thing to do is to try to lower the animal's body temperature by getting him into a cool, shady place and applying cool water, especially around the head and tail areas. Don't allow the animal to drink too much water, no more than a cup every thirty minutes. You can also give him ice cubes to lick. Then get him to your veterinarian as soon as possible

As a Legislator who has served in the New Jersey General Assembly since 1982, as a Freeholder since 1979, as well as an activist for more than half a century, needless to say, I was shocked at the headlined article which appeared in the Atlantic City Press, as well as many other state papers, "Alcoholics Ineligible for VA Aid — Excess Drinking is

In this day and age wherein we have MADD (Mothers Against Drunk Driving), SADD (Students Against Drunk Driving), along with the thousands of alcoholic rehabilita-tion programs following the medical decision that alcoholism is a disease, I cannot understand why the Veterans Administration in Washington, D.C. has not filed a protest against the Supreme Court decision, as well as demanding the repeal of the Federal Rehabilitation Act of 1973, which does not force the VA to treat alcoholism as a disease

Why then would almost every state government appropriate allocations in their budget for alcohol rehab clinics, counseling and all that goes to cure alcoholics and curb

Just as Governor Thomas H. Kean signed legislation creating a Council on Compulsive Gambling, so the Federal government should recognize that alcoholism is a far more

serious disease than "compulsive gambling."

I am now in my third year serving as Vice Chair of the Veterans and Defense Committee for the General Assembly No one knows better than my committee that military service, particularly the Vietnam War, has caused much of the alcohol and drug addiction our Veterans now suffer from, and whose rehabilitation we taxpayers and legilators are supporting heavily

I have learned that Veterans Homes already have AA groups, counseling services and programs for families faced with the alcoholic Veterans because of the many emotional and physical issues involved.

Justice Harry A. Blackman said the VA should examine benefit claims by veterans on an individual basis rather than conclucing automatically that the condition is a product of willful misconduct. The final decision should remain with a physician, not a bureaucrat.

I urge veterans and their families to send a letter to General Thomas K. Turnage, Administrator of Veterans Affairs, 810 Vermont Ave., N.W., Washington, DC 20420, urging him to initiate an appeal against this unreasonable, re

cent Supreme Court decision.

General Turnage, above all, should be responding to the human beings who served this country, not the bureauracts who sit on the Supreme Court bench, far removed from the realities of canes, crutches, drugs and depression.

I am writing you in the hopes of reaching people with multiple sclerosis. I have been a patient at the Gimbel Multiple Sclerosis Center at Holy Name Hospital in Teaneck, and I want other people with MS to know about this outstanding facility. My MS was diagnosed five years ago, and I have been hospitalized many times with complications from my MS. Medical care was always adequate, but no one really understood the frustrations and special concerns of people with MS. One of my concerns, for example, was how I could continue to feel challenged and worthwhile, knowing that I must give up many activities that had characterized a very active lifestyle

During 1988 I became a patient at the Bernard W. Gimbel MS Comprehensive Care Center, and my life has changed. I still have MS. And not long ago, I was hospitalized again. But this time my health was monitored by neurologists at the center who specialize in caring for people with MS. The center referred me to the National Multiple Sclerosis Society of Bergen and Passaic Counties, which arranged a home health aide to help me when I went home from the hospital. This helped me enormously in regaining my health and strength.

The center staff urged me to become involved in volunteer work at the MS Chapter. I did this and now have a new circle of friends whose projects help keep my organizational and comput-

er skills from getting rusty.



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
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



#### Ethics code proposed

State Senator Paul Contillo (D-Bergen) the author of the recently enacted toughened ethics code for legislators and state officials is now proposing and sponsoring a new ethics code setting strict guidelines on employment, business interests and activities of local, county and independent agency officials and their families which outlines penalties for violations, with fines of up to \$500, suspension from office up to a year, removal for "willful and continuous violations" and potential criminal prosecution

This ethics bill (S-2579) deals with the municipality and if enacted, a Local Government Ethics Commission would be formed to develop a code for the elected and appointed officials and employees of the state's 567 municipalities and 21 counties as well as the countiess agencies, authorities and boards that function on a local level, exclusive of employees of school districts.

"Real Estate Forum"

Q: We are in the process of selling our home. It was suggested we do some cosmetic improvements such as painting inside and out, landscaping, and repairing of the gutters. Are those economically sensible and are they tax deducti-

A: Exterior painting and landscaping have become major factors in what we in the business call "curb appeal," or in layman's terms, first impressions. Studies show that this type of cosmetic maintenance will return up to 71% of the cost on resale but most importantly, will appeal visually to many more buyers and eventually bring you a better sale price. However, these improvements are not tax deductible. Home improvements that are deductible include such permanent items as adding insulation, adding a deck or greenhouse, central air, etc. Ordinary repairs and maintenance are not deductible. Save all your receipts and check with your accountant next tax season.

Q: We just sold our house and should be closing in June. We are moving out of state and the \$100,000 profit we made from the sale is just enough to purchase our new home. If we refinance this home at a later date, will the interest deduction still be deductible?

A: This may be a problem. For 1988 still yet another revision has been made to the Tax Reform Act. Your new first mortgage may not qualify as "acquisition indebtedness" because it was not incurred at the time of acquisition. It was incurred later. It may qualify as home equity indebtedness and not treated in the same manner as a first mortgage. The National Association of Realtors is pressing the IRS to preserve the mortgatge deductibility in all-cash transactions as they have been. Please check with your accountant. This




