## Fire truck inspection set could be here by May

An inspection committee which includes Fire Chief George Sbarra has scheduled next Wednesday to visit the Ward '79 manufacturing plant in Elmira Heights, NY, to review the assembly progress of the fire truck the township ordered in 1988.

The wheels turn slowly when it comes to ordering and building a custom fire truck. The fire department initiated the request in its 1988 budget submitted early that year. In December, the commis-

sioners finalized the bonding resolution for \$180,000 to purchase the \$189,500 vehicle. The town at that time coughed up a \$9,500 down payment on the bond.

The bid for a 1500 GPM Triple Comb. Class A Custom Pumping Apparatus was awarded to the Cambria company in Secaucus. The company has a fire and safety division that sells fire apparatus, and put the bid together, according to company representative Fred Schmidt.

Schmidt said that the truck is "in production" and should be ready for delivery in the next 1-1/2 months. Schmidt said the inspection committee from the township has already inspected the vehicle's chassis at the Elmira plant. Next week's scheduled visit is to inspect the vehicle's body before the finishing touches are put on.

The next step, after a positive inspection next week, would be fitting the vehicle for piping, cosmetic touches, and preparation for final assembly, Schmidt said.

Fire truck orders usually take a minimum of 1-1/2 years to complete, Schmidt said. The long lead time is standard in the industry, he said, with some trucks taking as little as ten months to complete. It all depends on how busy the manufacturer is.

The vehicle, although promised within 200 days of the order, has run into "production problems with the manufacturer," Schmidt said. The manufacturer has been "really busy."

Although Cambria is known for its Mack trucks, the fire apparatus does not include Mack parts. The Cambria company subcontracted out the pieces of the fire truck to meet the bid specifications.

The township does not pay the vendor any money until the vehicle has been received and accepted. Sbarra said it would take at least three full days to inspect the truck when it is delivered later this year.

A few years ago, Belleville had to borrow a fire engine from Nutley, according to Deputy Chief Leo Kileen. He added, "The equipment has not been replaced in a timely manner, that's one of the big problems we have."

A preliminary peek at the fire department's proposed budget showed a recommended purchase of two new ambulances and one new engine. The two ambulances the department has now were both purchased in 1985 and each has more than \$50,000 hard miles on it. The fire engine to be replaced in a 1965 Seagraves Engine.

# Complex plods along

The township commissioners are expected to introduce a resolution at their regular meeting March 13 awarding a \$36,500 contract to J.G. Schmidt Steel for Phase A shop drawings of the new public safety building.

J.G. Schmidt Steel, 211 Central Ave., Passaic, submitted the lowest of three bids by the closing date Feb. 8. Schmidt's total bid of \$531,860 was the lowest total of all three bids.

Schmidt's Phase B lump-sum fixed price contract sum for all other post-shop drawings of structural and miscellaneous metal work came in at \$495,360.

The company will have 60 days from the commissioners notification of approval to complete the shop drawings, according to Virginia Siminaro of James Goldstein & Partners, Milburn, the building's architect.

Siminaro also said the township has the option to require that the bids for the rest of the project come in before the shop drawings are completed. The township would have to advertise and receive bids for the general construction by April 1, she said.

General construction would include plumbing, electrical and other work not handled by the steel firm.

Schmidt's bid was within 5 1/2% of the architect's estimate for the shop drawings, Siminaro said.

The township could have rejected all the bids and instructed the architect to go back to the drawing board to again scale down the project.

Two other companies submitted two-part bids for the Public Safety Building shop drawings and steel.

Cherry Steel Corp. of Longhorne, Pa. bid at a total of \$568,500. Mastercraft Iron Inc. of Neptune, N.J. bid at a total of \$639,000.

### A recap of the project

The Public Safety building, which will be located behind the present Town Hall on Washington Ave., according to blue prints last revised Oct. 6, 1989, will have three floors of 8,000 sq. ft. each. The basement level, also 8,000 sq. ft., will contain parking for police vehicles, elevator access, a prisoner drop off and various unheated storage rooms.

The second level or first floor will consist primarily of records and control rooms. This level is equal to the present location of the police department.

Additionally, it is scheduled to house the chief, deputy chief, crime lab, dark room facilities, booking, six regular cells and a holding cell.

The Public Safety building will attach to the present Town Hall building through a connecting link, including a vestibule and an elevator.

The connecting link will attach the Public Safety building to the Town Hall at each level. A separate elevator will be used for prisoner transport. The link is estimated to cost about \$165,000.

The second floor, on a comparable level to the present Town Hall main floor level, will house the courtroom, and the township Law Department offices. This

level will have the violations of office, probation office, squad room and interview rooms.

The third floor will serve for file storage and house police locker rooms, a training, exercise and briefing room, and the shift commander's office. Certain police files are presently stored in a storage trailer parked behind the Town Hall.

A proposed \$10 million bond for a comprehensive Town Hall project which would have brought other township facilities into the same building was cut back to \$5 million.

