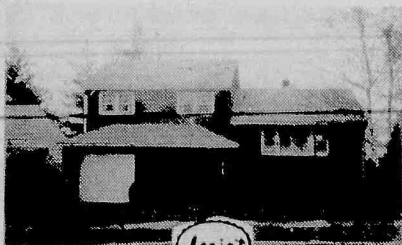

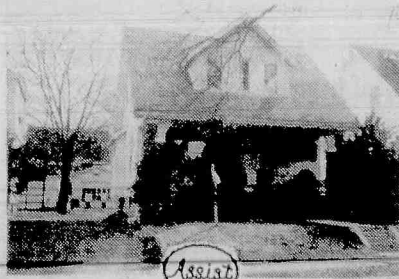

Will government change?

The throngs of individuals in Belleville who are calling for a change in the governmental structure is getting stronger and stronger, gathering momentum with each passing town meeting that contains arguments, creating an atmosphere where nothing is getting done.

In 1914 the commission form of government was established in town and as a study on the commission, done in the early 1950s, stated it was "uncoordinated, wasteful and extravagant." Many people today would say the same about today's form of the commission. The charter study recommended changing the form to a council, either with a weak mayor or a strong mayor.

A council was established and it proved to be successful for a period of time but the commission form returned. Since that time, certain individuals have used Belleville as a political battleground and the Board of Commissioners have had difficulty agreeing on a number of items. This is not to say commissioners should always agree and never question another commissioner but it is becoming obvious, the commission form has not been extremely successful and there appears to be a growing problem with it.

First and foremost in a commission form of government, the commissioner must trust one another. As each is a single head of a department, it is paramount each commissioner has faith in another to run that department. That does not appear to be the case in Belleville. A council form could have a full-time town administrator, appointed by the council, to oversee town departments; an administrator who specializes in running a town.

A board of commissioners has a basic election with the five top vote-getters going in office, with elections held every four years. A council would have representatives from wards, sections of town divided by population. This assure each area of town a voice in government. This system also provides for experienced members to always serve the board, since at-large council member elections and ward council member elections would not be run during the same year.

This November, if the voice of the change of government group contains at least 4,000 mouths, the decision on the type of government will be decided. Some feel the fate of the town depends on this. However, the fate of the town does not so much depend on the form of government, it depends on the people of the town, and ultimately, the elected officials. Changing the form of government will not make the questions and problems of Belleville go away. All it will do is re-phrase them. Hopefully, whatever form of government is established, the people in charge of that government will work together, not apart. Whether they are commissioners or councilmen.

Historic pieces helpful

The 150th anniversary committee met last week at the Belleville Public Library to discuss possible activities to celebrate the town's prestigious year. But there is also an underlying reason why these meetings are held, and why more than the 30-35 people who attended should be at the next meeting, September 7.

Throughout the course of the meeting people were discussing historic happenings that Belleville should be proud of. Most of the talk centered around the cherry blossoms, but everyone knows Belleville's claim to fame is this flower. An interesting event, one that not many people in the room knew of, was the first steam engine in the United States came into the country through Belleville. And the first steam engine built in the country was constructed right here in these 3.1 square miles of town.

Later more historic Belleville trivia was discussed, such as the mines that made up the town many years ago. The fact is, many other tidbits of information have to be around town only the people who know these pieces of history have not attended the meetings. By attending the next meeting, and enlightening everyone with something about the town, another piece to the historic puzzle will be put in place. By 1989, everyone in Belleville, and many people outside of Belleville, will know everything there is to know about the town.

If 150-200 people can show up for a town commission meeting to voice their displeasure with the town, more than 35 people can show up for a meeting to voice their pride in the town.

Center needs blood

Later this month, August 20 to be exact, a blood drive will be held at the Pathmark on Washington Avenue in an effort to pump some life into the blood supply of the North Jersey Blood Center.

The Center, which services 44 hospitals, is low on inventory and that means trouble for hospitals, which in turn means trouble for patients. Summer is always a low period but this year seems to be particularly poor, as last month a drive was held which was a disaster in terms of the amount of blood given. Without people giving blood, many others will suffer and possibly die because something they need is not available. People can afford to give some blood without it having a detrimental effect on them but people who are being prepared for operations can ill afford not to have blood at their side during their time of need.

