D.O.T. to discuss closing of the Rutgers Bridge

Closing anticipated for the fall of 1998

The Department of Transportation is scheduled to have a public information session on Oct. 29 from 3 p.m. to 7 p.m. at Town Hall to discuss the closing of the Route 7 bridge known as the Rutgers Street Bridge.

"The construction is anticipated to begin in the fall of 1998 and we are hoping to complete the bridge by the fall of the year 2,000," said David Brown,

spokesperson for the Department of Transportation.

"The purpose of the meeting is to give the community an opportunity to examine the exhibits of the project and to discuss the project with the department," Brown said.

The project is estimated to cost approximately \$30 million and it will be

funded with federal money, Brown said.

The drawbridge, located over the Passaic River, will be replaced with a drawbridge that conforms to contemporary design standards.

"We will take into consideration any aesthetic qualities that may be appropriate to include," Brown said.

Possible routes for detours will be dis-

cussed at the meeting.

Brown indicated that the most likely detour is rerouting traffic to the Kingsland/Park Avenue crossing over the Passaic via River Road in Lyndhurst Township. The anticipated length of the detour is four miles. In the past, this route was used when work was done on the bridge.

"The current bridge was built in 1914 and is beyond rehabilitation. We are replacing it in order to meet the current demands of vehicular traffic," Brown said, adding that it would not be cost effective to rehabilitate it.

Since the bridge is considered to be of historic significance — due to its design—the D.O.T. is proceeding with an environmental assessment process.

Officials plan forum on teen violence

Officials have scheduled a public meeting to address the concerns of parents and local residents regarding recent incidents of violence among Nutley and Belleville teenagers.

Mayor Garry Furnari said he and Public Safety Commissioner Carmen Orechio felt the matter must be addressed.

"In the days following these incidents rumors ran rampant," said Furnari, adding that the meeting will also serve as a "fact-finding" opportunity.

The meeting will be held 7:30 p.m., tonight, Oct. 24, in the Commission Chamber at Town Hall. It will be attended by public officials and Police Chief Robert DeLitta.

Furnari said there is no truth to the rumor that the incidents involved organized gangs.

Police report that the violence of two weeks ago did not spill over into this past weekend.

"It was a quiet week, just the way we like it," said one Nutley police officer.

But the dozens of teenage street fights, that erupted Oct. 11-13 along Franklin Avenue and in local parks, continues to linger in the memories of many.

DeLitta admitted that the township may have benefitted from some old-fashioned good luck this week in avoiding a recurrence of the violence.

DeLitta said that a Nutley High School football game on Friday night took many students out of town, while Saturday's torrential storm kept most people, including youths, indoors.

"That helped us out quite a bit," DeLitta said. "The streets were deserted."

DeLitta said an ongoing investigation into the brawls will likely result in arrests.

One distraught Nutley mother spoke to the Board of Commissioners last week, pleading that officials find a way to solve the teen violence problem.

"Something must be done," said the woman, who wished anonymity. "I'm concerned that kids could get killed."

Tracy Scheckel, director of the Red Cross and mother of a 12-year-old girl, said she now picks up her daughter from school rather than allow her to walk home alone.

Scheckel said the youth fights remind her of old movies about teenage gang wars.

"It's frightening for a child," Scheckel said. "It even scares me."

Students voice their concerns to save Jazz Ensemble

BOE discusses district's athletic league, After School Program, Department of Education's visit

Several young jazz enthusiasts voiced their concern of the possibility of permanently losing their Middle School Jazz Ensemble before the Board of Education at Monday night's meeting.

The ensemble is a pilot program started by Glen Van Benschoten, a middle school teacher.

He volunteered his time for two years, said Superintendent of Schools Michael Lally.

Student Tristan Blow told the board that Van Benschoten known as "Mr. Van" did not participate in the jazz ensemble this year because he was offered no stipend.

"If there was a stipend he would continue to do it," Blow said. "It takes too much time to not receive compensation for it."

Lally said the position would cost about \$1,000 to \$1,100 if the position had a stipend.

"I don't want to close down a

on Thursday night with parents and residents for a previously-scheduled meeting of a newly-formed citizens committee on crime prevention.

