# D.O.T. to discuss closing of the Rutgers Bridge

The Department of Transportation is scheduled to have a public information session on Oct. 29 from 3 p.m.to 7 p.m. at Town Hall to discuss the closing of the Route 7 bridge known as the Rutgers

Route 7 bridge known as the Ruigers Street Bridge.

"The construction is anticipated to begin in the fall of 1998 and we are hoping to complete the bridge by the fall of the year 2,000," said David Brown,

The project is estimated to cost approximately \$30 million and it will be

The drawbridge, located over the Passaic River, will be replaced with a drawbridge that conforms to contempo-

Brown indicated that the flows thesely detour is rerouting traffic to the Kingsland/Park Avenue crossing over the Passaic via River Road in Lyndhurst Township. The anticipated length of the detour is four miles. In the past, this route

"The current bridge was built in 1914 and is beyond rehabilitation. We are replacing it in order to meet the current demands of vehicular traffic," Brown

#### Officials plan forum on teen violence

Officials have scheduled a pub-lic meeting to address the concerns of parents and local residents regarding recent incidents of vio-lence among Nutley and Belleville

lence among Nutley and Belleville teenagers.

Mayor Garry Furnari said he and Public Safety Commissioner Carmen Orechio felt the matter must be addressed.

"In the days following these incidents rumors ran rampant," said Furnari, adding that the meeting will also serve as a "fact-finding" corporating.

will also serve as a tact-finding opportunity.

The meeting will be held 7:30 p.m., tonight, Oct. 24, in the Commission Chamber at Town Hall. It will be attended by public officials and Police Chief Robert. DeLitta.

Furnari said there is no truth to
the rumor that the incidents
involved organized gangs.
Police report that the violence
of two weeks ago did not spill over
into this past weekend.

The flat, brown spots are medically referred to as " lentigines". They have nothing to do with the liver, they are caused by the sun and usually appear on the face, arms and bands. Most commercial "fade" creams will not make lentigines disappear.

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

of the gun and pointed it to his left at the officers positioned there and at this point the officers fired at the suspect who died shortly thereafter, police reported.

#### Martini for Congress

During the campaign for the Eighth Congressional District seat, his oppone t has sought to link Congressman Bill Martini, R-8, to House Speaker Newt Gingrich.

In fact, one piece of campaign literature showed Martini as a marionette, with strings leading up to the Republican leader's fingers

But a glance at the record reveals quite a different Martini -- an independent and, we think, quite thoughtful legislator.

As a matter of fact, a national poll last year showed that of the 73 freshmen in the House of Representatives, Martini had been the least

likely to vote the party line.

Martini has put distance between himself and the more doctrinaire members of his own party by taking moderate stands on abortion, gun control and the environment. His indefatigable efforts to preserve Sterling Forest and support for other causes, moreover, earned him the endorsement of the environ-mentalist Sierra Club -- becoming one of only at 15 Republicans across the nation to be backed by that group in this year's elections.

But on other issues, including most of the more desirable aspects of the Contract with America, Martini has sided with the majority Republicans. He supported the overhaul of the welfare system. He voted to cut Congressional spending, and went the extra step and voluntarily pared down the size of his own Congressional staff. He advocated a crackdown in illegal immigration. He voted for term limits for members of Congress.

His opponent, rather unfairly, has skewered Martini over his votes to restrain the future growth of Medicare. In actuality, the two can didates aren't that far apart on this issue: both have said they want the growth of Medicare curbed, only differing on the degree by which it should be reigned in.

On balance, Martini is no more an echo of Gingrich than his opponent is of former Gov. Jim Florio -- to whom Martini has sought to link his foe. Voters in the Eighth Congressional District should judge Martini on his own moderate record, and return him to Washington for a second term on Nov. 5

#### Martini for Congress

During the campaign for the Eighth Congressional District seat, his opponent has sought to link Congressman Bill Martini, R. 8, to House Speaker Newt Gingrich.

In fact, one piece of campaign literature showed Martini as a marionette, with strings leading up to the Republican leader's fingers. But a glance at the record reveals quite a

different Martini -- an independent and, we think, quite thoughtful legislator.

As a matter of fact, a national poll last year showed that of the 73 freshmen in the House of Representatives, Martini had been the least likely to vote the party line.