It is imperative that people who can give blood, do so. By taking a few minutes out of your day, and a small amount of blood, you can give someone many more days. This August 20 we urge everyone to go down and give a little something of themselves.

THINGS YOU NEVER KNEW:

The Titanic had a twin sister

A COUPLE OF weeks ago a charming octogenarian from Belleville, one **Dominick Bonfante** by name, appeared on Channel 36's six o'clock news displaying a nicely detailed model of the Titanic that he had constructed.

In the annals of maritime legend, this ship is surely the best known ever, because on its maiden voyage from Southampton to New York, it struck an iceberg and sunk in the early hours of April 15, 1912, with the loss of 1,503 lives.

As Mr. Bonfante's model showed, the White Star liner was a majestic, 4-stacked vessel, and because the image so many have of it from movies and television is a distant shot by night as it slowly sank, he rigged it so all its portholes and other parts of the ship could be lit from inside, and the Channel 36 technicians showed a shot of the model in semi darkness.

It was a sight to remember on "A Night to Remember," as **Walter Lord's** best selling book and the subsequently excellently made movie versions were titled.

But, most people know only half the story. It surprises most to learn that there were, in fact, two identical ships made from the same set of plans prepared by designer **Thomas Andrews Jr.** Indeed, the Titanic and its sister ship, The Olympic, were project numbers 400 and 401 at Harland and Wolff shipyards in Belfast, being built side by side, with any number of photos and substantial motion picture footage existing to show them slowly taking shape.

THE OLYMPIC was a foot shorter than the Titanic at 882 feet, but each was 92.5-foot wide and each was powered with identical 51,000 horsepower low pressure turbine engines. Because of that slight dimensional difference and a few more luxurious fixtures, the Titanic weighed in at 46,329 tons compared to the Olympic's 45,324.

The Olympic was launched October 20, 1910, fully outfitted by May 31 the next year, and made its maiden voyage to New York on June 14 without incident. However, the nature of the steering and control

systems on both ships was new and radical, and obviously took a bit of getting used to, as the report on the Titanic disaster was to show later.

On September 20, 1911, the Olympic collided with a British cruiser, The Hawke, and each was badly damaged. The luxury liner returned to Belfast for extensive rebuilding, and was actually there when the Titanic sank. In light of the lessons learned from the tragedy, several safety measures were incorporated, the bulkheads redesigned and many more life boats added.

The Olympic went back into service, became a troop transport during World War I, and narrowly averted sinking by U-boat torpedoes in May, 1918. The attacking submarine, U-103, actually struck the Olympic and sank, with only one crew member rescued.

But the Olympic lived on, going back to Belfast for refitting in 1919, and resuming transAtlantic voyages from Southampton to New York on July 21, 1920, plying back and forth successfully until 1934. That year White Star merged with Cunard and coincidentally, the giant vessel rammed the Nantucket Light Ship in a dense fog May 16, destroying the smaller craft and causing the deaths of its seven crewmen.

A year later, the Olympic went the way of all great liners when their useful life spans have been lived. It went to Southampton in April, was sold to Metal Industries Ltd., a salvage company, and

later that year, taken to Jarrow and broken up.

Presumably a similar fate would have befell the Titanic had it not struck that huge iceberg and assured itself THE place in maritime history.

Andrews was on the Titanic the night it sank, making copious notes as it became apparent his creation would be lost. Like Captain Edward Smith, he went down with the ship, but his findings did go back to Harland and Wolff to answer several questions about the disaster.

As we all know, divers have located the wreck of the giant ship in the deep ocean, and we have all seen television pictures of its eerie remains, with a few artifacts already now back safely in France.

WHEN THE TITANIC sailed on that memorable voyage, there were 2,206 people aboard but, in keeping with the practice of the day, and well within governmental regulations, there were only 20 lifeboats with capacity for 1,178. Even at that, only 703 were rescued, because when the earliest boats left, they had plenty of room because most passengers were convinced the gigantic floating hotel would never sink.

