

VJT wants acreage here for subway base facility

Officials of New Jersey Transit ere scheduled to visit the Municip-Building today for several hours discussion of a proposed facility Silver Lake.

Dr. Jerome M. Lutin, Senior irector of the Newark-Elizabeth ail Link Division, is seeking local sponse to the idea of a Newark ity Subway yard at Belmont venue and Franklin Street, taking 15 acres, half in Bloomfield and of in Belleville.

In meetings held with the Silver ake Civic Association and the lver Lake Partnership, Dr, Lutin Itlined the plans for a final sembly plant for modern subway irs and the extension of the City abway to the Conrail right of way that crosses Franklin Street.

The utility would pay no taxes to the municipalities.

Immediate responses were unfavorable. Some residents said it would only bring in crime from

Newark.

Dennis Walsh of the Partnership took another viewpoint, asking if it would be possible to develop the location as both a repair facility and

a commuter parking area.

Dr. Lutin said it was a possibility that some local commercial development could be included in any NJT project.

Dr. Lutin was scheduled to be at the Municipal Building from 2:30 p.m. to 5 p.m., and from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. today, Thursday.

'I'll never forgive them': Spillane

Spillane wins Third Ward election, denounces Kennedy campaign tactics

"I will never forgive those people as long as I live for the hell they put me and my family through in the past few weeks!"

Third Ward Councilman Tom Spillane poured out his anger in the wake of his election victory in Tuesday's Third Ward Recall vote.

With a voter turnout of 26.4 percent, the voters went against recall 483 to 434, and supported Spillane for re-election with 495 votes to 459 for challenger Kevin Kennedy.

A small turnout had been expec-ted to help Kennedy, who had mounted a strong campaign to which Spillane responded in only the last days before the vote.

The vote against recall actually made the vote for candidates academic. In effect, Spillane won with the rejection of the recall proposal. Supporters of Spillane gathered at the Knights of Columbus Hall to

hear the results. Among them were Mayor Marina Perna and Council Members Bill Cook, Jim Messina, Charles Cerami, Mario Drozdz and Belleville Democratic Chairman Chester Prosperi.
Spillane's wife, Barbara, and his

father were also there, along with Attorney Emil Nardachone, who represented Spillane in the lawsuit that invalidated Kennedy's elec-tion last year, when more than 40 absentee ballots were thrown out by Superior Court Judge Alvin Weiss.

Also present were former Commissioner Vincent Frantantoni, who had thrown his support to Spillane, and Jackie Rega, a Republican.

Friends of Spillane said that the negative campaigning was among the worst ever experienced in Bel-

Spillane told the audience, "You don't print attacks on somebody's wife or family or friends. To put these people through that kind of hell is indecent."

Many said the Kennedy cam-paign publication's attack on Spil-

lane's daughter for obtaining a substitute teacher's job with the Community Health Service did much to cost Kennedy the election.

'A load off my shoulders'

Belleville man innocent of aggravated assaults

Gerard Maccioli, 32, of Belleville was found innocent of three charges of aggravated assault Tuesday after a two-day trial before Superior Court Judge Thomas Brown in Newark.

Maccioli and James DiGiacomo, 33, of Newark had been charged with beating three poll workers in Newark, on Nov. 5, 1991, Election Day.

Maccioli and DiGiacomo were working for the campaign of Republican Freeholder Arthur Clay for Essex County Sheriff. The incident allegedly occurred

at the Elliot Street School when two men allegedly leaped out of a van and began beating the Democratic poll workers.

Later that day, Maccioli was visiting a critically ill cousin at Clara Maass Medical Center when he was "identified" by the injured poll workers as one of those who assaulted them.

Maccioli vigorously denied the accusations, saying he was not at the scene, and he produced a number of witnesses who corroborated his claim.

Judge Brown dismissed one of the charges after hearing the state's

guilty on the other two charges after hearing several witnesses for the defense.

