# State Commission of Investigation agent denies giving Manager any legal opinion

If Township Manager Stephen Cuccio and an agent of the State Commission of Investigation dis-cussed the Rasmussen Memo, each has come up with different versions

has come up with different versions of the meeting. Manager Cuccio stated to the Belleville Times that on July 29, he asked Agent Grant Cuzuppe -whom he knew only as "Grant" - if there had been anything wrong about his presenting an unsigned memorandum to the Township Council in which the Resumerson Council in which the Rasmussen Agency was touted as best liability insuror for the Township.

Councilman Bill Cook said that

the action was "unethical" because the Council was not told the memo had been written by a Rasmussen employee

Cook said this was tantamount to

"bid rigging". Cook and Councilman Thomas Spillane also asked Township Attorney Robert Giordano to bring the matter to the attention of the Essex County Prosecutor, which Giordano did the following day.

According to Cuccio, the SCI agent, who has been visiting Belleville since Jan. 15 on an inquiry into Township affairs, advised him that

the matter was of no interest to the SCI

Cuccio quoted Cuzuppe as stat-ing to him: "It had nothing to do with bid rigging. Insurance is not a biddable item. You were only trying to save the Township money." money

The Belleville Times contacted the SCI headquarters in Trenton, and asked for confirmation of the conversation by Agent Cuzuppe.

SCI Executive Assistant Thomas Cannon said he had talked with Cuzuppe, and that Cuzuppe had denied that any such conversation had taken place. "No SCI agent would give legal

advice, in any case," Cannon said. Deputy Mayor Mario Drozdz said it was his understanding that 'the SCI had cleared Cuccio of any wrongdoing".

So far, there is no allegation by any official body that any wrongdo-ing did occur. As it turned out, Cuccio suggested that the Gallagh-

er Insurance Agency be retained as the liability insuror for Belleville. Drozdz cast the sole vote against this. Mayor Marina Perna abstain-

Drozdz has issued this statement to the Belleville Times:

"Gallagher Insurance's proposal isnot subject to a sealed bid. A

"I do not understand why the Council did not accept Ras-mussen's proposal for \$383,204 with a SIR of \$25,000, versus Gallagher's of \$100,000 for a cost of \$394,458.

"The action puts the Township

at a higher risk, which I cannot accept, and does not protect the interest of the taxpayers.

"Upon adoption of the Resolution awarding the contract to Gal-lagher, I still have not seen the E.N.T. and Recreational Policy, not to mention that ther is a limit on the Lloyd's coverage. Also, Lloyd's presently has financial problems according to a recent news article.

"I think Bill Cook has not released all of the figures and fact to the papers. In my opinion, this is not the best proposal (Gallagher's) for the Township of Belleville and its taxpayers.

## Library strikes out, Mental Health scores as Council works on final budget changes

Nicholas Roosevelt had first patent

The Township Council work ses-The Township Content work ses-sion on Monday rebuffed a Public Library request for the restoration of \$29,000 to its budget, but increas-ed the outlay for Mental Health Services from \$25,000 to \$60,000.

The only hope the Library may have that some money might yet be restored lies with Deputy Mayor Mario Drozdz, who seemed inclined to deny the money, but talked about the possibility of State Aid making up the shortfall. The fear expressed by a support-

er of the Library request, Councilman Tom Spillane, was that once the library functioned for several months without a Dorector, the Council would decide to have it run without a Director for 1994.

Carol LaMin of the Library said that she and Acting Director Adrea Cohen were facing an overload of work, and now they would be unable to find a full-time Director to alleviate the burden.

Alice Ricci, Executive Director

of the Community Mental Health Services made an almost tearful plea for restoration of the cut that reduced the Township support of the Services from \$69,000 to \$25.000.

We can understand a 10 percent cut, but not a cut of such propor-tions. It endangers our entire program," she said.

Ms. Ricci noted that almost 500 Belleville residents have received help so far this year, at costs of \$8 an hour, whereas they would have to find private counseling at many times that figure if Services could not provide it.

Councilman Dr. Frank Noonan said it was he who had suggested the cut, because he felt that the Board of Education should shoulder more of the cost.

