## Board hiring new teachers

District deals with  
overcrowding issue

Because of the steady increase in student population over the past few years, the Belleville Board of Education has made plans to also increase its teaching personnel.

School officials are conducting interviews to increase the staff at the elementary level for the 1996-97 school year. The board will be hiring one teacher in Schools 3, 7, and 10, and two teachers for School 8, said Superintendent Michael Lally.

"It's (student enrollment) been increasing by 3 percent for the last few years. In the last two years there has been a significant increase," said Lally.

Lally said the changing demographics of the community is the main reason for the influx of new students.

"We have a community where there are a number of residents selling homes and a number of young families moving in. The market value of homes is very attractive to new and young families," said Lally, adding, "towns move in cycles. Belleville grew old and is now becoming a young town."

Lally said younger families moving into town are good for the school system in one way, but place budgetary restraints on school officials.

"It helps us in one sense, but in another sense it hurts because we have to increase our staff," he said.

The \$32.3 million 1996-97 school year budget for Belleville was approved on April 16. It consisted of a \$70 tax increase for the average home assessed at \$40,000, said Ed Appleton, board secretary.

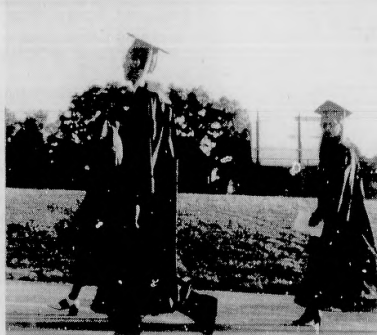

## Belleville conducts 99th commencement

With about 3,000 cheering parents and family members filling the grandstands of the athletic field, the 99th commencement of Belleville High School took place on Friday, June 21.

With the setting sun providing a picturesque background for the ceremony, the 223 graduates said goodbye to their past and greeted their future with confidence.

Class of 1996 Valedictorian,

Ben Dookchitra, summed up the general feeling of the graduates when discussing everyone's future.

"Our first goal, this graduation, is a mission accomplished. But this won't be our last great achievement," said Dookchitra.

Ram Arun Parekh, class salutatorian, said Belleville graduates must continue to cultivate their work ethics in all future endeavors.

"No one is going to work for

you. You have to do it yourself," Parekh said.

In a more poignant moment, Parekh recalled the struggles of his father coming to the United States as an immigrant. He used the anecdote as an example of how hard work and determination can benefit anyone in life.

"My greatest inspiration has always been my father. My father is the strongest man I knew. I've never known anyone to overcome the difficulties he was faced

with," Parekh said.

"He came to a foreign country with a suitcase of clothes and some pocket change. Through

While most high school graduates frequent house parties after the initial ceremony, Belleville's seniors got to cruise the New York Harbor.

About 90 percent of the Class of 1996 boarded the Skyline Princess after graduation for a cruise around the harbor, allowing them a panoramic view of historic city sites and attractions.

The cruise was sponsored for the sixth straight year by Belleville Alliance for Substance Education (BASE), said Eileen Brown, corresponding secretary for BASE. The event was part of the town's "Graduation Celebration."

The cruiseship started from the South Street Seaport and headed

uptown past the Twin Towers, The Intrepid, then passed the Statue of Liberty before heading back toward the seaport.

Although there was plenty of dancing on the top deck of the ship and plenty of reminiscing among students, the graduates were still aware of the life after the celebration.

Mary Lapas, class president, said she wants to become a lawyer in the corporate field. She will attend Rutgers University in the fall and major in political science while minoring in U.S. History.

**1996 Olympics provoke reflection**

In 1980, 29 year-old Bob Giordano made the U.S. Olympic weight lifting team.

Unfortunately, that was the year that the U.S. boycotted the Games, which were held in Moscow.

"Each of the 23 federations had their trials," Giordano explained. "We had ours in Philadelphia and then Carter called a boycott."

This boycott was the source of disappointment for many of the

1980 Olympians, including Giordano.

"The boycott took a lot out of me, it sort of discouraged me," he said.

Giordano competed for a few years after the boycott, although he admits that it was never the same.

"In retrospect, I wish I continued until the 1984 Olympics," he said.

Instead, Giordano retired from weight lifting in 1983, attended law school from 1983 to 1987 and

became Belleville's assistant township attorney in 1989.

Today, Giordano works as Belleville's township attorney and maintains a private law practice.

