## Town budget has 2-point tax drop

#### **By Richard Dickon**

The 1994 Municipal budget was amended to cut \$815,800 from the original budget, with about a two-point tax decrease in the municipal portion of residents' property tax bills.

Amendments to the \$29.9 million budget was passed after Councilwoman Angie Paserchia and Councilman Jerry Digori reconsidered their votes

The two had voted no, but changed their votes to yes after Mayor Jim Messina told them the Township would have no budget and no tax rate if the amendments were not passed.

Many of the same handful of residents who spoke out in June again said they were not content with a two-point municipal tax decrease at the August 9 meeting.

The mayor and council approved reductions to the introduced budget totaling about \$815,000 and are using \$1.5 million in accumulated budget surplus

## Fire dept. ranks, salaries approved

A resolution has been approved officially setting the Fire Department's table of organization at five Battalion Chiefs, four captains and nine lieutenants. The resolution was passed by the Township Mayor and Council at the August 9 public meeting.

The fire department's salary ordinance was also passed on first reading, with a public hearing scheduled for Sept. 13.

The ordinance offers top salaries ranging from \$67,314 to \$74,766 for Fire Chief; \$58,534 to \$65,014 for Battalion Chief; \$51,162 to \$56,534 for Captain; \$45,605 for Lieutenant and \$29,361 to \$42,750 for firefighters.

The promotions will remain open until salary contract negotiations are completed, according to officials.

The fire department will be restructured, with four existing Deputy Chiefs being given the option of retiring at full pension or accepting a lower-paying Battalion Chief position, as part of a change in the department's hierarchy

In addition four firefighters will be promoted to Lieutenant positions. The change is supposed to save about \$260,000 this year, about \$150,000 in salaries, according to Township Manager Stephen Cuccio.

Councilman Bill Cook said the ordinances should be taken off the table and voted on August 9. "We have civil service considerations, and decisions about careers are being made. The longer this is on the table the longer there is with no cost savings," Cook said.

"If a fire professional is coming to me saying 'I can fight fires better with this table of organization," Cook added, "I have to agree, if this saves one structure, or half or one tenth of a structure it is worth it.'

Cook suggested the Council examine performance measures after six months to see if the changes are translating into better performances.

Deputy Mayor Thomas Spillane, who voted against changing the table of organization, said "The previous table has served the township well, and has saved money. This will cost money and add more ranks. If we re going to add, let's add to the ranks of the firefighters, not to the upper ranks.'

Mayor Jim Messina said "I have no problem with the Chief's recommendations," before voting in favor of the changes.

Councilwoman Angie Paserchia said she did not have the expertise to overrule the chief's recommendations. "I've done a lot of homework on this, but if it were up to me, I'm afraid the town would I am down. I have to go with the professionals."


The vote was 4 to 2, with Councilman Nick Cerami voting no, Councilman Jerry Digori voting yes and Councilman Victor Canning being away on vacation.

As part of the agreement, the township will pay half-salary "separation allowances" to any member who chooses retirement, including the four deputy fire chiefs.

## **Stadium mess blamed** on trespasser dumping

By Richard Dickon A toilet bowl and other debris mixed in with dirt being stored on the old tennis courts at the Municipal Stadium is being blamed on illegal late-night dumping.

'Someone did dump a load of concrete on the dirt," said Charles Cerami, director of the Department of Public Works.

Dirt has been placed on the old tennis courts from "road openings," where Township roads have been resurfaced, Cerami said.

That fill could be trucked away, at considerable expense to the town, but Cerami said "We can save money by dumping it on the courts. We're getting fill for nothing.'

### Suspected car thief shot dead

A suspected car thief was killed by police Sunday night after he shot a hostage, crashed two stolen cars and attempted to carjack a third vehicle on Washington Avenue.

The deceased male was identified as James Lomack, 21, of Newark and police are searching for a second accomplice.

At a press conference held Monday afternoon in the office of Essex County Prosecutor Clifford J. Minor, Nutley Police Chief Robert DeLitta said "the Nutley police department as well as the Belleville police department performed exemplary."

Authorities were unable to confirm how many gunshot wounds were inflicted on the suspect and if he had fired back at police during the shoot out. The hostage also received a gun shot wound from the suspects 9mm A.A. Arms Model AP 9 Aussault Pistol.

