Aside From That

Our favorite candidate for Essex County Sheriff, Acting Sheriff Armando Fontoura turned up for Councilman Dr. Frank Noonan's pleasant bash on Saturday, reminding everyone that he has the name and looks of a silent screen film star. However, his name cannot match, in our opinion, that of Merle St. Amour, who had a passing resemblance to Louis Jourdan. Mr. St. Amour held sway in Bergen and Passaic counties back in the 1960s, and the rumor was that he could approach a dazzled housewife with the line, "What a set of beautiful new aluminum sidings you have, ma cherie! And that new bedroom extension! To say nothing of that new bathroom. Magnifique! And, regrettably, this will add a pretty penny to your assessment. Can you ever forgive me?" He added millions to the tax rolls, they tell me, before riding off into the sunset, or back to the Casbah. Collector Steve Vogel, eat your heart out! ●●●●● Actually, Vogel, or his office, at any rate, has been unusually popular in recent days with the taxpayers, who have been lining up to fork over their quarterly payments. It proves that Belleville people are responsible citizens, or that they don't trust the Postal Service. It also indicates that the economy is not completely dead. ●●●●● Aside from his encouragement of the Democratic cohorts, as exemplified by the campaign kickoff party held on his spacious lawn, Doc Noonan turns his hand to many other deeds of public service, including the whacking of the poison ivy vines that blanket much of the historic First Reformed Church cemetery. Doc became involved with the cemetery chore after attending a meeting in the church with the Belleville Historical Society which told of the need to preserve the cemetery in which many famed persons' remains are resting, or at least to clean out the underbrush and the weeds. A consummate gardener, Doc promptly volunteered to do the cleanup himself. Working Saturdays with his son-in-law, Phil Doyle, Doc Noonan has been uncovering treasures of day-lily, phlox and hosta which were planted many years ago and apparently forgotten. He is busy trimming trees so that the flowers will have more sunlight - "They need to be given a chance" - he says of the little fellows. "It's what's underneath that's important," he says, noting that his shovel keeps uncovering footstones and plaques laden with historic inscriptions. "This place really needs a competent scholar, or an archeologist," Noonan said. "It's a treasure trove of history." Assisting in the endeavor is Isabel Whittinger of the Society. "She's quite into flowers," Doc says. As far as he is concerned, "It's a labor of love." His immediate goal, after the cleanup, is to move around some of the spirea shrubs. "They give a yellow flower in June," Dr. Noonan said. "It'll be really beautiful."

Ed O'Neill is back from a visit to Louisville, Kentucky and a reunion of the Fourth Armored Division which he joined back in 1941 when it was formed at nearby Fort Knox. He never had a chance to see Louisville until now, and he is favorably impressed. The riverfront city has done much to beautify its waterfront and make it into a tourist attraction. "The streets are so nice and clean, and it reminds me of what they did in Charleston, South Carolina. When I came home, I walked down Main Street and looked at the river, and I wondered if something like that couldn't be done here, even if there isn't much left of the waterfront, what with the highway, and all." (It is our hope that with the establishment of Belleville's title as Birthplace of The American Industrial Revolution, a Historic District will be created and that a waterfront redevelopment will follow.) The Fourth Armored was commanded by Major General John Shirley Wood who overcame his middle name by being called Tiger Jack. More than 1,500 men died in the fighting that went from North Africa to the heart of Germany. Ed was nearly killed right here in Pine Camp, New York, when a malaria inoculation turned out to be nearly fatal. He spent the rest of the war in and out of Army hospitals, went back to being a longshoreman after recuperation, and retired to devote his interests to civic improvements in his home town. ●●●●● The whereabouts of Mary Pesci are particularly important to members of the Belleville Italian-American Civic Association as the October 26 Dinner Dance approaches. They know that actor Joe Pesci is likely to turn up for a visit home when his mother is in town, and the IACC would love to have Joe Pesci attend the dinner, where the guests of honor will be Connie Francis, Senator Carmen Orechio and journalist Ace Alagna. Pesci cannot be said to have won his Oscar on sheer good looks. He gave an incredible performance as a psychotic killer, and deserved the award. We wonder if Hollywood might ever get around to doing a movie on atomic scientist Enrico Fermi or New Jersey's Medal of Honor winner John Basilone, who chose to go back into combat after having won the medal on Guadalcanal, even though he was entitled to a discharge, and died for his country?

