Decades of distinguished service

Retiring police officers to be honored next week

Two 32-year Belleville Police Department veterans will be honored at a retirement party being held June 7, at 7:30 p.m. at the Knights of Columbus on Bridge St. The two officers were appointed to the Belleville Police Department at the same time on January 5, 1958.

Deputy Chief Hank Olivieri was one of the first two original members of Belleville's first narcotics squad in the early 1960's. He was a graduate of the Bureau of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs course offered by the Department of Justice. While on the Narcotics Squad, he worked with fellow officer Hugh O'Toole and later Ron Thompson. Olivieri received numerous commendations from Belleville and other police departments for his work on the narcotics squad which led to many arrests locally and in surrounding townships. His service here was also noted by the prosecutor's office. He was promoted to sergeant June 2, 1973, then lieutenant March 20, 1973.

Olivieri was also a member of the Belleville pistol team and a firearms instructor. While on the Narcotics Squad, Olivieri spoke to many service organizations throughout the town. He was pro-

moted to captain October 28, 1975, and then deputy chief April 4, 1983. He retired officially January 1, this year.

Olivieri served as a motorcycle officer in the traffic division, and served in the patrol division. He then joined the detective bureau and narcotics squad. Olivieri's personnel file is filled with commendations for his outstanding work and many apprehensions. Chief George Lister said, Olivieri was a U.S. Navy veteran.

Police officer Carmen "Coke" Pedalino retired March 1, this year. Pedalino served in the patrol and traffic division and received numerous commendations for his actions as an officer. He was a U.S. Army veteran.

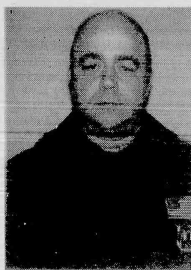
In 1967, Pedalino's quick action at an early morning fire at a Van Kessel apartment house saved eleven residents from a great tragedy.

In 1970, Pedalino rescued a young woman from a vehicle submerged in the Passaic River, thus saving her life.

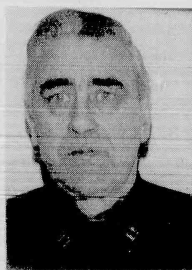
In 1967, Pedalino was commended for his quick action at the scene of a stabbing-homicide which led to the subsequent arrest. His action helped preserve the crime scene and recover important evidence.

Pedalino was also commended in 1965 for his quick apprehension of two men engaged in a burglary.

"Coke," as he was commonly known, was well-liked and well-known along Washington Ave. for his latest efforts in traffic enforcement. His experience and fairness

helped maintain the good will and public relations of the department with the business community. "He performed a good, concerned job with courtesy to the public," Lister said.

"The department lost two very good officers," Lister said, but agree-

Shade Tree Commission meets, will tour Wallace St. Sunday

The newly appointed Shade Tree Commission will decide the fate of a number of Sycamore trees lining Wallace Street. Mayor Michael P. Pizzi appointed the commission last week following a Superior Court ruling by Judge Leo Yanoff in Newark.

At the center of the conflict is an Essex County Community Development Block Grant to re-pave both Wallace St. and Overlook Ave. Trees were cut down on

Overlook to prepare for re-paving, but funding for the work has been held up by the county until the Shade Tree Commission settles the dispute.

The Shade Tree Commission held an organizational meeting Tuesday night. Raymond Pizzano was elected Chairman and Kevin Kennedy, Vice-Chairman. Other members of the board are Marie Vander Zwan and Lyle Davis. The fifth member, Jim Fusaro, a tree expert, was not present.

Members of the audience sighed, disappointed when Chairman Pizzano announced the first meeting was to organize the board, not to hear any public statements.

Pizzano said the Board would reconvene at 3 p.m. on Sunday to "tour" Wallace St. He said he hoped the board would "reach an amicable decision," that they would compile statistics about the trees, and that it would take about "3 or 4 meetings to decide."

Referring to the tour on Wallace St. Sunday, he said "we want to do our homework on this."

The board will meet June 6 at 7:00 p.m. in the Public Affairs Building at 383 Washington Ave. A videotape of the sewer system around Wallace St. will be shown.

According to Roy Brown, of 31 Wallace St., 41 homeowners from Wallace St. and Overlook St. would like to see the trees cut down. Four citizens are against it, he said.

The four citizens who opposed the tree-cutting, according to Roy Brown, signed a lawsuit with the aid of a Rutgers' lawyer, Margaret Hayden, which prohibited removal of the trees. In the event that the Shade Tree Commission decides not to cut the trees, these 4 residents will lose a grant from the County to re-pave the sidewalks and streets.