Maccioli was represented by Attorney Peter J. Willis of Jersey

"My lawyer led the prosecution witnesses through a lot of contradictions in their testimony," Maccioli

Maccioli was seriously injured in an automobile accident two years ago that required replacement of several bones and joints. "I was physically unable to assault those people," he said.





Barbara Simonetti was the recipient of a liver transplant in June. It gave her a new lease on life. "I had been in bed for a year, waiting for a donor," she recalled. Since then, she has been on the upswing, and now, in her job at Meyers Bakery, at 382 Washington Ave., she is involved in a food drive. Anyone who brings two cans of food to the bakery will have their name entered in a drawing for the gingerbread house that is now in the display window of the bakery. "It's the Christmas Food Drive, and our store is participating with the Belleville Department of Welfare, which will distribute the food." The bakery's proprietor, Karen Meyers, is working with Welfare Director Carol Ann Russo on the project. For more information, call (201) 759-1673 and ask for either Barbara or Terry. • • • Barbara's father, Dennis Simonetti, had a recent successful showing of his photography at the Belleville Public Library and Information Center. The elder Simonetti is one of the world's outstanding professional photographers and printmakers, and he is a teacher of thousands of professionals. Many of his students turned up from as far away as Florida and the West Coast to view the show and catch up with their old mentor, who has been out of action in recent years, fighting the Parkinson's Disease which has reduced his physical dexterity, but not his mental abilities. He is now scheduled for another showing of his work in Caldwell, and a long dormant book project seems to be reviving. Barbara's daughter is the graphic artist Dawn Cox whose design expertise is surpassed only by her beauty. Her husband is pretty talented, too. • • • A visitor settled down on Washington Avenue, last week, peering plaintively through the glass front door of the Motorcycle Mall. It was a demure homing pigeon or racer, described as a brown hen with silver bars, and Isadore Padula took pity on it. The former Township Treasurer puts in some time each day at the Mall, using his own considerable expertise with motorcycles to sell the bikes to an eager public. He also likes animals and strays, and he knew that former Commissioner Joe Fornarotto is a pigeon fancier, so Izzy called Joe and he came. • • • After cleaning and comforting the bird, Joe placed her with his own considerable family of pigeons in the pigeon cote behind his house on Union Avenue. "It seems to have been owned by somebody, and it may have hurt its wing in some way," Joe said. "She's feeling much better now." Joe is one of perhaps a half dozen pigeon raisers in Belleville, and he has copious supplies of pedigree sheets on his birds, some of which come from France, Belgium and Germany. He also has some impressive trophies for the feats of some of the birds he owns. He has won first and second place trophies for his racers. A third place winner he owns clocked 411.9 miles at a speed of 1,362.2 yards per minute, which is close to three mile quarters

Joe has a great deal of lore about the pigeon, which is obviously one of the most remarkable of all creatures. "The bird has telescopic vision, and can see objects that are five miles distant. It has a photographic memory, and that is how it spots landmarks for guidance. Its ears can be affected by radio transmissions that can make it lose its sense of direction. If lost, it may fly its heart out until it falls." They are also beautiful creatures with delicate shadings of color that have an iridescent quality. Joe picked up the hobby from an older brother, and the gentle warbling sound of a pigeon is music to his ears. Izzy prefers the roar of his Gold Wing, himself. • • • • A friend in need is a friend indeed, and the Friendly Visitors are a group whose services range from life serving to life saving.

The Friendly Visitors are a group whose services range from life serving to life saving. Take Mrs. Selma Howell Hollahan who is genuinely 75 years young, going among the "old folks" as she likes to say, making sure that the homebound of our community are not left to fend for themselves. A few days ago, she encountered an emergency situation in which an elderly man who requires leg braces was left sitting helplessly in his bathrobe because the nursing aide who was scheduled to care for him had taken ill and was hospitalized. Selma simply pitched in and got him dressed and into his braces so that he could prepare something to eat, and they even shared a pizza. "It was just back to doing what I did for my husband when he got sick," Selma said, and she stayed until an aide could arrive. For this kind of volunteer service -"I get there if I have to go through snow and ice" - she was one of 10 Friendly Visitors among 1,750 to be given a special citation for service this year.

