'Shock and disbelief'

Parents rally in support of arrested Principal; another arrest made in alleged child sex ring

By Howard Klausner Essex County Prosecutor Clifford J. Minor has announced another arrest in the investigation of an alleged child sex ring operated in a Linden Avenue home.

Charlene G. Sonn, 44, of Garfield has been charged with sexual assault, endangering the welfare of a child and making terroristic

Miss Sonn was described by investigators as the companion of the late Mr. Ronald Puttorak, landlord of the Linden Avenue house, who reportedly took his own life while held in the Essex County Jail in Newark last June.

Residents of Belleville were still stunned by the arrest last week of School 5 Principal Frank Catrambone, 53, who was taken from his office by investigators on Sept. 23.

Mr. Catrambone was arraigned Friday before Essex County Crim-

inal Assignment Judge Joseph A. Falcone, who set a \$50,000 bond for

More than 40 Belleville residents, most of them parents of children at School 5, came to the courtroom to show their support of the respected Principal.

Many expressed shock and disbelief at the charges of child molestation.

The previous week, two School 5 custodians were arrested on the same charges. They have been identified as Walter Jeffers, 55, and Mario Sista, 24. Jeffers is free in \$150,000 bond and Sista was freed on \$50,000 bond.

The case had its beginning in June, when the uncle of two girls, aged 9 and 11, reported to Belleville police that his sister's children were being sexually abused.

An investigation was conducted by Detective Sergeant Edward Panier, Detective James DelGrosso (now Sergeant) and Detective Arthur Connolly.

The complaint came to them on June 25, and on the next day, the 36year-old mother of the two children was arrested, along with her male companion, Felix Cabera, 33.

Both the mother and Mr. Cabera have been held in Essex County Jail since their arrests, each unable to

post \$100,000 bond. The girls, who attended School 5,

and a five-year-old brother were given to a relative for care, and the case was turned over to the Essex County Prosecutor.

Further investigation by the Pro-ecutor led to the arrest of Mr. Puttorak.

Mr. Puttorak had been arrested at 9 p.m. on a Friday and was found dead at 7:50 a.m. the next day, hanged in a cell on the eighth floor of the Newark jail.

There was no report that Mr. Puttorak had made any statements to police before his death.

Mr. Puttorak was employed as a

financial analyst for an insurance company. Several employees of a nearby supermarket were questioned by investigators, but none were

charged with any crimes.

The arrests of the custodians came on Sept. 15, made by members of the Essex County Prosecutor's Office Child Abuse Unit.

Sista, who is a former Special Education student, was questioned in Newark from 9 a.m. to 8 p.m., reportedly without the opportunity to contact an attorney. Sources state he received one frankfurter on roll during the period of question-

He signed a statement, at the end of the interrogation, and immediately, investigators went to the home of Jeffers in Belleville. Sources state that he was unaware that he was a target of the investigation, and therefore did not ask for legal

Jeffers was questioned until 1 a.m.. Both men were arraigned on Sept. 17, when bail was set for each. Jeffers' bond was \$150,000. Sista's was \$50,000.

Sista's family contacted Nutley attorney Angelo Bianchi, former State Banking Commissioner, who now represents Sista. Bianchi said he would "vigorously attack" the credibility of any statement signed by Sista after the 11-hour interroga-

Jeffers obtained the services of former Essex County Assistant Prosecutor who specialized in child

and woman abuse cases.

Miss Fiero stated, "I strongly doubt that any convincing evidence can be brought into court strong enough to convict my client."

At Mr. Catrambone's arraign-Assistant Patricia Kotyk-Zalesko, who heads the Sex Crimes Unit of the Prosecutor's office, told Judge Falcone that another defendant has implicated" Mr. Catrambone.

Presumably, Mr. Sista was the defendant to whom she referred.

The arrest of Principal Catrambone came during the school day. Investigators came to his office and asked him to accompany them to Newark, where he was told that he vas under arrest.

Local police had not been advised of the impending arrest. Chief Raymond Kimble was told about it at 3:30 p.m.

A reporter for a daily newspaper was reportedly at School 5 either at the time of the Principal's arrest, or very soon after. In either case, the reporter was there before Chief Kimble was made aware of the

was being questioned in Newark, his secretary, Clara Wojtic, was undergoing a five-hour interrogation of her home.

She reportedly was advised that video tapes may have been made implicating her in the sex ring, a

She has taken a two-week sick

claim she vigorously denied.

