## Scott pushes \$500G for police substation

State Senator John P. Scott (R-Dist. 36), is introducing legislation to allocate \$500,000 to help develop a "mini" police substation in the Silver Lake district.

Scott was to make the announcement at the April 23 Township Council public meeting. He was to be joined by state Assemblymen Paul DiGaetano and John V. Kelly, both (R-Dist. 36), Essex County Executive James Treffinger, Belleville Police Chief Raymond Kimble, Police Capt. Joseph Rotunda, PBA President, Det. Mark Minicini as well as the Council.

"The residents of Belleville, especially the citizens who reside in the Silver Lake area, have experienced a steady increase in a number of crimes throughout the year, such as motor vehicle thefts, robberies, burglaries and assaults," Scott said, "The police need help to decrease the number of these incidents.

The measure, if passed by the full legislature, would provide grant money for a station to employ two police officers and one counselor, according to Jennifer Dubroski of Scott's office. The officers' duties would include working with the neighborhood to assess and target the needs and concerns of the district's residents, to target areas of high crime and to work at increasing the awareness and safety of residents.

One of the counselor's responsibilities would be to work with local schools, groups and residents, providing information about crime prevention, domestic abuse and substance abuse.

Scott said, "It is vital that the police officers work hand-in-hand with the residents of the area. This type of communication provides a valuable service to both parties, by giving each the opportunity to become aware of the surrounding area and the problems that exist."

"The state of New Jersey has a responsibility to protect its citizens, and as Belleville's State Senator, I need to make certain that the state follows through with their obligation to protect the residents and business merchants of our towns," Scott added.

Second Ward Councilman Joseph Scaperrotta said, "I would like to thank and congratulate the Senator for once again coming through for the people of Belleville when they needed him. It's good to know Belleville has an open door to the statehouse."

## School #3 club trades on NY stock exchange

Members of the School #3 stock market club, comprised of fourth, fifth and sixth grade students, received a special invitation to the N.Y. Stock Exchange on April 15.

The special invitation was from Murray Titlebaum, manager of educational programs at the New York Stock Exchange.

"During our past visits we usually went to the visitor's center... I am not too sure how many children were given this privilege," said Isobel Villano, a sixth grade teacher at School #3 and an advisor of the stock market club.

The special invitation allowed the children to sit in the board of directors' room at the stock exchange, where Titlebaum talked to the kids about trading stocks and what it is like to be on the floor of the exchange.

Melissa Porecco, a fourth grade student, was surprised by the size of the table in the board of directors room.

"It was as big as our gym," she said.

Then the children went to the V.I.P. exchange section of the stock exchange.

"We were there for 20 minutes and explained to the kids the parts of the floor, the different jobs and how the technology has changed. There are less papers on the floor of the exchange today with the use of computers," Villano said.

To fourth grade student Jimmy Graham, the visit was extremely exciting.

"It was so much fun to see the

building. It was like a big math building with all of its numbers," Jimmy said.

Both Villano and Mary Brailey, a fourth grade teacher at School #3, met Titlebaum in a summer course called "Teach the Teacher"—a program sponsored by the N.Y. Stock Exchange. They have been attending the program for three years.

The students then went to Sherwood Securities in Jersey City where the children were lectured by Michael Burke, a trader, about supply and demand.

"They really understood it," said Raphealia Saulino, principal of School #3, who attended the trip.

"We learned about how stocks go up and down, how you make and lose money and how stocks go in the newspaper," said Lorena Ruiz, a sixth grade student at School #3.

The children were each given a trader to sit with for a half-hour, where they learned what a typical day was like for a trader.

"Some traders let the kids talk on the phone to their clients. They also learned the technology of trading," Villano said.

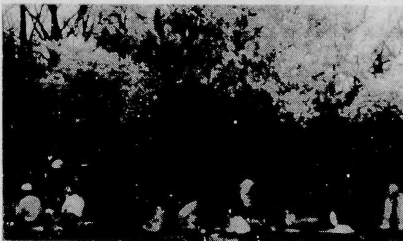
Fourth grader Alicia Cook got to invest some stock. "The trader let me invest. I made \$60 in two minutes. I forget what the stock was," Alicia said.

When asked about her favorite part of the trip Lorena said, "It was when they showed us how to trade stock in the trading room."