A farm girl from Wayne County, Pennsylvania, bordering the Delaware River, she was a spinster most of her life, marrying Albert Hollahan in 1980 and moving to Belleville from Newark. She lost Albert to illness 10 years ago, but she has stayed on in Belleville. A friendly lady at Block's Tax Service saw that she seemed at loose ends and suggested that she join the Friendly Visitors. And she has had a wonderful time ever since. "Between Holy Family Church and this, it all keeps me going," she said. She is also into jigsaw puzzies, making Christmas decorations, writing poetry and painting. "I"m a home person. I don't look for amusement outside the house." But her regret is that she ever left the farm. "I loved the cows. And I have never drunk coffee or tea to this day. Only milk. It sure provides me with calcium!" As one of nine children and a set of "highly talented parents", she has always liked action and joint activities, and the Friendly Visitors satisfies her needs. •• • • • The parent organization of the Friendly Visitors is the Community Mental Health Services of Belleville, Bloomfield and Nutley, housed in a building on the old Geriatrics Center, and now marking its 35th anniversary. Executive Director Alice Ricci estimates that 600

individuals and family units in Belleville are touched each year by one or more of the services provided. These include the Friendly Visitors Program, under the direction of Ms. Erni Goldstein, the Child Guidance Program, under the direction of Ruth Cowell, the Outpatient Program, the Preschool and Nursery Program, the Family Services Program for abused wives and children; the Partial Care Program for persons discharged from mental institutions and needing help in fitting back into society and the Vocational Counseling Program. There is also the Peer Support Program, in which elderly clients make contact with other elderly persons, and keep in touch with them. ● ● ● Some 2,000 people in the three towns make use of the Services, and there are about 66 full and part time workers to service them, assisted by the hundreds of volunteers such as Mrs. Hollahan, or a Lena Branca or a Frances Gerino, Belleville residents who keep up constant telephone contacts with the elderly homebound. Ms. Cowell noted, "Foster parents are the real heroes." These are the families which accept disturbed children, or abused children, and give them a sense of security until the time comes that their own families can function together again. • • • • "This is all a relic of the Great Society program that President Lyndon Johnson started in the 1960s," Ms. Ricci said. "Mayor Harry Chenoweth of Nutley was very instrumental in starting the Services here. Now we serve all three towns, with Belleville receiving a large share of



When the NJT bears gifts

New Jersey Transit is in town, sounding out the locals on the idea of creating a glorified car barn for the rolling stock of the Newark City Subway.

The NJT specifically is looking at seven and a half acres adjoining Belmont Avenue and Franklin Street in Silver Lake.

The carrot in the proposition is the possibility of creating a commuter parking area and a complex of office buildings and stores that would take advantage of an extension of the subway line to the proposed Ligth Rail Transit Vehicle Base Facility, as the project is titled.

It could go beyond that, if the subway is extended along the right of way of the Conrail track that now exists. An extension of that sort could bring a lot of passengers in from the outer suburbs, some of whom might find their way to Silver Lake.

Without this sort of development, the Facility in itself will not be much help to the community. It will not pay taxes, and it probably will not employ many local residents. And it would preclude other commercial development which the community sorely needs.

Many in Silver Lake are of two minds about having the subway extended deeper into their neighborhood. They fear that it would bring in crime.

The fact is that there is ample way today for crime to arrive here from Newark. Today's lawbreaker doesn't take the subway when a car can be stolen so easily.

We look forward eagerly to see what proposals may be developed that would help Silver Lake's economy and Belleville's tax base. It does have its interesting possib-

So much for monorails

In discussing why it is not feasible to extend the proposed monorail line between Newark International Airport and Penn Station to points further out, a New Jersey Transit official stated:

'The proposed cars will have four seats and room for seven standees. The top speed of the cars will be 29 miles an hour, and it will cost \$350 million to build the two mile link between the station and the airport."