The Board of Commissioners at the time intended to combine several scattered township offices in one building. They also expected to sell or lease the building currently used by the township to provide ratables.

When the bond was cut back, a separate, unattached police station was proposed for township property on Valley St. behind the Town Hall.

That alternate plan was scrapped in favor of the present proposed Public Safety Building. When the new Public Safety Building is attached to the old Town Hall building, the older building will have to be brought up to present construction codes.

The renovation could cost about \$200,000, but will depend heavily on what the renovating contractors find when they try to break through the walls.

Architect and engineer fees for plans of the various proposed

Who is responsible for these and many other charitable and civic acts that have made everything he's touched and everywhere he's been a little better for it?

"I am!" with a sly grin, said Louis Cicienia, owner of Charles Jewelers located at 163 Washington Ave., Belleville.

Cicienia, who purchased Charles Jewelers from Aaron Cohen 12 years ago, followed the advice of the retiring gemologist, who told him, "Lou, you sprinkle a little kindness and it comes back to you."

Sprinkling kindness has become the Cicienia's way of life. Lou, who has turned Charles Jewelers into a family affair, runs the business with the help of his wife Barbara and their three daughters, Lisa, Annette and Maria.

The Cicienia family live in Nutley and maintain their business in Belleville. Wherever the elder Cicienia goes he gives a piece of himself. Lou, a sincere and modest man does not like to speak of his endeavors on behalf of those less fortunate than him.

"The Lord has been very good to me and I believe in giving some of it back," said Cicienia.

And give it back Lou does!

Since opening his business in Belleville Lou's name has almost

## U.S. Judge to address Orechio Civic Group

Samuel Alito Jr., the U.S. Attorney for the District of New Jersey, will address the Carmen A. Orechio Civic Association at 8 p.m. Tuesday, Feb. 27 at the American Legion Hall on Franklin Avenue in Nutley.

Alito was born and raised in the Trenton area. He graduated from Princeton where he earned a Phi Beta Kappa key in 1972 and was chosen as a scholar in the Woodrow Wilson School of Public International Affairs. In 1975 he graduated from Yale Law School after serving as editor of the Yale Law Journal.

After clerking for Judge Leonard I. Garth of the US Court of Appeals for the 3rd Circuit, he served as Assistant US Attorney for New Jersey from 1977 to 1981. From 1981 to 1985, he was an Assistant to the Solicitor General of the United States, and in that capacity was responsible for the briefing and arguing of many cases in the US Supreme Court. From January 1986 until his appointment as US Attorney, he served as Deputy Assistant Attorney General in the Justice Department's office of Legal Counsel.

The 3rd Circuit has jurisdiction over federal cases originating in the district courts of Pennsylvania, Delaware, the Virgin Islands and New Jersey. It convenes in Philadelphia, and is a 12 member tribunal. It is considered one of the most prestigious appeals courts in the nation.

Alito, who lives in West Caldwell, is married to the former Martha-Ann Borgardner, and has two children.

The 39 year old Alito, appointed U.S. Attorney in March 1987, has recently been nominated by President George Bush to fill a vacancy on the U.S. 3rd Circuit Court of Appeals, one of the 12 appellate courts in the nation. The nomination will be sent to the Senate for confirmation.

some of the deliveries, the list has grown to as many as 30 during a season.

As Lou's reputation for helping those in need has grown so has his business. He believes that Belleville has been good to him and in return he has put his faith and at one time almost his life savings back into Belleville.

Having come from an area in Newark that was almost completely declared a blighted area, Cienicia takes pride in his present business location.

"When I first purchased this business from Aaron the original store was only half the size it is now. I busted a wall out here, a wall there and now I have a business that I can be proud of," Cienicia said.

After Cienicia built out his business as far as space would allow there was only one place for him to go - up!

Four years ago Lou decided to expand his business the only way space would allow and added a second floor to his existing building.

"I undertook this venture in Belleville at a time when a lot of businesses were either selling out or moving their establishments out of the city. This is a perfect example of what I mean by putting a little

back. This time I put a little back into Belleville," the Nutley resident said.

Lou, who is willing to put his hand into his pocket to help anyone in need has a controversial side to him also. As fast as Cienicia will help the indigent he is just as fast to take a stand on any issue he feels will harm his Belleville.

In 1984 Belleville town officials were contemplating moving police headquarters from its present location, which happens to be across the street from Cienicia's present location, to an area on Franklin Ave.

Cienicia, along with the then president of the Chamber of Commerce, Jaye Tarantino and others, opposed this move, gathered enough public support and defeated the idea.

Tarantino then explained that the Chamber of Commerce was definitely in support of a new police facility because the conditions were deplorable but the chamber's only true objection was the proposed site of the new building.

Cienicia does community work in Nutley as well as Belleville. When a devastating earthquake struck in Italy he volunteered to help do whatever he could. He became co-chairman of the Italian Earthquake Relief Committee of Nutley and through various fund raising events was able to send \$5,000 to the victims of the disaster.