Mr. Catrambone was represented at the arraignment by Brian J. Neary of Hackensack, a former Assistant Prosecutor who specialized in child abuse cases. Neary is designated as a Certified Criminal Trial Attorney.

He stated, "We intend to fight

this case as vigorously as possible." He predicted vindication for Mr. Catrambone.

Sources close to the Prosecutor's office express confidence in the evidence that reportedly has been gathered, in which the allegations are that the mother of the two children exploited them for profit, and for drug money.

The nature of the evidence has not been made public, and will not be until - or unless - formal indictments are brought by a grand jury.

Friends of the accused custodians and the educator express confidence that the accusations will not



Aside From That

For 42 years, Mike Nardiello has served as an educator in the Belleville School District and in those years he has won the respect and regard of both his colleagues and his fellowworkers, to say nothing of the parents and the children whose lives he affected. But it could not be said that he had become a byword in the media, beyond the borders of the town in which he was born and lived his life. All that changed last week, just as he announced his plans to retire as Superintendent of Schools. The calls began coming from Ed Farnsworth and Terry Martin of Channel 4 TV, Hank Stern of the Associated Press, Peggy George of New Jersey Network News, Leslie Jennings of Channel 9 News, Donna Zide of Channel 2 TV, Cesar Daris of Channel 11 TV, David Novarro of Channel 7, and reporters for Channel 47 and Channel 5. Channel 2 and Channel 9 arrived with camera crews, and the face and voice of Mike Nardiello were broadcast from Coast to Coast. "It's been the worst experience of my life," Mr. Nardiello said. • • • As our readers well know, the calls had to do with the arrest of a beloved and popular educator on allegations of misconduct with two children, charges that neither Mr. Nardiello nor many in the community can bring themselves to believe. But it was once again an example of the kind of news that brings attention to Belleville. Mike Nardiello's achievements, or the advances made in education under his guidance, were not what brought the media attention. Who cares about the unsullied career of a Belleville man when scandal provides such entertainment?

But the life of Mike Nardiello tells more about Belleville than the sensational allegations being made. He was born in Belleville to Vincent and Connie Frena Nardiello in their house in Silver Lake.. He was the youngest of nine children six sons and three daughters - and the father fed and raised the family on his income as a day laborer and construction worker. He attended School 4 and Belleville High School where he was graduated in 1941. He joined the Army in 1943, and was trained as an Infantry Medical Corpsman before being allowed to transfer as a Bombardier-Navigator cadet to the Army Air Force. During the Battle of the Bulge, he was transferred back to the Infantry, and was in training with the 78th Division when a knee injury prevented him from being shipped overseas. He was discharged after 37 months of service.

He was graduated from Montclair State College in 1950, trained as a teacher, but for a year he worked as a cost accountant for Food Fair because there were no teaching jobs available. In 1951, he was appointed as a part-time Seventh Grade teacher at his old school, Number 4, and there he taught science and mathematics, and some physical education. Evan Thompson, then Superintendent of Schools, decided to launch two Special Education classes at School 4. "I have no idea what made him select me," Mr. Nardiello said, "but I was given two weeks to study the Special Education system in the Newark schools, and I started." He was to teach Special Education for 12 years, working with pupils from seven to 19 years of age. • • • In 1964, Nardiello was named the first Director of Special Education in the School District, and in 1967, he became Principal of School 4. After 13 years, he was named Assistant Superintendent of Schools, and in 1983, Superintendent, the post he plans to leave in December.

He has been married for 39 years to the former Marion Caporaso and the couple's daughter, Mrs. Jerry (Judy) Domenick, has two sons, Michael and Joseph. • • "Belleville is a wonderful town. I know they've knocked down 20 budgets in the last 23 years, but in other ways, the people are very supportive of education," he said. "They always come out when we need them, and it's a great athletics town with a great athletics program. I'm proud that we've kept up our academic standings and we do it with the lowest expenditure per pupil in the entire county. We have wonderful dedicated teachers and staff here." • • • • On the down side? "Well, we do have some dissidents in town, and they do create problems." What lies ahead for the schools? "I think we are headed for a multi-cultural curriculum." Bi-lingual classes have been started for children whose first language is Spanish, and currently the percentage of "minority" students is estimated at 34.6. Breaking it down by category, Nardiello listed 750 Hispanic students, 186 Afro-American students, six Native Americans amd 360 Asian or Pacific Island students. The total school population as of June was 3,736, and enrollment has been increasing at the rate of 75 to 100 each of the last three years. All in all, he has left the public school system in better shape than when he found it. And not one of the media reporters asked about it.

