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## Silver Lakers tell of road, property woes

A group of Silver Lake residents brought complaints to the Mayor and Council about problems with roads, fire hydrants, and sewers while announcing the formation of "block captains" to handle issues for individual areas of the Silver Lake District.

Dennis Forlenzo, vice president of the SLCA, presented a list of all the block captains to the council, saying the job of a captain "entails every street in Silver Lake for all police, fire, health and public works issues."

The issues will then be sent to the Neighborhood Complaint Committee chairperson, Grace Dondarski.

Dondarski told the council that residents moving out of their dwellings often leave "their junk there when they move," and asked for more expensive fines for people not taking care of their properties.

She also said there is a problem with rats in the Lake Street area that has caused residents to hire exterminators.

The area had been suffering from flooding problems before a drainage system was completed, but Dondarski said the rodent problem now exists. New Mayor Jim Messina instructed Township Manager Stephen Cuccio.

Philip SanFilippo of Watchung Avenue presented a letter to the council detailing his attempts to have a damaged fire hydrant and sidewalk at 49 Watchung Avenue.

The letter contained a listing of seven separate attempts to contact the Newark Water Department, with no success.

## Silver Lake groups differ on rail link

Marie Strumolo Burke of the Silver Lake Civic Association (SLCA) presented a petition to the Mayor and Council June 28 opposing New Jersey Transit's proposed light rail train line and rail vehicle service facility in the district.

Larry Walsh of the Silver Lake District Partnership, a business and community development group continued to call for residents to wait and look at the possibilities for economic and community development before opposing the plan.

Burke told the council "We need ratables, not vagrants, crime, litter and noise," holding newspaper stories about the poor maintenance of NJ Transit facilities she said would lower property values.

More than 20 Silver Lake residents turned out for the meeting, to oppose the rail yard and complain about several other unresolved problems in the district.

In an interview, Walsh said the 30 or so acres of available property in the district could very well be condemned and built on by NJT. "If it becomes a reality, we should

try and get as much as possible for the community."

Walsh and the business partnership have asked for street frontage, small volume retail stores to continue the business area on Franklin Street, as part of NJT's proposal.

"Business is the backbone of the whole town. I think we need to look at the economic values and increased property values that can come from this," Walsh said.

Burke and SLCA have claimed just the opposite will happen, and Deputy Mayor Mario Drozd told the residents he agreed with many of their concerns and also supports the placement of retail frontage on Franklin Street.

"I understand your concerns about crime and vagrants, and it will have to be our police first on the scene, since NJT is short 30 or 40 men. I hear they're begging for additional manpower," Drozd said, "When dealing with NJT, you should always get things in writing."

Walsh said a distinction can be made between above-ground, light

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## Drozd urges council to accept fill...

## Council digs into dirt for municipal stadium

In his final meeting as Deputy Mayor, Mario Drozd implored council members to accept tons of free dirt fill to be trucked in to raise the level of the football/soccer field at the Municipal Stadium.

Plans to renovate and refurbish the Municipal Stadium have remained at a standstill, with the former mayor and council failing to resolve litigation that prevents the town from applying for Green Acres funds to pay for the work.

Councilman Bill Cook balked at accepting the free fill, saying he was "concerned" about using it without testing samples in a laboratory first.

Charles Cerami, Department of Public Works director, said later in the meeting he was "110 percent sure" the fill was clean, and that it could be placed on fields after being sifted.

"You have an opportunity, right now, to save some money," Drozd told the council.

New Mayor Jim Messina questioned what other costs would be entailed for equipment, and said "We need all engineering specifications and the elevations."

Township Manager Stephen Cuccio said the council "had to commit to (pay for) the trucking, and a few incidentals," but that much of the equipment could be loaned for "no cost" as a donation.

Cuccio said the town would need to pay for top soil and could seed the field with a seeding machine the town owns.

Charles Cerami said the fill was "the next phase in the (Jim) Landon plan. We want to try and get the field into decent shape." The question remains, he said, where the football team would play and practice in the fall, with the outfield grass of the baseball field a possibility.

Jim Landon is a local architect who prepared detailed plans free of charge to renovate the stadium.

Drozd said "something would have to be sacrificed" for the field to be renovated.

The most recent meeting between Barbara Lawton of Bruno Associates and Township Mayor and Council in June failed to resolve an existing lawsuit that prevents the town from applying for Green Acres funding.

High School track and tennis teams have been forced to compete on the road, since the stadium facilities are inadequate, and complaints abound that the poor maintenance of other fields has created poor conditions for competing.

Lawton told the council in June that the situation remains the same as last year, with the council needing to resolve the lawsuit before state Green Acres officials will entertain an application.

The Township remains embroiled in litigation involving Neglia Engineers regarding structural problems in a restraining wall that is not up to code. Council and town officials said a settlement offer is on the table, but no action has taken.

Former Mayor Marina Perna said the wall ended up costing "in excess

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## Perna, Drozd, Noonan bid council farewell...