Dr. Noonan remained the sole holdout when the Council voted to bring the appropriation up to \$60,000, still \$9,000 under the current outlay.






BEFORE THE CLEANUP - Ed O'Neil observes the terrible state of the curbside area near the Rutgers Street Bridge, left overgrown and desolate.

A very happy 25th birthday to Tina, who has fought a lifelong battle against epilepsy, and who underwent pioneer surgery last year to ease her condition. Tina, whose photograph has appeared in the Belleville Times for her exploits in the Special Olympics, had been in a deteriorating state of health. She was experiencing 60 seizures a month, of worsening magnitude. One seizure was so severe, her mother reports, that she found herself with her "Grammy" and "Grampy" before she returned to the land of the living. • • What appears to have brought her back to at least a condition that the human body can endure were two surgical removals of "hot spots" from her brain. These procedures were tried for the first time by surgeons at New York Hospital last November. Each operation, which required the removal of small portions of the brain, cost \$255,000, and Tina's mother is paying \$60,000 of that cost - but she says the price was nothing for the results achieved. • • • • "The number of incidents has dropped from 60 to six a month. There were a couple of hot spots that were in parts of the brain that they couldn't reach. But it saved Tina's life." Tina goes daily to her job at the West Essex Center for Epilepsy and is proud of her achievements there. "When we go shopping, sometimes I take my money out of my purse to give to Mummy to buy things," she said. Her recovery and improvement have continued at a rapid pace, daily nurse's care unnecessary. Tina meets with her friends, some of them from the school for children with learning disabilities which she has attended, and her mother reports that her abilities and her self-confidence are increasing all the time. "I want more people to know that this surgery can improve conditions they thought were impossible," her mother said. • • • Frank Zatorski said he was really feeling down a few years ago. His career as a truck and car rental manager had ended with the closing of the firm. And his doctors told him that he had two blocked arteries to his heart, and the other arteries weren't in such good shape, either. That was in 1984. A Navy Gunner's Mate aboard the U.S.S. Worcester during the Korean War, he turned to the Veterans Administration for help. Medicine rather than surgery was used to unblock his arteries, and something else happened to unblock his outlook on life. "I got involved with the Golden Age Olympics that the VA sponsored. It got me interested in things again." He had always been a competitor, and now he found himself involved with athletics which he had never known - horse shoe throwing and shuffleboard among them. "I would have tried tennis, but I have a sort of stiff leg. So I went out to Michigan, where they had the National Tourney, and I really enjoyed it. I met a bunch of wonderful guys, and we were treated like kings, all the way from the airport to the hotel. And it was like a regular Olympics, with a parade through town and bands and all the rest. But after the fun, it was serious competition." • • • • When it was over, he had won an oversize Silver Medal for horseshoes. "I'd never played horseshoes in my life, until I started with the Olympics. I asked the fellow who came in first how often he practiced. He said three hours a day." He found a friend in the Gold Medal winner, and with everyone else he met. Then, this year, in Johnson City, Tennessee, he won his second Silver Medal, this time for Shuffleboard. "My son met me at the airport and asked what did I bring back for him. So I showed him the medal. I think even he was impressed."