Rogers cautioned the public on jumping to negative conclusions and believing false rumors about the incidents.

"Rumors seem to be flying all over town," Rogers said. "We should be concerned, but as adults we must use our heads."

Contrary to rumors, Rogers said that guns and knives were not found on teens involved in the fighting.

Rogers admitted that some NHS teens were taken to Clara Maass Hospital for precautionary tests, but he said there is no truth to rumors that some of the youths were in critical condition.

"All this does is create fear," Rogers said. "It's adding fuel to the problem."

The sergeant said most police officers have children in the Nutley

school system and are also concerned parents.

Rogers called for the public's co-operation in dealing with the problem. He said police are trying to determine the root cause of the fights.

In an effort to help keep teens from hanging out on the street, Furnari has distributed letters to approximately 1,100 NHS students, asking them to offer suggestions on new programs.

"I want to hear what you have to say," Furnari states in the letter. "I need your ideas. What activities do you think the town should provide? What would you like us to do?"

Furnari said he has already received 800 suggestions from the students.

"We've gotten a tremendous response," Furnari said.

The mayor said most of the student responses ask for both a place to skate board and roller blade, and also a place to go and hang out.

"These are good kids," Furnari said. "They just want a place to go and feel like adults."

Furnari said he believes any new programs should be based on the suggestions of teens.

Orechio, as director of Public Safety, also recently proposed a meeting of clergy, school officials and civic leaders to discuss the establishment of new programs.

NHS officials warned students this week not to participate in any brawls. Students claim that approximately 75 Belleville youths ignited the series of incidents on Oct. 12, when the Belleville gang rampaged through Nutley.

DeLitta said he doubts claims by Nutley students that 15 carloads of NHS teens drove to Belleville on

Oct. 13 for a big brawl at School Number 5. But one Nutley student insisted the School 5 incident did indeed occur, saying it was in retaliation for the earlier attacks launched by Belleville youths.

The student said the gang of Belleville teens had stopped at various Nutley parks on Oct. 12 looking for trouble. Michael A. Lally, Belleville superintendent of schools, promised to look into the matter.

"We are working with Nutley on this," Lally said.

Lally joined an impromptu meeting on Friday with Furnari, Orechio, Belleville Town Manager Stephen Cuccio, Nutley Schools Superintendent Frank T. Votto, Nutley School Board President Robert Ruscignuolo and police officials from both towns to discuss the teen fights.

Age spots? New research project may help

Some news for people bothered by "age" or "liver spots".

People who work outdoors or sunbathe without sun protection can develop various skin problems. The sun can cause large freckles called "age spots" or "liver spots". These flat, brown spots are medically referred to as "lentigines". They have nothing to do with the liver; they are caused by

the sun and usually appear on the face, arms and hands. Most commercial "fade" creams will not make lentigines disappear.

Dr. Manuel R. Morman of Rutherford is conducting a research study on a medication being developed to lighten these areas of sun damage.

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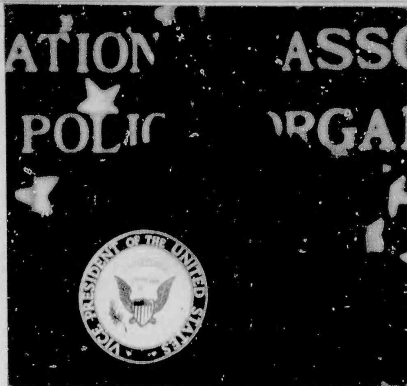

heart and soul of police work."

The Belleville officers were chosen out of 22 officers nationally.

Officers Melillo and Linfante pulled Collins over and as they were about to exit their patrol car, Collins fired two gun shots at them and took off, police reported.

The six Belleville officers followed Collins into Natley, when he crashed his car into the front porch of a home near Kingsland Avenue.

Collins shot at the officers who cornered him from both sides of the river on Kingsland Avenue.

The suspect held a gun to his mouth under his chin, leading the officers to believe that the suspect was attempting suicide. The officers were trying to convince the suspect to drop his gun and the standoff continued for a few minutes, police reported.

Then an officer observed that the suspect was going into his pockets, taking out ammunition and putting it into the open cylinder of the gun, police said.

