Students receive test help

Organization offers reduced rate

Starting in the fall, Belleville High School seniors looking to achieve a decent grade on their Scholastic Aptitude Tests (S.A.T.) will receive assistance.

The Board of Education sought out Educational Services Center, Monsey, N.Y. to conduct preparato-ry classes for students wishing to take the S.A.T.'s.

The courses offer 24 hours of total instruction for two or three nights a week in classrooms with anywhere from 10 to 17 students.

But one of the most satisfying aspects of the plan, said Boardmember Louis Pallante, is the price. Educational Services will charge \$230 per attendant, instead of the normal \$295 per student. All fees will be payed by the parents if they choose to enroll their children

"It's not costing the board any-thing. The board doesn't even say who is going to go," said Pallante. Pallante added that this is just

one of the ways the guidance department assists students.

"This is what our guidance counselors are doing. The guidance counselors reached out. I urged them to get some kind of S.A.T. program," he said.

"The school offers a course in S.A.T. 's, but it's nothing to this concentration. I don't think we've done this before," he added.

Pallante said the board did hear offers from other services, such as the Princeton Review, which charges \$750 per attendant.

Dr. Richard Benninger, director Or, Richard Beninnger, director of the guidance department at Belleviile High School, said most students who enter into the pro-gram do improve their test scores. The classes allow the students, "clues on how to take the exam."

"Most (students) are reasonably successful," said Benninger.

Benninger said parents are mailed promotional literature in enough time to give parents the option of which company they want to earoll their children with.

"There are several companies willing to do this," said Benninger.

Local police wait to press charges

Belleville officials are waiting for notice from the Essex County Prosecutor's Office on whether or not to press charges on two of the

women involved in the bizarre con-venience store fires set last week.

All four suspects are Belleville residents, but only the 12-year -old girl has been charged with arson

girl has been charged with arson by the Lyndhurst Police Department and the Bergen County Prosecutor's Office, said Lt. Ken Spera of the Belleville Arson Unit.

The 12 year old allegediy set fire to merchandise with a cigarette lighter in a total of eight different convenience stores, one in Belleville and Nutley, two in Bloomfield and four in Lyndhurst, officials said.

In Belleville, the Quick Chek on the corner of Washington Avenue and Little Street was visited by the

suspects last Monday.

"She lit a rack of potato chips on fire. That's what they did," said

In each incident, one or two adult women would engage the store attendant in heated conversa-tion, officials said, as the youth then strayed off and set the fires, said Nutley Fire Capt. Fred

The adult women, aged 33 and 26, along with the 12 year old and 4 year old, were questioned by

Police.
The bizarre arson incidents began June 27 at Krauzer's, at 300 Broad St., Bloomfield. Then the

descent.
"I thought it was a bias incident
against Indians," Scalera said. "I
thought if they're hitting Nutley,
they might be hitting other towns."
But Spera has ruled out any bias

But Spera has ruled out any bias crime, because some of the stores hit were parts of large corporations, like Quick Chek and Krauszer's.

"It's not a bias because there were also other stores owned by corporations. It wasn't one specific race, color, or creed. It was a random type thing. We're really not sure on why they did it, yet," said

As similar fires continued to be set throughout last week, authorities from Nutley, Bloomfield, Belleville and Lyndhurst began accumulating bits and pieces of rel-

One store attendant had received a partial license plate number. Scalera said Nutley difficials quick-by began entering "random charac-ters" into a police computer and finally came up with a vehicle in Belleville.

Once a name was attached to a suspect living in Belleville, authorities used a high school yearbook to gain a photo of the suspect. Police soon discovered that the suspect had a criminal record and a mug shot was obtained.

The photo was shown to a store attendant, who immediately identified the woman as one of the arson

Law enforcement officials then spotted the car and followed it to Newark, where they apprehended the four suspects.

Authorities said the 12 year old

Authorities said the 12 year old confessed, but the two adult women claim they never noticed the youth start the fires. Arson squads from both the Essex County and Bergen County prosecutor's offices are looking itsylts fires. into the fires.

Scalera said authorities are ask-ing anyone with information on similar fires to come forward and help with the investigation.



Megan's Law: Will it be efficient or create different incentives?

After a multitude of court battles that included appeals from a vast array of sex offenders, a federal judge recently gave approval to the controversial Megan's Law.

Megan's Law was created after sevenyear-old Megan Kanka was killed by a convicted sex offender who, unfortunately, lived right across the street from her.

The incident sparked the debate over the statute, which requires convicted sex offenders to register with local police after they are released from prison. The local police will then notify school groups, civic organizations, and residents of the offenders whereabouts in the community.

Since the concept behind Megan's Law

was brought into the spotlight, civil libertarians have questioned its constitutionality. Are the sex offenders paying twice for their crimes? Isn't one jail sentence enough punishment?

Other points the libertarians argued against the initiation of the law make some sens They believe that requiring convicted offenders to register with local police will only set them on the run. It would create the incentive not to let authorities and neighbors know where they live, but turn them into drifters. roaming from community to community.

And this notion brings us to another poten tial problem. Sociologists have deemed this kind of behavior with a high level of recidivism. This argument, coupled with the point that offenders might not register, makes us

ask the question, would Megan's Law be an efficient law?