Mayor Marina Perna, Deputy Mayor Mario Drozd and Councilman Dr. Frank Noonan reflected on their tenures on the Township's governing body at their final council meeting June 28.

Perna told residents she and the council "struggled to find creative means to stabilize taxes, whether it meant re-organizing departments, selling tax liens, seeking lower premiums from insurance companies, devising methods to control losses or liabilities and recovering funds that were owed to municipality. While deliberating over the economic factors forever knawing at our every move, we managed to overcome the problems."

She talked about the council's "progressive approach" in getting capital improvement projects begun, as well as the Washington Avenue facade program with the Chamber of Commerce, library restoration, and the pending senior housing project.

Improving the organizational structures and efficiency of the police, fire and public works departments was also cited by the mayor. Her full statement appears on page 4 under Letters to the Editor.

Drozd, whose statement appeared on the June 30 editorial page, talked about the change of

government, that "removed politicians from the administrative mainstream, and created a system of checks and balances... We were successful in having a professional government working for the people in an efficient manner."

He also mentioned the facade program on Washington Avenue, along with drainage systems that have eased Silver Lake flooding, paving of approximately 25 streets, curb-side recycling and replacing two scoreboards at Municipal Stadium with funds solicited from individuals and local businesses.

Drozd said streamlining of government led to this year's zero municipal tax increase and a 11 point drop in 1992.

"As a community leader involved in many civic and charitable organizations, I will continually promote our township in a positive and constructive manner," Drozd said.

Dr. Noonan thanked the council for their cooperation. He said the council will combine experience with youth that represents "the future of Belleville," calling Nick Cerami, Jerry Digori, and Victor Canning "three bright young people."

"I have complete faith that this town will get better and better and better," Noonan said.

## ...As Digori, Canning, Paserchia join council

Jim Messina and Thomas Spillane were sworn-in as Mayor and Deputy Mayor, respectively, while Council-At-Large elects Jerry Digori, Victor Canning and Angie Paserchia took their oaths at the Township Council's reorganization meeting July 1.

Messina called his election "very emotional" and said of the council, "All of us have more to achieve... with a new perspective. I accept the challenge to do the substantial work... and will always put the township's best interests first."

Specifically, Messina said he would strive for "unanimity" among the council, improve the town's image which he said "suffers in the press," and have "a more orderly parliamentary procedure" that "does not interrupt residents during their five minutes" to address the council.

Spillane thanked the council for "their vote of confidence" and said "This is a very difficult period to be a member of council. We have worked to improve the town's infrastructure and raised expectations, so the people want more."

"It is my wish that we have the wisdom to change what should be changed and to keep what should be kept," Spillane said.

Digori talked about his "vision of change" to "bring respectability back to the citizens," and that "these were not empty words" but "Now the work begins."

Paserchia thanked town officials for a Saturday session that helped orient the new council members. "Whatever I do in the next four years is for the betterment of taxpayers and workers in town," she said.

Canning spoke of his promise "to do the best for the town." "I promise a new approach different from the uncompromising, arrogant approach that has been," he said, vowing to "put aside personalities" for the betterment of the town.

Township Attorney Robert Giordano was also reappointed.

A happy birthday to my good friend Anthony Serio of Division Ave.

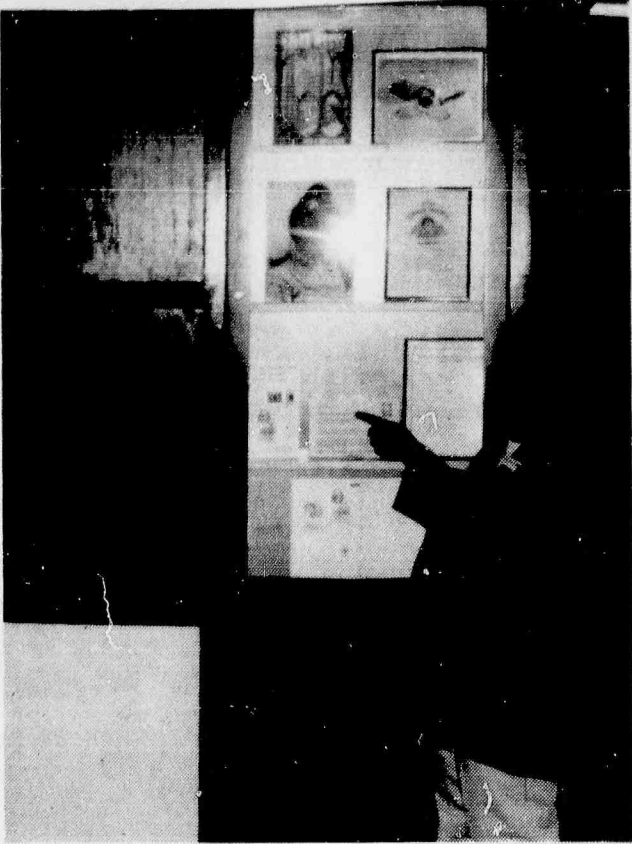

of \$300,000," more than the \$100,000 to \$150,000 she said it should have cost.