For curious reasons, none founded on any valid details of dereliction, Captain Smith's name was held in disrepute for many years. Only three years ago did the folks in his home town, Stoke-on-Trent, cause a memorial to be erected to him.

The designer, on the other hand, was honored with the construction of the Andrews Memorial Hall in his home town, Comber, County Down, and later a primary school was named for him.

His family continued to play an active role in public affairs, with **John M. Andrews** becoming the second prime minister of Northern Ireland from 1940-1943, and another **John Andrews** the deputy prime minister under **Terence O'Neill** in the early 1970's.

And we dug up all of this memorabilia for you just because 83-year-old Dominick Bonfante crafted such an elegant model of the one time queen of the sea.

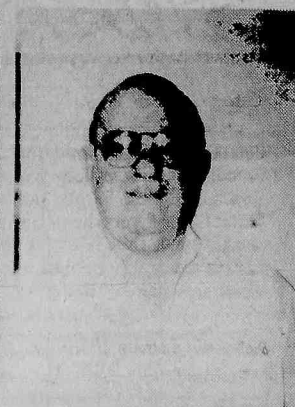

Executive Amato applauds BPU

Essex County Executive Nicholas R. Amato has applauded the state Board of Public Utilities decision requiring transfer station operators to supply information about trash disposal costs.

The BPU ordered the transfer stations to supply information about the rates now being charged by the operators. Transfer operators are compensated for all services provided after the delivery of waste at the transfer stations, including the handling of materials at the transfer stations, transportation of the waste to out-of-state landfills and the tipping fee at the landfill site.

The rate also includes a mandatory state recycling tax of \$1.50 per ton and a county administrative charge of \$2.85 per ton.

Essex County negotiated contracts with Waste Management Inc. and Solid Waste Transfer and Recycling to operate the two transfer stations at 100 Avenue A and 442 Frelinghuysen Ave. in Newark. The county holds the franchise for the enterprises.

Amato said the county cooperated fully in the BPU proceedings.

"While the county does not have access to internal financial records of Waste Management and Solid Waste Transfer and Recycling Co., and cannot supply them, the county has supplied all relevant information in its possession," Amato said.

The information supplied by the county includes the tonnage in and out of each station and the amounts paid to the operators for their services.

During negotiations last year, Amato said it was "quite apparent that neither vendor (operator) wished to become a public utility" subject to rate regulation by the BPU.

Amato said that when he took office in January 1987 he was faced with an Aug. 1 deadline to stop dumping at the Meadowlands landfills. He said it was vital to have the stations operating by Aug. 1, and therefore the questions of BPU regulation was left unresolved.

"No vendor would have undertaken the task of meeting and solving the county's solid waste crisis while at the same time agreeing to rate regulation by the BPU," Amato said. "It became necessary in solving the crisis to leave this issue to the BPU. That is why Essex County applied for and obtained a solid waste franchise from the BPU and contracted with the vendors for the performance of the service mandated by the franchise."

Amato said the county's main concern was securing the lowest possible rate through negotiations. After signing the vendor contracts, the county executive said it would have been a breach of the good faith shown by all parties during the negotiations, to urge a BPU rate

hearing.

The Essex rates, Amato said, are the most favorable rates of any New Jersey county which has been forced to utilize transfer stations and out-of-state waste disposal.

In Passaic County the rate is \$65, but Amato cites the testimony of Assemblyman William J. Pascrell, Jr. (D-Passaic), who told the Assembly Solid Waste Management Committee the fee is "built on deception."

In his testimony, Pascrell stated, "At \$65 a ton, Passaic County's tipping fee appears low in relation to those in Bergen, Essex and Union counties. In reality, Passaic's 'low' fee is built on deception."

Pascrell explained that Passaic County's Municipal Authority borrowed \$58 million by issuing long-term bonds in effect guaranteed by Passaic County taxpayers.

The debt, Pascrell said, was issued to finance landfill space in Pennsylvania. He said the debt extends 15 years even though most of the space will be used in the first 4 to 5 years.

"None or very little of the debt is being paid in the first several years; this year even interest on the debt is being deferred," Pascrell testified. "In other words, the true cost of landfilling is not reflected in our \$65 tipping fee because Passaic will

pay disproportionately more in the future due to deferred costs. Our costs aren't any lower, they are merely deferred."