Schools bounced 35 illegals in drive against non-residents

Superintendent of Schools Michael Nardiello said that a drive to find non-legal students in the local public school system resulted in 35 non-residents being ejected.

Responding to complaints by residents of Belleville that non-residents were attending school at local taxpayers' expense, the Board of Education launched a drive this year against students not entitled to attend schools here.

The findings indicated that about one percent of the enrollment was made up of students living out of town.

The students had signed affidavits of residency, usually giving an address where they claimed to be staying.

Disproving the affidavit required visits to the residences as early as 7 a.m. to see if the student actually was there.

Most of the cases were based on anonymous tips, Nardiello said.

Nardiello declined to say where most of the non-residents lived, but other sources indicated that Newark residents, dissatisfied with the school system in that city, were most likely to seek education in other towns.

"Unfortunately," Nardiello said, "this puts considerable expense on our taxpayers."

Nardiello issued this statement: "Belleville schools are for Belleville residents."

"Non-residents, who illegally attend our schools, will be prosecuted in court."

"Tuition will be charged and the student will be transferred immediately."

So far, there is no report of any prosecutions, but the statement serves as a warning for the future, school sources said.

Cop talks man out of suicide

As an FBI hostage negotiations team and armed police waited nearby, Police Sergeant Edgar Panier spent more than an hour talking to an armed man at the Belleville Motor Lodge, persuading him at last to put down a loaded pistol and surrender, last Thursday morning.

Through the dialogue that took place as the man, 26-year-old Jonathan Rudin of Passaic, alternately aimed the gun at himself and then in any and all directions, Panier kept up a calm, sometimes humorous, sometimes cajoling flow of words.

Panier, who has been in the Belleville Police Department since

1973, has the reputation of being a raconteur, but this was the first time his assignment was to talk a man away from death.

Panier stood in the courtyard of the Washington Avenue motel, Rudin stood on a second floor balcony. A man with a history of mental problems, Rudin was upset over the recent breakup of his marriage.

He had been in a Passaic tavern earlier in the evening, getting drunk and talking of suicide. Then he seized a gun belonging to the tavern and rushed out. He was followed by three friends, young women who knew him.

The women followed him to the

motel and went to his room, trying to talk him out of using the pistol.

A guest at the hotel overheard the heated conversation and telephoned police, under the impression that the three women were being held hostage by an armed man. They later told police that they were friends, not hostages.

The call came to police headquarters at 4:15 a.m. and Panier was first on the scene.

Once disarmed, Rudin was arrested on a charge of illegal possession of a weapon. He was taken later to the state mental hospital at Ancora for observation. Panier and his fellow officers went back to regular duty.

Hoods ram patrol car

Two policemen were injured when juveniles rammed their patrol car with a stolen vehicle in an escape.

The incident began on Watchung Avenue, when police spotted a speeding car and took chase. The fleeing car dashed into Newark and police caught up with it on McCarter Highway near the Bishop Walsh Homes.

The police were about to leave their car to approach the suspects when the pursued car suddenly backed up with a rush of speed and smashed into the front of the patrol car. The force of the collision was such as to lock the two cars together.

The juveniles then fled their car and ran into the housing project, where police lost them.

Police Officers Raymond Kimble and Dante Pasquale were so battered by the collision that both were taken off duty.

Damage to the police car is estimated at nearly \$3,000. The Police Department is self insured, meaning that repair money has to come from the taxpayer.

2 car theft suspects held

An alert security guard at the Wallace and Tiernan plant called police to a nearby parking lot, Thursday night, where they found two stolen cars and a man and woman from Newark nearby.

The cars each had shattered steering columns and makeshift keys in their ignitions, and the motors were running.

One of the cars had a flat tire, apparently blown when the vehicle hit a curb in a fast exit from Route 21.

Police said they found burglary tools in the possession of Lawrence K. Ison, 38, of Newark. Mary McNair, 20, of Newark, was charged with possession of a weapon when police said they found a nine-inch locking blade knife in her possession.

Police said they also found a crack pipe and some Valium tablets on the suspects. Valium requires a legal prescription to buy. Mr. Ison was later turned over to the Morris County Sheriff's Office on a warrant from that office.

Fontoura warns of steroids

With the opening of schools, Acting Essex County Sheriff Armando Fontoura is warning parents of a "serious threat" of steroid use and abuse by some high school athletes.