Collins then closed the cylinder

of the gun and pointed it to his left at the officers positioned there and at this point the officers fired at the suspect who died shortly thereafter, police reported.

"The success of any organization can usually be attributed to its leader. The support and leadership of our Chief of Police, Raymond Kimble is not only an essential ingredient but an unquestioned factor when any one of our officers is successful in this police department's quest to preserve the peace," said Capt. Leonard Burrell of the Belleville Police Department.

But the officers thought Capt. Burrell deserved recognition and they called him up on stage during the ceremony.

"Capt. Burrell was in charge of the shift the day of the shooting and he was at the scene when the shooting began. But he was too modest to put himself in for any awards. He puts his men before himself and I consider myself to be lucky to work under him," said Pino.

All of the men attended three continuous days of activities and ceremonies in Washington D.C.

"We received letters from two groups who have asked for additional information on the bridge and these groups have expressed interest in taking possession of the bridge," he said.

"This would entail dismantling the bridge and transporting it to another location," he added. "The counterweight is near a million tons which presents a challenge when moving it."

Mayor Victor Canning said he is concerned about the closing of the bridge.

"It is going to be a major inconvenience for the flow of traffic," he said. "It is also going to hurt local businesses."

Councilwoman Angie Paserschia shares the same concern.

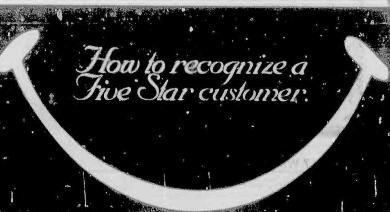
"This represents poor planning. It is the second time the bridge will be closed...I am devastated because it will add time to many commuters' trips," she said.

D.O.T has been coordinating this project with local officials from Belleville, North Arlington and Kearny as well as Bergen, Essex and Hudson counties.

program that has such merit with the kids. We would like to promote this as part of the middle school and we are going to try our best to continue the program," Lally said.

"Up until last night no request was made for money. All I knew is we had a teacher promote and volunteer his services," Lally said in a comment after the meeting.

Adam Waldron, a senior at Belleville High School, addressed the board about how the music program effected his life.

He described "Van" as "one of the greatest teachers" because he did not just teach but he "inspired" his students.

In other business, the Board of Education unanimously agreed to ask the athletic director Karen

Fucello to write a letter to the Athletic Council requesting a change in the athletic league that Belleville currently participates.

"At least 10 parents came up to me at the last football game," said Board member Frank Montagna.

"A public school should not

compete with private and catholic schools where they can go out and recruit their players," he added.

The board is also investigating how to increase its numbers for its After School Program which costs \$155 a month.

"Our program is better than parent care because the children are in a school environment with a certified teacher and aide," Lally said.

Board member Judy Piscatowski said the district's After School Program carries insurance while parent care does not.

The board also unanimously agreed to install bathroom facilities in the trailer at School 10. The sixth grade class will be crowded in the trailer because of over crowding.

Board secretary Edward Appleton said the cost would be between \$4,500 and \$5,500.

Lally also said the district will be monitored by the State Department of Education over the next two months.

"Because the district met all student performance standards, it qualified for an abbreviated monitoring process. Instead of 32 qualifications, we only have to be monitored for nine of them," Lally said.

The children took turns going into the ambulance, tried on the equipment, looked at different fire devices and talked to the firemen.

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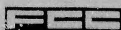

Columbus Hospital to sponsor breast cancer screening

Columbus Hospital, in conjunction with the American Cancer Society, will sponsor a Breast Cancer Detection Awareness Program on Saturday, Oct. 26, between 8:30 a.m. and 3 p.m.

Phil Federico garners Hall of Fame honors

"Wrestling has been a big part of my life," Federico told me last week. "It was quite a challenge at Pinelands, starting a program from scratch. But it turned out to be a great move for me and my family."

Federico was a standout wrestler at Essex Catholic and, after being graduated, competed successfully at Seton Hall University, where he earned a bachelors degree in 1972.

Following graduation from college, he took a job as assistant wrestling coach at Clifton High School. A few years later, he was named head coach and held that position from 1975 through 1979.