He resides in Livingston with his wife, Sue; two daughters, Gina, 12, and Adrienne, 10; and a son, Robert, 9.

"Hopefully all three of them will make the Olympics someday," Giordano adds with a grin.

Now that the 1996 Olympics are

approaching, Giordano admits, "Every four years brings mixed feelings for every athlete who suffered from the boycott. It's interesting and nostalgic, but it's also sadening."

"I was watching the trials the other day and I saw an interview with a woman who made the 1980 archery team," Giordano said. "Now, 16 years later, at age 42, she

## Officials want more details on mall site

A proposal by a Connecticut real estate company to develop an abandoned Macy's building has Bloomfield town officials excited, but Belleville officials cautious.

Newel's Realty Co. Inc. of Southport has proposed developing the 500,000 square-foot property, located on the corner of Franklin and Watsessing Streets in Bloomfield and Belmont Avenue and Franklin Street in Belleville, by constructing three or four large retail stores.

The plans include a total of 140,000 square-feet of retail space, a parking lot providing about 800 parking spaces, and "significant landscape improvement," said Mike Turner, deputy public affairs director of MWW Strategic Communications, the public relations firm hired by Newel's.

"We feel we are making a tremendous improvement on the site," said Turner.

But part of Belleville's problem with the proposal stems from how much of the development lies within the town.

If the project is approved, about 13 percent of the site will be in Belleville, said Tom Salzano, town tax assessor.

But town officials are concerned they will inherit most of the problems.

Same Papa, chairman of the Belleville Planning Board, said 118,000 square-feet of the building will be in Bloomfield and about 22,000 in Belleville.

"We will get 10 percent of the building and all of the parking. I have concerns about the water runoff and traffic. We're really getting all the problems," Papa said.

"I want this for Belleville, but it has to be done right," he added.

Dennis Forlenzo, vice-president of the Silver Lake Civic Association and Republican District Leader, said there should be a traffic light placed on Franklin Street. He also expressed concern over competition local storeowners would face from the large retail stores.

"If we do put business there, we don't want something that will hurt business in Silver Lake. We want the developer. It's good to see Belleville developed. We're trying to force the problems we already have," said Forlenzo.

Turner said he understands the concerns from both planning boards, and said the developer has devised methods of dealing with traffic concerns.

"Both boards are very thorough. We don't have a problem with that. We appreciate that, actually," said Turner.

Papa said one of his other concerns is based upon security around the site. He mentioned that Bloomfield's town engineer will work on the security aspect, but he doesn't feel that is the best person to handle the inherent problems.

"We don't operate like that," he added.

Turner said since Belleville officials are still scrutinizing the plan,

## Applicants are sought for youth services grants

The Essex County Youth Services Commission announced the availability of proposal application for service provider agencies interested in providing innovative services to the juvenile justice population and young people considered to be "at risk" in Essex County.

The Youth Services Commission had been dormant until revitalized by County Executive James Treffinger during the first years of his administration as part of efforts to address the crisis in juvenile justice in Essex. Treffinger appointed a broad-based group of professionals to the commission and charged them with developing a menu of services to address recidivism and focus on prevention of juvenile crime.

The commission was awarded a grant of \$887,119 from the State/Community Partnership

Program created by Gov. Christie Whitman. \$887,119 of that total grant has been allocated for the following program areas for both pre- and post-adjudicated juveniles and those considered to be "at risk": electronic monitoring, structured day programs, aftercare services, community service, community mentoring, sex offender treatment and juvenile delinquency prevention.

Applicants may be either non-profits or for-profit agencies, public or private entities, churches and community-based organizations. Prospective vendors should be aware that there will be mandatory proposer conferences for all agencies that plan to submit a proposal.

The dates and locations for these bidder conferences are contained in the Request For Proposal materials. Completed proposals must be submitted by Friday, July 12.

ing, several members of the School 8 Home and School Association (HSA) voiced their concerns about hiring an additional second-grade teacher.

"We're trying to give kids the proper education they need," said resident Monique Macechello, before the board informed the group they were hiring an additional teacher.

Karen McGinley, representative of School 8 HSA, said she was told by board members early in June that there would be three first, third, fourth, and fifth-grade teach-

ers, but only two second-grade teachers with 56 students enrolled for September.

"They were moving 56 kids into two classes. Teachers can't teach 30 kids in a class," McGinley said.

McGinley added that she's pleased the board is hiring the additional teacher, but has reservations.