### Branch Brook Park, Silver Lake revel in cherry blossoms' beauty

The weekend of April 20-21 once again saw Belleville transformed into the Cherry Blossom capital of America, with the annual Essex County Cherry Blossom Festival at Branch Brook Park on Saturday and the third-annual BlossomFest '96 street fair on Sunday in Silver Lake.

## Nature observation area created to honor Earth Day

In honor of both Earth Day and the Essex County Parks Department, the Greater Newark Conservancy supervised the creation of a nature observation area entitled "Wild Discoveries" in Branch Brook Park on April 20.

"The idea was to improve that area of the park and to attract more wildlife for people to observe," said Deborah Hadley, youth education director of the Greater Newark Conservancy.

The site—located in the northern section of the Branch Brook Park near the visitors center—focuses on improving the environment for wildlife, such as songbirds, hawks, rabbits and other types of mammals.

This three-month long project was designed and constructed by students from the Chad Science Academy and the Student Conservation Association.

The students solicited donations for the plant materials from plant nurseries around the state.

Gay Savoie, the education program coordinator of the Greater Newark Conservancy, said this site was picked because it has two major habitats: a wetland and a wooded slope.

"Whenever you have two major habitat types it tends to be a very

highly productive area biologically. It would tend to attract more animals and plant life," Savoie said.

At the site, the students planted native species that will help to feed wildlife such as blueberries and

Alverado died from gunshot wounds and Nunez was shot in leg, police said.

"I think he (Alverado) didn't try to run him (Officer Charles) over," Edwin Rivera, 14-year-old cousin of Alverado, of Belleville said. "It was wrong."

The Honda accelerated towards officer Charles when he shot at the car, police said.

Local mothers had different

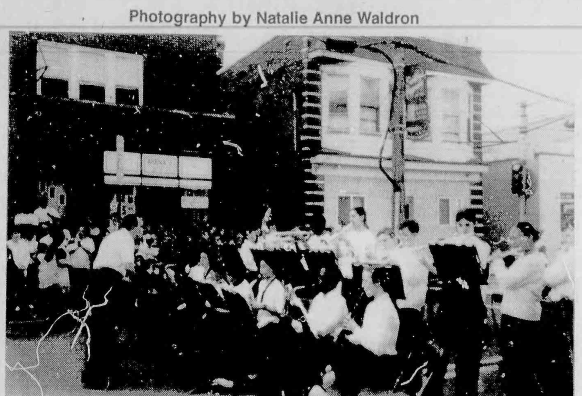

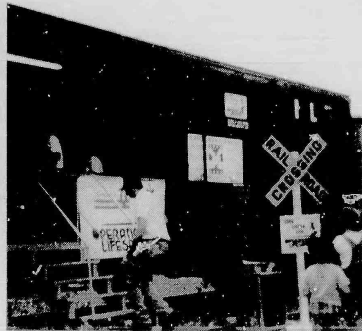

excellent education experience. "The children and parents were so pleased with this program."

Both Villano and Bradley used the knowledge from their classes at the N.Y. Stock Exchange to teach and supervise kids in the stock market club.

"They teach all the aspects of the N.Y. Stock Exchange. The security systems, the trade shows... They cover every aspect of what it is to run a business," Villano said.

This year one of the teams in the Belleville School #3 stock market club came in first out of 242 teams in the state's fourth through sixth grade division of the Stock Market Game.

The winning team comprised mostly fourth graders, along with two sixth graders.

This event is sponsored by the New Jersey Council on Economic Education, which operates out of Trenton State College.

Since then, the group has formed their own company in which they sold shares of stock to the student body, Villano said.

With the money they obtained they bought supplies to make chocolate lollipops, which were sold in the school.

"The team members are in the midst of buying back the stock and giving back the dividends. The profit that we make we will give to the Make a Wish Foundation. They usually get \$250 from the kids," Villano said.

elderberries. Oak seedlings were planted to provide acorns, which are an important source of food for the wildlife.

"The students are really proud of this project and we will continue to work on the habitat guide for the site," Savoie said.

The students also put up eight birdhouses and made a brush pile of branches and logs for nesting cover.

"The brush pile will be a place for animals to have their babies or to hide from predators," Savoie said.

A small pond was constructed to provide water for wildlife.