Dangerous side effects, Fontoura said, include brain and liver cancer, impotence, cardiovascular problems, prostate enlargement, jaundice, high blood pressure, abnormal bleeding and degeneration of tendons and ligaments.

Other adverse effects are menstrual irregularities, baldness, acne, water retention, and "increased, almost uncontrollable aggressiveness, eventually leading to a compulsive, nearly addictive dependence."

Users exhibit symptoms such as sudden increase or decrease in weight, mood swings, breast development in boys or such masculine effects in girls as deepened voice or reduction in breast size.

Steroids can be legally obtained by prescription for the treatment of certain diseases but are also sold on a "growing" black market, the sheriff said.

They are used by some athletes in which speed and endurance are factors and have surfaced in high schools across the country. An estimated 250,000 adolescent athletes use steroids, the sheriff said.

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Golden Comments

Newly hired New Jersey school superintendents and administrative principals will not have the guarantee of lifetime jobs under a bill recently signed by Governor Jim Florio.

Assemblywoman Barbara Faith Kalik (D-Burlington), who sponsored the bill, said New Jersey was the "only state in the union that virtually guarantees these jobs for life."

"No other public or private agency grants lifetime jobs to people in policy-making positions, and school boards shouldn't be doing it with superintendents, either," she contended.

The new law permits school districts to enter into three- to five-year contracts with superintendents and administrative principals in lieu of tenure rights provided for teachers.

Superintendents and administrative principals who now have tenure will be allowed to keep their current status.

Florio said the short-term pacts will allow a school district to terminate the services of its top administrator

"without having to pay up to half a million dollars to buy out someone in whom the board of education has lost confidence."

"That's the kind of 'golden parachute' that people in the corporate world are starting to see as a mistake," the Governor said. "It's the same with taxpayer dollars."

The New Jersey School Boards Association said about \$5.8 million has been spent to remove superintendents since 1985. Individual buyouts ranged from a low of \$50,000 to a high of \$660,000.

The new law provides for the automatic renewal of superintendents' contracts unless a school board gives one year's notice that it will terminate the contract.

Under the law:

- If a lower-level administrator is promoted to superintendent in the same school district, and the contract is not renewed after the initial three- to five year period, that person can return to his former position in the system.
- School boards must evaluate

the performance of their superintendents at least once a year, and the school boards association will establish a training program for school board members on superintendent evaluation.

* A superintendent certification commission will be established in the Department of Education to develop a report on the "skills and knowledge" required to serve as a superintendent.

"The law the Governor signed is a reasonable, intelligent compromise that makes sense for school boards, superintendents, the needs of our children and the pockets of the taxpayers," Assemblywoman Kalik declared...the further stated that hiring decisions should not be "virtually irrevocable."

"These people are a school board hiring a superintendent, not the College of Cardinals electing a pope," she added. She noted, however, that school superintendents shouldn't have to run the risk of getting fired every time a school board member doesn't like something they do. They need some reasonable guarantee of job security.

Governor Florio, who supported the elimination of tenure for superintendents said, "most people believe that administrators should be more accountable to taxpayers, and I agree." He explained that, "when someone with management responsibilities has tenure, it's almost impossible to remove them. Under a system like that, there isn't enough accountability. That undermines people's confidence in how their money is being spent."

The tenure ban was opposed by the New Jersey Association of School Administrators and the New Jersey Education Association, the state's largest teachers union.

Library gets state grant to computerize records

The Belleville Public Library and Information Center has been awarded a grant by the New Jersey State Library to convert electronically the records of 11,000 children's books for the library's new computerized system of circulation and inventory control, Library Director David Bryant has announced.

As part of the Cooperating Essex County Libraries System (CECLS), the Belleville Library became eligible for the \$7,400 grant intended to help libraries share information about their book holdings.

Bryant stated: "This grant comes at a perfect time for us. We will be fully automated by late November."

"This grant will create a nearly ideal blend of funding with municipal support, monies from our recent inheritance and now - state funds as well."

"By gathering support from three sources, we will give Belleville a state-of-the-art automated library system at a reduced cost to local taxpayers."

Bryant added that the Library's renovation and restoration of its original Carnegie Library continues with a completion projected in December.

Normal library hours have been restored, as of Wednesday, but additional paint work may require occasional closings, Bryant said.

Count our school blessings

Among the nice things about the reopening of the public schools this year is that there is no teachers' strike in progress, no moves by the State of New Jersey to seize the schools and no other immediate crisis threatening the education of our children. There are communities that are not so fortunate.