New Mayor Jim Messina blasted the council's inaction.

Lawton also told the governing body that a change in Green Acres funding policy will favor applications for the acquisition of land, and redevelopment plans like the stadium will be considered only after acquisitions, with money "leftover."

Belleville's status as an urban aid town will help its chances of getting any remaining funding, Lawton said.

Changes in the funding of Green Acres money will also hurt the Township, she said. A \$1 million application previously was allocated as 50 percent grant and 50 percent low-interest loan. Now the money is to come 25 percent grant and 75 percent loan, she said.

Lawton said that for the past several years allocation of the Green Acres funding has taken almost a year, so any funds from an application made by this October would not bring money to the town until possibly October 1995.

Township Attorney Robert Giordano said he advised the council that filing the lawsuit was not imperative since the governing body had years to act on such litigation.

Deputy Mayor Thomas Spillane and Bill Cook both said the offer to settle the lawsuit should be considered.

Perna has said that during her tenure, improvements to the stadium are being completed in phases, including improving drainage, sodding the baseball fields and building the restraining wall.

The mayor said Landon's plans were "a wish list of what we'd love the stadium to look like."

The town utilized Green Acres Funds for those renovations in the mid-to-late 1980s, which Perna said included "beautification" of the stadium.

The Green Acres funds ceased

when the town instigated litigation about the restraining wall, and now the new council must resolve the lawsuit and "trace those funds for drainage, etc." from the 1980s, Perna said.

The tennis courts are the next phase in renovations, Perna said in June, including the addition of one court and the resurfacing of the existing courts. Each phase also adds a few parking spaces for spectators in the area being renovated, she said.

The stadium area includes four tennis courts not being used for competitive games, a track also not being used in competition, three baseball/softball fields, two basketball courts and three paddle tennis courts, according to Lawton.

Perna said the stadium was built on a bog, and the tons of fill will take up water that may go down hundreds of feet below the structure.

Messina, who works in the construction field, has said the town needs to be "a little creative" in construction and said "inexperience" is why the tennis courts are still a "shambles."

Messina helped build varsity baseball dugouts in 1991, along with current DPW director Charles Cerami and Bruce Morgan of the town's Recreation Advisory Committee.

### NJT light rail train yard revisited; Economic gain tempers negative

Many Silver Lake residents have an idealized view of what should and should not happen in their district. Most people hear NJ Transit and automatically think of some of the poorly-maintained, crime-ridden stations in Newark and New York City.

These conditions, one could expect, will be the inevitable outgrowth of any NJT project in Silver Lake. Crime, noise, pollution and vagrancy would seem to be part of any deal.

A closer look, however, reveals to mitigating factors to this negative picture. First, light rail train lines generally are better maintained and attract less of the above-mentioned problems. Second, the reality is that NJT can choose to condemn the property and proceed with the plans for the link and the repair yard, regardless of public opposition.

Larry Walsh of the Silver Lake Partnership has said all along that residents should work with, and not against, NJT, to try and secure the best possible deal for the district. A group of retail stores along Franklin Street is part of a plan he and the partnership are pitching to make the district more attractive for commuting residents to live in and patronize.

Other 'dreams,' as Walsh puts it, are an arts center and commuter park and ride station to complete the changeover to a better area.

It is still difficult not to have nightmares about an irreversible negative, in the form of a poorly maintained, noisy, crime-inviting

extension and rail repair yard. Yet another equally frightening nightmare looms if residents choose to blindly reject NJT out-of-hand.

A fairly well-maintained rail link could spring up in Silver Lake, with residents failing to reap the full benefits of such a project, both economically and in community building.

This is far from a ringing endorsement of NJT, and Marie Burke and the civic association *should* continue to question every minor detail of the plans. As Mario Drozd warned in his final meeting as Deputy Mayor, any promises from NJT should be gotten in writing to ensure the best chance of them being carried out.

Economic health is a key to the health of Silver Lake, however, and any project, NJT or otherwise, should be carefully considered for its potential to improve the district's economic climate. So, instead of turning a cold shoulder to NJT, residents should instead keep a vigilant, cynical and critical eye on every element of their proposals.

Sometimes, the best way to fight against something you *don't* want is to instead fight those same forces for something you *do* want. Silver Lake may end up having a chance to improve itself by acquiring improvements from a company that will do what they think is best regardless of residents' opinions. It would be unwise to let such an opportunity pass in the name of blind opposition.

### Silver Lakers demanding action; stay tuned for council's response

While the question of whether or not the installation of NJ Transit's light rail train line and repair yard is open for debate, the other problems Silver Laker's were demanding response to are not.

Whether it be the damaged fire hydrant and sidewalk on Watchung Avenue, or rats running rampant near Lake Street, streets and sewers torn up but not paved, or 'junk' is left from exiting residents for weeks without any action, residents of the district sent a clear call for action.

Now it remains to be seen how much response will come from the new Mayor and Council to these problems, and fast it

will come.

