Times asks polygraph, drug tests for Township Manager, Assessor

The Belleville Times is requesting Township Manager Stephen Cuccio and Assessor Thomas Salzano to take polygraph and drug tests, in the wake of accusations made against the Times by Cuccio.

Cuccio informed the Belleville Times that he had seen Editor
Howard Klausner "rummaging
through papers" on the desk of
Township Clerk, Mary Lou Hood,
on Wednesday afternoon.

Cuccio is quoted by a Times employee as stating that if any

township documents were missing, he would have to assume they were taken by the Belleville Times and would report that to the State Commission of Investigation.

Cuccio has closed the Township Clerk's office to the press, or at least to the Belleville Times, claiming that it is a "restricted area".

Salzano was present in the Township Clerk's office while Klausner was visiting it, and summoned Cuc-

Township Clerk Mary Lou

Hood was on vacation. In the office was Assistant Clerk Kelly Nash.

Klausner was looking through a stack of newspapers on the floor, a few feet from the Clerk's desk, when Cuccio demanded to know what he was doing in the office.

Klausner replied that he was

looking for a newspaper.

Cuccio then told Klausner he had no business in the office and ordered him to leave.

Klausner did so, and a half hour later, Cuccio telephoned the Nut-

ley office of Orechio Publications, and spoke with Business Manager Arnold Ziem.

At that point, Ziem quoted Cuccio as saying that the editor was seen by him going through papers on Mrs. Hood's desk.

In view of these accusations, Editor Klausner has requested a polygraph test be taken by himself, Cuccio and Salzano, as to the facts, and that drug tests be given the participants as well, to ensure that the polygraph tests are untainted.

A day of remembrance observed in Belleville as tribute is paid to our nation's war dead

Under graying skies, reflecting the sombreness of the occasion, the community paid its tribute to the fallen of the nation's wars.

To Belleville, whose citizens have participated in every war since the American Revolution, the observances began near the Reformed Church Cernetery where the remains of 62 Revolutionary War soldiers are at rest.

The Rev. Richard Moheit, Paster of the Reformed Church offer.

tor of the Reformed Church, offer-

ed the opening prayers on the Rutgers Street Bridge, itself named after a prestigious Belleville family. The services then moved to the Municipal Building, where tribute was paid to the deceased Firefigh-ters and Police of Belleville, a tradition going back more than half a century.
At 9:45 a.m., a separate ceremo-

ny was held at the Disabled American Veterans Post on Washington Avenue, where a plaque bearing


the names of World War II dead was dedicated.

Finally, at 10 a.m., the traditional ceremony was held at the Veterans Memorial on Union Avenue, where the Reverend Gary Ward of St. Stephens Church in Kearny delivered a eulogy for the Four Chaplains who lost their lives in the sinking of the troopship Dorchester, having given their lifejackets to others as the ship went down off Greenland in 1943.

One of the Chaplains, the Rev. John Washington, had served at St. Stephen's before entering military





We are informed of more Belleville men whose names should have been listed among the War Dead appeared in the Memorial Day edition of the Belleville Times. United States Marine Corps Sergeant Rene Flory, Jr. was the first Belleville man to fall in the Korean War. Sergeant Flory is memorialized with a plaque on the grounds of School Seven. Bernard O'Conner and Kevin Kennedy annually place a Flag at the monument. • • • Among those who fell in World War II is Lleutenant Roger Melonle, an Army Air Force Pilot, who was the victim of an airplane crash. The Hebrew School of Congregation Ahavath Achim is named in his memory. • • • Army Air Force Sergeant Frank H. Metzler, Tail Gunner aboard a bomber was lost on a mission over Europe. His cousin, Mrs. Irene Sullivan of Belleville, reports that Sgt. Metzler's younger brother. Charles was reported Missing in Action in the Battle of The Bulge but was found hospitalized, and sent home because of battle injuries. • • • Army Air Force Lieutenant James O'Neil, a Navigator aboard a bomber, was shot down on his 23rd mission over Europe. His brother, Ed O'Neil, is Town Historian. • • • Joseph Zecker was an Infantryman who fell in Italy. His boyhood neighbor, retired Township Treasurer Isadore Padula brought his name to the attention of the Times.