He credits his desire to coach from his high school mentor, **Gene D'Allesandro**. Ironically, D'Allesandro, a coaching legend at Essex Catholic, became Belleville's head wrestling coach in 1976 and today, is still active in coaching at Belleville High, working with the golf team.

"Coach D'Allesandro gave me the motivation to coach," Federico said. "Clifton was a great opportunity. It's a big school with a great tradition. But when the opportunity came at Pinelands, it was hard to turn down."

The "opportunity" Federico refers to was the chance to start a program from its inception. A small Group I school, Pinelands had wanted to introduce wrestling to its Southern New Jersey community for a few years. When it saw the chance to bring someone with Federico's background on board, the marriage seemed natural.

Federico and his wife **Mary** had been married for two years and the couple had just welcomed their daughter, **Kelli** to the world.

"Taking the Pinelands job was something I had to do," Federico said. "I had a family and the opportunity was something I looked forward to. I knew it would take a lot of work, but my wife and I felt it was good move."

So, the Federico's moved to South Jersey and Federico began the job of not only coaching a program, but building its foundation.

"The first year (1979-80) we were a junior varsity program," recalled Federico. "The biggest thing I wanted to do then was develop the feeder program. It was imperative to get the recreation program started and the interest from the kids was great."

"I pretty much burned the midnight oil back then. It wasn't just coaching, it was camps all year round, working with colleges to get kids placed, etc."

The hard work paid off. Federico compiled an incredible record of 152-55 during his eight years as head coach. He coached 25 district champions, 12 regional champs and five state champions.

He was named Coach of the Year five times. In 1987, he earned Ocean County Coach of the Year accolades and was the recipient of the prestigious New Jersey State Officials Sportsmanship Award. He also gained national recognition for his superior coaching efforts by *Scholastic Coach* magazine.

Following Federico's "retirement" from wrestling, the transition took time.

"I knew it was time to get out of coaching," he said. "The program was in good shape. I wanted to spend more time with my family. It was kind of tough leaving it, but more importantly, I couldn't continue to take that much time away from my family."

He continues to coach at Pinelands, serving as head coach of the girls and boys bowling teams.

Congratulations to Federico on a tremendous accomplishment. He is a true example of how hard work and dedication will lead to outstanding success.

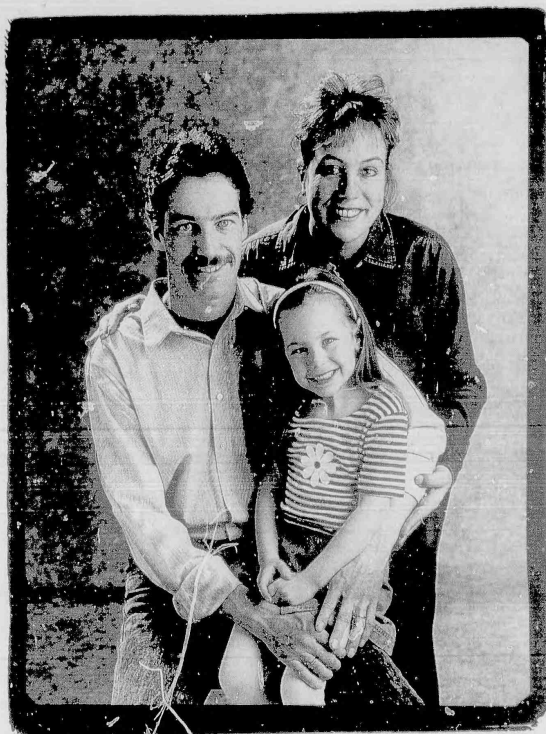

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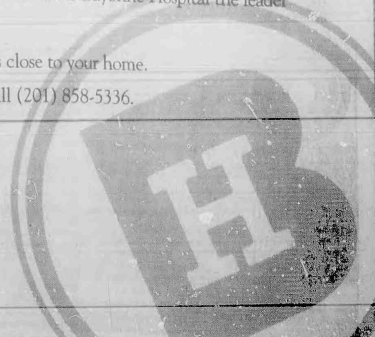
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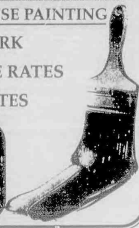