The three new council members, as well as the new mayor and deputy mayors and the sitting councilmen have all vowed to 'change' and 'improve' government's response to residents' needs. The Silver Lake call for action is a perfect opportunity for the new council to make good on its promises.

We will all pay close attention to the council's action or inaction as the summer wears on, and their actions will be closely scrutinized and criticized, when necessary, in this editorial space. Good luck, folks.

### Perna looks back four years at tenure as Belleville mayor

To the editor:

Nearly four years ago, the people of Belleville, by overwhelming majority, had decided to bring about change within the government in the hopes of revitalizing the town, its departments and its appearance.

Having placed a tremendous amount of faith in me, the council selected me to be the new mayor. There was no sense of order, and we were striving to make great adjustments both in the township itself and with our personal lives. The commitment to public office involves a great personal sacrifice of time, dedication to the people and the need to find a purpose for every action or inaction.

The economy was constantly working against our favor and creating severe budgetary problems. A sharp loss of revenues, the war against tax appeals, and local merchants trying to stay in business became the common denominator in attempting to justify every cut back or restriction on spending. Clearly, these were not the roaring eighties when America experienced a surge in the economy, real estate was at its peak, consumers were happily spending, savings were accumulated with ease and yielded a higher return. Despite these adversities, the council struggled to find creative means to stabilize taxes, whether it meant re-organizing departments, selling tax liens, seeking lower premiums from insurance companies, devising methods to control losses or liabilities and recovering funds that were owed to the municipality.

While debating over the economic factors forever gnawing at our every move, we managed to overcome the problems. The council took on a progressive approach to governing, and soon, many capital projects were underway to improve our community. The Washington Avenue shops had new storefronts and pride emanated from the merchants and business owners. The Belleville Chamber of Commerce is duly recognized for its efforts in this regard. The Belleville Public Library was restored to its impressive artistic appearance, and state of the art computers and security devices were installed to provide maximum efficiency and technology to its patrons. I thank the library board of trustees, former Director David Bryant and current Director Adrea Cohen for their unyielding efforts to make our library one of the best in the state.

Countless hours were spent attempting to develop our first senior citizen housing project exclusively for

our residents. The site has been selected; sponsors have been interviewed; financing has been researched, and soon, construction will begin. I thank the members of the council for keeping senior citizen concerns foremost in their minds and in their hearts.

Through the decisions of the council, the organizational chart of the police department was increased to 92 officers. A new wave of car-jackings were stopped before they precipitated, and auto thefts decreased to their lowest number in several years. I thank Chiefs Lister and Kimble for their intelligence, prowess and care. The safety of Belleville residents was entrusted to them, and they have never failed us. Because of their work, our streets and parks are secure and our neighborhoods are free from harsh crime.

Similarly, our fire department is to be complimented for the many acts of bravery in saving lives and in transporting the sick and the injured to hospitals. My thanks to Chief Caruso for doing a fine job.

The public works department, having suffered the most loss of men, was soon on its way to working more efficiently. New street sweepers, dump trucks, pick-up trucks and equipment were provided by the council to ensure smooth operations. Moreover, Mr. Herits, our engineer, deserves much credit for overseeing the paving of more than 50 streets and other major projects involving public works. We broke all records with our tree and stump removal efforts. Our stadium, ball fields and recreational areas are beautiful!

I extend my special thanks to Mr. Tom Longo, director of our health department. We did not have large amounts of funds to work with, but you never complained when we could not meet all of your needs. Instead, you found ways to accomplish tasks and run your department better than ever, to everyone's surprise. Additionally, I thank our tax assessor, Mr. Salzano, for performing a job which carries with it negative stigmas; yet with your very personable approach to all situations, you quickly put everyone at ease. I also thank the director of finance, the director of recreation and our township clerk for serving our township with loyalty.

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## Aside From That

The arguments of the Republican lawmakers in Trenton as they abolished the office of Public Advocate - "It was unnecessary...expensive...leftist" - is consistent with the Republican policy of being wrong on most issues in this century.

Not since the administration of Teddy Roosevelt has the Republican Party been on the side of the people against the monied interests, or even on the side of good sense.

After World War I, the Republicans torpedoed American participation in the League of Nations, effectively undoing what had cost 56,000 lives to accomplish and ensuring the coming of a second World War.

As that war approached, and even as it raged, Republicans opposed rearmament and almost defeated the re-enactment of Selective Service in 1941.

In the 1920s, even as two members of President Warren Harding's Cabinet were

on their way to jail for selling government oil reserves to private firms, Republicans supported a wide-open stock market frenzy coupled with the enactment of the restrictive Smoot-Hawley Tariff, both of which are generally considered responsible for the Great Depression.

When the Depression came, Republicans at first denied it existed, and then refused to provide direct assistance to the victims, even when they faced outright starvation.

They fought the New Deal, opposed stock market regulation, Social Security, bank deposit protection and reforestation, among other things.

They effectively prevented the expenditure of enough federal funds to really end the Depression.