The roots of the Sycamore trees have spread under the sidewalks, creeping their way into sewage pipes.

"Four times a year," Steve said, "the pipes get plugged up and when the toilet's flushed it all goes down to the 'basement.' This has been a nuisance for 20 or 30 years, he said.

Phyllis Giordano said she didn't want to see "trees cut down unnecessarily."

"If I had a tree that needed attention I would take care of it myself before cutting it down. Trees need care," she said.

Belleville drug suspect delivered pizza and 'coke'

No trial date has yet been set for the Belleville man arrested May 11 in Nutley for possession of cocaine and controlled, dangerous substance, said Lt. Joseph Russonella of the Nutley police.

James A. Mingucci, 25, of 28 Moore Place in Belleville, was arrested at 10:07 that Friday night near the corner of Centre Street and Franklin Avenue after attempting to get rid of the evidence when he realized he was under police surveillance, the lieutenant said.

"And as a result of that arrest, Belleville police seized a large amount of cocaine, anabolic steroids and cutting agents at the Moore Place address," Russonella said late Friday, and later the Newark narcotics squad seized a larger amount of cocaine at Mingucci's supply house on the third floor of 500 Summer Avenue in Newark.

Mingucci was a low to middle level dealer in the drug trade. Russonella said adding that his method was to work under the guise of a pizza delivery operation.

He would take a phone call where he worked and use a code

system then deliver the merchandise with the pizza, the detective said, adding he had a beeper and code book as well.

"We picked him up at Centre Street and Passaic Avenue," the lieutenant said adding that detectives William Lopa, Natty Ferrara and Officer John Rhein were part of the operation.

"He was headed west on Harrison, but when he approached Franklin he seemed to know he was being followed. He tried to get out of his car, a blue 1988 four door Olds, and dispose of the contraband," Russonella said.

The dealer tried to pull into the small parking lot on the north-east corner of Franklin Avenue and throw it in the street, but the squad retrieved about a gram of cocaine and a straw, the detective said.

Russonella wouldn't say how the narcotics squad learned of Mingucci's activities, but it frequently happens that competitors or even partners notify police anonymously. Mingucci, whom Russonella described as well built, did not resist and when returned to headquarters cooperated with police.

Burglary suspect nabbed in Blfd. charged in more than 26 break-ins

An apple a day may keep the doctor away, but a break-in a day brought police to John Berardi.

The 26-year-old, described as a drifter, is accused of going on a week-long burglary spree to support a drug habit, committing as many as three break-ins in one day between May 16 and 23, Bloomfield Police Chief John McNiff said.

The suspect is also charged with a similar offense March 1.

Berardi, who was arrested early in the morning of May 23 and arraigned Thursday before Bloomfield Municipal Court Judge Carl Stier, is charged with 10 counts of burglary, 10 counts of theft and three counts of attempted burglary in Bloomfield.

"No property has been recovered yet, but the investigation is active and continuing. Additional charges may be forthcoming," McNiff said.

Berardi, whose last known address was Union Avenue, Belleville, has also been charged with two counts of burglary-theft and one count of theft of movable property by Belleville police.

Police here charged Berardi with a burglary they May 7 at Algeni Pizzeria on Union Ave., a break-in the same day at the Fewsmith Church, on Union Ave. and a motor vehicle theft May 20 on Brighton Ave.

He faced similar charges in

Glen Ridge and Nutley. He is being held on \$50,000 cash bail.

The case will be referred to a grand jury, McNiff said.

The chief said Berardi was wanted on two outstanding bench warrants in connection with prior thefts.

"He was known to the Bloomfield Police Department because he's been arrested in the past for theft and burglary," McNiff said.

"He was our number-one suspect in these thefts, but his whereabouts were unknown."

Then, Berardi was spotted at 3:30 a.m. Wednesday walking at

Bloomfield Avenue and Municipal Plaza and was subsequently apprehended, McNiff told Bloomfield Life.

"Detectives recognized the M.O. (method of operation) and physical evidence, and as a result of their in-depth investigation, charges were brought against him," the chief said.

Bloomfield police charged Berardi with breaking into some addresses more than once and with committing sometimes two and three burglaries a day.

He is accused of burglaries at 98 Broad St., a professional office building, May 16, 17 and 19.

A break-in March 1 at the Essex Animal Hospital, 709 Bloomfield Ave., was repeated May 17, according to reports. Also on May 17, he is charged with attempted burglary at Sacred Heart School.

The following day, police charge, he attempted a break-in at a doctor's office at 10 Washington St. and burglarized a luncheonette at 124 Washington St.