Amato said the BPU has now put the issue to rest.

"Essex County never has, and never will oppose this determination," Amato said. "In our judgement, this BPU decision means that the BPU will now determine a fair and reasonable rate to be charged by Waste Management and Solid Waste Transfer and Recycling."

"That could mean a raising or lowering of rates, or that the rates will remain the same. We also believe it means that the vendors will have to abide by BPU imposed rates and cannot cease operation without BPU approval."

Amato emphasized that the subsection of Waste Management and Solid Waste Transfer and Recycling to rate regulation by the BPU was a novel legal issue in 1987.

"There was simply no time to resolve this issue by lengthy administrative and judicial proceedings," Amato said. "If waste disposal through the transfer stations had not taken place, the health hazard of retained waste and the illegal disposal of waste would have virtually turned the county into a wasteland."

Essex County was under a court

order to cease disposing of its garbage in the HMDC landfill as of July 31, 1987 — a date agreed to by the prior administration. Amato said the present high costs are a direct result of the prior administration's failure of coordination and planning, which resulted in the solid waste crisis.

Amato also said that the transfer station operation for the 80-percent of the county's waste that can be combusted will not survive the completion of the Resource Recovery Plant. The facility, which is currently under construction, is expected to be completed in early 1990.

"We have acted responsibly in the matter of resolving the waste crisis," Amato said. "We are absolutely assured that waste will be removed and landfilled until the Resource Recovery facility is in operation, and thereafter we are assured of a means for out-of-state disposal of ash and non-combustible wastes."

Even if Pennsylvania prohibits landfilling of New Jersey waste within its borders, Amato said the county is assured that other sites will be available for this purpose.

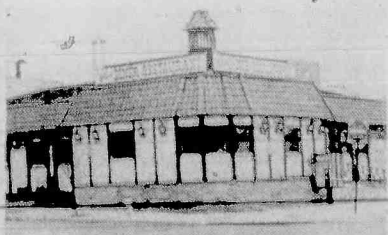

Foot Facts

LASTING IMPRESSIONS

A preliminary podiatric exam can be as easy as a day at the beach. That is, a bare-footed beachcomber can cast an amateur eye at her footprints in the sand. They may offer a clue as to whether a follow-up professional podiatric exam is advisable. If a footprint gives the impression that the arch is all but nonexistent, the feet may be overly pronated, meaning the ankles and arches are falling inward. If, however, the impression leaves only a thin border connecting the ball of the foot with the heel, the feet may be overly supinated. This means that the soles of the feet tend to face each other. Either way, feet could benefit from an exam. Corrective orthotics may well relieve the stress that supination and pronation place on higher-placed joints of the body.

Don't be overly concerned if a child's footprint appears flat. Children often have a fat pad in their instep, which will disappear as they get older. When ever you have questions or concerns about your own or your child's feet, ask your podiatrist. Take the first step toward better foot health by calling DR. PAUL A. CAPUTO at 759-6560. DENTALLY SPEAKING

Mrs. D. of Clifton asks: "My 7-year-old daughter's teeth are very crowded. Will her permanent teeth be crowded also?"

There's a very good chance, Mrs. D. that her permanent teeth will be crowded, due to lack of space. At about 7, there usually is a growth spurt which could alleviate moderate crowding. But if, as you say the teeth are very crowded, we feel she may need some help now.

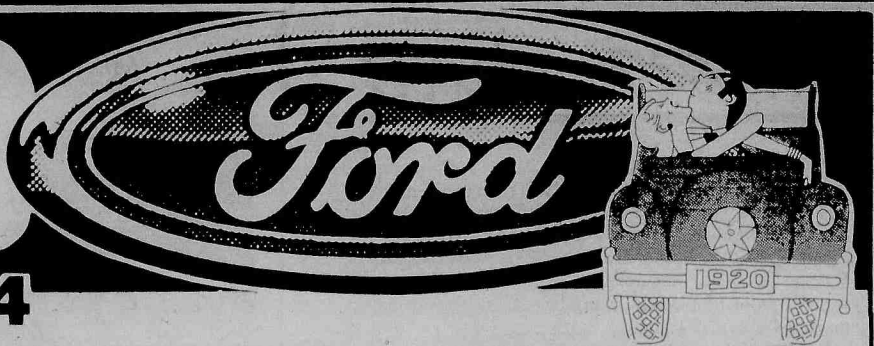
There are measurements that the orthodontist and/or dentist uses to disclose the amount of jaw space needed. If there is not enough, then either a removable or fixed appliance can be constructed to measure the jaw space and alleviate the crowding. We feel it's best to get a diagnosis now, so if treatment is needed it may begin and possibly prevent the removal of permanent teeth later.