While the list was gathered painstakingly by Joseph Fornarotto from records made available by the Department of Defense, it is our assumption that the record keeping may not be absolutely perfect, and we suspect that other names are missing, as well. Izzy recalled that his older brother, Joseph was reported Missing in Action at a time he was actually in a military hospital. Fortunately, Joe Padula had been able to make a telephone call home before the telegram arrived. Joe spent a year in the hospital, and he still carries shrapnel fragments from a German mortar shell that wiped out the patrol in which he was serving at St. Lo.. • • • Joe Padula, incidentally, entered Clara Maass Medical Center last week for treatment of a recurring heart condition dating back to his military service. For him, it has been a long war. ● ● We are informed that Federal Bureau of Investigation Agent Jim Lamb is heading the unit investigating the death of the late James Randazzo in which a couple of Belleville men are alleged to be prime suspects. One of the last times the FBI was in town was to issue subpoenas to the Belleville Public Library to obtain a look at the library cards. The idea was to find out who had been taking out books on bomb making, high explosives and other exciting reading. Because state law prohibits the library from giving out this sort of information, the FBI had to go to court to get into the files. We do not know if any arrests resulted, although there is a rumor the Library asked for help in tracking down some

delinquent borrowers. Kim Lui, a Registered Nurse who recently moved into Belleville with her husband, was asking for information about jogging tracks, bicycle paths and ice skating rinks, recently. Nurse Lui, a tall, attractive blonde with the lean physique of a long distance runner, hails from a part of the country dear to our memories - Madison County, State of New York, By The Grace of God, Free and Independent. The "free and independent" phrase comes from the terminology used in salutations, proclamations and other legal documents issued by the State. • • • We recall Madison County because as a teen-ager, we went up from our Brooklyn, New York homestead with other students to pick peas and beans there. Not for us were the fly-blown barracks of the migrant workers who actually made their livings up there. We were housed among the good folk of Morrisville who usually provided winter lodging for students of the Morrisville Agricultural and Technical School. That meant cozy feather beds in meticulously clean homes, and a ready supply of home baked cakes, crullers and pies from our friendly landlords and landladies. They taught us square dancing and how to judge the incoming weather from sighting the moon, and they were - and are - the salt of the earth, looking after the ill and the homesick with genuine concern. • • • • While we busily destroyed the local crops, the pickers who came from other parts provided the real farm production. We met migrants white and black - from the Deep South, and we met Barbadans who said they made more money doing crop work there then they did as teachers, lawyers and accountants in their native islands of the Caribbean. In the fields, everyone was good natured and co-operative, a handy trait when you were pulling a half dozen 35-pound baskets of produce a mile back to the weigher. We were confounded to witness middle aged women outpicking us three baskets to one. We were confounded to witness nine-year-olds outpicking us three baskets to one. When rain would drive us all together into an available barn, these rain soaked families would do group singing and even dancing that would have been creditable for a Hollywood production. There is such a thing as American and Caribbean work song, folk song and Gospel that make up a treasure which we hope has not vanished, but today's pickers carry CD players with them now. • • • In any event, Mrs. Lui comes from the same stock that beat the Redcoats at Saratoga and the Confederates at Gettysburg and left us with a great respect for the York Staters who lived then and live y that wonderful motto - "By The Grace of God, Free and Independent". • • • A recent report on the Silver Lake Association left out a bit of information on how to join the organization. The telephone number is (201) 759-2102 - we hope.

Zilch says, "The KKB wants to put them back to work, building summer homes for Council Majority members."

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

Whitman, Edwards, Wallwork

Tuesday, Republican Party members will have the opportunity to select one of three candidates as their gubernatorial nominee. Former Attorney General Cary Edwards, former State Senator James Wallwork and former Somerset County Freeholder Christine Whitman are seeking the honor of representing their party.

Professional politicians following the election have the perception that Wallwork is a blip on the horizon with Whitman and

Edwards in a tight race for the nomination.

We like all three candidates. Each in her or his own way has something to contribute to the General Election dialogue with incumbent Governor Jim Florio.

Regardless of who wins the Republican nomination, that person will not have an easy time defeating Governor Florio.

Usually, only a small number of voters take the time and trouble to vote in a Primary Election. For the most part, voters do not like to commit themselves to a particular party which is the case when one votes in a Primary Election.

'We are all Americans'

(The Belleville Times is pleased to reprint the remarks of the Rev. Gary Ward, delivered at the Belleville Memorial Day Observance, 1993.)

"I, myself, am from this town of Belleville. I grew up here; I went to

school here; my family still lives here.

"I am here this morning to speak about four individuals, four men who dered their lives for their country in World War II. They are known as the

Four Chaplains.