There is of course, the effect of the cut in the budget mandated by the Town Council, and this is under appeal.

Even with the cut, and the probability is that the state will restore some of the money, the system continues to function.

There was the jolt this past summer when the state released raw scores indicating that Belleville students were low on the totem pole, compared to students in neighboring towns. But we agree with the school administration that these test results did not tell the true story.

Some 3,500 pupils will be in the schools. As usual, Belleville is absorbing new ethnic groups and meeting the challenge of bringing more children from other cultures into the American mainstream. This has been going on in Belleville since the time the Dutch arrived, followed by the British.

To judge the schools fairly, you have to examine the teachers and the administration, their dedication and their expertise.

The children are a variable over which no administration has any control, or should have. They are the raw material which the schools will fashion.

Much depends on the family unit, when the success or failure of a pupil is measured. The schools can do the best they can, and they will. How the child will respond is not always up to the teachers.

It is an unwanted compliment to Belleville schools that some 35 non-resident students have been found in the system. It is sad that youngsters who probably see Belleville schools as a better alternative to the schools in their own community have to be ejected.

It is sad that there is such a disparity between neighboring school systems but when we speak with envy of other schools' seeming achievements, let us not forget that Belleville schools seem pretty good to plenty of others.

The legacy of Frank Capra

The passing of film producer Frank Capra may not seem to have much impact on life in Belleville, but in truth, he was a powerful figure in our lives.

He directed at least three movies which did more than most books to shape the image that Americans have of themselves.

"Mr. Deeds Goes to Town," "Mr. Smith Goes to Washington" and "It's a Wonderful Life" say things to Americans that Americans want to hear, much as the paintings of Norman Rockwell showed us a life we would have liked to assume was the American way of life.

"Deeds" and "Smith" came at a time that most of us no longer recall—the terrible era of the Great Depression when Americans lost faith in themselves; the terrible era when totalitarian rule was on the march, and we feared for the future of democracy. The young men and women who went to war in those days took with them a picture of America that Frank Capra painted for them, in film.

And after the war, "Wonderful Life" was a reaffirmation of the same ideals that had stirred the nation during the war—the idea that one man's life could count, that no one was a nameless cipher, even in the industrialized society that our nation had become.

This native of Sicily loved and understood the American dream. He knew it was more than making a better living or having a better car or house. He knew that the basic truths about this country were love of freedom, respect for the individual and simple justice.

Other immigrants and sons of immigrants saw the same dream. A George M. Cohan or an Irving Berlin could sing the nation's songs to it because they had the same love for the people that Capra had.

It is the genius of America that it can transform people of all nations into people of one nation, and Frank Capra played a great role in that effort.

He is not to be mourned. He is to be emulated.

A word for Gabe

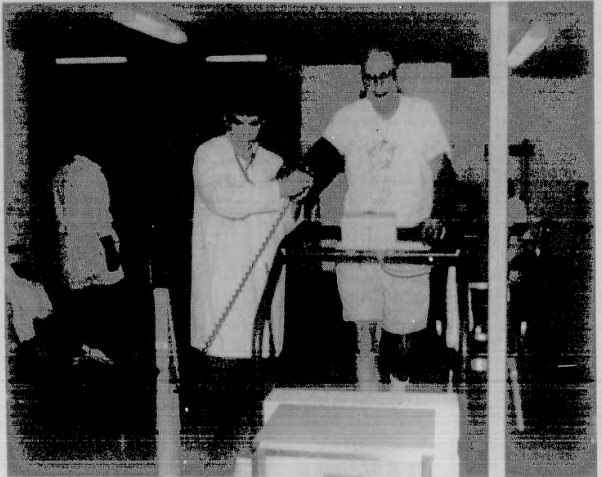
To the editor:

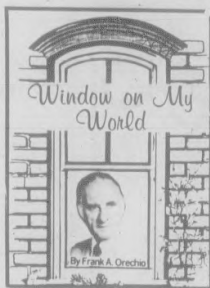
However, having worked with Mr. Nazzola in the past while

He loved life and lived it to the fullest. Although, ostensibly, he retired from business in 1982, the fact of the matter is he commenced a second career with the financial house, Merrill Lynch. Gene Boyle was devoted to his wife, Marge, his three sons, two daughters and his sister, Mrs. Cyril Forbes of Upper Montclair. Gene was an astute student of the political scene and relished the opportunity to have a political intelligent audience. He could tell a phony from the real thing. I developed an abiding affection for the man — in one word, he had character. Gene was admired and loved by legions of friends he made over the years through his activity in politics and in business. Gene is gone from among us, but he will never be forgotten.