"I will be more pleased when I know there is somebody there," she added. "Through the experience I've had, everything can be put off."

Lally said he knew earlier in the month that school 7, 8 and 10 needed an additional teacher, but was notified later in the month that there was an additional 15 students attending school 8 and 3.

"As well as you predict, you never know what's going to happen," he said.

### Torchrun through town sparks unity, pride and patriotism

Unity. Togetherness. Community Pride.

Those two words and one phrase are synonymous with the feelings Belleville residents shared when the Olympic Torch came through town last week.

Most of the residents interviewed, while anxiously awaiting any sign of the torchbearers, expressed these same notions when asked how the event made them feel.

Every organization from the community was present for the festivities. The police provided security, the Belleville High School Marching Band played spirited songs, and the elementary and middle schools displayed banners.

But a more interesting aspect of the event was how several different communities from neighboring towns could come together for an event that signified national pride.

Business leaders and residents from towns as far away as Wanaque came to witness their hometown resident, Kathy Riccardelli, carry the Olympic torch down Washington Avenue.

Residents from nearby cities such as Newark and North Arlington lined up on the side of the street to cheer what has been a symbolic tradition for the Olympic Games.

In a slightly comical occurrence, one excited resident asked Riccardelli to sign her shorts, even before the torchbearer could catch her breath and answer questions from the press.

When covering any type of news event, one is covering a part of history. But the electric excitement that filled Belleville last week made the coverage a bigger chapter in the annals of our history.

We would like to applaud all of the people behind the scenes who made the torchrun event a momentous occasion.

There are most likely too many to list, but a few very important thank you's go to Senator John Scott for donating the portable stage for the Belleville Marching Band, the Belleville Police Department, Mayor Jim Messina, Donna Caruso, the rest of the town officials, board of education members, and Eileen Brown, executive secretary for the Belleville Chamber of Commerce.

Unity, togetherness, and community pride may seem like a pretentious or overblown way to describe the torchrun event. But sometimes a little jolt of these things can last for a long time. Let's hope it does.

• TWO former New Jersey employees who were employed during the administration of James Florio were subsequently fired when the Whitman team took over. The New Jersey Supreme Court ruled in favor of the discharged employees. The Whitman administration appealed the decision in the U. S. District Court which was an appeal from a jury decision that the findings were politically inspired and in violation of the men's First Amendment associational rights. The U. S. Supreme Court upheld the lower court's prior rulings of that court that government officials could not fire public employees who are not policy makers solely for not being a supporter of a particular political party. This theory was first tested in a case of the U. S. Supreme Court some years ago involving employees of the Illinois, Cook County Sheriff's Office. They were discharged after a new administration took over. The appeal process eventually reached the U. S. Supreme Court which decided in favor of the discharged employees. Apparently, the only remedy available to new administrations at any level that want to stay on the right side of the law is to abolish the job if an administration wants to get rid of an individual or individuals.

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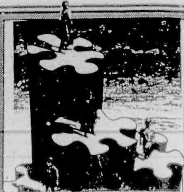

## IT'S A JUNGLE OUT THERE!

### Had an accident? Beware!

You've just been involved in a typical automobile accident. You were struck in the middle of an intersection not far from your home. What should you do?

First, do not move your car. You want the police report to demonstrate the relative position of the vehicles and thus show you are not at fault.

If traffic conditions allow and you are physically capable, you may get out of your car. Do not tell the other driver you are sorry. This will be interpreted later as an admission of fault when you really meant to say that it was unfortunate that the accident should have occurred.

Notify the police, then wait on the nearest sidewalk for officers to arrive. Take note of the location and the extent of damage to each vehicle, debris in the road, and any skid marks.

Exchange I.D. and insurance information with the other driver and try to remember any comments. These may include a remark that the driver was already late for work at the time of the collision. Take the names and telephone numbers of any witnesses and advise the police, but keep a copy of the information for yourself.

You will be asked if you are injured. Do not understate your physical complaints out of embarrassment. If you have any symptoms, accept an offer by the investigating police officer to call an ambulance. A refusal to go to the emergency room may later be used against you in a contest over your injuries.

You must notify your insurance company immediately to avoid a denial of coverage. As soon as practical, take pictures of the damage to your car and the scene of the accident including skid marks, or ask someone to do it for you.

It is important to get legal advice quickly to resolve issues. For example, who will pay your medical bills — your auto or health insurance? Whose insurance company will pay the repair and car rental bills? You may have received a ticket for a motor vehicle violation in connection with the accident, the disposition of which may well affect any subsequent claim made by you or against you.