Then the Japanese ignored former President Herbert Hoover's proclamation of a "Fortress America" that was impregnable to foreign assault, and plunged the

half-prepared nation into World War II.

At the end of World War II, Republicans demanded the immediate demobilization of the Armed Forces, charging that Franklin D. Roosevelt was planning to keep the boys in uniform to avoid unemployment.

They got their wish, and the Soviets almost overran Europe, forcing the revival of the Draft. The Republicans also forced wages, and they succeeded, destroying the economic base that had supported the prosperity of the post-war years. At the same time, they sold virtually every industry we had, from steel making to electronics, to Japan, Germany and Europe.

One clue to the problems we face is that when employment figures have risen sharply, the Stock Market has panicked. Full employment means paying more to the work force, and that is something the Republican leadership has been paid all these years to prevent.

A party whose answer to crime is the death penalty, and replaces \$20-an-hour jobs with \$4-an-hour McJobs, is surely not

going to abide a Public Advocate.

The Republican leadership spent much of its efforts in the 1950s trying to prove that Communists were in every school cafeteria.

Republican policy under Presidents Richard Nixon, Ronald Reagan and George Bush was aimed at breaking the power of organized labor to force down that Roosevelt bombed Pearl Harbor and the premature end of price controls, throwing the country into its first Post-War Recession.

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## Silver Lakers differ on train

rail trains and subways, citing a Montclair light rail station that is near a school and in the middle of a business area as an example of a well-maintained NJT property.

"We are businessmen with an investment in the community," Walsh said. "We are looking at what makes the whole area stronger and promotes a good image."

He said his group is looking at other community improvements, including arts and crafts programs, a "Kid Care" program, and concerts and theater programs he believes "could become a reality."

Walsh said he envisions a commuter park and ride station, along with an arts center, that would bring people from surrounding towns into the district to shop, and eventually to live.

"Commuters may come to Silver Lake to live because it would be convenient. Many younger people go directly to PATH trains from here with no fear," Walsh said. "Instead of building a wall we have to have constant communication with NJT and each other."

After an April meeting with NJ Transit officials, the Silver Lake District Civic Association publicly opposed a proposed extension of the Newark City Subway through Belleville and the locating of a rail vehicle service facility in the Township.

Residents from the Silver Lake District questioned whether NJT could prevent the potential for increases in noise, pollution and crime that may lower property values.

Burke has said the SLCA needs a guarantee that the facility will be completed, operated and maintained properly or it may become "a non-reversible negative property" that could not be changed into something else, like a park, once it belongs to NJT.

Residents are being told that they should take this proposal or else something else like low-cost

housing will be put there, Burke said, in an attempt to frighten resi-

dents into supporting the plan.

At present, no tax ratable properties are proposed, although both Walsh and Drozd have proposed professional or business structures to be built in front of the proposed rail station.

Perhaps the biggest problem, Burke has said, is the fear that policing and maintaining the facility will deteriorate with budget constraints in the future, leaving the facility in the same "less-than-satisfactory condition" as many of the other NJT stations.

NJT presented information at the April 26 meeting on existing conditions in the Belleville-Bloomfield area, identified key issues for the specific station areas and the planned vehicle base facility and evaluated the station site alternatives.

Dr. Jerome M. Lutin, senior director of NJT's Newark-Elizabeth Rail Link Division, spoke about positive impacts the project would have on property values.

"People even advertise 'walk to train' as a feature when selling their homes, because it gives their house an advantage," Lutin said.

The safety record of light rail systems was emphasized by Lutin, who cited a report from the Federal Transit Administration saying that

light rail transit systems report an average of 6.43 accidents per million miles, a rate that is much safer than diving.

An environmental consultant said the vehicle base facility allows the opportunity for economic growth and increases the value of land in the area.

The vehicle base facility is to anchor the site and it would be buffered from the community by other buildings, landscaping and compatible land uses, according to NJT officials.

As for security, officials said the agency's 131-member police department will be responsible for securing the facilities.

Buses and the trains are to have state-of-the-art radios to report emergencies and criminal activities.

The proposed Newark-Elizabeth Rail Link is configured as an extension of the Newark subway, to connect the Broad Street Station on the Morris and Essex Lines to Newark Penn Station on the Northeast Corridor and link major activity center within downtown Newark to Newark International Airport.

Officials stressed that all plans are preliminary.

Messina said he would speak to the Newark City Administrator's office to "get some action."

"This is a serious situation. The valve stem (on the hydrant) was taken out and never replaced, and the sidewalk has been undermined," Messina said.

SanFilippo said his main concern was "that someone could fall down and get hurt" but also said he was concerned about fire protection being "diminished" and that the situation was "environmentally unsound."

Township Manager Stephen

Cuccio also addressed complaints about road resurfacing and sewers on Lake Street and Honis Avenue, respectively. He said the contractor, H.A.M. of Passaic was refusing to finish the job until they got paid, and suggested the town "call in the bond" and award the job to another contractor.