Also at Holy Family School in Nutley, Cienicia was heavily involved and helped in the efforts to raise \$25,000 for the purchase of two school buses.

As a past vice president of the Belleville Chamber of Commerce, Cienicia still remains an active member of the chamber. Aside from chamber business Cienicia is a leader in the anti-blight movement in Belleville constantly remembering what had happened to him long ago in the area of Newark where he had previously owned a business.

Lou has one hobby that whenever he can get away from business and meetings he viciously attacks. He is an avid boater.

## Golden Comments

With David Stockman, Richard Darman, the present Budget Director, who helped deliver the enormous deficits of the Reagan years, cutting taxes and throwing money at the military, staging "a frontal assault on the welfare state," as Stockman was later quoted "it wasn't a 'frontal' assault; it was oblique and naughty, the governmental equivalent of a panty raid...The GOP cut taxes "irresponsibly," and the Democrats - the party of government - had the privilege of being "responsible" and trying to raise them.

Last year, as usual, Darman won. He got what the President wanted: no new taxes and the appearance of a smaller budget deficit (only \$100 billion). This was, of course, so much baloney. The real deficit was at least twice the \$100 billion advertised. The camouflage was provided, in part, by using \$62 billion in Social Security taxes to plug the hole and by simply NOT COUNTING other expenses - like the zillions going down the drain in the savings-and-loan scandal. Congress, paralyzed by its own ethical problems and sclerotic from years on an all-pork diet, went along with the sham.

This year, for the first time, Darman is in danger of being outplayed. Senator Daniel Patrick Moynihan, who spent the eighties fuming quietly over the hypocrisy of the Reaganists, has found an antidote to Darmanism in the ancient principle of jujitsu: You want to cut taxes? We can do it, too. Specifically Moynihan proposed cutting the Social Security payroll tax - which is ballooning now to pay for retirement of the baby-boomers but is actually being spent to paper over the deficit. (The reality is that Darman's two sons will pay higher taxes to cover his Social Security pension and the deficits he and Stockman so cavalierly produced.)

Moynihan's proposal is wonderful because it dramatizes the central unfairness of the Reagan-Bush budgets: The tax burden has been

shifted from the rich (whose top marginal income-tax rate dropped from 70 to 28 percent) to the middle class. (THE ECONOMIST recently computed that with Social Security taxes included, the "true" marginal tax rate is higher for a married couple making \$14,000 (30 percent) than it is for a couple making \$326,000 (28 percent). Of course, Demo-dinosaur types see the Moynihan proposal as irresponsible: It will "cost" \$55 billion to fix the 1991 budget deficit.

But that's sort of the point: "Reagan wasn't irresponsible? Bush isn't?" says Senator Bob Kerrey of Nebraska. "The purpose of Moynihan's plan is to create an artificial crisis. It's the only way we're going to really take a look at this thing."

Indeed, it might even be suggested that Moynihan is carrying Darman's water here: His goal, clearly, is to cause a crisis that will result in a budget "summit" where the administration and Congress will finally fulfill Darman's "obligation to be serious" by putting everything - higher income taxes, the defense budget, and entitlements (yes, even Social Security and Medicare) - on the table.

"Put it all out there," says Governor Mario Cuomo, who has been even more outspoken than Moynihan on this issue. "Tell the American people the truth - maybe we cut taxes too much. We've added two trillion dollars' worth of debt. Now we should go back to the original plan, a top rate of 38 percent (for those with income over \$155,000), or we could do a luxury tax. There are all sorts of things you can do."

The budget is a ravenous "cookie monster," and the burden on the middle class - especially since an increasing number of the cookies are being consumed by the rich. In a sense, the federal budget has become a massive income transfer from the middle class to the elderly middle class - and to the wealthy. The system is corroded and needs to be wrung out. And Moynihan is right: Until it is, the middle class will suffer unduly.

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## Brunello wins Middle School geography bee

Danny Brunello, an 8th grade student at Belleville Middle School, won the school's geography bee on Feb. 6, and a chance at a \$25,000 college scholarship.

The school-level bee, at which students answered oral questions on geography, was the first round in the second annual National Geography Bee that is being sponsored by National Geographic World, the Society's magazine for children, Amtrak, and Kudos snack.

The bee was kicked off the week of Jan. 29 in thousands of schools around the United States, District of Columbia, and five U.S. territories. The school winners, including Brunello and Keith Donovan, will now take a written test. Up to 100 of the top scorers in each state will be eligible to compete in their state bee March 30.

The National Geographic Society with its co-sponsors will provide an all-expenses paid trip to Washington, D.C., for state champions and their teacher escorts to participate in the National Geography Bee finals May 23 and 24. The first-place national winner will receive a \$25,000 college scholarship, the second-place win-

ner a \$15,000 scholarship, and the third-place winner a \$10,000 scholarship.

Alex Trebek, host of "Jeopardy," will moderate the national finals.

