Because of the steady increase in student population over the past few years, the Belleville Board of

Education has made plans to also increase its teaching personnel. School officials are conducting interviews to increase the staff at the elementary level for the 1996-67 school uper. The heard will have are contentary tevel for the 1996-97 school year. The board will be hiring one teacher in Schools 3, 7, and 10, and two teachers for School 8, said Superintendent Michael Lally.

"It's (student enrollment) been "If's (student enrollment) been increasing by 3 percent for the last few years. In the last two years there has been a significant increase," said Laly. Lally said the changing demo-graphics of the community is the main reason for the influx of new students. "We have a community were

there are a number of residents sell-ing homes and a number of young families moving in. The market families moving in. The market value of homes is very attractive to new and young families," said Lally, adding, "towns move in cycles. Belleville grew old and is now becoming ayong town," Lally said younger families moving into town are good for the school system in one way, but place budgetary restraints on school officials.

The \$32.3 million 1906-97 school year budget for Belleville was approved on April 16. It con-sisted of a \$70 tax increase for the average home assessed at \$40,000, said Ed Appleton, board secretary.

Officials want more details on mall site By Joe Brennan

A proposal by a Connecticut

A proposal by a Connecticut real estate company to develop an abandoned Macy's building has Bloomfield town officials excited, but Belleville officials cautious. Newel's Realty Co. Inc. of Southport has proposed developing the 500,000 square-foot property, located on the corner of Franklin and Watsessing Streets in Bloomfield and Belmont Avenue and Franklin Street in Belleville, by constructing three of four large by constructing three or four large ail store

retail stores. The plans include a total of 140,000 square-feet of retail space, a parking lot providing about 800 parking spaces, and "significant landscape improvement," said Mike fumer, deputy public affairs director of MWW Strategic Communications, he public rela-tions firm hired by Newel's. "We feel we are making a tremendous improvement on the site," said Turner.

Site," said Turner, But part of Belleville's problem with the proposal stems from how much of the development lies within the town.

If the project is approved, about 13 percent of the site will be in Belleville, said Tom Salzano, town tax assessor. But town officials are concerned

they will inherit most of the prob-

Same Papa, chairman of the Belleville Planning Board, said 118,000 square-feet of the building will be in Bloomfield and about 22,000 in Belleville.

22,000 in Belleville. "We will get 10 percent of the building and all of the parking. I have concerns about the water run-off and traffic. We're really getting all the problems," Papa said. "I want this for Belleville, but it has to be done right," he added. Dennis Forlenzo, vice-president of the Silver Lake Civic Association and Republican District Leader, said there should be a traffic light placed on Franklim bitret. He also expressed concern over competition local storeowners would face from the large retail stores. stores

"Each of the 23 federations had their trials," Giordano explained. "We had ours in Philadelphia and then Carter called a boycott,"

then Carter called a boycott." This boycott was the source of disappointment for many of the

1980 Olympians, including Giordano. "The boycott took a lot out of me, it sort of discouraged me," he

Giordano competed for a few ars after the boycott, although he admits that it was never the same. "In retrospect, I wish I continued until the 1984 Olympics," he said.

Instead, Giordano retired from weight lifting in 1983, attended law school from 1983 to 1987 and

became Belleville's assistant town-

became Belleville's assistant town-ship attorney in 1989. Today, Giordano works as Belleville's township attorney and maintains a private law practice. He resides in Livingston with his wife, Sue; two daughters, Gina, 12, and Adrienne, 10; and a son, Robert 9.

Robert, 9. "Hopfolly all three of them will make the Olympics someday," Giordano adds with a grin. Now that the 1996 Olympics are

American Red Cross of Metropolitan New Jersey is the largest volunteer Braille transcrip-tion service in the United States. Our Chapter, in cooperation with the New Jersey Commission for the Blind and Visually Impaired, transcribes textbooks into Breile Pranscribes textbooks into Bry de for students at the elementary and high school levels. These titles are reproduced for students throughout the country. There are over 7,000 titles already in the collection, and

more are being added every week. Currently, they are about 150 volunteers, of whom 125 volunteer their time by transcribing at home, and 25 who work regularly in the bindery every week. Most of the volunteers dedicate much of their free time to transcribing. In addi-tion to textbooks, the volunteers

tion to textbooks, the volunteers also transcribe theater programs, restaurant menus, birthday and hol-iday cards into Braille. Braille service to the visually impaired became a national Red Cross program in 1921 when Red Cross volunteers, trained in the rel-atively new skill of transcribing written materiais into Braille, becam producing a few noyale for began producing a few novels for the visually impaired veterans of World War I.