#### prevent thefts

**By Richard Dickon** Belleville youths and all bicycle owners are advised to take extra precautions to protect their bicycles from a rash of thefts that has seen about 20 bicycles stolen in the past two weeks, as compared to about 30 for the entire summer previously.

"We want kids to help us prevent bicycle thefts by taking little extra precautions," said Police Det. Pete Fraone, crime prevention officer, in announcing a registration program to help identify and recover stolen bicycles.

Fraone said with youths being out of school for the summer, bicycles are being stolen when they are not locked in vards or even garages. Riding alone can also make you a target for being pulled off a bicycle directly and having the bicycle robbed.

Starting on August 24 and continuing until school starts, residents can register a bicycle every Monday, Wednesday and Friday, from 1 to 3 p.m. at Police Headquarters. Once school starts, registration will be 3 to 5 p.m. Monday and Friday.

Bicycle frames will be stamped with a registration number, and the number will kept on a computer file as well as a paper file, Fraone said.

Disasters happen anytime and anywhere, and when disaster strikes, you may not have much time to respond. You will eventually get help, but you could get that help in hours, or it may take days. Would your family be prepared to cope with the emergency until help arrives?

The Belleville Office of **Emergency Management (OEM)** suggests six basics that you should stock in your home. They are water, food, first aid supplies, clothing and bedding, tools and emergency supplies, and special items. They should be kept in an easy-to-carry container, such as a plastic garbage can, backpack or dufflebag.

"Special items" would be for those people who have babies (formula, diapers, etc.) or it could be heart medication, insulin, prescripments or games for the children, to Walter M. Beresford, coordinator of OEM.

As part of OEM's public education program and an effort to provide disaster awareness to children in Belleville, the OEM is providing 10 family disaster commuter kits to the Belleville Recreation Department along with two brochures. The brochures are "Helping Children Cope with Disaster" and "Family Disaster Survival Kit."

A Citizen's Disaster Manual will also be provided to each child. This will provide an opportunity to reach out to the youth of our community and familiarize them with disaster awareness. Each kit contains the following items: a day pack, calorie bar, water, hand and body warmer, emergency blanket,

Residents should rethink their family's needs and the contents of their survival kit, at least once a year, Beresford said. Replacing batteries and clothing, changing the water supply and food supply every six months to keep it fresh and rotating canned goods are all recommended.

Beresford said a commuter disaster kit is important today since we are seeing natural disasters become more prevalent.

The town had 17 snow storms in 19993-94, besides heavy rains and windstorms. Beresford said if you must get off the road when traveling, the comfort of knowing that you have some essential items in your car should take the edge off a stressful incident or situation.

#### Clara Maass day care program continuing

Despite reports to the contrary, Clara Maass Medical Center's Kid's Place day care center will continue to provide full service to hospital employees and children of parents in the Belleville area.

Barbara Benjamin, assistant vice president at Clara Maass, said the day care center will continue to provide services to children, from infants six weeks and older to pre-school age.

Parents had met with hospital officials August 10 to express concern that the program might be closed. "After meeting with parents, where we saw how

much of a need there is for our day care program, we are recruiting children for our September enrollment," Benjamin said, "The program will stay exactly the way it was."

Bonjamin said there had been a misunderstanding that Clara Maass was considering closing the entire day care center.

"We had been talking about closing the infant area of the Kid's Place," she explained, "Now that it has been shown to be a valuable asset, we decided that it would not, in fact, be closed."

The deceased was described by Minor as being a black male, 5-foot-4, 170 pounds in his mid-to late 20's.

blue Mazda after he noticed the car exit the Regency Townhouse Apartment parking lot at 9:45 p.m. and speed along River Road without turning on the headlights.

Malanga chased the vehicle, which was stolen on Friday from Union Township, until the Mazda reached the Belleville border, according to the statement.

Belleville police officers Joseph Trabucco and Rory Shewmeister picked up the pursuit and also attempted to stop the stolen car at Mill Street and Washington Avenue.

Eventually, the Mazda returned to Nutley and the driver crashed it into a fence while attempting to turn right onto Kingsland Street from Washington Avenue.

Police searched nearby wooded areas for the two males seen exiting the crashed car when Nutley Police officer Bryant Jernick heard screams and a gunshot.