The National Geographic Society developed the National Geography Bee in response to a growing concern about the lack of geographic knowledge among young people in the United States. A 10-country Gallup Survey conducted for the Society in 1988 and 1989 found that people in the U.S. ages 18-24, the youngest group surveyed, knew less about geography than young people in any of the other countries.

The National Geographic Society, with nearly 11 million members, has as its mission the "increase and diffusion of geographic knowledge." Besides the National Geography Bee, the Society sponsors a number of other geography education initiatives, including the Summer Geography Institute for teachers, the National Geographic Society Education Foundation, and the Geographic Alliance Network, which currently encompasses 34 states.

## SCHOOL NEWS

### Peers educating peers

Each classroom at School 3 was visited Feb. 8 by two of the sixteen high school students trained in the substance awareness program called Peers Educating Peers Club or PEP-C.

The PEP-C generation speaks to the young children as only their teenage idols can. The older students make learning substance awareness interesting for the little ones.

Substance awareness is not new to School 3. Teachers and students at the school have been working with the Here's Looking At You 2000 drug curriculum for several weeks.

The drug education guide is aimed at the K-6 grade levels and includes educational games, ways to say no, and other vital substance awareness information that will help the children say no when they are offered drugs.

The Here's Looking At You 2000 drug awareness curriculum and guides will be shared by three of the town's six elementary schools this year. Each of the three schools will have the program for two months before the material will be passed on to the next elementary school.

BASE, the Belleville Alliance for Substance Education is working to divide the funding to provide

each school in the district with at least one complete Here's Looking At You 2000 guide.

BASE is seeking a commitment from the board of education, home and school associations and local businesses to each provide one-third of the estimated \$25,000 needed to purchase the comprehensive curriculum guides for all the district's schools. The guides are available in three learning levels directed at elementary, middle school and high school usage.

The PEP-C high school students all volunteered to work with the little ones and received two full days of in-service training with Belleville's Substance Awareness Coordinator, Debbie Meola.

Meola said the in-service program included decision making skills, coping skills, films on substance awareness, information on drug and alcohol dependency, and good health practices. The PEP-C speakers worked up lesson plans, role-played, and student-taught each other before entering the elementary classrooms.

PEP-C students must receive recommendations from two of their subject matter teachers and their guidance counselor, and, among other things, maintain school and homework as priority.

### Financial aid discussed for college bound seniors

Belleville High School students and parents had an opportunity to learn the intricacies of educational financing during an evening workshop held recently at the high school auditorium.

Lisa Anderson, associate director of financial aid for the Madison campus of Fairleigh Dickinson University, conducted the meeting. She reviewed the New Jersey Financial Aid form and also discussed the New Jersey

telephone network for financial aid. Information can be obtained free by calling 1-800-792-8670.

Discussion also centered on specific programs, such as the Pell Grant and Stafford Loan programs. Anderson emphasized the fact that the financial aid process is intended to help students achieve their educational goals.

The financial aid process should not be viewed as a roadblock to college admission. Students should be familiar with the financial aid form, in case college financial aid officers have questions, Anderson said.

### Computer careers

On January 24, Mrs. Chmura from the Chubb Institute visited Belleville High School to speak to the computer class of Miss Patak and Mrs. Sharra.

Mrs. Chmura's main objective was to discuss computer careers in both programming and operations. In the programming field, career levels from programmer to manager of software systems were explained. In the operations field, career levels begin with console operator and rise to manager of computer operations.

Students viewed a short video illustrating processes of the modern computer. Chmura ended her presentation with information about the Chubb Institute and the programs it has to offer.

Several students showed an interest in pursuing a computer career.

#### Catching up with Rey's Syndrome

In recent years, the public has been warned of a link between the taking of aspirin and the development of Rey's Syndrome. This potentially fatal illness of the liver and brain can develop in children who are given aspirin treatment of viral infection, particularly chicken pox and influenza. Fortunately, the public has taken the warnings against employing aspirin therapy for childhood viral illnesses to heart. According to the Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta, reported cases of Rey's Syndrome have dropped to 20 cases in 1988. That is the lowest level of reported cases on record. To ensure that the level stays low, the warning against this specific use of aspirin is being repeated in this column.

## Along the Passaic

### An attack on the Green Acres Program

The Green Acres Program is viewed by many citizens as a sacred trust, whereby we set aside lands as open space for the enjoyment of all people now and in the future. Thus it becomes grossly disturbing when land acquired under the Green Acres Program becomes a pawn for a new highway, a gas pipeline, or as in the most recent chain of events, for land to be used by a major corporation.

In the early part of this century, very special parks were established in Essex County, many designed by Frederick Law Olmsted or members of his firm. One such fine park existed along the Lower Passaic in Nutley and Belleville. It was a jewel with its tennis courts, fishing piers, and winding, tree lined pathways along the Passaic. But along came the Highway Department, which constructed Route 21 along the river leaving only small, unusable remnants of that beautiful park. Replacement land was provided, which ultimately became the Turtleback Zoo, but the ambience of a riverfront park was lost forever.