The break-ins resumed May 21 with an attempt at 31 Conger St. and entry of a doctor's office at 362 Franklin St. and continued the next day with a return to the Franklin Street premises and at a lawyer's office at 314 Broad St., police said.

They charge the spree concluded with a break-in at a diner at 265 Glenwood Ave.

Police charged Eric Nielson, 21, of Edgewater, with possession of a controlled dangerous substance, driving with a revoked license and filing false application for a driver license. Police discovered Nielson sleeping in his car with the motor running at Belmont St. and Tiona Ave. at about 1 a.m. May 25. The officers awakened Nielson and when he exited the vehicle, they observed a brown prescription container with no markings. Nielson also gave police a false name at the time of his arrest.

A 16-year-old juvenile from Newark was charged with possession of a stolen car following a footchase after he drove the vehicle into a parked car in Newark. Police were called shortly before 8 p.m. May 29 by a witness who reported a car being stolen from a Mt. Prospect Ave. address. Police observed the vehicle at Cottage St. and Belleville Ave. and followed it until it turned left onto Franklin Ave. The officers reported that the vehicle was being driven by a dark-skinned male about 16-17 years old, and the passenger in the vehicle also appeared to be a dark-skinned young male. The officers reported that the driver then observed the squad car and sped up as it continued south on Franklin Ave. to N. 6th St. At that time, the officers were instructed to disengage pursuit of the stolen vehicle. The officers then headed east on Davenport Ave. Shortly after the squad car headed towards Washington Ave., the stolen vehicle was reported by Newark police as having hit a parked car on Abington Ave. and N. 6th St., with the occupants fleeing on foot. driver on foot and apprehended him. He was taken into custody and released to his parents.

Police charged Raymond Caruso, 18, of Belleville with reckless driving May 25. Caruso was driving his 1983 Honda in reverse at a high rate of speed from DeWitt Ave. onto Joramelon St. The vehicle was weaving when he passed a patrol car at the corner of Union Ave. and Joramelon St. When the patrol car approached the Honda, the driver spun the car 180 degrees and ended up heading northeast in the east-bound lane.

A 1987 Pontiac reported stolen in East Orange May 18 was recovered by Belleville police May 24 on Belmont Ave.

Police charged Francesco Luongo, 42, of North Arlington with driving while under the influence of c.d.s. May 24, also charged with being under the influence of c.d.s. was passenger Alfred Grasso, 41, of Belleville. Police observed a vehicle swerving on Hornblower Ave. and stopped the vehicle. When the driver exited the vehicle, he was swaying and grasping at the car. When the passenger exited the vehicle, he also had trouble standing, police reported. Police did not notice any odor of alcohol, and place both men under arrest for D.W.I. c.d.s. Luongo was held on \$500 bail and Grasso was released on his own recognizance.

Police observed a black El Dorado driving very slowly on Franklin St. and make a turn without signaling. He was taken into headquarters and booked.

Since taking that risky step of a new venture, the Partial Care members have exhibited their reliability, their work skills and their ability to build good relationships with supervisors and colleagues. The volunteers have increased their time and Marlene French gives them high

marks on all counts. French reports that both volunteers are doing extremely well.

The two volunteers maintain their participation in the Partial Care Program in addition to their volunteer assignments.

Golden Comments

We observe that 2nd Ward Councilman-elect Frank Caputo, heading a transition committee concerned with the structure of a required and enacted administrative code, might facilitate the task by going no further than checking the Town Hall archives to review the Administrative Code prepared by Clive Cummins of 33 Washington St. Newark, N.J., one of the most outstanding legal architects of Administrative Codes in the state... This code was adopted in 1962 and expired with return to Commission government in Belleville.

This code was for the same Council-Manager type municipal government; was meticulously gone over and approved unanimously by the then five member Council. Modifications and changes have been made in the law, however, the basic tenets of the statute remain inviolate.

Legal fees for preparation of such an instrument are costly. A search of the Town Hall records to produce this document which should be made available to the seven newly elected Council persons to facilitate their understanding of all aspects of the workings of this form of government is strongly suggested...and could save some large legal fees...many of which might be incorporated in the new code.

During the interregnum, the time during which a throne is vacant between two successive reigns, speculation runs rife as to whom the next Mayor will be? The young lady garnering the most votes in the election could conceivably become Belleville's first lady mayor...the ladies would like that...and she is well qualified.

A bold and forceful editorial recently appeared in The Nutley Sun captioned "Will Florio do as Kean did with taxes?" It is "cutting and incisive" in its content and really strikes home. It reads, "Tom Kean did it! The former Republican governor created the state budget crisis. Kean in eight years doubled the state budget, from \$6 billion to \$12 billion. It was Tom Kean, after all, who increased the sales tax to six percent, and let us

not forget to mention the other increases in taxes, tolls and fees advocated by the Kean Administration.