Frank is married to the former Marian Blozen who also grew up in Newark and knew him since childhood. Son Frank Jr. lives in Nutley and daughter Jacqueline Gardner lives in Belleville. Grandson "D.J." - David Joseph, is two-and-ahalf, and active enough for the whole family. ••• • Frank became interested in helping the V.A. patients who were not in as good condition as he. He has organized an annual Palm Sunday Easter Party at the hospital in East Orange and this year he raised \$1,000 to fund it. He is also involved with the Belleville Lodge, Benevolent and Paternal Order of Elks and this past Saturday, he was handing out equipment at the Elks' Annual Golf Tourney held at Hendricks Field. "Golf? I never played golf. I've always been a Working Man," Frank Zatorski said. From Amsterdam, The Netherlands, from which much of Belleville's history flows, comes word that Arian Hijstek of the import firm of Brunschwij Chemia, is in the market for American chemical products. George Johnson, a Printer of the Old School, dropped by recently. Mr. Johnson started in the business in 1929, and he goes back to the time when handset type was still being used by some weeklies he helped print. He weathered the Depression - "We worked for peanuts" - and he was most of his career with International Ticket in Newark. The city was one of the great centers of printing in the United States, and while a good deal of the industry is still there, there is less of it. And the days of hot lead and cold steel are pretty well gone, too. By the 1970s, the printing industry had turned to photooffset, and pages are pasted up, rather than laid out in sticks of type. The heavy rotary presses with their lead forms wrapped around the cylinders of the presses have been replaced by lightweight aluminum sheets. These days, when a newspaper changes hands, it's the engravers who are dismissed - usually with a healthy buyout, but not always. • Mr. Johnson very nearly did not get started at all. At the age of three, careless use of matches burned his left side to the point where he was one of the worst cases in history to survive. He lay six months on his back, strapped between banks of burning electric lights, which were supposed to aid the healing process. He still cannot raise his left arm high, but he managed to learn his trade, and he was a good Union man, becoming Shop Steward at his firm. "We never had a strike, but we were close to a few." There was marriage, a son - now in Florida and retirement in 1984. By that time, there wasn't much to retire from. An age of American industry had ended, but the craftsmanship that went into creating America's second largest industry was provided by people like George Johnson.


## Thief uses fire threat into the store around 11:17 p.m.

The victim, a 43-year-old Belleville man, said the intruder walked


carrying a pail filled with gasoline. The thief produced a cigarette lighter ordered the clerk to empty the cash register, and then fled on foot with the cash.

percent of the class.



## **Finding the facts**

We were happy to hear from Executive Assistant Tom Cannon of the State Commission of Investigation that no free legal advice is offered by any of its agents in general, and by Investigator Grant Cuzuppe in particular.

Mr. Cuzuppe has actually won the respect of many citizens of Belleville who might otherwise look upon him as an intrusive visitor.

The Belleville Times casts no reflection on him, or his associates, as we express our regret that an SCI investigation was ever called in the first place.

We suspect that Belleville's reputation in other parts of the state is based upon the constant reference in the daily newspapers of accused wrongdoers, and the constant failure to show Belleville in any other light.

Our neighboring dailies to this day cannot bring themselves to accept Belleville as the place where the American Industrial Revolution actually began.

We do not know what sort of report Mr. Cuzuppe and his associates will bring back to Trenton.

But we hope there visit here has shown them that Belleville people by and large are honest people, good citizens and an example of the American Dream in action.

## More Library, not less

The decision of the Township Council to deny restoration of cut in funding for the Belleville Public Library and Information Center will have one immediate effect. The Library will not have a full time Director for the rest of the year.

And there is every likelihood that the Council majority will tell the Library that if it got along without a Director for most of 1993, it can get along without one in 1994.

But a good Library needs good direction.

Some people seem to regard a library as some stacks of books with a few people running around to hand them to you.

Instead, they should realize that the pennies saved each taxpayer would not make up for the enrichment lost to the public.

The availability of ideas and information made possible by the Library, and the guidance and inspiration offered by the professional Librarians, is matched only by the school system in importance to our quality of life, and unlike the schools, they are available to all age groups.

Closing the Library for longer hours is not a good answer, when we need more of the Library, not less.

## Down on Library

#### To the editor:

As a "concerned" citizen, attending just about every public Town Council meeting, at times I find it most difficult to Town Council meeting, at times I find it most amount to believe what I am hearing... Such a time was at the public budget hearing of Tuesday evening on July 27th. Ms. Margery Lord, President of the Friends of the Library, accompanied by several members created the impression that she is the spokesperson not only for her organization, but in fact for every citizen of Belleville. Seated next to her was the acting Director of the Library, Ms. Adrea Cohen, lending importance to what the spokesperson came there to say.

Reading from a 3-page dissertation, touching on the importance of the public library and it's legendary history, she concluded with an appeal to the Council to restore a \$29,247 cut in the library budget. Since she indicated that without the additional money, for all intents and purposes the library would cease to function at its present level. Since it is a fact that Belleville needs a functioning library, this kind of rhetoric turns the "appeal" into a mandate, enforced with coercion!!!