Baidassaro Divincenzo Mitten, our Copy Cat, heard the Rev. Lucius Williams warn the Board of Education that a Higher Power than the Essex County Superintendent of Schools would deal with them if they did not vote the right way on school busing. "I asked Bonafacchio the Church Cat about that," Baldassaro said, "and he said the voting in Heaven was running five-to-four in favor of courtesy busing and six-to-one against using the Lord's Name in budget debates." ● ● ● Fifth Ward Councilman Harry Zilch says his organization, the Kool Kukumber Boys is really excited about Belleville becoming the Investigation Capital of The World. "They figure that if they can get the concession rights, just feeding the incoming reporters alone will make them a fortune."

The intruder came out of the house, and ordered the woman to back her car away from the driv-eway because it was blocking his car. When she refused, the man pro-duced a handgun and ordered her to get the car out of his way. She

Police found a pile of valuables left on a bed, apparently abandoned by the suspect when he was discovered. A fingerprint was found on an item by Detective Jack Baumgartner of the Records Bur-

Escott said the suspect was linked to other burglaries in Belleville, on Sunset, Fairway and Belleville Avenues, and in Bloomfield, East Rutherford and Newark.

Principal Frank Catrambone

A citizen warned the public at a meeting of the Board of Education this week that it was "all right to show support for Frank Catrambone, Principal (of School 5) but let's not go overboard. If he's found guilty, I can just see the looks on your faces."

If Mr. Frank Catrambone is indeed found guilty of the charges made against him by the Essex County Prosecutor, it will not in any way reflect on the people who believed in his innocence.

In America - and Belleville is part of this great country persons accused of a crime are presumed to be innocent until a jury of his or her peers pronounces the word, "Guilty". Lynn Risolito, president of school No. 5 Parent-Teacher Association stated recently that her group believes in the innocence of Mr. Catrambone. Mrs. Risolito and her group have a right to believe

Essex County Prosecutor Clifford Minor has been in office for one year and has demonstrated great responsibility in the job. Minor, a member of the black race, knows from personal experience the underdog feeling, the feeling of being denied rights to which all Americans are born. Prosecutor Minor can be relied upon to proceed with great caution in evaluating any evidence developed in the case that led to the arrest of Mr. Catrambone.

Minor is a former Newark policeman and Presiding Judge of the City of Newark courts.

The principal has pleaded innocent to the charges, and in time, he will have his day in court. Until that moment arrives, Mr. Catrambone is presumed to be innocent, and if the matter goes to trial, we are assured that a jury of his peers will determine Catrambone's fate.

Target, Belleville

Senior who knows

To the editor:

I have to agree with Mr. Joe Fornarotto's opinion that we can save almost \$600,000 per year by doing our own recycling and garbage pick-up once a week like Bloomfield and now

It is particularly true, if we are paying a contractor the amount of \$3,444,781.41 for a 5-year contract. He must be making a profit as this amounts to about \$688,958.28 per year.

Mr. Fornarotto indicates that if we spent the first year the amount of \$400,000 for new trucks which should last 7 years, spent about \$625,000 for the salaries of the new men to pick up garbage and recycling material, the first year the cost would be extra just for new trucks. After the first year, we will save \$400,000.

The savings of \$104,000 that we pay to pick up recycling materials, plus the money we get back when we sell paper and some of the other materials, after the first year we will have the money in the bank — \$104,000, \$400,000 and the money for recycling material — a savings of over \$600,000!

I say, let's look into this fine idea.

I would like to make some other significant comments on the government we have in our Township:

A. Council / Manager government is similar to a private corporation. The Council should not act as a Board of Difectors of a company where the Manager carries out its policies as the C.E.O. of the corporation.

B. No individual Councilman should influence the Manager with pressure. The Council acts as a body and is only allowed

Any Councilman violating these rules is guilty of malfeasance of office and under the Faulkner Act can be removed from office. In other words, the Council as a body can recommend to the Manager but cannot interfere with his

In addition, I would like to point out an article that appeared in an issue of The Reader's Digest. It talks about a town in California operating under a manager. 

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



Chief Beresford has denied any wrongdoing.



Clay opposes **Blue Cross payments**

Freeholder Arthur L. Clay has expressed his opposition to the administration's payments of over \$140,000 that was paid out to a consultant before the Freeholders ever approved the contract. The contract with Walter Sobel, a Chicago architect, was scheduled to appear for a vote at the Sept. 14 meeting. The administration paid Sobel to examine the Blue Cross-Blue Shield building in Newark. The administration, with the approval of the Board by a 6-2 vote, leased a floor in the building a few months ago for several County offices.