A fleeing suspect grabbed Debra Marchese, a 36-year-old mother of two children, from the front of her house on Howe Avenue and brought her inside as a hostage, according to the statement.

The family heard the sirens and activity outside their home and went to investigate, according to DeLitta. "She went out a second time and the next thing she knows this guy grabs her," said DeLitta.

The suspect forced Marchese into the garage to the family's Ford Bronco. While her husband and children waited outside with police, he demanded at gunpoint that she accompany him.

DeLitta said the suspect fired two shots, hitting the woman's leg with one bullet after she opened and then accidentally dropped the garage door before pulling out the car.

At this point, Nutley and Belleville police vehicles surrounded the home and police officers were attempting to talk to the suspect, DeLitta said

Dawn Krupka, a Nutley resident who was riding in a car with friends at the time, said she saw the car sit in the driveway for several minutes, blocked in by police, before it smashed into one police cruiser and sped off over the lawn

Krupka said she heard several gunshots, too many to count, shortly after the car drove off with police giving chase.

According to police reports, the suspect then crashed the Bronco near a Chevy GMC truck occupied by Mario Rivera and Monica Marmol. The truck was stopped at the light at Park and River roads. As police approached the scene the suspect attempted to carjack the blue pick-up by pointing the gun at Rivera. After a brief struggle, both Rivera and Marmol escaped the vehicle. Marchese was also able to escape her car and "someone was holding her up," Krupka said.

According to the prosecutor's statement, the police reports indicated that the suspect pointed his weapon at police and they fired at the suspect in self-defense. He was pronounced dead at the scene.

Marchese was treated and released at University Hospital in Newark for the wound on her leg.

A joint investigation by the Nutley and Belleville police departments and Essex County Prosecutor's office continues, DeLitta said.

## **Belleville students score high** on school proficiency tests

By Richard Dickon School Superintendent Michael A. Lally reported student scores for three separate proficiency tests at the July 25 public Board of Education meeting.

Announcing test results for the Iowa Basic Skills, Early Warning Test and High School Proficiency Test, Lally praised school personnel for the excellent results.

"I am extremely proud of our students accomplishments, as compared with other school districts in Essex County," Lally said, "Our supervisors deserve a great deal of credit. Our school personnel are working very hard to prepare students for whatever challenges they face in the future."

Lally described the district as "proactive and progressive, not reactive and static."

The Iowa tests were administered in May to all students, grades kindergarten through eighth. The tests covered three areas, reading, language arts and writing, and mathematics.

In reading, 95.3 percent of all students met the standard proficien-

cy, with 96.1 percent and 86.5 percent of students achieving proficiency in language arts and writing and mathematics, respectively.

The Early Warning Test is part of "the implementation of action at specific grade levels," Lally said, and was given to 237 eighth graders as "a precursor" to the Grade 11 High School Proficiency Test.

The scoring had three levels. Level one was most satisfactory, level two was acceptable and Level Three was poorest.

In reading, 91.5 percent of all eighth graders scored level two or better. A total of 20 students scoring in level three have been scheduled for remediation.

In mathematics, 81.3 percent achieved level two or better, while 42 students scoring at level three have been slated for remediation. In writing, 91.9 percent scored level one or two, with 19 students scoring in level three and set to be in remediation.

In October, 243 high school eleventh graders took the high school proficiency test. In reading,

89.3 percent passed, while 87.9 and 98.7 percent passed for mathematics and writing, respectively. In a May retest, the percentages improved to 93.6 for reading, 94.8 for mathematics and 97.3 for writing, giving the grade a 92 percent for all areas of testing.

part in a citizens committee to work with the Council's budget committee on next year's budget. "If you feel that strongly, you

can be a part of the process," Messina said "We're looking for input."

Albanese told the Council he found another \$500,000 in savings that have could have been cut from the budget.

Frantantoni criticized the early retirement plan for the Fire Department (see related story, this page) he said will cost money down the line in deferred payments.

He also questioned why the Police Department budget appears

to be up \$454,000 in the "inside the cap" portion of the budget amendments.

Township Manager Stephen Cuccio told Frantantoni that a similar reduction exists in the "outside the cap" portion of the budget, leaving the department at about the same spending level as last year.