"Unfortunately, most Republicans went along with Kean's spending and taxing mania. So did most Democrats, it should be noted. As a matter of record, some Democrats wanted to spend even more money and raise taxes even higher than Kean got away with. Neither Republicans nor Democrats monitored state spending. They did not provide the fiscal network for ongoing economic push. They did not encourage new avenues of investment.

"Democratic and Republican legislators are, after blaming one another, still faced with a decision: Should spending be cut or should taxes be increased? That is the question; that is the rub.

"So far, Governor Jim Florio wants to do a little of both: reduce some state programs, lay off a few hundred state employees, tighten up a nickel there and a penny here. He also wants to hike taxes and fees, enough probably to retard even more the investment trade in the private sector in the state.

"The answer to this crisis is simple, but too simple for most politicians to heed: too much state spending. The Florio Administration should phase out each spending program initiated by Tom Kean, and let the special interests shout all they please. If the special interests persist in their unhappiness with the reduced state hand-outs, they may parade up to Madison at Drew University to visit the former governor and cry unto him." Amen we say.

Complying with a court order, the state Insurance Commissioner approved a "community rating" system for Blue Cross and Blue Shield of New Jersey. Under which all policyholders pay the same rate regardless of age, gender or place of residence.

Under the community rating system, rates for older subscribers will be substantially less than under demographic rating, however, the court-ordered plan will mean rates for younger subscribers will rise.

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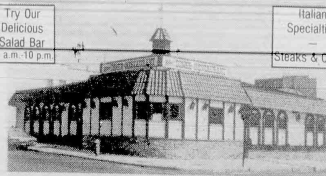

OUR OPINION

Bob Roe

Can Americans stand competition?

We are better workers than the Japanese? Better than the Western European nations now entering into a vast new multinational marketplace? Better than the "Pacific Rim" nations?

We should be better producers and in many ways we are. America is still the model capitalist nation not only because it is capitalist, but also — and more essential — because it is the model land of liberty.

Nevertheless, neither capitalism nor liberty itself will endure unless a fundamental change occurs in worker attitudes and in management attitudes about productivity. Americans may be producing, but they are not producing profitably. Productivity continues to lag. The first three months of 1990 were horrible.

Nonfarm productivity — that is, output for each hour of work — decreased by one percent, the biggest drop since productivity fell by an annual rate of 1.3 percent for the January-March period of 1989.

Increasing productivity is basic to boosting living standards, for it allows businesses to pay salaries and fringes as their output rises, and without higher inflation.

Equally disturbing news is found in the unit labor costs, an essential gauge of future price inflation, which has risen 4.9 percent so far in 1990, compared with a 4.5 percent jump during all of 1989. Labor costs are expanding without a corresponding increase in the productivity by those labor units.

This adverse condition cannot long continue without its further threatening the growth of the American economy. Only activist environmentalists, left-wing college professors and other socialist-oriented intellectuals will welcome this eroding of the American work ethic and the ability of American capitalism, in all its glory and might, to survive against foreign competition.

What is at stake here is not the raising of tariffs to keep out competition or further bashing of the Japanese because they know how to work harder. The issue here is our inability to focus on work.

Too many Americans believe that they are owed a living from their boss, from the government, from the courts and from anyone else making a few dollars more a week than they are.

Until we learn to work smarter and harder, we will not even be seeded in the fierce competition awaiting us in the 21st Century.

Watch 'hot cars'

To the editor:

When readers go shopping or to the beach this summer and open their car doors to go home, they know the hot blast of air that hits them. Unbelievable as it seems, some people still leave dogs in those cars with windows partially open. In New Jersey, that is against the law and the SPCA or local police should be called immediately.

On a warm day, the temperature in your car can reach 160 degrees in a matter of minutes. With only hot air to breathe, a pet can quickly suffer brain damage or die from heatstroke. The Humane Society warns: When it's hot — leave your pet at home! Open windows, shaded parking areas or air conditioned cars with the motor off won't save your pet's life.

In addition, be sure to know these signs of heat stress: heavy panting, glazed eyes, rapid pulse rate, dizziness, vomiting, or a deep red or purple tongue. If your dog does become overheated, get him into the shade and take these emergency steps:

- Apply ice packs or cold towels to the head, neck and chest.

- Don't give an unlimited amount of cold water. Let him lick ice cubes or even ice cream.

- Get the dog to a veterinarian immediately. It could save your pet's life.