• **PRESIDENT BUSH** was obliged to contend with a weekend demonstration near his home in Kennebunkport, Maine, by advocates for people with AIDS. I agree with President Bush when he observed that "behavioral change" is the best way to halt the disease's spread. More than 1,000 people marched through the center of Kennebunkport Sunday, scattering condoms and leaflets along the way. This is a disgraceful use of free speech. Bush is in favor of the most efficient and effective research possible. The President further observed, "I am in favor of compassion. I'm in favor of behavioral change. Here's a disease where you can control its spread by your own personal behavior." The President is absolutely right. Indiscriminate and loose sexual practices play a large part in the spread of AIDS. It is up to that small part of the population that indulges in these practices to curb its appetite for that type of sex that leads to AIDS in order to reduce the spread

of this dreaded disease.

• **I JUST** learned that an old friend who spent a decade of his life in this area died six months ago. He was Jerry Gay who became my business associate in New Jersey and Florida over an extended period of time. Jerry was 70 when he died from pneumonia. At the time of his death, he was living in the town that gave him birth, Anniston, Alabama.

• **AT LEAST** three citizens are reported to be gearing up for next May's Nutley Commission campaign. One is an incumbent, another is a male attorney, and a third is a female who believes local government can be improved upon.

• **THE Township** of Bloomfield is lucky. It has excellent, dedicated civil servants, among whom one is particularly outstanding, Frank Dominick, Director of Community Development. In my fifty years of actively studying the governmental scene in the area, Mr. Dominick, as a professional municipal employee, is a cut above the rest. A man known for unquestioned integrity, he has demonstrated ability, as a result of which, Mr. Dominick enjoys the trust and confidence of the civil servants he works with and the elected officials to whom he reports.

• **LABOR DAY** is now a thing of the past, and that occasion means the partisan political parties will start gearing up for the big show in November when the 80 Assembly seats and the 40 Senate seats are up for grabs. The Democrats control both Houses and the Office of the Governor. Republicans are determined to end Democrat control of the two houses in preparation to take over the State House in 1993.

Most of the Senate and Assembly seats will be decided not on the strength of the party, but on the popularity of incumbent Senators and Assembly persons in the districts where they have served.

In five districts, the new district lines may make a difference in the result which tilts toward the Republican Party in the Monmouth County area. The newest polls indicate Republicans will have a tough time winning either house. Passaic County's Senator Joseph Buhla is facing trouble in a three-way battle in November as is his Republican colleague in Atlantic County, Senator Bill Gormley.

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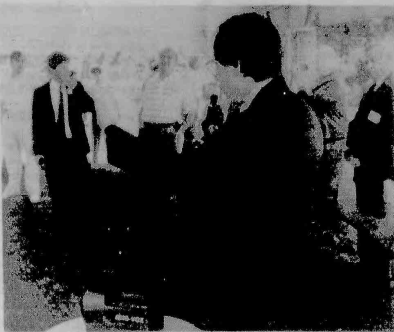

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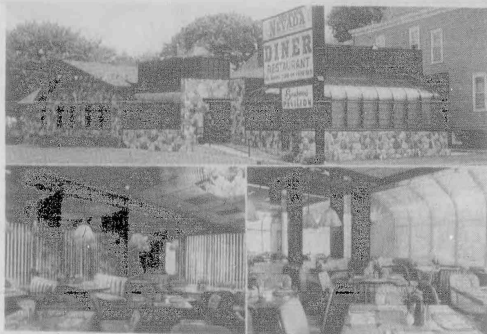

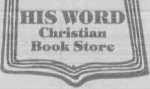

Busy time for '91-'92 cheerleading squad

It's become a familiar tune at Belleville football games. "One, two, three, four, five, my name's— and I want to say hi! Six, seven, eight, nine, ten back it out and meet my friend."

And the next cheerleader will step up and go through the same cheer. While the football players do their thing on the field, the Belleville cheerleading squad is busy doing its various routines in front of the home crowd. What the fans see on Friday evening's and Saturday afternoon's is the final product. What they don't see is the tremendous amount of hard work the girls put forth during the summer months in preparation for the gridiron season.