The list of reductions inside the "cap" totals \$459,000 and is as follows: \$27,000 from the Township Clerk's office; \$50,000 from the finance office; \$260,000 from the Fire Departments; \$30,000 from the Law Department; \$20,000 from the Construction office; A total of \$35,000 from Utilities, including gasoline and lighting; and \$37,000 from the Library.

A total of \$765,758.90 is reduced from items excluded from the "cap."

The total reductions are offset by the \$454,900 increase in the police department listed inside the "cap."

The fire department, as a result of restructuring the department's hierarchy, will pay half-salary "separation allowances" to any member who chooses retirement, including four deputy fire chiefs lower pay and the rank of Battalion who can either retire or accept Chief.



## Adding to fire dept. hierarchy bodes badly for angry taxpayers

on July 1st, we gave them our blessing, believing they would act in the best interests of beleagured taxpayers. Unfortunately, their changing of the Fire Department's table of organization is not best for Belleville taxpayers.

Mayor Jim Messina, Councilwoman Angie Paserchia and Councilmen Bill Cook and Jerry Digori all approved a new table of organization for the Fire Department, with Messina, Paserchia and Cook all saying that Fire Chief Robert Caruso should be responsible for picking the hierarchy.

It is true that the Fire Chief's input is extremely important in organizing the department, recognizing that lives, structures and property depend on the department running as efficiently as possible.

However, the new table of organization adds four new supervisory positions that may increase costs in the future. As Deputy Mayor Thomas Spillane correctly pointed out in voting against the change, the old system worked fine, and perhaps the department should have less supervision and more firefighters available to actually fight fires.

The Mayor and four Council members who approved the changes shirked their responsibility to look for the most costeffective methods to run town departments. While it is true that the changes save money in salaries immediately, by replac-

When the Township Council reorganized ing Deputy Chiefs with lower-paid Battalion Chiefs, the overall gain of four supervisory positions will cost money down the line.

> The amended 1994 Municipal budget offers beleaguered residents a two-point tax decrease. Not bad when taken by itself, but it must be heaped on top of a 68-point, average \$266 tax increase from the schools. Add in a tax increase from the county, and residents' disenchantment with property tax bills is understandable.

> Residents, particularly older residents trying to survive on fixes incomes, are angry about tax increases. Some will be forced to move because they cannot afford to pay property taxes.

> Until legislation to adjust property taxes to reflect reduced incomes of senior citizens is enacted by the state Legislature, older residents are counting on the Township Council to spend money wisely. Reorganizing town departments is one way to save money, and a proposal to streamline the Department of Public Works may provide substantial, long-term savings.

> Such actions, along with reasonable but fair salary increases for police, fire, and white and blue collar employees will go a long way toward restoring residents' faith that the council has their best interests at heart. Caving in to the fire department on an increased table of organization is not a good start towards such actions.

## **Crime statistics, Simpson murder** case expose domestic violence issue

The 1993 Uniform Crime Report shows fluctuations in area crime statistics except for one area. In Nutley, Belleville and Bloomfield, domestic violence reports were all on the rise.

The attention payed to the murder of O.J. Simpson's ex-wife and friend temporarily focused attention on Simpson's alleged abusive behavior toward his spouse, as have television shows such as "Roseanne" and "Grace Under Fire."

Domestic violence has long been the silent crime in America. Perhaps the increase in reports in our area, along with media attention to cases such as the Simpson murder, mean that the subject is finally beginning to be taken out of the closet.

The more attention focused on the issue, the more people who come forward to publicly talk about being the victims of domes-

tic violence, the better chance there is for those wives, husbands, and children to overcome their fear of reprisal and seek the help they need to break the cycles of violence that may exist in more households than any of us would like to believe.

Little good has come from the publicity given to the O.J. Simpson case, outside of focusing attention on the dangers of unreported and uninterrupted domestic violence cases. For the long-term, keeping the public aware and sensitive to the problem may be the only worthwhile legacy for this ongoing media circus.

Domestic violence is too important of a problem for America to need a sensational murder trial to bring it to the forefront. All media would do well to pay more time and devote more editorial space to uncovering and helping to keep the problem out of the shadows

## **Protect your pet** in hot weather

#### To the Editor.

Summer weather means its time for a reminder of how hot the inside of a car gets on a hot day, even with the windows partially open. The Humane Society of the United States warns: When it's hot -leave your pet at home! In New Jersey, it is against the law to leave dogs in hot cars and readers should notify local police or the SPCA immediately.