Clay, who had opposed the lease of the building since it was first proposed last year, was not able to attend the meeting where the Freeholders approved the lease. Clay had been mugged earlier this year and has been recovering from the injuries, although he did release several statements opposing the proposal. Clay returned to the Board at last week's meeting.

"There was never a need to rent or buy the Blue Cross building, but for some reason, the administration was determined to get its hands on it, spending as much of the taxpayers' money as necessary to do so," Clay said. "I opposed the lease last year, I expressed my opposition earlier this year and I continue to oppose it. The administration has yet to give it any valid reason why the people of Essex County must again foot the bill for its extravag-

This latest scandal is merely the latest for the administration," Clay added. "It's getting to the point that a week without a scandal in Essex County is more newsworthy than the scandals."

My mother lives alone and takes several medications. She sometimes forgets if she has taken her medication and will either skip a dose or double-up on the dosages. What can I do to help her?

Concerned Daughter

Dear Concerned Daughter.

Taking medications responsibly is the best way to maximize medication effectiveness for all ages. For example, be sure to read the label carefully on all medications and follow the directions for storing and taking them. Contact your mother's physician and pharmacist for complete information regarding the reasons your mother must take the various medications. Know what medications side-effects to ook for. Become familiar with what the medications look like, the dosages, and the number of times a day she takes the medication. Inexpensive, divided plastic medication containers can be purchased or make your own by clearly marking envelopes that your mother can easily identify. You may want to organize the medications to cover a seven day period.

Dear Senior Support,

I try to keep in shape now that the fresh blush of youth has faded a bit, but I can't afford the hefty prices fancy exercise gyms charge. I want to lighten my girth, not my Mr. C.C.

Dear Mr. C.C.,

Check with your doctor if you plan to start a regular exercise program - particularly if you've been sedentary. Your doctor will help you find a program suited to your needs and physical condition that can be done at home and doesn't involve costly exercise equipment. You may be given an exercise tolerance test to determine your present capabilities and identify potential hazards. Chances are, if you're in good health, your doctor will recomend a program of frequent, ongoing physical activity that is rhythmic, is repetitive, involves motion and uses your large muscles, and challenges the circulatory system.

Low impact exercises such as walking, strengthens muscles, improves circulation and will reduce your waistline, not your bank account.

Cerebral Palsy Center set for Cuozzo Street

On Monday, September 20, County Executive Thomas J. D'Alessio announced Essex County's second HOME allocation to Cerebral Palsy of Essex and West Hudson. Essex County, as the second largest urban county in the State of New Jersey expended funds for this project from a \$1.543 million HOME allocation from the federal government. The HOME program is administered by the Essex County Division of Housing and Community Development and is ranked one of the top 10 agencies in the entire United States for their HOME program.

The County Executive, together with the Housing and Community Development Director, Rosemary Senatore-Ciccone, MPA, met with Ruth Goodman, vice president of Housing for the Cerebral Palsy Center and Phyllis Burgess, executive director, to present a \$65,000 no interest loan for the acquisition of property located at 31-35 Cuozzo St., Belleville.

On Sept. 14, a closing was held by the Community Development

Agency, Cerebral Palsy Center and 31 Cuozzo Street, Inc. to purchase the vacant lots on 31-35 Cuozzo Street in Belleville to construct a group home for six developmentally disabled adults who are of low

and very low income.

The facility will open the group home for a minimum of 20 years and will receive an 811 grant from the U.S. Dept. of Housing and Urban Development for \$920,600. The grant awarded to Cerebral Palsy allows for \$376,600 towards the construction and \$544,000 for additional costs relating to the pro-

County Executive Thomas J. D'Alessio said he was delighted that the County could provide the necessary funding for the acquisition of the property enabling Cerebral Palsy to cite a location in their 811 application submitted to the: federal government.

This project is being funded in total by funds from the U.S. Dept; of Housing and Urban Development for a total of \$985,600. The anticipated start of construction will be the spring of 1994.

The funds will be awarded to the Cerebral Palsy Center as the sponsors of the project. However, as federal funds mandate a nonprofit agency must manage the non-profit agency.

Ruth Goodman, president of 31 Cuozzo Street, Inc., a non-profit corporation will be in charge of the developmentally disabled group home. Special outreach efforts will be made to disabled persons throughout the area and applications will be made available by the Division of the Developmentally Disabled.



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

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