It's estimated that the girls practice between 80 and 100 cheers for a football game. In addition, the squad is working out the final details of a halftime dance performance. And, if that's not enough, the

team will compete in a cheerleading competition in January and February.

"It's a lot of work," said Dena Lacara, the team captain for the '91-'92 season. "But it's fun. The football games make it all worth while."

Although the girls don't get to see too much of the game because of their cheering, most of them will tell you about Bucaneer games of the past two or three years. They will tell you the final score, which Belleville player scored a touchdown, or who made a key tackle. And, most of all, they remember the Thanksgiving Day game with Nutley, whether it be a win or loss.

In the 1990-'91 season, Jenna Murphy and Danielle Italiano shared the captain's duties while Michele Pizzi and Cheryl Puleo were the co-captains. This year, Lacara is the only captain. Stacey Schwed and Jennifer Appruzzese, "veterans" of the sport of cheerleading are the co-captains.

The '91-'92 squad has been practicing two to three times a week during the hot summer months. They generally practice either at Clearmon Field or Municipal Stadium.

"Because of the work on the stadium, we've been practicing mostly at Clearmon," Lacara said. At a recent practice, the team added a new "hello" cheer, which features a strong gymnastics routine. The routine went off pretty well.

"This is great," Lacara said as she watched her team go through the routine. "This is the first time we've done the gymnastics routine with the cheer. The girls did a nice job."

Lacara, Appruzzese and Schwed watch the girls practice and quite often will stop them in mid-step to correct a routine.

"We've got ten new girls on the team this season," Lacara said. "There were a lot of seniors on last year's team."

The cheerleading advisor is Carol Russo. This is Russo's seventh year as the advisor and she is quite proud of the work her team devotes during the summer months.

There is a lot to do, Russo said in talking about the long hours. "It's not only cheering, it's all the practice time and the other activities the girls do."

Those other activities include the breakfast or dinner the girls hold before a football game. Each senior gets a chance to host the event. The season finale with Nutley is handled differently. The Nutley and Belleville cheerleaders hold a joint breakfast at the games' host high school.

The team is also quite involved in the anti drug program. The girls hand out red ribbons at a home game which promotes the "Say No to Drugs" campaign.

The girls also choreograph the dance which is held at pre game or at halftime of the Buc football

games.

Last season, Russo entered the team in a high school cheerleading competition and the girls did very well. The team placed fourth in a field of ten. Russo was very happy with that performance and this year, the team might take part in two different competitions.

That means additional practice time for the girls, especially during the Christmas holidays. This year, as mentioned, the team will add more gymnastics to its routines.

In addition to being fine athletes, the girls must also excel in the classroom. Russo expects every girl to maintain a strong grade point ratio and any decline in academic performance could mean suspension from the team.

Every year, the girls have to try out for the team, regardless of whether they cheered the previous season. The tryouts are judged by people who have no alliance to the Township of Belleville.

"The tryouts are tough," Russo said. "But the girls know what to expect."

Despite the long hours and hard work, the girls enjoy the routine.

"We can't wait for the first game," Lacara said. "It's going to be a night game, isn't it? (For the record, it probably will be). They (Hackensack) beat us last year, didn't they? We should have a good team this season."

And finally, as practice ended, she added one more thought.

"Wait 'till you see the dance. It's pretty good."

Not to be outdone, the Buc cross country squad came through with its own strong week, highlighted by the Essex County Invitational last Saturday morning.

Now you have to understand what a determined group of athletes the BHS harriers are. The team has shown so much improvement during the course of the year

and last Saturday, dividends were paid on the team's success.

Freshman runner Ross DeMeo has led the boys' team this year with four first place finishes while the girls' team has captured four of seven dual meets by the running of senior Barbara Gundry.

Last Saturday, the team fielded five runners at the Essex Catholic Invitational at Branch Brook Park. Four runners came home with medals with the fifth, Frank Trupia, coming through with his finest run of the year. Trupia, just a freshman, continues to improve steadily and will be a very competitive runner with added work.

DeMeo started the day off for the Bucs by placing 17th in a field of 130 in the freshman race. Ross's time of 12:00 for the 2.1 mile course was a fine effort and best of all, on the three runners from the Essex County area placed ahead of him. Lee Ann Long and Patty Bliss

were the next to capture honors by placing 14th and 15th respectively in the girls JV race. Over 40 runners competed and Long and Bliss were in the thick of the race for the majority of the 2.1 mile course.