Recently a similar exchange took place. The land involved was 57.5 acres in Atlantic Mountain State Park for 67.5 acres in the International Trade Center at the junction of I-80 and Route 206. The beneficiary of the swap is BASF Corporation, one of the largest chemical companies in the world. The company could not find exactly the right land configuration in the International Trade Center so it offered a deal to the state for the near-by parklands. The company is paying \$300,000 to the State of New Jersey, which owns the land, and \$4.7 million to Waterloo Village, a nonprofit agency, which has lease rights to the land. Several inequities exist in this proposal, since the land owned by the state has considerably greater building potential and should be assessed at a higher price. The 67.5 acres going to the state, on the other hand, is composed of wetlands and flood plains, and cannot support the kind of development being sought by BASF. The approval for this exchange was made during the last days of the Kean Administration, whereupon an untold number of letters and phone calls then greeted the incoming administration objecting to the deal

and the manner in which it was handled.

Viewing the negotiations from the sidelines, we recognize the need to keep jobs in the state, but we must raise the question not only of equity regarding the dedicated parkland, but the future need to provide housing in this undeveloped area of the state for the workers who will be employed by BASF. Don't the courts always say to a town, if you want the big ratable, you've got to provide housing and all amenities for its employees? Thus a decision to keep a major chemical company in New Jersey will lead to a great deal more environmental disruption than first envisioned. Yet had the request for this transaction gone to public hearing, the folks in that part of the state would have objected. I am sure.

Because of the many letters and phone calls, Commissioner Judith Yaskin has taken two important steps. She is reevaluating the entire project, and has issued an order that from now on, a public hearing will be held on any such proposal. The voice of the people will be heard. This is an improvement in the decision-making process. More are needed, but we'll accept one step at a time.

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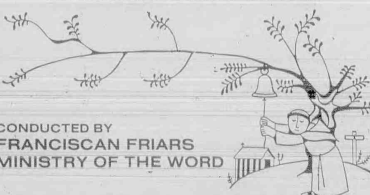
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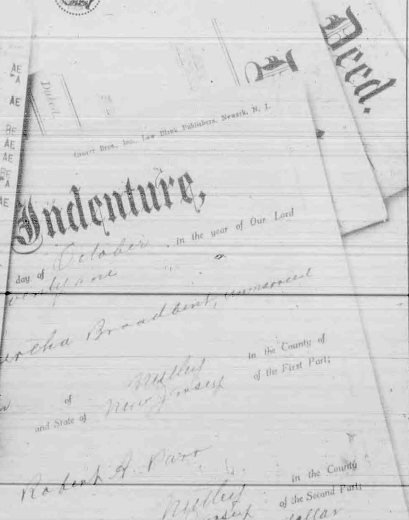

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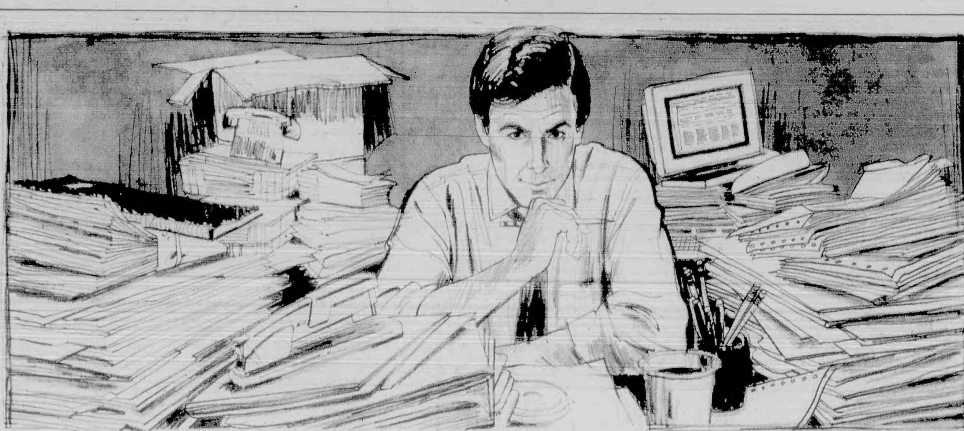

### Practicing what we preach

Ira North said on numerous occasions, "The ocean wouldn't hold our preaching but you could put our practice into a teacup." Some have described our actions as: "Preaching cream and practicing skim milk." In our time, we call this situation a "credibility gap." This means there is a vast difference in what we profess and what we do. This is not new. Jesus condemned the hypocrites of His day for doing the same: "The teachers of the law and the Pharisees sit on Moses' seat. But do not do what they do, for they do everything they tell you. But do not do what they do, for they do not practice what they preach. They tie heavy loads and put them on men's shoulders, but they themselves are not willing to lift a finger to move them" (Matthew 23:2-4).