On a warm day, the temperature in your car can reach 160 degrees in a matter of minutes. With only hot air to breathe, a pet can quickly suffer brain damage or die from heatstroke. Open windows, shaded parking areas or air conditioned cars with the motor off won't save your pet's life.

Be sure you know these signs of heat stress: heavy panting, glazed eyes, rapid pulse rate, dizziness, vomiting, or a deep red or purple tongue. If your pet does become overheated, get him into the shade and take these emergency steps:

- Apply ice packs or cold towels to the head, neck and chest.

- Don't give an unlimited amount of cold water. Let him lick ice cubes or even ice cream.

- Get the dog to a veterinarian immediately. It could save your pet's life.

Reading about the tremendous success of Disney's "Lion King" merchandise - and viewing the gripping Public Broadcasting System's "The Great Depression" - we are moved to tell how Disney helped our Uncle Ben lick the Depression a half century ago.

Ben was not a man of great physical stature but he had a fine intellect, and he was a college graduate at a time when it was still considered an honor to be one.

He was also born in time to be one of the participants in that great adventure known as the Great Depression, an era in which a college degree was better for stuffing a hole in your shoe than for getting you steady employment.

He did get a job in a Brooklyn department store where being a good salesman did not spare him from the daily humiliations that the floor boss loved to reserve for the"collitch man".

He travelled an hour each day to his apartment in a frame house in Far Rockaway, a place intended as a summer residence, where his beautiful wife and two boys braced against the winter cold. During the Depression, winters were usually 10 months long.

In the late '30s, he followed an older brother to Chicago, where there seemed to



be a few more job opportunities at the

He became involved with a sweater factory. During the Depression, men's sweaters were big sellers.

His sales commissions of a few cents on a sweater were enough to let him bring the family West, but life was still a struggle.

And then he got his Big Idea.

time.

It was nothing less than putting the face of Mickey Mouse on children's sweaters.

But these would not be simply dyed-on prints whose colors would run in the first wash.

The famous face would be integrated into the sweater, using a complicated Swiss knitting machine called a Jacquard.

(The Jacquard was a forerunner of today's computer, using punch cards to create patterns.)

Of course, Ben had to get the permission of Walt Disney, who insisted that the sweater be a quality product.

Sales were phenomenal. No single knitting factory could keep up with the demand. Buyers from every major chain and department store descended on Ben.

The grinning face of the Mouse brought delight to young and old alike, and those were just the retailers, and Ben's percentage of the millions of dollars in sales -

he was still on a modest commission - was enough to catapult him from a modest apartment to a magnificent North Shore chateau, complete with pool room, wine cellar and automatic garage door openers.

The prosperity lasted for about two years, and a subsequent effort to use other Disney characters was not successful enough to keep the allegiance of the buyers.



## In Re: Municipal Stadium **Council should heed** Morgan's advice

Back in April of this year, this column began to look seriously at the problems that have plagued Belleville's Municipal Stadium. Over the months, I've told you about the seemingly ridiculous predicaments that have occurred at Municipal Stadium and the

Township Council's apparent lack of concern over the facility. On July 1, the council restructured, with a new Mayor and some new council members. And while the current team appears to be more sensitive to the issue, I feel it necessary to continue to discuss the problems at the stadium, because there are many.

Bruce Morgan has been an outspoken member of the community regarding Municipal Stadium. He has been a member of the previous council's committee on rehabbing the stadium and he is very interested to seeing the complex renovated and our young athletes getting the chance to compete on equal footing with other towns that seem to put a little more pride and concern into their athletic facilities

Recently, Morgan noted the current council's interest, but did feel that some direction would be important.

"You look at the stadium, and, yes a key concern is first getting our kids home," Morgan said, making reference to the tennis courts (see Buc Shots, August 11, 1994 and a photo in this weeks issue).

"The council has ideas, but it would seem practical that we let all of our kids compete at home first.

"I also feel that the JV baseball field, which doubles as the practice field for football and soccer, has to be addressed now. And I mean, now

"That field is in horrible condition. If I'm the coach of an opposing team, I wouldn't let my team compete on that field. I think the new girls' soccer program is supposed to play there. I certainly hope not."