Flyers are available free of charge from the Humane Society which can be placed in store windows, on bulletin boards or on car windows to warn people of the hazards of leaving pets in hot cars. Address your request for flyers to: "Hot Car, The Humane Society, 270 Route 206, Flanders, NJ 07836.

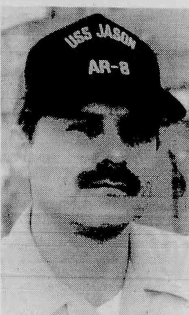

BOND ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE INSTALLATION OF CURBS AND SIDEWALKS FOR RUTGERS STREET AND OTHER COSTS INCIDENTAL THEREOF FOR AND BY THE TOWNSHIP OF BELLEVILLE, IN THE COUNTY OF ESSEX, NEW JERSEY. APPROPRIATING \$15,000.00 THEREFOR AND AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$15,000.00 BONDS OR NOTES OF THE TOWNSHIP FOR FINANCING PART OF THE COST THEREOF AND AMENDING ORDINANCE ADOPTED JULY 1, 1989.

Section 3 of this Ordinance was authorized as a general improvement to be made or acquired by the Township of Belleville in the County of Essex by Ordinance adopted July 1, 1989. For said improvement or purpose stated in Section 3, there is hereby appropriated the sum of \$15,000.00, which sum amends the aforementioned Ordinance to an authorization of \$40,000.00.

Section 2. For the financing of said improvement or purpose and to meet the costs and expense thereof, there is hereby appropriated the additional sum of \$750.00 as additional down payment for said improvement or purpose required by law and now available therefor by virtue of provisions in a previously adopted Budget or Budgets of the Township.

Section 3. (a) The improvement hereby authorized and purpose for financing of said obligations are to be issued in the installation of curbing and sidewalks for Rutgers Street between Washington Avenue and Hornblower Avenue and other costs incidental thereto.

(b) The estimated maximum amount of bonds or notes to be issued for the improvement or purpose is the additional sum of \$15,250.00.

(c) The purpose of the bonds and notes authorized is to finance commitments that may be incurred from the date of adoption of this Bond Ordinance.

Section 4. All bond anticipation notes issued hereunder shall mature at such times as may be determined by the Chief Financial Officer; provided that no note shall mature later than one year from its date. The notes shall bear interest at such rate or rates and be in such form as may be determined by the Chief Financial Officer. The Chief Financial Officer shall determine all matters in connection with notes issued pursuant to this Ordinance, and the Chief Financial Officer's signature upon the notes shall be conclusive evidence as to all such determinations. All notes issued hereunder may be

Section 5. The principal capital of the Township is hereby amended to conform with the provisions of this Ordinance to the extent of any inconsistencies herewith.

Section 7. The full faith and credit of the Township are hereby pledged to the punctual payment of the principal and interest on the said obligations authorized by this Bond Ordinance. Said obligations shall be direct, unlimited obligations of the Township, and the Township shall be obligated to levy ad valorem taxes upon all the taxable property within the Township for the payment of said obligations and the interest thereon without limitation of rate or amount.

Section 8. This Bond Ordinance shall take effect twenty (20) days after the first publication thereof after final adoption. It is provided by said Local Bond Law.

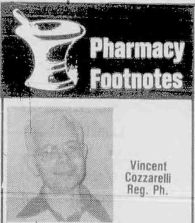

POSSIBLE HELP FOR BULIMICS

A preliminary report from the American Psychiatric Association holds out hope for an effective drug cure for the binge-purge eating syndrome known as bulimia. According to the report, when nearly 400 bulimic women were given the drug fluoxetine hydrochloride (an antidepressant) for eight weeks, the symptoms of bulimia were reduced. A 20mg. to 60mg. daily dose of the drug reduced food cravings, or obsession with body size, binging and vomiting, as well as the depression that often accompanies the disorder. While it has been known for some time that various antidepressants can ease eating disorder symptoms, fluoxetine hydrochloride does not cause such related side effects of traditional antidepressants as dry mouth, blurred vision, and constipation.

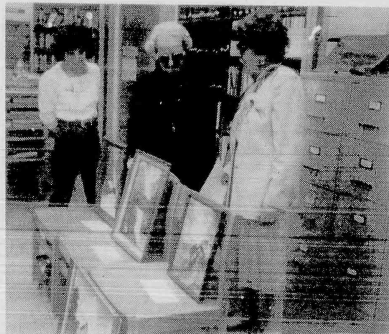

LE GUERIDON

Fine Gourmet Dining

Behind the modest storefront facade of Le Gueridon in Montclair is a restful dining room with generously spaced tables, Victorian oak chairs, peach embossed wallpaper, and grey wainscoting. You will know that you are in for a distinctive dining experience when you're immediately served a basket containing half a loaf of hot, crusty Italian whole wheat bread, accompanied by individual rounds of tasty deli cheese as well as a chilled bowl of butter roses.