"I am here to represent them on this, the 50th anniversary of their deaths, because one of them, Father John Washington, answered the call to serve his nation during World Wazr II, and left to be an Army Chaplain from the same Parish where I now serve, St. Stephen's in Kearny.

"Father Washington found himself on board the troopship, the U.S.A.T. Dorchester along with three other Chaplains, the Rev. George Fox, a Methodist minister from Virginia, Rabbi Alexander Goode from Pennsylvania and the Rev. Charles Poling, who was from a Dutch Reformed Church in New York. Also on board were 904 service people from the various armed services. from the various armed services.

"On Feb. 1, 1943, the Dorchester sailed from Staten Island to Boston en route to Greenland. In the early morning hours of Feb. 3, 1943, nbear St. John's, Newfoundland, the Dorchester was torpedoed by a German U-boat. Teh Dorchester sank in a matter of 20 minutes.

"In that time, however, amidst all the turbulence, the four Chaplains assumed positions of responsibility and service as they helped the crew members on board to procure life jackets and helped them off the ship into waiting life boats.

"When all the life jackets had run out, the four Chaplains took their own life jackets off their very own backs and gave them for the safety of others.
"The Chaplains went down with the ship in the cold dark icy waters of

the North Atlantic. "Of the 904 people aboard, 678 lost their lvies. The Four Chaplains freely surrendered their lives out of love and service for the one God they

served, the one Nation they served. "This is the lesson which they leave us.
"When they were helping with the life i ckets, they did not ask others to

which race they belonged or what their ethnic background was or what their religion was. They were serving people in need.

Theres is an invaluable lesson in this for all of us to learn from to grow

from and to be inspired by.

"We can make our homes, our town, our nation all better places in which

to live by the respect and dignity that we show to all people. Though we have difference, we are all Americans! We all inhabit the world together!

"In St. Stephen's Church there is a stained glass window depicting the memory of Father John Washington. On it there is a picture of the sinking of the U.S.A.T. Dorchester and there is a quote from the Gospel of St. John: "Greater love than this no one has than to lay down his life for a friend. (John 15:13).

"This quote applies to all the brave men and women who have offered their lives in war - not only for friends - but also for strangers so that all of the could continue to enjoy the blessings which are ours in this great Nation.

would continue to enjoy the blessings which are ours in this great Nation. The Four Chaplains stand as an enduring testimony to the words of a

song which we sing so often:
"America, America, God shed His Grace on thee, and crown thy good with brotherhood from Sea to shining Sea."

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





Helping children understand forests as natural resources

Did you know that it takes over 500,000 trees, an entire forest, to supply Americans with their newspapers every week? While working or playing outdoors this spring, help children understand the importance of trees as a natural resource.

The value of trees cannot be overestimated. Trees produce oxygen and filter our air, thus reducing air pollution. Trees growing around our roads, highways and buildings reduce noise. Forests provide homes, shelter and food for animals and recreation areas for people. They are important in preventing erosion and filtering water back into underground water supplies. Through decomposition (natural breakdown of dead material) trees provide nutrients to the soil.

While you work, ask your children to name all of the products they can think of that come from forests; name the animals that depend upon forests for food and shelter; relate ways they use forest areas for recreation. Think about sitting under a tree on a very hot day. Would you feel cooler? Plant a tree together.

While you rake winter leaves, talk about the life cycle of leaves and plan a picture story of how the leaves turned from green to brown and then fell to the ground. When you have accumulated a pile of decomposing leaves, spread them out on newspaper and examine them together. Look for fungus, bugs or worms. Explain how the leaves decompose, provide food for small animals and add humus (decaying material releasing nutrients) to the soil, which then provides the nutrients to new plants.

A fun and productive activity is to prepare a compost pile in your back yard using soil, yard waste and leftover vegetable matter. The resulting compost can be used for fertilizer for your garden. Many homeowners make compost piles in their yards. You can obtain information and directions on composting from your local Rutgers Cooperative Extension office.

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

There were two ways to go, give

up and mail in the season, or rally and make something out of the last three weeks.

Grande's troops chose the later alternative, and the result was a tremendous finish. The Bucs won two games last week, defeating Don Bosco 4-3 and then rumping past Nutley, of all teams, 13-3 in the season finale.

The two victories gave Belleville a 13-12 record for the 1993 campaign, the first winning record for Belleville baseball in a few years.



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






Kevin Johansen heads into third after banging triple against Don Bosco. Johansen, in addition to pitching well, was an outstanding defensive player at shortstop.

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