Close to the observation site, a cherry tree was planted by the group in the memory of Chester Prosperi, an Essex County employee as well as the Chairman of the Belleville Democratic Party.

Last year the Greater Newark Conservancy worked with the Chad Science Academy and the Student Conservation Association and built a nature trail entitled, Centennial Trail, in Branch Brook Park.

Hadley said, the name commemorated the centennial celebra-

tion of the Essex County Parks System, the nation's oldest county park system.

"It was also the first educational trail to be designed and built completely by youth," said Hadley.

Hadley summarized the purpose of the Greater Newark

Conservancy.

"The emphasis of our education is to educate the public on the need for preserving open space in the city... This helps the park system because a lot of their staff and funding has been cut over the past few years," Hadley said.

reactions to the incident.

"I think it was terrible that an 18-year-old had to lose his life," a Magnolia Street resident commented.

"They're not innocent," the mother of three said. "They should send them to boot camp after the first offense," she continued.

"There should be harsher penalties," she concluded.

"I agree that these kids should get more than a slap on the wrist," Magnolia Street resident, Alice

Treiber said.

"Everybody is leaving Belleville because of these incidents," Treiber said.

Nunez is being charged with receiving stolen property and possessing burglary tools.

He was transferred to the Essex County Jail. "Our investigation is done," Belleville Captain Joseph Rotonda said. "It's up to the Grand Jury now."

The Essex County Prosecutor's Office will investigate the incident in the coming weeks.

### Passing on Silver Lake police substation would be a crime

Talk has centered for at least the last two years on putting a police substation in the district, and now state Senator John P. Scott (R-Dist. 36), is introducing legislation to allocate \$500,000 to help develop a "mini" police substation in Silver Lake. The legislation is supported by state Assemblymen Paul DiGaetano and John V. Kelly, both (R-Dist 36), Essex County Executive James Treffinger, Belleville Police Chief Raymond Kimble, as well as the Council.

The measure, if passed by the full legislature, would provide grant money for a station to employ two police officers and one counselor. The officers duties would

include working with the neighborhood to assess and target the needs and concerns of the district's residents, to target areas of high crime and to work at increasing the awareness and safety of residents. One of the counselor's responsibilities will be to work with local schools, groups and residents in providing information about crime prevention, domestic abuse and substance abuse.

### Voters take giant step toward restoring town's credibility by passing school budget

Education is the key to changing any life situation for the better. The voters in Belleville may finally be warming to this concept, as they passed this year's school budget after more than a quarter century when all but one budget was voted down.

The question is, what brought about this reversal? Last year, an average property tax increase of \$12, \$58 less than this year's increase, was voted down, as was the 1994-95 budget, which was sabotaged by budget restorations.

The answer may be found with the school board and Board of Education administration. This year's budget committee, including Board President Ralph Mazzuca and trustees Robert Molinaro and former budget naysayer Frank Montagna, must get its share of the credit for getting the message out to parents, and especially senior citizens.

The message was simply that this budget was as frugal as possible, given the constraints of built-in salaries and state-mandated programs, among many other handicaps. Coming from Montagna particularly, a man who has shouted from the audience year after year about budgets being filled with hidden revenues and "fat," the message must have swayed enough voters to allow the district to operate with a budget that for once is not being stripped of new programs.

Likewise, Superintendent of Schools Michael Lally has been a tireless advocate of every budget since taking his current position. He and the board have had to fight the handful of incessant critics who have screamed long and loudly about the expenditures in the budget.

Lally and the school board budget committees have civilly answered each and every one of those exaggerated or misinformed statements, falling back on irrefutable statistics, including the fact that Belleville has had, and continues to have, the second lowest per-pupil cost in the county, and again this year had the lowest tax

increase in the county. All this while still gaining recognition as one of the top public high schools in the state by New Jersey Monthly magazine in a well-documented competition last year.

This year's budget victory can be the cornerstone of a return to proper priorities in Belleville that have been missing for decades. If the governing bodies of this town are really looking to improve the shrinking tax rateable business base and attract younger families with young children to purchase homes, then an excellent school system must be one of the main drawing cards.

I have championed the cause of spending properly on education over and over again in this column and in numerous editorials. It is nice to be able to put this aside for one year.