When the spies brought back their report concerning the land of Israel (Numbers 13), they were divided in their opinion. The majority said the land was good, but could not be taken. This group feared the giants. A minority of two had a different opinion. Caleb and Joshua declared the Lord was with them and they could take the land. The people did not believe the minority opinion and were punished for their unbelief. Only Joshua and Caleb entered the land of Canaan.

Caleb probably found little satisfaction in being right. He had told the people that the giants could be defeated with the Lord's help. He determined to demonstrate it. When the children of Israel later began to distribute the land, Caleb came forward to claim his share. "Now give me this hill country that the Lord promised me that day. You yourself heard then that the Amalekites were there and their cities were large and fortified, but, the Lord helping me, I will drive them out just as he said (Joshua 14:12). Caleb truly practiced what he preached.

We also need to examine our preaching and practice. It is easy to give lip service to what we hear taught. The Biblical concepts of faith, trust, hope, love, commitment, etc., are often preached in church today. Yet, how much do we demonstrate them?

We may claim to believe His words that greatness is found in service. Does our practice match this? We often hear that faith is demonstrated by obedience. Yet do we show a lack of faith by our disobedience?

Too often this failure is so evident. Yet, we will not make the necessary effort to change until we realize the danger of our not practicing what we preach. It makes us hypocrites. We give the world the right to say we are not sincere and that Jesus has no power to change and mold lives. Even more, we give the world the opportunity to mock and blaspheme God. (Romans 2:24, II Samuel 12:14).

Jonah read of an army that went to battle. Leading each division of the army was a standard-bearer. The flag he carried identified the division. In the attack, one standard bearer advanced beyond his troops. Word was sent to him, "Bring the standard back to the army." He replied, "Bring the army up to the standard."

One age does not need a new gospel, or even new ways to present the gospel. The crying need is for the church to practice what is preached. When this is done, the gospel will regain its ancient effectiveness.

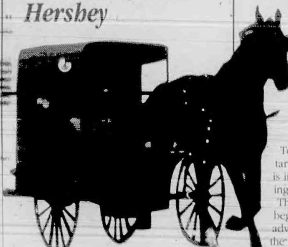

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## MEDICALLY SPEAKING

### SINUS DISEASE

- Q: What is sinus disease?
- A: Sinus disease is an inflammation of the air-containing cavities of the nose, face, and forehead.
- Q: What are the symptoms of Sinus Disease?
- A: Chronic sinusitis can include nasal congestion, pain or pressure of the eyes and forehead, nasal obstruction or nasal drip, or simply the sensation of a cold that doesn't go away.

- Q: What about sinus disease that does not respond to treatment?

- A: Yes. With fiberoptic examination of the nose and sinuses in the office and advanced CT scan imaging, doctors are able to accurately diagnose sinus disease.
- Q: Are there any recent advances in sinus surgery?
- A: Yes. Recently introduced endoscopic sinus surgery is a major breakthrough in the treatment of sinus disease. This surgery makes use of micro-telescopic techniques with no external incisions. These new techniques allow the surgeon to perform safer and more effective surgery. Most often the surgery can be performed with anesthesia on an outpatient basis. Recovery time is usually rapid, with patients returning to their normal activities within days.

## BUC SHOTS

It's been a tough year on the basketball courts for Belleville High School. The boys team took a 2-19 record into its season finale last Tuesday and the girls' squad was winless in its first 19 games. However, the future is promising for both teams, with a strong nucleus of young talent set to return in 1990-91.

The boys team was hoping for a better campaign in 1989-90. However, the Bucs have lacked concentration, according to head coach Don Roll in key situations down the stretch of close games.

"We're not that far away," Roll said. "We have to develop more consistency from the foul line and not throw the ball away in those key moments of the close games. We're making young mistakes, hopefully that will be corrected next season."

An impressive contingent of returning players gives Roll optimism. The front court could be strong next year, with **Jim DuHaime**, **Dennis DeWork** and **Troy Talmadge** having a year of varsity experience behind them. DuHaime is a junior, DeWork is a freshman and Talmadge is completing his sophomore year.

DuHaime provides that necessary muscle underneath. At 6'2" tall, he is often matched up against bigger players in the pivot.

"Jimmy makes up for a lack of height in the center position with a great deal of toughness," Roll said. "He battles hard and doesn't back down. He's a strong kid."

Talmadge has a world of experience which is just beginning to be realized. He has shown signs of brilliance during the course of this season.

"Troy needs to develop more consistency," Roll said of the sophomore forward. "He has excellent leaping ability and good speed. He has all the tools."

DeWork is another man with unlimited potential. At 6'1", he should grow a few more inches during his high school days. He has a basketball body and with work in the weight room, he should be a solid player for many years.

"Dennis will go as far as he wants," Roll said. "He has the ability to be a tremendous player."

The backcourt will return junior point guard **Art Caruso** and sophomore **Sal Straface**.

Caruso saw varsity action as a sophomore and is doing a good job of running the floor this year. He is a good athlete and has experience in running a team because he's also the varsity football quarterback.