We were under the impression that the monorail ride at Disney World in Florida had cars of larger size than four-seaters. In fact, we do not recall that standees were allowed in the Disney monorail cars.

It would seem that instead of getting a Disney World monorail, we are getting something designed by Mickey Mouse.

On Wallace & Tiernan

To the editor:

Although the management of Wallace & Tiernan has officially withdrawn its "last, best and final offer" to the members of Local 370, it remains necessary to respond to some of the comments contained in the

Nov. 3 article about the company.

Contrary to the headlines, Wallace & Tiernan consistently made it clear to the members of Local 370 that there was no guarantee that the company would remain in Belleville for any length of time even if the members accepted the company's proposals. Also, the \$13.56 to \$15.76 plus 3% plus \$1000 for the first year is not so.

While employees' seniority and salaries may not immediately have been effected by the company's offer, an employee's seniority could have been

rendered meaningless by other language changes proposed by the Company. Further, an employee's pay rate could have been reduced if he was unable to keep pace with the Company's changes to the job, performance standards or if the Company's reduction in force language was implemented.

The fact that the company even made an economic proposal, let alone a "last, best and final" economic proposal is inexcusable. Whether or not the increases offered were "fair," placing them before our membership without ever having discussed them with the

Executive Committee does not say much for the Company's motives in then discussing.

Management's subsequent efforts to divide our membership by initiating and encouraging a petition drive calling for a new vote on the offer was both illegal and unsuccessful. The failure to generate sufficient support for the petition indicates that the hand vote held at the Local's Oct. 25 meeting was not a "sham" as Mr. Rufenacht stated, but accurately a "sham" as Mr. Rufenacht stated, but accurately reflected the opinions of a fully informed member-

We are sorry that the company felt it necessary to act as it did. Had it made such a concerted effort to resolve the issues most important to this Local and its membership, the article would not have been necess-

Despite these actions, Local 370 remains willing to reach a mutually acceptable agreement which would make Wallace & Tiernan's Belleville facility a worldclass operation. However, it cannot do so if the result would be to eliminate those protections our members value so highly.

In the past 10 years, the Township of Belleville has experienced a windfall in tax revenue due to the construction of condominiums and the conversion of apartment complexes into condominiums. Yet, with such increase in revenue, the Township of Belleville cannot give the condominium homeowner what the

Each condominium owner pays taxes comparable to a residential homeowner, yet does not receive some of the same benefits as the residential homeowner. The Kelly Bill enacted in January 1993, would alleviate this injustice to the condominium owner.

It clearly states that the municipality must either provide the same services to the condominium owner as a residential homeowner or reimburse the condominium association for such services. These services would include snow plowing, street lighting, removal

of leaves, recyclables and garbage. Approximately a year has passed since the enactment of the law and the Township of Belleville procrastinates in their performances according to the

Perhaps the township feels that this statute can be ignored and that the condominium owner will disappear. This is a fantasy on their part because the condominium owners of Belleville will pursue "what the law entitles." Condominium owners will not wait indefinitely.

If the township does not respond quickly to this matter, there will only be the recourse "of the black robe," with the Township of Belleville incurring legal fees and damages. The condominium owners expect their town to do "what is morally right."

Condominium owners are urged to join forces to

attain what is rightfully due to them under the law.

Celebrate safely this holiday season

As families look forward to Christmas and New Year celebrations, the New Jersey State Safety Council and New Jersey SAFE KIDS offer the following tips to help-keep the holidays bright, merry and safe.

DECORATIONS: Select a fresh tree by looking for very green needles which are hard to pull from the branches and do not fall off when the tree is bounced on the ground. To prevent drying out, cut two inches off the trunk and keep in a stand filled with water and away from radiators, televisions and other sources of heat. Keep breakable ornaments or those with small detachable parts off of lower tree branches and out of areas where young children can reach them. Use flame-resistant decorations whenever possible. Keep holly, mistletoe and other poisonous holiday plants away from children and pets.