Physical assault, especially involving children, is one of the most egregious crimes a person could commit. Offenders should be punished with the strictest punishment. But something happens on the way to jail for

Most sex offenders, along with other criminals, don't spend the same amount of time in correctional facilities they were sentenced for. If they did, and received the proper punishment and treatment they deserve and need, then maybe Megan's Law wouldn't be neces-

People like to see quick results on every thing in the information age. And Megan's Law on the surface seems like a justified pub lic outcry. But some pondering of the possible repercussions should be analyzed.

Just try to put yourself in the place of a convicted sex offender who has learned that everyone in his/her community will know where they live, after they have spent 10 or 15 years in jail. Would they register or run away frightened? Would they create more of an enforcement problem by running away? These are tough questions but are important ones that need to be addressed.

We in no way are saying the concept of Megan's Law isn't justified. But whether or not it is the most efficient solution to a volatile social problem is the question that should be analyzed and discussed



First in a summer series 25 years later, Belleville Little League memories still vivid

Back in May of this year, I ran a series on the 1976 Belleville High School baseball team. That particular club finished the year with a 24-4 mark and held the number one ranking in the state for four weeks The coa

e coach of that team, George Zanfini, and one of the key play ers, shortstop Anthony Biafore, both gave a great deal of credit for the teams, and programs, success to the Belleville Little League pro-

gram.

"Without question," Zanfini said, "the little league program taught those kids so many fundamentals. By the time they got to high school level, they were pretty well taught the keys to the game." "I learned so much in little league." Biafore, who later went on to Monmouth College and played in the Chicago Cubs farm system, said. "(Coach) Mike Marotti (whom the Belleville little league field is named after) was teaching our team things like hitting the cut off is named after) was teaching our team things like hitting the cut off said. We had so much good coaching. I can't say enough about those days."

And while a quarter century has gone by, I can still pretty much remember the scores of every game my team, Biancardi, played that year and the key hits from my respective teammates.

In March of 1971, Belleville held its usual try outs for little league. I remember thinking that I had done pretty good in the fielding try outs but didn't fare as well in the batting section.

In 1970, I played farm league, the league directly below little league 1 figured after the batting try outs that would spend my last year eligible (I was 12 years old and the cut off was 12 for little league) playing farm league ball again.

I got quite a surprise when the phone rang one evening in my home at 725 Joralemon Street in Belleville and it was Jim "Red" (Clenaghan, the coach of Food Fair, who was calling to tell me I had made a little league team.

This was the chance to wear what we felt was the equivalent of major league uniforms and play all of our games at Marotti Field, which, to a 12 year old, was the equivalent of Shea Stadium.

The fences were (and 1 believe still are) 202 feet to dead center field, with left and right an even 200 feet.

Once again, to a 12 year old kid, that seemed a moon shot. But it was the "big time", a chance to play with, and against, the best baseball players in a town that prided itself on its baseball prowess.

I remember my first practice. It was a scrimmage against Rotary Club, who would turn out to be our toughest rival. We always practiced at Belleville Park and I remember getting a chance to hit in the

Chris Cervasio was pitching for Rotary, and compared to the

pitching I had seen in farm league the previous season, his fast ball was the equal to Bob Gibson.

I remember learning that hitting a fast ball pitcher required timing. If you tried to see the ball after the pitcher threw it, it would be too late to hit it.

too tate to fit it.

So I remember watching Cervasio wind up and taking my swing just as he released the ball. Some how, I got a clean single, Later in that scrimmage, I hit a homer off a different pitcher, although the "homer" wasn't exactly a long shot. It was more a clean hit that was muffed as I rounded the bases.

Nonetheless, I enjoyed my first scrimmage and Clenaghan pretty much told me that I would be the starting right fielder for opening day, which would also be against the Rotary Club. We had a good hitting team in 1971. Nišekey Lemongelli was

without question, our leader. He was a hard bitting catcher, the cata lyst of our club.

Anthony Speer was our leadoff hitter. Ronald "Booper" Beck

Authory Speer was our leadoff hitter. Ronald "Booper" Beck would be our power hitting first baseman. Joe Norton was the center fielder and Tom Bianchi would start in center. John Herko was-a key pitcher for us. Jimmy Clenaghan was our starting shorstop. Rich Gaschke was a promising infielder. Bob McNulty had potential and good power. Before the opening game, however, we were told that Food Fair would not be our sponsor, that Biancardi would sponsor our team instead. We were still the team in green and gray, just different let-

The highlight to the start of a little league season in Belleville is the parade that begins the season. All of the players on all of the teams (there were 16 teams in the league back then, eight in each division) would parade, in their uniforms, onto the field.

We were scheduled to open the season at 6 p.m. against Rotary, and I remember being some what nervous for that. Here it was, the chance to play little league, under the lights, in front of a big crowd.

Rotary was coached by Lemongelli's dad, Mike, so there was always a little extra rivalry there.

Anyway, the season would begin. Next week, I'll begin my look back at the 14 game schedule that Biancardi would play 25 years ago.

We had two seven game seasons, so to speak. So, if you didn't play well in the "first half", then the slate would be clean and you had a chance to do something in the second half.

We were still using wooden bats back then, but the concept of attaminum bats was beginning to become popular.

So, next week, a look back at that opener, and the nearly giant blunder that I made while rounding the bases following a home run is the fifth hining.