Straface, the younger brother of former Belleville basketball standout **Dominick Straface** is an excellent ball handler and is quickly learning the varsity game.

"I'm real optimistic about our returning guards," Roll said. "Both guys handle the ball well and have varsity experience."

Another player with potential is junior forward **Francisco Furman**. Furman has good upper body strength and, at times, shows the ability to play well under the boards.

There are other returning players who will be profiled in upcoming issues. Most importantly, it should be noted that Roll has done a good job in developing a strong nucleus of players.

While the future is promising, the key is the off season conditioning the athletes will encounter.

"I'm hopeful that many or all of the returning players will go to basketball camp," Roll said. "They have to play as much as possible. We'll be in summer basketball leagues too. The opportunity is there, but as I've said before, it's really up to the kids."

I was at the girls' basketball practice last Monday morning and was really impressed by the team unity and excitement. This is a team that has endured a difficult year, but you'd never know it by the enthusiasm generated by the team during the respective drills.

"I credit that to the seniors," head coach **Karen Fucello** said. "They played hard this year and gave the younger kids something to shoot for for next year. I'll tell you what, I'm really optimistic about next season. We have a lot of kids coming back and if they continue playing during the off season, we could do pretty well."

The seniors that Fucello refers to are, **Thelina Espiritu**, **Mia Hanos** and **Jennifer Bridge**.

Hanos was named second team, **NNJL**, for her work at forward. Hanos has been averaging 12.5 points a game over the last month.

"Mia has worked hard to improve her game on offense," Fucello said. "It shows with her production over the last ten games. She has looked for opportunities to score and has come through."

Espiritu was named Honorable Mention, **NNJL**. For four years, she has provided steady leadership to the Lady Bucs.

"Thelina is a fine asset to the team," Fucello said. "She is a team player and always gives her best."

The same can be said of Bridge, who returned from various injuries to be a good team leader in 1990.

"Jennifer has played very well the past few weeks," Fucello said. "She has shown a lot of improvement."

It's not going to happen easily and certainly not overnight, but the basketball programs at Belleville appear to be on the upswing. Let's hope the returning players continue their progress and work hard during the crucial off season.

## Grapplers win NNJL crown

The regular season is now over. Belleville's outstanding team of wrestlers closed out the dual meet season by blasting Don Bosco of Ramsey 66-8, then whipping St. Joseph's of Montvale by a 43-17 margin.

With a mark of 14-1, BHS now owns the title of "Champion" for the **NNJL**, 1989-90 edition. This latest honor adds to an already glittering season, one in which the Bucs conquered every obstacle in tournament and league competition.

Yet despite winning the Bloomfield Holiday Tournament, the Elizabeth Minuteman Tournament, the Essex County Athletic Director's Tournament, and the **NNJL** crown, Belleville must still face its toughest challenge this weekend at St. Benedict's High School. There they will compete with nine other teams for the District 7 team championships.

Here is the forecast for this year's District 7 championship tournament:

**103** — St. Benedict's Rich Bustamante is the clear-cut choice here. Nutley's Khoi Pham is the pick for second, with Belleville's freshman pepper pot Josh Cardinale earning a bronze medal for third place.

**112** — Jerry Allora of Bloomfield leads this division. Mike Miele of Belleville has lost his last five matches to Allora and will probably finish second to the Bloomfield senior once again. St. Benedict's Joe Almeida should finish third, but could upset Miele if he wrestles a notch above his usual effort.

usual effort.

**119** — Anthony Mielnicki of Nutley and Belleville's own Ralph Perna will battle for a gold medal. Mielnicki defeated Perna by an 11-10 margin in the finals of the Bloomfield Holiday Tournament. The pick here is Perna in a small upset, averaging his one point loss from the December event. Kearny's Cesar Rios and St. Benedict's Cesar Bustamante should wind up in a struggle for third place.

**125** — If Junior Nardone's knee is strong enough to compete, there is a runaway victory for BHS. If Nardone misses the districts, Joe Ombasky will drop down from 130 pounds and vie for the title. Competition will come from Tom Cellure of Bloomfield and Tony Rosamilia of Montclair Immaculate. Mark Vilardo of Kearny is also a threat, but Ombasky should win the gold medal.

**130** — Again, if Nardone competes at 125, Ombasky will compete here. If Ombasky wrestles at 125, Chris Talbot will fill the 130-pound slot. Damien DeVito of Glen Ridge will win this division, with Lamar Melton of St. Benedict's providing the most severe test. Brian O'Donnell of Kearny will battle Ombasky or Talbot for third place. Either Belleville wrestler should finish third.

**135** — The tournament's deepest division. Belleville's Lee Hands, Bloomfield's Pete Volpe, Essex Catholic's Leland Griffin and Glen Ridge's Rick Foster all have the talent to win a title. Doug Hollar of Montclair Immaculate and Herb Brooks of St. Benedict's

are dark horse contenders. Hands has beaten Volpe and Foster this season, and on that basis is the choice to finish first. However, a victory by Griffin would not be considered an upset.