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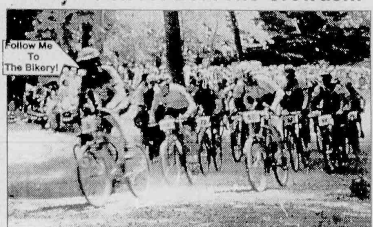

## Red Cross celebrates 75th anniversary of Braille department

When people think of the American Red Cross of Metropolitan New Jersey they probably think of services such as disaster relief, CPR & first aid training, and service to military families. What might not come to mind is the Braille Transcription Service, which has been the Chapter's best kept secret for 75 years.

The Braille Department of the American Red Cross of Metropolitan New Jersey is the largest volunteer Braille transcription service in the United States. Our Chapter, in cooperation with the New Jersey Commission for the Blind and Visually Impaired, transcribes textbooks into Braille for students at the elementary and high school levels. These titles are reproduced for students throughout the country. There are over 7,000 titles already in the collection, and more are being added every week.

Currently, there are about 150 volunteers, of whom 125 volunteer their time by transcribing at home, and 25 who work regularly in the bindery every week. Most of the volunteers dedicate much of their free time to transcribing. In addition to textbooks, the volunteers also transcribe theater programs, restaurant menus, birthday and holiday cards into Braille.

Braille service to the visually impaired became a national Red Cross program in 1921 when Red Cross volunteers, trained in the relatively new skill of transcribing written materials into Braille, began producing a few novels for the visually impaired veterans of World War I. The former Newark, Oranges, and Maplewood Chapters joined the national program soon after.

These Chapters merged in 1966 to create a single organization with a long and distinguished history of accomplishments that make up the present day American Red Cross of Metropolitan New Jersey.


The Braille department serves

about 90 students in New Jersey and approximately 1,200 students in other states throughout the country. Working in close cooperation with the New Jersey Commission for the Blind, they transcribe textbooks in subjects such as Mathematics, Science, History, Literature, Language, Art and Music. As these textbooks are transcribed, volumes are embossed on special Braille printers and bound. An average high school physics book can take a year to transcribe, and when embossed into Braille text turns into a stack of volumes more than eight feet high! After embossing, the volumes are assembled by volunteers and shipped to the school district that placed the order.

The Braille Department is always looking for more volunteers interested in this wonderful service to the blind. The Red Cross offers a Braille Transcription course in Essex County and is currently organizing a course in Passaic County. Anyone interested in these courses may call Jane Bente, director of Braille Services at 676-0800.

This year marks the 75th anniversary of this very special program. As a tribute to the Braille Department and its dedicated volunteers an anniversary dinner will be held on Sept. 27, at Mayfair Farms, West Orange. This event will honor the many volunteers, past and present, for the wonderful work they do for visually impaired. During the event, guests will have the chance to explore some of the history and products of 75 years of Braille service. There will be dinner, dancing and cocktails and we will be holding a raffle and silent auction to help raise money to support this unique and much needed service. The 75th Anniversary Dinner promises to be an enjoyable event for all who attend.

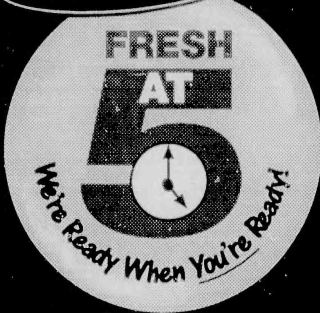

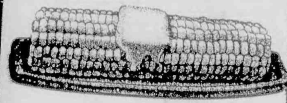

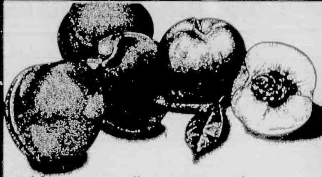

I also hope that your high school days were enjoyable and filled with good memories.

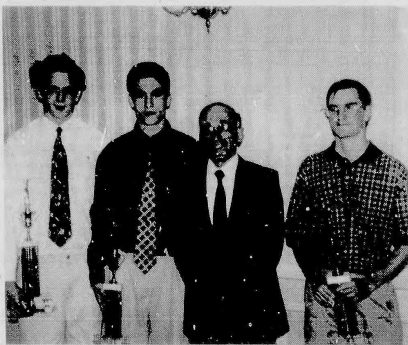