"This is what you put up when you go with low-bidders," Messina said, advising Township Attorney Robert Giordano to "give notice" to the contractor.

Progress on all the Silver Lake issues should be discussed at the new council's July 12th meeting.



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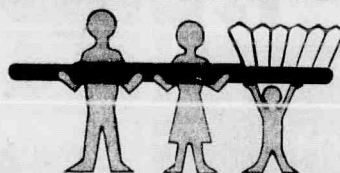

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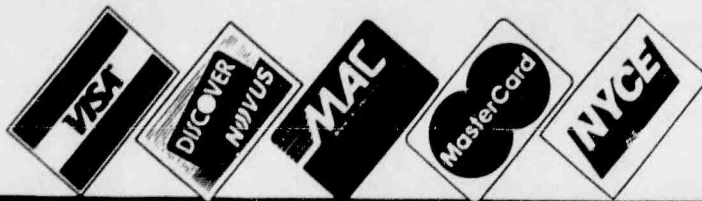
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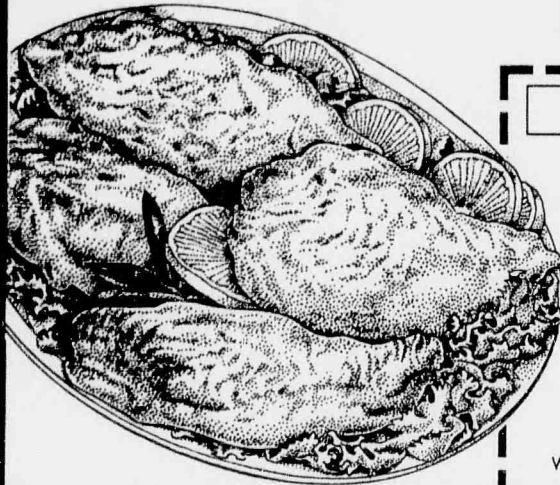

## In Re: Municipal Stadium

### Welcome, Mayor Messina Good Riddens, Mayor Perna

It's a time of celebration in our Township, and not only because of the July 4th weekend.

The Township of Belleville went through its Governmental changes last Friday evening, with **Jim Messina** being named the Mayor of Belleville and **Tom Spillane** selected as the Deputy Mayor.

Thus, the Township Council has a new look to it, with three new members coming aboard. **Jerry DiGori**, **Angie Paserchia** and **Victor Canning** are the newest Council members, and nothing but the best of luck is wished to them.

Departing the Council are former Mayor **Marina Perna** and former Deputy Mayor, **Mario Drozdz**.

A note about Mayor Perna. This is a talented, gifted professional, a person who now plans to devote her time to her law practice.

She spent four years in the Council and served as Mayor for the entire tenure. It's not an easy job. Perna, a native of Belleville and a Belleville High School grad, was the youngest Mayor in Belleville history and during her tenure, she had to endure a brutal recession that, nationally, was one of the worst since the Great Depression.

No one questions her abilities, her intelligence and her desire to be the Mayor of our Township.

Many in the community will note her work with the senior citizen base and her endless efforts in trying to keep the tax base under control.

But Perna gave the impression that the issue of Municipal Stadium was nothing more than a secondary concern, something that would stay on the back burner.

Her comments recently, calling plans to refurbish the stadium as a "wish list of what we'd love the stadium to look like", is a perfect example of Perna's apparent lack of concern on this issue.

We've seen the facilities deteriorate over the past four years. The track and tennis teams have not been home since the late 1980's because their facilities are inadequate. The Council assigned a committee to help devise a plan to rehab the entire stadium facility in 1990, and the committee did its job well.

However, the improvements never did get fully off the ground. The baseball field was revamped, but the field has not been maintained properly. (Witness the sprinkler system and the story of that ridiculous fence which separates the two fields).

The grandstands were rehabbed under the now famous Green Acres plan, but that renovation was authorized during the late 1980's, before the change of government.

It cost nearly half a million dollars to get the grandstands in order, mainly because the structure was badly deteriorated.

Perna said those funds were used to "beautify" the stadium.

If she had seen the stadium, the lockerroom and the adjoining area, I doubt she would say the monies beautified the area. Those monies strictly kept the place from falling down.

While the Perna Administration is now a part of the past, the efforts (or lack of) put forth over the past four years to improve the Municipal Stadium complex will not be brushed aside.

More has to be known as to why practically nothing was done. Why did the Council keep a lawsuit pending for two years which made Belleville ineligible for future Green Acres funds?

The general consensus is that the Council *could care less* about the complex. The new government, at least on the surface, promises to be different.

DiGori, a Belleville High School graduate and former football standout in the late 1970's, used the issue of Municipal Stadium as one of his key campaign points.

Not so coincidentally, he received the most votes in the last election.

Now, it will be interesting to see how he reacts to the stadium and how long it will take to get our athletes home.

I'm not an architect, but I think it doesn't take an engineering mind to understand what has to be done. The baseball fields on the JV level need major work. There was talk that the football field needs to be raised because of the water table.