HOLIDAY LIGHTS: Use only UL (Underwriters Laboratories) approved lights and extension cords. To prevent fires, examine for frayed cords, broken sockets and loose or exposed wires. Never use more than three strings of lights on one extension cord. Never use lights rated "indoors" outdoors. Turn off and unplug tree lights and other decorations before leaving the house or going to bed. Keep children and flammable items away from lit candles and fireplaces.

GIFTS: When selecting children's gifts, look for items that are well-constructed, durable, safe and which suit the age and skill level of your child. After opening gifts, dispose of wrappings immediately as they may be toxic or present choking hazards if chewed by a small child.

ENTERTAINING: At holiday parties, serve high protein and car-bohydrate foods like cheese and meat when alcohol is offered. Provide non-alcoholic beverages as well. Stop serving alcohol an hour or two before the party is over. Above all, DO NOT DRINK AND DRIVE! Use the designated driver system to ensure that all guests arrive home safely.

It's been 20 seasons since Dan Grasso was coach of the boys' basketball team at Belleville High School. 20 seasons since the 1974-75 squad was 13-10 and gave basketball fans at BHS a very special winter. Over the next couple of weeks, we're going to look back at that season, when the Bellboys put together a winning season and qualified

for the Essex County tournament, which back then was a prestigious

To give you a little flavor of what was going on back then, Gerald Ford had just taken over as President of the United States, after the resignation of Richard Nixon.

The Pittsburgh Steelers were en route to their first Super Bowl victory. The Raiders played in Oakland, the Jets played at Shea Stadium (more on that later), the Colts were in Baltimore and the Cardinals played football in St. Louis.

Belleville was a member of the Big 10 Conference, which meant two

ames each in basketball against powerhouse schools like Bloom-

field, Montclair, Orange, East Orange and Irvington.

At Belleville High, the football team was 5-4, having defeated Hillside in the season finale on Thanksgiving. Tom Testa was the head coach then. Karen Fuccello took a years leave of absence as coach of the girls' basketball team, turning the reigns over to Mike Cleri. The baseball team, which had been coached by Charlie Travers was now going to be under the control of George Zanfini, and we all know the success of the program during the Zanfini era.

I was a junior at Belleville High School that year. And I'll tell you,

the basketball season that winter was something special.

It was the season of Abdel Anderson, Michael Meagher, Pat Hogan, Alan Amiano, Joe Dunn, Doug Jackson, John Megna, Bob Tosi and Clyde Robinson. A player named Don Roll was a starting forward on the Belleville freshman basketball team.

We'll look back on those 23 games in the next few weeks, remembering Abdel's All American season, the win over Irvington, the game against East Orange at Bloomfield.

Has it really been 20 seasons?

REMEMBERING THE JETS HERITAGE

Did you see the Jets-Colts game last Sunday?

It wasn't exactly a rematch of Super Bowl III some 25 years ago, was it? As I'm sure you know by now, the Jets lost, 9-6 and with the defeat, their playoff hopes took a stumble, although by no means are they out

The Jets have been playing at Giants Stadium since 1984. Prior to that, their home games were played at Shea Stadium. The Jets decided to move to Giants Stadium because, supposidly, it's a better football facility and Giants Stadium does have more seats, and we all know that more seats equals more revenue.

I was a big Jets fan from the late 1960's, when Joe Namath took the Jets to the Super Bowl and pulled the biggest upset, perhaps in the history of sports, when New York beat Baltimore 16-7 in the aforementioned Super Bowl III at the Orange Bowl in Miami.

In 1977, the year Namath left the Jets, I got season tickets for the Jets and remained a ticket holder at Shea from '77 until '83. For seven seasons, we would pack up the car and head to Shea Stadium. It didn't matter whether the Jets were a 3-11 team, or a playoff team. The Jets playing at Shea Stadium was a natural. It was their stadium.