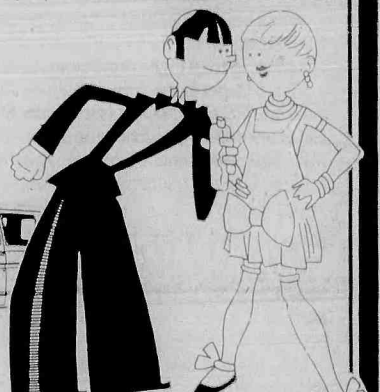
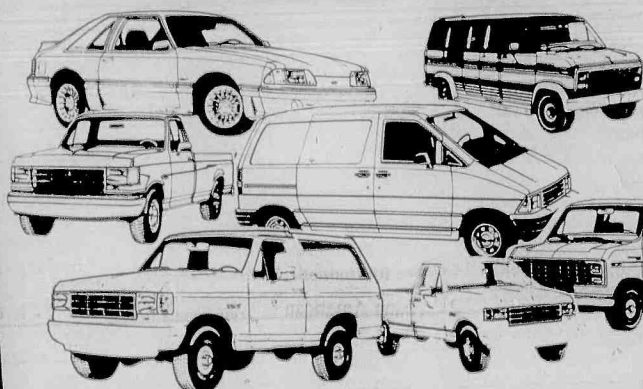

Graham races to county title, becomes first Belleville girl to achieve honor

This weeks Flashback takes us to the Spring of 1981. The Belleville girls' track team has just competed in the Essex County championships, and the results are quite impressive. Most notably, Cecelia Graham was victorious in the high jump, marking the first time a Belleville female athlete won a county title.

Her 19 year old brother, Michael, himself a Belleville track star in the late 70's, had been tragically killed in a car accident. His passing affected the entire track program at Belleville because he was such a tremendous athlete and class person.

Q. My house was listed with a real estate broker. The listing had expired and I decided to try and sell it on my own. One month later a couple came by and made us an offer. We settled on a price and went into contract. Two weeks went by and I received a letter from the broker that we had the house listed with stating that my buyers attended an open house he ran and he could prove that they signed in. He claims he is due a commission since he was the "effectuating cause." Is he correct?

A. Well, maybe. But not always, even if the property was originally introduced to the buyer by the listing broker. If no contract was entered into and after the listing expired the people see a For Sale by Owner advertisement, then go back and buy the house, the broker may be unable to collect a commission on that sale. New Jersey courts have upheld that position.

There are circumstances under which an effective action for payment of a commission would be successful. Such situations would involve some form of conspiracy, collusion or fraud whereby the purchaser and seller worked together to defraud the broker by effecting a sale after the listing expired. Consult your attorney with the details of this transaction and have him contact the broker.

Q. I have recently purchased a summer home for my personal use; I don't intend to rent it out. Can I apply for a Homestead Tax Rebate?

A. As part of the Property Tax Relief Program, New Jersey allows homeowners in the state to apply for a rebate of taxes on their "principal place of residence." You must own and occupy the property you are claiming as your principal residence. A rebate cannot be claimed on a summer or second home.

"Strie" is a dramatic finish for a painted wall. Apply contrasting glaze over a light-painted wall, then drag a notched squeegee down the wall, removing part of the glaze. Use a yardstick to hold the squeegee steady.

Yes, you can put new wallpaper over old, if it's smooth and tightly adhered, but grease spots may bleed through. Cover spots with stain-killing paint or shellac and let dry before papering. If grease is widespread, it's wiser to strip off the old paper.