Adding more ammunition to force the Council to grant this "mandate" and add the \$29,247 to the taxburden of the financially strapped Belleville citizens, came with an address by the acting Director of the Library, Ms. Adrea Cohen. Ms. Cohen stated that in 1988 the library enjoyed a much larger staff than today. Since we have not heard any complaints the library currently is not functioning properly, we can safely conclude the facility was grossly over-staffed at that time. It has also been reported that during that same time frame, salary increases of some 13% a year were "enjoyed"! When news of this leaked out, in addition to many other alleged irregularities this leaked out, in addition to many other alleged irregularities in connection with the operation of the library (there is the matter of how a \$300,000 legacy was spent) many of the taxpayers expressed their indignation, because they assumed the benefactor intended her legacy to further improve the function of the library, instead of "angels on the ceiling" or furniture so ornate it's use is discouraged.

As I stated at the public budget hearing, when all of the above was aired, perhaps we should question the competence of the director, claiming the library will "cease to function at it's present level" without the additional tax burden of \$29,247. The Town Council is mindful of the annual tax increases of around \$500 in recent years, and the taxpayers are mindful some of the increases were related to the excesses of the library. Cornelis P. ## **Cultural** index


#### To the editor


But the question for any foe of Governor Florio is simply this. How differently would you have handled the problems particularly the deficit problem - that he faced when he took office?

The anticipation had been building for about 24 hours. It was Wednesday morning, July 28. I was in San Diego, California and it was surprisingly overcast. But it didn't really matter. In a matter of hours, I would get into my rent-a-car, and take about a one hour

As I drove up Interstate 5, I began to think about the questions would ask at this appointment, which was actually an interview. I didn't know how receptive the person I was going to interview was going to be. Prior to July 28, I had called his secretary and she

said that he would be "happy to meet with me". But this was an interview with one of basebail's most successful managers over the past two decades, and I didn't want to walk into this guys office and sound like a Cardinal fan who somehow had gotten past the security at Anaheim Stadium.

I didn't know whether this person would talk a lot, or if I would have to keep the conversation going. I didn't know whether he would give me five minutes, or 35 minutes.

All I did know was that at 4:30 p.m., Pacific Standard Time, I was going to finally meet my main man in baseball, a guy that I went through the 1980's with and endured good and bad times as a Cardinal fan.

I got to the Big A, as expected, at 4:15 p.m. and ventured over to Gate A, where the receptionist instructed me to take the elevator to the second floor.

As I departed the elevator, the big doors leading to the California Angels Executive Offices beckoned. There was no turning back now. I walked in, and informed the receptionist who I was.

A minute or two later, the secretary appeared from a large door

and introduced herself. "Mike?," she said. "Hi, I'm Joann Story. Nice meeting you." "Same here," I said.

"It's going to be a few minutes. Do you mind waiting?," was her next question.

"No problem," I said. Actually, I was relieved because it gave

me a few minutes to get some questions together. While I did that, a few players from the Angels walked by and the Angels manager, Buck Rodgers, came in to check on messages. It was 4:40 now, and the game with the Oakland A's was set to start at 7 p.m.

The receptionist looked over at me and said, "Joann just called, it's going to be a few more minutes. Do you mind waiting? "No problem," was once again my answer.

At 4:50 p.m., Joann Story entered the lobby. "Mike," she said.

"Yes," as I expected her to tell me that it would be a few more minutes.

"Whitey will see you now."

This was it! In a matter of seconds, I would be sitting in Whitey Herzog's office and talking baseball with a guy that has devoted his entire professional life to the game. A guy that directed my Cardinals to three N.L. East crowns in

the 80's, three National League championships and one World Series crown while losing in game seven two other times.

A guy that led the Kansas City Royals to three straight A.L. West titles in the 1970's, only to come up short against the New York Yankees in the American League championship series three straight times

A guy that in 1990, walked away from the Cardinals because he felt the players just weren't giving it their best and management wasn't going to back him up.

A guy that today is the main guy in the California Angels organization, the Senior VP for player personnel. This was the chance to meet, and talk baseball with, "The

White Rat.