**140** — St. Benedict's has been flip-flopping Joe Huss and Mike Anabui all year at 140 and 145. The guess here is that Huss will go 140 and Anabui will go 145. Vinnie DeSimone of Belleville and Rory Walker Graham of Essex Catholic are top challengers. The feeling here is that DeSimone can take Huss, but not Anabui. If Huss wrestles here, the pick is DeSimone. If Anabui wrestles here, the pick is Anabui.

**145** — A potentially dynamic class with Anabui, Dan Holman of Bloomfield and Jamie Stanisci of Glen Ridge all battling for a title. Stanisci should win, but not without a severe struggle. Belleville's Jim Mastropalo and Kearny's Stan Klotz should vie for the fourth place spot.

**152** — Dan Hywel of Belleville... Gene Richard of Kearny... another great match, another win for Hywel.

**160** — Pick one. Ken Henry of Belleville, Paul Szep of Bloomfield, Chris Archer of Glen Ridge. All are super, all are seniors, all are capable of winning. Our choice is Henry by a hair.

**171** — Matt Szep of Bloomfield, far and away the class of this division. Szep easily outdistances Tony Rodriguez of Kearny and Kevin Brewster of St. Benedict's.

**189** — The weakest division in the districts with only two legitimate contenders. Carl

Scheuten of Bloomfield should defeat Kenya Moncour of St. Benedict's, but a win by Moncour would not be a surprise.

**HWT** — Lou Pointer of St. Benedict's is the clear favorite. George Wallace of Belleville and Mike Cairns of Kearny should be the runners-up. Wallace has not wrestled particularly well the second half of the season, but is still the choice here to finish second to Pointer.

The Belleville boys' basketball team dropped two more games last week, bowing to Bloomfield, 72-55 and St. Joe's of Montvale, 70-58. The two defeats lowered Belleville's record to 2-19 on the '89-90 season.

Don Roll's team battled Montclair last Tuesday in its season finale.

Andy DuHaime led Belleville with 19 points. Troy Talmadge scored 15, Jim DuHaime finished with five, Michael Trezza, Mark Nakashian, Dennis DeWork and Tom Klana scored three each and Sal Straface and Art Caruso had two points each.

Versus St. Joe's of Montvale, Belleville was without its top two scorers, Andy DuHaime and Talmadge. Despite not having its top two offensive arsenals in the lineup, the Bucs played a very good game.

"We were without 30 points," Roll said, referring to DuHaime's

and Talmadge's scoring average combined. "The kids played well, we were in it until the end."

DeWork, a freshman forward, led Belleville with 14 points. Straface scored 12, Jim DuHaime had nine, Trezza finished with eight, Klana tallied seven and Doug Hoogendyke and Caruso scored four each.

The Bucs shot 15 for 22 from the foul line against St. Joe's.

St. Joe's led, 18-12 after one quarter and 32-27 at halftime. The Bucs narrowed the lead to 45-41 after three quarters before St. Joe's pulled away with solid foul shooting in the final eight minutes.

The foul shooting has been costly for the Bucs this season. The team was shooting 65% from the line

(231 for 354) heading into last Tuesday's game against Montclair. In four of Belleville's losses, the total amount of foul shots the team missed exceed the point differential of the defeat.

"It's a matter of concentration," Roll said. "We're in positions to win games in the fourth quarter. But we're not shooting consistently from the line and the opponents are hitting the necessary foul shots. That turns the game around, because if we miss foul shots, we have to foul the opponent in an attempt to get the ball back."

The season was a tough one for the Bucs. However, the future looks promising, with some talented underclassmen set to return next year.

## Lady Bucs beaten by Bloomfield, 63-34

Two streaks continued for the Belleville girls' basketball team last week, and neither one caused reason for excitement. The Lady Bucs lost to Bloomfield, 63-34 last Tuesday, the 12th straight defeat for Belleville against Bloomfield dating back to December, 1984. The other streak is more current, as the loss was the 19th straight for the Lady Bucs this season.

Belleville concluded its season at Montclair last Tuesday, hoping for that elusive first win.

The game with powerful Bloomfield started off positively for Belleville last week. The Lady Bucs led 10-7 after the first frame, but the Bengals, ranked eighth in the latest state polls, took control in the second frame behind senior scoring machine Laura Lacey.

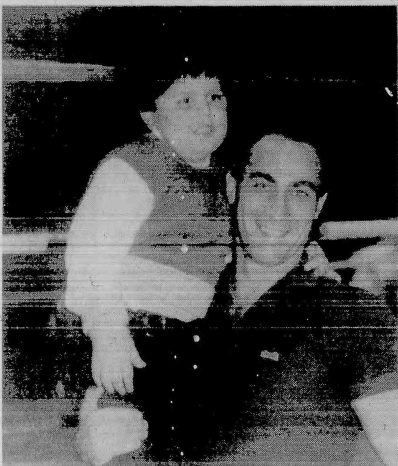