An unusual selection of appetizers includes smoked rainbow trout and Buffalo Mozzarella in a puree of sun-dried tomato and basil; and the popular baked brie in puffed pastry on miniature slices of fresh chili, melon, strawberry, and pineapple, warmed in Grand Marnier liqueur—stand out by any standards. The knowledgeable waiter recommended an appetizer special: savory broiled veal sausage with radicchio and sweet yellow and red peppers, a suggestion Paul was delighted he had accepted.

The house salad—radicchio, boston lettuce, endive, and tomato—was a winner. Barbara enjoyed the lively sweetness of its honey-mustard dressing as a delicious counterpoint to the sharpness of endive. Characteristic of the cuisine at Le Gueridon is the lively interplay of flavors in every dish. Paul's choice, Mozzarella Capri, mozzarella, roasted peppers on onion and lettuce with pimento under a very light vinaigrette—delivered manized flavor rarely found in a salad bowl.

Six different types of the ordinary pasta selections grace the menu. They can be ordered in half portions as appetizer or entree. Choose from Black lobster ravioli, Black olive ravioli and Sun-dried tomato in a pesto sauce garnish with fresh shrimp.

An entree special of the evening that Barbara found enchanting was poached salmon in a saffron sauce. Cooked to perfection she declared. Paul loved a mixed grill which includes a double rack of lamb, chopped and tenderloin venison, and grilled duck breast accompanied by a pepper sauce. Each entree was served with layered sweet potatoes, and white potatoes topped with maple syrup and brown sugar cream.

Mixed, fresh garden vegetables steamed to preserve their color, texture, and flavor, were a bouquet of pea pods, zucchini, broccoli florets, and carrot strips, perfectly at dente.

Service and presentation are as fine as the food—glasses were promptly refilled, cutlery replaced, dishes cleared, and our waiter could describe how the more exotic dishes were prepared.

Le Gueridon has no liquor license; bring your own wine and your waiter will deftly serve it and keep it chilled.

Barbara surrendered to white chocolate mousse cake slathered in whipped cream and raspberry puree and garnished with fresh berries. Decaf espresso capped a memorable meal.

As if it were not enough to be able to dine so lavishly here in the neighborhood, Le Gueridon owner/chef Alfred Iannelli (formerly of S.P.Q.R., N.Y.C.) is prepared to bring this kind of fare to your own home, office, or party site. Their "silver service" catering, complete to every detail and served with panache, can be hired for large or small affairs, and needs no further recommendation than a single visit to the restaurant.

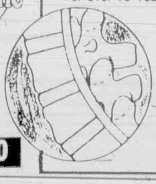

SINUS DISEASE

It was back in the Winter of 1983. The Belleville girls' basketball team was on the verge of one of its finest seasons. The team was drawing large crowds to its games and a player named Jennifer Apicella, then a junior at Belleville High, was nearing the 2000 point mark.

During a junior varsity game one evening in late January, a freshman forward made a quick move to the basket and drove the lane with authority. The player missed the shot, but it would become obvious early on that this player had excellent talent.

Before her basketball career was over, Desiree Johansen would lead her team in scoring one year and would play three different positions another year. And basketball wasn't the only sport that would occupy her time during the school year. She played tennis in the fall and softball in the spring.

Time has gone by too fast. Today, Johansen is a senior at Muhlenberg College in Pennsylvania and has wrapped up a standout softball career. Recently, she was selected to the NCAA Division III Central Region All-American team and the NCAA Division III Central Region All-tournament team.

Johansen, who hit .232, recorded 22 hits, 21 RBI's and three doubles. She was second on the team with 89 assists. Muhlenberg closed out its season with a 25-8 record, 10-0 in the Middle Atlantic Conference Southeast league.

Her four-year career stats were 105 games played, 326 at bats, 73 runs scored, 86 hits, 186 putouts, 247 assists, 15 doubles, one triple, one homer, five stolen bases, 66 RBI's and a career batting average of .264. She earned four varsity letters on the collegiate level.

But this is not just a story of impressive numbers and All American accolades. This is a story of young lady who worked hard for everything she attained. This is a lady who earned 11 varsity letters in her high school career. She worked her way to the number one singles player for the Lady Bucs tennis team.

She led the girls' basketball team in scoring in her junior year (1984-85), scoring over 30 points in three different games and averaging over 12 ppg for the year. She then sacrificed a good deal of her scoring prowess in her senior year to provide leadership to a very young team. Johansen played forward, center and point guard for the 1985-86 team.