Now, the school board must bargain in good faith with teachers, as the two sides sit down to negotiate a new salary contract. A trend has begun in Belleville, with both municipal and school personnel salary increases steadily going down in the past two years. The recent school administrator's salary increases, in the 3-percent range, should represent the starting point in salary discussions, with a final tally close to the inflation and cost-of-living indexes.

Other givebacks in the area of health insurance might also be in order, within reason.

Anything more than this will be considered exorbitant by voters, and may stall the momentum gained in passing this year's budget.

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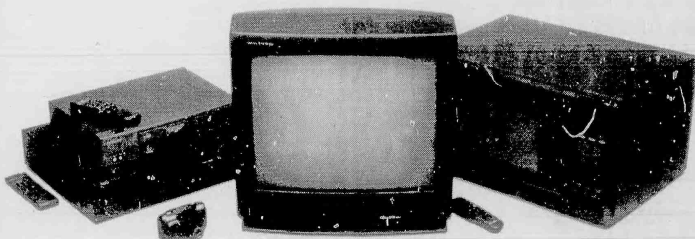

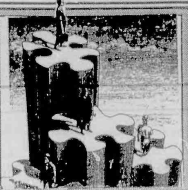

### Track team falls to West Essex

The Belleville High School track team put up some good performances, but fell short to West Essex 65-37 last week.

John Tosato's team will compete in the Millburn Relays this weekend. Next Tuesday, the Bucs will be at Paramus for a tri meet that includes Teaneck.

"The kids did a good job," Tosato said referring to the meet at West Essex. "A few of the events were cancelled because of wet grounds."

The Bucs had two first place finishes, in the 400 meter hurdles (67.7) and the two mile, with a time of 11:12.

I had mentioned this a few weeks ago and it bears repeating. Moreno's versatility in the hurdles and the two mile is very impressive. He stands a good chance of setting school records in both events before his high school career ends in four years.

Mike Dribnak finished second in the 800 meters and 1600 meters with times of 2:24 and 5:14 respectively.

In the 4 x 800 relay, the team of Moreno, Colucci, Chavez and Dribnak put together a time of 9:18.7.

In the freshman/sophomore sprint medley, the team of Herb Bolante, Louis Rios, Louis Cortes and Moreno finished with a time of 4:18.5.

The 4 x 200 team of Kvetkus, Bolante, Cortes and Chavez combined for a time of 1:45.2.

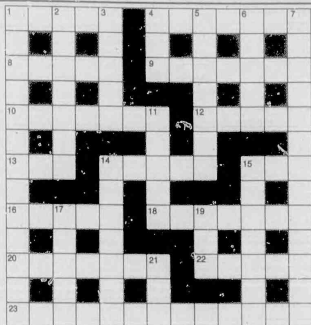

After purchasing the property in 1980, Roberts converted the Bloomfield Avenue side of the complex into condominiums and moved the cinema entrance to Seymour Street. He converted the theater into three cinemas in 1985.

The final stages of the renovation were just completed in the last few months, he said. In addition to new seats and a new sound system, the work included repairing the original plaster, the terrazzo floor, and painting and gold-leafing in the lobby, Roberts said.

"When I see some of the movie palaces of yesterday, I think it's a total tragedy," he said. "There are so few left. In my plans to upgrade it into a multiplex, modern theater, I wanted to preserve that history."

"We restored everything, all of the art work and the artistic architecture," said Roberts. "We preserved the movie palace of the past by restoring the workmanship that went into the theater in 1922 while making it an up-to-date, modern theater."

When it opened in 1922, the Wellmont Theater was a lavish addition to the Montclair commercial district. Its Georgian Revival style was designed by architects Reilly and Hall. It included a 40-foot-diameter dome, Italian marble in the lobby and a foyer with arched ceilings and fountains.

The extensive restoration that has transformed the 73 year old movie palace at 5 Seymour Street in Montclair has left many movie goers very happy with the results. In fact, the Montclair Historical Society recognized the theater's renovation as a "viable compromise between economic feasibility and historical preservation."

Owner Robert Roberts, who converted the lavish auditorium into a modern, three-screen multiplex was congratulated by the society for retaining most of the theater's original movie palace atmosphere.

The historical society presented its annual Preservation Award to the Wellmont at a ceremony held March 23rd at the theater.

Roberts, who also owns movie theaters in Chatham and Union, said he maintained the lavish interior for its historical and artistic significance.