When **Jim Landon** devised the plans three years ago to improve the Stadium, he came up with some well thought out plans, which *didn't* call for major renovations. They did call for adding parking spots and, the addition of a field house near where the old tennis courts used to be adjacent to the football field.

The field house was a good idea, and it's something desperately needed in our township.

But, most importantly, **you have three varsity teams that cannot compete at home because the facilities aren't good enough!!!!!!**

**PLEASE!!!!!!**

Let's make that our number one priority. Let's give the members of the track, boys and girls' tennis teams a chance to compete at home.

The seniors who just graduated a few weeks ago and who competed for the track or tennis programs, *never competed at home during their high school careers!!!!!!*

Something is terribly, terribly wrong with that!

This garbage has to stop.

I wish Mayor Messina and our new Council the best of luck. Please, review the Landon plans again, let's get started on this NOW!

There is a new school year approaching in a little less than two months. The girls tennis team will be competing during the fall sports season. Is there any chance those athletes can call the Belleville High School tennis courts home in 1994?

So that's it. As I said three months ago, this is an issue that will not go away until all of our athletes can call Municipal Stadium

ranks), their guidance, devotion, patience and leadership alleviated me of a lot of pressure. I look forward to coaching with them next season."

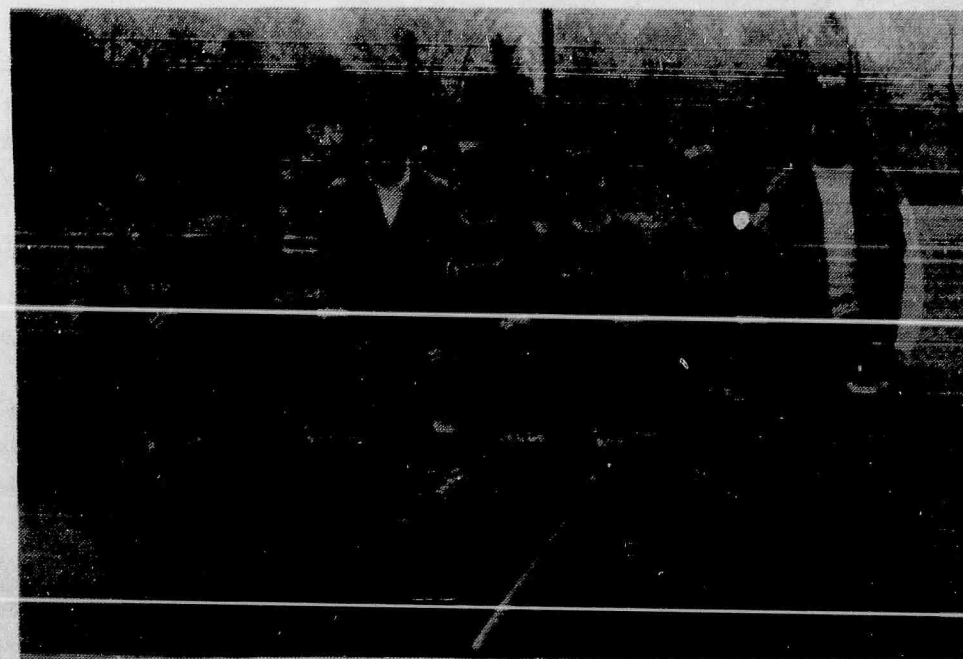
Thanks were also extended to the parents of the players, along with the Belleville Baseball Commission, led by League president Paul Disporto, League director Lenny Palumbo and

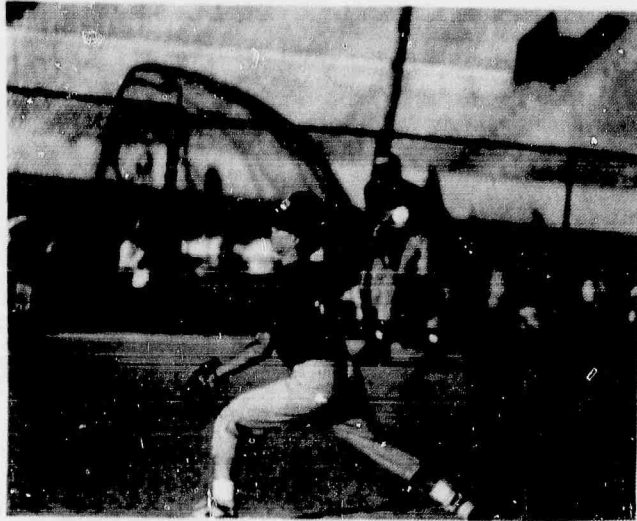
If not, then we'll hear a few years from now that Belleville still hasn't applied for Green Acres funding and is still embroiled in a lawsuit.

So, it's a new era. Perna is out, Messina is in.