But it was softball that Johansen enjoyed the most. In her freshman year, the spring of 1983, Johansen was asked to play third base. It was quite a step, considering the lady who played the hot corner the previous four years was a future Belleville Hall of Famer in Nancy Coffey.

Johansen never missed a beat, playing the position well and hitting varsity pitching with authority. She was a key player on the '83 team that won the county and conference championships.

In her sophomore season, Johansen moved to shortstop, a position she played for the remainder of her softball career. The softball team posted records of 24-5, 24-6 and 26-6 in Johansen's final three seasons and Desiree was one of two hitters on each team.

While Johansen worked extremely hard at all three of her crafts, she never forgot the most important function of school, academics. By her senior year, she was attaining a straight 'A' average in a tough curriculum.

She also spoke with pride about her family. Her mom and dad never missed a game. She raved about her twin brothers, then in grammar school, saying, "what good athletes they are." And of course, she spoke of her younger sister, Stacey (Latisaw), who was a standout pitcher on the Belleville Little League and destined to be a good pitcher for the Belleville softball team one day.

Anything else? Well, she was a class person about whom only the nicest things could be said, both from her teammates and teachers.

So it should come as no surprise that Desiree Johansen is an All American today. She attained that status in life a long time ago. It's hard to believe that she's 22 years old and ready to tackle the world. I still remember her as a kid who couldn't wait for her father to buy her a Cabbage Patch Doll.

Time has gone by.

"This game was a lot like the Livingston game (also a 3-1 loss, that coming in the County semi-finals)," Corino said. "We hit the

ball okay, but we made some mistakes in the field."

Johansen pitched the entire game for Belleville. She allowed just three hits and struck out three. For the season, the senior was 14-3.

Offensively, Johansen finished the '90 campaign on quite a roll. She homered in each of her last four games and Corino noted the homers were well hit.

"They were bullets. When they

left the bat, there was no question they were gone."

In the Linden contest, Johansen pitched four innings to win her 14th game. She struck out seven and walked two. Treicia Donnelly hurried the final inning for the Lady Bucs.

Johansen led the Belleville attack with three hits, including a double and homer. Jennifer Bridge was 2 for 4, Mia Hanos had a

double and RBI. Carey Woodruff had 2 RBI's and Amalia Fabiano collected two hits. Belleville had 11 hits on the day.

In the final league game of the season, Donnelly closed out her excellent career with a 5-2 victory over Paramus Catholic. The senior pitcher hurled a complete game, striking out two and walking one while allowing five hits. She finished the season with a 9-1 record.

Belleville scored three times in the first inning. Laurie Moyer hit a sacrifice fly to score Bridge, Colleen Mannion had a single that brought home Hanos and Woodruff's sac fly scored Johansen.

In the third inning, Johansen played home run derby again with a solo shot that increased the Belleville lead to 4-0. Later in the inning, Judy Krych singled to score Moyer with the fifth Belleville run.

Johansen and Bridge had two hits each. Moyer, Mannion and Krych had one hit each and one RBI a piece.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF BELLEVILLE IN THE COUNTY OF ESSEX AND STATE OF NEW JERSEY TO PROHIBIT LITTERING AND MANDATE LITTER DISPOSAL.
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE TOWNSHIP OF BELLEVILLE IN THE COUNTY OF ESSEX AND THE STATE OF NEW JERSEY, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. From and after the effective date of this Ordinance, the following regulations shall regulate littering in the:

(a) The term "littering" shall mean any used or uncleaned substance or waste material which has been discarded whether made of aluminum, glass, plastic, rubber, paper or other natural or synthetic material or any combination thereof including, but not limited to, any bottle, jar, can, any unlighted cigarette, cigar, match or any flaming or glowing material or any garbage, trash, refuse, debris, rubbish, grass clippings, leaves or other lawn or garden waste, newspapers, magazines, glass, metal, plastic or paper containers or other packaging or construction material, but does not include the waste of the primary processes of mining or other extraction processes, logging, sawmilling, farming or manufacturing.

(b) It shall be unlawful for any person to throw, drop, discard or otherwise place litter of any nature upon public or private property,

or other than in a litter receptacle or container designed for the collection of the particular item.