It would be an interview that I will never forget, and next week,

season. Bill Ingraham's team won two more games last week, stopping Hillside 5-4 in extra innings and defeating Millburn 2-1 as Glen Agens and Sal Tremel combined to hurl a no-hitter for the Bruins. The two wins improved Belleville's record to 24-14. The resultar season concluded

The regular senson concluded earlier this week when Belleville played the remainder of a game with the Nugents Black Sox in a game that was protested and came out in Belleville's favor.

The Bruins have a shot at third place, but in order for the team to accomplish that, they needed to beat Verona and Nugents earlier this week and had to hope that third place Cranford dropped its season finale to first place Verona.

The top six teams will qualify for the ECBL playoffs, which commence this weekend. The worst case scenerio for the Bruins is a fourth place finish and a first round battle with the Crescent Eagles. All playoff rounds are best two out of three

The two victories last week were especially impressive because the Bruins didn't hit the ball particularly well and had to rally from defecits to prevail.

Entering the final two games of the regular season, Belleville has won 12 of its last 14 games, improv-ing from a 12-12 mark to the current record of ten games over .500.

Against Hillside, the Bruins took an early 1-0 lead by scoring an uncarned run in the third inning. Mike King reached safely on an error and came around to score on a throwing error.

Hillside scored four times in the fourth inning off starting, and eventual, winning pitcher, Frank Gallagher. The Union County team collected five hits in the frame and took a commanding 4-1 lead into the fifth inning.

In the Belleville fifth, the Bruins chipped away. Rich Quine and King singled and Jason Nardachone singled to score Quine. On Nardachone's single, King was out attempting to take third base. Nardachone, who went to second cat his hit and eventual play on King, scored on a Mike Salvanto single. Relieville tied the game in the sixth when Pat Grady walked and eventually socred when Quine hit into a fielders choice.

In the eighth, the Brivins accored the winning run. Once again, Grady walked and moved two bases on a simple ground out. He scored on a sec fly by Anthony

Mielnicki Gallagher hurled the first seven innings and was credited with the win. Paul Mirabella, the former major lengue pitcher who is quick-by becoming the "Dennis Eck-ersley" of the ECBL, came in to with the cichth busines and second pitch the eighth inning and recor-ded the save.

Agens huried the first five innings, then gave way to Tremel, who pitched the final two innings and carned the win.

NOTES: The Bruins had just nine hits combined in the two victories last week. However, the team used good pitching and timely hitting to prevail.

Heading into the playoffs, Ver-ona will be the top seed. They were 30-6-1 entering this week. South Orange has clinched second place (27-10-1) and Cranford and Belleville are battling for third. Cranford was 24-12-3, which is good for 51 points. Belleville's 24-14 mark accounts for 48 points, but the Bruins had the one game in hand and could move ahead of Cranford with two wins and a Cranford loss.

The Crescent Eagles have clinched fifth place, with a 22-16-1 mark while West Orange appears to have the final spot, at 13-23-2. If the playoffs started this week,

Belleville would play Crescent while Cranford faces West Orange. Verona and South Orange are guaranteed first round byes. The winner of the Cranford-West Orange series would then play South Orange while the Bruins-Crescent victor would face powerful Verona.

She has become very special to me. No predictions, but stay tuned.





## **Church announces Anniversary Commission**

The Reverend Carolyn Lumbard, Priest-In-Charge of Christ Church, Episcopal 393 Washington Avenue, has announced the formation of an Anniversary Commission that will begin to formulate plans for the church's 250th anniversary in 1996.

"Christ Church is one of the oldest Episcopal churches in the state," said Lumbard in announc-ing the commission. "It has survived wars, the Depression, and the decline in church attendance of the past decades, and has now come to a period of growth and renewal." Accepting the responsibilities for the chair of this important commission is William Geppner, Junior Warden of the church and long-time Belleville resident. The commission will develop the plans for the celebration, along with a history of the church and its service to the community.

Christ Church came to life in 1746 as the result of a direct royal grant from King George II. For many years the congregation met in the grain storehouse of a grist mill on the riverbank. From there they moved into an old house known as the Academy, and from there to their own church, built on Main Street, where the church cemetery still exists today.