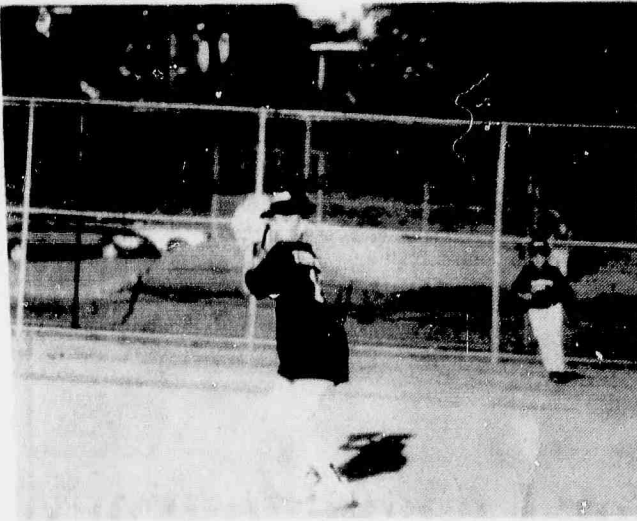
It's a time of hope and optimism.

### POP CULTURE?

At least ten national studies have described Americans as anything but the "pill-popping" culture that they are popularly portrayed to be. In fact, surveys by Gallup, Louis Harris and Associates, and other firms on the use of over-the-counter (OTC) medication indicates that Americans use OTC medications for only 38 percent of self-treatable conditions. When asked, nine consumers in ten said they know that medication should only be taken when necessary. Nearly seven in ten said that they prefer to fight symptoms without taking medications. Ninety percent claim to read product labels before taking an OTC medication for the first time. It seems that Americans know when to self-medicate, know how much to take, and know when to cease their efforts and seek professional help.

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HINT: The problem that Americans are most likely to treat with OTC medication is headache (70 percent of the time)

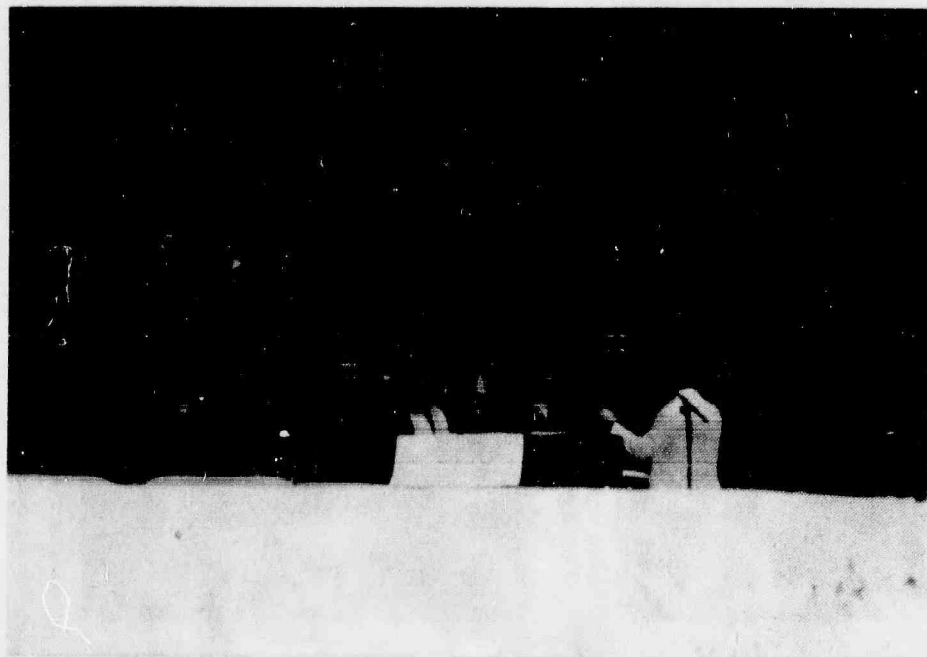

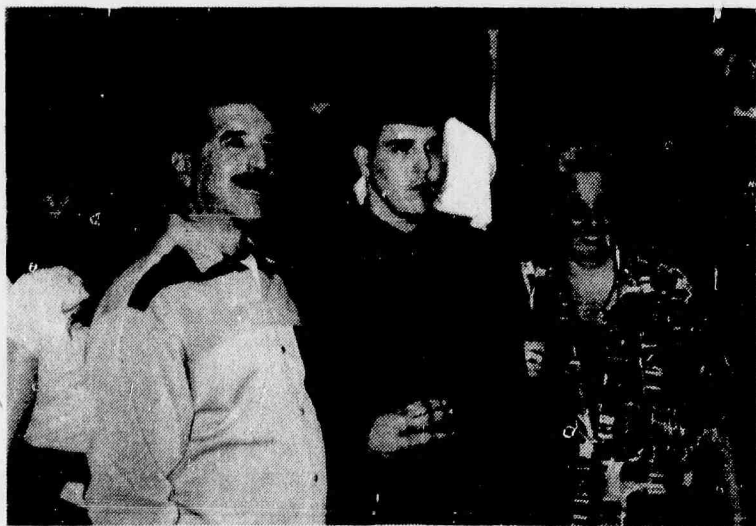