SECTION 2. The use of litter receptacles shall be required at the following public places, which exist in the municipality. The proprietor of these places or sponsors of these events shall be responsible for providing and servicing the receptacles such that adequate containment is available:

- (a) Building held out for use by the public, including schools, government buildings and railroad and bus stations;
 - (b) Sidewalks used by pedestrians in active retail commercially-zoned areas, such that at a minimum there shall be no single linear quarter-mile without a receptacle;
 - (c) All parks, beaches and bathing areas;
 - (d) All drive-in restaurants;
 - (e) All street vendor locations;
 - (f) All self-service refreshment areas;
 - (g) All construction sites;
 - (h) All shopping centers;
 - (i) All gasoline service stations islands;
 - (j) All campground and trailer parks;
 - (k) All marinas, boat moorings and fueling stations, all boat launching stations and all public and private piers operated for public use;
 - (l) All special events to which the public is invited, including sporting events, parades, carnivals, circuses, barbecues and festivals.
- SECTION 3.** It shall be unlawful for any person to discard or dump any litter on, or on or off any right-of-way, any household or commercial solid waste, rubbish, refuse, junk, vehicle or vehicle parts, rubber tires, appliances, furniture or private property, except by written consent of the owner of said property, in any place not specifically designated for the purpose of solid waste disposal or recycling.
- SECTION 4.** It shall be unlawful for any residential property owner to store or permit storage of any bulky household waste, including household appliances, furniture and mattresses, in areas zoned residential, except in a fully enclosed structure or during days designated for the collection of bulky items.
- SECTION 5.** It shall be unlawful for any

residential property owner to store or permit the storage of bulky items in areas zoned residential, except in a fully enclosed structure or on days designated for the collection of residential property.

SECTION 6. It shall be unlawful for any residential property owner to park or permit the parking of any vehicle on his or her residential lawn.

SECTION 7. It shall be unlawful for any person to keep or permit the keeping on streets, vacant lots and residential lawns except in a fully enclosed structure, any motor vehicle, trailer or semi-trailer, which is (a) missing tires, wheels, engine or any essential parts; or (b) which displays extensive body damage or deterioration; or (c) which does not display a current, valid State license; or (d) which is wrecked, dismantled or partially dismantled.

SECTION 8. It shall be unlawful for any vehicle to be driven, moved, stopped or parked on any highway unless such vehicle is constructed or loaded to prevent any of its load from dropping, sliding, leaking or otherwise escaping therefrom. Any person operating from which any glass or objects have fallen or escaped, which could cause an obstruction, damage a vehicle or otherwise endanger travelers or public property, shall immediately cause the public property to be cleaned of all glass or objects and shall pay the costs thereof.

SECTION 9. It shall be unlawful for any person, agent or contractor in charge of a construction or demolition project to permit the accumulation of litter before, during or after the completion of any construction or demolition project. It shall be the duty of the owner, agent or contractor in charge of any construction site to furnish containers adequate to accommodate flyable or nonflyable debris or trash at areas convenient to construction areas to maintain and empty the receptacles in a timely manner and with such a frequency as to prevent spillage of refuse.

SECTION 10. It shall be unlawful for any residential or commercial property owner to permit open or overflowing waste disposal bins on his or her property.

SECTION 11. It shall be the duty of the owner, lessee, tenant, occupant or person in charge of any structure to keep and cause to be kept the sidewalk and curb abutting the building or structure free from obstruction or nuisance of every kind and to keep sidewalks, arcways, backyards, courts and alleys free from litter and other offensive material. No person shall sweep into or deposit in any gutter, street, catch basin or other public place any litter or accumulation of litter from any public or private structure or driveway. Every person who owns or occupies property shall keep the sidewalk in front of his or her premises free of litter. All sweepings shall be collected and properly containerized for disposal.

SECTION 12. Any person, firm, corporation or association violating the terms of this Ordinance, whether as principal, agent or employee of another, shall be subject to a fine of \$100 for each violation. If the violation is of a continuing nature, each day during which it continues constitutes a separate and distinct offense.

SECTION 13. This Ordinance, pursuant to the provisions of N.J.A.C. 17:27, shall take effect 30 days after its final passage by the Township of Belleville and approval by the Mayor where such approval is required by law.

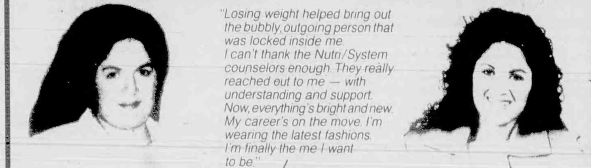

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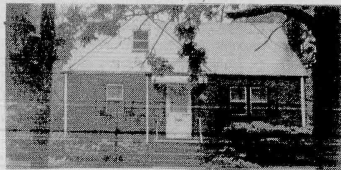

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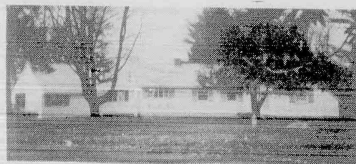

Did You Know??