The fans at Shea epitimized the Jets from their early days through 1983. Most of the fans had been season ticket holders for 20 years and were probably at Shea when the Jets beat the Oakland Raiders in the AFL title game in 1968. These were the same fans who would have wild tailgate parties in the parking lot before the game (before it became fashionable to tailgate) and the same fans who staged some great football games in the parking lot before the main event.

Those were the days of booing Richard Todd mercilessly, of the Air It Out Matty Fan Club, in honor of Jets backup quarterback Matt Robinson, and of Let it Loose Bruce, in honor of Jets running back Bruce Harper.

Shea Stadium had real grass. It was a little rickity, but that was part of the charm of that stadium. In late November and December, there was nothing like it. The wind swirling in from Flushing Bay. Scraps of paper flying all over the field. Airplanes constantly flying over the Stadium as they departed from LaGuardia Airport.

This was the Jets Stadium. And the personality of the team was of

the green and white uniforms and the crazy fans.

Back in the late 70's and early 80's, the Jets weren't always dominant. The team was 3-11, 8-8, 8-8 and 4-12 from '77 until '80, but the fans would always turn out. After some success in '81 and '82, the Jets stumbled to 7-9 in '83. But the fans always turned out.

There weren't 31,000 plus no shows like there were last weekend at Ciants Stadium. On the business side, I'm sure the Jets made a good decision by moving to Giants Stadium. They've sold more tickets than they ever could at Shea.

But the Jets at Giants Stadium do not mix. It's a plastic atmosphere there, and the games usually take on a boring effect. Giants Stadium belongs to the New York Giants. Period. Jets games belong somewhere in New York, preferably back on Flushing Bay. But that's not going to happen, because the Jets have a lease until well past the

And one more thing. Those uniforms have to go. The green helmets and the green pants on the road uniforms make the team look more like Jets University, instead of an NFL team. The Jets had great uniforms in the 60's and 70's, with the white helmets and green jersies with white patches where the numbers were.

This used to be a fun team to watch. Now, despite the 7-5 record this year and hopes for the playoffs, last Sunday's contest appears to be more the norm than an exception.




Leading the returnees is senior Liz Ramirez. Over the first three years of her career, Ramirez has improved steadily, both in scoring

Boys' basketball team rebuilding

There is potential.

Don Roll will be quick to remind you of that, especially during the early stages of the 1993-94 boys' basketball season at Belleville High School.

There is potential. 'I have to be honest with you," Roll said last weekend. "We are very, very, very inexperienced. I mean, we're inexperienced."

Another words, the team does not have a lot of experienced players, right?

"There's a lot of potential (there's that word again)," Roll said. "I really feel with the talent we have, these kids can really develop into good players, if not by the middle to end of this year, by the start of next season, for sure."

This isn't to say that the coach is writing off the '93-94 campaign all

together.

They're a good bunch to kids to work with. They're pushing each other in practice, but they are still learning the game and that takes



Gradually, the soccer program has become one of the most successful varsity entries at Belleville High School.

The 1993 team continued the trend set by the '91 and '92 squads. Gino DePinto's team was 12-5-4 this year, finishing third in the NNJIL Pacific Division. The Bucs lost out on the conference title by just 11/2 games.

"We played very well," DePinto said. "The team started out slowly, but we came around during the season and played our best soccer at the start of the Essex County tournament."

The Bucs, who finished with 14-4-2 records in 1991 and '92, started out the '93 campaign with just one victory in their first five games (1-2-2). But the team righted the ship in early October and won seven of its next eight games to move up in the

conference and county standings.

"When we started out 1-2-2,"
DePinto said. "we made some adjustments in the lineup. Our kids knew they were better than the record indicated, but it was up to them to prove that on the field."

The highlight of the season came in the second round of the county tournament. The Bucs traveled to Millburn to face the number one seed and the seventh ranked team in the state.