Martini has put distance between himself and the more doctrinaire members of his own party by taking moderate stands on abortion, gun control and the environment. His indefatigable efforts to preserve Sterling Forest and support for other causes, moreover, earned him the endorsement of the environ-mentalist Sierra Club -- becoming one of only about 15 Republicans across the nation to be backed by that group in this year's elections.

But on other issues, including most of the more desirable aspects of the Contract with America, Martini has sided with the majority Republicans. He supported the overhaul of the welfare system. He voted to cut Congressional spending, and went the extra step and voluntarily pared down the size of his own Congressional staff. He advocated a crackdown in illegal immigration. He voted for term limits for members of Congress.

His opponent, rather unfairly, has skewered Martini over his votes to restrain the future growth of Medicare. In actuality, the two candidates aren't that far apart on this issue: both have said they want the growth of Medicare curbed, only differing on the degree by which

it should be reigned in.

On balance, Martini is no more an echo of Gingrich than his opponent is of former Gov.

Jim Florio -- to whom Martini has sought to
link his foe. Voters in the Eighth Congressional District should judge Martini on his own moderate record, and return him to Washington for a second term on Nov. 5

#### Phil Federico garners Hall of Fame honors



Belleville native Phil Federico was inducted into the Pineland Regional last Saturday for his outstanding contributions to the wrestling program at

A 1968 graduate of Essex Catholic High School, Federico, 46, is just the second coach in the history of the school to Pineland's Hall.

"Wrestling has been a big part of my life," Federico told me last week. "It was quite a challenge at Pinelands, starting a program from scratch. But it turned out to be a

Federico was a standout wrestler at Essex Catholic and, after being graduated, competed successfully at Seton Hall University, where he earned a bachelors degree in 1972.

Following graduation from college, he took a job as assistant wrestling coach at Clifton High School. A few years later, he was named head coach and held that position from 1975 through 1979.

He credits his desire to coach from his high school He credits his desire to coach from his high school mentor, Gene D'Allesandro, Ironically, D'Allesandro, a coaching legend at Essex Catholic, became Belleville's head wrestling coach in 1976 and today, is still active in coaching at Belleville High, working with the golf team. "Coach D'Allesandro gave me the motivation to coach," Federico said. "Clifton was a great opportunity. It's a big school with a great tradition. But when the

opportunity came at Pinelands, it was hard to turn down."

The "opportunity" Federico refers to was the chance to start a program from its inception. A small Group I school, Pinelands had wanted to introduce wrestling to its Southern New Jersey community for a few years. When it saw the chance to bring someone with Federico's background on board, the marriage seemed natural.

Federico and his wife Mary had been married for two

ars and the couple had just welcomed their daughter, Kelli to the world.

Taking the Pinelands job was something I had to do." Federico said. "I had a family and the opportunity was something I looked forward to. I knew it would take a lot of work, but my wife and I felt it was good move

So, the Federico's moved to South Jersey and Federico began the job of not only coaching a program, but building its foundation.

"The first year (1979-80) we were a junior varsity program," recalled Federico. "The biggest thing I wanted to do then was develop the feeder program. It was imperative to get the recreation program started and the interest

from the kids was great.
"I pretty much burned the midnight oil back then. It wasn't just coaching, it was camps all year round, working with colleges to get kids placed, etc."

The hard work paid off. Federico compiled an incred ible record of 152-55 during his eight years as head coach. He coached 25 district champions, 12 regional champs and five state champior

He was named Coach of the Year five times. In 1987, he earned Ocean County Coach of the Year accolades and was the recipient of the prestigious New Jersey State Officials Sportsmanship Award. He also gained national recognition for his superior coaching efforts by Scholastic Coach magazine

Following Federico's "retirement" from wrestling, the transition took time.

"I knew it was time to get out of coaching," he said. "The program was in good shape. I wanted to spend more time with my family. It was kind of tough leaving it, but more importantly, I couldn't continue to take that much

time away from my family."

He continues to coach at Pinelands, serving as head

coach of the girls and boys bowling teams.

Congratulations to Federico on a tremendous accomplishment. He is a true example of how hard work and dedication will lead to outstanding success.

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