The field has gullets and divots throughout. Morgan proposes what seems to be a very common sense idea.

"Shut that field down now," Morgan said. "Let's get the work started now, so by baseball season in the spring, the clay is down and the major work is completed.

"If we start it now, then the varsity football field, which also needs work, would be used in place of the practice field. When the football season ends in November, then you can begin work there. This way, no season is interrupted and by the spring, the JV field will be in shape and the football field will be undergoing its renovations which would be in time for the ensuing football season next fall."

The varsity football field is in need of a major overhaul, but it will certainly survive this season. The JV field cannot make the same boast. It's hard to believe that that field can be used for anything other than a NASA training site for future men walking on the moon.

So, while the weather is good, perhaps the Council can look into doing some immediate work on the JV field, thus having it ready for next spring.

"If not, I can see the JV soccer team being on the road only very shortly and the JV baseball team almost definitely being on the road for the entire 1995 season," Morgan said. "Eventually, that field will be deemed not good enough to compete on."

As for the varsity baseball field, Morgan's annual plea is about to be heard.

Once again, Morgan feels that it would be in the best interest of

the township to drain the sprinkler system on the varsity field before the dead of winter.

Despite those recommendations in previous years, the council did nothing, and when it came to turning on those sprinklers the following spring, the pipes burst and the field was flooded.

"You need to drain the system properly before the cold weather kicks in," Morgan said. "This way, excess water doesn't build up and a repeat of the previous two years won't occur."

It was just last March that varsity baseball coach Chuck Martin and his team had to take rakes and shovels to the varsity field in order to get the excess water off the diamond after the sprinkler, system exploded because of neglect.

And that was for the second straight year!

After it was recommended originally in the Summer of 1992 that it be drained properly!

So, we'll see if this time the system is drained properly and stored for the winter months. Or, we'll have a repeat of the previous two springs, which means extra maintenance bills to repair the system after it explodes.

"The best time to drain the system would be late October," Morean said "This way, the weather is still decent and baseball is done for the year."

The Bucs posted an 8-2 mark in '79 and earned Belleville's first post season football bid.

This week, we look back at games five through seven of the season. Belleville was 3-1 through four games and were favored to defeat Irvington and Essex Catholic in weeks five and six respectively.

Expected victories over Irvington and Essex Catholic would then set up a monster game with Seton Hall Prep, at Municipal Stadium. The B anticipated Seton Hall coming into the game undefeated and carrying the states longest winning streak.

For many seniors on the '79 Bucs, this contest would be the culmination of years of hard work, and for many, it would represent the chance to avenge a 63-0 drubbing handed them as sophomores by Seton Hall in '77.

Then-Belleville High School Athletic Director Jim Silvestri, a big fan of football, could always be found on the Belleville sideline during games.

Following the Bucs 26-14 win over Passaic, the A.D. proclaimed that "the next two weeks will be tough for us."

"Why?" was the conventional question, because Belleville would be heavy favorites to defeat Irvington and Essex Catholic.

"That's just it," Silvestri said. "We're supposed to win those games. I hope the kids are up for it. They were sky high tonight, but that was against Passaic. I hope they don't take the next two weeks for granted."

Belleville had beaten Irvington the past two seasons. As a matter of fact, the 17-14 win over the Campers in 1977 was head coach John Senesky's first victory as the varsity head coach.

## Rec I.D. system begins

Effective after July 15, 1994, Recreation I.D. Cards will be required of all persons wishing to use any of the Township of Belleville Recreation facilities.

Use of these facilities will be restricted to Belleville residents only and will be monitored by a Recreation Dept. and/or Police Dept. representative. Non-residents will not be permitted to play and will be asked to leave. The new I.D. policy will support Township Ordinance 3-26 "Publicly Owned Playgrounds and Fields," which was adopted February 8, 1994.

To obtain an I.D., you must visit the Recreation Department office weekdays during the hours of 8:30 a.m. to 9:30 a.m. or 3 p.m. to 4 p.m. only. All applicants/players must furnish:

1. Positive identification with photo.

2. Proof of Residency: If age 17 or older, only a valid driver's license will be accepted. If school age, a High School I.D. Card or current report card will be accept-

I.D. cards must be in person's possession in order to play or use the facilities.

An annual \$2 fee will be charged for all residents at the time of application for these I.D. Cards.