"Millburn was undefeated and first in the county," recalled DePinto. "We went to their place and played a great game. It was the best win of the year, by far."

The Bucs won the game in the shootout, 2-1. Belleville held a 1-0 lead for most of the second half, but Millburn tied it in the waning seconds. Undaunted, the Bucs played hard in overtime and prevailed in the nailbiting shootout.

Senior Greg Groeling was once again outstanding. As a junior, he led the county and conference in scoring. This year, despite being double and triple teamed, he finished with a team high 22 goals and earned first team, NNJIL honors. Groeling was selected to the third team, Essex County.

"I was dissappointed with the

county selections," DePinto said. Two of our kids were selected to the team, but should have been rated higher. I don't think our team got the respect it deserved from the county selection committee."

Another senior, Glusseppe Mennella, finished with 15 goals and also earned first team, NNJIL and

third team, Essex County, honors. Mennella was perhaps the Bucs most consistent player in 1993. When he wasn't scoring a goal, he was usually assisting on another player's goal.

Groeling and Mennella were also selected to the 1993 All State

Joe Colucci was outstanding this season. The junior earned first team, NNJIL honors for his defensive play. He was also selected Honorable Mention in the county

"Joe will be a key player on next year's team," DePinto said. "He was solid in every game this season. I don't think he had one sub par game all season long.'

Marcelo Gioriando was the teams top midfielder and was another first team, NNJIL, selection. Like Colucci, he was selected Honorable Mention by the Essex County committee.

Giorlando was the man who scored the winning goal in the shootout against Millburn.

"Mike was excellent," DePinto said. "He was the second best goalie in the league, behind the player from Don Bosco. He made

some great plays all year long."

late JV standings, we had the best


JV record this season.







Tips From Fire Experts On Safe Hearth and Home

(NU) - In an effort to stem the high number of residential fire deaths and injuries that occur every year during cold weather months, the United States Fire Administration (USFA) and the Sleep Products Safety Council (SPSC) have issued recommendations for making homes

safer.
"It's ironic that so many fire deaths occur when people think they are the safest—at night and in their own homes," says Assistant USFA Administrator James Coyle. "Most incidents are during the months be-tween October and February, and most can be prevented.

"When it comes to fire safety and bedding, what is common knowledge to one family may be a secret to others," says SPSC Chairman Paul Dillion. "This is particularly disturbing since most of the steps to preventing fires at night are very simple."

Each year, fire kills close to 5,500 Americans — more than all other natural disasters combined, includmeanes, torna earthquakes. The recommendations issued by the USFA and SPSC are:

Smoke Detectors

Place at least one on every floor of the house. -Test batteries monthly and change

them twice a year.

Alternative Heaters -Use space heaters in well-venti-

lated rooms. Place heaters where they will not be knocked over, away from cur-

tains and furniture. -Plug space heaters directly into wall sockets, not into extension cords; unplug when not in use.

Kerosene Heaters

se sure they are legal in your area. -Use K-1 Kerosene only; never use

gasoline or camp stove fuel.

Woodstoves and Fireplaces -Use seasoned wood and a protective screen at all times.

-Clean interiors, hearths and chim-

Sleep Safety Practices Never smoke in bed.

—Discard mattresses made before the 1973 Mattress Flammability Standard, which requires cigarette ignition resistance.

-Use only electric blankets approved by testing labs.

—Don't run cords under beds or trap

them against walls.

Safe Cooking Practices Don't leave the stove unattended

while cooking. -Keep clothing, curtains and other

combustibles away from the stove. -Make sure the stove is off and small appliances are unplugged before going to bed.

-Keep lighters and matches out of

reach of children.

-Teach children how to call for emergency assistance. -Use safety plugs in electrical out-

Home Fire Escape Plans

-Plan an escape route and practice it often. Everyone should know at least two ways out of every room. —Keep emergency numbers by the phone and know how to call for as-

-Identify an outside meeting place and never return to a burning building for any reason
